City Council Meets New Officers, Gets Investment/Trash/ADU News

Tuesday night's El Segundo City Council meeting featured four members on the premises plus Chris Pimentel participating and voting via teleconference from a lodge in Pennsylvania. Police Chief Bill Whalen kicked off the proceedings by introducing the three newest officers in his department—all with local ties. Oscar Haro and Zachary Contreras recently graduated from the police academy in Riverside County and are now in the Field Training Officer Program. The third, Anthony Sanchez, is a hire Whalen described as a "remarkable event" since the former is the first true lateral officer to join the El Segundo Police Department since 2011. As part of an aggressive recruitment campaign to bolster sworn personnel, the ESPD offers laterals who come from other agencies a \$25,000 signing bonus incentive.

City Treasurer Crista Binder and Deputy City Treasurer II Dino Marsocci presented their quarterly investment portfolio update with some notable news about the economy. A marked drop since the end of March in the 5-year yield suggests an economic slowdown (though not necessarily a full-on recession), with the Federal Reserve likely to cut interest rates twice between September and December. However, unemployment remains low and inflation numbers hover near the Fed's target of 2 percent – both reasons for optimism. At the same time trading uncertainty with China

and Mexico has put a strain on the market, with bond yields falling as a result.


To hedge against further yield reductions, Binder and Marsocci confirmed that the City of El Segundo made a flurry of investments in the past couple of weeks – particularly 5-year CDs – to lock in better rates now while still maintaining diversification. Looking overall, the City's total invested portfolio market value is \$84 million, with an effective yield of 2.33 percent at the end of the last quarter and continued compliance with the investment policy.

During this quarter, the City purchased three CDs for \$735,000 and one corporate bond for \$500,000. Two investments matured for \$1.245 million and three bonds called for \$1.5 million. Since March 31, the City bought 17 CDs for \$4.165 million, three municipal bonds for \$2 million, two corporate bonds for \$1 million and one Supra bond for \$1 million. Four investments matured since March for \$1.745 million. Also during this time, the City moved \$16.75 million in funds to CAMP, which is a new permitted investment pool added to the policy in June 2018. The effective yield in CAMP at the end of this quarter was 2.61 percent. Total invested at the end of March was \$25.7 million.

Addressing a January compliance order from the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle), the Council introduced an ordinance amending the City's solid waste and recycling code to meet current state-mandated requirements. Public Works Director Ken Berkman referred to the ordinance as a "critical step" in achieving the necessary compliance. One key change is to establish a permitting and regulatory program starting January 2020 for commercial and multi-family residential properties in regards to solid waste (keeping it out of landfills) and recycling. It will require the more than 20 local licensed haulers to provide detailed reports showing all reasonable efforts are being made to properly implement the program – including monitoring, education and enforcement.

While the City has done well in the area of green recycling and posts good waste diversion numbers, it apparently isn't enough. City Attorney Mark Hensley said CalRecycle wants to see El Segundo perform even better - and will require haulers to keep track of business and residential diversion. The permit system -with a fee to be established by the Council in coming months -- essentially puts the burden on the haulers to ensure compliance, Berkman explained, and could prompt some to opt out of doing business in town. He added that the City also plans to look at franchising commercial collection (currently it only does so for single-family residences and duplexes) in five years. The amended ordinance will also clarify limitations on large, bulky items left for pick-up at residences.

Nanibah Chacon's new mural at El Segundo Public Library



Local Lawmaker's E-Scooter Bill Offers Path Forward for Cruisers

Legislation to regulate electric scooter rentals offers them a chance to operate again in South Bay cities, some which have banned the motorized boards over liability and safety concerns. Supporters think that Assemblyman Al Muratsuchi has struck the proper balance between protecting cities from lawsuits and being opened-minded about a new technology.

Scooters and bikes for rent are popular with office employees and tourists for short trips. The bill requires rideshare companies,

including Bird, Lime and L.A-based Wheels, to work with cities before launching operations. The Consumer Attorneys of California supports the attempt to regulate e-scooters and bikes and the "Wild West" nature of the business.

The attorneys don't consider the state protections a huge burden, calling them minimal. One of those protections is to set a limit on how much insurance the scooter companies must carry before they approach local governments



In the sixth inning, the Dodgers' comeback attempts came up short. Carson Rollins, Stenberg, Blanco and Davis each had hits and ended up scoring to make it 9-7. The rally came up short when Schobel got a strikeout for the third out to give the Cardinals their improbable championship title.

