Local Resident Gets Behind the Wheel to Help Cancer Patients

At 71 and happily retired since 2012, Kathryn Boyle remains busy and active. She continues to check off items from an extensive "bucket list" that is still far from complete. A few recent forays fulfilled: Seeing Billy Joel and Jeff Goldblum (he plays piano too) live in concert. Feasting on a table-made Caesar salad at the Tijuana hotel restaurant where it was originally invented in the 1920s. Comparing the LA region's finest pastrami sandwiches. Traveling through Spain and Portugal for her birthday, which by the way she did solo last summer. Despite various nagging aches and pains that come with the territory called life, she is one tough cookie and plans to enjoy each day to the best of her ability.

Kathryn now splits her time between her long-time residence in El Segundo and a second home she purchased in Palm Springs. Music, friends, family, fine wine and gourmet cuisine are staples of her lifestyle – but it isn't all about leisure for the feisty woman of Irish origin who grew up in Philly with a bunch of salty brothers and eventually raised two kids mostly on her own. For nearly a decade now, she has volunteered her services as a driver for cancer patients.

"While I was still working, my boyfriend was diagnosed with cancer and I'd go with him for treatments," Kathryn said. "There was a male patient we enjoyed chatting with who was in a wheelchair...and a van would bring him to and from the hospital. One time he received his radiation treatment late because the machine broke down. But the van could not wait for him because the driver had to pick up other patients. So I got to thinking there should be a more reliable

way to transport patients."

After some research, Kathryn learned of a program through the American Cancer Society in which volunteers deliver patients to and from appointments. Looking for a way to make a difference, she decided to give it a shot. She filled out the necessary applications, went through a background check and was on the road soon after. But while the logistics of picking up, dropping off, waiting and then picking up and dropping off again did not prove to be very taxing (Kathryn would go to lunch or shop while the patients underwent their treatments), the emotional aspect took a toll early on. "I made the mistake of becoming too close to one

of the women I was driving – we became friends and planned social activities," Kathryn said. "Then suddenly she died one day and I was really distraught. I had to take a break."

Kathryn didn't drive again for close to a year, but eventually pushed herself to give it another try. She started again, vowing this time to keep her emotional distance while still remaining friendly and cheerful. A few patient stories stood out. One man asked her to stop at a drug store on the way back from the hospital on a particular afternoon. "I'm only supposed to pick them up from the appointment and then take them straight home, but this guy insisted," she said. "So he goes into the drug store and

Council Weighs Police Recruiting Strategy; Gets Good Budget News

With the just-announced retirement of Captain Brian Evanski in a couple of weeks, the number of sworn personnel in the El Segundo Police Department (ESPD) will drop to 54 – eight below the budgeted 62. The fact that half of the remaining sworn officers will be eligible to retire in six years has Police Chief Bill Whalen worried about the future, which prompted him to ask the El Segundo City Council for help on Tuesday night.

Citing a region-wide recruitment problem with all the other agencies vying for candidates from the same limited pool, Whalen proposed creative ways to attract officers to El Segundo. One key strategy: Make them an offer they can't refuse, or at least one that blows away the competition. As an example, the chief suggested a huge hiring bonus to lure a lateral police officer (someone who has already worked at another law enforcement agency and completed their probationary period). ESPD's current bonus for lateral applicants is \$3,000, with Torrance offering the highest in the area at \$6,500. Whalen briefly mentioned a \$25,000 hiring bonus figure for laterals, but staff will come back to the Council with a concrete number that will also include a reasonable service time commitment to ensure that the officer doesn't leave the department early. A lesser bonus

comes out with a giant jug of wine. He looks at me and says, 'Don't judge me...'" Then there was the woman so appreciative of Kathryn that she wanted to pay her for the service. "I said, 'I can't take your money. This is all volunteer work.' But she was determined to give me something, so it ended up being a jar of this amazing extra virgin olive oil. I was okay with that."

