High Interest in Space Tourism

The success of private space exploration companies such as SpaceX in Hawthorne hasn't gone unnoticed by travelers looking to expand their horizons and come back with more than a t-shirt.

A new poll of Americans reveals a high number would ride aboard a space vehicle and endure the rigors of liftoff and a return to Earth. Four in 10 people said they'd consider making the voyage into space despite some strong doubts space tourism will become a reality within the next 50 years.

Pew Research Center asked Americans their views about the new space race, both for exploration and pure fun. Among people most interested in traveling into space, 45 percent say they'd go up for the unique experience. Another 29 percent want to sightsee and specifically look down at the Earth.

Elon Musk of SpaceX, Amazon founder Jeff Bezos and Virgin Airlines' Richard Branson are huge backers of the new space race. They and their space flight companies are testing reusable rockets and space vehicles they hope someday will ferry passengers around the Earth and back safely.

Becoming a space traveler isn't for the majority of Americans, based on the poll results. An overwhelming number -- 58 percent -- said their bucket lists don't include a flight that orbits Earth. The cost of a ticket and the perceived danger makes such a trip impossible to imagine for many of them. Others said they're too old or not healthy enough to make that kind of trip.

If the days comes when manned space vehicles fly like commercial jetliners, more men

than women are ready for departure. About half the men (51 percent) say they would be interested in orbiting the Earth in a spacecraft, compared with one-third of women. The men who aren't interested in going to space think it would be too expensive. The women believe the dangers outweigh the adventure, according to the poll results.

The interest in being a space traveler is highest among young Americans born between 1981 and 1996. An impressive 63 percent of the millennials told Pew they would definitely or probably be interested in going up in space for a look-see.

People in the survey were evenly divided on whether space tourism will happen in the next half-century. Americans were even more skeptical about the possibility that mankind would build colonies on other planets by 2068. Still, there are believers out there.

Almost one-third of the people polled envision colonies on other planets within 50 years. That aligns with Musk's belief that millions of people could be living on Mars around 2060. He raised the ante last September when he told attendees at a space conference in Australia that the first human visitors to the red planet could reach Mars as early as 2024.

Public attitudes about space exploration and who will drive future missions are changing, the poll numbers reveal. While Americans who profess to be interested in news about space are confident that private companies will contribute to the U.S. space program, a solid two-thirds don't want space exploration to be privatized. Two-thirds of Americans polled said it is essential that NASA continue to be

involved in space exploration.

President Trump has set a goal for NASA to return astronauts to the moon, where the space agency could build a relay station to support the more ambitious missions to Mars. The agency announced last year it has plans to build a facility called the Deep Space Gateway on the moon. The structure could serve as a way station between the Earth and the Red Planet -- a nine-month trip between the planets using the fastest rocket NASA has in operation.

Will space be a profitable venture for SpaceX and the other transporters? Americans feel sure they can, and believe these private companies are well-managed and will control their costs enough to make meaningful contributions to the exploration of space in this century. NASA currently uses them as contractors to lift satellites into orbit and make supply runs to the international space station.

NASA will send up another rover to Mars in two years as part of the agency's ongoing exploration of the planet. "The Mars 2020 mission addresses high-priority science goals for Mars exploration, including key questions about the potential for life on Mars," NASA said. The next Rover mission is designed to demonstrate technologies that "address the challenges of future human expeditions to Mars." They include a method for producing oxygen from the Martian atmosphere, identifying water beneath the surface, and improving landing techniques. NASA also wants to study weather, dust and other environmental conditions that could affect future astronauts living and working on Mars. •


Check It Out

The Stars Beneath Our Feet Helps Build Bridges From Social Debris

Summer is in full swing and there're a bounty of brainy books beckoning from our shelves to be plucked and pondered through as we speak. And one in particular might just be the remedy for the summer slump and offer ready respite from the stultifying Celsius and sun-soaked concrete outside. So find a shaded corner of our amply air-conditioned library and delve into this week's winsome whopper of bookly whimsy.

The Stars Beneath Our Feet by David Barclay Moore offers a surfeit of surefire summer insights. This Young Adult novel features a protagonist undergoing the

gauntlet of trying trials and troublesome tribulations of adolescence. Young Lolly lives with his mother in Harlem and has an affinity for design and architecture that he expresses through his acute adroitness with Legos. The Legos become a refuge from the hardships of urban living and coming of age in a neighborhood blighted by bouts of street violence. His imagination becomes a safe haven from the cacophonous social inequalities with which inner city children wrestle. Often angry and confronted with moral confusion, Lolly manages to think outside the box and wield creativity to his advantage to build a barrier to protect himself from class injustices Lego brick by Lego brick at a time.

