New Ordinances to Address Party Houses and Underage Drinking

In a meeting that ran to nearly 11:30 p.m., the El Segundo City Council on Tuesday night introduced ordinances to deter loud and unruly gatherings at so-called "party houses" and to assess penalties at private events where minors drink or use drugs. The agenda item prompted significant public comment from a mixture of local PTA and Reach Out Against Drugs (ROAD) representatives as well as regional drug prevention agency officials. All urged the Council to adopt the ordinances.

The party house ordinance will allow police to fine people who host loud and unruly gatherings – and also cite the property owners. Much of the impetus for the item came from a particular Airbnb home at 416 Virginia Street that has been the subject of numerous complaints over the last several years from neighbors upset about noise, littering, vandalism, trespassing and street/sidewalk/driveway blocking from guests staying at the residence.

After much discussion, the Council agreed on a fine system of \$2,500 for the first violation that would jump to \$5,000 for the second offense if that occurs within 90 days of the first. A third violation in that period increases the fee to \$7,500. Councilmember Chris Pimentel asked to adjust the timeline to the 90-day window as a way to show a "pattern of abusive behavior" as opposed to penalizing someone for a couple of isolated incidents over a full year. After 90 days pass

with no violations, the fine then reverts back to \$2,500. Police Chief Bill Whalen explained that the intent is to identify when a house is a recurring problem or nuisance – not the site of one or two one-off events.

Pimentel was not so certain about the proposed "social host liability ordinance." The rest of the Council supported fees of \$1,000, \$2,000 and \$5,000 (the same amounts already adopted by Hermosa Beach and Manhattan Beach) for successive offenses that occur within a 12-month period where police find evidence of minors drinking alcohol at a gathering. El Segundo's ordinance will also be one of the first in the region to also impose a penalty for marijuana consumption. But Pimentel questioned the reasoning for the ordinance when current laws in California are already stringent regarding underage drinking. He expressed concern about the ability to prove a parent or homeowner was negligent. City Attorney Mark Hensley confirmed that officers can only cite when it is "beyond a reasonable doubt." That means seeing the illegal activities in person, taking IDs and interviewing guests.

Related to the party house ordinance, Planning and Building Safety Director Sam Lee noted that the Council will also in the next month or two discuss the topic of short-term rentals in town – whether to ban them altogether, or perhaps allow them with heavy penalties built in for bad behavior. Second reading and adoption of the ordinances will take place at the

Council's strategic planning session on June 13 with the laws going into effect 30 days later.

Also on Tuesday, the Council approved a new fee schedule for the upcoming El Segundo Aquatics Center as well as the Urho Saari Swim Stadium (The Plunge) as a way to recover the City's total costs for the facilities. The fees (vetted by the Aquatics Subcommittee and Recreation and Parks Commission after an extensive consultant study on comparable market areas) include daily drop-in rates and multi-use options over various time periods, family packages, and hourly lane rental fees. The stated goal is to break even or close to it after a few years of operation.

Daily single visit drop-in rates (currently free for all El Segundo resident age groups) will go to \$4 for adults 18 to 61; \$2 for military, seniors 62-plus and youth 3 to 17. Non-residents who now pay \$5 across the board will see that number increase to \$6 for adults but drop to \$4 for the other categories. The fee structure also includes bulk price incentives for residents and non-residents who purchase 30-day, 90-day or annual memberships. Also added to the mix is a spectator pass (\$1 for drop-ins), which Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit said is an important way to control access at large events and to ensure people don't simply pop into the building to, as an example, shave or shower. Additionally, per the settlement agreement with Wiseburn

Wiseburn School Bond Measure Fails

On Tuesday, voters in the Wiseburn Unified School District rejected the \$29 million Measure W school bond. Preliminary results with all 14 precincts reporting showed 949 yes votes (49.87 percent) and 954 no votes (50.13 percent). The measure required 55 percent voter

approval in order to pass. The bond sought to generate \$2.1 million annually through approximately 2042 at a taxpayer cost of 1.9 cents per \$100 of assessed evaluation. Targets for the funds included facility, technology and security upgrades as well as classroom upgrades. •

"Assault Weapons"

Michael Usher repeated 30-year old anti-gun Democrat campaign lies and fake news (5/10/18 letter). For example, he claimed "The AR-15, the weapon of choice of mass shooters, is not a defensive weapon. ... It is an assault weapon."

