El Segundo Gears Up for New Trash Collection Services in May

Change is inevitable and that's especially so in a rapidly evolving world. That goes for El Segundo too, though the community has shown historical resistance to veering from what it had become accustomed to over the past decades. Among the local socalled sacred cows: We don't have parking meters in town. That policy continues to remain in place for the time being. Another one: There is no housing in El Segundo east of Sepulveda (now known as Pacific Coast Highway). That one is also still intact, but corporate demand has prompted a conversation on the matter in recent times. And then there's this: Residents here don't pay for trash collection. Well it appears we have one cow down because starting next month, this will no longer be the case. Owners of one- and two-unit properties will for the first time ever receive bills for solid waste and recycling collection. The amount: \$15 a month per single-family home and duplex unit billed quarterly (\$45 for three months). Three- and four-unit properties will not fall under the City service. Owners of those (as well as larger complexes) must arrange for their own collection. More on this later.

In addition to the charge, residents will also see a new hauler –EDCO -- take over collection duties beginning on May 1. Services will become automated to replace the previous unlimited manual curbside pick-ups. To usher in the change, EDCO will deliver free new bins to residences starting April 24. With that there will be a bit of an initial learning curve for people to tweak the way they put out their trash after 25 years with the outgoing company, Republic Services.

While the RFP process requested bids for both types of service, City staff felt automated

collection will be more efficient and cleaner while also setting El Segundo up to comply with both current and likely upcoming state regulatory changes. In fact, El Segundo is the only remaining city in Los Angeles County still using manual curbside collection – at least through the end of April. Only one other municipality out of the 88 still utilizes manual, but it's not curbside.

The new 95-gallon bins (each the size equivalent of three standard cans) will be color-coated to indicate what items may be placed within. **Grey carts** will hold non-recyclable household trash. The list of acceptable waste includes soiled disposables plates or cups; soiled food containers; soiled paper towels or napkins; broken glass, ceramics of mirrors;

diapers; pet waste; vacuum bags; rubber or garden hoses; and wire. Recyclables, green waste, hazardous waste, electronics or batteries, fluorescent lightbulbs, pharmaceuticals/ medical waste, and automobile parts may not be placed in grey carts. Residents may ask for one additional grey cart.

Blue carts will be used strictly for recyclable items. That means household glass and carton containers, shredded and mixed paper, paperboard boxes, newspaper, Styrofoam, cardboard, and beverage containers marked with "CA Redemption Value" or "CA Cash Refund. Also allowed: Any plastic containers, lids and packaging with a recycling symbol of #1-#7. Not okay: Plastic bags, newspaper

Police Hope License Plate Readers Will Help Capture Criminals

The topic of installing automated license plate readers at various intersections in town to help identify potential criminal vehicles spurred some recent attention in these pages, with a letter to the Herald from Councilmember Chris Pimentel expressing his concern that the technology will promote privacy invasion. A rebuttal followed the next week from a local citizen feeling the elected official may have over-exaggerated the implications. In any case, the devices are indeed coming and could be up and running as soon as mid-summer.

El Segundo Police Lieutenant Ray Garcia, who is the department point person and resident expert on the license plate

readers, said the devices are not actually new to the community. "We've had readers for years mounted on our cars and on our trailers," he said. "We were among the first cities in the South Bay to use them, just as we were with body-worn cameras."

The difference with the new readers is that they will be strategically installed at key intersections where they will be mounted on the traffic signal mast arms. From there, they will take photos of license plates on the vehicles driving by. "A lot of times when we have property crimes, we only have partial plates," Garcia said. "The pictures the readers take will get captured and matched with a list of **See License Plate Readers, page 11**

Rebates Now Doubled for Turf Replacement Program

As of April 1, the popular turf replacement rebate from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California has been doubled from \$1 to \$2 per square foot of lawn removed. As a member agency of Metropolitan, the West Basin Municipal Water District qualifies for this program and encourages residents and businesses within its service area to apply for the increased rebate at www.bewaterwise.com where up to \$50 million in applications will be accepted annually.

West Basin will also return this summer with its popular series of free classes for District residents and businesses to learn how to transform their landscapes into drought-tolerant gardens and take advantage of the updated Metropolitan rebate program. Visit www.westbasin.org for more information.

