El Segundo Police Volunteer Shares a *Flaky* Beatles Memory

After wrapping up a 42-year career with American Airlines in 2005, El Segundo resident Linda Messia joined the El Segundo Police Department (ESPD) as part of the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP). She is still at it more than 12 years later, working at least 16 hours a month to help provide an additional set of "eyes and ears" for the community. And she has a really great Beatles story, but that's for later.

The RSVP program continues to thrive and is now celebrating its 25th anniversary since its original inception in 1993 under then-Police Chief Tim Grimmond. The department's goal is to tap into the vast experience and skills seniors bring to the table as well as provide another way for the latter group to give back to the community. RSVPs assist both Field Operations and Administrative Services Bureaus, with duties that include speaking with local merchants; driving a marked volunteer car through residential and commercial areas to provide visibility and keep an eye on possible criminal activity; and helping with traffic control and special events.

However, vacation checks remain the most important and popular of all the RSVP services, according to ESPD Lieutenant Jaime Bermudez. "We always get residents that call requesting vacation checks of their homes while they are away," he explained. "The RSVPs help by visiting each home and checking the perimeter to make sure everything is locked and secured. Our residents really appreciate this service."

Linda agreed. "We check on homes when residents go away for sometimes days and even weeks," she said. "We check out their homes from doors, windows, anything suspicious... and pick up any newspaper or other items that could alert a potential burglar to know

the house might be a place to break into."

Linda is one of 15 RSVPs currently involved with the department, with the members ranging in length of service time from four months to 22 years. To qualify, one must be at least 55 years old, pass a background investigation, be able to walk stairs (without railings) and walk without the assistance of a cane or walker. Volunteers must work at least four hours a week.

Awarded the ESPD RSVP of the Year in 2014, Linda also volunteered with the Manhattan Beach Police Department for a decade, mostly providing station tours for grade school kids. She originally moved to El Segundo in 1998 with her son Justin who was 9 years old at the time. "I would say that I am always wanting to give back for the

beautiful life I have lived, and police work was part of the answer," she explained. "I was also a volunteer with St. John's Hospital in Santa Monica, Marina Mercy Hospital and Northridge Hospital." And then there was that run-in with The Beatles. But not just yet...

Born and educated in Pasadena, Linda knew from an early age that she wanted to be an airline "stewardess," as the profession was called back then. When age appropriate, she accepted a position with American Airlines (United also wanted to hire her). "When I was hired in December 1962, there were qualifications and rules and regulations that no longer exist today," she said. "For instance, you could not be married, have children, had to resign at the age of 32, and there were

Two El Segundo police officers earned recognition at last week's 44th Annual South Bay Medal of Valor luncheon for their notable actions during two serious incidents in 2017. Officer Jeff Darringer received the Medal of Valor, while Sgt. Tony de la Rambelje earned a Distinguished Service Award. This year's event, held at the Torrance Marriott, also honored officers from Hawthorne, Hermosa Beach, Inglewood and Torrance. The purpose of the Medal of Valor Awards program is to "attract community recognition and attention to the South Bay's outstanding police and fire departments, and to honor their exceptional individuals." The ceremony is also a fundraiser for the South Bay Police & Fire Memorial Foundation – an organization that provides financial support for families of fallen or disabled police and fire personnel from nine independent South Bay cities including El Segundo. Among the foundation's current board members are El Segundo Police Lieutenant Carlos Mendoza and Continental Development Corporation Community Affairs Director Sherry Kramer

In selecting recipients, the Medal of Valor Committee reviews applications submitted by senior officers from the nine public safety departments. "The Medal of Valor is given to a police officer or

El Camino College Joins Grant Program to Provide Job Training

As part of a newly announced \$500,000 grant, El Camino College will partner with other Southern California organizations to provide job training to area residents. The Citi Foundation announced that Propel L.A., supported by the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation (LAEDC), was selected as the recipient of a \$500,000 grant as part of the 2018 Community Progress Makers Fund. The fund is a \$20 million, two-year initiative by the Citi Foundation to support high-impact community organizations that are driving economic opportunities by bringing together residents, nonprofits, businesses, and municipal agencies.

Through the fund, Propel L.A. will develop a two-year program and partner with nonprofits to seek out underemployed and dislocated workers in Inglewood/Lennox, as well as Pacoima/Northeast San Fernando Valley, and recruit them for the advanced manufacturing training academies offered at El Camino College

and Los Angeles Valley College. The grant will fund fees, books and supplies for students in the program, which will serve as a model for potential others throughout the county.

