City Council Gets Incomplete Update from Edison on Recent Power Outages

On Tuesday night, the El Segundo City Council heard from Southern California Edison representatives Paul Hennessy and Connie Turner regarding the recent spate of power outages impacting local residents and businesses. The electric utility provided a circuit reliability report outlining the average frequency of both brief and sustained interruptions over the past few years as well as the most common causes of outages—with equipment failure the primary culprit over 42% of the time.

But the Edison officials could not yet pinpoint the reasons for specific outages over the last few months since that will entail manually looking at the circuits for each city. Asked by Councilmember Carol Pirsztuk if the company has any insight on the recent increase in problems, Hennessy said no. He explained that it takes the outage team awhile to break down a specific incident and it will need to have a specific date and location in order to do so. Mayor Suzanne Fuentes added that anecdotally, residents report outages several days a week.

Hennessy explained that equipment failure happens due to age and infrastructure not being replaced. He admitted that in the past, Edison only replaced equipment that broke. But the company launched a more preventative infrastructure replacement program in 2010 that is still in the catch-up process. Among the El Segundo projects is a \$1.2 million fix of underground cable causing issues east of Sepulveda.

Turner went on to confirm the likelihood of over a dozen rotating, planned outages this summer with predicted heatwaves the main reason as well as the closure of a major gas storage facility in Santa Clarita that will limit Edison's use of back-up generators. The rolling outages serve to protect the grid when demand exceeds supply, Turner said. She pointed out that Edison has 88 different circuit groups in its service area, so the rotation will serve to minimize impacts on a particular city. Turner went on to give citizens a number to call (1-800-655-4555) and indicated they can opt in to receive updates via text, email or phone

to stay in the loop on their particular outages. She also gave the City Clerk a form to post online that citizens can use to make claims in the event of damages from outages. Fuentes said she herself filed a \$5,000 claim, but did not receive a dime. Turner responded that while there are no guarantees, everyone has the right to file a claim.

Also on Tuesday, the Council (per Fuentes' initial request) directed staff to conduct a

It's looking like a bummer summer for overseas travelers because of renewed threats from terrorists, criminal gangs and a tiny flying insect in the Olympic host city of Rio de Janeiro.

The mosquito-born zika virus in Brazil is scaring U.S. fans from making the 13-hour flight to the host city for the Summer Olympic Games. The world comes together every four years for the Games, however, turmoil within Brazil's government and an outbreak of zika have created doubts that the host can complete construction of the venues in time for the competition.

The opening ceremonies are scheduled for Aug. 5, with the games running through

Aug. 21. The U.S. Olympic Committee said two weeks ago it's ready for the Games to begin, while acknowledging Rio's "unique challenges" created by a zika epidemic and political scandal.

"The bottom line is that our athletes are ready to go and we are committed to supporting them 100 percent this summer," USOC chief executive Scott Blackmun wrote last month.

U.S. health officials are advising pregnant women not to visit Brazil this summer because of zika virus, which can be spread from mosquito to human, as well as from a pregnant woman to her unborn baby. There have been confirmed



A familiar slogan shouted by thousands of Congolese audience members as Muhammad Ali prepared to face George Foreman in 1974 at the Rumble in the Jungle in what was at the time, Kinshasa, Zaire. The pro-Ali crowd from back then has grown by millions in the years since. Cassius Clay, later known as Muhammad Ali, chiseled out a place in the hearts of every American on his way to becoming known as "The Greatest". Ali entered the hospital last week in the Phoenix area due to as well. He took down Sonny Liston twice. He brought the enormous George Foreman to his knees by inventing the rope-a-dope. Perhaps most famously, Ali nearly fought until life left his body when he took on Joe Frazier in the Philippines. The names mentioned above speak volumes about who Ali was as a person and a boxer. Ali, on the other hand, was always out to prove a point. He took on the best, beat the

what was initially thought to be non-threatening respiratory issues. It later became one fight that the champion would ultimately not survive. Muhammad Ali died last Friday night at the age of 74. Though his spirit may now be gone, his legend will truly live on forever.

There have been books written, movies made, documentaries produced and articles constructed, all about the man whose name was Ali. The 860 words in this article will certainly neither do any of those, nor the man himself, justice. Perhaps the most important thing to remember about Ali, however, was that he was a man who made promises and truly lived up to them. He promised to be the greatest ever. He was. He promised to shock the world. He did. He floated like a butterfly, he stung like a bee, and even after a despicable disease rendered him much more useless than any other fighter ever could, Ali remained fearless. Though his voice was little more than simply a whisper, his spirit remained gigantic. An unshaken champion, Ali stood for freedom and love.

