City Council Opts to Pursue Upgraded Aquatics Facility

The path to a new aquatics facility in town became a bit clearer on Tuesday night when the El Segundo City Council opted to aim for the most ambitious of three options for the venue that will be built at the future Wiseburn High School site. The group unanimously agreed that the so-called "Upgrade Option" will provide the best package of programming and amenities to serve local schools and the community while also maximizing revenue-generating opportunities. But the decision also means a heftier price tag, with estimated construction costs of \$10.6 million for the project. As part of a prior settlement with the City of El Segundo, Wiseburn Unified School District agreed to foot \$6 million of the construction bill. The City has \$1.8 million in its Aquatics Fund that the Council agreed to earmark all of (but no more than that amount) towards the new project. However, the group hopes to secure outside funding so that Aquatics Fund dollars can instead be used for the eventual renovation of the Urho Saari Swim Stadium (The Plunge).

Mayor Suzanne Fuentes announced that the outside funding effort received a giant initial boost with the news that Continental Development Corporation President Richard Lundquist has pledged to commit \$1 million of his personal money towards the construction bill. "Go throw your arms around him and thank him when you see him," the Mayor said of Lundquist, who also offered to lead the campaign to reach out to local business leaders in hopes of raising additional dollars for the facility. Fuentes also publicly asked the El Segundo Unified School District to contribute to the cause. She and Councilmember Dave Atkinson (who serve on the Aquatics Subcom-

mittee) will next meet with Wiseburn officials to restructure components of the 2013 settlement, including an extension of the original June 2017 opening date. Wiseburn will also be asked about the possibility of tacking on to its \$6 million commitment, though Superintendent Tom Johnstone indicated on Tuesday that his Board had not authorized additional funding at this point.

In considering three design concepts, the Council and staff quickly dismissed the "Base Option." While the least expensive to build at \$7.4 million, it also only meets basic needs

with a 50-meter by 25-yard pool and limited programming and seating. With minimal revenue-generating possibilities, a recent financial analysis indicates that the Base Option will actually drive up the City's annual aquatics-related expenditures by more than \$200,000.

In contrast, study of both the "Hybrid" and Upgrade options show the City's overall yearly aquatics expenditures dropping a bit thanks to increased revenues despite the higher up-front costs. The Hybrid design (\$9.3 million) calls for a 51.2-meter by 25-yard pool, one 1.2-meter

Students not only learn gardening basics but also composting, native plants, water conservation, and soil management.

Richmond Street School continues to thrive and bloom as a result of the strong roots planted and cultivated by Ms. Van Breene. •

Raytheon Hosts ESHS Students at Engineering Games and Robotics Day

Last week, in celebration of National Engineers Week, Raytheon Space and Airborne Systems hosted activities designed to promote science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) to regional middle, high school, and college students, inspiring the next generation to help ensure America's competitiveness.

On Wednesday, Feb. 25, 110 high schoolers in grades 9 -12 from across the South Bay were hosted at Raytheon's El Segundo facility to participate in a day of Engineer Games and Robotics. This was the 15th year that Raytheon has hosted Engineering Week for the community of young learners. El Segundo High School (ESHS) sent a team of three to compete, along with ESHS teacher Steve Lubs. Following a lunch provided by Raytheon, the students began the day with an introductory welcome by world-renowned Raytheon optical engineer Mr. Lacy Cook, who is an inventor of nearly 90 patents.

Following a short James Bond-themed skit performed by Raytheon engineers, all of the students were given a brief explanation on the science and engineering of an AM radio and cryptography. Then the student led teams paired with Raytheon mechanical and electrical engineers, and each team raced to complete mathematical calculations, build a tuning

capacitor, pick up a secret message on their newly created radios, and decode the message to win the game!

After completion of the games, an award ceremony highlighted the top three teams with medals and a "perpetual trophy" which gets passed to the winning school year after year, like the Stanley Cup. There were also raffle prizes given away by Raytheon, and all student participants received a goodie bag. Thereafter, all of the teams were given a tour of some of the research and testing labs at the Raytheon facility, including a bird's eye view of dynamics, optics, thermal systems, and electro-magnetic interference. What an amazing opportunity!