Kathryn's driving frequency depends on her schedule and whereabouts, so she picks up patients both in the South Bay and in the desert area depending on the week. She finds all of it rewarding and doesn't see it as work. It also hits home on many fronts. "In addition to my boyfriend [he has since passed away] who had cancer, I myself was diagnosed with breast cancer just over eight years ago," Kathryn said. "I am cancer-free now, but I will never take anything for granted." In fact, the simple act of driving a car became a major task in 2016 when Kathryn broke her wrist and found it difficult to maneuver for a few months. Showering and tying shoes were also ordeals and the overall experience was very humbling. Thankfully, she is all healed up and back on the road. In any case, it helps to be resilient no matter what the ailment. Back when she was going through her own cancer treatments, Kathryn got called into jury duty. "My doctor noted on the form that my prognosis was fatal," she said. "I got sent home that day, but not before the clerk stared at me blankly and said that in the future this won't be an excuse to get out of jury duty."

A few years ago, the American Cancer Society hosted a luncheon to recognize the drivers. Unbeknownst to Kathryn, she would have to go up to the podium and speak. Though unprepared with any sort of speech, she told the attendees about driving female patients who learned of her breast cancer, her determination to fight it and her eventual conquest. "They [the patients] saw this retired woman with a lot of energy and would tell me, 'You give me hope," Kathryn remembered saying that afternoon. "Before I realized it, I was up at that podium and



looked around and most of the room was crying too. That was when I truly realized that what I was doing - though seemingly so simple -- was something really important and meaningful."

Kathryn doesn't know how much longer she will continue driving cancer patients, but has no plans to stop anytime soon. "As long as I am seeing well and feeling good, I will keep going," she said. You won't find her behind the wheel in August, however. She has planned another trip to Spain, though this time with a friend or two in tow. "I like traveling alone because I can go at my own pace and schedule, but it's nice to have a companion sometimes," she said. Indeed, the many cancer patients who have taken a seat next to Kathryn Boyle feel the same way. •



Election Vote Count Update

After last Tuesday's municipal election, the City Clerk's office received roughly 700 additional vote by mail (allowed to be accepted three days after the election provided they were postmarked on or before April 10) and provisional ballots. This will affect the unofficial election result totals reported last week. The ballots will be canvassed, inspected and counted today (April 19) starting at 9 a.m. in the West Conference Room at City Hall. Final results will be audited tomorrow. The unofficial results for the City Council race showed candidates Scot Nicol and Chris

Pimentel in front for two available seats with 1,604 and 1,596 votes respectively. Lance Giroux trailed the two with 1,425 votes with Maria Barden in fourth with 387 votes. While the new count could potentially change the order of the top three vote-getters, the fate of Measure C (the three-quarter-cent sales tax increase that would be implemented only if LA County places its own sales tax hike on a future ballot) is set – as more than 84 percent of local voters approved it in the unofficial results.

The City of El Segundo invites local citizens to take part in a conversation to create solutions for homelessness in town. A Community Meeting will take place on April 25 from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. at El Segundo City Council Chambers (350 Main St.).

Throughout our region, homelessness has become a significant challenge. In Los Angeles County, there are nearly 60,000 homeless on any given night. El Segundo's homeless neighbors are a relatively small group, yet their access to services and housing is still an issue that deserves attention.

In November 2017, the Los Angeles County Homelessness Initiative established funding to support planning activities made by cities in the Los Angeles Continuum of Care. El Segundo received one of these grants and is currently collecting input from the residential and business community on the challenge of combating and preventing homelessness within our area. The City's Homeless Plan will serve as a guide for addressing this issue locally and regionally.

The City asks citizens to join in tackling this multifaceted issue. If you're not able to attend this meeting, email Sergeant Ryan Danowitz at rdanowitz@elsegundo.org to let him know what your experience is with homeless neighbors and how you think the City can better serve them.

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

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
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
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Film Review

Zhao's *The Rider* Is a Meditative and Moving Look at Americana

Tales of Americana rodeo cowboys – typically men – often portray a heavy helping of machismo in their identity. But in director Chloé Zhao's second feature film, *The Rider*, we see a softer and more observational story of blue collar workers who, with the use of non-actors playing fictionalized versions of themselves, reflect a larger societal observation of overcoming hardship in pursuit of a deeper passion for something as beautiful as it is dangerous and destructive.