In addition to doubling the amount of the turf removal rebate, Metropolitan has made other changes to the turf replacement program, including:

- Increasing the eligible area from 1,500 to 5,000 square feet for residential landscapes; and from 10,000 to 50,000 square feet for commercial, institutional and industrial sites, allowing larger properties, such as schools and parks, to participate.
- Eliminating the requirement that program participants must first remove turf from their front yard.
- Decreasing the number of replacement plants required for areas where grass has been removed from five to three plants per 100 square feet.

The rebate program rules also require a landscape plan, a watershed approach, efficient irrigation and mulch coverage. Synthetic turf is not eligible for the program.

Asian Chicken Skillet

Recipe Provided by Campbell Soup Company

- Serve the chicken and broccoli mixture over the rice.

Brunt of New Tax Laws Hits Home at Refund Time

The mad rush to file income taxes by midnight April 15 has begun. Expect some added stress because there are fewer tax brackets, revised calculations, and fewer deductions to claim after Congress made sweeping changes in the nation's tax code.

The additions and subtractions in the tax overhaul bill 17 months ago were too many to count. The immediate effect on workers was their take-home pay was slightly higher last year. What they didn't know -- until now -- was whether they would still receive a tax refund under the new formulas for individuals and couples. And if so, would the IRS be giving back less.

Those residents who've already filed their federal returns have the answer. For the rest who haven't prepared their federal returns yet, they will soon find out if there's money coming to pay off outstanding debts, make some home repairs, or splurge on a vacation.

Based on IRS figures released before April 1, the consequences of the congressional changes to tax law aren't proving to be as draconian as predicted. Yes, refunds are safe. The average refund has dipped under the new tax code by \$20, the IRS said after calculating 92.9 million returns filed as of March 29. The average refund so far is \$2,873. There are several factors that could cause a tax refund to be larger or smaller than expected, especially in the current tax season when individuals are encountering new tax brackets with higher standard deductions. These offset the past deductions -- including a cap on mortgage interest and state and local taxes paid -- which members of Congress eliminated in late 2017. Standard deductions increased to \$12,000 for singles, \$18,000 for heads of households and \$24,000 for married couples filing a joint return.

Situations that could reduce the amount of this year's refund include: math errors or mistakes on the 1040 forms; back taxes owed to the federal or state government; and unpaid child support or student loans. If the IRS makes adjustment to a return or withholds some or all of a refund, the tax bureau will send a letter explaining where the money went. The Internal Revenue Service says it "understands that taxpayers are anxious to get details about their tax refunds," but to disregard misleading information circulating on social media.

There is no "secret way" for taxpayers to find out when their refund will be issued, though the IRS says it issues nine out of 10 tax refunds in less than 21 days. The "Where's My Refund?" tracker at the IRS website takes the guesswork out of the waiting process. People can use "Where's My Refund?" to check on the status of their tax return within 24 hours after the IRS receives an e-filed return or four weeks after a mailed paper return.

The "Where's My Refund?" tool is updated daily and usually overnight. Only call the IRS tax help hotline if a check on an individual or couple's refund indicates the taxpayer should contact the IRS. If the system doesn't show a return filed 21 days after it was electronically filed or six weeks after tax forms were mailed, a call to the IRS is warranted.

South Bay residents without Internet access can call an automated refund hotline at 800-829-1954. There is a myth that ordering a tax transcript is a "secret way" to get a refund date confirmed. The IRS says doing this will not help taxpayers find out when they will get their tax refund. While taxpayers can use a transcript to validate past income

City Announces Deep Concerns Over Proposed LAX Expansion

The City of El Segundo has expressed deep concern over the proposed massive expansion of LAX announced by the City of Los Angeles' Los Angeles World Airports last week. The expansion, which will add two new terminals or concourses containing 29 gates for passenger loading, will add noise, traffic and pollution affecting El Segundo residents, who already deal with impacts from one of the busiest airports in the world. In addition, the expansion will exacerbate a growing problem of travelers and LAX workers parking on El Segundo streets.

