## City's Arborist Pleased to See Tree Budget a Bit More Limber

During its summer strategic planning sessions, the El Segundo City Council agreed to increase the annual budget allocation towards tree maintenance by another \$75,000. The news warmed the heart of Park Maintenance Superintendent Mark Trujillo, the City's arborist, who hoped additional funding could help him and his staff address long-deferred work on El Segundo's "urban forest." Now in his 30th year on the job in El Segundo, Trujillo not only oversees local street trees but also maintenance of parks, medians, open spaces and any landscaping on City-owned property.

"We have an in-house tree crew that prunes, removes trees and stumps, and plants trees—but unfortunately, they cannot keep up with the maintenance of the City's 6,000 trees," Trujillo said. "That is where the contract tree maintenance comes into play. During the economic downturn, less money was available for contract maintenance and so a longer cycle took place between tree-trimming. We would like to get back to a four- to five-year cycle with our grid pruning, which will keep the trees healthy and safe."

That being said, Trujillo and staff also face challenges in righting some landscaping wrongs of the past. "Some inappropriate species were planted in limited growing space, or a tree that can reach 50 feet tall was planted under power lines—and as a result of that, trees are topped by utility companies and that leaves the new growth susceptible to failure or the tree roots cause damage to curbs and sidewalks to create tripping hazards," Trujillo said. He added that the City now makes sure to plant species compatible with El Segundo's climate zone and available growing spaces. That includes shorter-height trees under power lines to avoid future clearance issues.

A South Bay native who was one of nine children and grew up in nearby Gardena, Trujillo set his career path in motion while still in high school after taking horticulture classes there and enrolling in a Future Farmers of America program. But an industrial accident two weeks after graduation temporarily derailed his plans. "I spent the next four years going through a series of reconstructive hand surgeries and rehab," Trujillo said. "After I completed the rehab process, I was encouraged to go into a different profession that wasn't as physically demanding...but I didn't think working in a building or at a desk would fit with my personality. I liked working outdoors and seeing

the physical results of my labor."

Trujillo's desire to "keep it outside" led to his first notable position in 1982 as a Parks Maintenance Worker for the City of Hermosa Beach. After three years in the small department there, he realized that advancement opportunities were few and far between. "I then applied, tested, interviewed and was hired by the City of El Segundo in 1985 as a Park Maintenance Worker and was promoted to Park Maintenance Worker II within a couple of months," he said. In that capacity, Trujillo spent most of his time at Recreation Park and thankfully not at a desk. He continued to rise up the ranks, with stints

## School Board Views Special Presentation on District Testing

The Tuesday night meeting of the El Segundo Unified School District School Board featured special presentations by Preschool Director Guadalupe Grijalva and Marisa Janicek, the District's Executive Director of Educational Services. Grijalva spoke about the possible expansion of after-noon hours for the Eagles' Nest Preschool; Janicek took to the presentation podium and detailed the District's implementation of the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) testing program.

In her presentation, Grijalva noted that "we heard the requests of parents in our program that needed additional time for their children in a caring and educational setting." The current program that is in place includes a p.m. session that runs

from 12:00 to 3 p.m., serves only three-year-old children, and has an enrollment capped at 11 students. Grijalva and staff are proposing to extend care until 4:00 p.m., with both three and four-year-old students accommodated. Extending the Eagles' Nest hours will also help meet the needs of working parents. Grijalva is hoping to implement the new extended-hours program in the next week.

Grijalva's presentation noted that 32 families who were surveyed were interested in participating in the possible extended-hours option. Wrote the Preschool Director in an email sent prior to the meeting: "We surveyed families about our programs and services and one of the things that we discovered was that we were not meeting the needs of families who sought additional

## Feels Neither is Right

A "fee" over \$1,800 to any El Segundo resident, for the transportation and mileage only, to the nearest emergency room, by city paid (taxpayers) paramedics in a city paid (taxpayers) vehicle. Why? the city wants to "recover" back some of the 14 million dollars it pays to the fire department for doing their job. Please note, at 3 a.m. paramedics would still be paid the same whether they responded to a 911 call or were left sleeping.

June 2014, Thursday morning at 7:30 A.M. a special council meeting, agenda page 4, to charge an "additional fee" (unknown to most citizens) for the transportation by El Segundo paramedics. They claimed a "recovery" of \$180,000 to the city. I have invoices from Wittman, who's doing the "recovery" col-

lection, and what was paid to the City from June 2014 to July 2015. \$180,000? try over \$800,000.