In a simple story sense, *The Rider* celebrates salt-of-the earth people who face hardship and

At the center of the story is newcomer Brady Jandreau, who along with the cast, doesn't so much perform as he does live his everyday life and express his very real feelings. Zhao captures an authenticity to a part of this American character and life that loosely fictionalizes a narrative that cannot be faked with very masterful observation and understanding of these people and their lives. *The Rider* is one of the most unique and moving viewing experiences I've seen in quite some time. It's largely a meditative film, which means that it requires you to watch with patience. Like Darren Aronofsky's *The Wrestler*, starring Mickey Rourke as a

it does so with a real painter's eye. Brady Jandreau (who plays himself) is a man of the land – silently wise for a young man who has experienced a lot in his young life, including a debilitating post-rodeo accident that sidelines him. Brady is also a man of grit. We don't see the accident, but we do see him removing staples from his head before putting on his cowboy hat. The film follows Brady as he attempts to literally "get back on the horse," which is such a big part of his small-town life.

The Rider goes further in painting a larger image of the hardships that Brady faces. Zhao portrays Brady's life with a single father, whose drinking means the rent doesn't get paid and threatens the stability of him having to also raise a developmentally disabled younger sister. Here, Zhao shows that he has more in his life that he must tame. These storylines are even more powerful when you learn that Chloé Zhao uses nonactors to play these characters to stunning effect -- essentially versions of themselves, including his aforementioned father and sister as well as another rodeo cowboy who is a full paraplegic.

Wiseburn School Board Addresses Cyber Hack; Honors Bee Winners

Last Thursday evening's meeting of the Wiseburn Board included only one special presentation, acknowledging three students for their success in the Feb. 22 spelling bee.

The Board meeting encompassed the old and the new, feting spelling bee winners -- a practice that goes back in the field of education for decades. It also addressed a very recent plague – a cyber hack of Wiseburn Unified School District's information technology system.

The spelling bee stalwarts recognized included first place winner Andrew Carranza, a sixth grader at Dana Middle School; runner-up Sakura Walters, also a sixth grader attending Dana; and third-place finisher Christopher Smith, a fifth-grade student at Peter Burnett Elementary.

Deputy Superintendent Chris Jones, who ran the initial portions of the meeting because Superintendent Tom Johnstone was across the street at Los Angles Air Force Base receiving a commendation as an "Honorary Base Commander," introduced the students and asked each which word they found to be challenging in the 26-student competition. The spelling bee winners then posed for a photo with the assembled Board.

Board member reports followed, with Neal Goldman thanking all who worked to "negotiate the ransomware scenario." Nelson Martinez thanked the Wiseburn Education Foundation for its work at the recent Rock Around the Block extravaganza. Vice President/Clerk Roger Banuelos echoed Martinez' kudos for the volunteers involved in the success of the Rock Around the Block program and also congratulated Peter Burnett Elementary for being selected as a California Distinguished School. "That is just fantastic," Banuelos remarked. "I am incredibly proud of everybody there. It is a validation of what happens at Burnett." The Burnett School will be recognized at a gala that will be held at the Disneyland Hotel on May 3.

Board President JoAnne Kaneda also thanked all concerned with quelling the ransomware threat, and lauded the subsequent game plan implemented. She thought Wiseburn "made the right decision" to not pay the "ransom," noting it caused the District to investigate possible options in data storage and data safety that it may not have considered without the attempted cyber-attack. Kaneda also spoke about her wish to have a review of the parameters of the ransomware attack, what the District learned and what steps should be implemented. She added that the District could benefit from a "rolling three-year IT plan."

Kaneda also spoke about the District's plan to expand the Child Development Center (CDC), with a key component to lessen the waitlist that many families find that they are faced with as they seek childcare options. If the proposed school bond passes in June, money would be available to upgrade all District facilities and supplement and grow the CDC program.

David Wilson, chief business official, spoke about District financial liabilities as all California school districts struggle to meet their financial obligations (pre- and post-retirement) to people who work in the field of education. "When you are in the people business, it can be expensive," Wilson said.

During his comments, Jones mentioned the April 9 EdShift event, which took place at the new high school and allowed the District to showcase the facility. Prior to Thursday's meeting, Johnstone had categorized the Ed-Shift mission as an attempt to "bring together teams that want to change the conversation on education, and effect positive, District-wide transformations." The superintendent spoke of reconfigured learning spaces that enable 21st century advances that he described as "very progressive and risk-taking" at the higher K-12 levels. He posited that it is "fundamentally a different way of looking at learning," saying that one of the goals of EdShift is to "tap into what the kids already know and build on it."

About 100 people attended EdShift day, Jones said, and they were able to "see the schools in action." He was also highly involved in quelling the ransomware attack and spoke of that threat to the District before introducing District technology technician Ouan Tra.

