El Segundo's Neil Cadman Juggles Multiple Roles

El Segundo resident Neil Cadman is firmly entrenched in the local business scene. He runs the Cadman Group, a boutique commercial real estate company, as well as, Urban Advisors, an entity that seeks to fulfill a niche by leveraging analytics to help inform investors who are buying, selling, or looking to maximize an exiting investment, he's quite a busy man.

When he is not toiling in the commercial real estate world, Cadman and wife Becky are the owners of the popular Richmond Street eatery Deluca Pasta, which was launched as a restaurant 13 years ago and was rebranded in 2018. sponsors weekly live music events to add to the family atmosphere. Because of the COVID-19 quarantine, Deluca was mandated to shut-down their dining room and patio, but is offering take-out, curbside pick-up and free delivery, in conjunction with the GundoToGo program.

During these uncertain times, Cadman said that he has tried to keep as many employees on the payroll as possible and continue to provide health insurance. He acknowledges that the restaurant industry has taken a big hit, but that he expects the economy to eventually rebound, citing "no fundamental issues with the economy."

Chevron Refinery Thanks Hospitals and Nonprofits Tackling COVID-19 with \$110,000 in Gas Cards

El Segundo, California – April 17, 2020 – Chevron's El Segundo Refinery has donated \$110,000 in gas cards to support essential workers in Los Angeles's South Bay amidst the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. More Prevention

Those physically least able to dodge out of the way are likely to be among the most at risk from the virus. C). 

The Future is Bright for Madison Kellum

Each year high schools across the nation celebrate their seniors graduating. At the graduation ceremonies, speeches by the Valedictorian give us hope that our future is in good hands. When you meet El Segundo high school senior Madison Kellum for the first time and listen to what she has to say, you instantly recognize a bright future for all of us.

A good student might take one or two AP classes and weather through the intimidation of challenging courses. Madison's schedule is a bit more daunting when you consider she's taking AP Literature, AP Calculus, AP Statistics, AP U.S. History and AP Psychology. On top of that, her 4.5 GPA is a testament to her brilliant classroom success. To stay current for her classroom studies, she participates in weekly Zoom calls for Spanish, English, and ASB! She has been studying for her AP Calculus, AP Literature, and AP statistics exams. Her teachers have been very accessible via email and video chat. But if you ask her, she'd rather be in a classroom setting.

Madison says she loves all of her classes but has a clear favorite. "My favorite class this year is AP Literature. I love having long conversations with Ms. Gerber and discussing how the literature relates to the current political climate as well as analyzing the works from a historical context."

Madison's success in the classroom is just part of her story. Besides being an excellent student, a friend to all, she is a community volunteer and a fundraiser." I've helped our YMCA do lots of fundraising. Last year, our team of teenagers raised \$10,000 through planning a dance, having call nights, and service projects such as a car wash." She has worked as an intern for Los Angeles City Councilman, Mike Bonin. "I answered phone calls and helped solve constituent issues such as potholes, tree trimming, and illegal dumping."

Madison is very involved in the ASB at school and has served as class treasurer each year and ASB treasurer her senior year. She, along with Ella Tichy and Amanda Thoman, planned the football snack bar, as well as the prom and homecoming last year. Madison lives in Westchester and is highly involved in a program called Youth and Government through the YMCA. She has served as treasurer last year and president this year. They have weekly meetings and have attended conferences, two in Fresno and one in Sacramento in the past. At these conferences, they write bills, model court cases, elect officials, and model the government. "We plan service events such as beach cleanup and a Halloween event called 'Spooktacular' for our YMCA!" With Madison's incredible academic scores and her community involvement, she was recently notified that she had been nominated and inclusion in the U.S. Presidential Scholars Program. The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964 during the Lyndon B Johnson's presidential term. It is in recognition and to honor some of our nation's high school graduating seniors for their accomplishments in the classroom, academic success, leadership, and service to school and community. of Presidential Scholars, a group of 32 eminent citizens appointed by the President, will select the finalist and announced in May.

The nomination for the U.S. Presidential Scholars Program is very secretive. Those nominated don't know who chose them. Madison has her thoughts and believes State Superintendent Tony Thurmond nominated her. "They tell us that the selection is based on SAT scores and activities/community service." According to Madison, she received a letter in the mail telling her she had been nominated. Dr. Gooden was notified too and offered to assist her if she needed any help with the subsequent application. "They are reviewing our final applications now and I'll find out in a few weeks if I'm selected as one of approximately 120 scholars selected."

Madison is currently deciding where she'll be attending college. She is interested in staying close to home and attending either USC

or UCLA. "I'm currently deciding between UCLA and USC. I was offered a presidential half-tuition scholarship at USC, but it's still more expensive than UCLA, so we'll see! At USC, my major is called philosophy, politics, and economics, and my major at UCLA would be political science."

These days Madison is staying active at home by going on walks with her new Labradoodle puppy named Beau. She's also going to UCLA and USC with her dad to walk around the campuses to help decide where she'll attend college. Her family is close and they have been playing plenty of games such as Scrabble and Yahtzee.

