Treasurer Looks to Safeguard City Monies, Builds Portfolio

While various components contributed to the projected future year budget deficits that prompted the El Segundo City Council to place the Measure A initiative on the ballot, one of the lesser discussed culprits was a substantial loss of investment income. Over the last few years, interest rates have dropped to well below one percent on certificates of deposit (CDs) and money market accounts that used to earn considerably more—and those have not made a comeback. Additionally, the City's higheryielding bonds also reached maturity during that period. Interest on investments fell from \$1.17 million in 2010 to just under \$70,000 in 2012, according to data provided by the City's Finance Department.

While opportunities to bolster yield remain limited, City Treasurer Crista Binder continues to look for ways to maximize El Segundo's investments. "Since I started with the City [in January 2013], we've added medium-term notes to the portfolio--these are corporate securities that can add value when other investments are not yielding the same," Binder explained. "We added about 10 percent of these to the portfolio, making sure we diversified amongst the issuers by name and also sector. In other words, we purchased securities in incremental amounts from different companies that work in different industries. We are also shortening the duration of the portfolio to mitigate risk. In a rising interest rate environment, you want to shorten duration so you are not exposed on the long end of the curve to interest rate fluctuations."

Through these moves, the yield on the City's portfolio has increased by 40 basis points, or 0.40 percent overall. While growth potential on short-term investments is still very low, Binder said that she looks for value where she can without incurring too much risk. "Our

primary goal with the portfolio is safety first-then liquidity and then seeing market rate of return," she explained. Binder added that she is also looking at adding "non-callable" bullet securities to the portfolio that can be held to maturity and won't subject the City to the risk of only being able to reinvest at lower rates.

Upon her appointment to City Treasurer 15 months ago, Binder hit the ground running by scheduling meetings with all the department heads to get a better sense of their operational needs as well the workings of her own office. She discovered the City was using four banks to manage the needs of the various departments—a practice she felt was not optimal. "We needed a much more streamlined cash management operation and so I issued an RFP [Request

For Proposal] for banking services to find the right bank to meet all our treasury needs," Binder said.

Binder put together a panel to review bids from five banks and the group ultimately selected JPMorgan Chase, officially contracting with the firm as of last August. "They presented the best solution to meet the City's needs, including financial incentives to improve our cash management operation," Binder said. In implementing the new banking services, Binder and staff worked with JPMorgan Chase to design an optimal structure comprised of one master concentration account and three zero-balance accounts. "We also have four stand-alone accounts and one custody account



Fuentes, Dugan Elected to Council; Tax Measure Fails

El Segundo will have a leadership change beginning next week, as local voters elected newcomer Mike Dugan to the City Council along with incumbent Suzanne Fuentes during Tuesday's municipal election. With three candidates vying for two open slots on the dais, Mayor Bill Fisher fell short in his bid for a third term. The just-elected two Council members will be sworn in on April 15 and the full group of five will select a new Mayor the same evening. Also on Tuesday, El Segundo voters rejected the Measure A tax initiative that the Council and corporate business community had supported in hopes of shoring up the City's looming budget deficits.

Unofficial results as of Wednesday morning with all three precincts reporting showed Fuentes with a total of 1,878 votes, Dugan with 1,701 and Fisher with 1,403. Measure A, which needed a simple majority of voters in order to pass, failed by a 1,678 to 1,287 margin. A small number of provisional ballots were still left to be counted yesterday and today, but are not expected to impact the final outcome.

The total number of non-provisional ballots cast for this election was 3,030, reflecting 26.5 percent of registered voters (down from about 29 percent two years ago). Of that number, 1,550 were vote by mail and 1,480 from precinct turnout on Tuesday.

Voters also encountered a new ballot type, the County-approved "Opto-Mark" that replaced the now obsolete punch card. "Of the 65-plus cities in Los Angeles County that conduct their own elections, we were the last holdout two years ago still using the punch cards where you have to make sure the hole is punched fully and remove any hanging chads-but that ballot card stock is no longer available and the punch card ballot counter no longer supported," said Deputy City Clerk I Cathy Domann. The Opto-Mark asked voters to use a black marker and darken in the circled items of choice. "This made for a more accurate system as far as confirming voter intent, but it was also more labor-intensive for us since we had to make sure the ink didn't bleed into one of the other ovals or that there wasn't an extra mark," Domann added. "Also some of people who voted by mail used pencil or different-colored pens."