"Over the years we have worked cooperatively with the City of Los Angeles on improving the customer experience at LAX. However these new projects are just too much for our residents," said El Segundo Mayor Drew Boyles. "We are calling on LAX to scale back or eliminate these new gates, especially the brand new United Terminal 9, which will add another terminal to the airfield closest to our city.'

Summary of the Proposed Expansion

The Notice of Preparation (NOP) released by LAX last week details how the airport wants to add a new "Terminal 9" on the south side of the airport (closest to El Segundo) that would be used by United Airlines; and a new "Concourse 0" (which would be attached to the current Southwest Airlines Terminal 1). It also proposes to relocate American Eagle to a proposed expansion of the Midfield Satellite Concourse near the Tom Bradley International Terminal.

Up to 29 so-called "contact gates" are proposed at the new "Terminal 9" and "Concourse 0" facilities to enable and accommodate massive growth at LAX. The NOP also calls for major roadway demolition and reconstruction. Along with ongoing construction from other LAX projects, this would subject residents of El Segundo and nearby communities to nearly a decade of intense construction activity. The NOP also includes a variety of safety improvements on the north airfield (away from El Segundo), including reconfiguring taxiways. Significantly to El Segundo, it does not provide for the lengthening of any North Airfield runways or further separate the current runways on the north side.

Need for a Balanced Airport

"El Segundo has always stood for a balanced airfield, but this project proposal makes an unbalanced airport even more unfairly weighted toward El Segundo," said El Segundo City Manager Greg Carpenter. "El Segundo already has to bear the burden of loud, noisy nighttime cargo flights -- but instead of attempting to balance operations between the north and south, the lion's share of impacts will fall to our residents

Parking Problems Generated by LAX Growth

In addition, as LAX has grown in recent years, El Segundo neighborhoods have experienced a surge in airport users (either travelers or workers) parking on residential streets to access the airport. "People parking in El Segundo to access work or travel at LAX is having negative impacts on our quality of life," said El Segundo Mayor Pro Tem Carol Pirsztuk. "Instead of alleviating the problem, the projects outlined in the Notice of Preparation will only make things worse."

LAX and Local Quality of Life

El Segundo has a long history of working with its neighbors to protect the quality of life around LAX. In 2017, it approved a settlement with LAX that cleared the way for the construction of the Landside Access Modernization Program (LAMP), which includes a new people mover, parking structures and a consolidated rental car facility -- all of which will make getting in and out of LAX easier. However, this current project will trade seldom-used remote gates on the western edge of the airport for active gates in or around the central terminal area, leading to major increases in traffic congestion, air pollution and noise. Further, by proposing that the new Terminal 9 have access from Sepulveda Boulevard, it would negate some of the benefits of the LAMP project in that it would shift traffic back to the already overcrowded Sepulveda Tunnel.

"We look forward to continuing our discussions with the City of Los Angeles over how best to address this massive LAX expansion," noted Mayor Boyles. "But for now, we don't see any benefit to our residents, who already deal with some of the worst airport ramifications in the nation, and we as City leadership will use any strategy necessary to protect our residents."





Catching Up on Former Eagles Still Playing/Coaching

With baseball in full swing, it's time to catch up on some former Eagles still playing or coaching. El Segundo High School's baseball program and former Eagles playing professionally date back 86 years. You read that right: 86 years.

Baseball in El Segundo has been a staple in our lives for decades. For the past 86 consecutive years, our community has been able to root for one of its own at the professional baseball level. Most people believe the streak started when Bob Flynn, in 1960, signed with the Kansas City Athletics. The streak actually started in 1933 when George Myatt was signed to a Dixie League contract. Myatt went on to play in the Major Leagues and then went into the coaching ranks. He retired from coaching after the 1972 season. Over nine decades, 57 former El Segundo High School baseball players have signed to play professionally. There might not be another community of 17,000 people in the United States that can boast such a streak.

Lars Nootbaar continues the streak as a player when he was drafted by the St. Louis Cardinals last June. This season he is playing in the Midwest League for the Peoria Chiefs -- the Cardinals' Class A affiliate. In the opener, Nootbaar had a two-run double and the next day hit a solo homerun. You can track his progress throughout the season by visiting the team's website at peroiachiefs.com.