Ryan Yates, Raytheon's lead engineer who coordinated the Engineer Games, tells me that "Raytheon brings this day to high school students because they believe that we live in a world that has some huge challenges, but history has shown that the right technical innovations and scientific know-how can accomplish almost anything. Raytheon has a desire to encourage kids to excel in math, science, and engineering, not just because we hire those kinds of people, but because everyone benefits from having more engineers and scientists working!" Film Review

A Look at '71

If you look closely, 2014 was a banner year for the war movie: Bradley Cooper single-handedly turned *American Sniper* into a national phenomenon to (eventually) become the highest grossing film of the year (coincidentally, the first non-franchise film to do so since *Saving Private Ryan*). Other 2014 war movies, as well as early Oscar contenders, saw the Brad Pitt-starring *Fury* and Angelina Jolie directorial feature *Unbroken* rally in a cool sum for 'prestige' pictures behind "Brangelina's" collective star power. *The Imitation Game* found pathos in Benedict Cumberbatch's unsung genius of Alan Turing to find well-deserved

prison drama *Starred Up* showed a ruggedness reminiscent of a British Ryan Gosling. He's the broody everyman— somebody who observes the cinematic environment as opposed to eating it up. He can build drama just through his presence and that is showcased here. He has the understanding to simply guide the film— never stealing the show or demanding the center of the conflict.

The film itself is quite visually impressive as well. It is rather vibrant for a war film; rich color contrasts its dark subject matter. The realism is both rewarding and brutal — very opposite of the studio-movie war zone

critical and audience success. Even the daffy *The Monuments Men* found its box office legs in the early months of the year. However, the more intimately made war story '71, which debuted at last year's Berlin International Film Festival, found its way into American theaters last weekend, and stands as a riveting independent counterpart to its studio companions— a showcase for a war story both simple but effective during a conflict that doubtfully finds itself in international history books.

'71 follows a young soldier, Gary Hook (Jack O'Connell, of the previously mentioned *Unbroken*) who is left disoriented and abandoned by his unit during a violent Belfast Riot in the titular year of 1971. The riot occurs during the early years of the Troubles, a three decade era of violence between Northern Ireland's Irish nationalists and the country's unionists, which included British and Protestant citizens. Taking place over the course of 24 hours, the film follows Hook's interactions with civilians and soldiers from both sides of the conflict and the violence that surrounds them.

Twenty-four year-old leading male Jack O'Connell is going to be a big star, and you can feel it in '71. He carried the weight of Jolie's heavy-handed *Unbroken* direction on his shoulders, and his little-seen turn in the

O'Connell inhabited in *Unbroken*. It's also swift in its pace which makes for a very tense, involving watch. The momentum from the film's beginning won't rock you, but it involves you enough to really feel along Gary's side.

It is a terrific war story, though maybe not a revelatory one. It's not a film about triumph, but about survival. *Unbroken* was a survival picture on the surface, but ended on a note of American triumph. '71 portrays a conflict that depicts no triumph for either side, but rather shows the effect war has on the individual. '71 is now playing at the Arclight Hollywood and Landmark Theaters.

In 2013, former El Segundo residents (and siblings) Morgan and Ryan Rojas set out to realize a vision of bringing independently made and specialty films of artistic merit to a larger awareness and appreciation. 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

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


The Greatest

Etched into the memory of every fight fan is the photo of a snarling and defiant Muhammad Ali, glaring down on the canvas at the helpless, hapless and clueless Sonny Liston. Billed as the ferocious "Bear," Liston was thought to be invincible. Yet in a matter of seconds, his invincibility and title were gone.

That's when something miraculous took place. The team began to start gelling and lo and behold, began winning games. A win against Boston. Another against Utah. Then even a third against Milwaukee. It was the Lakers' first winning streak since last December 9-15. While fans across Los Angeles may already know that the Lakers need all of the losses that they can get, it has become increasingly clear that the team just does not care.

With their 101-93 win over the Milwaukee Bucks at the Staples Center last Friday night, the Lakers did something more with their 16th game of the season. They showed that they had heart and could compete in this league with a balanced effort from their players. Six players in total exited that night's game having scored in double figures, throwing the notion that the team is tanking directly into the wind. "At the end of the day, we are competitors," Wayne Ellington said. "We're not coming out here trying to lose any game." Ellington missed his first six shots of the game but was the reason why the Lakers got back into things in the fourth quarter. 11 straight points in the fourth quarter from the shooting guard helped solidify the win as he finished with 14 on the night.

