School Board Views Multiple Special Presentations

The Tuesday night meeting of the El Segundo Unified School District School Board featured special presentations including an Arena High student update, the recognition of outgoing student representative to the Board Lexi Griffin, the annual District PTA report, the feting of outgoing High School Band director Steven Fox, recognition of District certificated and classified retirees, and a presentation about the Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Biomedical Pathway development at the High School.

Executive Director of Educational Services Marisa Janicek made the first presentation, introducing some of her students, who collaborated to give an Arena High student update, citing the benefits of attending Arena, which included smaller class sizes, and increased teacher one-on-one attention.

Student representative to the Board Griffin. who is wrapping up her time serving with the Board, then made her presentation, which was followed by her recognition

The annual report of school site PTA President's was next on the presentation agenda. The site president's and District council president Michelle Lawson reported on school-site activities, volunteer hours, as well as financial gifts made to each District school.

The Board then recognized band director Fox for his "significant contributions to the development of the District's music pathway and award-winning High School band.

In an email sent prior to the meeting, Fox wrote that "I am extremely honored that the Board is recognizing me. The past eleven years at El Segundo High has been a wonderful experience. A lifetime of memories that I will cherish." Much thanks goes out to the parents, students, band staff, school staff, Administration, District, and School Board for making it a great journey."

Dylan Farris, the District's Executive Director of Human Resources, then took to the podium

to lead the recognition of retiring District employees. Teachers Linda Brown (19 years of service) and Wendy Nocket (16 years) were honored, as were classified employees Juan Mosquera (38 years); Gable Solomon (36 years); Hector Najera (24 years); Stephanie Fujii (22 years); Cheri Borchert (20 years); Glenn Miller (19 years; and Irene Kasch (two

Nocket, a math/science teacher working at the Middle School, is retiring after working 37 years as a teacher. Nocket began the Ocean Day Safety program when she began her tenure at ESMS in 2000, and has participated in the very-popular Outdoor Science School since her arrival. Mosquera who has worked as a relief bus driver, maintenance helper, general maintenance worker and plumber in the District, is most proud of his work as Girl's Soccer Coach, garnering Coach of the Year accolades. Solomon, the senior High School custodian, was a cherished member of the ESHS staff, and his retirement "send-off" was a highly-attended ceremony where he was lauded for his morethan three decades of service to the District.

Najera, who worked for 15 years in the District, retired from his job as night custodian, and is currently enjoying his retirement, travelling. Fujii, a Richmond Street instructional aide specializing in reading intervention, started working for the District in 1994, and noted that she has "been to more Little League games, basketball games, and dance recitals than she can count." Borchert, an instructional aide at Richmond Street, has worked as a noon-duty supervisor at both of the District's elementary schools, organizing noon-time sports at the

Jacobson Reflects on Nearly a Quarter Century of City Council Service

Not long after he rejoined the El Segundo City Council in 2004 for the second of what turned out to be two separate 12-year stints, Carl Jacobson received a new moniker from then-Mayor Kelly McDowell: the "Institutional Memory of the City." Considering that Jacobson had previously served on the dais between 1984 and 1996 (the last eight years as Mayor), he brought with him extensive knowledge of past issues that faced El Segundo and background on virtually every key decision made---as well as vast experience with countless committees, commissions, boards, agencies, cities and citizen groups connected to local quality of life matters. At the time, Jacobson didn't expect to stay on for another dozen years and end up at 24 total to make him the longest-serving City Council member in the history of El Segundo. "I felt there were still important things left undone," he said of his continued and successful election runs. "Although there is always more to be done, I am leaving the City knowing it's in the best shape it has been in for a long time and I am confident the new Council will continue to be good stewards of our community."

Trying to narrow down the highlights of Jacobson's career on the Council is not a simple task given the sheer scope of accomplishments. He broke down some past achievements covering various areas


Obituaries

Friends School and Green Street Friends Quaker Meeting. In El Segundo he was involved in the Cable Committee, the Garden Club and RSVP.

He will be dearly missed by his family and is survived by his wife of 55 years, Barbara Pinchuk; his brother Alan Pinchuk and wife Judy; his 3 daughters, Miriam Pinchuk and her husband Rupert Clayton, Melissa (Pinchuk) Fisher and Sandy Fisher, and Julia (Pinchuk) McCormick, as well as 2 grandsons, Max and Peyton McCormick.