On the coaching end Scott McGregor, Class of 1972, and two-time CIF Player of the Year, is in his eighth year as the Baltimore Orioles Pitching Rehabilitation Coordinator based out of Sarasota, Florida. McGregor, who pitched for the Orioles for 12 seasons, is a member of the Baltimore Orioles Hall of Fame.

There are nine other former Eagles continuing their baseball playing careers at the collegiate level and two more coaching at the college ranks. It takes a special athlete to combine playing a sport and maintaining a good grade in the classroom.

Jake Palmer led the Eagles to three consecutive CIF appearances. He was a high school All-American selection when he hit a school-record .548 as a senior. He also holds the school records for games played and most consecutive (129) games played before being recruited by UC Irvine. As a starting sophomore outfielder for the Anteaters, he is currently hitting .288 and leads the team in runs scored and walks.

Sean Emery was a two-year starter for the Eagles. In his senior year, he was selected to the All-Ocean League first team and played in the South Bay All-Star game before heading

to Claremont-Mudd. In his freshman season, he was selected to the SCIAC All-Academic Team. For the Stags this season, Emery is hitting .270 as one of the team's outfielders.

Wyatt Boyce was a hard-throwing righthander for the Eagles before graduating in 2016. After a year at Cal State Dominguez Hills, he went to West L.A. College where he made 13 starts for the Wildcats in 2018 and earned Second Team All-West State Conference-South honors. This season, Boyce is coming out of the bullpen for Chico State.

Spencer Palmer was one of the Eagles' top

hitters and helped lead the team to 27 wins in his senior year. Now he is one of El Camino College's top hitters on a team ranked in the top five in California. The Warriors are 25-5 overall and a half game back in the standings behind Long Beach CC. As a freshman, he led the team in hitting, doubles and walks and is second in home runs. This season, he once again leads the team hitting with a .370 batting average as well as in RBIs (28) and walks (23).

Spencer Long was a four-year starter for the Eagles before taking over at shortstop for El Camino. He helped lead the team on offense with a .265 batting average in 46 games, but was also a starting pitcher averaging nearly a strikeout per inning. This season, Long has found his calling as the team's closer besides playing solid defense at shortstop. He leads the team with seven saves in eight appearances and a minuscule 0.60 ERA.

Jaime Galicia was one of the most dominant pitchers in the South Bay when he led the Eagles to the program's 36th league title in 2018. Now the freshman at El Camino is the leading pitcher for the Warriors with a 7-1 record and a 1.41 ERA.


Brendan Casillas was a four-year starter for the Eagles and helped his team to three Ocean League championships. He is one of El Camino's catchers this season.

Garrett Boyce was primarily used in relief and had a 1.19 ERA for the Eagles as a senior. Boyce is now a starter for West L.A. College and is one of his team's top pitchers.

Mario Morales was a second baseman for the Eagles and played in 24 games his senior year. When he moved on to West L.A. College, he became a utility player and has contributed in the infield and outfield as well as at catcher. His live arm has also given him time on the mound in relief.

Two other former players are coaching at the JC level. Grant Palmer is regarded as one of El Segundo's top hitting shortstops ever. He was a four-year starter who graduated with plenty of awards on both the baseball diamond and on the football field. He originally started his baseball college playing days at El Camino, but before too long he accepted a scholarship to attend UC Irvine. Palmer played in the College World Series for the Anteaters. When he graduated, he accepted an assistant coaching position with El Camino two seasons ago where he coached the infielders and is a hitting instructor.

Derrek Duarte was a three-year starter for the Eagles, having graduated in 2004. Duarte played first and second base as well as catcher and was also 3-1 as a pitcher. He

was considered one of the top hitters on the team with a .340 batting average. He was an All-Pioneer League First Team member and played in the South Bay All-Star game. Duarte went to El Camino after high school and played under Coach Nate Fernley where he was awarded All-WCC Honors. He helped lead the Warriors to a conference championship in 2007. He played two years at Cal State Dominguez Hills and batted .327 as a senior. Duarte is in his first season assisting at El Camino, working with the catchers, pitchers and hitters. •




Check It Out

Watcher in the Woods by Kelley Armstrong

Watcher in the Woods is the fourth Casey Duncan novel and is set deep in the Yukon Territory in Canada. Casey is the only detective for the city of Rockton, population 200. The police team has three members: Sheriff Eric Dalton, Casey and Will Anders. Rockton is both technologically and structurally cam-

ouflaged, so you would not be able to see it flying over the town or even know that anyone lived there. Rockton is fascinating because it is like living off of the grid. It has outhouses, no cell service and no electricity. The residents use wood stoves, fireplaces and lanterns for light, and use a generator sparingly.