As a man who never looked down on those who looked up to him, and who helped as many people as he could. As a man who stood up for his beliefs no matter what. As a man who tried to unite all humankind through faith and love. And if all that's too much, then I guess I'd settle for being remembered only as a great boxer who became a leader and a champion of his people. And I wouldn't even mind if folks forgot how - Muhammad Ali

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<u>Film Review</u>

"Approaching the Unknown" Won't Have the Search Team Called

Apparently, movies have yet to learn by now the dangers of sending but a few scarce humans-in this case, just one-beyond Earth's reaches and into the vastness of space to save humanity from some planet-threatening problem. Of course, this risk of the 'what can go wrong does go wrong' variety, drives a time-tested plot of which audiences are readily entertained; just look at recent cinema, "The Martian," "Interstellar," and "Gravity" for proof.

The real danger that movies should be wary

enough to discover a process to create water from dirt and fearless enough to disobey orders to manually fix his ship in a bind from Earth-residing NASA engineer and old pal Louis 'Skinny' Skinner (Luke Wilson), his cold exterior doesn't lend itself to drawing the audience in, and proves the whole thing could use a little more humor and heart.

You can tell before it's over that "Approaching the Unknown" is a movie that didn't spend its efforts trying to differentiate itself from other sci-fi movies as it does attempting to cash in on their successes. Sure, a few flashback

of is building a story around this premise alone, and without adding anything new to the equation. The result, which the latest solo-inspace-survival flick "Approaching the Unknown" shows, is that audiences will fail to care if that character is fated to drift further and aimlessly out of orbit and into the forgotten beyond. While there might be enough familiar elements to satisfy those who are looking for something akin to background-watching, "Approaching the Unknown" doesn't have enough original elements to generate the inertia of interest necessary to captivate viewers in its own right.

The astronaut whose fate we are tied to is William D. Stanaforth (Mark Strong), on a one-way, sacrificial trip to Mars to colonize the planet for the rest of humanity-if he doesn't perish before arriving. A former military man with instinctual intelligence and steely conviction, Stanaforth is also loaded with lazily tacked-on self-affirmations ("I'm not going to Mars to die; I'm going there to live."), making him a comparable but cliche fixture to spend a full ninety minutes with.

Strong, last seen in this year's underperforming Sacha Baron Cohen spy-spoof "The Brothers Grimsby," lends his action-hero looks and serious resolve to playing Stanaforth and it's to the actor's strengths that he brings the character to life. While he seems like the perfect person to have in a real-life situation-brilliant scenes of Stanaforth convey his detachment from non-existent family and friends back home, but there's nothing beyond his person that amounts to be developed. You're probably already braced for when the solitarily-confined character loses his grip on reality, talking to himself and hallucinating characters from his emotional past. But all of this within the first twenty minutes? It fast-tracks all of what the movie has to offer in the blast-off stage alone.

While "The Martian," "Interstellar," and "Gravity," show that battling elements and confronting the certainty of death can do more than simply entertain audiences (each being commercially and critically received and Awards-positioned), Strong's strengths aren't in the department of amiability and warmth, unlike Matt Damon in "Martian," or Matthew McConaughey in "Interstellar (or even Tom Hanks in "Apollo 13"), actors whose ingenuity comes second to their naturally likable selves. It seems the bigger irony that first-time writer/ director Mark Elijah Rosenberg doesn't get right in his directorial debut is that the greater the dazzling technology, the greater a natural human presence must be there for us to relate to. Unfortunately, it doesn't look like the search team will be getting called for this failed mission.

"Approaching the Unknown" is rated R for language. Now playing in select theaters and On Demand. •

The U.S. State Department's warning about terrorist threat levels in Europe was a buzzkill for Americans who decided to skip the Olympics and head for the continent instead. A "Europe Travel Alert" issued May 31 said law-enforcement officials believe terrorists may be planning to stage attacks on visitors between now and the end of August.

"The large number of tourists visiting Europe in the summer months will present greater targets for terrorists planning attacks in public locations, especially at large events," the State Department said.

France is hosting the Euro Soccer Championships from June 10 through July 10, and the Tour de France cycling race from July 2- 24. France has extended a state of camps and heavy fines," the alert explained.


The United States has no diplomatic ties with North Korea, and cannot assist Americans who are detained by the authorities who've held at least 14 U.S. visitors over a 10-year period.

Most of the countries and regions with high travel-risk levels are off the beaten track for most Americans, including Somalia, Pakistan, Central Africa, Columbia, Syria and Iran.

Travel to Mexico merited this warning from the State Department, with a reminder that criminal gangs and drug wars make some states more dangerous than others to visit.

The risks run from being caught in a street fight between rival gangs to abduction for ransom, it said. Carjacking and highway robbery is a serious problem in border towns.