LAEDC launched Propel L.A. to support implementation of the Countywide Strategic Plan for Economic Development. The plan outlines seven goals to improve quality of life countywide through education, job creation, and building livable communities. Goal 1: Invest in Our People, and Goal 2: Strengthen Local Export-Oriented Industry Clusters, are the foundation of the work funded by the Progress Makers grant.

In 2016-2017, the inaugural cohort of Community Progress Makers helped more than 14,700 low-income people secure financial assets; built over 10,500 affordable housing units; strengthened more than 1,100 small businesses; and connected 1,800 young people to jobs in their communities.

Letters

Feels US Government Doing Little

The Letters section of the May 17, 2018 issue of the El Segundo Herald contained many letters supporting the continued government inaction on pursuing gun safety regulation based on historical information and limited scientific research. Historical anecdotes about the birth of the NRA do little to shine a light on the current problem of mass murders committed by private citizens and the availability of modern assault weapons.

The one study cited in the Letter, Wright-Rossi, is too limited in scope to be of any use in an understanding of gun safety in the information age. The major flaw of the nearly 40 year old study that prevent it from being useful in shaping policy today is that it only compares U.S. data from State-to-State. Nation-to-Nation comparative studies would be more informative about differences between societies with different central government regulations. Without uniform gun regulation nationwide there is no control for the sale and transport of firearms from State-to-State by private citizens, so studies of nationwide trends cannot yield a true picture of statistics on the sale and transportation of firearms is needed.

The growth of internet sales, the increased availability of assault weapons and the lax standards of background checking by private sellers are recent developments of unscrutinized situations that require new research and more thorough data collection. However, useful statistics are hard to come by since the US Government does little to support

this data collection and does not fund deeper research into the current state of firearms laws, sales and deaths. It is irresponsible for our leadership and lawmakers to obstruct, delay, and ignore this urgent need made apparent by the present crisis Americans are living through today.



They weren't supposed to win 17 games, a league title was a lon shot, defeating the number one team was unthinkable and visions of a CIF Southern Section quarterfinal playoff appearance were but a dream. But that didn't stop the El Segundo High School softball team from reaching those levels this season. The Eagles had lost five key players to graduation after a 12-15 record in 2017. Head coach Megan McCann had some talented players returning, but she believed in her team's potential to reach its lofty goals.

The Eagles defeated top-ranked La Reina in the second round of the playoffs, but their 6-2 loss to JW North (Riverside) in the CIF-SS Division 5 quarterfinals ended their season. They finished with a 17-10 record overall and are the reigning Ocean League champions. It was quite an accomplishment for a team that ended up starting just two seniors.

The Eagles traveled to Thousand Oaks to face La Reina. Sporting a 20-3 record and a stingy pitching staff that has a micro 0.77 team ERA, the Regents were the obvious top-ranked team. El Segundo used one good inning combined with lights-out pitching to knock off La Reina 4-1.

The game was scoreless through the four innings as the Eagles' Monique Benjamin and the Regents' Erin Brown were locked up in a pitchers' duel. Then in the Eagle half of the fifth inning Gabby Benjamin doubled, Audrey Butler was hit by a pitch and freshman phenom Katie Croxall had a two-run double to score pinch runner Jade Johnson and Butler. Adri Hebert tripled to score Croxall, and Kaili Reitano had an RBI single that scored Hebert to give the Eagles a 4-0.

Benjamin was dominant and allowed her defense behind her to play flawlessly. She struck out four, walked none and allowed one unearned run in the seventh inning. Hebert was stellar at third base with eight assists, including a few to her left in the hole as well as attempted bunts and slap hits. Croxall led the offense, going 2-for-4 with two RBIs and a run scored. Hebert, who is hitting .502 on the season, had an RBI triple.

The Eagles advanced to the CIF Southern Section quarterfinals for the fifth time in 11 years (previously 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2015). Their reward was hosting JW North and a heavy-hitting team with a .445 team batting average and 91 extra base hits to its credit, including 21 home runs.

The Eagles had their problems figuring out North's Bryanna Zepeda in the circle. El Segundo had outhit its opponents in 15 out of the last 16 games and as a team was hitting .394. In this game Zepeda changed her delivery and pace and mixed up her pitches.

