Project Lead the Way Presentation Made to ESUSD School Board

The Tuesday night meeting of the El Segundo Unified School District School Board featured a special presentation on the District's Project Lead the Way (PLTW) program that was spearheaded by Executive Director of Education Services Marisa Janicek, as well as a presentation from Preschool director Guadalupe Grijalva about the current state of the preschool.

Janicek introduced the PLTW teachers, who updated the Board on the progress of the program, which now encompasses students from K-12. Taking part in the presentation were PLTW teachers Danielle Flynn, Phuong Uzoff, Megan Delong, Jenn Cho, and Steve Lubs.

A national program, Project Lead the Way allows students to take classes in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). These courses are part of a pathway that will prepare the interested and qualified student for future STEM studies after leaving high school, and avail them of a path to post-graduation STEM career opportunities.

Chevron representative Lily Craig was on-hand, as the Board and Janicek thanked Chevron for their sponsorship of the program, which dates back to 2010 in the District. High school teacher Steve Eno, who has been instrumental in the success of PLTW, was also in attendance. Eno, who will be leaving the High School to take advantage of another opportunity "back East", was recognized by the Board and the presenters for his work with the program and the students.

In an email sent prior to the meeting, Superintendent Melissa Moore penned that "this is the first year the program is offered in K-12. It provides our students amazing (STEM) opportunities that are second to none. This program would not be available without the generous grants from Chevron. Our District is truly fortunate."

Grijalva's presentation touched on various bullet-points, including sessions and schedules for the District's youngest learners; licensing issues; creative curriculum, assessment data, and professional development; the District's inclusion program for students with special needs; support services, parent partnerships, including the PTO; and next steps as the planning is implemented for the 2016-17 school year.

Grijalva also noted the recent Eagles' Nest

parental survey, which had the participation of 85 families, with "99 percent of the families feeling that their children are happy and safe in our preschool; 98 percent of families are satisfied or very satisfied with the programs hours of service after having received requests for additional time by 80 percent of the families last year."

In an email sent prior to the meeting, Grijalva wrote she was excited to share her experiences and celebrate her first full year on the job. "It means a lot to me to see how

Atkinson Reflects Back on City Council Term

Despite not being re-elected to the El Segundo City Council, Dave Atkinson was all smiles when stating that his main reason for running again was to make sure Measure B passed. "People in town obviously didn't like me as much this time around, but what's most important is that they did like Measure B," he said referring to the transient occupancy tax increase overwhelmingly passed on April 12. "When I went walking door-to-door, I told everyone, 'Even if you don't vote for me, vote for Measure B. Well, they listened. The revenues from this will be a huge boost for the City and help subsidize infrastructure projects that have been delayed for far too long."

With Measure B moving forward, Atkinson views his campaign as a success even though he no longer sits on the City Council. He noted that he personally put up 107 signs in favor of the initiative. That said, what went wrong when it came to his own fortunes in the Council race? "I think there were several reasons for it," he said. "El Segundo has a long memory and there were people unhappy about me being part of the vote that removed Carl Jacobson as Mayor and moved Bill Fisher into the spot. As I said at the Council meeting when the vote happened, it was one of the most difficult and agonizing decisions I ever had to make—and there was a lot to it that people don't know.

El Segundo Files Challenge to Regional Transportation Plan

City immediately south of LAX takes action to protect residents against projection of unmitigated growth at airport

Yesterday, the City of El Segundo filed a petition with the Superior Court challenging the approval of the 2016-2040 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG). El Segundo's petition attacks the RTP on a variety of issues, but the main reason for the challenge is that SCAG has not adequately justified or analyzed its plan for significant growth at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), which is immediately north of the City. Further, the RTP includes no proposed mitigation for this extraordinary growth projection, which will have immediate and negative impacts on the quality of life for El Segundo's residents.

"We are taking this extraordinary step to protect our residents, who bear the brunt of the noise and pollution generated by LAX," said Suzanne Fuentes, the mayor of El Segundo. "SCAG cannot release a transportation plan that projects significant growth at LAX without detailing proposals on how to lessen the impacts of that growth on our residents. It's not only a violation of law; it's a violation of principles of fairness."

As the petition notes, the RTP provides a blueprint for the Southern California region's transportation network over the next 25 years. It also serves as the region's Sustainable Communities Strategy which, as required by law, is to coordinate regional transportation and land use plans in order to promote

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compact, transit-oriented communities that will help California achieve its greenhouse gas reduction targets by reducing vehicle

Further, the projected growth violates SCAG's own commitment to sustainability and to its policy of aviation regionalization, which encourages the distribution of aviation traffic around the region so the communities that surround LAX do not bear all the impact of aviation traffic growth. Finally, the Petition objects to the RTP's conclusion that its program for improvements in ground access at airports (including LAX) will not have significant impacts on El Segundo.

