El Segundo Library Launching Fine Forgiveness Month in April

In one of the many famous episodes of the classic sitcom Seinfeld, Jerry learns that he owes late fees for a book never returned to his high school library due 20 years prior. But that doesn't hold a candle to a real-life case. Apparently, none other than George Washington failed to return a library book back in 1789. Mount Vernon

the El Segundo Public Library between April 1 and April 30. "You may ask library staff to remove old overdue fines as well in person or over the phone," McCollum added. "All materials will be eligible for fine forgiveness during this special event with the exception of damaged, unusable or lost items. Additionally, there will be no reimbursement for previously paid fines or fees."

Street School told me about a recent incident when a child burst into tears when she realized that her account was blocked during a class visit," she said. "It turns out that her mother checked out books on the account for her brother at the main library and forgot to return them by the due date. Librarians also are heartbroken when they hear parents tell their kids that they will no longer be able to check out library books because they don't want to risk accumulating additional fines." Said overdue fines run 25 cents per item per day. However, fines and fees for overdue library materials equate to less than 1 percent of the Library Services Department's annual budget. The average monthly income from overdue fines and fees is \$1,666. Library staff estimate at least \$10,000 in overdue fees could be waived during Fine Forgiveness Month. While that amount may seem substantial, McCollum feels the lost revenue will be mostly offset by the return of overdue materials - particularly when considering that a significant portion of this lost revenue would otherwise have never been collected anyway. That's because some patrons choose to stop using the library rather than pay the overdue fines. McCollum views Fine Forgiveness Month as the beginning of a conversation about the value of overdue library fines in El Segundo.

staff got around to replacing the book some 221 years later.

For all the benefits offered by public libraries, one pesky stigma seems to dog them all: the specter of overdue books and associated fines that may hamper some people from remaining customers. With that in mind, the El Segundo Public Library recently announced its Fine Forgiveness Month promotion. During all of April, anyone still holding onto late materials borrowed from the facility can return the items with no questions asked - and with any late fees waived. The El Segundo City Council recently gave its blessing to launch the program.

"The Library Board of Trustees and El Segundo Public Library are most interested in using Fine Forgiveness Month as an opportunity to recover recent overdue items that may be used by others and restore library access for patrons of all ages," Library Director Melissa McCollum explained. To take advantage of Fine Forgiveness Month, one can simply return overdue library books to

In analyzing the impact of late fees, Mc-Collum and staff came upon some surprising statistics: 10 percent of children's accounts (or 480 children) have a block on them, prohibiting those from checking out library materials because of overdue fines. Meanwhile, 6 percent of adult library accounts (761 adults) also have blocks. Children's accounts are blocked at \$5 and adult accounts are blocked at \$20. Due to these blocks, 249 children's accounts and over 500 adult accounts remain unused over the past three years. "The Library Board of Trustees did not want to recommend raising the threshold for children's accounts at this time, as students often visit school libraries with their teachers rather than parents," McCollum said. "The Board is concerned about caregivers being surprised about fines accruing in much higher amounts without their knowledge."

McCollum went on to note that parents are not typically available to pay fines during class visits, making the overall process challenging. "A library assistant at Richmond

West Basin Launches Water for Tomorrow Program

West Basin Municipal Water District last week introduced a renewed approach to addressing its service area's water future. The Water for Tomorrow Program brings new emphasis to West Basin's commitment to protecting, securing and diversifying its water supply portfolio while building upon its history of innovation and industry leadership.

Southern California's water supply is less certain and less reliable because it comes from a variety of sources, including Northern California and the Colorado River. Unpredictable ebbs and flows of imported drinking water, environmental and regulatory decisions impacting supply availability, and the uncertainty affiliated with climate change further dictate that more preparation is needed to be ready for future water supply challenges.

In the District's efforts to secure its water future, West Basin and the Water for Tomorrow Program will continue to advance conservation and water use efficiency as a cornerstone of its resource management plan. The District will also focus on improving the reliability of our region's critical imported water supplies, continuing to invest in its recycled water program, and exploring local drinking water supplies such as potable water reuse and desalination.

