# **Environmental Committee Looking** for Green Light with Work Plan

With Earth Day just a little over a week away, the City of El Segundo will soon unveil its first environmental work plan. The goal is to create a comprehensive list of suggested practices that staff can analyze and then implement positive changes in the areas of urban planning and development, transportation, air quality, water and energy conservation, hazardous and solid waste, and governance. Much of the groundwork for the plan is the result of extensive research and discussion among members of the City's Environmental Committee. According to its bylaws, the Environmental Committee should be "comprised of seven members--three members from the business community, three members from the residential community, and one member from the El Segundo School District to serve four-year terms." The current group has six members with a vacancy in the local business representative seat that the City Council hopes to fill in the near future. The group's focus is to balance environmental, social and economic concerns with each recommendation it makes. While the City has fostered various green programs over the years, the Environmental Committee was dormant for a lengthy stretch until a relaunch in the summer of 2014. "The relaunch was a suggestion by the South Bay Cities Council of Governments as part of an initiative to build a Climate Action Plan for the 16 cities and portions of unincorporated

Los Angeles County in its governance," explained Environmental Committee Chair Tracey Miller-Zarneke, an El Segundo business owner and resident who noted that she found her passion for the environment through her work with the Main Street-based non-profit Grades of Green and membership in Heal the Bay. "A previous version of the committee had existed from 2008-2012, but that committee was suspended as a result of cuts in the Public Works Department that left no staff available to coordinate the group. Even earlier in the city's history, a Trash Committee had been formed--and this committee can be credited with bringing the City Yard recycling and green waste options to our community in the early 1990s."

## **School Board Recognizes High-Achieving Richmond Street Students**

Tuesday evening's meeting of the El Segundo School Board featured special presentations highlighting the exploits of two Richmond Street Elementary (RSS) students; a state of the school address from Guadalupe Grijalva, the director of the Eagles' Nest Preschool; and a lengthy presentation regarding the implementation of District Instructional Technology.

Fifth grader James Baldino was feted by the Board members for his burgeoning mathematics skills. Baldino was part of a six-member team of fourth and fifth graders who, under the tutelage of fourth grade teacher Valerie Voboril, participated in a recent Excellence in Mathematics competition in Culver City. Approximately 150 "mathletes" from 30 schools competed, and Baldino captured a bronze medal for displaying his prowess in the individual portion of the competition.

Jackson Lund, also a fourth grader attending RSS, recently competed in the Los Angeles county Scripps Regional Spelling Bee, placing in the top 15 percent of the assembled 110 top spellers. Lund had won the RSS campus spelling Bee on February 10 to qualify for the Scripps competition. # Lakers Lottery Outlook a Bit Sketchy

It appears that the Los Angeles Lakers have suddenly found their groove precisely at the wrong time. A team that has struggled through most of the season and has found themselves near the bottom of the Western Conference standings yet again began to win when losing may just mean the most. A three-game winning streak, which included victories against playoff teams like the Memphis Grizzlies and San Antonio Spurs, has certainly given Lakers fans much to be optimistic about at the end of the season. With all eyes on this year's NBA draft lottery, though, winning just might be the last thing that the Lakers wanted to start doing.

For some teams, there is a race to the top of the standings so that the Golden State Warriors, Cleveland Cavaliers and other elite franchises can get prime positioning and home court advantage for the playoffs. For other teams, like the Lakers and the Phoenix Suns, there is a race toward the bottom of the standings as each team tries to be worse than the other to improve their odds of acquiring a high-end prospect that is coming out of college in the NBA Draft Lottery. The Lakers don't care much about trying to be worse than other teams. The Lakers, as one of sport's most storied franchises, are built upon winning and hoisting trophies into the air. When your season has gone in the tank and there are prospects like Markelle Fultz and Lonzo Ball on the market, though, the worse you are as a team, the better it is for your team.

The Lakers' odds of holding on to a top three pick sat at 48.5 percent as of Monday morning after the team won its fourth straight game on Sunday night thanks to a three-pointer at the buzzer by second-year guard D'Angelo Russell. That means that on May 16 when the ping pong balls start dancing around, all eyes will be watching to see if the Lakers either hold onto the third pick in the draft, get lucky and move up higher on the draft board, or lose their draft pick altogether. If the Lakers' pick lands outside of the top three, then the team will be forced to hand the pick over to the Philadelphia 76ers because of a previous trade that had been made between the two teams.

