City, Bargaining Groups in Talks for New Labor Agreements

By the time this edition hits the streets, labor contract talks will be underway between the City of El Segundo and the six bargaining units representing its employees. These discussions will have major implications on the City's budget going forward given recent estimates of a deficit between \$4 million and \$5 million for 2014/15.

El Segundo Human Resources Director Martha Dijkstra noted that labor negotiations will continue over the summer until agreements are reached. "They do not need to be resolved by a specific date—discussions take place as long as there are issues to be resolved," she said. "The frequency of talks varies from bargaining unit to bargaining unit and will be based in part on the type and quantity of issues on the table."

Looking back at the last set of agreements, the Council approved labor contracts on October 4, 2011 with its police and fire bargaining units and realized \$2.3 million in annual salary and benefit expenditure savings as City employees gave up nine percent in concessions at a time when El Segundo also faced a looming deficit. Among the concessions, the El Segundo Firefighters Association employees agreed to kick in three percent of their pay towards the employer contribution for Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) and forfeited the option of vacation buy-back. The El Segundo Police Managers' Association employees agreed to pay three percent of their wages Employer-Paid Member Contribution, significantly reduced vacation buy-backs and moved to a two-tiered retirement formula with PERS for new hires. El Segundo Police Officers Association employees also began to pay three percent of the EPMC, received reduced longevity pay, lost vacation

buy-back, went to a two-tiered PERS formula for new hires, and earned time off in lieu of pay for previously compensated items such as shooting incentives, court appearances and sick leave over-accruals. Each of the deals ran for two years with a union option for a third year eventually exercised by each group.

In November 2011, the City reached agreements with the El Segundo City Employees Association and Segundo Police Support Services Employees Association, saving over \$400,000 combined as employees

began to pay three percent of the EPMC, saw reduced vacation buy-backs, and went to a two-tiered PERS formula for new hires. Then In October 2012, the City finalized terms with the Supervisory and Professional Employees Association bargaining unit, saving \$339,900 with employees now paying into EPMC and a two-tiered PERS formula in place. Additionally, personnel began to pay 50 percent of the normal cost of retirement benefits (for the new retirement formula created as part See Labor Agreement, page 13

ESUSD Examines City Cuts to Library

As El Segundo's elected officials meet in strategic planning meetings on the budget for the 2014-2015 fiscal year that begins on October 1, the City Council is seeking line items that can lead to a decrease of the anticipated shortfall. All items that this Council is looking at include expenditures that have existed for many years and several affect the El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD). The ESUSD Board of Trustees met Tuesday, July 29 in a special meeting to examine the impact on students of any budget cuts made by the city. Those line items were advised to the school district and the newly-hired Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore just a few days after her first day on the job.

The potential reduction of a 20-year cash contribution provided by the city to ESUSD was built-in to the ESUSD budget. That one line item that has been part of a reciprocal agreement between the two entities and continued as a Memoranda of Understanding to renew that agreement was renewed in 2012. Some consider that cash to be a gift, others see it as a symbol of a partnership between the city and the District, and others believe this to be a handout the schools can do without after all these years. The district has always anticipated that the \$250,000 was vulnerable, and it was not part of their 2014-15 budget, adopted with reserves prior to the July 1 deadline. However, unanticipated

Legislators, Elected Officials Band Together to Save SCROC

When unveiled in 2013, Governor Jerry Brown's Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) gave school districts more flexibility to spend money by removing categorical funding and replacing it with block grants. But it also took monies away from some school districts—including many in the South "It is not usual for South Bay businesses to employ SoCal ROC program completers because of the strong ties developed over the years between SoCal ROC and business owners and other professionals." Bay—in order to provide additional funding for disadvantaged districts. After months of negotiations, Brown increased base grants for all school districts by \$537 per pupil and implemented an economic recovery payment to help districts that still fall short in receiving adequate funding. The end result is that every school district received more money in 2014 than it did last year.