Arlene Josephine Kirkwold February 23, 1915 – May 17, 2016





Author Fair Gets Expressive in 16th Annual Event at Library

The El Segundo Public Library Author Fair returns on Sunday, June 12 with more than 30 authors and poets slated to be onhand for the 16th annual installment of the popular event. With the theme "Express Yourself...Through Writing. Art. Music," the 2016 festivities will include appearances from several notables from the creative realm. Heading the list are songwriter/ musician/authors Charles Wright, who appropriately enough penned the early '70s hit "Express Yourself" and recently published his autobiography Up From Where We've Come; and Bobby Hart, who along with the late Tommy Boyce wrote numerous classics for The Monkees ("Last Train to Clarksville"), Chubby Checker and other musical luminaries. Boyce and Hart were also performers in their own right. For his writing debut, Hart composed a memoir entitled Psychedelic Bubble Gum: Boyce & Hart, The Monkees, and Turning Mayhem into Miracles. Other prominent authors on board include Attica Locke, Julie Claiborne Johnson and Maggie Shipstead (Fiction); Neal Griffin, Diane Vallere, Jeri Westerson and Gwendolyn Womack (Mystery); and Derek Kent (Children's).

"We chose this year's theme to incorporate all elements of creative expression that the Author Fair promotes, including our authors, the El Segundo Art Association-whose art will be on display during the event—and the live music," said Senior Librarian Julie Todd. "But since our past fairs have always been eclectic, we're also adding some Mysteryliterally—to the mix with a panel focused on that genre."

Additional event highlights will include book purchases and signings; two author panels; balloon art courtesy of Boom Boom Balloon Man; Children's Puppet-Making Workshop (in the Children's Library between 3 and 4 p.m.) led by Sarah Woloski; raffle prizes (handed out at the panels), and a broad mix of live music from the Smoky Hollow Band (American Traditional), Andy and Renee (Folk), Planet Queens (Singer/Songwriter Tribute) as well as original tunes from Paul Zollo, Jill Freeman, Gary Stockdale and Lisa Johnson. "We will also have a photo booth where participants can take selfies with their friends, family or possibly even their favorite author," Todd said.

The first panel, "Expressing Yourself Through Writing," runs from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. and will be a how-to for those interested in writing/publishing. Screenwriter and Library Board member Kevin Smith will serve as moderator with the aforementioned Claiborne Johnson, Hart, Locke and Wright as panelists along with Fiction writers Parnaz Foroutan, and Andrew Roe.

Griffin will moderate the second panel, "Confessions of the Best Local Mystery Writers," from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. Vallere, Westerson and Womack will be the panelists, along with Mike Befeler, Joel Fox and Terri Nolan (who writes crime stories based in the Los Angeles area).

Other authors appearing at the event will include Larry Bridges (poetry), Elena Karina Byrne (Poetry), Jennifer Caloyeras (Young Adult), Charles Epting (Historic LA), Liz Fenton (Chick/Pop), Jamie Asaye FitzGerald (Poetry), Jake Gerhardt (Children's), Rachel M. Harper (Fiction), Peggy Hesketh (Fiction), Charlottte Innes (Poetry), Jessi Kirby (Young Adult), Sharael Kolberg (Memoir), Laura Levine (Mystery), Gabriel Meyer (Poetry), Nadine Nettman (Mystery), Tao Nyeu (Children's), Lisa Occhipinti (Decorating/Book Art), Nina Sadowsky (Thriller/ Fiction), Nancy Webber (Art/Non-Fiction) and Mariano Zaro (Poetry).

In addition to checking out the panels, attendees can get books signed on the Library Main Floor between 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m., 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. and 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. Children's author/illustrator signings (Gerhardt, Kent and Nyeu) will take place in the Children's Library between 2 and 3 p.m. Meanwhile, Meyer—a long-time El Segundo resident-will again host the annual Poetry Corner in the Main Floor Rose Garden Room from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. Bridges, Byrne, FitzGerald,Innes and Zaro will handle the readings and sign

Also of note, the Library will debut its first-ever Adult Summer Reading Program this year with sign-ups officially starting up during the Author Fair. The inaugural theme is "A Book is Your Passport... Travel. Explore. Read." Adults 18 and over can participate in the festivities that will include a Book Buzz Tea kick-off event, with additional programs and prize incentives along the way.

school sites. Miller worked for the District as the warehouse operator and driver, travelling to each District school site on a daily basis, developing relationships with administrators, teachers, and students. Kasch, who works as accountant in the Business Services Department, came to the District after a long-tenure in the Lennox School District.

