Fuentes Bids Farewell to Council, Looks Forward to Next Chapter

Well, that went by fast, didn't it? Then again, it seemed like a lifetime ago when she stepped off one dais (the Planning Commission) to move to the next one (the City Council) in 2010. Either way, two terms and eight years later, Suzanne Fuentes finds herself truly "out of a job" for the first time and ready to embrace the next chapter of her life. It won't be an easy transition, as public service has been a staple of her daily existence for so long. However, she welcomes the opportunity to see more of the world. Ohio, Hawaii and Idaho are on the travel agenda, as are trips to New Zealand, the Mediterranean and the Mississippi River.

"I sold my home two years ago so I could retire and become a full-time mayor," Fuentes said, noting that in 2016 she also wrapped up a nearly 30-year career at Northrop Grumman in order to focus completely on El Segundo. "El Segundo's geographical footprint is small, but we have a long reach due to our business community. I became even more involved in regional issues such as Los Angeles Air Force Base, Metro, transportation and homelessness."

Thinking back on her tenure on the Council, Fuentes recalls taking a "listen and learn" approach during her first year to learn the ropes. Told the City had a balanced budget when she took her oath in April 2010, she was surprised to find out a week later that it was actually a \$3.9 million deficit. She and her colleagues spent the next year in scramble mode, looking for ways to shore up the City's finances. One controversial proposal was a ballot measure to merge El Segundo Fire Department into LA County to save potentially a few million annually. Fuentes vehemently opposed it, feeling that

maintaining the City's independence was a critical component of El Segundo's ability to provide the best possible services to its residents and businesses. In her mind, the City would have to look at other means to boost revenues—specifically through economic development. As far back as 2011, Fuentes spoke of the need for "a strategic plan and vision" and that came to fruition a few years later when the Council adopted its first longrange strategic plan that it continues to hone each summer.

While the quest for fiscal solvency understandably dominated the proceedings during her first term, Fuentes said that Council decisions over the past four years finally began to pay off in that regard. "The most

important accomplishment over my second term was that we structurally balanced the budget," she said. "My first term, we sold off property – a bad idea – such as the original Fire Station #2 site, land off Imperial, as well as cars. That was not structural."

Fuentes emphasized that achieving a structurally balanced budget was a difficult challenge, but the City managed to provide services, reach agreements with unions, pay down unfunded pension liability and bolster technology to catch up with today's needs. Other key commitments included allocations to improve local infrastructure and funding for critical new City positions such as an information systems director and

Loye emailed prior to the meeting, "Sometimes I have to pinch myself because I can't believe how fortunate I am. Not many people get to live and work within a one-mile radius. I've lived in El Segundo for about 37 years and love this place. Working at Richmond these past 14 years has been amazing. The administration has

At least two different residents have received identical scam letters from what appear to be the same source demanding money or else a "secret" will be exposed. The recipient is instructed to pay exactly \$8,800 via Bitcoin and are provided instructions on how to make payment. You can view samples of the actual scam letter and instructions that were received by a resident on the El Segundo Police Department Facebook page May 18 post.

If you receive this letter please do not fall for the scam. Do not pay anything. This appears to be a scam letter being sent out to multiple people and the crook undoubtedly hopes someone falls for it.

Purse Snatchers Apprehended by ESPD

On May 13 at 3:51 p.m., officers arrested two individuals who are suspected of being involved with the theft of a purse from an 89-year-old woman. 



The final leg of the El Segundo High School spring sports ended for one team in thrilling fashion while another continued their playoff run in a rout. The baseball team's recent success over the past few seasons meant that the CIF Southern Section's decision to reward the Eagles was placing them in Division 2. The softball team, which has done well, was quite content in playing in the Division 5.