"The idea that spending billions of dollars to make it easier to get in and out of LAX will not increase activity there is illogical," noted Fuentes. "SCAG needs to do a better job in analyzing these very real impacts on our residents."

Superior Court, states that the RTP's Environmental Impact Report (EIR) is significant funding to ease access to LAX, leading to increased noise, traffic, and air pollution impacts on El Segundo and its residents. All of LAX's current planning approvals are predicated on a maximum of 78.9 Million Annual Passengers (MAP), but the RTP assumes growth to a range of 82.9 to 96.6 MAP. The RTP fails to acknowledge this disparity and fails to evaluate or mitigate the impacts of such growth.



But when it came down to it, I truly felt that it was the right move for the City and I stand behind that vote. However, I realize the way it went down did not sit well with people." Atkinson added, "I must also have frightened the Police and Firefighter associations—as they called voters, went door-to-door and spent \$40,000 in their goal to remove me from the Council. It probably didn't help that a sitting Mayor also worked against my reelection. In my mind, I got what I wanted and the big winner is the City of El Segundo."

Atkinson also believes citizens did not take well to his support of various tax hikes and fee increases. "There are those who say we shouldn't ever raise any taxes or fees for services and that we should look at cutting employee salaries and pensions," he said. "Well, during the time I was on the Council, we have looked at salaries and pensions by reducing the City's share of future retirement costs and restructuring union contracts—and we held firm and made a number of moves that will absolutely help the City in the long term. On the other side of the coin, there's talk of low employee morale because we are addressing the same salaries and pensions people want us to cut. Well, you can't have it both ways and I deemed the City's financial stability as the most important issue. There has to be a balance."

Atkinson went on to say that El Segundo can no longer afford to maintain a status quo that may have worked decades ago but not anymore in today's economic climate. "I am a long-time resident in this town and yeah, it has been great not paying for certain things forever," he said. "I don't want to pay higher fees. But there comes a point where you have to realize that nothing comes free and maybe people ought to pay for what they use. If you want to continue to pay nothing for things like trash pick-up, using parks facilities, riding the shuttle—things that residents pay for virtually everywhere else--then who does pay for it? The City. And if we don't have the money, then all those good things we are used to having will just go away unless our citizens are willing to at least pick up some of the slack. Now these great benefits can continue, thanks to Measure B."



Looking back at his tenure on the Council, Atkinson admitted that he found it frustrating to navigate through red tape considering that he was used to implementing decisions quickly when he worked in the automotive industry. "With government agencies, things just take a long time to get done even when it's crystal clear a certain decision is what's best," he said. "I won't miss that part of the job."

Even with the sometimes lengthy delays, Atkinson still pointed to various accomplishments during his term. He expressed particular pride in being the key Council liaison in facilitating the deal for a new aquatics facility at the future Wiseburn High School site. "This will be a state-of-the-art complex the likes of which doesn't exist anywhere in the area and will be a huge draw for El Segundo," Atkinson said. "I am sorry I won't get to finish what was started, but have confidence that the new Council will see it through."

Other highlights mentioned over the past four years include the move to bring TopGolf to town, the opening of several major developments such as The Point and elevon, plans for the Raytheon South Campus and several hotels, the new LA Lakers complex, the rehabilitation project on Richmond Street, and the Chevron tax in-lieu agreement. On a more personal level, Atkinson noted that he played a major role in organizing El Segundo's Host City activities when a delegation from the Special Olympics came to town last summer. "Many volunteers contributed to making the visit a huge success and for me it was one of the most rewarding experiences I have had since joining the Council," he said.

Having already retired before joining the Council in 2012, Atkinson will use his newfound free time to travel with his wife Carol and enjoy being with family. "I will certainly keep an eye on what's happening with the City and root on the new Council to continue moving El Segundo forward," he said. "Although I won't be one of the people on the dais anymore, I wish everyone well. We had our disagreements and maybe some people in the community questioned some of the decisions, but I believe we all voted with our conscience and on what we felt was best for the City." •

County Supervisor Candidates Address the Big Issues at Forum

The three candidates vying to assume the seat soon-to-be-vacated by long-time Los Angeles County 4th District Supervisor Don Knabe convened on May 2 for a forum hosted by the Torrance Area Chamber of Commerce and held at the DoubleTree Hotel. With Chamber Board member and Counsel Karl Schmidt serving as moderator, the trio of hopefuls weighed in on the key issues facing the District--which represents nearly two million people and encompasses the South Bay communities as well as other cities, several Los Angeles neighborhoods and various unincorporated areas. Voters will decide on June 7 whether to elect current 44th District Congress member and former City of Los Angeles 15th District Councilmember Janice Hahn, Knabe's Senior Deputy and former Manhattan Beach Mayor Steve Napolitano, or non-profit CEO and Pastor Ralph Pacheco who previously served lengthy stints on the Rio Hondo Community College and Whittier Union High School district boards.

