City Council Asks Public for Input on New City Manager Selection

The El Segundo City Council will select a new city manager early next month with the retirement of Greg Carpenter in June. The group started the recruitment process early with the help of Councilmember Don Brann, enlisting the services of Bob Murray & Associates. The initial outreach resulted in 53 responses, each screened by the consultant. Ten recommendations came back to the Council, of which five were recently city managers. Others were in director positions. The Council ultimately narrowed down the applicant list to seven for more extensive interviews before the end of this month. Normally, a city manager selection happens behind closed doors with no community input sought as part of the process. That all changed this month when the Council held a special townhall meeting seeking feedback from citizens regarding the strengths and characteristics desired from a city manager, along with potential concerns. Brann described the upcoming hire as "the most important job the Council has and we want to get it right." He likened it to a school board choosing a new superintendent. Mayor Pro Tem Carol Pirsztuk told the audience, "Don't hold anything back because this is your town.

Pimentel unavailable to attend. The vast majority of public comments came from a small group of citizens, most of whom are well-known community business leaders.

The meeting focused on four key questions delivered by Mayor Drew Boyles. The first asked, "What should a city manager know about El Segundo and what is unique about us as a town? Answers included understanding the equal importance of both a Fortune 500 company and a coffee shop (Ron Swanson); realizing that most of the City budget comes from business (Lily Craig); identifying what's missing and expanding the business base given our very limited space (from a new resident only identified as Mark); helping guide El Segundo as it transitions with a large number of new residents (Mona Eisman); and understanding the unique economic drivers of the airport and LA Air Force Base as well as getting ahead of upcoming trends (David Herbst). Eisman added that "this city is just slow to do things" and must be "more proactive." Swanson echoed about the importance of understanding the role of LAX. Emphasizing that she doesn't feel the community has come first (or even second in the past), Eisman described the city manager role as a leadership position with residents deemed as important as businesses.

son to possess? Swanson preferred a CEO type with sales and marketing skills who has actually signed the front of a check. Eisman looked to someone open-minded to trying new ideas and not one who says, "They did it this way somewhere else." Herbst called for someone with a "get-it -done attitude." A resident who did not identify herself wanted a leader with "strong communication skills, a problem-solver, good listener, decision-maker, can execute, and thinks on their feet." Eisman imagined someone with experience who is also "the right person to grow with our city. Craig did not want to see someone come in who's "sitting in an office all day." She added, "The city manager should not play favorites [amongst the Council members). Eisman listed "transparency and ethics" as critical while Herbst warned, "Don't settle." Eisman pointed to the importance of a leader who is "very focused on how we define success for the good of the city and El Segundo." The third question: What is the preferred method of interacting that you want the city manager to have with the community and what are the most important topics to communicate? Ideas included being available at the farmer's market quarterly to talk to citizens (Swanson) and not eating lunch in the office (Eisman). Pirsztuk addressed the importance of getting the word out about Council meeting topics, with Boyles indicat-See City Council, page 6


Obituaries Pastor John Newton Svendsen

The WIC program feeds two-thirds of the babies in Los Angeles County, but the food boxes for low-income mothers of small children aren't just formula and groceries. Those packages are warding off obesity and health problems related to poor eating habits.

WIC revamped its food selection for mothers, expectant women and infants and children last decade. The program cut back on juice, whole milk and cheeses, and replaced them with more fruits, vegetables and whole grains. WIC also reduced the amount of fat and calories that infants were getting from formula in the family's package.

Those dietary changes led to a marked decrease in obesity rates in WIC's young clients, according to a new study released

this week. Because WIC serves more than 400,000 residents every month, cutting the adolescent obesity rate with simple dietary changes is a life-changer for local families and the Los Angeles County public-health system. Work by researchers at UCLA's School of Public Health. Tulane University and the county-based WIC agency has produced a blueprint for how to reverse the national epidemic of obesity.

The study compared the weights of children before and after the changes in the WIC program in 2009. Researchers included data from 180,000 WIC client-families since 2003.

WIC's healthy-food boxes after 2009 reduced the obesity risk by 10 percent or higher for boys and girls when they reached 4 years old, the study found. Catherine Crespi with See WIC, page 11

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

El Segundo School Board Looks at District Safety, Hails Employees

Tuesday evening's well-attended and only regularly scheduled meeting of the month for the El Segundo School Board featured a presentation made by Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore regarding the ramping-up of school site safety plans, as well as the recognition of top-flight educators and classified employees.