Yet despite the good news, an inadvertent provision of the LCFF also wiped out funding for two vital vocational education centers in the state, including the Torrance-based Southern California Regional Occupational Center (SoCal ROC). Founded in 1967 and the first facility of its kind in California, So-Cal ROC provides career technical education (CTE) via college preparatory programs and support services for over 10,000 students a year and over the decades has helped hundreds of thousands of individuals go on to high-paying jobs. When a technicality in the LCFF eliminated categorical funding for SoCal ROC and threatened to close the facility a year ago, Senator Ted Lieu, Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi and other legislators crafted a temporary budget fix to earn a two-year reprieve to buy additional time to save the center. "Unless the budget changes, this crown jewel of the South Bay will be eliminated," noted Muratsuchi, whose AB 2216 legislation introduced this past March hopes to protect funding for CTE and ROCs and extend the reprieve through June 2017.

"Last year's budget put in a two-year extension to continue operating as it is," explained Lieu. "We wanted to work with Governor Brown for a permanent solution, but it hasn't happened yet—though there is still a year to go." Lieu maintained that AB 2216 would fix the problem by moving SoCal ROC into its own category with a separate stream of funding available. In the meantime, school districts in the South Bay received the State dedicated funding in their budgets this past year and next and must continue to "pass on" the dollars to SoCal ROC. These dollars—originally provided by the State—make up the funding reprieve that Lieu and Muratsuchi negotiated. "We need the Governor to understand that SoCal ROC and the Northern California facility are different and don't fit into the system of local control funding," added Lieu. "[The options are] AB 2216 can get to his desk and he signs it, or he puts a permanent fix into next year's budget."

SoCal ROC has established partnerships with over 300 businesses and holds classes at its Torrance campus as well as in adjacent areas such as Torrance, Manhattan Beach, El Segundo, Redondo Beach, Inglewood and Palos Verdes. Classes are free to high school students, while adults pay a nominal fee for career training. The center offers a variety of programs within five major career sectors including Business/Finance, Health Sciences, Consumer Public Services, Engineering and Trades, and Art Media/Design. The programs offered depend on industry demand, student interest and in some cases fulfillment requirements for college entrance. "With its business affiliates within the South Bay, SoCal ROC is able to provide extensive externship experiences for its students," said campus Superintendent Christine Hoffman.

who already identified their career area and want to get a head start on taking foundation course work, and adults looking to retrain in order to immediately reenter the workforce after earning an industry certificate.

Hoffman was the catalyst who raised awareness among legislators, stakeholders and the Department of Finance that when the Governor initially proposed the LCFF concept in January 2013, implementation would totally eliminate the dedicated funding for ROCs and related programs in California. "Since then, we have been able to coalesce thousands of stakeholders in the South Bay and throughout the state to fight for future funding to protect this extremely valuable resource as well as other regional occupational programs in California," said Hoffman. "We hope that the additional two-year extension proposed in AB 2216 will allow time for all involved to develop a new funding model to keep SoCal ROC in operation after that reprieve. AB 2216 has widespread support from both houses of the Legislature. The final word will rest with the Governor as the bill will need his signature to take effect."

El Segundo Mayor Suzanne Fuentes expressed concern that Governor Brown may not budge from his current status. "A South Bay COG [Council of Governments] Board member shared at a meeting a few months ago that Governor Brown addressed the League of California Cities and repeated his desire to keep funding at the local level, which the Board member interpreted as the Governor was not going to fund SoCal ROC--he was looking for all the involved school districts to fund SoCal ROC, which is unlikely," said Fuentes.