The 9/15/15 council agenda about the budget, on page C-2, states "collecting for fire inspection fees and for non-resident paramedic transportation". Either way taxpayers already paying for their city paramedic service should not be charged an "additional fee" if they use that service. What would happen if the people of El Segundo hired someone to "recover" the money for the days, months and years for fire services that they didn't call for?

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# Nancy Cobb

## Education and Leadership In and Out of the Classroom

Making a decision to run for any office is one not made lightly or without careful consideration of all the factors involved. One must weigh the reasons for running for that particular election, the timing in one's own journey, and the circumstances of the entity holding that election.

For Nancy Cobb, a retired teacher from the El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD), the election this November for two positions on the ESUSD Board of Trustees is the right timing for her and the next four years appear to have challenging and interesting circumstances the Board will be considering.

"I have been passionate about education my entire life," said Cobb. "My classroom experience for more than 17 years will bring a new perspective to the Trustees. Since my retirement in 2010 I have remained involved in various aspects of the high school. As chairman of the Leadership Team, I worked with Jim Garza (a current Trustee and former Assistant Principal and Principal at El Segundo High School) on the WASC Accreditation and projects for the school.

"There are many challenges facing teachers today that didn't exist at the beginning of my teaching career. Embedding Common Core into the existing standards, educating everyone on that implementation, and communicating all that is needed to make for a successful learning experience for the students is not an overnight accomplishment," she stated.

"The influence of new technology in the classroom does not end with the 1:1 iPad for each student either. This program has been a challenge for the teachers in that the teaching methods needed to be adapted, homework handled differently, and the program will

always have glitches. So there is that challenge as well. But teachers are resilient and I have seen many changes since my first classroom experience."

When a teacher shortage in California was big news even in her small farming hometown back in Illinois, Nancy Cobb sought out an interview on her college campus. An aunt and uncle who lived in southern California encouraged a visit so she could see first-hand where she could be living and working. Santa Monica High School is larger than that town she left in the Midwest.

"The Santa Monica area was so exciting!" Nancy Cobb recalls. "It was so 'cosmopolitan' compared to where I came from. I knew I wanted to teach and moving here was such a wonderful opportunity. The job was teaching high school English Literature. I had my degree from Knox College in Galesburg, Illinois. In order to teach here I needed to take more classes, so I enrolled at UCLA." In 2005, she earned a Master's degree in Education from Chapman University.

That was all in the mid-'60s. Nancy left teaching for a few years to start her family. In 1976, looking for a community where she could be more involved, she moved to El Segundo and raised her two kids, Lori and Greg, here. They both attended schools in ESUSD.

In 1985, she began NL Cobb Associates, an Executive Search firm with a specialty in the apparel industry, working out of an El Segundo Main Street office space.

"I really enjoyed having my own business. I became a member of the El Segundo Chamber of Commerce and joined the El Segundo Rotary Club. As a President of the Chamber,

# Film Review


## One Man's Foot is Another Man's Treasure in the Documentary *Finders Keepers*.

In 2007, a North Carolina man got a lot more than he bargained for when he bid on a used grill from a repossessed storage unit at a local flea market. Much to his surprise, when Shannon Whisnant took the grill home, he discovered a severed human foot inside. An egotistical and boisterous personality, he unapologetically intended to keep this foot forever, despite demands of its return from the man whose foot it was. As bizarre as it

out of tragedy— John lost his foot in an airplane crash that also left his father dead. On top of struggling with drugs and alcohol for years, the death of his dad was especially hard on him, so he decided to mummify his foot in memoriam. It's an unconventional idea, but the way John speaks to the camera and explains his hardships so honestly and, now seven years sober, so openly, we can't help but support his decisions, no matter how crazy they may be.

Directors Bryan Carberry and Clay Tweel have

sounds, this all happens within the first act of the film *Finders Keepers*, truly one of the strangest and funniest documentaries of the year.

While most people who discover an amputated body part would either alert authorities or get rid of it as quickly as possible, Shannon found this as an opportunity to cash in on 15 minutes of fame. Assuming that this severed foot would be an easy moneymaking spectacle, he charged \$1 for children and \$3 for adults to take a peek at just the grill the foot came in. He was making a name for himself as a ruthless media hog, and much to the dismay of his family, Shannon thought this was his big break. He always wanted to be "famous." really found a needle in a haystack with *Finders Keepers*. While it is tonally a funny film, they don't shy away from hitting poignant, emotional notes that ground the film and give it substance. ## Eagles Run to Victory and Improve to 3-0

The El Segundo football team has routinely put up big numbers with their pass-happy offenses in past years. That may have changed with the emergence of junior running back Taz Tauaese, who rushed for 323 yards and five touchdowns in the Eagles' 42-30 win over host Bishop Montgomery. Not since Scippio Stubbs in the 90s and Chris Atmore, who rushed for 318 and 383 yards in back to back games in 2005, had an Eagles running back rushed for 300 yards or more in a game.