The final presentation of the evening was helmed by El Segundo Police Department (ESPD) Chief Bill Whalen, who updated the members on matters relating to the department and the bolstering of school site safety in El Segundo Unified School District. Whalen meets with Moore on a quarterly basis, and currently briefs the Board twice a year. "I feel honored to work with Chief Whalen," Moore said, and noted innovative programs that the ESPD and the District are implementing.

Whalen espoused his and the department's efforts to protect the students and District personnel. "I applaud [the Board] and Dr. Moore" in all the steps that have been recently enacted to ensure school site safety, encouraging all involved to "think outside the box." He also talked about the challenges law enforcement personnel face with the decriminalization of marijuana in California, and how it affects students.

Twenty years after the school site shooting at Columbine High School that resulted in the deaths of 12 students and one teacher and shocked the country, Moore reported said she thought it was a good time of the year to "take stock of everything we have done over the past year," calling it "a considerable amount." Last year at this time, Moore said the District was in the research mode to develop "next best steps" in school site safety after the Feb. 14, 2018 shootings at Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida.

She noted a couple of recommendations that evolved from the school site safety assessment were the expansion of the canine search to El Segundo Middle School, which will also help deal with vaping concerns on campus, and the prioritization of implementing a new batch of District-wide cameras. IT Executive Director Danny Gauna spoke to the Board about potential camera systems that the District is evaluating. Prior to the meeting, Moore had called the current camera system obsolete and "in some ways antiquated and not efficient."

Gauna spoke of and how an updated camera system would not only be centralized, but would be of great benefit to strengthening the District security apparatus.

Moore said that any implementations and recommendations regarding school site security were based on studious research, and not just knee-jerk reactions to school site violence.

Moore's presentation also touched on the RULER program, which offers increased social emotional support to students, as well as noting the upgrades to the school site visitor management system and the District implementation of a tip line to aid the security process. Moore also highlighted that the District had added two safety specialists: that the ESPD had provided a second resource officer, and that there was a concerted effort made by the District to engage with community partners. Moore also noted how the fencing around District school site perimeters will be or has been strengthened and that school office entryway areas will be buttressed.

Moore advocated the advent of the tip line program, where parents and students can alert the District to perceived possible safety issues. She also stressed the need of the "see something, say something" mantra to keep District personnel in the loop in case possible security issues arise.

Executive Director of Human Resources and Facilities Dr. Dylan Harris made the employee recognition presentation. Educators of the 2018/19 school-year included Megan See ESUSD, page 11



Sports Eagles Win Another Ocean Title

The El Segundo High School baseball and softball teams have all but wrapped up a share or an outright Ocean League title. The boys volleyball team is poised to win a share of the Ocean League, but needs to finish its schedule strong.

The baseball team's dominance of the Ocean League is nothing new. In the past six years, the Eagles have won or shared in five league championships. With some key players returning, the prospects of a 37th league title seemed likely and it would also be the third in a row. The Eagles swept an improving Lawndale team 3-1 and 4-0 and have won the last 29 of 30 meetings between these two teams.

The Eagle baseball program celebrated its 13 seniors on Senior Day by honoring Ethan Burner, Benny Casillas, Kyle McMullin, Ian Bonham, Dylan Marquez-Wasson, David Brady, Bailey Davis, Chance Nelson, Cam Dornblaser, Cooper Sutherland, Quin Kirsten, Matt Romero and Marcellus Henry before the game. The ceremony was a fitting tribute to these special players who have continued to make the Eagle baseball program a success.

El Segundo's supremacy over Lawndale continued with a convincing 3-1 win. Aiden McRoberts continued his magic on the mound by limiting the Cardinals to four hits and one walk while striking out a season-high 10 batters. He improved to 4-0 in league play with an ERA of 0.25.

El Segundo has had its challenges scoring this season, so it has leaned on good pitching and sound defense. It didn't change against Lawndale. With McRoberts doing his share and the defense playing magnificently, the offense did just enough to provide the sixth win in a row.

Kind Hearts and Coronets

I've loved books all my life, really. Books are friends. Books are collectibles. Books hold endless hours of joy, suspense, compassion ... they enrich your life with knowledge, empathy and imagination.

A House Among the Trees is packed with everything a book lover could want : children's literature, the book publishing world, museums, the worlds of film and art, scandal, personal tragedy, personal accomplishment, even thoughts about nature ... It's astonishing

how much detail is given to character, plot, place and time (1970s through present day).