After making opening statements, the candidates fielded a dozen questions on a variety of topics. Looking at the most pressing issues in the district, Napolitano pointed to rising crime rates and needing to backfill public safety positions. He proposed diversion and probation program options for non-serious offenders rather than just incarceration. He also identified the "widespread, tragic" homeless problem. Pacheco emphasized the need for the County to fulfill its promise to provide essential services and felt "we can do better" in that regard. While agreeing on the importance of adding more police to address crime, he noted that providing County officers is not the answer in cities such as Torrance with their own law enforcement. Hahn described homelessness as "one of the biggest issues facing every community" and spoke of tents set up in San Pedro and the large amount of veterans living on the streets. She called for Veterans Administration reform. Hahn also mentioned the need to build a 21st Century transportation system that can link together all parts of LA, adding that it is her "life's work" to connect the Green Line into LAX.

Addressing the challenges in monitoring the County's \$28.5 billion budget, Pacheco hoped to leverage Federal and State resources to pay down unfunded liability, restructure pension plans and to ensure fiscal accountability in every department to ensure each spends wisely. Hahn said the County's primary mission is to act as a "safety net" and "keep people from falling through the cracks." She listed children (and foster care) as her primary focuses as well as the homeless. She added that the County will go back to voters asking for transportation and parks bond funding, with the caveat to "make sure we are being fiscally responsible." Napolitano said a change isn't necessary because the County has been fiscally conservative with balanced budgets and did not lay off a single employee. He agreed on the need to prioritize children with an emphasis on education.

Asked if the County is business-friendly and to offer ways to help small businesses thrive, Hahn reported she has heard complaints from that sector. She suggested to create a small business advisory council and also find a way to connect small businesses to the two ports to provide international trade opportunities. Napolitano said he helped spearhead a business concierge program and worked to facilitate film permitting. He added that he wants to organize business summits to hear directly

from business owners. Describing the County's business-friendliness as "cumbersome at best," Pacheco lamented that it takes one to two years to get plans through the County as opposed to local cities. However, he warned that items such as conditional use permit issuances must also take into account the needs of the community at-large.

On the challenges of increased crime in the wake of the Prop 47 and AB 109 legislation that put more criminals into our communities, Napolitano stressed the "need to measure better" and provide probation and diversion programs to the mentally ill to avoid the "revolving door" quandary and to push for education and treatment options. Pacheco said the State mandated the County to provide prison locations while only paying \$50 per prisoner. He pledged to push State legislators to rewrite the bills to provide more funding. Hahn also said she supports rewriting the legislation, but until that happens she wants to see more "community-based policing" with additional officers and sheriffs deployed.

Regarding their thoughts on maintaining a strong aerospace presence in the District and South Bay, Pacheco thought to reach out to the major commercial industrial complexes and ensure they are protected, while also providing tax credits and other incentives to keep plants in the County. Hahn listed her top priority as keeping Los Angeles Air Force Base here and avoiding any potential relocation process. She also spoke of providing incentives to keep jobs here, diversifying the economy and technology to transfer to other industries, and ensuring the future workforce is well-trained by collaborating with community colleges and universities. Napolitano said the key is to maintain the Air Force Base, which he referred to as the "heart and soul of aerospace." Related to that, he called for more affordable housing and an expanded transportation system that links the Green Line further south down to San Pedro so those living there and working in El Segundo can travel back and forth efficiently. He also talked about having good schools to train the next generation.

On ideas for transportation, Hahn spoke again of the importance of County-wide connectivity that can provide opportunities for where people can live, work and go to school. She mentioned the future plan to connect the Green Line to LAX, noting that people don't use that mode of transportation now because it stops a mile away from the airport. Pacheco proclaimed his support of Senator Tony Mendoza's SB 1472 to provide two additional members to the Metro Board as part of developing a regional transportation plan—and to ensure the new individuals come from communities not already represented. He also indicated support for the Gold Line extension to Whittier and completion of the Green Line. Napolitano called for "geographic equity" and pointed out that the Green Line extension to LAX slated for 2023 is the only Measure R project on the docket for the 4th District in the next decade. With Measure R2 dollars potentially on the way, he said he will fight to make sure the District projects get "pushed up in the line" and not relegated to the second or third decades. He also called for freeway improvements on the 710 south to improve access in and out

Insurers Agree to Pay \$400 Million on Lost Life Policies in California

Settlement Reached in Nationwide Death Master File Investigation

Life-insurance companies under pressure from the the state's insurance commissioner will pay \$400 million in death benefits they kept for decades because California policyholders' relatives and estates never filed a claim.