One thing that Ellington's play and comments solidified is that while some teams are in full "tank mode" to reduce their number of wins and gain a better position in this year's draft lottery, the Lakers are certainly not one of them. Lakers General Manager Mitch Kupchak drove that fact home when asked how his team would approach the last 25-30 games of the season. "I just don't know how you send that message to a coaching staff or players," Kupchak said, speaking of tanking. "That's just not something that we want people to think that we would do." While Kupchak and the rest of the Lakers brass may not be saying it, however, they certainly are thinking about. "I'd love to be able to put together a young team that can

win 55 games next year," he continued. "But it's not that easy." One thing that would make it much easier is holding on to their top-five protected pick this year.

The only way to hold on to that pick would be to lose as many games as possible in order to finish with one of the league's worst five records. The team's recent winning streak of late seems to be putting a bit of an encumbrance on that process, though. Wayne Ellington, for instance, isn't the only player who has been stepping up for the Lakers of late. Jordan Clarkson, a player who Kupchak and the Lakers traded up for in last year's NBA draft, has been dazzling Lakers fans with his play of late. "He's just getting more confident each and every game," Lakers head coach Byron Scott explained of Clarkson. In his last 10 games, Clarkson is averaging 14 points, four assists and four rebounds. Not bad for a rookie getting an average of 20 minutes per game this year.

There is no questioning that right now is the future for the Los Angeles Lakers. It is clear that Kupchak wants to continue stockpiling young talent like last year's 46th pick, Clarkson. With the way he has been playing when given the minutes, the future looks bright. Even former stars like Jeremy Lin and Carlos Boozer have stepped up and given the Lakers good minutes recently. If a team for the future is what the front office is looking for, though, they need as many draft picks as they can possibly get and draft picks means losing. Even if players like Clarkson aren't the answer, developing youngsters like him and acquiring other young assets that can then be exchanged for the next "break-the-bank" type of superstar is key.

As for tanking to secure their top-five pick in this year's draft? Well coach Scott wants no part of it. "We're going to try to win every game and whatever happens after that with the lottery pick, happens. I think if you go into it saying, 'we're going to lose every game to see if we can get the best pick,' I think it backfires on you." Well, even if the head coach, General Manager and players on the team won't admit it, the more losses the Lakers manage, the better off they will be in the future. For a team that is already way out of playoff contention, the future is most readily of utmost importance. While they may not be tanking, per say, the players on the Lakers simply aren't good enough to beat the mid to top-tier team's in the league this year. Players like Ellington and Clarkson are certainly fun to watch and may even help the team in the long run. For now, however, there is only one thing to keep in mind: winning is losing for these Los Angeles Lakers. •

Record-Breaking Season Ends for Eagles

The season came to a disappointing end for the boys' soccer and girls' basketball teams. Both teams had reached the CIF Southern Section playoffs and both put together record-setting seasons. Still, it was a sad ending for each team that had played so brilliantly throughout the season.

El Segundo High School has been known throughout the region as a baseball school with a ton of success to backup that claim.

After all some 52 former Eagles have played baseball professionally. But that may all be changing with the success that soccer teams at the AYSO level has enjoyed and now the high school's success.

Once a program that wasn't taken seriously is now turning heads and placing area teams on notice that the El Segundo Eagles has a seriously good soccer program at all levels. It wasn't long ago that maybe a couple dozen people would filter through the stands while watching Eagle games at home. Now upwards of 500 fans filled the stands for each of the past two CIF-Southern Section Division 4 playoff games.

It was a record setting year for the Eagles, who won their first Ocean League title in school history. They advanced to the CIF-Southern Section Division 4 quarter-finals for the first time in school history and their 18-3-3 record shattered the record for most wins in a season. Their state and national rankings were also a program best.

After defeating Valencia in the first round the Eagles traveled to Brea Olinda for their second round matchup. It was the first time in years that the Eagles had advanced to the second round. The Eagles and Wildcats locked up in an epic battle. El Segundo's offense had been struggling to find the back of the net but their defense has been nothing short of dazzling.

The game went scoreless and after two overtime periods went to a penalty kick to decide the game. It marked the second consecutive game that the Eagles needed to go to a penalty kick to decide the game. When you add up the scoring drought the Eagles had failed to score a goal in 197 minutes over two games. From early in the first half against Valencia to the end of the second overtime period against Brea Olinda the Eagles failed to tally a goal.

The Wildcats hounded the Eagles' Zack Keller in goal but the talented Keller made ten saves and came up with his tenth shutout on the season. The Eagles struggled to get the offense in sync and had a number of attempts just miss their mark, but give credit to the Wildcats defense guarding the net.

When it came time for the PKs, Tyler Redman, Gilbert Cortez, Jackson Bacil and Santi Cardenas connected. Jake Grundman took over in goal and was marvelous by stopping the potential tying kicks.