Baseball Team Loses Heartbreaker

The Eagles, the Ocean League champions, were gunning for their 20th win of the season in the first round of the CIF Southern Section Division 2 playoffs. Playing in the Division 2 playoffs meant the highest division El Segundo had played in since 1996 when head coach Billy Traber was a junior pitching for the Eagles. The Eagles first round playoff game paired them with Alemany, the third place team from the Mission League. This game became a classic pitchers' duel between El Segundo's Jaime Galicia and Alemany's Blaine Traxel. The Warriors scored their first run in the second inning when Jesse Parraz singled and went to third on Ethan Hagen's double off the right field fence. Dirk Ryan then lifted a fly ball to centerfield that scored Parraz for a 1-0 Alemany lead. Julian Rodriquez and Mateo Camano gave the Eagles hope with consecutive singles with two outs in the bottom of the second inning, but Traxel






Two Amazing and Different Reads

For this week's review, I couldn't pick between two slim but lovely volumes I've read recently. They are so different, but fantastic in their own unique ways.

Dear Fahrenheit 451: A Librarian's Love Letters and Break-Up Notes to the Books in Her Life by librarian Annie Spence is



an epistolary gem full of irreverent wit and snarky humor. In it, Spence features letters to books she loves and hates, essays about readers and libraries (including a lovely piece on the "magnificent Library featured in Beauty and the Beast Movie") and of course, tons of book suggestions. Spence's commentary spans diverse genres from romance to scifi, horror, and even cookbooks. I loved her humor and insights about books, reading and librarian tasks.

Backman's novella, And Every Morning the Way Home Gets Longer and Longer, is a cerebral homage to family relationships that endure despite misunderstandings, illness and even death. Part of the book takes place in a town square that represents what a grandfather grappling with Alzheimer's remembers of his life. As he loses parts of himself, struggling each day to recall the people, places and events that shaped his experiences, glimpses are interspersed of the

grandfather's life and relationships with his son, grandson and wife. I appreciated the graceful way Backman captured the time loss and confusion that many people with Alzheimer's experience and his beautiful handling of sensitive topics such as death and mental illness. Best read with tissues nearby, I found this slender tome elegant, gently comical and profoundly moving.

Unseen Footage Revealed in *Grey Gardens* Prequel, *That Summer*

If you're familiar with the documentary *Grey Gardens*, you're probably aware that it is arguably one of the most iconic American documentaries in cinema's history. *Grey Gardens* tells the story of an eccentric mother and daughter -- Big and Little Edie Beale -- who chose to extricate themselves from high society in order to live together

with the Beales (close to four rolls of film) went on to become *That Summer*.

That Summer is a small, quiet documentary that should excite fans of the Beales. Between Big Edie singing opera in her oversized armchair to Little Edie claiming that her cat with an eye disorder is the spitting image of Teddy Kennedy, the film is a fascinating collection of hilariously observed moments. With a runtime of 80 minutes, That Sum-

in a codependent, yet loving, relationship. This unusual decision and existence became the subject of *Grey Gardens*. The film's cult following in its devoted fan base would soon spark TV movies, numerous parodies and perfect Halloween costumes. This Friday, fans of *Grey Gardens* can go behind the scenes of the East Hampton estate where the Beales lived in never-before-seen footage that includes appearances by Andy Warhol, Truman Capote and Mick Jagger in the film *That Summer*.

The film opens slowly. Using entirely archival footage, we spend the first five minutes with photographer Peter Beard as he recounts stories while flipping through the pages of his photo book -- the most interesting being anecdotes of hanging out with Warhol and Jagger during the Studio 54 era. Through all of the glitz and glamour that Beard has photographed over the years, we find that with all of their peculiarities, there was no subject quite like the Beales. Beard, along with his friend Lee Radziwill (a cousin of Edith and Edie Beale), decide to chronicle the moments of this odd lifestyle at the crumbling Grey Gardens estate during one summer in 1972. The initial purpose of the film was to show how the East Hampton economy had changed over the years, and the run-down decrepit mansion was the perfect location and depiction.

