City Sees Some Improvement in Customer Service Surveys

Results recently released from City of El Segundo surveys conducted late last year with both residential and business customers indicate that a majority of those who participated see service improvements compared to 2017 when the questionnaires made their debut. In a summary provided by consultant Quality Solutions, Inc. 557 residents (out of 1,048 officially sent out) responded to some portion of the survey. This is up from 347 in 2017 – an increase of 55 percent in participation. Of those who replied, 60 percent marked that they noticed either some or significant improvement from the City. At the same time, the Net Promoter Score (NPS) -- the tool used to measure customer loyalty and predictive indicators for customer defection, dropped very slightly from 59 percent to 57 percent. The decline, according to Quality Solutions President John Dickey, is negligible especially given the marked uptick in total responses. He characterized the City's overall performance as "truly remarkable" when considering that other municipalities that use NPS typically score in the range of just 23 to 28 percent.

When examining areas viewed as modest strengths, the majority of residents who returned the surveys pointed to police availability and responsiveness; fire and paramedic responsiveness, knowledge and competency (which earned the highest scores both in 2017 and 2018); quality of recreation and parks programs as well as maintenance and upkeep of related facilities; and public library resources and services. Respondents gave lower scores to the responsiveness and overall vision of the El Segundo City Council; water and sewer billing department customer service; and condition of streets, sidewalks and public facilities. Detractors identified cost of living/taxes as the most

concerning issue in town by a considerable amount, while also listing noise pollution and the airport as notable negatives.

Despite the overall high marks, Mayor Drew Boyles found some of the residential data alarming. "We haven't done a good enough job getting the word out about the Council's vision," he said, adding that alternate means of communication (e.g. texting, social media) could prove fruitful in the future. Dickey also pointed out that while City Council responsiveness and vision earned the lowest scores in both survey years, the 2018 numbers improved by 8 percent.

To arrive at the NPS, the residential surveys identified 68 percent as "promoters" and then subtracted the 11 percent deemed "detractors" to culminate in the final 57 percent score. On a scale of 0-10, those giving a rating of 9 or 10 fell under the promoter category. Detractors gave grades of 6 or lower. The remaining group, called "passives," provided scores in the 7 to 8 range. The City hopes to convert the passives into promoters by improving products, services or overall customer experience. Until then, this group doesn't factor into the NPS. The consultant report urges staff to analyze individual responses to get a clearer understanding of where services may have fallen short, particularly for the detractors, and to reach out to those people to begin a dialogue. Under the NPS methodology, the initial question for both residents and businesses is, "How likely would you be to recommend this company [the City] to a friend or colleague?"

The business side of the survey yielded fewer responses, with only 325 coming back out of 3,581 invitations. That was less than last year, though proximity to the holidays may have impacted the total. Still, staff hopes to identify ways to capture a larger business audience. While the City's NPS score of 47

percent is considerably lower if compared with top-of-the-line private sector companies that land in the 60 to 75 percent range, it was also markedly higher than the 2017 mark of 32 percent. Of the responding businesses, 58 percent indicated they saw either some or significant improvement in City services over the past year.


Areas viewed as modest strengths included the business license renewal process; responsiveness, knowledge and competency of the fire department and field inspection services (which earned the highest score); and police department availability. Lower scores came for responsiveness, knowledge and competency of working with the Planning and Building and Safety Department for plan checks, permits or inspection services; business development and attraction policies; and City zoning policies (which had the lowest score, but improved slightly from 2017). Staff responsiveness was the primary issue for detractors, replacing the perceived need to be "more business-friendly" from the previous year (which Dickey said was "cut in half" from 30 percent to 15 percent as an identified problem). The NPS of 47 derived from 62 percent promoters minus 15 percent detractors.

"As an advocate and long-term user of the NPS methodology, I will tell you that we are in the early stages of understanding and incorporating our stakeholders' concerns and ideas," Boyles said. "While we saw improved participation this year, we can and will do better, reaching people through varied mediums and also at the touch point or transaction. As far as our peer group of government agencies go, it is clear that we are significantly outperforming them. By setting and measuring performance to respondent and other performance goals, we will move closer to becoming a world-class organization for our residents and our businesses."

