Technology Committee Helping to Guide El Segundo into the Future

It seems that with each passing year, the pace of technology progresses faster and it's getting more difficult to keep up with the changes. With that and other considerations in mind, the El Segundo City Council last year made technology a strategic objective and approved the formation of a dedicated committee to help usher in a new era in the hopes of not just keeping up with the times-but also getting ahead of the curve. Created just last summer, the City of El Segundo's Technology Committee hit the ground running and now meets on the first and third Thursdays of every month at 6 p.m. in the Police Department Emergency Operations Center. The group advises the Council on technology-related issues such as equipment, software, hardware, programs and staffing, as well as on ways to deploy technology citywide. The members interact with both City staff and experts in the information technology community to consider best practice strategies in implementing and maintaining systems. "Since its formation, the Technology Committee has been focused on understanding the challenges facing El Segundo, both as a community and as a city," said Lindsey Breeden, a committee member who also partners in a firm specializing in business branding and marketing. "We have quickly identified several items that need attention immediately and are

working with City staff and the City Council to implement our recommendations to create stability, continuity and an efficient user experience across all technology city-wide."

According to committee bylaws, members "shall represent a cross-section of the community including both residents and local industry representatives who have expert knowledge in technology and general technology practices." In addition to Breeden, the group also includes Chairman David Froemke (who runs a business consulting firm), Vice Chair Paul Lanyi (a marketing contractor at Kaiser Permanente), Tom Vanek (a senior lead technologist at Booz Allen Hamilton) and Gurvinder Bindra (owner of a computer consulting company), with two additional appointments just confirmed

School Board Mulls Bond Initiative, Hears Middle School Proposal

The El Segundo School Board did double duty in the past week, meeting last Thursday afternoon with Tom Clifford from the firm CliffordMoss, a political strategy and public affairs firm, to hear and view a presentation about a possible bond initiative that would face local voters in 2018. Dubbed by CliffordMoss a "Strategic Conversation Guide—Preparing for 2018 School Bond Success," the 22-page PowerPoint presentation delineated the recent back-story of the El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD) bond initiatives, including award-winning schools, high graduation rates, and the advent of the 2016 District Long-Range Facilities Master Plan.

Clifford then noted the District's "needs," as well as the past El Segundo history voting for or against bonds. The last District measure approved was in 2008, with a tick over 67 percent of participating voters passing a \$14 million bond framed to "support high academic achievement, enhance student safety," and improve and refurbish aging District facilities. Slides then portrayed the "Science of Winning" the bond measure election, with the notation that more than 50 percent of the voters in the 2018 elections are expected to vote by mail versus going to the polls on election day. Ice Company Memories

Thank you for the historical picture of the El Segundo Ice Company, in the March 15 issue of the Herald.

You mentioned the Ice Company was owned by the Pinkerton family in the early 1920s. I was under the impression that it was owned by the Reddington family, my maternal grandparents. I have fond memories of coming to El Segundo in the 1930s and riding along while the ice was delivered to residents. In those days everyone had aN "icebox," not a refrigerator.

Apparently, sometime prior to 1930, my grandfather Gene Reddington must have purchased the ice company and it remained on the corner of Virginia and Pine for years. They later moved to the 200 block on West Walnut, where it was part of several acres called "The Reddington Ranch." They raised turkeys and chickens, corn, vegetables, strawberries and fresh eggs, which they sold to residents and out-of-town customers.

"Grease Girl" Teaches Women About Their Cars

Kristin Cline likes to work on her car on the weekends and she's not squeamish about the grease and grime. When she pulls on her mechanic coveralls and leans into the engine compartment of her classic Studebaker, she feels at ease. She thinks more women should try it, popping their car's hood and getting familiar with what's under there.