By winning, the Lakers are decreasing their odds of keeping their draft pick in a draft year that is absolutely packed with potential stud players. That being said, how do you force a team to go out, compete and somehow lose on purpose? With a roster packed full of players searching to prove themselves to all of the other NBA teams around the league, it's pretty much impossible to lose on purpose unless the head coach somehow manipulates a way to make it happen. Players like David Nwaba are fighting for a chance to stay in the NBA after playing most of the year in the D-League. Players like Tyler Ennis are fighting to prove that they can contribute to victories at the NBA level. The competitive drive in professional athletes simply can't be underestimated and so the Lakers manufactured victories like the one they had last Wednesday against the Spurs with Ennis leading the team in both points (19) and assists (six).

There is a certain divide among fans when it comes to the process of tanking in the NBA. Some fans look into the future, want a great draft pick and begin almost rooting for their team to lose consistently. Other fans see a franchise like the Lakers and think that losing, and losing on purpose, is a disgrace. Losing on purpose is bad for the fans who spend the money to go to games. Losing also deters other high-impact free agents from choosing to sign with a particular team that simply has a losing culture around the franchise and in the locker room. The young Lakers, though, have chosen to build their team through the draft recently. For that reason, acquiring yet another piece to fit into their puzzle in a year that has otherwise already been lost should be of utmost importance.

The Lakers' regular season has now officially come to a close. Now Laker fans everywhere have something to look forward to once again. Instead of wondering when the team will fall apart and take yet another unfortunate loss, fans can now look forward to the NBA Draft Lottery and the opportunity of adding another key piece of talent to the team next year. With new management in place surrounding Jeanie Buss, there is sure to be a lot of change coming around Laker Land and almost certainly on the roster. Magic Johnson has a way of attracting big-name talent to come and play for his team. While that still remains to be seen, there is no doubting the fact that the Lakers will certainly be much better next year than they have been this year. May 16 is the next big day to keep track of if you're a Laker fan. The Lakers' chances of landing an enormously talented former college athlete are now only one lottery ball away from actually happening.



# **Check It Out** The Chilbury Ladies' Choir By Jennifer Ryan

It is 1940 during World War II in Kent, Great Britain, and most men have left the village of Chilbury to fight. This leaves the women to "keep calm and carry on" by implementing a women's choir, which

Told through letters, journal entries and newspaper articles, the story lets us experience the devastation of the Nazi bombings of the British countryside, unexpected--even forbidden--bittersweet love, and adventure and intrigue. We share in the worry the townsfolk have for those in the midst of battle. The choir bands together when their worldview grows dark. By using music, each woman finds ways of going forward, even when it seems the odds are against them in every way. They are able to give others a muchneeded respite from bad news and hard times by performing beautiful songs to "cheer up" their community. Throughout the villagers' trials and tribulations, each character grows and finds inner strength through the testing of their endurances.

The audiobook adds depth to characterizations from audio portrayals by actors Gabrielle Glaister, Imogen Wilde, Laura Kirman, Adjoa Andoh, Tom Clegg and Mike Grady. These are beyond the typical narration of a print book, especially the comic misadventures of amoral midwife Mrs. Paltry, the vibrancy of pre-teen Kitty Winthrop and the melancholy of young Jewish evacuee Sylvie. There is also the delightful addition of excerpts of actual performances of popular versions of classical music sung by women's choirs, including "Abide with Me and All Creatures," "Ave Maria," and "The Lord is my Shepherd."

## The Last Picture Show and Black Narcissus Wow at Turner Festival

movies that we here at Cinemacy watch and share with our readers, there are always old classics that have been skipped, or just need to be to re-watched and enjoyed all over again. One event that celebrates the films of the past is the Turner Classic Movie Film Festival, held annually at the Hollywood Chinese and Egyptian Theaters, and running from Thursday, April 6 through Sunday, April 9. This festival, in which this genre of movie lovers take in and discuss all things classic (sometimes walking about in full vintage dress to get into the fun), celebrated the theme "Make 'Em Laugh: Comedy in the Movies." Films shown included such classic comedies as Steve Martin's feature film debut The Jerk; the 50th Anniversary screening and restoration print of Dustin Hoffman's The Graduate; and Singin' in the Rain, which honored the late Debbie Reynolds. This year there was a somber note in remembering Robert Osbourne, TCM's famous host who series in which four film prints that were shot on nitrate film stock--whose high silver content in the film stock made color contrast alluring, but also highly flammable and prone to theater fires--were played in the Egyptian Theater, whose projection booth was painfully retrofitted in order to play the film stock. As Martin Scorsese noted in the introduction of the movie's amazing print quality, nitrate film was popularly used before the '40s until it was eventually phased out. The mystery of a family whose daughter is kidnapped and held ransom, played to enthused audiences. Peter Lorre's English-speaking film debut was a stylish mystery that had me excited to watch the remake (the 1956 remake of the same name, starring James Stewart and Doris Day).