For a period on Tuesday night, many local residents were left in the dark (literally) waiting for ballot count results as a transformer blew in the area of Mariposa Avenue and Sepulveda Boulevard around

9 p.m., mainly affecting Center Street east to Nash Street and from Mariposa north to Imperial Avenue—but also the cable studio that was broadcasting the live feed at City Hall. This temporarily prevented any viewers from watching the proceedings on television or on their computers. Cable eventually got up and running again despite continued power outages on the east side of town. The last precinct count and unofficial totals posted shortly before 11 p.m.

In securing a second term on the Council and finishing as the leading vote-getter, Fuentes said, "I am so grateful and humbled by the voters, my supporters and volunteers and am very excited to welcome Mike Dugan to the Council and work with him." She attributed her successful campaign to her love for and commitment to the City. "I've worked hard and treated this as my second job." Looking at the immediate future, Fuentes noted, "We have our work cut out for us with Measure A falling at the polls. We're going to have to roll up our sleeves and get to the City's business." Fuentes added that she thought Measure A would prevail with all five Council members backing it as well as the business community, but pointed out that "historically El Segundo hasn't passed tax increases."

Fisher, who joined the Council in 2006 and became Mayor last May, said, "It has been an honor serving the El Segundo community for eight years. It's unfortunate that I will not have the opportunity to continue the work we started to move the City forward. I wish the new City Council the wisdom necessary to meet the challenges that lie ahead."

Dugan, a management consultant who came up short in his first Council bid two years ago, was not available for comment as of press time. He was on record as opposed to Measure A. The author of the ballot argument against Measure A, El Segundo resident and former City Councilmember Mike Robbins, could also not be reached for comment in time for this edition.

Measure A sought to increase utility user taxes on businesses by 2.5 percent, impose a new 2.5 percent utility user tax on residents (with both reduced to two percent after three years), raise transient occupancy taxes on lodging by two percent, reduce business license tax credits, and levy a business license tax on long-term parking facilities—with the goal of increasing City revenues by roughly \$6.6 million annually in the first three years

but in the end we will have reduced our total accounts by four," Binder added.

Among the more notable services as part of the new banking relationship will be a lockbox that will accept Automated Clearing House (ACH) collections for water bill payments so customers can sign up to have their accounts debited automatically. This should be in place by the end of May, Binder estimated.

Last July, Binder and staff also completed an analysis of three years worth of cash flows in order to determine seasonal trends and the City's ongoing liquidity needs. "Without a good understanding of our cash flows, then we may not have enough money on hand to pay the City's obligations," Binder said.

As for the aforementioned staff, Binder's department recently underwent a significant change when long-time Deputy Treasurer II Mary Kobus retired at the end of December. The recruitment process brought a replacement in Dino Marsocci, who started two months ago. "We were fortunate to find Dino, as he brings not only cash management experience, but has

which we are keeping from the old relationship, worked as a controller in private industry as well," Binder said.

Meanwhile, Accounting Specialist Thim Whiteside earned a promotion to Deputy Treasurer I last fall to enable Binder to add duties she deemed critical to the operation. "Thim can now perform many of the functions of the Deputy Treasurer II, which provides us with an experienced backup in the absence of either one of us," Binder said. "Thim was instrumental in managing the operation after Mary retired and before we hired Dino."

To culminate Binder's first year-plus at the helm, the department next month will produce its first monthly investment report as opposed to just the standard portfolio statement. The report will feature charts and graphs along with economic trends so the public can gain a better understanding of how the City's investments are faring in relation to the overall economy. And though not a fixture at the podium during City Council meetings during her tenure thus far, Binder indicated this will change once the investment report is complete. "You'll be seeing more of me in the future," she promised. •

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As construction progresses on the Crenshaw/LAX Transit Project, Metro and Walsh-Shea Corridor Constructors (WSCC) are committed to providing the most up-to-date information on construction activities being performed along the 8.5-mile project route.