Madison's immediate goal is hoping colleges will reopen in the fall and get a job on campus. She is also interested in studying abroad in Israel, Greece, or London. Her long-range goal and possibly a pathway to her future is to go to law school. "Hopefully, I'll work as a civil rights attorney or something on an international scale. However, I'm also really interested in journalism." Madison is interested in political journalism, such as covering state, national and international politics and policymaking. USC has a program called Master of Public Diplomacy, where Madison would get to study how governments across the world use the media to spread their messaging. "Both print and TV interest me because I love both writing and public speaking," said Madison.

Dear Neighborhood Therapist,

I have been in a horrible divorce and custody battle. We share custody of our elementary school children. I am an immigrant with a full time job that barely pays the bills for my small apartment. My ex-husband and his family have unlimited resources, and I am convinced he will try to keep me in court to bankrupt me and "prove" I am an unfit mother so that he can get full custody of the children and limit my access to them. He tells the children I am unworthy of respect, and he has threatened me and also lied in court. This has been incredibly hard on the kids, and they are starting to act out and don't know what to believe. At the same time, I feel like I am walking on eggshells with my own kids, like I cannot even give them a timeout, because it might be used against me and lied about to take them away. How can I possibly teach my children about right and wrong if I can never say no to them about anything?

Dear Trying to Hang in There,

I'm very sorry to hear what you are going through. Your ex-husband has put you in a terrible position. He has whipped up a storm of pain and chaos, and either does not notice or does not care about the effects it has on his own children. Despite your best efforts, he has been able to insert his presence into your home even though he is not there.

Worse, he is punching down: you are an immigrant in a country where women earn less than men - a double disadvantage - your ex-husband is trying to ruin you, and yet you know that society will certainly lay the blame at your feet if your children have problems.



Neil Cadman

Cadman Group manages is the Park Vista senior living facility located just east of the Recreation Park Little League field. With 97 units, Park Vista has offered El Segundo seniors affordable living for three decades.

Paula Rotolo, who has been on the Senior Housing Board for nearly 20 years, has worked closely with Cadman to make Park Vista a success, so successful that they have an occupancy waiting list of more than two years. Rotolo said that years ago, Park Vista endured financial challenges, so the Board decided to advertise for a property manager. They selected the Cadman Group, and Rotolo said that the partnership has proved mutually beneficial.

"It was one of the best decisions we have made in my tenure," Rotolo said. "The Senior Housing Board has healthy reserves, and although we will have challenges in the future, our financial strength is much healthier than it was 20 years ago."

While touting Cadman's business acumen, Rotolo also notes that "Neil is patient with the Park Vista residents and the board and shares his knowledge to lead the board in a proper direction." Cadman "goes far beyond what is expected.' she said." I cherish my friendship with Neil, and hope it continues long into the future."

Cadman is not wholly defined by his successes in the real estate and restaurant worlds. He is a staunch advocate of giving back by launching Cadman Cares, helping the residents of Park Vista, and by gathering and supplying necessities for the occupants of the Long Beach Homeless Shelter.

As part of his cycle of giving, Cadman



serves as the Chairman of the El Segundo Education Foundation and has served the city by volunteering for multiple community committees. Regarding his tenure with the Ed! Foundation, Cadman said he relishes the challenge of fundraising. "I get to speak with parents and (school) District staff. I really enjoy it."

He also has made the time to support the El Segundo Unified School District in other ways, serving on the high school leadership and parent advisory committees, as well as the ESUSD school site improvement committee, and school bond exploratory committee. When not donating his time to work on these committees, Cadman also quietly offers financial support; for the last decade, he has given \$12,000 to support the

goals of the organizers of the El Segundo Run for Education.

Cadman, son of English immigrants, was born and raised in Westchester. He graduated from UCLA, where he studied political science, intending to go to law school, but his job aspirations took another turn. He began his career in commercial real estate at the Hanes Company in Beverly Hills and expeditiously climbed the company ladder, rising from support-staffer to broker. He said that once he realized the opportunities that abounded in the commercial real estate field, he began purchasing multi-family real estate buildings. Cadman was not all that impressed in the customer support offered by property management firms who were servicing his own buildings, so he launched the Cadman Group in 1995.

The Cadman Group provides property and asset management, as well as brokerage and consulting services to its clients. They strive to provide top-notch customer service while taking into consideration the client's main investment goals.

While helming the Cadman Group, Neil noted the need for a different company that worked with commercial real estate entities in a straightforward way, without any hidden agendas, and this led to the formation of Urban Advisors in 2019. He said Urban Advisors' goal is to "simply offer the facts" that will lead to informed client decisions. He explained Urban Advisors is not looking to broker a deal, or manage the property, or provide financing, but to provide analytical data and insights from an unbiased and experienced viewpoint.

Cadman and his wife, a retired schoolteacher who he met while attending UCLA, have lived in El Segundo for the past 25 years. They have three children attending school, online at this point, in the ESUSD. When not on the job, Cadman, who played a year of ice hockey in college, enjoys the occasional foray onto the golf course and is a self-described UCLA sports fanatic, and a big supporter of any endeavor Disney related. But he mostly recreates as a family man. "If it involves my wife and kids," he said, "it's fun."

Asked why he decided to settle down and raise a family in El Segundo, Cadman said, "We wanted our kids to go to public school. Education is our passion. I have always said that you judge a community by the quality of public service, and the quality of public education and El Segundo can't be beat." •