The Eagles could only manage three hits and two walks, though they struck out just once. The balls they hit were stung hard, but the Huskies played great defense behind Zepeda. In the first inning, Hebert hit a ball destined for an extra base hit that was tracked down by centerfielder Julie Phelps. Kaelyn Kearney's long fly ball was caught in the third inning. Gabby Benjamin's deep fly ball to the left

centerfield gap in the seventh inning was also caught. With the change of pace and the spin Zepeda put on the ball, the Eagles popped up several times with runners on base.

JW North took the lead with a two-run third inning. The speedy Latrice Thompson bunted for a hit and stole second base. Lair Beautae tripled in Thompson and ended up scoring on an errant pickoff throw for a 2-0 lead. The Eagles responded in their half of the third inning. Audrey Butler drew a nine-pitch walk and then scored on Monique Benjamin's triple in the right-center gap. Zepeda then induced one of seven pop-ups in the game to get out of the inning.

The Huskies blew an opportunity to have a big fourth inning. Phelps singled and stole second and third base. Bianca Salazar walked, but was thrown out trying to steal second. Monique Benjamin then struck out Zepeda on four pitches. She got out of the jam when she got Mariah Garcia, a .411 hitter, to hit a meek pop-up. The Eagles had their chance in the bottom of the fourth to tie the game. Kaili Reitano singled, but was later erased on a questionable pickoff call at second base.

In the fifth inning, the Huskies threatened to score again. Monet Morgan was hit by a pitch and took second and third base on consecutive sacrifice bunts fielded by Hebert. The Eagles got out of the inning when Benjamin got Lair Beautae, who is hitting an eye-popping .670

Reitano in relief of Monique Benjamin for a 6-2 lead. The Eagles went quietly in each inning and their season ended.

Monique Benjamin threw four innings and gave up two unearned runs on two hits while striking out five. The El Segundo offense, which had scored 37 runs in the previous four games, could manage just two runs on three

hits. Though the loss was stinging to the team, it was still a successful season. For a team that few outsiders thought would do so well, McCann and company knew they would play beyond others' expectations. Afterwards the second-year head coach consoled her team and told them how proud she, the school and the community were of all of them.

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


A Trio of Superb Graphic Novels

across the desk as an answer to the question, "Have you read anything good lately?" Action panels. Thought balloons. This couldn't possibly be serious reading, right? Wrong!


One of the best books of 2017 was author Thi Bui's very personal and beautifully written memoir The Best We Could Do, a warts-and-all account of her early life in Vietnam before immigrating to the United States. A story of heartbreak and struggle, Best is a timely first-hand look at the refugee experience. With realistic illustrations throughout, Bui paints an honest portrayal of her family with an especially pointed look at her father and the hardships he endured as a child. The Best We Could Do is an excellent depiction of the actions of the past having a ripple affect across multiple generations. This is a must read.

New to paperback is author Adrian Tomine's series of illustrated vignettes, Killing and Dying. This is a collection of short stories in the same vein as Raymond Carver and George Saunders. Told in a very slice-of-life way with biting humor, the style resembles the Sunday funnies with dark undertones simmering just below the surface. With Killing, Tomine continues to be one of my favorite graphic novelists.

Last but not least, author Santiago Garcia and artist David Rubin bring the classic tale of Beowulf to life in this gorgeously illustrated rendition. Adapting the timeless poem of a larger-than-life hero ridding his kingdom of a savage and brutal monster as their canvas, Garcia and Rubin paint a lush and vibrant depiction of the enduring battle between good and evil while remaining faithful to the source material every step of the way. Han Solo's Bad Boy Origin Tale Told in Solo: A Star Wars Story

While the Star Wars saga continues to propel the story in a new direction, the Star Wars universe is committed to exploring every corner of the galaxy far, far away. Solo: A Star Wars Story, in theaters everywhere today, acts as a prequel to the original Star Wars by telling the origin story of everyone's favorite smuggler, Han Solo. As originated by Harrison Ford in the first Star Wars, he would play Han for the rest of the series and cement his status as one of pop culture's most iconic characters. In Solo, Alden Ehrenreich steps up to the plate to channel the smuggler as a 20-somethingyear-old street rat turned fighter pilot. While it's not terrible, Solo is uninventive and limp -- which fans may be disappointed, but not shocked to hear.

We are immediately thrust into following the titular Han, a smuggler escaping a life of "lawlessness" along with beautiful Qi'ra (Emilia Clarke). Fed up with their dreary life

While it's a serviceable movie, there's no denying that we're cashing in on the currency of a character and world we already know rather than building things anew. There is only so much originality that can go into "prequel" films like this one, and unfortunately that predictability is Solo's biggest downfall. While there are a few plot twists and surprises here and there, Solo as a whole comes off as flat. Action scenes aside, the story lacks the pizzazz that Star Wars fans have come to expect and deserve.