### The Last Picture Show (1971)

Peter Bogdanovich introduced his most critically awarded film in The Last Picture Show before the Saturday afternoon screening. He was impressed that the packed house had shown up "that early" for the screening.







The presenters detailed the strides being made in the District as the coaches continue to educate teachers and staff on the benefits and possibilities of enhancing the student experience by fully embracing the new technologies available to teachers, students and parents. After the presentation, Board members added their input--noting the time it takes to incorporate new technologies into the classroom environment, and the added time that veteran teachers must invest to become fluent in the new digital technologies.

Janicek, in an email sent prior to the presentation, lauded the efforts of the technology coaches, and the supportive community and "amazing students." She noted that "to prepare our students for the challenges ahead, we also need to prepare our teachers. It is an exciting time, but challenging with all of the shifts in education--and peer coaching is a valuable research-proven technique to help teachers at all levels."

After the special presentations, the Board quickly approved the 10 consent agenda items, including an Eagles' Nest Wildlife Learning Center Assembly; a District Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) night; and the Master Schedule Training for District administrators, teachers and counselors on Power School Master Scheduling. The two days of training will commence on April 19.

The Eagles' Nest assemblies are set for April 19 and 20, and will give youngsters the opportunity to receive hands-on learning as they are guided by local biologists. The District GATE night will take place in the RSS cafeteria on May 11, with parents invited to attend a workshop led by Kristine Quinn, a guest lecturer from CSU Fullerton—and students selecting and participating in interactive workshops based on their specialized areas of interest, including coding, Lego building, and improvisational skills.

During the action item portion of the 135-minute meeting, the Board accepted financial gifts bestowed upon the District; approved the wording of a job description for Program Specialist---Special Education; approved a resolution laying off a classified employee at El Segundo High School and another resolution dealing with Ed!'s feebased Summer Academy.

Two information pending action (IPA) items confronted the Board, including the noting of the District's Comprehensive School Safety Plans for 2016-17, and a public request that could ultimately lead to a revision of the Use of School facility policy that would take place during the 2017-18 school year. However, the Board tabled a second IPA item dealing with the need for more field time for a local soccer club that is comprised of a multitude of District students.

Moore then highlighted the upcoming events on the District's calendar, including upcoming PTO and PTA meetings, and the always popular Run for Education that will take place on April 22, commencing on Main Street in front of the High School.

Board member reports followed, with comments including thanking the technology team for their detailed presentation and pumping up the Run for Education next Saturday. President Bill Watkins thanked the City for the synergy it has achieved with the Board in working to craft solutions in areas of common interest.

Moore then gave her Superintendent's report, thanking the Ed! Foundation for upping the annual pledge to \$1.5 million while pointing out that El Segundo Unified is "one of the least funded school districts in the state of California."

The next regularly scheduled El Segundo School Board meeting is on the calendar for Tuesday evening, April 25. •

in the country. A child's experience remains the number one focus as UCLA designs an environment with its young patients and families in mind.

Studies done of pediatric patients and their parents found that anxiety is the most common complaint when a child is hospitalized. Kids also lose their appetites, can't sleep and can't control their emotions. They're less cooperative with doctors and nurses when they're upset and frightened, researchers have discovered. The answer: Use "medical" play in the hospital to alleviate that stress.

Healthcare professionals also must take the parents' emotions into account. Children do better when their parents feel less anxious, according to published research. Child behavior and development specialists have expertise that pediatric caregivers need to tap.

With this gift, Mattel has contributed \$80 million to UCLA and the university-run healthcare system. The toymaker and the hospital say they want local kids to have access to doctors and nurses who understand pediatric care, and who work toward the best health outcomes possible for sick kids. They're intent on making a hospital experience less scary, too.

Mattel President Richard Dickson said his company's charitable gift is meant to "ensure that even more children and families will benefit from exceptional healthcare at UCLA Mattel Children's Hospital." Sick kids in Asia and Africa will benefit from advances in pediatric medicine at the Westwood medical center as UCLA plans to launch a doctor exchange.

