Kornblum Continues Academic Improvement

During the May 28 meeting the Hawthorne School Board heard an update from LaTima Jones, the school's new principal, who shared with the board the successes and challenges facing her students. Jones started the presentation by acknowledging the success of her predecessor Jennifer Beekman. Prior to Jones's tenure at the school, the staff and students improved the school's Academic Performance Index rating by 17 points to a current (and presumably final) score of 789. "Last year, under the leadership of Mrs. Beekman, the Kornblum staff rocked the CST," said Jones. "They met all of their targets which was a wonderful, wonderful achievement and our staff needs to be recognized for that. You guys worked hard and we celebrate that."

In English Language Arts Kornblum's lower grades all either improved or showed minor decreases compared with last year. The school's third grade was especially strong, having met the district's goals in every end of unit assessment. "Third grade really did a spectacular job," said Jones. "I'm so proud of them." However, the school's fourth and fifth graders were less successful on the test. In all but one unit, less than half the students scored proficient or advanced on their benchmark assessments. Jones said improving scores in these two grades is a priority. "We're going to focus on working to improve our scores," said Jones. "[Fourth and fifth graders] didn't do as well on language arts . . . so we're going to work on that area."

While English Language Arts was a problem for Kornblum's fifth grade, in Math they showed consistent growth all year. So far, every unit assessment has shown improvement over last year. "In fifth grade I was very delighted to see that every unit they improved on their scores [compared with] last year," said Jones. "I'm very proud of them." Kornblum also has a sizable amount of students learning English. Jones explained that special projects teacher Jezabel Salas has been working with these

students after school so they can get a solid grasp on the language, and Jones is confident in their abilities. "Our after-school classes focused on second and third grade students," said Jones. "Miss Salas, our EL specialist, she worked with those students after school, consistently all year, and she's been working to move them along so they can reclassify. I'm sure they will be reclassifying as they have more school experience."

Kornblum has a number of special program in place to improve student education. One program Jones said has been working well is providing teachers with collaborative work time while students are working. "It's a first for us," said Jones. "It's working extraordinarily well for us. Our students are well behaved; on the occasion that Miss Salas isn't available I do the same thing. I did it once this year and I loved the experience of teaching and working with the kids directly. I'm a real teacher at heart."

Kornblum's fifth graders also have the

opportunity to receive math tutoring from students attending Hawthorne Math and Science Academy. These HMSA students are instructed by a Kornblum teacher how work with small groups of Kornblum students to improve their math skills. "When we go in there you see the students and they are very attentive, they want to learn they're engaged, they want to learn," said Jones. "I see it being a great program. We're hoping to expand it next year to language arts or multiple grade levels depending upon the participation of HMSA students." Jones said she has enjoyed working with the staff at Kornblum. She commended them for going above and beyond to help students. "The entire Kornblum staff . . . have responded to any request I've given them,"said Jones. "I feel that we are truly a team, everyone comes together."

One parent of a Kornblum student, Cristina Montoya, also addressed the Board to compliment Jones's performance as the school's principal. She said Jones is attentive to every student and provides them with rewards like "Brag Tags" and "Gotcha tickets" for good behavior. "She takes the time to explain everything to the parents and the incentives she provides to the students are great," said Montoya. "Miss Jones, we are very happy with you and I wish you could stay with us forever." The Board was similarly impressed with Jones. Board member Cristina Chiappe said the programs at Kornblum are models for the district. "It doesn't surprise me that you are so successful," said Chiappe. "When we talk about what we want from a school it's what you are doing. I'm really impressed with what's going on at Kornblum." •

Centenarians Reveal Their Secrets to a Long, Happy Life

(BPT) - One hundred years ago, the average American's life expectancy was between 50 and 60 years, and so the estimated 53,000 centenarians in the United States today have lived much longer than most of their contemporaries. Perhaps that is why a new survey shows that these 100-year-olds feel "blessed" (36 percent), "happy" (31 percent) and "surprised" (12 percent) to have lived so long. Not one reports feeling sad or burdened; only 3 percent say they feel lonely.

For the past nine years, UnitedHealthcare has conducted a survey of 100 100-year-olds to gain insight into their lives. For its most recent 100@100 survey, the company also polled 65-year-old baby boomers to examine how the attitudes and lifestyles of people entering their retirement years compare to those who hit that same age 35 years ago.

According to the study, one thing both groups agreed on is that they feel younger than their years. On average, the centenarians surveyed said they feel just 83 years old, while 65-year-old baby boomers said they feel 55 years old.



"It's encouraging that older Americans feel more youthful than the number of candles on their birthday cake might suggest," said Rhonda Randall, D.O., chief medical officer of UnitedHealthcare Retiree Solutions. UnitedHealthcare serves more than a quarter of America's centenarians through its Medicare plans. "By looking at how they are living their daily lives, we can glean important insights about the keys to staying healthy and feeling vibrant as we age."

The following are some of the secrets to healthy aging, as revealed by the 100@100 survey.

Secret 1 Keep Up with Exercise

Despite their age, centenarians stay active: more than half walk or hike and nearly a third do strength-training exercises. Some even run outdoors or play team sports every week (4 percent). Exercise is an important part of boomers' lifestyle as well. Nearly 3 in 4 walk or hike each week, 37 percent do strength-training exercises and 13 percent run outdoors or play team sports.