All of the residents pay for the privilege of living in Rockton because they want to escape their pasts. Some are white collar criminals, some are escaping to a better life, and others are hiding from bad situations. The majority of the townspeople are only in Rockton for about two years. They do their assigned jobs and then move on. Some want to stay longer, like Kenny, who was shot but doesn't want to leave because he is afraid he can't return to Rockton.

The book starts by having Casey and Eric fly down south to Vancouver to convince her sister April, who is both a neuroscientist and a neurosurgeon, to help save Kenny because Rockton no longer has a doctor. When they return to Rockton, they discover that a U.S. marshal found Rockton and wants to bring back one of the residents. The marshal wouldn't say which resident and gets shot before he can find his fugitive. After the marshal dies, it is up to Casey to figure out who killed him and how the marshal located Rockton.

I have a friend who says a mystery isn't a mystery unless a murder occurs within the first 50 pages of the book. This book definitely fits that description! There are numerous suspects: April, who was smuggled in to town to fill in as the doctor, as well as the majority of the residents of Rockton. The sheriff has a dossier on everyone who lives in Rockton, but the majority lied to get in -- so their stories aren't necessarily believable. It is up to Casey to find the killer and keep the rest of the residents safe. No one is who he seems to be in Rockton, and Casey and Eric have to determine who has motive and means to kill the marshal.

The book is really enjoyable because the author does a great job with setting and character development. It is definitely action -packed! The reader can picture what life is like in Rockton and Casey is a strong and intelligent detective. Sheriff Eric Dalton is the only resident who has lived in Rockton his entire life. It is interesting to see what technology and modern conveniences are through his perspective.



wanted people, missing persons, stolen and felony cars and so forth. If the database gets a hit, the info goes to the officers in the field in real time."

The speed of that technology is a primary reason for implementation. "I typically run about nine license plates manually on a given shift," Garcia said. "They can do thousands. The biggest benefit is crime investigation. If we know a crime happened between 2 and 3 a.m., we know they aren't coming in from the beach. It's usually entering from Main and Imperial. If we have a time frame, we have a lead. Sometimes people might say they saw a white car or a plate that had a '3' on it."

Working out the logistics of where to place the readers turned out to be a tricky process. The El Segundo City Council in February gave the go-ahead to install them at different locations around town. Garcia and Public Works staff went out with the vendor (Vigilant Solutions) to scope out spots. Easier said than done. "There are a lot of restrictions," Garcia explained. "The biggest is Caltrans on PCH since they control and service all the traffic signals and do not allow automated license plate reader technology on their equipment. So we can't put them there." Imperial Highway was also a no-go since the City of Los Angeles controls that artery. "We needed special permission to have them on Main and Imperial Avenue -- even though that is clearly in El Segundo -- because our lights are timed with the City of LA's signals. We got the okay, but we can't use their DWP power. Edison had to come up with architectural plans to provide power."

The plan is to install 34 new readers. Garcia noted that the process is still in the contract phase, though talks between the City Attorney and the vendor were close to wrapping up as of press time. Once the contract is finalized, certified and registered, the next phase is drafting a purchase order and posted it. After issuing the purchase order, it's still another 90 to 120 days until the readers go up. Hence the mid-summer projection if all goes smoothly from here on out. "The wheels of progress are slow," Garcia admitted.

Those wheels went at a snail's pace considering that plans to purchase this equipment go back a number of years and involved police captains who have since retired. "It [the purchase] fizzled out due to lack of funding and other obstacles," Garcia said. "Eventually, if fell into my lap and we finally were able to move forward with the Council's blessing."

Proposed locations for the readers include Main and Imperial both north and southbound going in and out of the city; El Segundo Boulevard and Illinois Street both east and westbound; Grand Avenue and Kansas Street east and westbound; El Segundo Boulevard and Continental Boulevard eastbound only; El Segundo Boulevard and Isis westbound only; and Rosecrans Avenue and Douglas Street westbound only. Crews will install one camera per lane at each fixed location (26 combined). "We will also outfit two police cars with four cameras each," Garcia said.