Running from the Expo Line to the Green Line, the Crenshaw/LAX Transit Project has eight stations and will serve the Crenshaw District, Inglewood, Westchester and the surrounding LAX area with stations at Crenshaw/Exposition, Crenshaw/Martin Luther King Bl, Crenshaw/ Vernon (Leimert Park), Crenshaw/Slauson, Florence/West, Florence/ La Brea, Florence/Hindry and Aviation/Century.

Current Construction

Construction on the underground stations is anticipated to begin in iate April with pile installation at Crenshaw Bi/Exposition Bi and Crenshaw Bl/Martin Luther King Bl. Concurrently, demolition work is slated to begin on the Florence construction yard located at Florence Av/LaBrea Av. As the Crenshaw/LAX Transit Project is a design-build project, project design continues while construction begins.

Properties located at the future Expo construction yard have been cleared, and work on a 16-foot sound wall surrounding the yard has begun. Along the route, geographical boring (obtaining soil samples) and potholing (checking for underground utilities), as well as railroad track removal along Florence Av and utility relocation continue.

Community Updates

Metro held a January 2014 groundbreaking ceremony to kick off the start of construction. More recently, the project held its first community construction update meeting, an Open House at its new Airport Project Office at 9323 Bellanca Av. The event saw hundreds in attendance.

Metro now provides daily project updates via Facebook (facebook.com/crenshawrail), Twitter (@crenshawrail) and emails. Several project factsheets pertaining to trees, work permits and environmental standards have been distributed. Metro will also continue to meet with community stakeholders to provide

Other activities include partnering with community organizations to coordinate events promoting careers in construction. This has included appearances at Career Day at Crenshaw and Inglewood High Schools and mentoring two Morningside High School students for the day at Metro headquarters.


Further, outreach to local artists has begun regarding the process of submitting art for Metro stations. The project team has also expanded with the addition of new members to WSCC and Metro. Moreover, the Crenshaw/LAX Transit Project and WSCC have contracted with several local vendors to provide a myriad of services to the project.

WSCC is a joint venture between Walsh Construction and I.F. Shea Company. Together, they have collaborated on many rail projects in the United States, including systems in Dallas, Phoenix, Charlotte and Chicago. In addition to its October Business Opportunities Summit, WSCC has made an immediate impact in the Crenshaw/LAX community by hosting two food drives and a toy drive for the 2013 holiday season.

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

As late as March 23, God's disciples CNBC and the Washington Post both reported that the then-five million enrollees were bogus. In fact, only 715,000 were previously uninsured. The other 4.3 million were those who had migrated over from God's cancelled private policies to mandated Obamacare programs. That means that as of the third week of March, just 1.4 percent of the estimated 48.6 million uninsured cost taxpayers \$2.6 trillion over the next 10 years, God simply shrugged. On a similar vein, on March 10, the Washington Post reported that with only three weeks remaining to enroll, only one in 10 eligible signees had signed up. Ironically, the Affordable Care Act was deemed unaffordable. Out of five possible reasons for failing to enroll, most chose, "I could not afford to pay the premium."

But perhaps the greatest hurdle God had to overcome was the law itself. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services revealed that the law contains 14 exemptions from Obamacare. If anyone has any hardship in obtaining insurance, he need only ask for an exemption. Since this applies to anyone, it is an abandonment of the individual mandate--the very heart of the law.

Chanting, "We will Overcome," God got two million to sign up in the last week. Surely Charlton Heston himself would have stood in awe. God is, after all, omnipotent and can achieve miracles. Allahu Akbar! •

Supreme Court Allows More Influence from Money

As if the Supreme Court hadn't caused enough damage to the democratic process through Citizens United, last week the court gave more freedom to wealthy donors to influence elections. In a 5-4 ruling, the court bypassed longstanding restrictions on campaign donations by allowing those with enough money to donate a total of \$3.6 million to the list of candidates running for Congress. This decision by the court strikes down a limit imposed by Congress back in the Watergate Era that prevented any single donor from hashing out large amounts of money to influence Capitol Hill. Under the old restrictions, a donor could donate \$5,200 to a Congressional candidate each election cycle and no more than \$123,200 to all candidates and political party committees put together.