Famous children's author Mort Lear dies unexpectedly from an accident at his home in Connecticut, leaving his personal assistant Tommy (Tomasina) to deal with what he leaves behind. That includes complex wishes in his will, previously unknown to her, that she must carry out, as well as decide what to do with the house he has left to her. Then there is the film that is being made about Mort's life: English movie star Nicholas Greene has been cast to portray Morty and he is coming to "soak up" the atmosphere. A museum curator is awaiting news of a possible bequest of items from the late author/ artist. And if that wasn't enough on Tommy's plate, she must plan a memorial tribute for her employer that will take place at the Met.

Did I mention Tommy's brother Dani, with whom she has had a falling out?

Going back and forth through time, the reader finds out how Tommy met the great man and how she soon became indispensable to him through the years. Tommy's beginnings are explored, including her relationship with her "hippie" parents. Her father writes and performs songs on the spot to describe whatever is going on in their lives. The story also reflects upon her younger brother Dani, and her teenage and college years.

Other characters get their say. Merry, the museum curator, was dazzled by Morty's charm and talent. She covets the original drawings from his children's books and hopes to add them to her museum's treasure troves. In her memories, she describes lunches with the author and the doodles he made on napkins and bits of paper that immortalized those times. The actor Nicholas Greene's life is explored and the reader discovers that Nick has been corresponding with Mort via email. A big secret is relayed that may impact the direction of the film of Morty's life.

In the audio version, Mary Stuart Masterson has found Morty's voice: New York-ese, gravelly and warm, it's a winning effort for a female to capture a man's voice to that degree. She also easily makes Nick's clipped British accent sound realistic. In my daily commutes to and from the library, books on CD make it a much more agreeable time on the freeways, especially one as addictive as this one.

Mark warned not to oversaturate people with topics they are not interested in, but rather target them with custom items. Craig agreed that oversaturation can lead people to shut down and added that in addition to online outreach, there are those who prefer to read newspapers.

Looking at how to get the city manager acclimated with the residents and how to meet people in the community. Swanson suggested "an old-fashioned meet and greet" at major City events. Brann agreed. "The basic rule is show up," he said. Craig said the introduction of the city manager can be similar in style to the event to meet the police chief. Swanson maintained the meet should occur within the first 90 days, while Eisman said just showing up was not sufficient. Signage and marketing around the event are paramount.

Craig asked if El Segundo residency was required for the hire. Though the answer is technically yes, Assistant Attorney David King said this is not actually enforceable per the State of California. Brann said he preferred someone who lives really close, but not actually in town so they have a life outside of El Segundo.

The fourth question: What are the most important challenges facing our city and what skills are needed to address them? Craig called for a "sustainable budget." Eisman spoke of "a real commitment" that considers what our community will look like in "three, five, 10 years." Boyles chimed in that new Sacramento legislation if passed can mandate that cities add housing along Metro paths and employment areas." While Mark saw the inevitability of housing east of PCH, he felt the City could "figure out a way to address the issue that is palatable for the community."

Earlier, Brann stressed the need for the Council to select the new city manager with a 5-0 vote to show all the members support this hire. Swanson concurred. "If the five of you don't vote 5-0, you're voting for the wrong person..." •

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
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

Single-Family and Duplex Properties Signing Up with EDCO

A friendly reminder that you are automatically signed up to receive the new collection services with EDCO. Property owners will receive the first quarterly bill in the mail in mid- to late May from EDCO. It is up to the owner whether they would like to pass the \$15/month/unit cost to the tenant. As with all cities in California, the City of El Segundo is required to comply with certain federal and state environmental program mandates. Compliance with the solid waste mandates was the main reason for the switch to automated trash collection, while the storm water pollution prevention program requires the City to operate and maintain effective street cleaning operations to ensure trash does not get into the storm drain system (and ultimately on our beaches, and in our harbors and the ocean).

While the benefit of the new four-day trash collection cycle is that there will be no trucks on City streets on Fridays, it did require some modification of the street sweeping days and times. UCLA's Field School of Public Health said the improved weights have a lasting effect.

"Because heavier children tend to become heavier adults, our study suggests that improving the diets of young children is an important strategy for addressing our national obesity epidemic," said Crespi, who co-authored the study of the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children. It's commonly called WIC.

