City Council Takes Steps to Make Meetings More Efficient for All

It was only a few months ago that the "over/under" on an El Segundo City Council meeting was frequently somewhere between 10:48 and 11:19 p.m. With the growing list of increasingly complex agenda items often pushing the gatherings (held on the first and third Tuesday evenings of each month) to the four-hour mark, one had to wonder if the Council members – not to mention City of El Segundo staff, attending citizens and maybe even some reporters - found it a struggle to maintain peak energy, attentiveness and performance. On certain nights, one could realistically ask, "Could this meeting actually end on Wednesday?" Even if the regular meetings didn't quite stretch to midnight, the Council members typically also had to go into closed sessions afterward (and always beforehand).

The increased running time of the meetings became a running joke earlier in the year, with playful remarks from the dais referring to the usually failed effort to fall below the aforementioned mythical over/under. But it was a serious matter to Councilmember Don Brann, whose doctorate dissertation topic centered on the topic of meeting length. Rule of thumb: Four-plus hours running late into the night, not so ideal. Former Mayor Eric Busch famously noted on more than one occasion that after a couple of hours, decision-makers begin to experience diminishing returns in effectiveness. Staying fresh

and sharp are paramount when faced with the difficult prospect of setting policy for thousands of constituents.

With that in mind, the goal to keep meeting length within reason while maximizing Council and staff productivity became priorities earlier this year. In April, the Council voted to start its regular meetings an hour earlier – kicking off at 6 p.m. instead of the historical 7 p.m. The preceding closed sessions and interviews and appointments for committees, commissions and boards moved from 5 p.m. to 4 p.m. The objective, according to the staff report, was to "look at ways to be more efficient with the community's, Council's and staff's time." The 6 p.m. start is also in line with other South Bay cities as well as many municipalities across the state.

Since the earlier start went into effect, meetings have generally ended before 9 p.m., allowing those involved to get some shut-eye at a decent hour. However, the Council and staff also implemented additional changes to the agenda itself to simplify the process. One of those, "Approval of Agenda Order," is new. "The City Clerk [Tracy Weaver] surveyed other South Bay cities and several do something like this," City Manager Scott Mitnick explained. "She suggested the language we now use. I have also used a similar format in other organizations."

Another notable recent revision was to move the consent calendar to the front of the meeting, just after the beginning presentations, when in the past it came up after major discussion items. "This was done to be in line with where most California cities place the consent calendar," Mitnick noted. "This allows for more efficient use of staff, consultant and resident/interested party members' time by placing routine consent items at the beginning of the City Council agenda. This way, these individuals don't have to wait through public hearings, staff presentations and other lengthy reports before their more routine consent calendar items are acted on."

As a general rule, the bulk – or sometimes all – of the consent agenda gets automatic approval from the Council without discussion. Sometimes, members will "pull" a consent item to provide further clarification and/or invite additional discussion before the vote. And once in a blue moon, one of those items dominates the meeting. As example, the just-approved changes to the Raytheon South Campus project – part of the consent calendar as a second reading scheduled for adoption – prompted over an hour of Council discourse. Those scenarios are few and far between, though.

Another significant change implemented by staff in August to further reduce meeting length only lasted a month before being scrapped. A decision to remove the second public comment period at the end of meetings ultimately didn't sit well with the Council members. Starting next week, citizens will

Film Review

Ms. Purple is a Visually Stunning Sibling Drama

"373 backers pledged \$73,634 to help bring this project to life." That's the impressive takeaway from director Justin Chon's Kickstarter page for his third independent feature film, *Ms. Purple*. Chon, who stunned audiences and critics alike with his sophomore film, *Gook*, once again brings a heartfelt story of Asian American cultural identity and the basic human desire of belonging to the streets of Los Angeles in *Ms. Purple*, now playing at Landmark's Nuart Theatre.