Lately, she's had less time for her 1955 Studebaker because she's leading a Saturday car-clinic class for women. Cline is an automotive writer during the week with a blog called "Grease Girl." Her classroom is a garage at the Automobile Driving Museum in El Segundo, where she teaches the "Ladies Car Care 101" clinic. It's a starter class, drawing sometimes as many as two dozen women who come knowing a little, not a lot, about cars. "Knowing certain things about your car can mean more confidence when you're driving it," Cline said. women think of car maintenance and repair as a guy thing, which "Grease Girl" found out firsthand when she bought her Studebaker and began restoring it. She'd attend classic car shows and often was the only woman there. But, that's changing as women become auto technicians and mechanics.

Cline discovered that "the car world is a really fun place to be and the garage can be fun." The classic car project was her path to a writing career and her blog. Cars can be like that, too. There's linkage between random happenings under the hood that fuel, power, cool and control a vehicle. Career moves are easier to predict than a car breakdown, though. Some basic knowledge and terminology about horsepower and cars can be a confidencebuilder for a woman, Cline noted, adding that though a woman may not do her own tune-up or oil change, she should know what system of the car and parts they involved. Assault with a Deadly Weapon Against a Police Officer

On March 25 at 4:45 p.m., an El Segundo Police Officer and his K9 partner were driving in to work from the Inland Empire. The officer was traveling westbound on the I-10 freeway in Pomona when he was rear-ended by a man driving a white Dodge Durango. As the officer changed lanes, the vehicle followed behind and rear-ended him again. The officer was rammed several more times as he attempted to evade the vehicle. The suspect vehicle eventually sped away in reverse on the freeway and exited on Indian Hill Boulevard in Pomona. With the assistance of Pomona PD and the California Highway Patrol, the suspect was eventually located. He admitted to officers he intentionally rammed the El Segundo Police car. The officer was injured as a result of the assault and treated at an area hospital where he was released a short time later. The police dog was not injured.

David Glen Dennison, a resident of Pomona, was arrested and charged with assault with a deadly weapon against a police officer, assaulting a police dog, criminal threats, and DUI. He was booked at the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, Walnut Station. The California Highway Patrol - Baldwin Park station is handling the arrest and investigation.

Imperial Highway Resurfacing May Cause Delays Near LAX

The City of El Segundo has notified Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) officials of a major resurfacing project that started Monday, March 27 that will restrict traffic on eastbound Imperial Highway between Sepulveda Boulevard and Hornet Way for approximately one month.

The majority of the work will take place weekdays, between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., and require the closure of most lanes on eastbound Imperial Highway, as well as occasional full closures that could restrict access to the Interstate 105 eastbound on-ramp at Hughes Way. Paving work will take place over one full weekend, tentatively set for Friday night, April 8, through Sunday, April 10. One lane will remain open when possible, and emergency vehicles will have access if needed.

Motorists can bypass the work via eastbound Maple or Mariposa avenues to northbound Douglas Street. The work will not affect westbound Imperial Highway.

The project involves the removal of four inches of the road surface, which will then be replaced with rubberized asphalt concrete. The work is weather-dependent and subject to delays.

Airport officials recommend travelers plan ahead and allow more time for possible detours.

<u>Community Briefs</u> **ESPD Urges Homeowners** by Alleys to Mark Addresses

In order to enhance service and response time, the El Segundo Police Department is reaching out to those with homes, apartments, condos or townhouses with alley access. The ESPD noted that it is "very important to have your address number on the front, as well as the alley side, of your home. Addressing on the alley side makes it easier for police officers to find your home quickly during an emergency."

Especially in emergency call situations such as when an intruder is on a particular property, officers may need to surround or enter the property from the front and the rear. Trying to locate the proper back entrance requiring police response wastes valuable time. The ESPD suggests that addressing for the front and rear of properties should be highly visible from the driving surface, a minimum of four inches high, of contrasting color to the background, and illuminated during hours of darkness.

Curveball Alters Planning Commission Action on Accessory Dwelling Units

Garages May Be **Removed From the Equation**

Pending state legislation threw an unexpected and perhaps welcome curveball at the El Segundo Planning Commission Thursday night when City staff delivered the news that garages may not have to be considered as potential Accessory Dwelling Units and thus might be exempt from California's new ADU law.