Under the new ruling, which was acted upon an appeal from the Republican National Committee, the court's decision allows individuals to give the individual maximum to every candidate for Congress. As a result, the new maximum contribution that can be made to candidates and party committees during a two-year election cycle has been raised to \$3.6 million.

Everyone has the right to do as they wish with their money. If you earn it, then of course it's your right to spend it as you see fit. However, to have the court determine that political contributions are protected as free speech and by removing limits on monetary donations, the court has just placed a large majority of Americans at a disadvantage. Politicians already spend a ridiculous amount of money on elections. Politico reported that President Obama and Mitt Romney were able to fundraise \$1.123 billion and \$1.019 billion, respectively. Yet, the court found it necessary to raise the limits on campaign contributions. Absurd.

At this rate, our vote and opinion really will not matter. It already feels like all we can do is kick and scream while special interest groups and lobbyists manipulate the legislative process. I would expect elected officials to take a backseat in trying to impose campaign contribution restrictions of any kind. It is after all a big reason that they get elected into office. Yet, to have the Supreme Court remove contribution restrictions under the guise of free speech is ridiculous and dangerous. It gives corporations and the few in the millionaire income bracket an even bigger advantage over the rest of the population.

As it is, money influences the voting process enough. Elections are already about which candidate has the most ad space, airtime and the best-run campaign. It is more about the tour bus and the campaign stops than addressing actual issues that concern voters. This decision by the Supreme Court hinders our democratic process. It allows for this flawed two-party system to continue thriving. While we do have other political parties, the truth is that two parties control our election process because they obtain the most money. With the court's most recent decision, this situation is not going to end anytime soon. •

Eagles' Talented Softball Team Starting to Gel

The 2014 high school softball season is in full swing. For the El Segundo Lady Eagles, who are off to a 3-3 start, this could be the last season in which they vie for a Pioneer League championship. With the realignment of the South Bay high schools into different leagues starting in the fall, this will be El Segundo's opportunity to make a statement before heading to the Ocean League.

With a roster full of talent, head coach Keith Cameron has a problem every coach would love to have--too many good players and not enough positions. He noted that on his roster of 15 players, any of them would be starters at any other school. "That's the beauty of this team--there is no real drop-off if we make a substitute. They're all good," Cameron said.

Cameron enters his 18th year as head coach, but has been coaching for 27 years altogether. He's not one for record-keeping and has no idea what his coaching won/loss mark might be, but one thing for certain is that his teams are winners. In the past 10 years, Cameron's teams have won 179 games and advanced to the playoffs in each of those years. Cameron says he can't remember the last time one of his teams failed to make the playoffs.

The El Segundo baseball program doesn't rebuild, but rather reloads. You could say the same for the softball program that ranks up there with other South Bay premiere programs such as Mira Costa, San Pedro and Torrance.

With just three seniors on this team, you might assume the Lady Eagles are short on both experience and talent. Not so. The three seniors provide the leadership and have been with the team for three years or more. Nicki Honsowetz is a three-year letterman and will start at second base. Tess Von Flue is a three-year starter who was brought up as a freshman, while McCall James is a four-year starter.

James, who has signed a letter of intent to play for Santa Clara next year, has been an all league selection and made the All-South Bay team. She returns as one of the area's top pitchers and will be hidden down in the lineup with her bat.

Von Flue's versatility makes her one of the team's top players defensively. She can play any of the outfield positions and can be inserted anywhere in the infield as well. Honsowetz's slick fielding and speed helps solidify the infield.

Standout junior catcher Kaitlin Covington is still recovering from an injury. Nayeli Diaz, just a sophomore, has been starting in place of Covington and has improved dramatically while handling a top-notch pitching staff.

The infield is so impressive that Cameron believes it's as good as any he has ever had. At first base sophomore Julie Roach is solid, but it's her bat that stands out to Cameron. Rhianna Rich is a three-year starter and the junior shortstop will most likely be the team's leadoff hitter. Alyssa Pelegrin is also a sophomore, but is already being considered one of the top third basemen in the South Bay.

Joining Von Flue in the outfield are Katherine Burner and Allison Tatnal, both returnees. Burner's speed makes her a natural for centerfield, while Tatnal's big arm and speed give the Eagles a very talented outfield.