Emailed Superintendent Moore "ESUSD is fortunate to have dedicated employees in both classified and certificated service. We wish the employees the very best as they enjoy many new opportunities ahead."

Executive Director of Educational Services Marisa Janicek then introduced the High School Biomedical Pathway development presentation. The presentation, made by outgoing Biomed instructor Erica Zug, detailed how the implementation of the Biomed pathway has given interested students the opportunity to become engaged in the field of science, and prepare them to begin the process to become innovative and productive leaders in the fields of science, technology and medicine.

President Garza thanked Zug for her work in developing the Biomed program, citing her "passion and expertise that really made the program special."

Following the seven special presentations, the assembled Board members tackled the consent agenda, which listed six items, including an upcoming October assembly that is set to take place at Center Street School. Entitled "Walk through California," the presentation is designed to allow fourth grade student to "actively participate in a lively retelling of California history." Games, music and storytelling are part of the presentation, which will also include the usage of a large topographical map of the Golden State of California that will allow the students hands-on immersement in the states' history.

After the initial item on the action items docket, the acceptance of gifts to the District, the Board approved the High School Choir's trip to Hawaii that is slated to take place at the tail-end of March, 2017. The Royal Hawaiian Music Festival, a "competitive educational performance tour," will commence on March 23, and conclude on March 28. Approximately 50-60 students would travel to Oahu, with the cost of the excursion not to exceed \$2,100 per person. Students will fundraise and use parental donations to pay for the trip and experience, which is expected to include attendance at musical performances, attending "master classes," rehearsals, as well as a group hula lesson. Choir Director Summers informed the Board that each attending student would be receiving a \$300 scholarship from the festival organizers to help mitigate the cost.

The majority of the other action items on the Tuesday night agenda were the approval of multiple course offerings at both the Middle School and the High School. These 2016-17 courses had initially been placed before the Board members at the May 10 meeting as information pending action items. The Board also approved a vendor proposal from Sunesys, LLC, to increase the District's IT wide-area network, and a service agreement with Siemens Industry to provide a Districtwide heating, ventilation and air-conditioning (HVAC) preventative maintenance agreement and necessary software upgrades to the HVAC grid. The contract runs until June 30, 2017, at a cost to the District of \$199,760.


With no information pending action items on this Tuesday's agenda, Superintendent Moore then highlighted the District's informational calendar, with this Monday, Memorial Day, being a school holiday, and District promotion and graduation dates looming during the second week of June.

Board member reports then followed, Moore then made her Superintendent's report, and Garza closed the two-hour meeting after asking for a moment of silence for long-time El Segundo resident and District employee Arlene Kirkwold, who passed-away recently at the age of 101.

The next regularly scheduled Board meeting is set for Tuesday evening, June 14. •



Should They Stay or

Should They Trade?

The Los Angeles Lakers are coming off of their worst season in franchise history. That much is already known. People in L.A., however, are tired of hearing about how bad the team is and the string of bad averaging 23 points and six rebounds per game, but in a weak Eastern Conference, those points are almost to be expected from a player of his caliber. luck that the team has run into in the last six years or so. The NBA draft lottery held last Tuesday afternoon at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn, New York may have been just the thing that Lakers fans have been looking for. After walking away from the lottery with the second pick in this year's NBA draft, the Lakers now have options and sit in a pretty nice position. Should Los Angeles take who ever falls to them at the No. 2 pick, though? Or should the Lakers brass trade the pick for a veteran player that can help the team win now?

After finishing with the league's second worst record last season, the Lakers maintained the second pick in this year's NBA draft. There was much fear floating about that L.A. might fall out of the Top 3 in the lottery, in which case, their pick would have been forfeited to the Philadelphia 76ers. "After winning only 17 games, to then have lost the pick would have been brutal," Lakers publicist John Black said immediately following the lottery. It would certainly have been brutal for the Lakers, but imagine that for Philadelphia? Two of the Top 5 picks in this year's draft. Well, there is no need to imagine any longer. The Lakers kept their pick and now it's all about deciding what to do with it. There has been much talk lately that the rumor floating around the NBA is that the Lakers are going to shop their pick. In doing so, they will be giving up a chance to keep a Top 2 talent, and mortgaging that chance in order to take in a veteran that they would hope could contribute immediately.