California and Florida regulators led a nationwide investigation of the life-insurance industry and found that 20 companies had access to death information of their policyholders, yet never paid the death benefits, according to the California Insurance Commissioner's Office. A "60 Minutes" report in April credited California and Florida regulators for the crackdown on the practice.

The companies agreed to pay \$400 million on policies bought by Californians, Insurance Commissioner Dave Jones said.

The 20 insurance companies settled for \$5 billion nationwide and agreed to pay 200,000 beneficiaries of their policyholders. Prudential, John Hancock, MetLife and 17 others settled without admitting any wrongdoing, officials said. The investigation centered on a widespread practice by the targeted insurance companies of ignoring a national death list sent to them by Social Security.

In some cases, the insurance companies would cancel a life insurance policy for non-payment after a person's death, according to the "60 Minutes" report.

"The investigation found that life insurers failed to use of the Social Security Administration's Death Master File for their business benefit while ignoring information the database contained that would allow life insurers to identity deceased life insurance policyholders whose beneficiaries were owed benefits," said a statement from Insurance Commissioner Jones.

The Death Master File is updated with the names and identity of everyone for whom a death certificate is filed in the United States. The Social Security Administration uses the Death Master File to stop paying Social Security benefits. It licensed the Death Master File to life insurance companies, Jones said.

There were 20 settlements with insurance regulators as a result of the market- conduct investigations, according the California


Insurance Commissioner's office. The companies that settled with state regulators, were:

Aviva; Axa, Aegon, Allianz, American International Group, Genworth, Guardian Life, ING, Jackson National, John Hancock, Lincoln National, Metropolitan Life, Midland, Nationwide Corp., New York LIfe, Pacific LIfe, Prudential, Sun Life, Symetra, and TIAA Family.

USAA and Mass Mutual received clean reports in the multi-state market-conduct investigation, Jones' office reported.

Insurance companies used the Social Security death list to stop making annuity payments

we continue to work towards supporting the families who have chosen our preschool. We have wonderful teachers who care very much about their students and families, so that we will continue to be a program strength that we will keep building on."

Board President Jim Garza commented after the presentation concluded that the current program in-place at the Eagles' Nest is "everything that I want to see in an educational experience for the kids."

Grijalva's presentation followed comments made by student representative to the Board Lexi Griffin detailing campus events at the High School as the students and faculty point towards a June 9 graduation ceremony date.

Carol Pirsztuk, Ed! Foundation CEO made the evening's final special presentation. She reminded the Board of tomorrow night's Ed! Foundation gala that will again be taking place on the grounds at Chevron Park on Friday night, as well as the Ed!'s Summer Academy that will start on June 13. The Ed! Gala festivities will feature a silent auction that will give gala-goers the opportunity to win, among other prizes, a trip to the Masters golf tournament, dugout seats to a Dodger game, a trip to San Francisco, box seats to an LA Kings game, and a walk-on to watch the filming of the hit television show, Modern Family.

The only Discussion item on the agenda involved the options available to the District pertaining to the life-cycle of the High School artificial turf football field and replacement possibilities. Dylan Farris, Executive Director of Human Resources, and Director of Maintenance and Operations Alfredo Perez lead the discussion.

Options currently in play to replace the turf, which has shown signs of early "degradation" and was installed back in 2010 and is under warranty until 2018, include replacing the current comparable turf at no charge to the District, with no extension of the warranty; or "upgrading" the artificial grass to the current top-of-the line turf, with an eight year warranty at a cost of \$150,000 to the District.

Farris said that he asked the turf representatives what a new field would cost at this time, and was told a new install, with warranty, would currently run about \$500,000. He said that the recommendation, at this time, would be to take the upgraded turf package with a new eight-year warranty at a cost to the District of \$150,000. Installation would take place after the 2017 graduation festivities.

There were nine consent agenda items tackled

at the meeting. Among the items that were given approval: Wednesday night's Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) program at the Richmond Street cafeteria; and for the High School Cross Country team to travel to Mammoth this summer to participate in a training camp program, and to Clovis in October to compete in what was termed a "very elite race."

The GATE night was to include a special presentation made by Mr. David Ghoogasian, and was entitled "Motivate GATE students to their fullest potential." A topic that was highly requested by GATE parents who responded to a District survey, the evening was open to all GATE identified students in grades 4-8.

Mammoth will be the destination for the varsity high school's cross country team in early August. Team members will be attending a special "High-Altitude" training camp in preparation for competition during the 2016-17 school year. One of those competitions will take place in Clovis on October 8th.

Six action items were addressed by the Board, including a resolution deeming May 11 as National School Nurse Day; a second resolution branding the week of May 15-21 as Classified School Employee Week; and the approval of the District's Educator Effectiveness plan, which spells out the way the District will be earmarking, for professional development, a grant of \$240,644 over the next three years.