However, after spending the summer with Radziwill and the Beales, the project was ultimately shelved. A few years later, directing duo Albert and David Maysles went back to visit Edith and Edie and the outcome of that visit resulted in the iconic and infamous documentary *Grey Gardens*. Forty-five years later, the original footage of Beard's summer

mer may confuse or be slightly off-putting to those who aren't already used to the nonsensical style of *Grey Gardens* or are expecting a documentary with a clear story of plot points, arc or direction. However, fans will be thrilled with the access to this never-before-seen footage that amplifies the eccentricity of the Beale women (who were also cousins of Jackie O.).

One may question if we really needed another documentary about the wildly wonderful Beales? Director Göran Olsson (*The Black Power Mixtape 1967-1975*) proves that there is never too much of a good thing, as he creates the perfect prequel to *Grey Gardens* with *Last Summer*. Although both Beale women have since passed, their memory will continue to live on in this iconic footage.

That Summer is not rated. 80 minutes. Opening this Friday in select theaters, now streaming on Amazon Prime Video. •

Privacy Rights Go Out With Trash

Strangers rummaging through garbage cans at the curbside have generated discussion on social media lately. Residents are understandably concerned about protecting their homes from opportunistic thieves lurking about. Are scavengers who dig through your barrels breaking the law?

The household trash placed at the curb isn't protected by law, but that doesn't mean it's okay to take the contents of the barrel either. That's the consensus, based on comments left at the neighbor-to-neighbor website called Nextdoor.com. Homeowners lose all rights over trash when it's put out at curbside, according to a U.S. Supreme Court case that sent a drug trafficker to prison in 1988.

However, the recyclables in the blue barrels and bins belong to the cities...and removing bottles and cans is breaking the law. That is the opinion of several city attorneys in Los Angeles County and a belief shared by several residents who took part in an animated discussion on Nextdoor.com.

Before getting to their comments, here's a brief review of the 30-year-old Supreme Court case back when trash barrels were metal -- not plastic -- and before recycling was a common household term.

The justices in a 1988 California case decided that any right to privacy or from unreasonable search and seizure is defined by a homeowner's property line. If the garbage cans are on private property, they're off limits to police without a search warrant as well as to scavengers. Since the case was decided, identity theft has become a huge problem, giving South Bay residents another reason for concern.

It is common knowledge," the justices wrote, that "garbage left on or at the side of the public street are readily accessible to animals, children, scavengers, snoops and other members of the public."

South Bay residents posting on the social media report seeing cars pull up in front of their houses in daylight and at night. Occupants of the vehicles get out of the car, lift the lids on the green and blue trash bins, and pick through the discards before the garbage collector arrives. Neighbors say it makes them nervous knowing that prying eyes are going through their once-personal property.

One resident found a solution. She places her green and blue trash bins at the end of her driveway, so they're on private property. She warned the scavengers they were trespassing and they haven't come back since the encounter, she wrote on Nextdoor.com.

Other residents are empathetic to the plight of the scavengers who come looking for aluminum cans, glass and plastic bottles they can redeem for cash. Residents admit to feeling

torn about wanting to help the less fortunate versus the homeowners' lack of privacy and security in plain sight. "They're just trying to make a living," one resident said in a post." And frankly, they are recycling stuff [scrap metal] that would end up in landfills."

Still, there is a sense of uneasiness among neighbors who report regular weekly visits ahead of the garbage collection trucks. Not even using a shredder to eliminate the risk of identity theft takes away the feeling that comes with knowing that remnants of your life are on public view at the curb. "It's still oddly invasive having someone go through your trash," one resident wrote on Nextdoor.com.

Some residents said they're willing to look the other way when scavengers go through the recyclables set out at curbside. Others insist it's stealing and the loss of revenue from the redemption of cans and bottles ultimately will lead to higher trash pickup rates for everyone.