It has only been a year since the latest Star Wars movie, The Last Jedi, was released. This poses the question -- is the frequency at which Disney is pumping out these films making the movies less special? That could be one reason why Solo feels unnecessary in relation to the Star Wars canon. That's not to say that the film lacks talent, both in front of and behind the camera, including director Ron Howard (who replaced directors Phil Lord and Christopher Miller after they were let go because of bumpy

on the planet Corellia, Han makes a plan to escape with Qi'ra and live out his dream as a fighter pilot. Their attempt to leave ends up in chaos. Han narrowly escapes, but is forced to leave Qi'ra behind. Determined to save her from an unknowing fate, Han continues on his journey alone (or, solo), desperate to find a way to rescue her from the evil powers that be.

The quest to rescue Qi'ra is not an easy one. In fact, Han nearly gets killed multiple times (but...no spoiler here -- of course, he doesn't). He meets a cast of characters throughout his journey, including the killer Wookie turned best friend, Chewbacca (Joonas Suotamo), and fellow back-alley smugglers Tobias Beckett (Woody Harrelson) and Val (Thandie Newton). Han becomes entangled in the duo's latest mission to rob a train full of coaxium fuel for the criminal organization Crimson Dawn, which will bring everyone involved a major payday. Han sees the reward money as the opportunity he needs to buy a plane to finally rescue Qi'ra and wholeheartedly agrees to join. However, things go south before the mission is completed, which forces the group to take on an even riskier job. This new job introduces Han to Lando Calrissian (Donald Glover), L3-37 (Phoebe Waller-Bridge), and ultimately, the evil forces of Crimson Dawn

leader Dryden Vos (Paul Bettany).

behind-the-scenes drama). Ultimately, Solo's biggest disappointment is that it is forgettable -- especially among the sea of other hero movies that came out recently. Although for as much criticism as the film has received, there really is nothing like sitting in a theatre listening to John Williams' Star Wars theme song in surround sound. That alone may be worth the price of admission.



What a Soldier's Life Is Worth

The Memorial Day crowds at local cemeteries are gone, though the flags and flowers remain as symbols of the most solemn day of the year for America's families, their friends and veterans. It's an observance as old as the Civil War, yet just last week another name and family joined the nation's ranks of Gold Star survivors.

Only days before Memorial Day, the Army announced the death of a Los Angeles soldier who was on a peacekeeping mission in the Balkans -- formerly Yugoslavia. Staff Sgt. Conrad A. Robinson died May 24 at Camp Bondsteel, Kosovo from a non-combat related incident, according to the Army. The 36-year-old was assigned to a medical brigade out of North Carolina.

The sergeant's death -- which the Army says is under investigation -- raises the question so close to Memorial Day about what do the families of service members, like the Robinsons, do now. The Pentagon has a financial safety net for military families when a soldier dies while on a mission or suffers an injury that leads to death later. The reality of losing a breadwinner sets in after the military funeral and burial, especially for the spouses and children who live on base housing.

The immediate relatives of members of the U.S. Armed Forces who have been killed in combat or in support of certain military activities are called Gold Star Families. The term was coined during World War I when service flags were first flown by families during the global conflict. "The flag included a blue star for every immediate family member serving in the armed forces of the United States, during any period of war or hostilities in which the armed forces of the United States were engaged. If that loved one died, the blue star was replaced by a gold star," according to the U.S. Army's website.

The Pentagon pays a \$100,000 death benefit to the survivors, starting with spouses and children. Staff Sgt. Robinson leaves a wife and two daughters, ages 5 and 10. The one-time payment is free of federal or state taxes. If the deceased has no wife or children, the parents or siblings would receive that amount.

Men and women serving in the armed forces are covered under the death and housing benefits if they are in training for a combat mission or basic training after signing up for military service with the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force or Coast Guard. This covers

military reserves and service personnel who have been accepted for duty and are killed while traveling to their assignments.

The military also pays to the spouse, child or parent up to \$400,000 from a government life insurance policy. Every serviceman or woman is automatically enrolled to receive the maximum amount, though they may decline coverage or choose a lower payout to their survivors. Whatever the dollar amount, it also is tax-free. And that's not all.