Ms. Purple centers on 23-year-old Kasie (Tiffany Chu) who unexpectedly finds herself the sole caretaker of her bedridden, comatose, dying father. Abandoned by her mother as a child, Kasie has always struggled with

isolation and feelings of low self-worth, as depicted in the film's beautifully shot opening montage where she wanders alone and aimlessly down Koreatown streets. To make a living, Kasie depends on the seedy Soop Sok karaoke lounge, a local hotspot in the K-town pay-for-play market, where she works as a "hostess" (among other favors male customers may ask of her). Just as she feels like the world is caving in on her, Kasie's estranged brother Carey (Teddy Lee) agrees to return home and help with their father. Here begins the slow process of bridging the fractured familial gap between sister, brother and father.

The brother/sister relationship between Carey

Cross Country Teams Reload for 2019

The El Segundo High School cross country teams are set to make another run at history. Both teams had successful 2018 seasons and have reloaded to make this another potential banner year. Head coach Marcos Bolanos says this season's teams have depth and experience and are highly motivated.

The boys have the deepest and most talented group where as many as 12 who are all capable of running a varsity meet this year. This will allow the team to have some flexibility in racing fresh legs. Leading the Eagles will be team captain Arend Verfaillie,

who is coming off a successful junior season in both XC and track. He set several school records during his junior year and looks to take down some more this season.

Midsummer standouts that look to make an impact include seniors Niall Glynn and Lukas Lux. Senior standout Cobi Rifkin returns as a top seven runner from last fall. Marcus Ortiz returns for his junior year and was one of the top seven from last year. Junior transfer from Mira Costa Will Garrell brings some serious talent and has posted a sub 16-minute in a 3-mile race. Also coming off a huge track season are juniors Ryu Iguchi and Cole Sterba. The Eagles are looking to have five runners break the 16-minute mark this season! Should that happen, it would be unprecedented for the Eagles' program and

make them legitimate contenders to advance to the state meet.

The Lady Eagles continue to march along with historic results. They have won four straight Ocean League titles, won several invitational meets, made it four straight years to the CIF Southern Section finals as well as three straight years to the meet state with top 10 finishes. Last season, they finished third at the 2018 at the CIF state meet. They have reloaded with talent despite losing two 4-year mainstays in Nikki Fulcomer and Gabby Lee.

Led by senior co-captain James Matlosz and Sophia Zago, the Lady Eagles, ranked seventh in the CIF-SS Division 4, look to storm back to the place they left off last

year. Matlosz and Zago are both coming off strong track seasons and look to run in the low 17s for a 3-mile course. Behind them will be a young bunch of talented runners including sophomores Tyler Matlosz, Erin Rifkin, Ami Jacobson and Isabella Mai. Tyler Matlosz is the freshman record-holder for the 3-mile and won three events for the track team. Rifkin and Mai have plenty of experience and look to be one of the top seven. Jacobson has had one of the strongest summers and looks ready to cement herself as a top seven runner. The Lady Eagles continue their depth with two returning seniors in Letina Daniel and Leah Guziak, who both helped in the push to a successful run to the league championship and the CIF and state meets last year.

ES School Board OKs Middle School Gym, Security Cameras

Two weeks into the start of the new school year, the members of the El Segundo School Board were privy to special presentations on Tuesday evening, ranging from the second effort from new student representative to the Board Ella Tichy to a presentation from a duo representing the architectural firm Westberg White Architects (WWA), detailing their proposed plans for developing the long-sought El Segundo Middle School (ESMS) gymnasium project.

The Westberg White presentation, which the Board ratified later in the meeting, began by touting prior collaboration with the El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD) and WWA. Accomplishments listed included multiple projects at myriad school sites. The presentation also lauded WWA's successful collaboration with the Redondo Beach Unified School District in the construction of similar gymnasium projects at Adams and Parras middle schools.

Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore said the District was pleased to again partner with WWA, and that she and the facilities committee had visited the Adams modular gymnasium facility and were impressed with the results.

Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services, Marisa Janicek, made a presentation regarding District results in testing to comply with the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress. In a nutshell, the District students are progressing quite well. "We are extremely pleased with the results overall," said Moore, noting how ESUSD students, for the most part, are meeting or exceeding state and county averages as well as test scores of other "like" schools locally.

Chief Business Official Kim Linz next spoke about the current numbers associated with the District's "Unaudited Actuals" financial statement. Prior to the meeting, Linz emailed, "Due to conservative budgeting practices, the ESUSD remains on solid financial footing. The ESUSD continues the historical practice of careful fiscal planning to ensure the continuance of quality programming for students while still leading the way with innovative curriculum that prepares our students for the future."

The ESUSD has for years faced a structural budget deficit that occurs when a district has expenditures that exceed revenues. Moore said this budget deficit occurs because of a "lack of adequate financing" from California state coffers.

One of the consent items passed Tuesday evening was the California School Funding Coalition Participation agreement, which ESUSD first entered in 2017, and has the aim to promote legislative awareness as the District continues to mine diverse sources to adequately fund programs.

Consent agenda items that the Board passed included a couple of mid-May assemblies at Center Street Elementary School designed to allow fourth and fifth grade students to participate in a retelling of America's beginning by utilizing games, music and storytelling to make history resonate.

The main action item approved was the agreement with NIC Partners, to the tune of \$1,439,823, that will, according to District-provided notes, "provide installation of a new, comprehensive Cisco Meraki camera solution" that will "enhance the District-wide electronic video surveillance system for increased safety and security, and upgrade the wireless access points and switches at all sites." The seven-year contract will be funded by Measure ES Bond funds (\$643,120), and Sale of (Imperial) Site funds (\$796,703).

In an email sent prior to the meeting, Board President Nancy Cobb wrote, "It is important to emphasize that the community prioritized safety and security when we updated our Long-Range Facility Master Plan in 2018, which specifically identified security cameras as a need." She added that subsequently, Bond Measure ES included \$10 million to address safety and security. She reiterated that in June 2018, consultant Dave Krug from Actus Consulting highlighted the need to install state-of the-art security cameras as one of his recommendations to enhance security. Cobb also noted Dr. Moore's "comprehensive safety update" in May, which detailed the improvements that the District has made in programs, training, personnel and facilities, including the recommendation to pursue the installation of security cameras. Cobb reported that Executive Director of Information Technology Danny Gauna had vetted the available camera options, and that the Cisco Meraki cameras proved to be the best fit.

Also passed was an agreement with El Camino Community College to "develop seamless pathways from high school to community college for career technical education or preparation for transfer."

Moore then highlighted the upcoming District informational calendar, including

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

once again have the opportunity to speak twice (not including opportunities during any public hearings) at the beginning of meetings just after presentations and then once again after department head and Council reports. During the Sept. 3 Council meeting, Brann pointed out that the 6 p.m. start prevents some individuals from arriving at the meetings in time to speak - thereby leaving a second comment period as their only chance to participate. But he added that the second comment period (typically only one or two citizens approach the podium) does not make much of an impact on meeting length and he would be amenable to having just one comment period perhaps in the 7 to 7:30 range. For the foreseeable future, there will be two sets of public communications.

As for the aforementioned public hearings, that portion of the agenda is required by state law and/or City code, Mitnick explained. "Other items are placed on the Council agenda when action is required by the Council and if the Council has requested informational items to be on the agenda. Staff also places

informational items on the agenda as well." Mitnick added that while there are no specific time limits to the meetings, the overall length is taken into account in advance when placing items on the agendas. He also emphasized that the recent changes are not due to his arrival on the scene. "As the city manager, I have made some minor procedural changes to the agenda format," he said. "However, these have been really minor and based on my experience in other local governments... along with 'Best Management Practice' recommendations from the League of California Cities and other professional associations



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