The Board then heard information pending action items on myriad courses and programs that may take place at both the high school and the Middle School when the next school year kicks-off. Course descriptions were available to Board members via file attachments, with high school classes involving Algebra/Geometry, AP Art History, Symphony Orchestra, and AP Computer Science Principles to be considered.


On the Middle School front, pending action courses for the fall included Chamber Orchestra, Intermezzo Strings, and Middle Year Programme offerings in Accelerated Algebra, Math I & II, and Math II & III.

Superintendent Moore then addressed the Board about some of the upcoming events on the District's informational calendar, highlighting the May 12 facilities master plan town-hall meeting that will be taking place at the Richmond Street cafeteria, and the Friday night Ed! Foundation gala.

Board member reports followed, and Moore then gave her report. Garza then closed out the two-hour meeting. The next regularly scheduled meeting will take place on Tuesday evening, May 24. •

The boys' volleyball program has come a long way from its roots. The program has been one of the top athletic programs in the school for the past ten years. In that time the Eagles have won two CIF-Southern Section titles and has won at least a share of a league title for five consecutive years.

Needing a win against Santa Monica on the last day of the regular season the Eagles came up with their biggest win of the season defeating the Vikings on the road in front of a raucous home crowd. The Eagles, behind the reigning CIF-Southern Section Division 3 Player of the Year, Stephen Moye, the Eagles dispatched the Vikings and dash their hopes of an outright title. Moye had 41 kills and eight blocks as the Eagles clinched a share of the Ocean League title with the 17-25, 25-23, 24-26, 26-24, 18-16 win. Joe Kelly had 63 assists and six blocks while Steve Brandlin had 22 digs for El Segundo (18-7, 9-1) and heads into the playoffs as the fourth

The Eagles faced Schurr from the Almonte League on Tuesday. A win would send the Eagles into the second round tonight against the winner of the Vista Murieta/ Westminster match. Should the Eagle win they would be on the road if Westminster wins while a coin flip would determine the game against Vista Murieta. The quarter-finals are set for Saturday while a potential matchup against Quartz Hills looms in the semi-finals next Wednesday. Quartz Hills nearly knocked off the Eagles in the CIF finals holding a two games to none advantage before the Eagles made their historic comeback victory.

Baseball

The baseball program continues to be a model for success. No the Eagles won't win the Ocean League title but they are in position to finish second and advance to the CIF Southern Section playoffs for the eighth consecutive season and the thirteenth time since 2002. They defeated Lawndale 6-0 in the first game behind the pitching of Spencer Long. The junior right-hander was masterful through six innings scattering three hits while striking out five and walking none. Justin Ostler tossed a perfect seventh inning. Jake Palmer, CJ Shevlin and Brenden Casillas each had two hits to lead the Eagles. Both Palmer and Shevlin had two RBIs apiece.

In the second game the Eagles sent eleven hitters to the plate in the second inning and scored seven runs on their way to a 14-1

victory on Senior Day. Wyatt Boyce had a big day at the plate going three-for four with homerun, a double and five RBIs. Nico Celestial has settled nicely into the lineup hitting fourth now that Sean Emery's injury has sidelined him. Celestial had perhaps his best day as an Eagle hammering out a double, a scorching single and three RBIs and scoring twice.

The feel good story of the Eagle's season has been Bradley Heckman. The senior, who was sidelined with arm issues as a junior has put together quite a season. His pinch hit single raised his batting average to .556, tops on the team. Though he didn't pitch his eye-popping 0.79 ERA is also the best on the staff.

Senior catcher Jason Kehl, who has been sidelined all season long because of a football injury, made an appearance as a pinch runner who ended up scoring. Kehl, who started behind the plate as a junior, who was one of the Eagle captains, was to share time behind the plate while also playing first base.

The Eagles played Santa Monica on Tuesday at home and on the road today. With a win in either game the Eagles would advance to the playoffs as the second place team and a potential first round home game next week.

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Luke Walton Set to Turn Things Around

The Los Angeles Lakers have finally found something to celebrate about. After the firing of Byron Scott on April 24, the Lakers wasted little time in finding their next head coach. The hiring of Luke Walton was announced almost two weeks ago now, and with it came an overabundance of joy from both the Lakers fan base and their players. Despite a long list of potential head coaching candidates that included experienced NBA and college coaches, the Lakers made their choice. Last Thursday night, Walton officially signed his five-year contract with the Lakers to become a first year head coach in his own right and the 26th coach in franchise history.

