The Knights tried to mount a rally in the third, putting two runners on after a single and an Eagles error to put the tying run on second with one out. Rich and the Eagles dug deep and they got out the jam by getting the Knights' best hitter, Alex Davis, to ground out to third.

The Eagles mounted a threat of their own in the fifth inning, but came up short. However, Bishop put another two runners on base via a walk and an error in the sixth before Rich induced a groundout and a strikeout to end the inning.

The Eagles stopped the Knights in the top of the fifth, with Rich striking out the last batter of the game to give El Segundo a 1-0 victory over Bishop Montgomery and secure