The Water for Tomorrow Program will be highlighted throughout West Basin's community outreach and education programs on an ongoing basis. Additionally, materials will be available at the numerous free conservation events offered in the District's service area, such as free rain barrel distributions, turf replacement classes and greywater workshops. 



El Segundo School Board Sees Facilities Upgrade Plans

With Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore out of town attending the League of Innovative Schools Conference in Seattle, Washington, Director for Human Resources, Facilities and Maintenance and Operations Dr. Dylan Harris took her spot at the table during Tuesday night's El Segundo School Board meeting. Farris had recently been selected as the recipient of the Association of California School Administrators (ACSA) Region 14 Personnel Administrator of the Year Award. The award is typically bestowed upon an administrator who has evinced strong support for the school management team; practiced exceptional leadership in managing myriad school programs; bolstered educational and student achievement; and championed educator's professional growth, creativity and innovation in deftly dealing with challenges currently facing public education.

Moore, in her letter of recommendation to ACSA, touted Farris, calling him a "master communicator" and lauding his "passion for education and commitment to students." She wrote that he is "pragmatic and calm" and has a "passion for the profession." She detailed the skill set that has made Farris valuable to El Segundo Unified District in implementing the Long-Range Facilities Master Plan (LRFMP) and the allocation of bond monies. Moore pointed out how Farris "works with architects, construction management and outside experts to see a facility improvement from an idea to a reality."

Prior to the meeting, Farris emailed that he was "grateful to be recognized by my colleagues and ACSA," noting that "the best education can only be provided by high-quality teachers and staff. El Segundo Unified is such a terrific place that it truly makes my job easy! We attract great people -- we have wonderful employees who are passionate about their work."

Farris was one of the key presenters at Tuesday's meeting, giving an update on District facilities projects for the wind-down of the 2018/19 school year and beyond. The District and stakeholders have identified \$92-million in the LRFMP needs. Farris, joined by PBK Architects Principal Gilbert Baez, updated the Board on construction projects as the District looks to prudently spend the matching \$92 million in bond money it was granted when El Segundo voters passed Measure ES last November.

Farris began his presentation noting that the facilities, maintenance and operations

representatives. Former School Board member Chris Powell is serving as the chairperson of the committee. Farris then delved into Phase I of the District's modernization plans. At El Segundo High School, proposed projects include the long-postponed science building HVAC project, as well as the much-anticipated modernization of the campus library, plus the gymnasium renovation involving the bleachers and improved acoustics.

At El Segundo Middle School, a new gymnasium project is on the docket, as well as a redesign of the administration building. The hope is to limit school day chaos that tends to occur with the current administration building configuration.

At Center Street Elementary, a "shade structure" project is on the drawing board. Richmond Street Elementary will receive upgraded security infrastructure as well as well as an upgrade to the entrance area to the school, its own "shade structure," and the rebuilding of a new version of Madsen House that will be utilized by the Learning Connections pre-and-post school day programs. Farris also reported that the windows in the main building are past their prime and need to be replaced. The Madsen House replacement plans were front-and-center during Tuesday's presentation, with Baez speaking of the current site plan for the new TLC facility, detailing architectural plans. Farris said before the meeting that he wanted to get the word out that there are multiple required parameters that must be met before many of the construction projects can begin.

Farris explained that while the optimal outcome is to complete upgrade programs during the summer months, he said "we are just going to have to get comfortable with the idea that we are going to have projects ongoing while school is session." He indicated there could be construction projects taking place during the school- ear for the foreseeable future.