Opposing pitchers trying to get through the Eagles' lineup could be in for a long day. There's speed and power at the top of the lineup with more power down in the lineup. Cameron believes with Rich, Burner and Tatnal at the top of the order, it will set the tone for what could be a long inning.

Pelegrin, who has verbally committed to Oregon State, will most likely hit fourth. Don't let her size fool you because she has power and has demonstrated that by hammering batting practice home runs into the pitcher's mound at Stevenson Field.

Hitting fifth should be Shannon Brooker, who is also one of the team's top pitchers. Brooker combines her power with the ability to read the defense to slap singles. With Von Flue hitting sixth, it sets the table for James, Roach and Honsowetz.

Dodgers Come Back Home

Last Friday afternoon, Dodger Stadium opened its doors once again for the 2014 Major League Baseball season and with it, a new chapter began in its assembly. With great hopes built up from last season, Dodger fans have now begun to expect greatness from their team that now dominates the minds and imaginations of the L.A. faithful. Baseball is back in Los Angeles and indeed that is a good sign. From all the way across the world in Australia, back down to San Diego and all the way back up to L.A., the 2014 Los Angeles Dodgers have already been all over the world, yet the season has just begun. Some might say that the Dodgers' tough traveling schedule has resulted in their first two losses of the season. L.A. looked good in Australia, taking two straight games over the Arizona Diamondbacks to start the season at 2-0. It wasn't getting to Australia that was the problem, though--it was coming back. Clayton Kershaw had a muscle in his back flare up while Brian Wilson had nerve irritation in his elbow that, after just two appearances, has now sent him to the 15-day disabled list. Both Kershaw and Wilson looked good in their appearances in Australia, but once they arrived back in the States, it was clear that their workload in Australia in combination with the altitude from the flight home was what ultimately led to injury. Wilson knew he was injured in San Diego but attempted to pitch anyway, leading to the Dodgers' first loss. Kershaw was slated to pitch Opening Day in Los Angeles, but because of injury, Hyun-Jin Ryu got the nod and gave up eight runs through just two innings en route to the Dodgers' 8-4 loss.

So what does this new chapter of Dodger baseball tell us so far? Well, it looks a lot like last season--at least when it comes to the injuries. Having to use the disabled list within the first five games of the season is never a good sign for a ballclub that isn't necessarily the youngest in the league. Don't expect the injuries to stop, but at least this year Mattingly and company are more prepared. With four outfielders and a cache of pitchers on the roster, the Dodgers just might have the

depth to withstand injury this season. There is no timetable for Kershaw's return and some even say that he will be sidelined well into the month of June. With Zack Greinke, Ryu, an impressive first start by Dan Haren, a stable newcomer in Paul Maholm and Josh Beckett and Chad Billingsley on the mend, the Dodgers should have more than enough firepower to endure Kershaw's absence.

Though the Dodgers suffered a terrible loss last Friday afternoon in what was the L.A. opener, their 8-4 loss might actually have been a good thing for the team. Ryu looked horrible (despite the Dodgers' poor defensive play), sure, but he will almost undoubtedly rebound. It was the entire bullpen that was finally on display and feeling at home, though, as Jose Dominguez, Chris Withrow and Jamey Wright each entered the game and succeeded in not even allowing a hit. Even Brandon League got into the game and despite a collective groan of discomfort from the Los Angeles crowd, he threw to seven batters, struck out three and didn't allow a hit in two innings.

Not everything is optimistic, though. There is some cause for concern. The Dodgers' offense, save for a few batters, looked anemic over the first seven games of the season. In the series against the Padres, the Dodgers batted .185 through three games. Back-to-back home runs helped to raise that average in the opener against the Giants, but there were still seven runners left on base and the team was 3 for 14 with runners in scoring position. With all of the bats on the roster, one would think that those numbers would certainly have to improve. Adding to the pessimism movement comes Yasiel Puig and the "problem" of having four outfielders. Puig is still his typical "Wild Horse" self, showing up later on Opening Day and getting benched for his first game in front of hometown fans. Were it not for his benching, Matt Kemp would have been left off the Opening Day roster, which admittedly was much to the latter's disliking.