One of the veterans whose name has been most bandied about is Paul George, currently of the Indiana Pacers. Another is Jimmy Butler of the Chicago Bulls. Theoretically, the Lakers could take the No. 2 pick that they just earned in this year's draft and either trade it to Indiana for George or to Chicago for Butler. Who knows, there may even be another team out there who would be willing to part with their superstar for the pick, too. No matter who is available in the trade market, however, (unless it's a Top 5 player in the league, obviously) the Lakers should absolutely not trade their pick for a veteran.

While George and Butler could bring immediate proven talent to the Lakers and perhaps put the team on the map again, both players have been injured in their careers and with injury comes the risk of yet another injury. In George's case, the star small forward is coming off of a devastating and gruesome broken leg. He rebounded nicely last season to lead his Pacers team to the playoffs while

Bulls shooting guard has continued to average right around 20 points and five rebounds per game.

Mortgaging the future for a player of George's or Butler's caliber would serve to benefit the team for only the two or three year's (barring another injury setback) that remain in those players respective primes. To trade an 18-19 year-old future star that will come into the NBA and fit together with the timeline that the Lakers already have in place would simply be foolish. Sure, a veteran of George's ilk would improve the team by 10 to maybe 15 wins per season. In the Eastern Conference, those numbers are drastic. In the West, however, that's barely a blip on the radar. Paul George on the Lakers may not even get the team to the playoffs. Ben Simmons or Brandon Ingram, however, would accelerate the Lakers rebuilding process and fit in perfectly with a young team who just hired a young coach that will most certainly be competing in the Western Conference in two or three years when Steph Curry, Kevin Durant and Russell Westbrook are all hitting the end of their primes.

Those who say that the Lakers would be best served to trade their pick in order to gain a free agent like George also argue that in doing so, it would tempt a big time player like Durant to also come to L.A. Unfortunately, there is close to a zero percent chance that Durant willingly chooses to come to the Lakers, no matter who else the Lakers have on the roster. What the Thunder have right now, is the second best roster in the Western Conference. There's no reason anyone would leave that, even if it were to join LeBron James. Lakers fans and analysts of the game need to realize that rebuilding is process and it takes patience. That is exactly what the Lakers are doing: rebuilding. The Lakers and all of their fans should realize that it takes time and while they build a roster full of young, top-tier talent, they can also use over \$62 million in salary cap space to add other veteran free agents (Harrison Barnes and DeMar DeRozan, to name a few) to round out the team and quickly become a force in the Western Conference.

Drafting the right way does a lot for a team's future. The Lakers have done that thus far. Add \$62 million to the mix and there's absolutely no question that the Lakers, with money alone, will attract the right kind of free agents to play alongside a young team and this year's number two overall pick that will undoubtedly take the Lakers to the next level, sooner, rather than later. •



"Maggie's Plan" is a Wonderfully Crafted Film About a Crazy Little Thing Called Love

Thanks to the likes of pop-culture entertainment such as "Sex and the City" and practically everything in Woody Allen's filmography, the Millennial generation has come to believe that finding true love in the concrete jungle that is New York City is among the most romantic of notions. Director Rebecca Miller defies this fantasy with her new film "Maggie's Plan," a wonderfully crafted film for the intelligentsia-sect that takes one woman's quest of subverting modern romantic convention by artificial insemination, leading to a hilarious deconstruction of uncharted adult life.

The woman with the plan is Maggie Hardin (Greta Gerwig), an independent, plaid-coat loving, thirty-something educator with babies on the brain. After complaining to her friends (played by the perfect comedic duo Bill Hader and Maya Rudolph) that she is incapable of loving someone for longer than six months, she decides that now is the time to start thinking about having children of her own, on her own, which leads her to a brilliant-but-miswired sperm donor (Travis Fimmel), who works as an artisan pickler.

Things get tricky when Maggie simultaneously meets and falls for fellow teacher John partners were artistically satisfied turns into a one-way street, where Maggie is the bridge over John's troubled water.

With such artsy hits as "Frances Ha" and "Mistress America," Greta Gerwig has more or less become the go-to actor for the unstereotypical NYC-dwelling hipster heroine and, as in the aforementioned films, she brings her signature bright-eyed optimism to the big screen. Her honest portrayal of Maggie is equally matched by Ethan Hawke's John, the self-tortured artist who becomes so wrapped up in his own wants and needs that he doesn't realize how much his actions are damaging his relationships. The Academy Award-winning Julianne Moore and her unexpected Danish accent prove that, given the right material, she is as much a comedic force as she is a dramatic one. Together, these three actors don't just provide superfluous laughs, they also strike sensitive chords at just the right moments, giving the film a lasting, full-bodied experience.