Prior to Farris's presentation, Center Street fifth grader Rushil Ghosh was recognized for two recent accomplishments. On March 9, Ghosh competed in the Los Angeles County Scripps Regional Spelling Bee and remained among the top competitors -- a tremendous feat, considering the more than 35,000 students attending schools in Los Angeles. Ghosh also competed in the 2019 California State Geographic Bee, earning a spot in the top 100 students. Ghosh will compete in the upcoming state "Geo-Bee" competition in Fresno, and if successful would represent California in the "Geo-Bee" national championship in May that will take place in Washington D.C., with college scholarships and further recognition on the line at the National Geographicsponsored event. Center Street Elementary Principal Martha Monahan introduced Ghosh. Monahan spoke about how proud the Center Street Elementary community was of the fifth grader's accomplishments. Eagles' Nest Executive Director Guadalupe Grijalva, along with El Segundo High art teacher Tracy Kadanoga and some of her advanced art students, made a presentation regarding the creation of a new mural at the preschool. The present mural was deemed in need of repair -- necessitating a fresh design incorporating teaching tools and numerical identification, counting, occupations and careers, community helpers and inclusivity.

In the second contest, the Cardinals had no ill effects after consuming a big lunch between games. They put together a five-run first inning en route to a 12-6 win. Cardinal pitchers, including Aaron Newman, Mathew Alvarez and Andre Sugden, kept the Angels off balance.

On any typical Saturday, there will be games all day long. With five Major Division teams this season, it created a dilemma for one team. The result was that team would play against a squad from another local Little League within District 36. So the Royals faced the Mariners, a team from Redondo Beach Little League.

As you might expect, no lead is safe in a Little League game and the Royals, who trailed 8-4 after two innings, would regroup and rally for a 12-11 win. Owen Reed's three-run double gave the Royals a 10-8 lead. In the fifth inning, the Mariners took

team includes 15 custodial members and four maintenance staff members, as well one warehouse/maintenance worker. Farris also mentioned two positions under his guidance that are currently vacant: Director of Maintenance and Operations, open after the recent resignation of Alfredo Perez, who took a position in another school district; and the newly created title of Bond Projects Manager.

Farris added that there are three different ways that Phase 1 of the LRFMP projects will be funded, including utilizing monies from the recent passage of the bond measure, funds gleaned from the sale of the Imperial property, and "modernization funds" that could be available down the road from the State of California. He said that many Phase 1 projects are about "safety and security," including not only securing the site perimeter, but beefing up "visitor monitoring."

Next Farris detailed the positions on the Facilities Advisory Committee, including parents/community representatives, management representatives, and bargaining unit The proposed timeline for the project should have the new design in place by mid-May. Board President Nancy Cobb lauded the project, commenting on the importance of See ESUSD, page 10



Check It Out The Clockmaker's Daughter by Kate Morton

Part ghost story, part mystery, Kate Morton's latest historical fiction book, *The Clockmaker's Daughter*, weaves multiple storylines through time while touching on music, art, war and the supernatural. At first glance, the various characters and their tales don't appear connected... but by the end of the story, they have converged in interesting and sometimes unexpected ways.

Similar to other Morton works, *Clockmaker* features a house, Birchwood Manor, located in a small English village. Throughout the 150-plus years, the house is the setting for joy, grief, love

and even death, but, despite tragedy, endures as a symbol of refuge for characters in need.

Morton excels at crafting tragic outcomes where small decisions in series of events can have far-reaching implications. While readers wish the characters made different choices that might have resulted in happier results, they understand the complex human emotions and complicating circumstances that can lead to the imperfect human decisions. Morton's writing is beautiful, elegantly crafting rich characters that draw you into lush descriptions of their hopes, dreams, disappointments and fears.

Film Review Us Review: A New, Essential American Nightmare

Last year's *Get Out* ended up being more than just one of the scariest and most wildly original movies of recent times. Jordan Peele's horror flick, about a group of African Americans who become enslaved through mind control after getting hypnotized by a family of wealthy Whites, became a pop cultural lightning rod for people to discuss the Black experience of living in America – speaking to both its earliest historical roots of enslavement through the modern anxiety of Trump-era politics.

For such a stunning achievement of a debut, it's no wonder that audiences have been looking forward to whatever Peele's follow-up film would be with feverish excitement. And now, Peele is back with another

suspense thriller - Us - which is equally ambitious in its masterfully layered allegory (this review is spoiler-free).