One resident added that welcoming that kind of activity would increase property crimes, including residential burglaries and other crimes of opportunity committed by outsiders coming into the city. "I'm just as worried that these people are also casing houses, seeing whether you're home during the day or night, what you have parked in your driveway, what's in your car, etc.," the poster wrote. "It's naive to think someone who is already stealing wouldn't take the opportunity to grab something off your property -- or worse, load it in their car and leave."

The Los Angeles County District Attorney advises residents to shred their unwanted mail before tossing it into the trash barrel. Unsolicited offers for credit cards or personal loans contain sensitive information, including a person's name and address that identity thieves use in their crimes, according to the DA's office.

A South Bay legal expert says that privacy rights are thrown out with the weekly garbage unless a homeowner takes precautions to keep prying eyes from seeing what's inside those barrels. "Keeping trash bins closer to your home before a scheduled pickup may offer less exposure of your personal information during that time," said a column about the subject co-written by Donie Vanitzian, a mediator based on Marina del Rey. "But as the [Supreme] court stressed, it is unlikely anything can prevent other owners -- especially nosy ones -- from snooping through your trash bins once they are subject to public access."

Vanitzian added there's little to do to prevent police and determined snooping neighbors from getting into your curbside trash and learning something about you that you'd prefer to keep hidden. •



What is "Escrow"?

Is it a process? A company? A person? The answer is a smidgen of all three. The word "escrow" comes from the Old French *escroue* meaning "roll of parchment" or paper representing the deed or asset a neutral third party would hold until the completion of a transaction. In our modern and litigious times however, escrow can have an illusory nature, and be vague and confusing for first-timers. Until you have been through the process, you cannot fully wrap your head around and appreciate how escrow works and what to anticipate. A successful escrow is the product of an experienced team of real estate, title, and escrow professionals united in cause to guide you through this relatively timely, yet very important process.

Trust the Process!

At its essence, escrow is a process. Escrow usually "opens" when a fully executed purchase agreement has been delivered to a neutral third party, or escrow holding company. The escrow holding company is chosen by mutual agreement between both parties of the sale. You might see a duration of 5-60 days, depending on the complexity or necessity of a buyer or seller's situation. The duration, or escrow period, is also determined by mutual agreement between the parties.

After escrow opens, the escrow holder will order a property title search with the title company chosen by the parties in the contract, and prepare joint escrow instructions. These instructions are reviewed and approved by the two parties involved in the transaction (with help from their agents, of course!). Once agreed upon by both sides, the instructions are signed by buyer and seller. These instructions basically tell the escrow officer what to do and when to do it, and give her the authority to do her job. But, not all components of a transaction are handled through escrow. The purchase agreement (contract) contains several items that are handled by others, such as requests for repairs, exchanging personal property, removal of contingencies, liquidated damages, and disputes handled through arbitration and mediation.

When an escrow has "closed", this means that all of the conditions of the escrow have

been met, the loan has funded, documents have been recorded, and the property and proceeds have legally changed hands. So, what happens in between?

Escrow are people, too!

And very important ones, at that. Just what is an escrow officer? She is a person that works for an escrow holding company. Sounds easy, right? Think again.

She will process the escrow and handle the monies and documents from beginning to end, and her duties are numerous. The presiding escrow instructions are the framework for the escrow officer. She must be a master of her paperwork, including: escrow instructions, amendments, grant deeds and quitclaim deeds, estimated and final closing statements as well as HUD-1 documents required by lenders. She also facilitates the request, delivery, and signing of documents for all parties.

She must comply with local, county, state and federal requirements. If the buyer is financing, she will work with the lender to help grease the wheels on the loan approval and underwriting process, satisfy the lender's conditions, and organize signing loan documents. She will handle closing funds, okay the release and recording of documents, and is on the hook for all financial accounting related to the transaction. Another large part of her job is requesting payoff demands and lien releases, and working to ensure that free and clear title is conveyed to the buyer and in compliance with the lender.