The military has another insurance program for soldiers and service personnel who die of traumatic injury. This coverage starts at a minimum \$25,000 payout and death after seven days of survival with one's injuries triggers the payout to survivors. Like other death benefits, this one is tax-free too.

Families also are in line to receive unpaid pay and allowances. Social Security pays a small one-time \$225 payment either to a spouse who is caring for children or to the children who are under 18.

Families living on base are given 12 months' time rent-free while they grieve and adjust to the next phase of life. For off-base housing, a surviving spouse receives one year's worth of housing allowance. When the family moves, the military handles the move off base or to a new home.

Families who lose a service member also get to keep their low-cost health insurance for three years, before switching to the retired military health plan. Dental care is available, too, for the husband or wife, children or dependent parent. And some of their personal debt is forgiven automatically.

The Pentagon also sees that the children of soldiers and service members who are killed while on duty or en route to a base can attend college or a training school of their choice. The military has a tuition assistance program for students pursue and finish their studies toward degrees in four years.

Military deaths happen suddenly, yet the effects are life-changing for families, towns and communities. By one estimate, the Pentagon's safety net for survivors of active-duty servicemen and women killed in Iraq and Afghanistan has provided them with up to \$800,000 in death benefits and insurance payouts.

At least one financial institution, Chase Bank, says it will forgive the mortgage, auto loan or consumer debt of a service member killed since 2011 either in combat or while in military service. Unlike the other military and government-issued benefits, loan forgiveness is taxed by the IRS. •

When de la Rambelje and the other officers entered the home, they found a shirtless man about 10 feet away "holding two knives in a threatening manner while bleeding profusely from several apparent self-inflicted cuts to his body

between the man and the officers and began a calm and "empathetic dialogue" to determine why the man was so upset - it was apparently due to a situation with his mother. The conversation went on for about 20 minutes until the sergeant convinced the

He proceeded to cut his wrists and then slit his own throat when officers arrived on the scene. The individual eventually underwent surgery after being transported to the hospital.

The honoree write-up commended de la Rambelje for utilizing "outstanding verbal

apprehension of a suspect armed with a hatchet who was threatening multiple people that resulted in an officer involved shooting." The primary distinction in awarding the Medal of Valor is imminent threat of great bodily harm or loss of life to the officer, a colleague, or a citizen.

The incident that earned Darringer his Medal of Valor took place on January 18, 2017. He was the primary officer in pursuit of a suspect who had driven off in an SUV after threatening various individuals with an axe in a residential area near Sheldon Street and Imperial Avenue. Darringer joined with Sgt. Glenn Delmendo, Officer Christopher Jenkins and Officer Steve Paulsen in a chase that eventually moved into Westchester. Once the suspect reached Manchester Boulevard west of Sepulveda, he began to drive erratically. This spurred Darringer to complete a legal intervention maneuver. The SUV then spun around and came to rest next to Darringer's vehicle, trapping the officer inside.

The suspect then exited his vehicle and stepped onto the hood of Darringer's car while raising the hatchet as if he was going to attack through the windshield. Realizing the extent of the danger he was in, Darringer fired several rounds through the windshield while in a seated position. At the same time, Delmendo and Jenkins had taken positions behind Darringer's car and saw that their colleague was in grave danger. They proceeded to fire on the suspect, who was ultimately killed. "The heroic efforts of Officer Darringer saved his own life and the bravery and sound decision-making of Sgt. Delmendo and Officers Paulsen and Jenkins saved Officer Darringer's life," it reads in the submission about the honorees.

Sgt. Tony de la Rambelje earned the Distinguished Service Award for his actions during an incident on November 17, 2017. "The Distinguished Service Award is given to a police officer or firefighter who perform acts that exemplify the finest standards of their respective departments," Whalen said. "Sgt. De La Rambelje is the recipient of this award for the El Segundo Police Department for his efforts in successfully resolving a call involving a mentally ill individual that was armed with multiple knives and was threatening suicide."

On the date in question, de la Rambelje was one of several officers dispatched to a residence to respond to an assault and deadly weapon call. The reporting party said he went to visit a friend and found the man covered in blood, prompting an immediate 9-1-1 call from outside the home. The officers made phone contact with the bloody individual and determined this was a likely suicide attempt. It was also possible someone else was in the residence.

and throat." There was also a great deal of blood on the hallway floor and pouring from his body. The man was also very agitated and did not comply with orders to put down the knives.