If the name Luke Walton may sound familiar and you don't follow basketball much, you might recognize him from the Lakers' 2009-2010 championship teams. Walton played as a steady contributor for the Lakers for nine years and has since moved on to become an assistant coach of the Golden State Warriors, where he is currently attempting to capture his second championship ring in as many years with that team. Once Walton's run with the Warriors runs out in this postseason, he will assume full duties as head coach of the Lakers. Walton does have some head coaching experience, too, though, filling in for Warriors head coach Steve Kerr while he was forced from the sidelines to start the year with complications from two offseason back surgeries. In his stead, Walton started the year with a 24-0 record and went a combined 39-4. "I'm incredibly happy for Luke," Kerr explained. "As we witnessed earlier this season, he has all of the intangibles necessary to be an outstanding head coach in this league, including a terrific understanding of the game [and] the ability to communicate with a wide range of people."

One of the biggest criticism's of the Walton hiring is his lack of any type of long-term head coaching experience. Sure, he went 24-0 and 39-4 with the Golden State roster, but my grandpa could have stepped in as head coach and would have taken that team of players to a similar record, right? The Lakers clearly don't have the same team of players as the Warriors, therefore the head coaching job is going to be a much more challenging one. "Believe it or not, the fact that he really doesn't have a lot of head-coaching experience is a positive" Lakers General Manager Mitch Kupchak explained. "We get to work with somebody who's working on the fly. We've had experience with coaches like that in our past. In fact, I think Pat Riley was our last

36-year-old coach. [Riley] did pretty good. But we're happy to have Luke for a lot of different reasons." While Luke may not turn out to be the next Pat Riley (who would?), the hottest coaching commodity in the league has also turned out to be the youngest active head coach in the league and should gel nicely with a roster full of young players who are already excited about his arrival.

"I'm excited about it," said Julius Randle when asked about Walton's new hiring. "It's a fresh start for us all. I think Luke is going to be great for us." Jordan Clarkson echoed those sentiments. "I'm really excited about him being the new head coach and really seeing how things are put together," Clarkson said. "I want to be in L.A. and be a part of this whole process. I think it's an exciting time for Laker Nation." Walton may not have a ton of real head coaching experience, but what he lacks there, he makes up for with the ability to relate to youngsters. "Obviously him being so young, he's going to be easy to relate to," Randle continued. "He's going to demand a lot of us and it's not going to be an easy process, but we're all looking forward to the challenge." There's no questioning Walton's decision to join the Lakers as a head coach. Sure, he's leaving the Warriors, which might be one of the greatest teams this league has ever seen. But who wouldn't jump at the chance to live in Los Angeles, get paid tons of money, and rejoin (and possibly resurrect) a team that you are already familiar with and have won multiple championships with. While his decision seems sound, the decision of the Lakers to tab him as a head coach so hastily is what remains to be seen.

One of the Lakers main challenges before the season starts is going to be in upgrading the roster. Something that Walton should certainly set his sights on should he wish to have any success in L.A. A roster of a year ago that included Roy Hibbert and Nick "Swaggy P" Young, should certainly look to rid itself of useless veterans like the such and further a nucleus of young, energized players that will have the ability to reinvent themselves on and off the court. While Walton attained his nearly spotless 39-4 record with a roster that was a given to him and a roster that might be one of the best this league has ever seen, his challenge will now be compiling one of his own. The problem last year was as much a roster problem as it also was a philosophical problem with Byron Scott and a "get Kobe Bryant the ball, problem". With all of that

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<u>Film Review</u>

'Sing Street' is another musical delight from the director of 'Once'

Sing Street, from the Irish filmmaker John Carney (known for grabbing the attention of the film world in 2007 with the moviemusical smash, Once), takes place during the homestretch of the Cold War, where a group of adolescents come together in the name of fellowship, bonding over the pop culture of the time and a desire to break away from the confines of the tangible.

To that end, Sing Street's story and character beats are conventional, but organized delicately. This film is a little more innocent than the previously aforementioned, closer to something like the amiable nostalgia of this year's Everybody Wants Some!!. The catholic schoolboys of Sing Street are right at the onset of puberty, not yet so acquainted with the confusing realities of drugs, sex, mental illness, etc. Not to say that they aren't troublemakers, but there's a brighteyed charm to everything they do.

Carney's previous film, 2014's Begin Again, was his first film made across the Atlantic, and his new movie sees him return to the streets of Dublin. Sing Street tells the story of our protagonist Cosmo (Ferdia Walsh-Peelo, something of a ringer for Freddie Highmore), who, at the whim of his father (Aidan Gillen, Game of Thrones), enrolls at the local Christian Brothers school, whereupon both his passion for music is awakened by the help of his older brother (Jack Reynor), as well as a desire to start a band to win the heart of the mysterious Ralphine (Lucy Boynton).

There is an element of autobiography in Carney's Sing Street, not unlike the writing efforts from Greg Mottola in Adventureland or Steven Chbosky in Perks of Being a Wallflower. The writer/director Carney's own musical background does have a notable stint as bassist for the 90's Irish band The Frames, fronted by his Once star Glen Hansard. Details in this movie, such as his school's insistence on black shoes, are pages taken directly from his own life, much like how Almost Famous reflects the start of a young Cameron Crowe's own career in music journalism through the shy, blossoming music aficionado.