Apparently Usher wants to ban and confiscate all AR-15 rifles – including those mounted in police cars and on police motorcycles of the El Segundo, Manhattan Beach, Redondo Beach, and Los Angeles police departments,

because they do tissue damage. It is necessary to damage tissue to stop enemy combatants, whether criminals, terrorists, or soldiers. The AR-15 is a semi-automatic civilian version of the full-automatic military M-16 rifle. Both fire standard center-fire 22 caliber ammunition that has less than half the power of 30 caliber deer hunting ammunition.

All semi-automatic firearms are not machineguns (which have been severely restricted nationally since 1934). They fire one bullet per trigger-pull (like handguns). Democrats and fake news misrepresent them as machineguns to ban them. The AR-15 is functionally identical to all semiautomatic firearms widely commercially available since 1896, long before soft-on-crime liberal Democrat policies increased crime.

The Democratic Party mislabels traditional semi-automatic firearms as "assault weapons", which sounds similar to "assault rifles" which are machineguns, as part of their campaign to ban and confiscate all firearms from lawabiding Americans. The California Democrat "assault weapon" law banned traditional rifles and shotguns based on looks, not function. It banned a single-shot shotgun ("Encom CM-55"), and firearms that don't exist ("H-93"), based on pictures in a firearms book.

Democrat Gun Control Agenda Modeled On Nazi Gun Laws

The Democrat "gun control" agenda is modeled on "gun control" laws Hitler's National Socialists ("Nazis") used to register, ban, and then confiscate firearms from all Jews and political opponents prior to sending millions of Jews to concentration camps, gas chambers, and ovens.

Registration would facilitate the confiscation process. He explained it would take multiple laws over time to incrementally ban and confiscate all handguns.

Shields used the analogy that if he could not take the whole loaf of bread at once, he would take it one slice at a time. HCI was renamed the Brady Campaign after expanding their agenda to ban and confiscate all firearms. The Democratic Party adopted their agenda.

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled in *Haynes* v. U.S. (1968) that felons cannot be convicted for failure to register or license their firearms, because it would violate their Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination (felons are prohibited from owning or possessing firearms).

The real purpose for firearm registration is to confiscate firearms from law-abiding Americans.

Unified School District, individuals who show proof of residency within Wiseburn boundaries will be eligible to receive the same discounted rates as El Segundo residents who possess a valid recreation ID card.

While the Council members seemed satisfied with the general fees, they asked staff to closely monitor the rental costs and report back to see if those rates may need to be tweaked lower in the future. During public communications, South Bay United Water Polo Club President Kurt Fry reported that El Segundo's hourly lane rate at the El Segundo Aquatics Center is three times the amount of the Hawthorne pool and therefore prices his group (and perhaps others) out of using the new facility. The possibility that the rental costs might be "grossly elevated" concerned Councilmember Don Brann, who thought this could prevent the City from realizing projected revenues. "It won't work if the fees aren't realistic," he said. Petit said she would be comfortable publishing "rack rates" with the ability to dip below via off-peak discounts and reductions for non-profit groups. The Council also discussed 10 percent discounts for clubs in which at least 20 percent of the members live in El Segundo, and for long-term tenants who use more than 10,000 lane hours.


In another item, the Council received additional assurances about a craft beer and music festival set for The Lakes at El Segundo in late August. Though the members conditionally approved the event during its last meeting, they wanted more concrete details on parking, security, liability and benefits to non-profit groups. Among the details revealed on Tuesday, applicant Huck Street Productions provided required insurance coverage (\$2 million per occurrence and \$4 million general aggregate coverage); set up a security plan with their own crew as well as El Segundo Police Department staffing; agreed to fire safety requirements; and arranged a parking plan with Chevron.

The initial thought was to utilize the Chevron parking lot across the street from The Lakes, but police officials worried that attendees would be too tempted to jaywalk. Instead, Chevron will provide five lots on El Segundo Boulevard near Main and Richmond streets. Volunteers from non-profits will work the lots and proportionately split all the revenues from the parking fees recouped.

