Eagles Double Their Pleasure Against South, Return to Playoffs

The El Segundo baseball team won 18 games in 2008, but failed to make the playoffs for just the third time since 1985. This year however, the Eagles are 21-8 and placed second in the Pioneer League to earn a trip to the CIF Southern Section playoffs for the 43rd time in head coach John Stevenson's 50 years at the helm. The Eagles guaranteed their spot in the expanded playoff format by defeating South Torrance 8-0 and 11-7. For the Eagles, it was a measure of revenge against a Spartan squad that swept El Segundo last year and kept the only 18-win team out of the playoffs.

The Eagles scored runs in each of the first

five innings and built an 8-0 lead to topple a team that has become a baseball rival. The Eagles sent Nigel Nootbaar to the mound, and all the sophomore did is pick up where he left off against Lawndale by throwing a one-hitter to a team that had been running up scores on the rest of the Pioneer League.

The Eagles' lineup has been on fire as of late and came out swinging again by pounding out 11 hits, including five doubles and two home runs. Logan Erickson led the attack by going 3-for-3 with a single, double and his second home run of the season; he boosted his batting average to .398 on the year. Erickson's bat is coming alive at a great time, much like many of the Eagles' hitters are. The senior designated hitter has been driving the ball to the

gaps more this year, which has generated a higher batting average that has hovered above .350 for most of the season. "I'm seeing the ball a lot better now," Erickson said.

Another Eagle hitting his stride is senior first baseman Richard Seigel. Once a promising pitcher before an injury slowed him, he is now a mainstay at first base where he has become a defensive standout. But where Seigel is really making an impact is with his bat. He is hitting .375 on the year and is 11-for-23 over the past six games as a starter. Against South he had two hits, including a double, and also scored once. Seigel has