Tra approached the presentation podium to share details about the cyberattack. Ransomware is an insidious software that hackers employ to paralyze a computer system until a sum of money is paid. Of the security breach, Tra said, "This is on me. We need to learn from this and move on." He noted that as a small district, Wiseburn did not think it could be a candidate for a cyber-hack. This event, Tra said, made him look at possible District IT "shortcomings," noting implementations that will "not allow this to happen again." He detailed steps that will be or have been taken to protect District data.

"Lesson learned," Quan concluded. "Even though we are a small [district], we are vulnerable. Instead of waiting for summer, there are things that need to be taken care of as soon as possible."

Among the action items tackled by the Board were the first of what is expected to be four approvals for Da Vinci schools charter petitions; the approval of agreements with Cal State Los Angeles and Cal State Long Beach to have the District provide opportunities for student teachers; and an agreement with UCLA Extension to train people to work with the CDC.

With work still ongoing at the Douglas Street location, the facilities portion of the action item agenda focused on "piggyback" construction items that have typically allowed the District to save and make money under the guidance of Facilities Planner Vince Madsen. The Board also addressed repurposing the old District administration facility located on Aviation Boulevard, and placing the outdoor bleachers for the pool deck at the Aquatics Center.

Fiscal action items agreed to included the approval of additional payments to the Law Firm of Atkinson, Andelson, Loya, Ruud & Romo. Goldman queried whether there was any possibility of looking into a retainer agreement with District law firms, saying he was hoping to "look at creative alternatives."

Johnstone then arrived and took his seat on the dais after his induction as an "Honorary Commander" across the street, commenting that the soiree was "a lot of fun."

The next regularly scheduled Wiseburn School Board meeting is penciled in for Thursday evening, April 26. •

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

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Fraud against small businesses is on the rise. Were you aware that employee theft at businesses in the U.S. totaled more than 50 Billion in 2017? Did you know the *average* cost of fraud that was reported in 2016 was \$150,000? Additionally, over 75% of all small businesses (less than 100 employees) experienced some form of Check fraud in 2016- this was an increase of 71% from 2015! Those are staggering numbers for most small businesses to consider. How would you and your business weather such an unexpected loss? However, fear not, focusing on just a few areas of your operation you can help your company reduce its exposure to fraud.

Here are four of the most common forms of Check/Funds Transfer Fraud against small business owners:

1. Payroll Fraud- 54% of all small businesses suffer from payroll fraud. What can you do? Owners should have a working knowledge of their payroll system and do occasional audits. Additionally, your business banker should proactively be making you aware of Banking Services such as Positive Pay and Positive Pay with Payee match. Such a service helps prevent checks from being issued fraudulently. It's an early detection system that prior to clearing a check; it alerts you that a check doesn't match the amount/payee listed on your electronic check register and alerts you to either pay or reject the highlighted check.

2. Online Banking- Online Banking is a common service that allows owners to constantly monitor their accounts and provide the luxury of convenience. However, proper assignment of authorities to staff who use Online Banking is critical. Does their access to the system match their roll at your company? Are there any dual controls in the system? Is the same person that initiates wires and electronic transfers the same person that approves them? Most employees' access to

Online Banking should be view only to limit that exposure. Only senior/ trusted positions within the company should have full access to the Online Banking program. Even then, spot checks by the owner are very important.

3. False Invoicing – This has been an increasingly popular fraud method. False invoicing occurs when an employee creates false suppliers or where they pay a legitimate supplier and diverts the funds to an alternative account where they control the funds. How do you fight this- Owners must have basic oversight for every vendor in their business. Additionally, vendor payments usually stay within a certain range- expense management and awareness to budget are keys to catching this type of fraud. Monitoring Invoices to make sure there are no past dues and paid invoices are within budget guidelines.

4. Internal Email Fraud- Emails requesting funds transfers that appear to be an email from an authorized employee within the business, when in fact it's from a fraudster. The fraudulent email-from the Owner, CFO or Office manager- authorizes and requests a wire or electronic transfer to be made. The email appears to be the business email of the authorized personnel, but will always

have some small difference in the email line- so small it is often overlooked. The transfer is sent out to a fraudulent recipient and the money is lost. How to avoid? All emails requesting transfers should be closely reviewed and then a telephone call should be made to the authorizer requesting the transfer of money. DO NOT just reply to the email. Consistent reminders to staff of this protocol and vigilance by all are critical.