One benefit identified with the new parking location is the ability to draw attendees to downtown businesses after the festival. Councilmember Scot Nicol asked the applicant to keep a representative around the lots and downtown area from an hour before the festival until an hour after to "protect the city from the event" and ensure there are no problematic incidents given the influx of people. "We will hear from the public if the event gets out of hand," Nicol warned. The Council also asked to raise the parking fee to \$20 as an incentive for more people to forego driving and use rideshare services instead. The organizers will also work with Lyft and Uber on a detailed plan to have drivers available. The Council agreed to maintain the previously discussed applicant permit fee of \$12,500. •



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<u>Film Review</u>

Soccer Brings Hope in Ultimate Underdog Story *The Workers Cup*

In the documentary world, we often get one of two types of stories: the broad-stroked tale of a massive issue, or an intimate slice of life of ultra-specific characters. Occasionally, we get a film that manages to merge the two, which ends up telling a much richer story. We have one of these cinematic hybrids with The Workers Cup, opening at the Laemmle Monica Film Center on June 8.

Doha, Qatar is scheduled to be the home of the 2022 FIFA World Cup. Since receiving the controversial bid, there has been a general awareness that the working conditions while building this massive infrastructure borders on modern slavery. The stadium workers are story portrayed. It introduces us to a team of people we easily become attached to, and then takes us on their journey toward a major goal. It's the ultimate underdog story, and therefore a gripping adventure towards a dream. Coupled with the fact that this micro-story also represents a massive global epidemic of failed economies and allowing big business to destroy the lives of its employees, you can bet there is a lot of great subtext in these soccer games.

Director Adam Sobel's access to the intimate lives of these figures is on clear display. The intentionality of his shooting shows that he has culled the absolute best material to tell his story. Symbolic images from the kitchen preparation of unimaginable amounts of food effectively shows us the massive number of

immigrants, coming from poor countries in all directions. Their rights as workers are nonexistent, and notably missing two vital freedoms: the freedom to quit and the freedom to change jobs freely -- freedoms we don't even recognize as such in the U.S.

The Workers Cup profiles one of these workers at the Gulf Contracting Company (GCC), a group focusing on construction. In an effort to boost morale amongst the abysmal working conditions, the GCC and other Qatar construction companies have formed a soccer (football) league for friendly competition between employees. The documentary follows the GCC team in their hopes of achieving tournament success -- the silver lining to their otherwise grim situation.

Among the teammates, we get a vibrant and eclectic group of characters coming from Kenya, Ghana, Nepal and India. Despite their cultural differences, the team is united in its pursuit of victory. In a working situation, where emotion can only be expressed in a few ways, bringing this victory to their team is one of their only positive outlets.

When we watch professional athletes, there is sometimes a neutralization of emotions -- as every one of these figures is typically at the peak of their game. But when we watch a team of construction workers-turned-athletes competing for a prize that truly has the potential to be lifealtering, suddenly I began to feel the enthusiasm and emotion that I would if I were to watch my favorite team play. This is the brilliance of the people we're dealing with. Interesting facts: 60 percent of Qatar's population are immigrant workers -- over 1 million out of a 2 millionperson country. Additionally, the ratio of men: women in Qatar is 6:1.

These observations are a long-winded way to say that The Workers Cup is a standout in nonfiction filmmaking. There are numerous other details that make this film memorable, but I'd rather allow an audience to experience the expertly told, emotionally charged journey filled with triumph and anguish, and an early Cinemacy favorite.

The Workers Cup is not rated. 92 minutes. Opening this Friday at the Laemmle Monica Film Center tomorrow. •

Wiseburn School Board Honors Long-Standing District Employees

The very-well attended May 31 meeting of the Wiseburn School Board featured recognition of seven employees for their long-term tenure. Those feted for their service to Wiseburn Unified School District included Susan Daniels, Dana Middle School, 35 years; Jennifer Flanders, Burnett Elementary, 30 years; Melissa Mathias, Burnett Elementary, 30 years; Sylvia Wagner, Anza Elementary, 30 years; S. Renee Amaral, 25 years, Anza Elementary; Marcos Chavez, 25 years, Dana Middle School; and Catherine Koundakjian, Anza Elementary, 25 years.

Superintendent Dr. Tom Johnstone said it was "amazing" to him that many of the tenured honorees are third grade teachers in the District. "One of the nicest nights of the year," he said, being able to "honor people who have made a big difference in the community."

Daniels, a Dana campus tech aide, was unable to attend the meeting, but Dr. Blake Silvers, current principal at Dana who will be taking over for the retiring Johnstone at the end of the month, had emailed that Daniels exhibits "a tremendous amount of flexibility and willingness to support school programs," and that he was also "so very thankful for her positivity, her commitment to Dana Middle School, and her reliability."