West Basin Recognizes Director Gloria D. Gray as Newly Elected MWD Chair

Community members joined the West Basin Municipal Water District Board of Directors at a special board meeting and reception on Feb. 13 to recognize Division II Director Gloria D. Gray as the newly elected Chairwoman of Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

Gray, who was officially sworn in as Chairwoman on Jan. 8, is the first African American to lead the 38-member Metropolitan board, and only the second woman to serve as Chair in its 90-year history. Water industry leaders and elected officials, including Mayor James T. Butts of Inglewood, Los Angeles City Council President Herb J. Wesson, former Chair of the State Water Resources Control Board Felicia Marcus, Los Angeles Unified School District Board Member Dr. George McKenna III, Eastern Municipal Water District Board Member and Immediate Past Chair of the Metropolitan Board of Directors Randy Record, and Metropolitan

General Manager Jeff Kightlinger each spoke in support of Gray's new leadership role in regional water policy.

First elected in 2006, Gray represents West Basin's Division II that includes the city of Inglewood and the unincorporated Los Angeles County areas of Lennox, South Ladera Heights, West Athens and Westmont.

During the special board meeting, each of West Basin's Directors shared comments with the public recognizing Gray's leadership and successes with the District that includes nearly one million people served in 17 cities and unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. El Segundo School Board Hears State of the Facility Presentation

At Tuesday evening's meeting of the El Segundo School Board, the members were privy to a presentation from a troika of women who spoke of the strides being made at The Learning Connection (TLC), which is El Segundo's before-and-after school program offered at both Center Street and Richmond Street Elementary schools for students in transitional kindergarten through grade five. School Board Vice President Dr. Jeanie Nishime ran the meeting, in the absence of President Nancy Cobb.

Student Representative to the Board Matthew Tritasavit kicked off the presentations, initially congratulating the El Segundo High School boys soccer team for capturing a second consecutive CIF title with a 2-1 overtime victory over West Torrance High last Saturday evening.

Denise Azcuna, longtime program director at TLC, was joined in the presentation by Center Street instructor and Nationally Board-Certified Teacher Daphne Moote, and Guadalupe Grijalva, Executive Director of TLC and the Eagles' Nest. They gave updates on enrollment, discussed the results of recent parental surveys, and recapped TLC changes and the current implementation of their programs. Moote spoke about the training sessions that took place in the past year, as well as new items implemented in the program, including small-group activity time.

The TLC program, which is anchored at El Segundo Unified School District elementary schools and is its 25th year, currently has an enrollment of 302 students. The speakers detailed new programs and noted they look forward to the new building construction taking place at Richmond Street after the demolition of the old Madson house TLC facility.

Parental survey results were parsed, with the note that "overall feedback was positive and reaffirmed the changes implemented" this school year. The survey results portrayed that respondents felt, overwhelmingly, that TLC provides a vital service for District families, is a welcoming place for the child to reside, provides a welcoming environment at drop-off and pick-ups time, and that staff is responsive in timely fashion to parental inquiries.

The final stages of the presentation centered on "building the capacity of the personnel," including upcoming professional development opportunities. Next steps mentioned include increased communication with families through an updated website and a plan to keep the Richmond Street families informed about summer construction on the new TLC building. Said Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore: "I commend our team and our program."

Prior to the TLC presentation, Director of Innovation and Student Support Services Dr. Jack Plotkin and his implementation team

That reticent swagger that the El Segundo High School boys soccer team has these days is because it just won its second consecutive CIF Southern Section championship. Yes, the Eagles defeated a highly touted West Torrance team 2-1 in the first overtime period to capture their second consecutive CIF title. A year ago, the Eagles won the CIF-SS Division 5 championship and this season they won the Division 3 title.