She may have one of the most demanding jobs in real estate. She is the go-between to which all buyers, sellers, borrowers, lenders, real estate brokers, and title companies look for the legal, efficient and competent execution of an escrow. She is the channel for all parties and the nerve center where sellers, buyers, real estate agents, and lenders go for updates, questions, and problems.

People often underestimate the value of a good escrow officer. Not all escrow companies are created equal. The escrow officer should be trustworthy, reputable and efficient; she just might be the difference between you getting a set of keys or rough, turbulent seas.

always been supportive and forward-thinking, the staff is welcoming and fun to work with. I have been blessed with having fantastic first grade teachers on my team. One of the perks of my career is to make friends with he families of students. I often have had other siblings. It really makes you feel like a family friend there is lots of shared history with them. Nothing is quite as special as seeing current or former students around town and being recognized. It is nice to know that although I won't be teaching anymore, I still get to keep up friendships with both students and staff. I have loved my years at Richmond Street School."

Cash worked for the District for 24 years and was the lead teacher for The Learning Connection after-school care program. Sturgeon, a Center Street School (CSS) Instructional aide for more than two decades, garnered the District's Classified Employee of the Year honors in 2015.

Joan Moon, who was unable to attend the meeting, also works as an instructional assistant and has been employed by the District since 2004.

Outgoing student representative to the Board Jake Nichols, after he gave his report, was recognized for his service this year. An emotional Board President Emilee Layne thanked Nichols for his time and wished him well in his college endeavors.

The Board also singled out Southern California Regional Occupational Center (SoCal ROC) student Ricardo Mickens, who was selected to receive a Beach Cities Masonic Lodge scholarship for his outstanding achievement in Career Technical Education.

Prior to the meeting. Board member Dr. Bill Watkins, a long-time proponent of the SoCal ROC program, emailed that the Board was "honored to recognize" Mickens, a senior at El Segundo High School, for his accomplishments in SoCal ROC's School of Art and Design. El Segundo High Principal Dr. Jennifer Tedford spoke at the meeting, extolling the alternate path Mickens has taken to further his schooling.

CSS received recognition for its selection as a Green Ribbon School by the California Department of Education (CDE). The CDE recognizes educational entities for "excellence in resource efficiency, health and wellness, and environmental and sustainability education."

In an email about the accolades bestowed on her school, CSS Principal Martha Monahan wrote, "We are very proud to be recognized by the California Department of Education for the work that we are doing at Center Street to conserve resources and minimize our carbon footprint. With support from Chevron and our school district, we were able to replace shrubs in our large planters with native, drought-tolerant plants. This has not only made our campus more attractive, but it has also cut our water usage significantly. We are excited about our plans to create a new learning garden for our students that will be accessible, water-wise, and will feature California native plants."

Monahan and her PTA president Tracey Miller-Zarneke then made a quick presentation about the strides being made on campus to "Go Green." Layne lauded the ecological efforts at CSS, noting "we are here to educate in so many ways."

The penultimate presentation of the evening revolved around the proposed installation of a mural on a District shed at Arena High, highlighting the work being done by the Arena art students. Board members applauded the students' efforts and pledged support for the mural.

During the consent agenda, the Board approved a contract with the Stanford SCALE team to provide Next Gen Science Standards professional development for El Segundo Middle School (ESMS); an agreement to mark year two with P.S. Arts to continue enriching the District's elementary schools; an arrangement with Paragon Systems Solution for new data cabling services; and an agreement with the Los Angeles County of Education to provide accounting services to the District.

The program with the Stanford SCALE team will allow middle school science teachers to participate in an "intensive" five-day workshop commencing on June 25. This will afford the opportunity for the instructors to continue to grow and refine their breadth of knowledge and teaching skills.

P.S. Arts will again work with the District to provide enrichment for students at CSS and RSS and ensure students are able to take advantage of a top-notch visual arts curriculum.