Like in Begin Again, the musical landscape that Sing Street's characters inherit has quite a verisimilitude. Carney loves to relate the characters' musical lives to the way they live with everything else. The fertile era of 80's post-punk and new wave is almost the ideal context in which to do this, with the multiple subcultures inspired by those sounds - punks, goths, mods, and futurists, among others. The result is an ode to how music shapes identity, especially how it gives glory to being a misfit, an underdog, or a despairing romantic that otherwise might not exist.

People tend to look at a person's musical taste as part of a bigger picture, for instance - in a hilarious and poignant moment in the film, Cosmo's brother warns him that a woman can never truly love a man that listens to Phil Collins. With uplifting heart and real musical energy, Sing Street is a film about discovering the honest music you want the world to judge you by.

'Sing Street' is rated PG-13 for thematic elements including strong language and some bullying behavior, a suggestive image, drug material and teen smoking. Now playing in select theaters. •

said he would reserve judgment on the latter and is not in favor of it until it is costed out. He noted that "no one can raise a family on minimum wage," but also explained that with the raise also comes increased costs for goods in the County—and that as an example, the arts internship program is now at a deficit as a result. Pacheco proclaimed support for the wage increase--calling it an alternative to being on welfare--and reported that 26% of Torrance residents are at or below the poverty line. He also called for retraining programs. Hahn said she heard from businesses voicing concerns about the minimum wage increase--with worries that if one city (or county) adopts it and another doesn't, companies could choose to leave for a neighboring area. Otherwise, she said she supports the increase, especially since two-thirds of those at that salary level are women. On paid sick leave, she asked to study it first—but spelled out the hardships for those who have to choose between staying home with a sick child or going to work when they themselves are sick and putting co-workers at risk.

Returning to the topic of homelessness and what the County should be doing, Pacheco called the problem a "pandemic situation" and advised to utilize community-and faith-based organizations that can provide housing and revitalization, as well as personal management and life skills. He added that mental health issues are not being addressed, but need to be. Hahn said she has never seen 44,000 homeless in LA County (of which 4,000 are veterans) before, but that a Congressional bill would raise \$13 billion in hopes of reducing the problem. She called on the County and City of Los Angeles to work together to coordinate efforts. "I believe in housing first," Hahn said, explaining that conventional wisdom has been for the homeless to first get their lives together (e.g. get off drugs, find a job) and then get shelter. "I think that's impossible. How can anyone living in a tent get their life together?" Hahn suggested providing rental subsidies and vouchers and to work with landlords/property owners. Napolitano said the number of homeless in the US is higher than in any other nation and "we need to fix it." He mentioned work to help secure funding toward PATH (People Assisting the Homeless) and collaborating with faith-based organizations, but indicated those groups are overworked and can't do it on their own. Napolitano noted that there is a spectrum of homelessness where those who are considered "chronic" need housing first. He touched upon the County's approval to allocate \$150 million to reduce homelessness and emphasized the need to find the most cost-effective ways to provide treatment and housing.

Considering when to use the County's rainy day fund, Hahn spoke of the importance of having reserves in the event of an emergency such as an earthquake or fire. She also thought the monies could be appropriate to address homelessness, which she characterized as a "crisis" that may need special resources. Emphasizing that homelessness is a longterm problem that won't be solved tomorrow, Napolitano cautioned against ever using onetime money for ongoing funding. He said reserves in the past went towards "unfunded mandates" such as when the State or Federal governments required the County to provide services regardless of whether those dollars were in the budget or not. Pacheco talked of a 47-point plan to address the homeless problem and offering up a quarter-cent sales tax (with a sunset clause) to raise \$1 billion. He asked the audience if that is worth our while, or should we consider a \$26 million parks needs assessment.

On how to educate a skilled workforce, Napolitano zeroed in on vocational education, career pathways and the need to train for skills such as plumbing and auto mechanics. He warned that the Southern California Regional Occupational Center lost State funding and has been surviving on a patchwork aid bill to keep it going for three years. He said we must find a way

to keep it open to provide key training for high school and at-risk kids. Pacheco called for "innovative and creative ideas" on how to address the economic situation in our communities and spoke of serving on the ROP (Regional Occupational Program) Board in Whittier to retrain 20,000 adults in marketable skills. Hahn singled out the role of community colleges in providing an educated and trained workforce, but has heard business owners say they can't find people to fill available jobs. She acknowledged that many kids will never go to college and that it is imperative to make sure they have "the skills to pay their bills." She explained that even a slight change in State curriculum can be a one-and-a-half to two-year process—and suggested establishing a separate track for community colleges to approve changes more quickly to keep up with evolving technologies.