"U.S. citizens are encouraged to lower their personal profiles and to avoid displaying indicators of wealth such as expensive-looking jewelry, watches, or cameras," the State Department says. Tourists should avoid isolated areas or situations where they appear easy targets for robbers or kidnappers who demand

emergency to cover the soccer and cycling a ransom or force their victims to withdraw events, according to the State Department.

Poland is hosting the Catholic Church's World Youth Day event, which is expected to draw up to 2.5 million visitors between July 26 and July 31. Local infrastructure, including security, may be strained due to the large number of visitors to Krakow, officials say.

"Poland will impose border controls at all of its national borders from July 4 to August 2, and visitors to Poland during this period should be prepared to show their passport and undergo stricter security screening throughout Poland," the State Department said.





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

study on the impacts of oversized vehicles and trailers parked on city streets in the wake of complaints community-wide including in the Smoky Hollow area. City Manager Greg Carpenter said residents and businesses will be surveyed for input on the matter and the results will come back to the Council to discuss possible regulation to limit or prohibit

Speaking of parking, Fuentes pulled a consent agenda item regarding renewal of the City's lease with Edison to continue maintaining and operating property along Washington between Walnut and Maple and along Illinois between Mariposa and Holly as park space. Though the Council ultimately approved the item, the City may in the near future renegotiate the deal in order to provide new parking spots for nearby employees who currently still leave their cars on residential streets. The Council on several occasions instituted permit parking restrictions for various blocks in the area, but problems continue as employees simply move to the next available street. With help from the Economic Development Advisory Council, the City approached Edison about the concept of leasing some of the land to a major property owner. Edison was open to the idea. The City is now waiting to hear back from Kilroy (the largest adjacent commercial property owner) to see if the latter wishes to enter into a deal that could provide about 70 new spaces. Residents will also weigh in on whether they prefer to keep the green space or ease parking concerns.

City Treasurer Crista Binder and Deputy Treasurer II Dino Marsocci presented their quarterly investment portfolio report. Total portfolio value currently stands at \$64.5 million (with \$37 million in short term and the rest in long term). Short-term yield is at 0.55%, with long-term yield at 1.31%. The City is also in compliance with its investment policy, recently updated to provide constraints so the portfolio is not overly heavy in a particular security or asset class.

Thanks to a slight rate uptick, the City purchased almost \$1 million in CDs and nearly \$5 million in bonds the first quarter of the year. Since March 31, it picked up another CD for \$245,000 and a bond for \$500,000. However, bond rates remain sluggish with minimal movement limiting opportunities to obtain additional yield. Treasury rates are still 30 basis points under December 2015 numbers for the five-year bond. Economic indicators show unemployment down despite weak job numbers just announced, but gross domestic product and inflation running below Federal Reserve ideal projections. The Fed meets next week, but the reported likelihood of another increase right now is low.

Presentations included the introduction of new Chevron Plant Manager Henry Kusch, who recently returned to the refinery (where he had worked from 1990 to the mid-2000s) after a stint on the Nigerian Delta. He just bought a house in town and said he is "happy to be back in El Segundo." Also, Senior Librarian Julie Todd provided details on this Sunday's Author Fair (covered in the May 26 Herald) as well as the new Adult Summer Reading Program which will have a kick-off tea event on June 25 from 11 to 1 featuring Penguin Random House. Meanwhile, registration for the youth Summer Reading Program (with the theme "Read for the Win") begins today, June 9, at 9 a.m. with a kick-off party June 14 at Library Park at 11 a.m. The free program usually draws over 800 kids.

During reports, Carpenter introduced the City's new Revenue Manager Juliana Demers. Her role includes projecting and tracking revenues, overseeing the business license process and finding creative ways to generate monies. He also reported that four members of the El Segundo Fire Department worked a 12-hour shift to help contain a major fire in Calabasas

last weekend. Carpenter went on to recognize El Segundo Police Officers Tom Jones, Luke Muir and Eric Atkinson who freed an elderly woman pinned underneath a car that struck her early last month at the 99 Cents Store. The trio earned Distinguished Service Awards from the South Bay Police and Fire Memorial Association for their actions.

City Attorney Mark Hensley said an independent hearing officer quickly resolved the dispute between the Richmond Street project contractor and the electrical subcontractor that had held up construction. He added that a Supreme Court ruling on sign ordinances may affect how the City can regulate signage in the future.

Mayor Pro Tem Drew Boyles reported that he met with Steve Napolitano (Senior Deputy for County Supervisor Don Knabe) about potential grant monies to cover the hefty costs (in the ballpark of \$750,000) of new plumbing for the bathrooms at El Segundo Beach. Though nothing is officially in the works, Boyles was hopeful because the City "didn't get a no." •