In the end, we can never completely avoid fraud. However, working with your business banker to set up some of the fraud prevention services like- On line Banking, Positive Pay with Payee Match, ACH Fraud filter can greatly reduce your risk exposure. If your business banker isn't familiar with these services (and they should be)- contact me. Also- Inspect what you expect! Create dual controls for all disbursement activity and consistently monitor areas of your operation where fraud can occur.

amount will also be proposed for pre-service police officers (those who have graduated from academy, but not moved on to a field training program and probationary period).

In addition to targeting laterals, Whalen wants to increase the number of entry-level candidates by beefing up the department's cadet program from the six currently allotted slots up to 15. While the estimated cost for the add-ons is \$185,000, the chief pointed out that just three cadets helped generate \$288,000 in parking ticket revenue and that those individuals can also provide traffic control and event support for a lower cost than a regular officer being paid overtime money. Whalen also asked to provide a \$1,750 education benefit to cadets who stay two years and suggested a relocation reimbursement for officers who have to move in order to work in El Segundo. He added that talks are underway to potentially contract with Phelps (the City's advertising and marketing agency) to get the department's message out to a wider audience.

Whalen pointed out the difficulty of the hiring process in general and the need to be especially aggressive in the recruitment campaign. Even after receiving 1,100 applications, ESPD ultimately sent just six individuals to academy. Of those, three are still here. "I want us to be a destination location," Whalen said.

Also on Tuesday, the Council received some good news regarding the 2017/18 budget update. Due to about 30 unfilled staff vacancies, the City potentially will have nearly \$2.5 million in surplus monies not factored into original estimates. Finance Director Joseph Lillio presented staff's recommendation to use the bulk of the extra funds to pay down the City's unfunded pension liability, with \$1 million to fund a section 115 pension trust fund and a combined \$1.3 million towards unfunded police and fire pension plans. The latter two moves will save the City about \$2.1 million over the next 25 to 26 years, according to estimates. Councilmember Mike Dugan was the lone dissenter on the matter, feeling that the City would be better served using the funds for major projects that need to be addressed today. Mayor Pro Tem Drew Boyles begged to differ. "Why wouldn't we pay down the only debt we have outside of Douglas Street?" he asked. Lillio also reported that 2017/18 general fund revenues are tracking about \$2.7 million above budget, thanks in particular to a sizable uptick in transient occupancy tax from hotel openings, as well as increases in gas utility user tax and real property transfer tax.

Lillio additionally provided the quarterly update on key performance indicators (KPIs) that measure how the City is doing in various areas. Of 30 priority activities, 28 are on target or completed. Recent highlights include teleconferencing capability in City buildings; recruitment for new positions at the El Segundo Aquatics Center; increased subscribers for the City's enewsletter; RFP releases to update the City's website, conduct a facility needs assessment, and bid on the TopGolf site; and the Measure C ballot measure passed by local voters last week.

The already funded \$250,000 for Recreation and Parks Department capital improvement projects will go towards the Holly Valley Park playground replacement (\$170,000), Campus El Segundo shade structures (\$125,000, of which AYSO will cover \$75,000 and the City \$50,000) and Teen Center upgrades (remaining dollars). The Council agreed to the allocation after a presentation by Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit, who provided a rundown of the highest ranked future priority projects. Topping the list is renovation of The Plunge, followed by a revamp of the George E. Gordon Clubhouse. Other wish list items include the Joslyn Center restroom renovation, Acacia Park playground construction, Richmond Field renovation, Washington Park playground replacement, and toddler playground. The abovementioned Holly Park, Campus El Segundo and Teen Center projects came in sixth, fifth and seventh respectively on the ranking list. The Recreation and Parks Commission recommended going with those three projects now to allow the current fund allocation to be utilized in the most effective manner while benefiting a diverse set of community members.

The Council also got the latest update on proposed designs to repurpose and modernize the underutilized El Segundo Public Library reference shelf area into a reading and wi-fi lounge that will serve as a future meeting place. The 1,500-square foot area will contain added seating (52) with built-in charging stations embedded into new tables, as well as new carpeting and fixtures. The lounge will incorporate traditional-style classic furniture chosen for long-term durability along with lighter coastal colors. The project will entail removal of eight reference shelf units as well as the microfiche and study carrels.