In its previous meeting two weeks prior, the Planning Commission had been told they faced deciding upon the better of two evils due to a new law that took effect January 1 after Governor Jerry Brown signed it earlier in 2016. At that meeting on March 9, Planning Manager Gregg McClain said the new legislation required the City to allow every single-family property in El Segundo's R-1 zone to have or construct an ADU without requiring any additional parking because each of these properties is within a half-mile of public transit. The concern, according to McClain, was that garages could now be converted to ADUs, which would then conceivably bring an even greater shortage of parking to a city in which spots can be difficult to find.

Thursday night, McClain told the commissioners, with all five present, "There are a number of pending bills in Sacramento that are going in and tweaking the section that applies to Accessory Dwelling Units and we would like to spend some time to study the language of these and try to assess their likelihood of approval because at least one of them we're aware of may have the opportunity to make favorable changes to the draft ordinance that we've presented. So what we're going to do is request that you open the podium to public testimony today and then at the end of that, we'll take the information and process it. But, also, we're going to ask that you continue to a future date and then give us a chance to come back with possible amendments."

The announcement of the pending bills pushed back the previous timeline for getting a new ordinance before City Council for review and adoption. Thursday night, the Planning Commission continued the public hearing on the matter that began at its March 9 meeting and continued it, per city staff's recommendation, to its second meeting in April on Thursday, April 27. City staff had hoped for Council to hold a public hearing on Tuesday, April 18 during the regularly scheduled meeting, and for Council to act on the ordinance at its Tuesday, May 2 session. The effective date for the new ordinance would have then been June 1. At least two members of the public who addressed the Planning Commission Thursday night have pending or in-progress construction and were concerned about moving forward with their building and/or plans since once a new city ordinance is passed, they could then enhance their plans by adding facilities such as a cooking area (which wasn't allowed at the time their building plans were approved) or second-floor storage once the new ordinance defined the allowable square footage of an ADU.

Commissioner Brenda Newman asked staff to explain what had happened between March 9 and the current meeting so the public would understand why the City's ordinance regarding ADUs was being delayed. "There are at least four bills that are pending that are addressing the part of the government code that deals specifically with ADUs," said McClain. See Accessory Dwelling Unit, page 4

use and development of Los Angeles World Airports' (LAWA's) proposed Landside Access Modernization Program (LAMP) at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX). These recommendations were made during a special joint meeting of the CPC with the Los Angeles Board of Airport Commissioners (BOAC).

Amendments were approved for four separate plans: the LAX Plan, the Westchester-Playa del Rey Community Plan, Mobility Plan 2035, and the LAX Specific Plan. The amendments also included zone changes to various properties located within the various plans.

Collectively, these amendments permit the construction of LAMP's several primary components, which include: an Automated People Mover (APM) system with six stations that would transport passengers between the CTA and the other main project components located east of the CTA; a Consolidated Rent-A-Car Facility (ConRAC); and two new Intermodal Transportation Facilities, which include public parking and passenger a station at the Intermodal Transit Facility where it interfaces with Metro's Airport Metro Connector station at 96th Street/Aviation Boulevard.

The BOAC certified LAMP's Final EIR during its previous meeting on March 2 following public comment. Prior to the Final EIR, LAWA prepared a Draft Environmental Impact Report (Draft EIR) for LAMP in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), which was released on September 15, 2016. The official comment period for the Draft EIR ran from September 15 through November 15, 2016. Two public meetings were held in October 2016 that allowed the public to learn about LAMP and its components, with attendees able to submit comments following presentations from LAWA staff and consultants.



"And all of them are working independently to change the language in certain ways. One in particular adds clarity. It's sort of a clarification bill. And in how they add the clarity, we feel that we may be saved from having to do garage conversions, which is a good thing. So, we want to study that a little longer and then we also want to sort of assess the likelihood that that bill would be approved. We have reason to believe it will be because I think all the cities are asking for that clarity."