Anza Elementary Principal Alberto Paredes took to the presentation podium to extol the virtues of his site honorees. "These teachers work tirelessly, are dedicated and passionate," he said. He then noted that he had gathered comments from some of their Anza teaching colleagues, and shared these thoughts with the meeting attendees.

Of third grade teacher Koundakjian, Paredes noted that her fellow teachers praised her for being a "true-champion of the little guy," calling her "the first person to celebrate someone else's success." Of second grade teacher Renee Amaral, Paredes, quoting colleagues, called her "the glue that keeps the staff together" and paid compliment to the fact that "every year she raises thousands of dollars for our school."

Paredes also shared colleagues' thoughts on third grade teacher Wagner, who was called "so well-respected that, in some of the most difficult times, she is the voice of reason among our staff and makes class feel like a family."

First-year Burnett Elementary Principal Kim Jones also gathered observations from colleagues and friends on the teaching careers of Mathias and Flanders, both third grade teachers. Mathias was hailed as "great support," who is "always willing to be a voice for other teachers" and has partnered with other instructors in a collaborative way to strengthen their teaching skills. Flanders was called "a team player and a kind, natural leader, as well as "an amazing teacher, friend, mother and wife."

Dana School head custodian Marcos Chavez was unable to attend the meeting because of a death in the family. Silvers spoke about what Chavez has meant to the Wiseburn faculty, students and parents over the years. He called him the "true cornerstone of Dana Middle School" and noted the "welcoming environment" that Chavez helps cultivate. Johnstone referred to Chavez and his brother Miguel (head custodian at Cabrillo) as "Wiseburn treasures."

After a brief reception to honor the longevity honorees, the meeting continued with comments from the public to the Board and a public hearing on the pending renewal of charter petitions for the Da Vinci schools. A group of Da Vinci students approached the podium and touted their upcoming summer camps, as well as expressing their views regarding certain school admission policies.

Next on the agenda were "from the public" comments to the Board. Normally these comments are limited to a total of 20 minutes, with individual speakers asked to condense their musings to three minutes or less. Thursday night's meeting, however, featured multiple groups of speakers -- with topics including the benefits of ultimate frisbee and trying to secure space for such endeavors; Da Vinci dress codes; a better social comingling of students who attend the three Da Vinci schools; the possibility of a tutoring program involving elementary school students and high school mentors; challenges with the ongoing Child Development Program, which has recently had the full-day Pre-K program at Anza continued for the 2018/19 school year; support of the hoped-for passing of Measure W, which local voters faced on June 5; the perceived lack of baseball/softball fields in the district; the need, in the speaker opinions, to continue to upgrade high school sports programs; and the SAT and ACT preparation currently available to high schoolers.

Board President JoAnne Kaneda thanked all the members of the public who spoke for nearly 40 minutes about their concerns and praised them for "using your voice to speak to us."

Board member Israel Mora, who also serves on the Da Vinci School Board, noted to the student speaker that "there is a Da Vinci board" that they should probably go to first to raise their concerns regarding the high school.

The Board next gave their reports, with the overwhelming theme being appreciation of the members of the public who took the time to speak last. The group also lauded the selection of Lisa Wilberg to become the new assistant principal at Dana, as well as the positive trajectory of education in Wiseburn. Kaneda added her thoughts, saying that "what we do in Wiseburn is we teach them how to think."

As the District winds down the school year, items on the June calendar include dissecting the results of the Tuesday evening school bond vote, yesterday's Concert on the Green; Da Vinci graduations on June 12, as well as School Board meetings on June 14 and 26 and the Dana graduation ceremony

Action items tackled Thursday night primarily revolved around construction projects for facilities surfacing and striping at District schools, and the ever-present soil issues still being managed at Wiseburn High acreage on Douglas Street. District Director, Facilities Planning Vince Madsen gave a positive report, noting the ongoing challenges dealing with the grading and the pesky dirt issues at the new high school as construction continues full-bore on the aquatics center, gym and soccer field.

Representatives of Balfour Beatty and Sharefest presented a \$1,000 scholarship to Da Vinci Design student Donell Tinsley, who will be attending Cal Poly Pomona to study architecture. Balfour Beatty, which is managing the ongoing construction project at the high school, partners with Sharefest -- a non-profit organization that specializes in community beautification projects -- to spruce up school facilities. They also provide grant scholarships to worthy recipients. Tinsley's father attended the meeting and said that "this is a very special school district. You folks do a great job here. I truly appreciate all of you." •

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
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