His family is suddenly wrought with tragedy as Lolly's beloved older brother Jermaine becomes a victim of gun violence. Lolly's Lego pastime immediately takes on new significance as an outlet for his grief and survivor's guilt. The healing process is long and arduous and we're exigently engrossed in his narrative of overcoming challenges and personal adversity. Lolly is continually pressed to make critical and life-changing

decisions throughout the story -- decisions that will irrevocably dictate and reroute the course of his life toward either self-defeat and resignation or redemption and understanding. And we're alongside Lolly every step of the way rooting for his wellbeing.

The novel excels at providing a panoply of underrepresented voices and seamlessly incorporating them into the forefront of the narrative fold. Characters are recruited from an array of unique demographics and offer insights from marginalized groups historically not highlighted in YA fare. We have LGBTQ characters playing prominent roles and teens who fall within the autism spectrum driving the story. At its heart, the novel is about cultivating a strong sense of belonging and community, and finding compassion through kindness and unexpected friendships.

David Barclay Moore writes with velocity and panache and manages to authentically capture an equal portion of hope and harrowing. It's a precarious tonal balance to strike. The writer provides a frank portrayal of hard realities like poverty, divorce and bereavement whilst also somehow imbuing the story with a distinct sense of humor, optimism and Harlem bravado. Moore's use of regional language is particularly effective in achieving this ambiance of aural precision. The urban patois reads convincingly.

All said, it's a considerable work that should entice many a reader with its strong themes of togetherness and healthy relationships. The novel also serves as a potent celebration of art and its ability to inform and shape impressionable young minds toward striving for excellence. The story is a mindful mesh of *A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man, Extremely Loud & Incredibly Close*, and *A Tree Grows in Brooklyn*. It's a most palatable potpourri of past profound plots.

This peach of a page-turner is nigh-perfect, palm-sized and primed to be perused. It sits on our shelves waiting to whomp you with a one-two of hard-won wisdom.

Joaquin Phoenix Plays a Brutal Contract Killer in Arthouse Film

In the life of a contract killer, one is required to maintain complete control in the midst of chaos in order to stay alive. Now add in the variable of companionship, and this contingency becomes a vulnerability and jeopardizing to one's life. This is the synopsis of director Lynne Ramsay's provocative arthouse film, *You Were Never Really Here*.

You Were Never Really Here is the story

limits of their comfort zones to show the depths of wickedness of which the human species is capable. Her 2011 film, *We Need to Talk About Kevin*, revealed a depth of sin that borders on demonic. While Ramsay again displays the depravity of human behavior in *You Were Never Really Here*, she seems more intent on exploring how people get to become broken and how innocence can become lost at the earliest of ages. When Joe sees Nina experience horrors first-hand, he

of a murder-for-hire killer, Joe (Joaquin Phoenix), who lives a life of dark solace in modern-day New York City. A burly bear of a man, Joe is silent and consumed with his own thoughts -- blending into the city background during the daylight hours before operating in the night shadows as a monastic mercenary. His lifestyle appears to be easy except for the fact that Joe must care for his aging mother (Judith Roberts), whose home he returns to between jobs so that he can tend to her in her declining mental state. One day, a new job pops up - to locate the daughter of a high-profile senator. Except in this case, finding the girl, Nina (Ekaterina Samsonov), doesn't mean the end of the job. Joe soon realizes that he has waded into the criminal underbelly of child trafficking, coordinated at the highest levels. When the job goes south, Joe must decide whether to retreat and live a lone wolf life, or fight for her safety, which would threaten everyone's survival.

The pairing of Ramsay with Phoenix makes for an electrifying experience. Both artists don't turn a blind eye to the heinous and horrific parts of the human psyche. They full-tilt bulldoze towards it. Phoenix delivers another stunning performance in a role that requires him to push to the fringes of human behavior. He more than delivers in the moments of mental anguish, like when Joe stows away in the closet of his childhood home and wraps a plastic bag over his head to relive moments of childhood trauma to queasy effect.

The theme of control is something that Ramsay has become acclaimed for mastering in her movies. She pushes audiences past the realizes that the circle of abuse he endured as a child continues despite all of his efforts and is forced to question: Did he really save her? Was he ever really there?

You Were Never Really Here is a crackling action thriller with stunning cinematography that shows artistic flourish. Ramsay and Phoenix craft a morality drama that shows how the best of efforts in a broken world can still come up fruitless. Ramsay wades into these waters to capture this dark, depraved part of the very real human psyche in an artfully electrifying fashion and the result is a trip that cinephiles will love to take.