Fuentes added that losing SoCal ROC would prove devastating on many levels, as the center provides vital vocational training for students to develop skills and careers. "College is not for everyone," said Fuentes. "Instead of accumulating a national average of \$29,000 of college debt, SoCal ROC students can graduate with a trade. SoCal ROC instructors are working professional tradesmen and women who impart their skills and knowledge. Another concern of mine is our region, state and country will lose the ability to do things for ourselves. We offshore so many manufacturing jobs and hire lower skilled people to perform certain jobs here, so it's just a matter of time until we lose our ability to perform skilled labor. We need a society of skilled workers to maintain a healthy middle class. California and the United States must have a workforce that can 'do' something..." Meanwhile, Fuentes was part of a contingent that traveled to Sacramento on Tuesday to meet with the Governor's staff to advocate for AB 2216.

Torrance City Councilmember Heidi Ashcraft, a former longtime Board member of SoCal ROC, echoed Fuentes' concerns: "We cannot lose this amazing school that has trained so many people in its over 47 years of existence that have gone into the workforce directly after attending or gone on to higher education because of skills learned there. The Governor did not realize SoCal ROC is a school district on its own with buildings, land, a superintendent and school board." •

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

Leading with the status of the economy, the story is that 288,000 jobs were created in the month of June and therefore the economy is growing.

And now, the rest of the story: Writing in the Wall Street Journal, Mort Zuckerman, the editor-in-Chief of U.S. News & World Report revealed that part-time jobs increased by 1,115,000, but the Bureau of Labor Statistics revealed that full-time jobs fell by 708,000. Incredibly, we have traded full-time employment for part-time employment and deemed that "economic growth."

Moreover, The Atlantic Magazine reports that young adults making less than \$25,000 increased by six million, while those making more than \$25,000 fell by two million during the Obama years. Despite claims he has "created jobs," in truth the jobs created offer no disposable income and no career growth.

Turning to our Southern border, Paul Harvey's initial report would have been "that there is an explosion of child immigration due to civil unrest in Central America."





Do's and Don'ts: The Art of Tackling Your Tile Project

(BPT) - When you add a tile or natural stone surface to the kitchen or bathroom, it transforms each space with a fresh, clean

and customized look. Many homeowners often dream about adding a backsplash or replacing a floor, but never complete the project because they can't decide on the right look, become mentally exhausted by the thought of doing the project or don't know how to accomplish it themselves.

"There are simple tips designers use to plan the look and feel of a room using tile colors and patterns," says Kirsty Froelich, design director for The Tile Shop. "Whether you want to do the tiling yourself or plan to hire someone to lay it for you, these hints will help you get the look you want with ease."



Do: Find inspiration to guide your vision -This is the fun part. Get motivated to do your project by looking for photos that catch your eye and start a file of your favorites. Visuals of what can be done or what has already worked for someone else are great reference for your project even if you tailor it to fit your own style. Also, try using graph paper to draw out your own geometric designs.

"I usually sketch a couple of different ways so I can visually see which one I like the best," Froelich says. "You don't have to be an artist to do this."

As you gather visuals, you'll most likely notice a similar pattern and/or shape of tile or stone materials that you're drawn to, which can range from ceramic, porcelain and glass to marble or slate. This will help you narrow down a style of tile to use. One material that is very versatile is Travertine from The Tile Shop. It comes in a neutral color palette, perfect for using on the floor, walls, backsplash, around the fireplace or even outdoors in warmer climates. It is available in stores and for purchase online.

Don't: Go overboard - Too many patterns or colors in one space can overwhelm a room. Instead, keep things clean and simple.

Do: Check your colors - Before purchasing all the materials for your project, bring samples home so you can see the colors in the space.

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"Store lights and the lights in your kitchen are very different, and all of the sudden, what you thought was a beige color in the store might look green in your home," says Froelich.

Also match your tile samples against other colors that will be in the room, from the paint on the walls to the granite countertop to the wooden cupboards and floor. By matching samples, you'll know the finished project will result in the exact look you want.

Do: Measure twice - This tip applies not only to the planning process, but also to the installation process, especially if you need to cut tile. Once you've measured and doublechecked your measurements, don't be afraid to have someone else repeat the process to ensure accuracy.