At its core, "Maggie's Plan" is an unconventional romantic comedy that also serves as a dose of therapy for those who may be feeling at a crossroads in their own personal lives. Maggie is a complex character with flaws, and that is exactly what makes her such a compelling

Harding (Ethan Hawke), a charming anthropology professor and struggling novelist whose round-wired spectacles perfectly compliment his geek-chic attire. Maggie thinks she's found "the one" in John, despite him already being married to the stone cold intellectual Georgette Harding (Julianne Moore), which doesn't stop an instantaneous affair. Flash forward a few years, and Maggie, now with a smiling infant girl, realizes the tangled web she's woven when the reality of her life with John sets in and is nothing like she thought it would be.

Rebecca Miller paints the portrait of a 21stcentury relationship in such a realistic way, where one's expectations of certain things tend to trump reality. In Maggie's case, she wanted a child and love, and at first, she thought she successfully constructed it. The dynamics that set the tone of the relationship in the beginning, however, quickly shift, drowning Maggie in the process. Her ideal relationship where both character to root for. Maggie's plans pivot within each act, all to hilarious results. From choosing a sperm donor to raise a child on her own, to wanting a child with her lover John, to wanting to leave John and go back to the way things were, Maggie shows us that it is ok to change one's mind, and that what seemed like a good thing at one point in our lives may not be in our future selves' best interests.

No matter your age, we may not have everything figured out, and that's ok. It is ok to make mistakes, especially if those mistakes bring you closer to figuring out who you really are, and what you really want. However, if there is one thing we can take away from Maggie Hardin's experience, it's that sometimes, the best plan, is no plan.

California voters can expect a barrage of campaign promises from presidential candidates as they compete in California's delegate-rich primary on June 7.

How can voters know if the candidates are giving it to them straight or spinning the facts? Well, the truth is out there.


There are a couple of websites called Factcheck.org and Politifact.org that closely follow every debate, campaign speech and interview given by candidates elected offices. Their role in the cancer deaths in America.

current campaign is to check the accuracy of the claims politicians make in public. Neither is affiliated with a political party or accepts corporate donations to avoid suspicion.

One is run by a public university. The other is staffed by an independent-minded Florida newspaper.

The Herald contacted Factcheck.org and asked how it decides which political claims to investigate, and about being fair and balanced to the candidates.

"It is important for fact checkers to guard against selection bias," said Eugene Kiely, the Factcheck.org director. "In a presidential year, we cover every debate on both sides (that included in the early going two GOP debates a night) and we cover both conventions (all the major speeches, such as the keynote address, the nominating speeches and the prime-time speeches)."

The staff includes a Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist, a Penn University professor in communication, and a science writer and researcher. The factcheck team investigates claims, some of which are suggested by the readers.

"We review transcripts of all Sunday talk shows (CNN, FOX News, ABC, NBC and CBS.) This is a staple of our coverage. We do this every year, not just presidential years," Kiely said.

"The idea is to draw matesources that provide an equal

opportunity for review of claims made by Republicans and Democrats."

Factcheck.org monitors the accuracy of political TV ads, debates, speeches, and news releases, too.

The team's work follows the national news as the candidates descend on California, with 341 Republican delegates at stake and 548 Democrat delegates. Recent topics lend support to Factcheck.org's assertion that it's an equal-opportunity examiner of claims made on the political trail.

They include:

- "Trump on Hairspray and Ozone"
- "Harry Reid's Wild Exaggerations"
- "Sanders False Income Claim"

The fact-check team also looked into the Zika outbreak in Brazil, a reported cancellation





of National Prayer Day, and hotly contested Senate races in Ohio and Pennsylvania. In non-election years, the fact-check team reviews every speech and press conference given by the president, Kiely told the Herald.

Factcheck.org is a nonprofit and nonpartisan project of the Annenberg Public Policy Center at the University of Pennsylvania.

Editors and reporters from the Tampa Bay Times comprise the staff of PolitiFact, which checks claims made by elected officials and politicians. The journalists also serve as a watchdog on the political commentators, known as pundits, whose remarks wield considerable influence in the media.