City Attorney David King told the Planning Commission his office had received word of the pending new bill just Tuesday and that the new bill was intended "to clarify the scope of the law" and the author's original intent, which was to not have garages included as ADUs but instead pool houses, studios and the like already existing on a single-family property. At least, that's the way King's office reads the pending bill, noting that the bill already passed didn't specifically say garages could be an ADU but didn't specifically eliminate them either--and that other parts of the new law included language that included garages. "In particular, I think it's noteworthy that this recent bill, which came to our office's attention on Tuesday-it's coming from the author of the legislation that became the law and so it seems as though there's an attempt by Assemblymember [Richard] Bloom to clarify the scope of the new law," said King. "And in particular, the new law doesn't define accessory structures and what accessory structures would be subject to this ministerial approval process [the new state law put into place] that we talked about last time [at the March 9 meeting] and there was a presumption on all of our parts that the accessory structures included garages because there was other language in the statute

that talked about garages in particular---but the new bill only references accessory structures and it gives examples such as pool houses and studios and other similar structures, but it doesn't say anything about garages. Now, I just want to emphasize that this is just a bill. It's not law and it's not an urgency bill, so it could take nine months to get through the approval process. So, as the Planning Manager mentioned, we will evaluate to see the likelihood of success and we'll definitely look into seeing what the intent was and maybe look into some of the legislative history to see if there was any intent that accessory structures were to cover and include garages. But the language

definitely seems to indicate that garages were not necessarily intended to be included as an accessory structure."

McClain also told the Planning Commission that state agencies had "indicated implicitly that garages were included" prior to the introduction of Assemblymember Bloom's pending bill and called the pending bill "a very, very welcome clarification if it goes through."

Planning Commissioner Scot Nicol asked how the City is currently handling any requests to convert an ADU into a livable unit that had been received since January 1 when the new law took effect. McClain said the City had received two applications to convert ADUs that are not garages or living units into livable units with cooking and plumbing. He said those would be approved within 120 days as required by law. McClain advised members of the public interested in converting an ADU or building a new living unit to consult the Planning Department. He added that if someone came in with an application to convert a garage into a living unit, the City would be "under a lot of pressure to get this ordinance done faster." •

Ball Doesn't Bounce Bruins' Way

There was nothing sweet about UCLA's 86-75 loss to the Kentucky Wildcats last Friday night in the Sweet 16. Kentucky was able to advance to the Elite Eight to later take on the North Carolina Tar Heels. The Bruins, however, were left wondering what went wrong on a night that was supposed to go their way and belong to freshman sensation Lonzo Ball. Instead of Ball, it was De'Aaron Fox and the youngsters on Kentucky who showed up in the spotlight as an 11-point loss officially put an end to UCLA's season.

Perhaps the moment was just too big for him, or perhaps the freshman star simply had an off night. Whatever the reason was, though, Ball picked his team's biggest moment of the year to struggle. Ball finished the game with 10 points and eight assists, but he also had four turnovers and missed five of six three-point attempts while trying--and failing--to get his team back in the game. In all, UCLA turned the ball over 13 times while being outscored 14-2 off of those mistakes.

In the end, the Bruins found themselves outsmarted by a Fox. De'Aaron scored a career-high 39 points to help his team win its 14th game in a row and advance to this year's South Regional final. "I scored like the first eight points of the game, and after that I was like you know it's going to be a good night for me," Fox said. Fox's performance was the best by any freshman in tournament history and best by any player in the tournament since Tayshaun Prince put up 41 against Tulsa in 2002.

Along with Ball, Isaac Hamilton, TJ Leaf and Bryce Alford all scored in double figures. Leaf and Hamilton led the way with 17 apiece, but in the end, Kentucky's all-around game was simply too much for the Bruins to handle. The loss marked the third time that the Bruins would make it to the Sweet 16 under head coach Steve Alford without being able to advance to the Elite Eight. "We just got beat by a very good team that played very, very well tonight," Alford said, giving all of the credit to Kentucky.