The 1-0 win on PKs propelled the Eagles into the quarterfinals against a physical and talented Chaparral team from Temecula where they unceremoniously defeated 5-2. It was uncharted territory for the Eagles who hadn't played this deep into the CIF playoffs.

A great crowd came to support the Eagles but disappointment set in in the first half when the Pumas took a 4-1 lead; four different players scored for Chaparral. The Eagles got in the scoring column when Santo Cardenas scored on a breakaway.

If the Pumas owned the first half the Eagles controlled the second half. El Segundo, which trailed 4-1, put most of the pressure on the Pumas but had six attempts go wide and three others saved. On the other end Keller, who had been so dominate in goal all season long, had been victimized by a breakdown on the defense out of place in the first half. That led to four goals and a rare deficit the Eagles were chasing. But in the second half the defense shored up and Keller had to make just two saves. Chaparral did manage to extend their lead to 5-1 on

a perfectly timed play on a breakaway. The Eagles closed out the scoring with a late goal on a pass from Grant Bemis to Jake Grundman, who powered it to the back of the net to make it 5-2.

The loss was a hard one to handle. The Eagles displayed the class of a team that acknowledged that the better team had won that day. At the midfield handshake El Segundo players shook hands and applauded their opponents in a scene of positive sportsmanship you rarely witness these days. It is a tribute to not only Eagle head coach Andrew Kelly and his staff but to the fans as well.

With the JV team going 11-5-2 and placing second in the Ocean League and the freshman team which was 10-5-1 including 7-2-1 in league play the future of El Segundo soccer is on the rise.

ESHS Girls' Basketball

The girls' basketball team had a season to remember. They placed second in the Ocean League behind defending CIF champion Culver City. The Eagles were not fortunate to have much height but what they lacked in size they made more than made up with outside shooting and a tight defense. The Lady Eagles had been hampered by season-ending injuries early on, so the roster had been pared to eight at one juncture of the season. Morgan Gee, Anilupi Finau and Melissa Euyoque each sustained season ending injuries and were out for most of the year. For the playoffs JV players including Miley Lee, Paige Bargas and Alleya Nomura were promoted. Their presence was a welcome relief and each played a vital role.

The Lady Eagles had easily defeated Santa Ana Valley in the first round and won a thriller against La Canada in the second round. It was the first time in years the Eagles had advanced to the CIF Southern Section quarterfinals. Their reward was facing top seeded Orange Lutheran. In a game that was mismanaged by the game's officiating crew the Lady Eagles fell 40-29 in game that was much closer than the final score indicated.

El Segundo played the much taller Lancers close in the first half. The Eagles held a short-lived lead when Sarah Chang sank a 26 footer. Then Paige Endo's no-look pass to Jordan Swanier for a layup at the buzzer gave the Eagles an 11-8 lead after one period.

El Segundo had taken the Lancers out of their game and disrupted their rhythm. In the second quarter the Eagles slowed the paced down while Orange Lutheran attempted to quicken the pace. The ploy worked and the Eagles trailed at half time 22-17.

Orange Lutheran seemed to be a one-player offensive team; Taelor Griffin scored 16 of her team's 22 first half points. The Lancers front line of Gloria Bates and Bryn Adams, both six footers, helped hold the Eagles to one shot attempt.

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
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Lemony Peas & Pasta Salad

Then Orange Lutheran went on a five-point run and closed out the third quarter leading 35-27. In a low scoring fourth period the Eagles could not close the gap and went on to lose 40-29.

The officials working the contest may have taken away some of the zing out of the game. 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
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



bulkhead and seating for 600 (compared to 300 for the Base Option) with a second 75-foot by 35-foot shallow warm-up fitness pool that can support greater community access and use. Though pricier by \$1.3 million, the Upgrade Option with a 54-meter by 25-meter pool plus a couple of two-meter bulkheads offers additional programming and seating (900) to host larger meets and tournaments. Atkinson noted that El Segundo would be the only city in the area with a pool this size, thereby increasing outside draw and boosting revenues.

Though he voted for the Upgrade Option, Mayor Pro Tem Carl Jacobson was reluctant to spend the Aquatics Fund monies on the new facility at the expense of The Plunge. "I don't want to lose Urho Saari," he said of the town's historic indoor pool. His colleagues echoed those concerns, but Atkinson issued the reminder that the City has ample time (a couple of years) to raise other money towards the project. As for The Plunge, current estimates to renovate the aging facility range from \$800,000 to \$1.2 million.