RJ Puffer Powers Dodgers to Major Division Title

The Dodgers finished third in the standings during the regular season, so reaching the championship game was thought to be a longshot. They did cut into the deficit in the fifth inning when Porter Robbins and Vinny Baldino each singled. Benjamin Lee doubled to start the inning and scored on an RBI single by Robert Cantu to make it 5-3. The Dodgers held off the Angels with an easy ground ball and a strikeout to finish the game.

Jim O'Conner Wins Nate Chittick "Phenomenal Coach" Award

This award goes to a manager or coach who best exemplifies the spirit of placing fun and development above competition. It considers someone who teaches, encourages with respect and integrity and shows a passion for the game and the players he or she is coaching. Out of all the nominees by players, other coaches and parents, Jim O'Conner of the Double-A Lake Monsters was named the league's second annual Phenomenal Coach of the Year.

Another fantastic regular season is in the books, capped off by Championship Saturday. There were three teams crowned, but all players playing El Segundo Little League were winners. •

City Council

The consent agenda contained an item increasing the fee waiver for the El Segundo Run for Education from 50 to 75 percent, saving the El Segundo Council of Parents and Teachers over \$6,000 in the process. The move came after staff met with event organizers to review and update the scorecard used to determine the level of City subsidy. Councilmember Don Brann voted against the item, but only because he preferred to see the entire fee waived.

During reports, Mayor Drew Boyles received unanimous support from his colleagues on an item to allow adults over 21 to bring and consume alcohol at Library Park during the four upcoming Sunday Concerts in the Park events (3-7 p.m.). He pointed out that attendees

bring alcohol anyway and staff has reported no major past incidents resulting from consumption during the concerts. Boyles added that the City of Manhattan Beach allows spectators to bring and consume alcohol at Polliwog Park for its own summer concerts with no significant issues.

In a second item brought forth by Boyles, the Council members directed staff to prepare letters of opposition to six pending Assembly and Senate bills related to housing and accessory dwelling units (ADUs). Planning Manager Gregg McClain provided an overview of each bill, which would hinder local control in these areas. The most concerning, he said, is SB13 (passed by the Senate and now in Assembly), which "incentivizes the

conversion of garages" and "encourages bootleg units." If passed, the new law could prevent the City from enforcing building safety codes for such units for up to five years. McClain noted that the bill in its current from is "very confusing" and will make it difficult for building inspectors.

Meanwhile, AB 881 would allow ADUs to be in existing garages and remove El Segundo's requirement for owner occupancy for five years. AB 68 would allow a second "junior" ADU on a property if the main one is attached and also allow ADUs on multi-family lots. SB 330 aims to declare a statewide housing crisis and would prohibit the City from imposing more than 0.5 parking spaces per unit for new residential structures. AB 1279 hopes

to determine high-resource areas (HRAs)

and permit up to four units per lot within the development envelope of a single family zone and thus spike density levels. "A good chunk of the city would be in an HRA," McClain said. AB 1763 would increase the minimum density bonus to 80 percent for projects that are 100 percent affordable housing. McClain emphasized that each of the bills are "moving targets" that continue to undergo revisions and there is still time before a final outcome.

Finally, City Manager Greg Carpenter announced that City Hall will be open every Friday starting in about a month. It is currently open every other Friday. Staffing will alternate to keep employees in the 9/80 workweek format. •



SUMMARY OF ADOPTED ORDINANCE In 2006 and 2015, the City Council elected to become subject to the Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act (Pub. Cont. Code §§ 22000, et seq.; "Act"). Prior to 2019, the Act authorized public projects of \$45,000 or less to be performed by the employees of a public agency by force account, by negotiated contract, or by purchase order. The City's code currently allows those public projects of \$45,000 or less to be awarded by the City Manager. On January 1, 2019, Assembly Bill 2249 (Cooley) became law The bill increased the dollar limits for such projects to \$60,000, due to rising public construction costs. Ordinance No.1583 will allow those projects that are valued at \$60,000 or less to either be performed by City employees or awarded administratively.

to enter their zones. "E-scooters and bikes have appeared in major California cities often overnight," and left cities and counties "in the dust as they attempt to catch up and create regulations," the consumer attorneys group said. The chaotic rollout of e-scooters led to a "patchwork of conflicting laws and regulations" that needs continuity, according to the group the filed its remarks in support of AB 1286. The State Assembly approved the bill on May 3.

The State Senate must approve the bill yet, and the governor sign it for the e-scooter regulations to become law. The scooter and bike operators themselves are divided on the idea of being regulated in California. Three operators of mobility devices oppose restrictions while three are neutral, according to Muratsuchi's office.