In Los Angeles County, WIC currently serves approximately 67 percent of all infants and about half of all children ages 1 to 5, according to local figures. Approximately 600,000 residents and 400,000 families use the food assistance every month. WIC organizations -- which serve almost every low-income neighborhood in the county -- are devoted to improving nutrition and health among pregnant women and young children.

The UCLA-Tulane work demonstrated the impact that food selection for children under 5 have on obesity risk and what researchers call "growth trajectories" for children in the WIC program. These findings could apply to children in other parts of the country, said Crespi. The work is the most comprehensive study of the effect of the government-funded food program's changes on obesity risk in Los Angeles County, she said. Half of all children under 5 in the county are enrolled in WIC, the data showed. Researchers examined data from 2003 to 2016 for four groups of children: those receiving the newly formulated food package continuously from birth to age 4, those receiving only the original food package, those who joined WIC at age 2 and received the new food package until age 4, and those who joined at 2 and received the old package. UCLA did before-and-after comparisons of children's growth potential and weights based on which WIC packages their families received. The children who received a full dose of the new food package had healthier growth trajectories and lower risk for obesity at age 4 than those who received a full dose of the original version of the package. from page 3 Specifically, the risk was 12 percent lower

for boys and 10 percent lower for girls.

When the researchers examined growth trajectories between those two groups, they noticed the sharpest differences began to develop at 6 months of age. This suggested that a more nutritious diet led to healthier growth in toddlers after they turned 1.

"The beneficial effect of being exposed to the new food package, compared to the old one, was much stronger during the 6 months-to-1-year age interval," said Pia Chaparro, the study's lead author and an assistant professor of nutrition at the Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine. "This difference between the two groups during this age interval was large enough to set children in the new food package group on a healthier growth trajectory through age 4."

Analyzing statistics for children who joined WIC at age 2, researchers found an 11 percent lower obesity risk for boys receiving the new food package but no reduced risk for girls. It is not clear whether the disparity in risk reduction was due to biological or sociocultural differences, Chaparro said. Nearly one in five school-age children and young people (6 to 19 years) in the United States has obesity, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control. Children are considered overweight when their bodymass index is at or above the 95th percentile for their peers. Genetic factors contribute to excess weight gain, and those are difficult to change, the CDC admits. Federal health officials say that sugary drinks and fatty foods should be limited. Taking a cue from WIC, the government recommends that children eat more fruits and vegetables to maintain a healthy weight and avoid health problems. Children with obesity are at higher risk of having chronic diseases, including asthma, sleep apnea, bone and joint problems, type 2 diabetes, and risk factors for heart disease. It's worth mentioning The American Heart Association funded the L.A. County WIC study. •

Farris briefly detailed the attributes of the educators and classified employees who were recognized, quoting comments from their peers that portrayed their stellar work. Moore and Farris both noted how this was their favorite meeting of the year, recognizing the accomplishments of both certificated and classified District employees. Many of the honorees were in attendance --- and after listening to Farris extol their virtues, they posed for a photo with School Board members.

The Board next tackled myriad consent agenda items, including the approval/ratification of the February campus visit to the Middle School by a team of members of the International Baccalaureate Organization to conduct their Programme evaluation visit, which, according to Moore, went very well.

Also approved by the Board were professional development opportunities for District staff; a STEAM- themed assembly at Richmond Street School that will occur place on May 2; the High School Cheerleading summer camp that will take place from July 22-25 and be held at the Hyatt in Palm Springs; and the approval/ratification of an agreement with BEST Contracting Services, to the tune of \$17,745, for emergency roof repair at the Middle School, which were necessitated by the roof damage sustained by the school in the aftermath of the April 9 windstorm that buffeted the area.

Action items later approved during the two-hour gathering included an agreement with Telacu Construction Management to provide bond management services as the District embarks on facility upgrade programs stemming from the Long-Range Facility Master Plan and the November passing of bond Measure ES.

Telacu's Preeti D' Souza, who attended the meeting, was selected to helm the project.

Moore said that she has a wealth of experience with similar bond measure projects, most recently with the modernization and expansion of Lawndale High School. D'Souza has a bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Bombay, as well as a Master of Science in Construction Management that she received from Texas A & M. University.