Also on Tuesday, the Council held off on a recommendation from the Economic Development Advisory Committee (EDAC) to launch a comprehensive outreach effort to Sepulveda Boulevard businesses and property owners regarding a proposed name change of that street to Pacific Coast Highway (PCH). The EDAC members feel the revised moniker can enhance economic development opportunities in town by

letting outsiders know El Segundo is a coastal city. Caltrans confirmed that Sepulveda is already designated as Highway 1 (PCH) by the State Legislature, but the City still has to take preliminary steps to proceed with the name change---including documented support from a majority of affected property and business owners, Council approval, and submission of a formal request. But Caltrans also indicated that submitting the request in concert with Manhattan Beach would be more desirable for consistency so that PCH can run contiguously through the various South Bay cities. When first approached, Manhattan Beach did not express interest in changing its portion of Sepulveda to PCH. With that in mind, Councilmember Marie Fellhauer made the motion to reach out to the neighboring city once again to see if the latter might now be willing to be on board. Depending on the results, the Council could then decide to dedicate resources to the outreach effort.

In a more informal Sepulveda survey last spring, only 86 (mostly business owners) responded out of 509 entities contacted. Of the respondents, 42 percent strongly disagreed with the name change, 35 percent strongly agreed, 14 percent had no opinion, six percent somewhat agreed and three percent somewhat disagreed. The next survey, should it proceed, would likely entail hiring a public outreach firm for about \$5,000, to go door-to-door and call business and property owners on Sepulveda to get

more extensive feedback. Between the formal request to Caltrans, implementation schedule and signage installation, it would take 12-18 months to complete the process and ensure costs and impacts to businesses are minimized.

During presentations, Southern California Gas Company Public Affairs Manager Mike Harriel announced that his agency will begin gas pipeline testing along a portion of El Segundo Boulevard as part of a State-required inspection that must occur every seven years. The work, which entails cleaning and gauging natural gas pipes while checking them for corrosion, will begin about April 1 and last seven weeks into mid-May. It will take place just east of Nash Street and will impact the left and middle eastbound lanes adjacent to the MTA Park and Ride--closing those lanes for a stretch of 100 feet. Only one eastbound lane and the right turn lane into the Park and Ride will be open. Eastbound lanes will reopen prior to crossing Douglas Street. Though told it would be logistically difficult to accomplish due to the positioning and size of equipment, Councilmember Mike Dugan said he will talk to Gas Company officials about the possibility of minimizing traffic impacts by using one lane on both the east and west sides of the street rather than clogging up the two lanes on the east.

Mar Ventures Senior Vice President Bill Messori reported that the elevon project at Campus El Segundo is "almost a reality," as

nine businesses will open in July and landscaping is currently in progress. Tenants include an accountant, logistics firm, dermatologist, headhunter, media and gaming companies, and Mar Ventures itself. Meanwhile, Mar Ventures and elevon partner Continental Development Corporation got the Council's blessing on Tuesday to reduce the overall project site that includes elevon from 23.87 acres to 13 acres. The Council approved a three-phase development at the site in 2013. The modification allows the remaining two phases to revert to the original Corporate Campus Specific Plan map approved in 2002 so that the upcoming projects won't be delayed by having to complete a new tract map. EVA Airways bought the Phase 2 area, while the Phase 3 section is pending sale to the Los Angeles Lakers for the team's new headquarters.

Finally during reports, Mayor Fuentes got her colleagues' support for the City Manager to hire NexLevel Information Technology, Inc. for technology strategic planning services at a cost of \$48,840. NexLevel will first document the City's current technology infrastructure, determine how resources are used, and benchmark the results so that it can strategize with staff to formalize the strategic plan and prioritize current and future projects. Fuentes hopes the move will make the City "more leading edge" and competitive. "It behooves us to have a world-class IT system," she said. •

NOTICE The City of El Segundo (City) prepared a Draft Addendum to the previously Certified Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) for the proposed Los Angeles Lakers Corporate Office and Training Facility Development project to evaluate potential environmental effects which may be associated with changes in the previously-approved Corporate Campus Development.

A previously approved Draft Addendum to the Certified EIR for the 2013 Revised Project analyzed the environmental effects of: (1) a proposed Specific Plan Amendment that would affect the distribution of vehicle traffic throughout the project site's private streets and (2) change the site plan of 23.87 acres of the site to a 625,205 square-foot commercial office/retail development to be constructed in three phases (Phases 1, 2 and 3).