Short trips under 10 miles account for a majority of the travel by car done by local residents and commuters, according to the South Bay Cities Council of Governments that studies transportation trends. The council is drawing up a map of low-speed corridors in the South Bay, which would be safe routes for e-scooters and bikes to travel. The goal of regional transportation planners is to ease traffic congestion and gridlock by promoting access to bus and Metro lines in the hopes that more drivers will use public transportation.

The scooter and bike companies would be required to carry liability insurance in case of accident, injury and damage under the proposed legislation. The general liability policy must cover at least \$1 million per event. A company must be insured for \$5 million or more against multiple crashes and mishaps, and must cover injuries and damage claims made by the person riding the e-scooter or bike when the crashed occurred, according to the bill.

A city or county that authorizes a provider to operate within its jurisdiction on or after January 1 next year must adopt rules regarding the use of e-scooters and bikes before a provider can offer them for rent. Local rules must cover the operation, parking, maintenance and safety of the devices within the city or county limits, under the law.

E-scooters are a "last mile" transportation option and they give access to bus and Metro lines to people living in traditionally underserved communities, Muratsuchi noted. The regulations in his bill reflect the approach taken successfully by Santa Monica, he believes, and create guiding principles and financial obligations for the free-wheeling industry.

"California has been in the forefront of consumer protection with emerging technologies such as our first-in-the-nation insurance requirements for transportation network companies such as Uber and Lyft," the assemblyman said. Companies that offer shared mobility devices are already complying with minimum insurance requirements in cities like San Francisco and Santa Monica. "This bill would codify these regulations to create a uniform statewide standard, require basic safety standards, and prohibit waivers of rights to protect riders," Muratsuchi added.

As noted, three of the rideshare operators in the state oppose the restrictions on how and where e-scooters are permitted to go. A group called the Civil Justice Association of California opposes this bill over a concern it will lead to more lawsuits against scooter manufacturers. The association says e-scooters and bikes are being singled out by a provision in the proposed law that prevents companies from requiring users to sign standard liability waivers. Participants sign waivers before taking a spin class, the group has claimed.

"Providers of recreational activities that involve some amount of risk (in some cases the risk is part of what makes the recreational activity fun) require participants to sign liability waivers before engaging in the activity," the association said in submitted remarks before the Assembly voted on the bill.

The Civil Justice Association of California says its mission is to "work in the State Legislature and the courts to reduce the kind of unwarranted and excessive litigation that increases business and government expenses, discourages innovation and drives up the cost of goods and services for all Californians."

Another group called TechNet opposes this bill, saying it would deprive 40 million Californians of access to transportation options from e-scooters and bikes. It also believes the regulation will hinder cities from creating mobility networks -- the kind of low-speed travel routes that the South Bay's regional transportation engineers envision in the next decade.

The other presentation on the agenda was to bestow an \$18,000-plus check to the District from DMS, which the school was able to raise while participating in the fundraiser Pennies for Patients that benefits blood cancer research for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society (LLS). The funds raised were the most by any school in Southern California,

and a representative of LLS was on hand to thank DMS and the District for their efforts. Wilberg spearheaded the quick presentation, saying "We are really proud of our students." Silvers added, "The amount they raised this year was phenomenal." He called the experience "one of those times that we can teach kids to give back. We are proud of the kids, the teachers and the community in general."

Board member and administration reports followed after WEF representative Rebecca Hamburg gave a quick report about the fundraising success of the recent Rock Around the Block event, as well as newly endowed scholarships.

Member Nelson Martinez called Thursday's meeting a "wonderful evening" for recognizing the District employees. Vice President/Clerk Roger Banuelos added his thanks for the "amazing and wonderful things happening in the district. Sometimes we don't take the time to recognize them." He also gave kudos to teachers, noting the strong showing that the students had in the recent science/technologybased Herndon competition, and congratulating those who coordinated the Washington, D.C student trip. He also mourned the loss of Scott. "We lost a great person in the community," Banuelos said.

Kaneda spoke about the "splendid, rewarding times" spent attending recent school site open houses. "This is they payback that we get," she said. She also lauded the support given to programs by the WEF.

Silvers lauded the scholarly accomplishments of the students who participated in the Herndon competition and the success of the Washington, D.C. excursion. He too mentioned the passing of Scott, saying that he had already received emails from community members who wanted to have a plaque placed in her honor at one of the sporting venues where she had volunteered. He also thanked the teachers for their above-and-beyond work during what he termed the "open house season."

Silvers added that for the first time ever, the DMS graduation will take place in the new Wiseburn High gymnasium. Quipped Kaneda, "That is the first time it won't be taking place in the hot sun" at a sunbaked outside school site venue.

The next regularly scheduled Wiseburn School Board meeting has been bumped up a day, to Wednesday, June 12, to avoid conflict with District promotion/graduation ceremonies. •