Moore said D'Souza, who addressed the Board, is "very impressive." Telacu Senior Vice President Jay Bell was also on-hand to explain the upcoming construction management process and answer Board member questions. Member Emilee Layne had questions and concerns about the cost of contracting with Telacu, and the timely availability of their resources and personnel, questioning the "District's new approach" to hiring a construction management firm. "I am really having a hard time swallowing the cost," Layne said. District Chief Business Official Kim Linz briefly addressed the Board and gave her blessing to the agreement with Telacu. The agreement, which covers 12-months, is budgeted to cost the District \$349,120.

The Board also approved a resolution regarding District issuance of general obligation bonds (\$27 million) stemming from the \$92,000,000 in funding that the voters gave their blessing to when they passed Measure ES; and another resolution deeming the week of May 6-10 as Certificated School Employee Week.

The information pending action on the agenda involved the possible expansion in scope of the District's canine search program, which is currently implemented at the High School. Dr. Moore recommended to the Board that they consider expanding the program to the Middle School. Middle School Acting Principal Ali Rabiei will be meeting with stakeholders about the possible change in practice. It is expected that the item will be brought back to the Board for them to act at the first meeting in June.

Upcoming events on the District calendar include Saturday's Run for Education, and the High School's Drama Department presentation of "All Shook Up," which will start its three-day, four-sperformance run on April 25.

The next regularly scheduled ESUSD School Board meeting is set for Tuesday evening, May 14. •

Project Description: The City of El Segundo (City) proposes to extend Park Place from Allied Way to Nash Street with a railroad grade separation to implement a critical project as identified in the City's 2004 General Plan Circulation Element Update, its 2005 Traffic Impact Fee Study Update, and the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) 2017 Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP). Park Place currently exists in two segments with a roughly quarter mile gap across an undeveloped area which consists of Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR) and Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) railroad spurs. The project would implement a gap closure to develop Park Place as an alternate east-west route between Sepulveda Boulevard and Douglas Street to relieve congestion along portions of Rosecrans Avenue and Sepulveda Boulevard, as well as to improve local traffic circulation and access to and from the I-105 freeway. 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Planting and Caring for Trees this Arbor Day

at; they also serve important purposes in our communities and all over the world. They provide the oxygen we breathe, regulate the temperature of our neighborhoods, provide food and shelter for wildlife and add value to our homes. If you've ever wanted to plant trees in your own yard, or if you want to join a community tree planting project, Arbor Day is a great time to get started. National Arbor Day is celebrated on the last Friday in April, this year falling on April 26. There may even be Arbor Day events happening in your community. You can find out a CelebrateArborDay.org.

Tree planting is a great opportunity to involve the whole family, teaching your children the importance of the natural environment and how we can all be better stewards of our planet. Below are some tips for a successful tree planting.

1. Location, location, location. Where you plant a tree matters. Tall trees should be planted far enough from utility lines (and homes) to avoid problems when they grow to maturity. Shorter flowering trees may be a good choice closer to utility lines. Large evergreens shouldn't be planted close to a house on the southern side, as they can block warming winter sunlight. However, planting trees to the north of a house can help shield it from cold winter winds.

2. Choose your tree with care. The Arbor

3. How to start your tree. Whether you start with a bare-root seedling, a balled and burlapped tree or a container-grown or potted tree, be sure it looks healthy. For a bare-root tree, look for abundant root growth, numerous small fibrous roots that appear moist and a good color. A balled and burlapped tree

root-bound in the pot or can - if roots have circled around the edge of the container, you should cut any circling roots before planting. Always remove any container before planting. Balled and burlapped is the preferred choice for larger trees.

4. Plant properly. Watch the videos at

practices for planting bare-root seedlings, balled and burlapped trees or containerized trees. Tips for all three types include: digging a hole wider than what seems necessary for

your tree, packing the original soil around the planted tree firmly but not too tightly, creating a water-holding basin in the soil around the tree and giving the tree a good watering, then keeping the soil around the tree moist but not soggy, watering every 7-10 days during the first year after planting.

5. Continuous care for your trees. For your newly planted trees - and even existing trees on your property - help them thrive by watering them correctly (which is especially important when conditions are hot and dry), adding mulch, pruning as needed and watching for issues such as pests or tree diseases.

The time for planting trees is now. By doing so, you are an important part of something bigger. The Arbor Day Foundation's Time for Trees initiative aspires to plant 100 million trees by 2022, the 150th anniversary of Arbor Day. Each tree planted will help clean our air and water, fight climate change, prevent damage from

storms and flooding and beautify our world. Enhance your yard, your community and the planet by planting a tree this Arbor Day. *