The proposed project also involves a draft Addendum to the previously Certified FEIR that would allow for the development of a further scaled down project consisting of combined offices, athletic training facilities, and an exhibition venue for a professional sports team in a single two-story building of up to 133,000 square feet in area ("Lakers Project") only involving the Phase 3 5-acre site of the 2013 Revised Project. The Phase 3 area was previously approved to be developed with 214,340 square feet of office uses. The proposed Corporate Campus ("Original Project") was approved and the EIR was certified by the City of El Segundo on January 2, 2002 (Resolution No. 4241). The Certified EIR for the Original Project was approved for the development of 2,175,000 gross square feet on a 46.5-acre site. In December, 2013 (Resolution No. 4852) the City of El Segundo approved an Addendum to the Certified EIR for a scaled down development for 625,205 square feet commercial development.

An EIR is a detailed informational document that analyzes a proposed project's potentially significant environmental effects. An EIR also identifies ways to reduce environmental effects and reasonable alternatives to avoid or minimize significant environmental effects. The addendum

has been prepared under the authority of 14 California Code of Regulations § 15164(a) (CEQA Guidelines) which allows a lead agency to prepare an addendum to a previously certified EIR if some changes or additions to the previously certified EIR are necessary but none of the conditions described in CEQA Guidelines § 15162 of the CEQA Guidelines requiring preparation of a subsequent EIR occurred. The purpose of the addendum is to provide substantial evidence in the record to support the determination of the decision making body of the lead agency that none of these conditions has occurred as a result of the proposed changes in the Revised Corporate Campus Development. An addendum need not be circulated for public review but can be included or attached to the final EIR.

The proposed Lakers Project includes modification of certain development standards of the Specific Plan that would: 1) Amend the CCSP to list combined offices, athletic training facilities, and exhibition venues for professional sports teams as a permitted use; 2) Consider a parking demand study that would amend the parking section of the CCSP to permit shared on-site parking for the exhibition venue and office use that will not operate simultaneously; and 3) Amend the signage section of the CCSP to allow: a) a non-projecting roof sign up to 24,300 square feet in size; b) one 265 square-foot window sign; c) an increase in the total area of signage per building face to exceed five (5) percent size up to a maximum combined twenty seven (27) percent for projecting wall signs and LED digital signs with individual projecting wall signs up to 2,000 square feet in size and LED digital signs up to 450 square feet in size; d) allocation of up to 65 percent of the sign area of the window sign and seven of the projecting wall signs with sponsorship name and/or logo information; and e) allocation of up to 100 percent of the sign area of the non-projecting roof sign and the LED digital video sign.

Project Description and Location The original Corporate Campus Development project was approved in 2002 under EA-548. The approval also included a Specific Plan, Development Agreement, General Plan Amendment, Zone Change, and Subdivision. The original Corporate Campus included the development of 2,175,000 square feet of commercial, office, and retail on a 46.5 acre site. The project was approved with a 0.99:1 Floor Area Ratio (FAR). In 2013, the revised Corporate Campus under application (EA-1021) was approved as a 23.87 acre commercial office/retail development to be developed in three (3) phases (Phase 1: 217,637 square feet; Phase 2: 193,228 square feet; and Phase 3: 214,340 square feet).

The proposed Lakers Project is to be located on the Phase 3 site and will be a scaled down development of up to 133,000 square feet of corporate offices, training facilities and an exhibition venue developed with a FAR of 0.53:1. The Lakers Project is 81,340 square feet smaller than the previously approved 214,340 square-foot commercial office/retail development for Phase 3 of the previously approved Revised Project. Additionally, the previous Addendum to the Certified EIR for the Revised Project allowed for a daily maximum allowable trip count in the Phase 3 area of 2,343

trips. The Lakers Project will generate a total of 1,260 daily trips which is 1,083 fewer trips than the maximum trip generation used to evaluate the traffic impacts of the Phase 3 portion of the Revised Project.

ANTICIPATED SIGNIFICANT ENVIRONMENTAL EFFECTS Based on the analyses in the Addendum to the Certified EIR, following incorporation of mitigation measures, the project would have no additional significant and unavoidable impacts not previously identified. The project, as analyzed in the Certified EIR, has a significant and unavoidable impact relative to transportation/traffic, air quality, and construction noise. The proposed project will also contribute to a significant cumulative impact relative to traffic/transportation, regional population growth and housing, and solid waste but will less than the Original Project as the Revised Project is smaller in scale.