The decision to go eastbound only at El Segundo Boulevard and Continental was a strategic move, according to Garcia. "Since The

Point and Plaza El Segundo have become operational, there has been more crime in that area," he said. "People flee from that location and bolt north before heading eastbound on El Segundo Boulevard to get to the freeway. We know they are going in that direction. We also anticipate TopGolf coming online in the future. If any crimes occur, we want to catch anything that goes east." For Rosecrans and Douglas, El Segundo readers will be on the westbound side only since Manhattan Beach has them at the same intersection capturing eastbound traffic.

Asked to address concerns that the readers record the whereabouts of innocent citizens and create another layer of Big Brother watching us all, Garcia responded, "We are here to preserve anyone's privacy and not be invasive in any way, which is why this is progressing slowly - because we want to do this the right way." But he added, "Everyone in this geographic area has already had their license plate read. They are up in the airport, through the City of LA, Manhattan Beach. Anywhere you drove north or south or east, you drove through a license plate reader. Some people are overly concerned because they believe we are monitoring that part of their lives. However that data is kept confidential and we are the only ones who have access to it. I think it's more invasive having a cell phone or using a computer because those track exactly where you are and what you query. That's why you get specific ads on your devices. They develop a profile to get you to buy things."

Police Chief Bill Whalen said he understands the concerns some community members may have with the use of this additional technology. "This program is something we have been very thoughtful and deliberate with both on the implementation and with our policies governing the use of the system," he explained. "This system will only be used to apprehend criminals who come to El Segundo to victimize our community. Criminals have gotten increasingly sophisticated and it's critical we appropriately embrace technology to ensure we are doing everything possible to keep this community safe".

Garcia added that the surrounding cities all have operating plate readers at various intersections. El Segundo will be the last to join the party. "We will be part of a regional system," Garcia said. "By joining this group, we get to share information including their databases. We can query partial plates and times of day to possibly identify suspects for crimes within our city. Also we can alert about a car associated with crimes that is in our city."

According to reports, the system has been a success in Manhattan Beach as well as in other communities. "Anecdotally, they get database hits all the time," Garcia said of our westerly neighbors to the south. "They limit it to felony and stolen vehicles. You can hit on every little warrant if you want. This is a learning process for us to see where we want to get the hits. Our true intent is for this to help us solve crime and leverage technology to help us do our job better. Law enforcement is changing. We've had accidents with officers running plates manually. The readers are a lot more efficient and enhance the safety of our citizens." •

Refund Time

and tax filing status for mortgage, student and small business loan applications and to help with tax preparation, they should use "Where's My Refund?" to check the status of their refund.

Even though the IRS issues most refunds in less than 21 days, it's possible a refund may take longer, it says. When a return is incomplete or needs more review, it takes longer to process and the taxpayer may need to provide more information or fix any errors found by IRS auditors. "This means that in some cases, a taxpayer who filed later may receive their refund sooner than someone who filed earlier in the season," the bureau says. "Also, remember to consider the time it takes for financial institutions to post the refund to the taxpayer's account or to receive a check in the mail."

Another myth the IRS is trying to dispel is that the tax withholding on individual employees' and self-employed people's paychecks is correct since a refund was issued this year. It's not true that getting a refund means there's no need to adjust the withholding for the rest of 2019. The IRS encourages people to do what is calls a "paycheck checkup," especially if the current tax return contained surprises or "unexpected results." Either too little or too much withholding requires action for next year, as does additional tax withheld to avoid a costly tax bill. The IRS has a withholding calculator on its website that helps taxpayers to dial in the correct amount of federal tax to be withdrawn from each check.

Given all of the changes in tax brackets and deductions that tax filers are seeing firsthand this filing season, the IRS offers some simple advice for those procrastinators who haven't prepared their federal returns yet. File for an extension, but pay any amount they expect to owe the IRS to avoid penalties and interest.