Using his skills as a crisis negotiations team leader, de la Rambelje positioned himself

distraught individual to put down the knives and seek help outside. After the surrender, de la Rambelje provided water and a blanket for the man to cover the wounds and hide those from his mother. As it turned out, the man had ingested 30 aspirin pills and 30 Tylenols in addition to drinking three beers.

skills, empathetic listening and rapport building to de-escalate" a situation that might have otherwise resulted in the use of deadly force. The other officers were so impressed by their colleague's leadership and handling of the situation that they nominated de la Rambelje for the Distinguished Service Award. •

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

weight and height requirements." Eventual legislation did away with these stringent requirements. Linda has three grown children and two grandsons who all live in Oregon, except for her eldest son who resides in Huntington Beach.

Thinking back on her airline career, Linda recalls flying a turnaround from LAX to Kauai on September 11, 2001. "We arrived back at LAX at 5:30 a.m. -- and since I lived in El Segundo, I was home and fast asleep before the airplanes hit the World Trade Center and Pentagon," she said. "The time change allowed me to sleep until a phone call from another flight attendant informed me of our planes hitting both of the above. I knew that life would never be the same for my airline and any of the others." As it turned out, she was on the first plane to leave LAX (or anywhere else) when commercial flight service resumed on September 14. The incident affected her deeply. "At that time, I decided to volunteer with the US Air Force and fly our troops from within the United States to Germany and then onto Kuwait, Iraq and Bosnia for three months." Linda was stationed in Frankfurt during this period.

So, about those Beatles? Almost. But first, it may be interesting to note that Linda also used to be a partner in a business called High Flight Gun Sales in San Fernando. "It was always weird when I would take my break in the cockpit," she said. "In 1985, I took on the position of purser on international flights whose job responsibilities were from the cockpit door through to the rest of the plane. As the pilots were flying and sometimes reading Guns and Ammo magazines, I would mention the new firearm just made with a red ramp and white outline. It was fun to see them spin around with mouths open wondering how I knew about guns."

With a career spanning five different decades, Linda decided to write her autobiography in 2007 as a way to give her children a look at her life story. The title was Something Special in the Air, named after the American Airlines slogan. She continues to be involved with a Kiwi organization that is a charity project for airline members past and present. "We meet once a month for lunch

and give back to needy families," Linda said. "It was difficult in writing the book to decide 35 chapters that were flights that stood out to me to be the ones that I would never forget." And this is where that Beatles story finally comes into play...

August 29, 1966 was the date of the final Beatles concert before the group "retired" from live performing to concentrate on studio recording. The storied event took place at San Francisco's Candlestick Park. The crew knew Linda was a huge rock and roll fan who also lived down the street from the iconic Whisky a Go Go on the Sunset Strip - and so they offered her a special charter flight. "We met at the airplane next to our Superbay Hanger and set up the plane with sandwich trays, drinks and 35 miniature boxes in the lounge and talked to him for a half hour. Down-to-earth guy and so normal..." The "cute Beatle," as he was known, even asked the manager to invite Linda to a party at a Hollywood mansion. She politely declined.

It was then that the unforgettable meeting became even more memorable. "We were offering sandwiches from the linen-lined tray and Ringo [Starr] accidentally slid one to the corner of the tray," Linda said. "When I went to offer one to John [Lennon], who was at this time enjoying his bowl of Corn Flakes with milk, the corner sandwich fell right into the middle of the Corn Flake bowl and splattered milk and flakes onto John's face, hair, ears and even his nose. I was shocked and grabbed some paper towels to wipe off the flakes and milk. John just smiled and said, 'No problem, luv." In fact, I was given 12 x 12 autographs by the boys and John wrote, 'To Linda, Thanks for the Corn Flakes. Love, John Lennon."

Upon arriving in San Francisco, Linda was part of the decoy bus to divert thousands of screaming fans away from the band. She and two other stewardesses even got to see part of the concert while sitting in an armored car that also provided protection from the wind and cold. "We were told that we needed to take a cab back to the plane 15 minutes before the concert ended, by crew schedule," she said. "It was a wonderful flight and of course the concert was a great memory." And certainly it was only a coincidence that McCartney's future wife was named Linda.

Meanwhile, Linda Messia feels blessed to make an ongoing positive contribution to the El Segundo community and hopes to continue doing so for years to come. "This is a city where I have lived and worked since the late 1990s and I truly feel that it is my home and family," she said. "I have no thoughts of retiring from the RSVP program and hope to be active as health allows." Just make sure you pay extra close attention if you are in the same room with Linda and a box of cereal... •

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
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