It/s this duality that makes Us work on two operatic levels: a familiar yet pulse-pounding set-up of a family trying to survive a home invasion, as well as a wildly conceptual existential dread-fest that ties in such gigantic conversations as race in America. When an African American family (a detail that isn't relevant to the story until you think about it symbolically afterwards) vacations at their beach house, haunting memories can't help but pop up for Adelaide (Lupita Nyong'o), who remembers an experience she had when she, as a little girl back in 1986, wandered away from her family one night at the boardwalk only to find herself face to face with another girl - her exact self. It's enough to make for a traumatic childhood that makes her feel not quite herself and sets the stage for years later when her family becomes the targets of home

enough, being each of their actual selves.

A family of four staring back at their exact opposites, they see these attackers all clad in red jumpsuits, brandishing scissors as weapons and noticeably all mute – except for Adelaide's doppelgänger, Red (also played by Nyong'o). From there, it's a story of the family trying to outlive their attackers, who aim to do away with them and take their place in this world.

Peele, a previous funnyman whose background on the two iconic sketch shows Mad TV and Key and Peele helped shape him into the brilliant premise inventor that he is, proves more amazingly here that it's his deep understanding of film history that makes him such a gifted talent (the Hitchcock comparisons have been flying his way as of late). While this review could spend even more time unpacking the visual references that are everywhere in the film and their significance (while still not touching on everything), quite simply put, Us is everything any audience could want in a movie. And one of the best parts is Peele marries his uncompromising vision with the mindset of being big-screen popcorn entertainment, giving Us the opportunity to be seen and discussed by people of all types. And this is what films - the best, paradigm-shifting films - are supposed to do. We should not only escape into something for 100 minutes and return to modern life unchanged, but come back from the experience more learned, or at the very least willing to confront realworld discomforts. So beyond being one of the most unsettling films of this or any other recent year, Us achieves an importance that will be recognized, re-watched and discussed for years to come.

Fine Forgiveness

In her presentation to the City Council, she mentioned that a growing number of libraries nationwide -- including the main facilities in notable cities such as San Diego, San Mateo and Denver -- have eliminated charges for late returns of library materials in order to increase patron access to materials and services, reduce the inequitable impact of overdue fines, improve patron relationships with the library, and optimize staff time and increase efficiency. "Many other public libraries are creating fine-free cards for certain categories of patrons, such as kids or teens or active duty military personnel and veterans," Mc-Collum said. "Interestingly, in a recent study of libraries that have eliminated overdue fines, none of the libraries have experienced increases in late returns, longer hold times, or gaps in the collection."

While she isn't aware of a "record-holder" for the longest overdue book in El Segundo, McCollum hopes some interesting stories emerge from Fine Forgiveness Month. "Perhaps an adult has been holding onto an old library book they couldn't part with as a kid or someone finds a 1930s El Segundo Public Library book tucked away on a relative's bookshelf," she said.

Meanwhile the El Segundo Public Library is also gearing up for National Library Week (April 7-13). "In addition to Fine Forgiveness Month, we'll be celebrating library highlights, volunteers, our new reading lounge, and the debut of our first Limited Edition Artist Series Library Card at a special National Library Week Breakfast on

Thursday, April 11 at 8 a.m. where all are welcome to attend," McCollum said. Fine Forgiveness Month promotional material will be available to the general public by the time this article hits the streets. School library staff also plan to work with administrators and parents to ensure current El Segundo Unified School District students' accounts are cleared of overdue fines during April. Now if only Jerry Seinfeld and George Washington could have had the same opportunity back in their day... •

Eagles Named to the All-CIF Teams



Reese Jones was selected to the All-CIF Southern Section Division 4A First team. She was also named the Ocean League's MVP.



The morning is the best time to water grass. Temperatures and winds are typically lower in the morning, which means less evaporation. Strive to water grass before 10 a.m., but if you must do so later, wait until after 4 p.m., when the sun is less intense.

How do you know the amount of water your lawn is getting? Invest in a rain gauge to monitor precipitation. When using a sprinkler, set out a few empty tin cans in different places to measure water application. Unsure if you need to water? Try the footprinting test. Walk across your lawn and if your footprints are still visible after 30 seconds, it's time to water. Healthy, well-watered grass will stand back up quickly after you walk on it.