For the first time in the school's history, El Segundo played host to a CIF final in any sport. In claiming a second consecutive CIF title, it marked the first time in 53 years an El Segundo program has repeated as CIF champions. The 1965-66 baseball teams won back-to-back CIF titles under legendary coach John Stevenson, so Eagle soccer head coach Andrew Kelley is in some very select company.

On a cool evening, an estimated 1,500 fans would be treated to one of the most intense games of the season between the second-seeded Eagles and the eighth-ranked West Torrance Warriors. Before the game, El Segundo senior Emma Byron sang a breathtaking rendition of the National Anthem that set the tone for the evening.

Wiseburn Board Hears Comments on Resolution to Cut Counselors

Last Thursday evening's well-attended Wiseburn School Board meeting (under the guidance of Vice President/Clerk Roger Banuelos in the absence of President JoAnne Kaneda) featured comments from seven concerned community members, teachers and parents who were there to voice their thoughts about a pending "discontinuance of particular kinds of service" for the 2019/20 school year.

The Board later in the meeting adopted a resolution that would eliminate, at least at this time, school counselor positions during Wiseburn Unified School District's 2019/20 school year. The resolution cited the Board's need to "meet fiscal and programmatic obligations."

The community members, some very emotional, were adamant in their support of the value provided to the community by school-site counselors, with remarks touching upon the assets the counselors are to the elementary school students and the impact they make on young learners. The speakers shared positive experiences with District counselors that have been critical to their children's growth, as well as personal stories of the impact on young learners and their families.

Board member reports followed. Dr. Neil Goldman thanked the public speakers and noted that the Board and administrators have received letters from concerned parents anxious over the proposed counselor reduction. He also spoke of the strategic master plan that the District is developing, commenting, "We are continuing to move forward so that we can be the best for you and our community. We will try to act accordingly, and follow-up on your comments." Nelson Martinez

thanked the speakers, saying, "As a father of two, my children benefit from the counseling services, and I can certainly understand the comments that were made here tonight." He also recognized the letter writers who were not able to attend Thursday's meeting.

Chief Business Official David Wilson made a very brief presentation, and then Assistant Superintendent, Educational Services Dr. Aileen Harbeck spoke about the recent Project Lead the Way (PLTW) training that District teachers have completed, noting that more Wiseburn instructors are involved in the program than ever before. She also gave praise to the Wiseburn Education Foundation for i0ts financial support of myriad programs.

In his comments, Superintendent Dr. Blake Silvers gave the District's perspective on the proposed counselor reduction. He noted that he understood that the resolution to be passed later in the meeting could cause "feelings of discomfort and frustration. "We do not plan to cut counseling services to our students in the elementary schools," he said. "In our analysis of our current program, we sincerely believe that we can do better and provide a better and more defined level of counseling support for our schools. Our new model will allocate an additional \$30-50,000 into the area of student support services and through both counseling and administrative intervention support. Students will not see a lapse in service. We have heard from the community and we know that our students are using our counseling services. We need to do right by our community and continue to provide the best services." Silvers thanked the citizens who attended the meeting and said he was "encouraged by the path we have moving forward to ensure our students thrive."

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





Spirit Awards Honor If Beale Street Could Talk and the Best of Indie Film

If you regularly follow Cinemacy's weekly film contributions (and we hope that you do!), you'll know that Morgan and I both strive to share with you what we feel are among the most exciting and special films that don't always find themselves being discussed in conversation. So with that in mind, instead of using this week's submission to talk about the films that you might have already seen and which won at this year's Academy - while sharing her thanks on the podium and in the press room - brought her dog, Pip, onto the stage, stealing the show. Best Supporting Male went to Richard E. Grant in Can You Ever Forgive Me? and Best Supporting Female went to Regina King in If Beale Street Could Talk.