PolitiFact rates the accuracy of statements made by the candidates, placing them in categories that range from "True" and "Mostly True" to "Mostly False" and their lowest rating "Pants on Fire." It also investigates viral media and rumors on the web, and rates President Obama's top 25 promises.

The web site lists the truthfulness of statements about the number of cancer deaths per day in the United States (Joe Biden), the U.S. coal industry (Hillary Clinton), and Puerto Rico's national debt (Bernie Sanders). Also, they rated Donald Trump's assessment of the crime rate in Germany.

Biden misstated that 3,000 people in America die of cancer every day. That number of deaths includes Central and South America, PolitiFact noted in correcting the vice president.

PolitiFact's team looked into a viral Facebook post that President Obama canceled National Day of Prayer, Olympic gold medal sprinter Usain Bolt's claims that Zika-carrying mosquitoes can't catch him, and whether marijuana is a Schedule 1 drug that is offlimits for medical research.

So, who's paying for these fact-check projects? The Annenberg Foundation originally was the funding source for Factcheck.org until 2010 when it began accepting donations from individuals. Factcheck.org says it has never accepted any funds from corporation, unions, partisan or advocacy groups. The average donation is \$55, and five donors gave \$1,000 or more last year, according to an annual statement from the group.

PolitiFact says its primary source of funding are the advertisers and subscribers to the Tampa Bay Times. It also accepted a grant from the Democracy Fund, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, the group says on its web site, http://www.politifact.org.

Political researchers who accept corporate funding run a risk, as a 2015 UCLA-led study of media bias noted. UCLA political scientist Tim Groseclose and University of

Missouri economist Jeffrey Milyo paid student researchers from their own salaries and some university funds. The decision to seek outside funding is rare in scholarly research, UCLA noted.

"No matter the results, we feared our findings would've been suspect if we'd received support from any group that could be perceived as right- or left-leaning," Groseclose said in

a press release from UCLA.

The Eagles countered in their half of the first inning with Alyssa Pelegrin's two-run homerun followed by Julie Roach's solo bomb to give the Eagles a 3-1 lead. The Warriors came back in the second inning to score four unearned runs and led 5-3 in the fifth inning. In the bottom of the fifth, Cierra Kessler's RBI single easily scored Allison Tatnal. Pelegrin's RBI double tied the game at 5-5.

In an exciting seventh inning that saw each team have an opportunity to score, both teams' defense came through in the clutch. A lead off double by West pitcher Mailee Newman went for naught when she was picked off going to third base on a ground to Pelegrin. In the bottom of the seventh inning Nayeli Diaz and Tatnall each singled. Kessler's sacrifice put runners in scoring position. Pelegrin, who has eight home runs on the year, was intentionally walked to load the bases with one out. The Eagles squandered their opportunity with a pop up and a ground out.

Neither team could muster up any offense until the Warriors scored two runs in the eleventh inning. In the bottom half, the Eagles

loaded the bases with one out and the top of the lineup coming up. Tatnall blasted a line drive that seemed destined to left-centerfield to potentially tie and maybe win the game. But shortstop Mia Wyatt made the leap of her life and caught the ball. She quickly tossed to third base for the force out and just like that El Segundo's season was a memory.

It was a tough and agonizing way to go out for the Eagles. Having worked through adversity throughout the year, the Eagles were deserving of a win against a solid West Torrance team. But it wasn't to be and with a senior heavy team the underclassman will no doubt use this game as a learning lesson.

"We were right there and had plenty of chances but we made too many physical errors and a few mental ones that cost us. Overall I'm still proud of each and every player on

where he felt made a positive difference. On the development side, he and the Council of the time worked to place Downtown power and utility lines underground to help beautify the area; completed a new general plan in less than a year with full public participation; saw El Segundo win two Most Business-Friendly City awards, including the first one ever handed out by the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation as well as the 2015 honors; brought in the Plaza El Segundo and The Point complexes as well as Elevon and various creative office projects; and paved the way for the upcoming Lakers facility, four new hotels and the future Raytheon South Campus development.

For infrastructure, Jacobson was part of the leadership that oversaw the Douglas Street Gap Closure, Douglas/Nash two-way street conversions, other street improvements, Southern California Edison issue resolutions, sewer pump station overhauls, El Segundo and Aviation boulevard improvements, and current Richmond Street rehabilitation, among other items.