Action items quickly passed included approval of a Spanish textbook for students at ESMS as well as that school's summer reading list; and tentative agreements between the District and its employees as contracts are negotiated for the upcoming school year.

Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore then noted the upcoming informational calendar, which includes multiple school-site open houses, leading to District promotion and graduation ceremonies calendared for June 15. "This is one of the busiest times of the year, but it is one of the best times of the year," she said.

Board member reports followed, with Watkins and other members marveling over the construction progress being made at the El Segundo Aquatics Center, as work continues on Douglas Street heading towards a planned September grand opening.

In her report, Layne spoke of school site safety concerns, and the fact that the Board was doing everything possible to make sure District campuses are as safe and secure as possible.

In other news, Tedford emailed prior to the meeting that last Thursday's town hall meeting, held to discuss revisions to the District's Long-Range Facilities Master Plan, garnered a "much bigger turnout" than the first gathering. She noted that the individuals she spoke with about proposed changes at the high school "seemed positive about the recommendations."

The next regularly scheduled El Segundo School Board meeting is slated for Tuesday evening, June 12, with the open session commencing at 7 p.m. in the District Boardroom, located at 641 Sheldon St. •

an emergency services manager. The latter was a long-term priority for Fuentes. "I am pleased [Emergency Services Manager] Randy Collins was hired," she said. "He is working with community members as well as the City and has collaborated with LA Air Force Base and outside agencies."

Maintaining the Air Force Base as an economic hub for El Segundo and the South Bay was also a top objective for Fuentes and she leveraged her position by working with the South Bay Aerospace Alliance (SBAA), South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG) and Los Angeles Economic Development Corporation (LAEDC) on aerospace as well as other regional issues. Speaking of the LAEDC, that agency awarded the City a second "Eddy" in 2015 as the "most business-friendly city" in LA County (small city category). "We are proud to have won this award twice," Fuentes said. "It's a

testament to the job our staff does and the overall appeal El Segundo has as a business destination." The proof was in the pudding when the City exceeded its goal of attracting 100 new businesses by the time of its January 2017 centennial milestone and continues to welcome prominent new companies to town. As for that 100th birthday, celebrated with a year-long slate of festivities, Fuentes remarked, "I was honored and blessed to be El Segundo's centennial mayor."

Fuentes was reflective when considering the challenges ahead for her successors. She emphasized the importance of remaining proactive in order to rein in growing pension costs that take up more of the City's budget with each passing year. She also pointed out the difficulty in maintaining a full staff - particularly in the police department where sworn personnel are still well below allotted numbers. "El Segundo is small, so it's difficult to give

employees opportunities and challenge them," Fuentes said. "The growth opportunity can be challenging since some departments only have two or three levels. Senior employees must leave or retire for junior employees to promote. As in all industries, the expectations for lifelong employment has changed with employees changing jobs and careers more often. Due to bargaining unit constraints, our City department managers can't move employees around to other departments to provide stretch assignments and cross training opportunities. As I commented several times from the dais when employees left us for promotions, we were sad to see them leave but happy for their growth opportunities and knowing our managers had a done a great job preparing them for their new jobs."

As for what advice she has for the new Council, Fuentes noted that it's not really advice per se. "Just prepare yourself... most things take longer in local government due to state laws and labor negotiations," she warned. "Our newest Council members both work in private industry where decisions are made and actions taken quickly. They will learn about government constraints."

Not two days went by after officially leaving the Council that Fuentes received a special invitation from the White House to join in Cinco de Mayo festivities in Washington. She found it a fitting way to cap off her eight years. "It has been an amazing ride," she said of her time on the Council and as the mayor. "I appreciate the hard work my colleagues put in as well as our amazing City employees to make El Segundo a better place. I also thank our businesses for their support and our residents who care so much about the community. El Segundo will always be my heart and soul no matter where I might be on the globe at the time." •