Other notable awards went to Can You Ever Forgive Me?'s Nicole Holofcener for Best Screenplay, Eighth Grade's Bo Burnham for Best First Screenplay, and Sorry

Awards (the big winners being *Green Book*, Bohemian Rhapsody and Black Panther), we wanted to share with you some of the lesser known films of 2018 that were honored at a different awards event -- one that Cinemacy covered on the red carpet (check out our site for our video coverage) as well as in the press room.

Taking place the day before the Oscars every year, the Film Independent Spirit Awards celebrate the best of films that are independently produced and made outside of the rigid - and often political - studio system. Despite their countries of origin, budgets and the talent attached, all of the films recognized at the Spirit Awards have one thing in common: they all embody diversity, innovation, and uniqueness of vision.

While the Oscars awarded Best Picture to Green Book, the Indie Spirit Awards gave Best Feature to If Beale Street Could *Talk*, the big screen adaptation of James Baldwin's literary classic directed by Barry Jenkins (who was also awarded for Best Director, as well as honored last year for the incredible Moonlight). If you've yet to see it, Beale Street was truly one of the most beautiful movies made last year. Its level of artistry and emotive resonance will surely leave an imprint on those who seek it out.

Best Male Lead went to Ethan Hawke in First Reformed - and while Hawke unfortunately couldn't attend the event, his performance in the film was committed and definitely one to celebrate. Best Female Lead went to Glenn Close in The Wife, who to Bother You's Boots Riley for Best First Feature. The Robert Altman Award, which is given to an ensemble cast, director and casting director of a film considered to be a "maverick" of the year, went to Suspiria, and the John Cassavetes Award went to En El Séptimo Día.

While the landscape of movies has evolved so much over the past few years, leaving unique films to compete with the latest binge-worthy television show on any number of streaming services, Cinemacy aims to share with you, our readers, interesting films of little-known awareness but are among the top artistic achievements of the year. And with the Film Independent Spirit Awards (and Oscars) now concluded, we set our sights ahead to 2019 and what will no doubt be another exciting year in film. •



Five Feet Apart is a YA novel geared towards teens who are fans of John Green's The Fault in Our Stars. The movie for this book is coming out in March 2019. The book was a screenplay before becoming a book, and has three co-authors. It is a bittersweet love story about two cystic fibrosis patients who meet in the hospital. Stella and Will's points of view. Stella Grant is a high school senior who spends her spring break in the hospital instead of Cabo San Lucas because she has cystic fibrosis and her lungs aren't working at their capacity. She is very smart and plays by the rules.

While in the hospital, Stella meets Will Newman, who also has cystic fibrosis. Will is a cartoon artist and rebels whenever he is given the opportunity. The two are complete opposites: Stella is obsessed with taking her meds at the right time and prolonging her life, and Will just wants to end his clinical

has left. The big question that the book asks is can two people fall in love if they are not allowed to touch?

When they first meet, Stella doesn't like Will because of his attitude towards their disease. The one rule that all cystic fibrosis patients have is that they have to stay six feet apart from one another at all times so they don't infect each other. As Stella and Will get to know each other, they find the distance hard to maneuver because they want to touch. It must be hard living in a world where you can't touch the person you care about, hold hands or give a hug. As Stella and Will start to fall in love, they realize that their romance is doomed from the start because those with cystic fibrosis aren't allowed to be together. Their lungs are susceptible to infections and they might kill each other. I like how the two solve their problem: they use a pool cue to stay five feet apart so they can be together yet still not harm each other. The book includes their parents and friends, and lets the reader know what it is like to live with cystic fibrosis.

I liked this book because it was hopeful. Even though both of the main characters had a terminal illness, they each had a plan for their future and a spark to live and enjoy the world. I liked learning more about cystic fibrosis and really enjoyed reading the book. I hope all of you enjoy reading it too! •

City of LA Announces New Recycling Plan for Hyperion Plant

Last week, the City of Los Angeles announced its plan to recycle 100 percent of wastewater currently discharged to the ocean through the Hyperion Wastewater Treatment Plant, by 2035. This came right after introduced legislation by Senators Robert Hertzberg and Scott Weiner that aims to reduce wastewater discharge to California's oceans by 95 percent by 2040, through a combination of water conservation/efficiency and recycled water.