Jacobson considers the retention of Los Angeles Air Force Base in El Segundo as one of his most important successes. "During the 1991 BRAC [Base Realignment and Closures], a group of us collaborated to find housing options for Air Force personnel as a way to keep the Base here," he said. "We also formed a coalition and went to Washington, D.C. to lobby for the Base."

Regarding LAX, Jacobson was a key figure in the 2005 settlement agreement that yielded funding for residential sound insulation in town while also limiting passenger gate capacity. Other achievements included persuading the FAA to change navigation procedures in just three months (as opposed to the normal oneyear wait) to reduce noise in the northwest residential area; and installing an early turn camera system.

Public safety enhancements included the completion of Fire Station 2, the Fire Station 1 expansion/retrofit and recent ladder truck purchase, and addition of a second paramedic unit. Jacobson added that he strongly opposed Measure P in 2012 that would have merged the local fire department with Los Angeles County.

"It is important we maintain our independence as well as our ability to retain our EMT and paramedic resources," he said. In a related program, Jacobson is credited as a founder of Super CPR Saturday—an annual event that trains citizens in basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation. He has volunteered at every past event and said he will continue to do so despite his Council retirement.

Recreation and Parks accomplishments included the opening of the beach facility and lifeguard station at the end of Grand Avenue; the completion of the Campus El Segundo Athletic Fields; various park upgrades (including the recent re-opening of Hilltop Playground that is considered a model facility for the entire state); original arrangement to construct The Lakes golf course and driving range; numerous library additions and improvements; and the move to bring a new aquatics facility to town in the next couple of years.

"I am excited about the state-of-the-art pool coming to the future Wiseburn site, but I hope the next Council makes sure to finally fix our Plunge, which should never be allowed to fall by the wayside," Jacobson said, adding that he was part of the Council votes that authorized major past renovations to that facility (e.g. new architecturally-appropriate windows) and got the Urho Saari Swim Stadium classified as El Segundo's first and still-only historical building. For local seniors, Jacobson was instrumental in bringing Park Vista housing to town without using federal funds. He also worked to expand and upgrade the Joslyn Center. And on the subject of schools, he and his wife Nancy (a long-time local schoolteacher) were charter members of the El Segundo Education Foundation's Superintendent's Roundtable. As part of the Council, Jacobson helped craft the joint use agreement allowing the City to utilize various campus facilities when not in use by the school and for El Segundo Unified to do the same for City facilities. He was also key in starting the City/school library affiliation agreement.

Mayor Suzanne Fuentes recently remarked that if the City had an issue that impacted local quality of life, Jacobson served on a related commission-twice. His resume of involvement encompasses just about every commission, committee and board ever formed in El Segundo. The list includes LAX Area Advisory Committee, FAA Roundtable, Aviation Safety & Noise Abatement Committee, Senior Citizens Housing Board, Hyperion Citizens Forum, Los Angeles County Sanitation District, Chevron Community Advisory Panel, Los Angeles Vector Control, South Bay Regional Communications Authority, Community Emergency Response Team,

and El Segundo Disaster Council. For good measure, he has also served as a Planning Commissioner and El Segundo Chamber Board member, and is a docent at the Automobile Driving Museum. "I love classic cars," Jacobson admitted.

Jacobson continues to work as IT director at the El Segundo-based Glentek. With a sudden influx of free time available with his Council duties wrapped up, he said he plans to "finally go on that vacation" with his wife and hang out more with his two daughters and five grandchildren. And he still enjoys getting on his ham radio—a long-time hobby—and dabbling in home improvement projects.

"I will miss being on the Council, but I'm not going anywhere," he said. "I'll continue to be involved in the community and you'll see me at different events. And if the City needs my input about something, they know where to find me. It has been a wonderful experience serving the people of El Segundo. The residents and businesses have been great and I appreciate everyone's support. It has meant a lot. Most of all, I have to thank my wife and family for standing behind me. I would never have been able to manage all these years without them. I do have to say that the time really flew by."

Looking back at his 24 years of service, how does Jacobson hope he is remembered? "As someone who really loved El Segundo and did everything he could to be fiscally responsible, act with integrity, and preserve and enhance the community assets that make people want to be here in the first place," he said. "This is a special place to live and to raise a family. I hope that some of the things I was able to accomplish helped others enjoy the same kind of life we've been fortunate to have here." •




El Segundo second baseman Kaili Reitano waits to put a tag on Becca Chung.