Nurse Florence Nightingale, who is considered the founder of modern nursing, said it was the responsibility of doctors, nurses and healthcare providers to create and keep a therapeutic environment for child patients. UCLA has embraced the

philosophy by creating a specialized children's healthcare center near the Westwood campus. In-hospital and outpatient services are available there.

The Children's Hospital Association says that Mattel has delivered more than a halfmillion toys nationwide to pediatric patients at children's hospitals. "Mattel has generously helped create positive healing environments," said Many Wimpey Knight, the association's chief executive.

Play grants totaling \$377,000 have gone to children's hospitals in Long Beach, San Francisco, New Orleans, Baltimore, the Bronx, Dallas, Milwaukee and Hackensack. "By engaging in play whether outside on a playground or inside via technology, hospitalized children can just be kids," Knight said.

Mattel's commitment to UCLA will also touch children and their families in China, Indonesia, India and South Africa through physician exchanges and research partnerships.

Tami Dennis with the Children's Hospital noted that UCLA doctors will visit hospitals in those countries periodically to lecture and do clinical work. Visiting specialists will be provided clinical fellowships in Los Angeles, where they'll spend one to three months observing the practices and techniques of the UCLA Children's Hospital staff, according to the spokeswoman. "The visiting physicians will then be prepared to return to their home institutions to teach their colleagues what they have learned at UCLA Mattel Children's Hospital," she added.

UCLA Mattel Children's Hospital is located within the Ronald Reagan UCLA Medical Center in Westwood. The facility has a 90-bed inpatient unit, plus an outpatient Children's Health Center. The hospital serves more than 34,000 patients each year, according to the university. •



# Tree Musketeers Says Goodbye After 30 Years of Growing Youth Leaders and Trees

Three decades after Tree Musketeers was founded by eight-year-olds to empower young people to be environmental leaders, it is shutting its doors as of April 30, 2017. The El Segundo-based nonprofit organization emerged as the world's first youth-led environmental organization and remains a place where "kids are boss." Young people have worked to plant over two million trees in California and around the planet and hosted multiple national events and campaigns to bring like-minded kids together. In the process of making communities healthier, Tree Musketeers provided leadership education and opportunities to thousands of young people, some from severely disadvantaged backgrounds, who grew up to become leaders in schools, business, politics and the arts.

Tree Musketeers' Board of Directors made the difficult decision to wind down operations after hosting its 30th Annual Arbor Day Celebration, a successful event where hundreds of volunteers came together to plant and care for trees. Tremendous enthusiasm remains for the organization's mission among volunteers, young and old, who serve as Youth Management Team, Adult Partner Team, Advisory Directors and Arbor Day task force members in addition to those who are just happy to tend trees. A number of factors led the Board to conclude that ongoing operations were not feasible.

The decision to bring the Tree Musketeers story to an end follows several years of financial hardship, which Executive Director Gail Church attributes to the changing economic climate and public spending priorities. "We saw a precipitous drop in individual and corporate giving during the 'Great Recession,' which has never fully rebounded. Federal and state grants to nonprofit urban forestry programs had already dropped off in the early 2000s, so the shrinking individual and corporate gifts beginning in 2008-09 were particularly devastating to us."

"It is sad to say goodbye," says Co-Founder

a sycamore they named Marcie the Marvelous Tree, which they hoped would inspire other kids to plant trees and help the environment. Tara Church remembers that day well, almost 30 years later: "We wanted to

Tree Musketeers was founded on May 9, 1987 when 13 Brownie Girl Scouts planted

do something small to help the Earth, which was suffering from massive deforestation, holes in the ozone layer, suffocating pollution in the air and oceans, animal extinction, and so many other things that were terrifying to our young minds," she said. "We decided to plant a tree, which was easy and fun, because more trees in our communities can help all of those environmental concerns." They soon realized that one tree was not enough, and began dreaming of a plan to plant trees throughout their community and inspire other kids to join their cause in hometowns worldwide. Tara'a mom, Gail, and other parents and friends were there from the beginning to help Tree Musketeers' young founders bring their dream of a youth-led environmental movement to reality.

Hometown successes range from surrounding the residential area of El Segundo with a green pollution barrier of trees to inspiring industries to replace the ozone-depleting CFCs, and bringing recycling to El Segundo. These accomplishments have merited recognition from three U.S. Presidents and numerous other prestigious awards, and they are why Tree Musketeers is profiled by leadership and business writers, and why the organization was one of 25 highly effective organizations highlighted in the Brookings Institution publication, *Sustaining Nonprofit Performance*.