"This is a necessary step to help the City ultimately achieve its local water reliability goals," said Tracy Quinn, Director of California Water Conservation & Efficiency at the Natural

Resources Defense Council. "The plan also provides a path for the rest of California's coastal areas, demonstrating how city leaders, water and wastewater utilities, environmental organizations, and community groups can work together to develop visionary projects that create more resilient communities. Los Angeles is showing the rest of California that we can no longer waste this precious resource."

The Board also approved the mandated Student Plan for Student Achievement, the adoption of the plan to utilize a block grant (\$124,500) from the state that benefits perceived low-performing students. The members also approved the comprehensive safe school plans -- a hot-button issue as districts fine-tune their policies to ensure student and employee safety on campus; as well as a 2.5 percent pay bump for many District employees.

Silvers commented that he wanted to thank the principals and District Assistant Superintendent, Student Services Dr. Mary Ring for "putting together" the safe-school plans. He emphasized that the District's goal was to have a "comprehensive approach to overall school safety." He added that there were two tenets to the plan: to ensure a uniform approach to campus safety, and enable "connectedness" so that the students would feel safe as they enter their school each day. Ring commented about how synergy with not only the Da Vince High School staff was important in this endeavor, but also the partnership with local law enforcement officials. "We know school safety is a huge concern," Silvers said, pointing out that the District is working with a consultant to make sure school sites are made as safe as possible.

As construction continues on the property housing Wiseburn High School, the members also agreed on multiple change orders as the process wraps up.

When the Board passed the resolution regarding the District counselors, there was a lengthy pause before the item was greenlighted, with Goldman mentioning, "We have the ability to rescind this." Ring spoke about the fact that Wiseburn takes any changes in services "very seriously," and that she is committed to working with staff in building a new support plan. "This will not be a reduction in services," she said.

Goldman added, "Why I am motioning this is because we have an opportunity to be even better for our community and our students. We will be very conscientious about being held to the standard of equal or better moving forward. Nothing is changing between now and the end of the school year."

The next regularly scheduled Wiseburn School Board meeting is docketed for Thursday evening, March 14. •

briefed the Board on the District's participation in a program dubbed RULER, which aims to support and bolster students' social emotional learning. The RULER program was created by the Yale Center for Emotional Intelligence. The acronym RULER stands for recognizing, understanding, labeling, expressing and regulating emotions.

Moore emailed prior to the meeting that she was "pleased with actions we have taken to move forward with adoption of a social emotional learning program." She lauded Plotkin and his team for their invested time and the training that they have received as they begin implementation. She spoke at the meeting about the importance of the program, and how getting parents involved was paramount to a successful outcome.

The presentation delved into the importance of how necessary it is for students to recognize the ebb and flow of emotions during the day and be able to utilize "anchor tools" of the program to help them stay on an even keel. Implementation will include help from parents and staff with modeling behavior, as well as expanded training for personnel.

Long-term goals entail the program folding into the District graduate profile, instilling initiative and personal accountability. Additional priorities promote strong interpersonal skills; emotional intelligence, evincing empathy and respect; ethics, portraying honesty, integrity and morality; and a vital commitment to personal well-being. Post-presentation, Board members gave their support to the RULER program, hoping that it could be implemented as soon as feasible.

On consent items, the Board members giving their blessing to an agreement with Certified Transportation Services to transport District sixth graders to the always popular Outdoor Science School, which has been relocated to Colby Ranch this year because the Camp Hess Kramer site was badly damaged by the 2018 Malibu Woolsey Fire. The Board also approved the purchase of an

Amazon Prime membership that, according to District-provided notes, will not only aid in saving on shipping costs, but also provide valuable analytical data that will allow El Segundo Unified to "streamline purchasing in the future.'