Seeing it as a good use of available tourism marketing dollars, the Council agreed to infuse this summer's El Segundo Art Walk with much-needed cash to help promote the event, provide a central headquarter location, pay for live entertainment and staffing, and cover permit fees. The monies will not go towards artist acquisition, food, beverages and office expenses. George Renfro, a member of the Arts and Culture Advisory Committee who produced last year's event, pitched the Art Walk's economic benefits to the City as part of his request for \$33,300 (down from the original ask of \$45,000). He explained that the Art Walk was "at a crossroads" and was facing "stagnation and defeat" unless something could be worked out with the City. Renfro spoke of the event as an example of the "culture shift" in El Segundo and the ability to "bring people to town who don't normally come here." He also noted that the monthly event that takes place the third Thursday evening in June, July and August highlights businesses, which welcome the exposure. Renfro mentioned that two downtown restaurants reported their single highest gross receipts during last year's event, and that attendees came here from art-centric areas such as San Pedro and Santa Monica. "The Art Walk can help put us on the map,"

Renfro hoped to set up the headquarter area in the fire department parking lot, but ran into some Council opposition. As a compromise, Councilmember Don Brann suggested the Civic Plaza courtyard. Mayor Pro Tem Drew Boyles asked that as a contingency to allocating the funds, the City's Economic Development Advisory Council (EDAC) should develop success criteria for the event.

During presentations, the Council proclaimed May as Older Americans Month and Betty Jacobson as the 2018 El Segundo Older American of the Year in advance of the May 12 Elderfest Celebration at the Joslyn Center. A second proclamation noted National Arbor Day as April 27, with an invitation to citizens to join Tree Musketeers, the Next Generation to care for the trees in Memory Row on April 28 at 10 a.m.

Planning and Building Safety Director Sam Lee reported on the ongoing D.R. Horton residential development on Imperial Avenue in response to prior neighbor complaints. He noted that dust control is no longer an issue with grading completed, while earlier noise has also dissipated. Plans are underway to change truck routes to lessen road impacts. Meanwhile, a third party engineer has gotten involved to resolve problems with nearby homeowners reporting damage from construction activities.

Public Works Director Ken Berkman announced that his department has finally received the permit for the sign change from Sepulveda Boulevard to Pacific Coast Highway. Notices will be sent to businesses, with a marketing event the first week of June.

The El Segundo City Council will next convene in a special meeting set for Monday, April 30 at 3 p.m. The public hearing on changes to the City's fees and services charges, originally scheduled for this past Tuesday's meeting, will be moved to that Monday's agenda. •

Gougères are savory puffs flavored with cheese and served hot from the oven as a quick hors d'oeuvres.

Ingredients

Gougères batter:

- 1/2 cup water
- 2 tablespoons (1 ounce) unsalted butter
- 1/4 teaspoon plus 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 3 1/2 ounces bread flour
- 2 extra-large eggs

• 3 1/2 ounces Gruyere cheese, grated

Gougères toppings:

- 1 extra-large egg
- 1 egg yolk
- 1. 1/2 ounces Gruyere cheese, grated
- Fleur de sel



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Preparation

- 1. Insert paddle attachment in a stand mixer. In a heavy metal saucepot, combine the water, butter, cayenne and salt; bring to a boil over high heat. Remove the pot from the heat, add all the flour and stir with a wooden spoon until thoroughly combined to form a smooth paste. Return the pot to medium heat and cook, stirring, for 1 minute longer.
- 2. Put the paste in the bowl of the stand mixer. Mix at medium speed for 1 minute. Add eggs one at a time, beating at medium speed until each is fully incorporated and stopping to scrape down the side of the bowl. Add the 3 1/2 ounces of grated Gruyere and mix until incorporated.
- 3. Transfer the dough to a pastry bag fitted with a 1/2-inch round tip and pipe nickelsize mounds onto a non-stick baking sheet, or a baking sheet sprayed with nonstick spray, 2 inches apart.
- 4. In a small bowl beat together the egg and egg yolk forming an egg wash. Using a pastry brush, brush each of the Gougères with the egg wash. Sprinkle with grated Gruyere cheese and a pinch of fleur de sel.
- 5. Bake the gougeres on the center rack in the preheated oven until they are puffed and golden brown, about 18 minutes.
- 6. Serve immediately.