Don't: Ignore the details - A tile project will go from nice to stunning if you add simple finishing touches to the project. For example, Froelich recommends mitering corners for a professional look and finishing any raw edges of the space with bullnose, stone profiles or trim pieces.

Do: Use resources - Take your plans, photos, See DIY, page 11

city budget cuts proposed for Library Services and Crossing Guards to ESUSD were not previously on any radar.

The city receives revenue from a state Traffic Safety Fund that is earmarked by most cities to employ crossing guards. Traffic safety of the city's residents, which include children, is an obligation of the city's services. Surrounding cities all provide crossing guards to the school districts in their jurisdiction.

The proposed reduction of any and all library resources includes the librarians for Center Street and Richmond Street Elementary Schools, El Segundo Middle School, and El Segundo High School. The certificated librarian at the high school would remain an employee of the school district. This arrangement whereby books and tapes can be checked out by any card-holding member of the El Segundo Library system from any location and returned to any location is well-utilized by the residents and students.

The collection of the El Segundo Library provides all schools with their collection and all circulation of books from all locations, schools and the main library, are barcoded in the same circulation system. All equipment available to all students in the school libraries is the property of the city. So, any reduction in library services from the city would have implications of major proportions. The discussion of the cuts proposed for all library services provided to the schools included comments from all five members of the school board.

James Garza, the Board Clerk who was previously the assistant principal and principal of the high school for many years, stated that the distribution of all textbooks

the community live in the city and expect that the city and the schools are a cooperative. The city uses many school district properties, including housing El Segundo Cable Television at the high school, without compensation from the city to the district.

Board member Emilee Layne explained that

is accomplished at the libraries as well. Any reduction of services, especially the staff provided by the city in each school, will impact 3400 students.

Dr. William Watkins, Board member previously in the district as a teacher, principal, assistant superintendent, and superintendent, is serving his third term as an elected member of the school board. He was taken aback at the irresponsibility of this proposal from the city to use the school district as a victim of budget cuts. Watkins stated that the city and the school district provide services to the same people in the city of El Segundo. Budget cuts to the school district will affect all students, all parents, teachers, and reduction of library services mean that the city does not view the community as a whole, but sees the schools as a business arrangement. The members of

the \$250,000 is not an issue as the money was always a welcome gift, but pointed out that the library services and especially the elimination of crossing guards cannot be taken lightly. The lack of crossing guards will leave a dangerous situation for students, particularly for those at crosswalks near Center Street Elementary School.

Vice President Dr. Jeanie Nishime pointed out that the liability to the district to use volunteer parents or teenaged students as crossing guards would not be a viable solution. Crossing guards are trained by the El Segundo Police Department and provide a much-needed service.

President Laura Gabel mentioned that many books in the school libraries have come from parents and grandparents who have contributed from their collections to enhance the library collection overall. PTAs in all the schools hold book fairs and reading contests and contribute monetarily to the libraries in the schools.

Dr. Moore stated that if the library services are reduced and/or eliminated, library technicians would need to be hired, books would need to be purchased to stock the shelves, and library management systems and equipment would need to be purchased for check-out services and barcoding would need to be completed. All school libraries would have to be closed for a minimum of four months at the beginning of the school year to transition.

The reduction or elimination of the cash contribution (\$250,000), library services (\$190,000), and/or crossing guards (\$80,000) has not been given a timeline by the city's proposed budget cuts and if cuts would be for one year or a permanent elimination of services from the city to ESUSD. The city could reduce their expenditures by \$520,000.

Another strategic planning meeting of the City Council and Departmental Staff is scheduled at the El Segundo Library on Monday, August 4 at 5 p.m. It is an open meeting and the Board of Trustees of the El Segundo Unified School District will be in attendance and are reaching out to citizens who are available to attend in support of the district not losing library services and/or crossing guard services from the city of El Segundo. •

of pension reform) and 100 percent into the Public Agency Retirement System (PARS). Meanwhile, managers and department heads (who are unrepresented and have no bargaining capacity) began to contribute toward their PERS retirement contributions—with the amounts ranging from three to seven percent.