Action items included approval of a lowperforming students block grant initially presented at the Feb. 12 meeting. It comes with an allocation of a tick more than \$213,000, which will be expended through the 2020/21 school year and earmarked to support students deemed low-performing in English Language Arts and/or Math. The grant will go towards professional development, intervention coaching, and supplemental materials.

The Board additionally approved video archiving for its future, regularly scheduled meetings; an amended salary schedule for the principal position at El Segundo Middle School, as the District looks to fill the position for the 2019/20 school year; and the reassignment of Acting Vice Principal Sarah

Davlantis and Acting Principal Ali Rabiei to their prior positions in 2019/20. They will finish out the 2018/19 school year in their interim positions at the middle school after the appointment of Dr. Melissa Gooden as the permanent principal at El Segundo High School. Moore said she was "truly grateful" for the work Davlantis and Rabiei have done when they were asked to step up after Gooden came aboard in late November, and that their reassignment was not in any way performance-related.

Moore then previewed the District's informational calendar, including an in-service day (no school for the students) on March 8. Board member reports followed, with comments on the breadth of the experiences sixth graders were currently having at the annual Outdoor Science School.

The next regularly scheduled El Segundo School Board meeting is on the calendar for 7 p.m. on Tuesday evening, Mar. 12, in the Sheldon Street District boardroom. •

During the post-game lineup, the two teams -- in a classy gesture -- saluted the opposition's appreciative fans.

During the celebration afterwards, Coach Kelley was surrounded by family and friends while his players absorbed the history they had just made. He was all smiles watching his team celebrating with friends and family. "All the credit goes to the team," Kelley said. "They made it easy and they worked hard and each one of them made this moment happen."

The Eagles (23-1-1), who are ranked second in California and sixth in the nation, went back to work on Monday preparing for the Southern California Regional that started Tuesday and continues today with the championship game on Saturday. The Eagles won the Southern California Region State Division IV championship last season when they defeated Hesperia 3-3 on penalty kicks. This season, the Eagles are the top seed in the 2019 CIF Southern California Regional Division 3 Soccer Championship. El Segundo had a bye on Tuesday and hosts the winner of the Tulare Western/ Alta Loma match today at 4 p.m. The winner advances to the finals, set for Saturday at a site TBA.

El Segundo is the home of some special athletes past and present. Every now and then, a former Eagle will continue to be special by raising awareness as well as funds for a cause. Shannon Brooker is a former pitcher and hitter for her softball team. She helped her teams win 83 games in four years as a starter. After high school, she ended up attending Boston University studying Business and will graduate this May.

Brooker has been an athlete all her life and set a goal in high school to run a marathon at some point in her life. In 2017, she witnessed the Boston Marathon for the first time. She said she was so humbled and inspired just from standing in a crowd cheering on hundreds of strangers. She also witnessed first-hand the most incredible sense of community and support, which was the moment she decided she was going to be among those runners one day.

Brooker first heard of the Martin Richard Foundation two years ago during a lecture at BU. It was established by the parents of Martin Richard, an 8-year-old boy who was killed in the Boston Marathon bombing on April 15, 2013. The foundation is dedicated to promoting education and sports in the community for youths and helps finance athletics programs for children with disabilities.

Qualifying to run the Boston Marathon requires a sanctioned time or a lottery entrance. Another way is by running for a designated charity such as the Martin Richard Foundation as a volunteer. Brooker decided to get involved with the organization because of the positive values it aims to instill in children. Those consist of community, inclusion, kindness and peace. She said she was inspired by the parents of Martin Richard, who turned one of the most horrific experiences of their lives into something filled with so much love and compassion.

Brooker has been training regularly and increasing mileage. She trains with the Martin Richard Foundation along with other charities. She said, "During the long runs on Saturdays I have averaged about a 10:30 pace, so I am hoping to finish it in less than 4 hours and 30 minutes!"

Brooker has set a goal to raise a minimum of \$7,500 for the Martin Richard Foundation. She has hosted fundraisers at Chipotle and Blaze plus one in March at CPK in Manhattan Beach.