Before the game was played, all of the credit was being given to Lonzo Ball for the season that the freshman had been having for UCLA. Ball has already been ceremoniously placed on the Los Angeles Lakers roster, even though there is still the whole routine of an NBA draft to go through. Though it remains to be seen where the Lakers will have the opportunity to pick, there is no doubting the fact that Ball will be at the draft. When asked about his future with the Bruins after his team's loss, Ball did not hesitate to make his intentions clear. "That was my final game for UCLA," he said with the same calm and cool demeanor that the freshman always has on the basketball court. "I appreciate all the fans and all the support." Alford wasn't surprised of Ball's decision. "Guys can make a good living sooner than what it was two decades ago, three decades ago," the coach said of his guard's decision.

Coach Alford had a decision to make of his own. The Indiana alumnus was rumored to be the front-runner to take over as head coach of his alma mater once this season ended. As soon as UCLA's loss was in the books, however, Alford shot down any speculation that he would be leaving the Bruins. "I'm absolutely, 100 percent, not going to Indiana," Alford said moments after UCLA's loss. "I am happy here. I love it here. We have a great recruiting class coming in and a brand-new practice facility. Obviously, I love my alma mater. But I'm committed to UCLA. I am not going to talk to Indiana. I am staying a Bruin." The next morning, Indiana hired Dayton's Archie Miller as its next head coach.

Ball's 4-10 shooting night couldn't have come at a worse time for the Bruins or for the guard who has high hopes of playing in the NBA. With Magic Johnson and new Lakers general manager Rob Pelinka sitting in the front row, Ball was outshined by Fox, who certainly has expectations of going off of the board early in this year's NBA draft as well. Coming into the game, the Bruins were the nation's top-scoring team, averaging 90.2 points per game. It wasn't only the offense on display by Kentucky, but defense as well, holding UCLA to just 33 points in the first half and an eventual total of just 75. "We really picked it up defensively," Fox said. "That's why we won. Not because of our scoring. That team averages like 90 points a game and we held them to 15 less than their average."

Everything was quite average for the Bruins except for their scoring on a night that saw the last team from California get bounced out of the NCAA tournament. UCLA was outplayed in every aspect of the game as Kentucky's excellent young stars took center stage and stole all of the headlines. Now, the Bruins will head into a long offseason that should see the team bring in another excellent recruiting class. For Lonzo Ball, the NBA awaits. Will the 19-year-old Los Angeles product live up to all of the hype, or simply fade into the background as he did against Kentucky?

Beach City Academy owner, Richard Murad brainstormed with others and decided to bring some relief to some very unfortunate people. He invited the Japan team to leave

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


Before I Fall

This week, I'm reviewing one of my favorite teen books, *Before I Fall*, by Lauren Oliver, which recently has been adapted to the silver screen. While Oliver has gone on to write many New York Times Bestselling titles including the

Delirium series and *Rooms*, my favorite is still her debut, *Before I Fall*. It's about redemption, transformation, and how your actions affect those around you--including positive or negative consequences.

For high school senior Sam, Friday seemed no different than any other: hanging with her friends, sliding through school and going to parties. In a split second, all that changes as Sam dies in a fiery car crash. But then she wakes up confused in her bed at home. Was it a terrible dream? As she realizes she is actually

participating in the 50-plus-year-old age group has been pegged at 74 percent.

Film Review *Kong: Skull Island* Finds Fun With Comic Cast

In *Kong: Skull Island*, Skull Island is a remote, uncharted island in the Pacific, hidden away from the outside world by a stormy surface that has kept the island unexplored for years--which also keeps the mystery of who, or what, lives there as well. That is, until satellite photos--a new technology in the year 1973, during which this latest King Kong movie takes place--reveal the island (named for its foreboding topographical resemblance of a skull) and prove its existence to a team of scientists who set out to discover what unknown mysteries such a place could offer.