Asked about economic development and to provide ideas to foster it, Pacheco called it one of his top priorities with a specific goal to expand international trade and to look at the issue systemically. He mentioned meetings with the Harbor and Arts groups. He thought dialogue with various labor markets would be a perfect start in looking to increase job opportunities and build the economic base. Pacheco also spoke of leveraging State and Federal resources to help promote education. Hahn said that economic development can't thrive without safe communities, She identified strengthening the ports and the international airport as two major components, with a need to address traffic congestion and to use transportation dollars to ensure cargo moves in and out of the ports efficiently and quickly. Hahn called small businesses "the backbone of economic development," stating that "when they thrive and grow, they hire." She thought it important to give them access to investment capital and to ensure the County is businessfriendly. Napolitano agreed that public safety and transportation (especially 710 Freeway improvements) are vital factors, but added that he wants to hear directly from businesses as a way of governing from the "bottom up" as opposed to the "top down" so issues may be addressed on the County level. Noting that two-thirds of businesses are small, he said the County must offer better informational resources for them such as an improved website portal (which he said is currently difficult to find and went to a dead page when he searched for it) and an easier way to renew business licenses online. Other ideas mentioned included expanding the business concierge program, providing educational pathways, and pushing the State model film ordinance.

Recognizing Supervisor Knabe's role in championing the Safe Surrender Program and Successful Anti-Sex Trafficking Operation, Schmidt asked the candidates what their own legacy program might be. Hahn praised Knabe's "brilliant effort" in saving unwanted babies so that they can be dropped off at fire stations. She reported that the Supervisor had saved 144 lives so far and thought her legacy would be to ensure that "after saving their life, we gave them a life worth saving" by providing good schools, affordable housing and a measure of dignity. Or, she offered, since her father (Kenneth Hahn) brought the Dodgers to LA, she would make sure everyone with cable TV can watch the team's games. Napolitano said he wished to continue Knabe's Safe Surrender and Anti-Sex Trafficking work, feeling he is part of that legacy. Also, he hoped that in 12 years we will no longer be talking about the issues of today—that problems such as homelessness and transportation congestion will be resolved before then. Pacheco remarked that "the best legacy is our children" and that the County must provide more creative and innovative ways to provide services. "The best legacy is there are still honest politicians serving the public office," he added.

The victor on June 7 will replace Supervisor Knabe, who first took the helm of the 4th District in 1996 and garnered reelection four times before terming out this year. •



to their deceased customers, according to the California insurance commissioner. This pattern of selective use of the death list indicated to investigators the companies knew policyholders had died, Jones' office said.

State investigators from Florida, North Dakota, New Hampshire and Pennsylvania also discovered that life insurers weren't using the national Social Security database, called the Death Master List, as the government intended.

"Until recently, many life insurers only used the Death Master File for their own economic benefit to identify deceased annuity holders in order to stop making annuity payments, but the life insurers failed to use the Death Master File to identify deceased policyholders in order to pay life insurance benefits," Insurance Commissioner Jones said.

The companies would wait for a claim to be filed for the death benefits, and in some cases when the policyholder who had died stopped paying the premiums, the insurers cancelled the policy and kept the death benefit, Florida Insurance Commissioner Kevin McCarty said in a "60 Minutes" interview.

McCarty, who co-led the investigation, dismissed the insurance industry's argument that the policies state that insurers don't have an obligation to pay the benefit unless a claim is filed.

"And I'm here to say that you have a responsibility to investigate a claim if you know someone has died. And if you have a letter that says you're deceased, you have actual knowledge the person has died," he said.

The California Controller's Office also launched its own investigation after it determined that life insurance companies had violated state laws that require unclaimed property held by corporations to be turned over to the State Controller so that the Controller can search for the property owners. Unpaid life insurance benefits qualify as unclaimed property.

The life insurers also reached five settlements with states for unlawfully holding unclaimed property, which prevented state controllers from carrying out their legal duties, according to authorities. The five settlements added \$2.5 billion to the payouts.

California's Unclaimed Property Law requires corporations, business associations, financial institutions, and insurance companies to annually report and deliver property to the Controller's Office after three years have passed without any contact with the customer.

Investigators continue to watch the insurance companies that weren't the focus of the probe, and are pushing for full compliance by the industry to use the Death Master List.

"We urge the remaining life insurers to follow the lead of the 22 companies that are now using the Death Master File database to search their records for deceased life insurance policyholders and to pay their beneficiaries benefits owed," Commissioner Jones said in his announcement.

"Until they do so, our investigation and enforcement actions will continue."

Missouri Insurance Director John Huff, who is president of the national association of state commissioners, said in an email for this story that his group is working to create a national system for consumers to check on lost life-insurance policies. •