As the great Dodger announcer Vin Scully said himself, "Baseball can be such a humbling game, like life itself, and the Dodgers are certainly tasting vinegar right now." Truer words may never have been spoken. Sure, the Dodgers tasted that vinegar in front of a soldout crowd at Dodger Stadium in their home opener, but baseball is just like life. It has its ups and downs and fortunately enough for the Dodgers, it is early enough in the season that they can easily rebound from the minor downs that they have experienced so far this season. It is, indeed, going to be a long one and the first chapter is yet to be completed. So Dodger fans, strap in. It's going to be one long season full of ups and downs, adversity and glory. •

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
This is my favorite time of year. It's still a little cool outside, but warm enough to eat outside and light enough to enjoy the evening sky.

Come out and join the action as the Eagles compete for their final Pioneer League crown before moving to the Ocean League. •

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

# Baby Boomers: Three Crucial Times to Review Your Medicare Options for Retirement

(BPT) - Baby boomers facing the big decision of when to take Social Security retirement shouldn't overlook the importance of signing up for Medicare at age 65.

Although Social Security offers an age range, generally 62 to 70, for starting retirement benefits - you don't have this type of flexibility with Medicare health insurance.

"Turning 65 is the trigger for your Medicare enrollment, so it's important to study this decision as your birthday approaches," says Paula Muschler, operations manager of the Allsup Medicare Advisor. This is a Medicare plan selection service offering personalized help that includes customized research, a tailor-made report and enrollment assistance. "You have three months before, the month of and three months after your birthday to enroll properly in Medicare when you turn 65."

One important caution: You may decide to delay Medicare enrollment. "But if you make a mistake with this decision, you could end up with lifetime penalties that add to your Medicare costs," Muschler says.

Anyone turning 65 should examine their Medicare choices carefully. Muschler outlines three situations that require close study.

1. You are reaching age 65, but you plan to continue working a few more years.

"You need to examine your Medicare enrollment because it interacts with your employer's group health plan," Muschler says. "Depending on your employer benefits and the size of your employer, you may need to enroll in Medicare Parts A and B." Original Medicare is made up of Part A, which is hospital insurance, and Part B, which is medical insurance.

2. You are reaching age 65 and retiring from work at the same time.

If you combine retirement with turning 65, it's important to coordinate the dates of actual retirement and your 65th birthday, Muschler says. "You should take steps to ensure that you don't have a gap in health care coverage, and you'll need to choose Medicare plans. This is especially true if you leave work a few months before you turn 65."

3. You retired from work before age 65 and

have used other health insurance.

"You need to closely examine your health care options as you get ready to turn 65 and move into Medicare," Muschler says. "There may be special considerations with ending COBRA, health insurance exchange or retiree coverage, depending on your situation. Once you determine that, yes, you do need to get ready for Medicare carefully review all available Medicare plans."

Generally, people enrolling in Medicare choose from two paths. One option is to choose Original Medicare and a prescription drug plan, known as Medicare Part D. Many people also buy supplemental coverage, called Medigap, for added benefits.

A second option is to shop among the Medicare Advantage plans available in your area. Depending on where you live, there is an average of 20 Medicare Advantage plans available. In addition, there may be 35 available Part D prescription drug plans from which to choose.

Other factors to consider:

• Relocation. Are you planning to move after retiring?

• Frequent travel. Do you plan to split your year between two states or travel the country?

• Health. What needs do you have? Do you have any chronic health issues?

• Cost. What's your retirement income? Have you considered saving money with your Medicare plan?

 Medication. It's critical to examine how your Part D plan covers the drugs you take when you first enroll and during each annual enrollment period.

"We frequently get calls from Medicare beneficiaries who didn't realize they could save so much money with their choices," Muschler says. "Sometimes they choose a plan because a friend recommended it, but they end up paying much more than they need to."

After first-time enrollment, participants can use Medicare annual open enrollment from Oct. 15 to Dec. 7 each year to make changes.

"Your Medicare plan can be one of the best things about your retirement if you find the plan that truly matches your needs, lifestyle and budget," Muschler says. •

# Stay Ahead of Cybercriminals: Use Caution and Common Sense Online

(BPT) - Cybercrime is everywhere these days. It happens in the dead of night, in broad daylight, in homes, hotels, restaurants and airports.