However, the mysteries that *Kong: Skull Island* tease as to what could happen hardly end up showing audiences anything they haven't seen before, as this popcorn romp ends up being a more familiar take of a crash landing on a dangerous and exotic location. However in this take, all must survive not only the wrath of the enormous king primate but that of similarly colossal creatures of equally enormous stature that prove to be their biggest threat until they

his actual character, and Mason Weaver (Brie Larson), a sexy bombshell war photographer. Leading the team from a defense perspective is the now out-of-work Lt. Col. Preston Packard (Samuel L. Jackson), an American soldier whose post-war memories of losses on the battlefield fuel aggressions that extend to the island's native inhabitants, including the mighty Kong, being eventually made into this movie's real villainous and threatening character.

Kong: Skull Island is a large movie (about as large as this CGI'd Kong, the biggest of any King Kong in the movie's franchise), where, upon the group's arrival to the island and immediate encounter with the giant primate, three separate factions of characters get their own storylines to get quite episodic early. While Randa, Conrad, Weaver and more stumble upon the face-painted loincloth-laden natives and a few other wacky characters (hey, John C. Reilly!), Packard grows further hell-bent. Consumed by his PTSD, he grows determined to conquer the King who, we learn from Reilly's kooked out WW2 pilot who lives on the island, is actually

And yet, while the cash-out mystery is barely paid out to the audience, the film is hardly a disastrous time. This blockbuster, directed by Jordan Vogt-Roberts (*The Kings of Summer*), made by Legendary Pictures and released by Warner Brothers, brings a large ensemble cast of cartoony characters who evoke the camp of B-movie seriousness along with a visually fun, '70s-drenched period piece reminiscent of the post-Vietnam era from which the movie mines its story. The light politicking that *Skull Island* enters into channels the original *King Kong* story (of the developed nation's Anglo man capturing and conquering the primal "other") as an allegory the protector of the island from an even greater (read: bigger) danger—"skull walkers" that look like two-legged slithery dinosaurs with the face of a bare skull. The consciences of all parties are tested when Kong is threatened by Packard and the skull walkers, forcing the group to realize how saving Kong's life will affect their own safety and chances of returning home (stay tuned for the sequel).

Kong: Skull Island hardly tries to explore new territory, but has its fun as an ensemble movie that slides by with camp and charm. The movie diverts from telling the traditional tale of men capturing the mountain-sized monkey (of which we've already seen in Peter Jackson's 2005 faithful re-telling of the 1933 classic film, King Kong), and instead puts a new spin on the Monster Universe, which also coincides with Godzilla (be sure to stay tuned after the credits for a post-movie teaser). It may drain you a little more than you'd like, but an alluring visual draw and list of enjoyable onscreen talent make Kong: Skull Island a light-fared, playful time. 118 min. Kong: Skull Island is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of sci-fi violence and action, and for brief strong language. Now playing in theaters everywhere. •

"This application will greatly improve our city's ability to serve our residents' recreation needs and wants." to help the City," she said. "The committee has been focusing on developing a technology road map that encompasses the City's current help support staff in developing a comprehensive technology strategy and to support the innovation occurring every day in El Segundo with leading-edge technology. The committee also recently helped the City's Information Technology (IT) staff work through some scenarios related to long-term operating system purchase decisions-in one case recommending to hold off proceeding on a new website (for which the Council had already set aside \$250,000) in order to first resolve legacy system issues and develop a more comprehensive technology strategy. "The committee also determined a feasible way to improve our business license and permitting process leveraging technology, which will help us achieve one of our goals of bringing the initial licensing and renewal process online to create a much more efficient, cost-effective and customer-friendly experience," added Boyles.

Pirsztuk pointed to the importance of the committee's work to help the City launch into the digital world. "El Segundo is very fortunate to have talented residents who are willing to lend their skill sets in technology system and application architecture. While the intent is to give strategic guidance to the City on the development and enhancement of new technology, the committee is also working to ensure that the adoption of any new technology is compatible across key systems and that those systems are secure from hacking threats."