Most of the prior contracts contained a provision for cost of living increases if general fund core gross revenues increased by \$1.5 million during the designated time periods. The agreements also guaranteed employees would not be laid off unless general fund revenues for any six-month period fell 7.5 percent or more.

Despite the prospect of savings, the Council of the time was not unanimous in approving the agreements. Then Councilmember and now Mayor Suzanne Fuentes explained that she was not comfortable giving up "one of our big bargaining chips"—the option to lay off employees. Then Councilmember Don Brann thought the negotiations were a "hurried process without sufficient discussion." He was additionally disappointed that the City remained closed Fridays, thought the contract terms should run for one-year only, and felt employees should pay their full share of the retirement system.

For this summer's round of talks, the City enlisted the services of attorney Steve Filarsky as its chief negotiator. Specializing in public sector labor relations, Filarsky has 34 years of experience negotiating contracts on behalf of public agencies. The hire did not sit well with El Segundo City Employees Association representative Wendell Phillips, who described Filarsky as "more of an adversarial negotiator" and felt bringing the latter on was "not a hopeful sign" that talks will go smoothly.

Representation for the other unions includes the Teamsters (Police Support Services Employees Association, Supervisory and Professional Employees Association) and Richard Levine with Silver, Hadden, Silver, Wexler and Levine (El Segundo Police Officers Association, El Segundo Firefighters Association). The El Segundo Police Managers Association represents itself. Under the Brown Act, discussions between Council and its designated labor negotiators take place in closed sessions to review the City's position

and provide direction. City budget estimates for 2014/15 currently do not assume continued concessions from labor groups. Concessions for all bargaining units, with the exception of the Supervisory and Professional Employees Association, are due to expire on September 30, 2014 and must be renegotiated in order to continue.

Earlier this month several union representatives publicly expressed disappointment with the Council, feeling the latter created and inflated the shortfall to force labor into additional concessions. Among other statements, El Segundo Police Officers Association President Sergeant Mike Gill said the Council had no plan to close the budget gap and "successfully created a grand deficit" the likes of which he had never seen—all in an "effort to influence and impact the negotiation process."

Initially looking at a \$514,000 deficit for the next fiscal year, the Council opted at a recent strategic planning session to increase its reserves level, put aside monies for economic uncertainty and equipment replacement, and fund over \$3 million for high-priority capital improvement projects it felt could no longer be

delayed. At the time the group also declined a cost-saving proposal to cut department budgets by three percent across the board, pointing to the likely adverse impacts on residents from service losses. Even with other cost-saving measures such as cutting school and storm water funding, the moves resulted in a projected deficit of well over \$4 million.

Responding to various allegations from the union heads, Councilmember Marie Fellhauer said the intention during negotiations is for both sides "to work together to meet our City's needs." However, she pointed out that the City has "deferred so many projects for so long" while employees have been "paid more than fair" and received raises while local infrastructure continues to crumble. "Accusing us that we are making up this deficit, I don't accept," Fellhauer said. "We need employees to step up and keep this city great."

Mayor Suzanne Fuentes added that "it's time for the City to start paying attention" to its infrastructure. "We're trying to get our house in order," she said of the need to address critical improvements such as sidewalk repair and tree maintenance. •

Why is the CHP officer any different? Wouldn't a uniformed officer respond to a similar incident involving two average citizens to pacify the situation and arrest the aggressor? So why do this CHP officer's actions get overlooked? As a peace officer he failed and as a man he looks pathetic beating a woman into the ground when he was not once attacked.

It saddens me and scares me that there are people who are not disturbed by these violent and cowardly actions of this CHP officer. I am irritated and baffled that the outcry has been rather timid after a video reveals a man savagely beating a woman into the ground. We are failing ourselves as a society when we justify violence against civilians by authority figures; and we are failing ourselves as humans when we sit back and accept violence against women. Shame on us. •