In fact, due to the explosion of online transactions, social media and mobile technology, it can happen almost anywhere at any time. The good news, however, is that it doesn't take a computer genius to protect yourself and your family from the proliferation of cyber criminals who are running scams or seeking to steal your identity.

Cybercriminals victimized 71 million people in the United States in 2012, according to a recent report by the electronic security company Symantec. The problem has become so bad that FBI Director Robert Muller expects cybercrime to eventually overtake both terrorism and counter intelligence as his agency's No. 1 crime-fighting priority.

"Cybercrime has become a national plague that can damage us all," says Don Culpepper, who specializes in family safety and security at Fireman's Fund. "But much of the time it's our own online behavior that opens us up to crime. By changing the way we interact online, by becoming more aware of our behavior, we can take a huge step toward becoming cyber secure."

By refraining from giving out personal information, you can keep your accounts and identity safe from fraud and theft. Never give out any personal information via email, the telephone or through the mail unless you are 100 percent certain that the person or organization you're dealing with is legitimate and you have initiated the contact.

"Your greatest tool to protect yourself and your family from fraud of all kinds, including cybercrime and Internet fraud, is common sense," Culpepper says. "Trust your instincts and if something sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

### Tips for staying cyber secure:

- Provision your home Wi-Fi router with a high-level encrypted firewall and make it undiscoverable.
- Monitor you children's social network and mobile computing activity, and stay up-to-date on privacy settings.
- Make certain that you're adequately insured to withstand a loss.
- Use sophisticated passwords and update them regularly.

Still, there are times when even savvy Internet users can be vulnerable to crime. Fake pop-

up alerts that claim your computer has been hacked or is infected with a virus direct you to third-party websites that ask for personal information or direct you to download an actual piece of malware. These programs can run through your computer looking for personal information to send back to the criminals. Many of these programs look legitimate. If you're not familiar with the program that has popped up on your computer, simply close it without clicking on any links.

Companies you interact with, such as banks and retail stores, transfer your information digitally. If those companies' networks are compromised, then your personal information is at risk. Private information you use to identify yourself like usernames, birthdays and even the answers to personal questions can be collected from a compromised system to commit fraud.

"Wi-Fi networks can be especially vulnerable to hacking, particularly public networks that many of us rely on daily," Culpepper says.

Once criminals have this information, they are able to do all sorts of damage. They can get driver's licenses or other identification in your name, access your bank accounts, open utility accounts, apply for jobs and apartments

in your name and even take out loans.

Once your identity has been stolen, it is very difficult to stop the damage, but here are a few steps you should take immediately upon discovering the fraud:

- Monitor your credit report and place a fraud alert on your file with one of the three major credit reporting agencies: Equifax, TransUnion or Experian.
- Close the accounts you suspect have been tampered with or opened fraudulently.
- File a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission.
  - Create a police report.

In addition, many insurance companies offer policies that can help you recover from the ravages of identity theft. Typical coverage can include attorney fees, new loan application fees, lost income as a result of missing work to deal with the identity theft, among other things.

"While it seems like cybercriminals are always one step ahead of our security counter measures, there are things we can do to stay safe," Culpepper says. "Use common sense, stay alert and regularly install and update the security software on your computers and mobile devices." •

(and \$5.9 million per year thereafter) to cover projected budget shortfalls and also pay for much-needed capital improvements. In placing the item on the ballot, the Council members said they felt it was the only viable option to address the deficit. That message did not resonate with voters, however. "It is a sad thing for El Segundo that the community isn't willing to support keeping our town special—particularly when the businesses in town were willing to pitch in 98 percent of the costs to do so," commented Councilmember Marie Fellhauer on the failure of Measure A. Similarly in 2010, voters

declined on a proposed one percent utility user tax increase also supported by the businesses that would have footed the bill.

Representing the business community, Yes on Measure A co-chair Joe Harding, added, "We're obviously disappointed in the results on Measure A given the serious economic situation El Segundo faces. It will now be incumbent upon everyone to think of new and constructive options to ensure El Segundo can continue to provide the services we have come to expect. The tough decisions ahead will not be easy..." •