Since its formation, the committee has been in discovery mode to learn about technology operations citywide. Department heads have rotated through the committee to present overviews of the challenges they face as they look for recommendations going forward. The City also expects to bring on an IT Director sometime this spring who will head a new department. The committee will work closely with the new hire to advise that person in developing sustainable technology solutions. Shortterm goals are to help identify constituents' needs and technology requirements, and to prioritize and help vet potential technology investments. The long-term objective is to

to understand why a repair is costing you so much," she said, likening the experience to a visit to the doctor. Trained mechanics and doctors both have specialized training and are skilled at diagnosing a problem. It talk about various maintenance things under the hood," she said. "Checking your fluid levels, checking your oil, checking your tires, using a tire gauge to check the PSI [pounds per square inch] and how to add air to your tire."

helps to know what they're talking about--and specifically with a car repair, what a broken part does and why it needs to be replaced.

"Ladies Car Care 101" doesn't expect them to know about cars, though some can identify the radiator, which holds the engine coolant. The air cleaner and the carburetor at the top of the engine aren't always a mystery to the ladies. The museum keeps a Cadillac Deville in the garage, which comes in handy for Cline's class. The women surround the old Cadillac as she opens the hood. Then, they do a pretty typical guy thing. They look at the engine, trying to figure it out.

For the next two hours, "Grease Girl" explains the engine parts, the transmission, the brakes and tires. Class time is a slow trip through the working systems of the internal combustion engine. Along the way, students pick up the terminology of the repair shop mechanic: timing belt, master cylinder, engine coolant, wheel alignment. They also hear about car maintenance from Cline and why it's better to pay a little now rather than a lot later. "We'll

Regular oil changes and keeping tires properly inflated are the simplest ways to give their vehicle tender loving care, the women are told. After all, it's a machine with fastmoving parts that create friction and heat. The coolant in the radiator system prevents the car from overheating, and the oil lubricates and protects engine parts. Warning lights alert drivers about low levels of these critical fluids, and Cline says don't ignore them. "A lot of people don't know what the different warning lights mean in their cars," she said. "Is it an emergency that needs pulling over and stopping or can they keep going to their destination?"

Ignoring a warning light that is an emergency light can be a very expensive driver error, so Cline covers the most common warning signs that women and men should heed. If the engine temperature light is showing, that's a serious one. So is the engine oil light, even if the car is new or just had an oil change. "This could be a tipoff that the drain plug isn't tight or it fell out, and the oil has all drained out," Cline said, adding that engine-damaging problems aren't limited to older cars. "Even if a car is brand new and a light comes on, it could be something serious."

There's a perception among men and women that cars are too complicated to understand, so they don't even attempt it. Cline thinks she understands why: Today's cars have gotten so efficient, they don't break down as often. Even the guys have stopped learning about their cars and trusted the maintenance to a garage or the dealer, but even choosing a qualified mechanic takes a little know-how about their training and car talk.

"Ladies Car Care 101" offers some garage time without the guys, though Cline says she may open a class later for men and women. Her plans include a more in-depth class about changing the oil and a tire too. The women who turn out to these classes at Automobile Driving Museum never tune up their cars or change the brakes themselves, yet a Saturday in the garage with the "Grease Girl" is where horsepower meets consumer power.

"I'm not calling for everyone to be a car enthusiast or expert--just have a basic knowledge about car systems, how they work, and about car maintenance," Cline said. "A little knowledge about your car can go a long way."

Having been the only woman at car shows and in the garage when she started rebuilding her Studebaker, Cline had to get over the feeling of being out of her element. Men feel more comfortable talking about cars and standing around a shop because they were raised that way. The garage can be a strange and intimidating place for a woman, especially a car repair shop. Her message to the class: Don't be afraid to ask good questions.

Cline's classes for the South Bay are small, drawing between 12 to 27 beginners, and not really hands-on. The women who gathered around the classic Cadillac at last month's clinic didn't get their hands dirty or take home dirt under their fingernails. That'll come later for the ones who, like "Grease Girl," decide to work on their cars as a hobby.

For the majority of the beginners, they were connecting the dots between the spark plugs and the ignition, the oil cap and moving pistons, and the gas pedal and the transmission. And, they discovered there's personal power in horsepower. Being an informed car owner, they can deal with a mechanic more confidently and be safer out on the road. •