Secret 2

Get Preventive Care to Stay Healthy

Older Americans are taking the saying "an ounce of prevention equals a pound of cure" to heart by keeping up with preventive health care services to stay well. Nearly 9 in 10 get an annual exam (87 percent of centenarians and 89 percent of baby boomers) with their primary care physician, and the majority also report getting eye exams regularly (71 percent of centenarians and 76 percent of baby boomers)

Secret 3

Maintain a Positive Attitude

Both centenarians and baby boomers say maintaining their physical health and a positive attitude are equally important to successful aging (66 percent and 81 percent, respectively). In fact, 82 percent of centenarians say laughing/having a sense of humor is important to healthy aging.

Perhaps the most important lesson revealed in the 100@100 survey findings is that living a long, healthy life is about more than just genetics. Daily habits and lifestyle choices can make a difference not only in how long people live but also in how they feel as they age.

Sunsets on Titan Reveal Complexity of Hazy Exoplanets

Scientists working with data from NASA's Cassini mission have developed a new way to understand the atmospheres of exoplanets by using Saturn's smog-enshrouded moon Titan as a stand-in. The new technique shows the dramatic influence that hazy skies could have on our ability to learn about these alien worlds orbiting distant stars.

The work was performed by a team of researchers led by Tyler Robinson, a NASA Postdoctoral Research Fellow at NASA's Ames Research Center in Moffett Field, California. "It turns out there's a lot you can learn from looking at a sunset," Robinson said. Light from sunsets, stars and planets can be separated into its component colors to create spectra, as prisms do with sunlight, in order to obtain hidden information. Despite the staggering distances to other planetary systems, researchers have recently begun to develop techniques for collecting spectra of exoplanets. When one of these worlds transits, or passes in front of its host star, as seen from Earth, some of the star's light travels through the exoplanet's atmosphere, where it is changed in subtle but measurable ways. This process imprints information about the planet that can be

collected by telescopes. The resulting spectra are a record of that imprint. Spectra enable scientists to tease out details about what exoplanets are like, such as aspects of the temperature, composition and structure of their atmospheres.

Robinson and his colleagues exploited a similarity between exoplanet transits and sunsets witnessed by the Cassini spacecraft at Titan. These observations, called solar In the process, Titan's sunsets revealed just how dramatic the effects of hazes can be. Multiple worlds in our own solar system, including Titan, are blanketed by clouds and high-altitude hazes. Scientists expect that many exoplanets would be similarly obscured. Clouds and hazes create a variety of complicated effects that researchers must work to disentangle from the signature of these alien atmospheres.

Jupiter's Great **Red Spot Is Shrinking**

Jupiter's trademark Great Red Spot-a swirling storm feature larger than Earth—is getting smaller. This downsizing, which is changing the shape of the spot from an oval into a circle, has been known about since the 1930s, but now a striking new Hubble Space Telescope image captures the spot at a smaller size than ever before.

Jupiter's Great Red Spot is a churning anticyclonic storm. It shows up in images of the giant planet as a conspicuous deep red eye embedded in swirling layers of pale yellow, orange and white. Winds inside this Jovian storm rage at immense speeds, reaching several hundreds of miles per hour. Historic observations as far back as the late 1800s gauged this turbulent spot to span about 25,000 miles at its widest point—wide enough to fit three Earths comfortably side by side. In 1979 and 1980 the NASA Voyager flybys measured the spot at a shrunken 14,000 miles across. Now, Hubble has measured the diameter of this feature to be just under 10,000 miles. •

Here are thumbnail sketches: in 1849, the French economist Frederic Bastiat wrote that there are only two ways a person could better himself: "Productivity or Plunder." On an individual basis, if one man took from another that which he had produced, it

the process of taking from the top discourages industry, while simultaneously providing benefits for not working as a disincentive to work. Consequently, a system that disincentivizes work by both top and bottom cannot possibly serve the best interests of the nation. By Bastiat's or any rational person's definition, such a condition is comedic "plunder."

And now we come to Herbert Stein's warning, as paraphrased by FOX News: "Anything that can't continue, won't." The financial cost

would be a criminal and immoral act. But on a collective basis, that criminal act is the foundation of Liberal thought.

But having more than a criminal foundation, the philosophy has two corollary consequences: it is collectively enslaving and individually degrading. Such parking shall not be enclosed with security fencing or gates. Such parking shall be continuously open and accessible at all times for guest parking and shall be appropriately identified. Guest parking may, in the case of mixed-use developments in the mixed-use overlay zone, be provided in conjunction with the parking for the commercial retail uses, however, if the commercial uses include restaurants, guest parking may not be used for the portion attributable to the required parking for the restaurant. Guest parking jointly used for commercial and residential uses must not be located more than 150 feet from the entrance lobby or access point to the residential units. Signage designating and directing traffic to the guest parking areas shall be provided if guest parking is not shared with the parking for commercial/retail uses;

76. For purposes of this section only, a bedroom is defined as being any room containing sixty square feet or more that is not a living room, dining room, kitchen or laundry service area. 1/4 cup coarsely chopped fresh cilantro 1 jalapeno pepper, very thinly sliced (Remove seeds for less heat)

Directions

Roll the pizza dough into a 10-by-14-inch oval on a lightly floured board. Transfer it to a baking sheet. Bake at 450° F for 8 to 10 minutes, or until lightly browned. Meanwhile, heat the oil in a medium skillet, and stir in the garlic and lemongrass

paste; cook for 1 minute. Add the chicken and soy sauce; stir-fry over medium-high heat until the chicken is cooked through. Place the carrots in a small bowl and stir in a pinch of sugar and the vinegar.

Spread the chicken mixture over the baked dough then sprinkle it with the carrots, grapes, cilantro, and jalapeno slices. Cut the flatbread into 8 square pieces.
