The purpose of Marie's visit was to share a bit of history with the kindergarteners and tell them what it was like to be five years old back in 1915. The children gathered around Marie on the carpet to hear her tell stories from her life as a five year-old. She told them stories of traveling by covered wagon out on the Texas plains, sharing campfires and meals with real live cowboys. She went on to tell how Babe Ruth could hit a baseball that seemed to go on forever. She told the children about how having fun meant shooting marbles with her brothers and playing dolls with her sister, or playing a good game of "kick the can" with friends. When she was five, there was no television to watch or even radio to listen to at home. The students heard Marie tell them how she

She spoke about going to the silent movies to watch Charlie Chaplin in black and white. Marie told the children about moving to El Segundo in 1942 with her husband and son; this was before Center Street Elementary School was even built. She told them how a dairy and hundreds of cows occupied the land where their school now lies.

Both Marie and the kids thoroughly enjoyed the visit. It was truly a great experience for all involved. Cooper and his classmates all enjoyed the visit and hearing the stories from someone with so much history. We all need to take a lesson from Marie and the kindergarteners and remember to take the time to listen to the stories of our elders before it is too late and their stories are lost forever.•

In the past 50 years that John Stevenson has been the head baseball coach at El Segundo, the Eagles have reached the postseason playoffs an unmatched 42 times. If you ask Stevenson, he'll say that those teams all had something in common--someone who came through in the big games. Add Ben Doucette to that list with his perfect 4-for-4 day against Don Lugo as the Eagles won their first round CIF Southern Section Division IV playoff game 11-1.

After missing the playoffs a year ago with an 18-12 record, the Eagles secured their spot in the playoffs with a second place finish in the Pioneer League. The Pioneer League sent four teams to the playoffs, but the way