Fernando Aguilar, the organization's 16-year-old president, shares his thoughts. "It has been an honor to serve as a Tree Supervisor, Youth Manager, and the President of Tree Musketeers," he said. "This organization has taught me more than just leading a bunch of people. It has taught me humility, strength, patience and organization. After working with all these people and wonderful youth, I can say in full confidence that I am hopeful for the future. Corrie Zupo, who has managed air emission compliance for refineries, power plants and airlines for over a decade; resident and local business employee Caroline Hawks, who said that she channels her love for her hometown and passion for the planet as established by her Conservation and Resource Studies degree; resident Rachel McPherson, a marine biologist specializing in stormwater regulations who indicated her desire to share her knowledge to benefit the community; local businessman and resident Kevin Maggay, who has managed environmental compliance for refineries, power plants and airlines for over a decade; and resident Chris Lubs, whose extensive work at El Segundo Unified School District with Grades of Green was instrumental in the District's decision to appoint her to this seat. The committee also maintains a partnership with El Segundo Public Works representative, management analyst Julie Hegvold, as well as intern Deena Strunk who lives in town and also studies at California Polytechnic State University en route to a degree in Environmental Science. "The Environmental Committee members bring a wide spectrum of expertise to our city," Mayor Suzanne Fuentes said. "Their institutional knowledge and recommendations will improve our quality of life for residents and businesses in El Segundo."

With a vision statement "to create and maintain a sustainable community," the committee's mission is "to improve social, economic and environmental well-being by fostering partnerships through education, guidance and outreach." Since returning to the fold, the committee has reached out to multiple City departments in hopes of inspiring "eco-centric thinking in all practices wherever applicable-from Public Works to Planning to Finance to Recreation and Parks," Miller-Zarneke explained. "Members have met with organizations such as the South Bay Cities Council Of Governments, Surfrider Foundation, West Basin Municipal Water District, and Tree Musketeers, just to name a few."

The committee also ramped up community outreach by updating the Elsegundo.org website green page, posting messages on online community boards and the recently launched City newsletter, running print ads, and participating in local events. The increased presence and face-to-face interaction with residents and businesses have helped, Miller-Zarneke noted. "Environmental awareness is

## **Film Review**

*Narcissus* (this film was buzzed about since Thursday's screening of *The Man Who Knew Too Much* as the most anticipated of the nitrate films) and it did not disappoint. Introduced by the Academy's Film Archivist, this movie was included for its beautifully preserved print, making it obvious why *Black Narcissus* won the Oscar for Best Cinematography. The Technicolor picture, about a group of sisters who open a nunnery in the Himalayans. growing in town and we also have a number of local businesses and schools taking the lead with different grass roots projects," she said. "As just a couple of examples, Chef Hannes on Main Street uses his restaurant compost to replant vegetables in the back of his building and even uses food shipping containers as the growing beds-which prevent those large items from going to the landfill. And the Richmond Bar and Grill has shifted into using no polystyrene for takeout containers and they've eliminated plastic straws." Meanwhile, Center Street Elementary School and El Segundo Middle School both compost lunch waste to use in the campus gardens and also launched Grades of Green chapters on site to teach kids about reusing and recycling.

El Segundo boasts an extensive track record on the environmental side. For instance, it is the only California city where more than half and as much as two-thirds of the water used in town is reclaimed (cleaned and recycled) thanks largely to responsible practices by large businesses here. The City also adopted water conservation ordinances; received a Flex Your Power award from Edison for recycling half its water; garnered a commendation from the Water Replenishment District for installing artificial turf at the Campus El Segundo Athletic Fields; retrofitted its facilities with energy-efficient fixtures and systems; purchased various hybrid, electric, natural gas and propane vehicles for its fleet; installed LED lights at traffic signals; held green building workshops; and hosted biannual community shred days. Fire Station 2 was the first public building in the South Bay to achieve LEED certification-and El Segundo is also home to a number of other green buildings.

While the above accomplishments speak to the breadth of El Segundo's green resume, Miller-Zarneke hopes the work plan will take these efforts to an even loftier level. "There are many more green practices that we can and should easily work into our community," she said. "The draft is currently nearing completion and the committee is anxious to usher the plan through the proper City channels as efficiently as possible," In the meantime, she "hopes all residents and businesses will use the upcoming Earth Week as an opportunity to make a change for the greener right now, because every moment we take care of our present is a better moment for our future." •