The easiest way to file an extension is through the Free File link at IRS.gov. In a matter of minutes, anyone, regardless of income, can use this free service to electronically request an automatic tax-filing extension on Form 4868. Filing an extension avoids a late-filing penalty of up to 5 percent per month and any payments made by April 15 reduce the interest and late penalties that come with unpaid taxes to the feds.

California residents who file for a federal extension automatically receive more time to prepare and file their state returns, too. It doesn't grant an extension to pay their state taxes. Residents still need to pay any tax due to the Franchise Tax Board using a payment voucher. The form is at www.ftb.ca.gov/professionals/efile/forms.shtml for download. •

delivery bags or chip/snack bags. Residents may request up to two additional blue carts.

Green carts will be used to separate green waste material such as landscape and pruning waste, nonhazardous wood waste and organics all mixed together. Green waste includes grass clippings, flowers, brush, tree trimming, weeds, palm fronds, leaves, branches, wood scrap and chips, ice plant (in small quantities), ivy, floral decorations, Christmas trees (cut in half), untreated and non-lead-based painted wood, and food scraps. Residents may ask for two additional green carts.

Meanwhile those who want to dispose of their old trash cans can leave them out on their collection day (after already receiving the new carts) with a note asking EDCO to take them away. The old cans must be empty when left out.

In contrast to the prior five-day collection, EDCO will pick up Monday through Thursday. As a result, some residents' trash days may change. An online map provides a breakdown of collection days for each residential street. Go to https://www.edcodisposal.com/el-segundo/ for collection dates as well as other information. The City also has a FAQ page on the new service at https:// www.edcodisposal.com/assets/001/5601.pdf

Collections won't take place on New Year's Eve, Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas Day. For those holidays, services will be delayed by one day. Holidays falling on a Saturday won't delay collection for the remainder of the week. If they fall on a Sunday, there will be a delay.

On collection day by 7 a.m. the latest, residents will be asked to set their new carts out at street level with the wheels against the curb and if possible out of the way of traffic. Those whose bins were collected from an alley can keep them there in the future, with the instruction to place the carts at least two feet away from walls or fences as well as two feet from each other. Carts should also be at least three feet from any parked cars, mailboxes, trees or telephone poles. Arrows on the lids of carts should point toward the street or alley. Also strongly recommended: Don't overfill any of the carts to the point they can't be closed properly.

With the automated system, EDCO workers will not leave their vehicles unless absolutely necessary Their trucks are outfitted with robotic flippers and arms specific to each color cart that pick up and dump the items at different intervals on collection day.

EDCO's contract also provides a way for residents to leave out bulky items that are too large to fit in a trash cart. Examples include water heaters, appliances, furniture and televisions - though not hazardous waste or construction material. To arrange this, customers can schedule pick-ups with EDCO up to four times a year and with up to six items per pick-up. Other contract base services include holiday tree collection, abandoned item collection in public right-of way, up to 15 City-sponsored events annually, outreach and education, two annual cleanup weeks for bulky items, and two annual document shredding events.

In initially looking to charge residents for solid waste collection, the City pointed to markedly escalating costs for the new trash contract exceeding \$1 million annually as the services have become increasingly more complex over the years. A state-mandated Proposition 218 process required protest ballots be mailed out to the residential property owners giving them a chance to nix the proposed fee. Those mailers went out last fall. However, less than half of the total ballots that the City sent out came back with a "no" to decline the fee. This gave the El Segundo City Council the ability to impose a charge of up to \$20 a month for trash collection. After some discussion, the group (Councilmember Don Brann dissented and Mayor Drew Boyles recused himself from the vote due to a business conflict) eventually settled on \$15 a month. The City will cover the remaining cost (an additional \$6.26 per month per unit). The Council has the option of changing the fee at any given time and can still go as high as \$20 (with only consumer price index increases allowed over and above that amount). It can also in the future decide to lower the fee or even waive it altogether.

As for three- and four-unit complexes that are now considered commercial properties,

those owners can choose to contract with EDCO or another City-licensed hauler. At the Council's request, EDCO will offer the same rates for the same level of automated services to these properties (per unit) as will be provided to the single-family homes and

As part of the rollout, EDCO sent out mailers to residents and held several community meetings in coordination with City Public Works staff over the past month. The outreach campaign will continue as the service officially kicks off next month. •