Thank the Moon for Earth's Lengthening Day

For anyone who has ever wished there were more hours in the day, geoscientists have some good news: Days on Earth are getting longer.

A new study that reconstructs the deep history of our planet's relationship to the Moon shows that 1.4 billion years ago, a day on Earth lasted just over 18 hours. This is at least in part because the Moon was closer and changed the way the Earth spun around its axis.

"As the Moon moves away, the Earth is like a spinning figure skater who slows down as they stretch their arms out," explains Stephen Meyers, professor of geoscience at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and co-author of the study published June 4 in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

It describes a tool, a statistical method that links astronomical theory with geological observation (called astrochronology) to look back on Earth's geologic past, reconstruct the history of the solar system and understand ancient climate change as captured in the rock record.

"One of our ambitions was to use astrochronology to tell time in the most distant past, to develop very ancient geological time scales," Meyers says. "We want to be able to study rocks that are billions of years old in

a way that is comparable to how we study modern geologic processes."

Earth's movement in space is influenced by the other astronomical bodies that exert force on it, like other planets and the Moon. This helps determine variations in the Earth's

rotation around and wobble on its axis, and in the orbit the Earth traces around the Sun.

These variations are collectively known as Milankovitch cycles and they determine where sunlight is distributed on Earth, which also means they determine Earth's climate

rhythms. Scientists like Meyers have observed this climate rhythm in the rock record, spanning hundreds of millions of years.

But going back further, on the scale of billions of years, has proved challenging because typical geologic means, like radioisotope dating, do not provide the precision needed to identify the cycles. It's also complicated by lack of knowledge of the history of the Moon.

Leap Seconds

Every now and then a leap second is added to Coordinated Universal Time (UTC) in order to synchronize clocks worldwide with the Earth's ever-slowing rotation.

Two components are used to determine UTC:

International Atomic Time (TAI): A time scale that combines the output of some 200 highly precise atomic clocks worldwide, and provides the exact speed for our clocks to tick.

Universal Time (UT1), also known as Astronomical Time, refers to the Earth's rotation around its own axis, which determines the length of a day.

Before the difference between UTC and UT1 reaches 0.9 seconds, a leap second is added to UTC and to clocks worldwide. By adding an additional second to the time count, our clocks are effectively stopped for that second to give Earth the opportunity to

LAWA Joins "Stop The Bleed" Campaign at 103 LAX Locations

In cases of traumatic injury, seconds count. A person can bleed to death in less than five minutes, but with the right tools bystanders can step in and render aid to the injured until first responders are able to reach the scene.

That's the philosophy behind "Stop The Bleed," a national awareness campaign that Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) has joined with the installation of bleeding suppression kits at 103 locations throughout the nine terminals at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX).

"A victim can bleed to death much faster than trained public safety personnel can arrive," said Patrick Gannon, LAWA Deputy Executive Director for Security and Public Safety, during a news conference with the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) earlier today. "The person standing or sitting next to that individual might be the only one who can make the difference between life and death."

"This has been an ongoing collaboration between the Los Angeles Fire Department Tactical Emergency Medical Support, what we call our TEMS Unit, Community Risk Reduction Unit and Los Angeles World Airports," said Los Angeles Fire Department Deputy Chief Armando Hogan. "The National Stop The Bleed campaign was implemented to fill a critical link in the chain of survival until first-responders arrive on the scene."

The kits are stored in cabinets that also include an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) that can be used by the general public to help resuscitate someone suffering cardiac arrest. Just like the AEDs, the kits include

instructions to help bystanders render aid.

"What we've learned over the years is our ability to protect the public in terms of public safety is truly dependent on the public's involvement," said LAFD Medical Director Dr. Marc Eckstein. "The tools in these kits are extremely easy to apply, and they are designed to be used by any lay-rescuer, any would-be Good Samaritan, to save the life of another, or even their own life."

The kits include a clotting bandage that can be used to pack a wound and a tourniquet that can be used to stem the flow of blood from an injured person's limbs. Also included in the kits are latex gloves, an emergency trauma dressing and shears.

Through its Emergency Management Division, LAWA has ordered 250 of the kits at a cost of \$17,125 from North American Rescue. One to two kits are in each AED cabinet. They were distributed earlier this month, and signs are being updated to indicate the kits are inside the AED cabinets.

"The medical literature is extremely compelling that these kits truly work, they stem hemorrhage and they save lives," he said. "This is truly another step to provide for public safety at one of the world's busiest airports."

In addition, the LAFD is providing training to multiple agencies, including Los Angeles Airport Police, Airport Operations, Customs and Border Protection and the Transportation Security Administration in the use of these kits.