The Eagles came into the game facing an undefeated Bishop Montgomery team full of experience, pride and vengeance. In the past seven meetings the Knights had dropped six consecutive games, so this was a game they were looking forward to. They used that incentive to take the opening drive of the game 95 yards in 15 plays to take a 7-0 lead.

The Eagles responded with a long drive of their own. Senior quarterback Jason Kehl found Landon Sharp open for a 12-yard gain and Tauaese gained another 11 yards on the ground. Then Tauaese took Kehl's handoff for 58 yards to the Knight's one-yard line and one play later dove into the end zone to tie the game. That long run by Tauaese would be a premonition of what would be in store for the Knight's defense the rest of the game.

On the next El Segundo possession it took four consecutive Tauaese running plays to give the Eagles a 14-7 lead. This time Tauaese's 9-yard run was second and third effort and drug two defenders into the end zone with him.

Bishop Montgomery's quarterback Brendan Marafino threw an interception to Isaiah Gray and the Eagles went back to work. Kehl directed the Eagles on a 10 play drive spanning 84 yards. Sophomore tight end Taj Balogun caught a pass for a 21 yard pickup and Tauaese picked up 48 rushing yards on the drive including a one yard dive into the end zone to give the Eagles a 21-7 lead.

This had all the makings of another runaway blowout and the Eagles were seemingly in control on both offense and defense. Shaman Moore came up with an interception and nearly returned it for a pick six but was caught at the 4-yard line. Tauaese did the rest on the next play by carrying two defenders into the end zone for a 28-7 lead.

Bishop Montgomery responded with a long drive to get into the end zone to make it 28-14 on Marafino's keeper from two yards out. With time winding down in the first half time keeping by the game clock was suspect with no time running on rushing plays or tackles inbounds and when the officials were clearly winding the clock.

The first half was clearly a test for the Eagles, who were playing without several key players due to injuries. But with the way Tauaese was running the ball and the way the defense was responding the second half looked favorable for the eighth ranked Eagles. What was a concern for Eagle head coach Steve Shevlin was the mounting penalties the Eagles were being assessed. Unsportsmanlike, offsides



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

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

and too many players on the field helped the Knights sustain drives or give the Eagles poor field position.

“When you have as many penalties (12-127 for the game) that we had and can still come away with a win I think it says something about our resiliency. We also have to be smarter, keep our mouths shut and not make so many mistakes,” Shevlin said.

Bishop Montgomery attempted an on-sides kick to start the second half that failed. Tauaese ripped off a 48-yard run and the Eagles looked like they were going in for another score. The Knights stopped the Eagles and El Segundo would settle for a field goal attempt that sailed wide. It marked the first time in 31 games that the Eagles hadn't scored inside the red zone (20-yard line).

The Knights made it a 28-21 game following a double reverse pass play when Kane Kutler found a wide-open Bryce Matthews for a 47-yard score. It was a play the Eagle's defense wasn't expecting but one they'll make sure to work on in future practices defensive coordinator Dan Heck hinted.

The mark of any good quarterback is his leadership skills under duress. Jason Kehl led the Eagles on their most important drive of the game. With precision play calling and great line blocking Kehl directed the Eagles on a 70 yard seven play drive he capped with a two yard dive into the end zone behind the blocking of center Jess Caravello to put the Eagles on top 35-21.

Bishop Montgomery used up nearly five minutes to start the fourth quarter on a 16-play. The Eagle's defense would bend but not break and on fourth and goal at the El Segundo

3-yard line Mark Binder and Shaman Moore stopped Patrick Smith short of the goal line. The Eagles took over but when their punt was blocked out of the end zone the lead shrank to 35-23. The Knights would score on their ensuing possession to make it 35-30 with just over four minutes remaining.

A turnover gave the Knights a chance to take the lead with under three minutes left in the game. Haamid Brooks then forced and recovered a fumble on the Eagle's 30 yard line. On the first play Tauaese found daylight on a counter and outran the Knights' secondary for a 70-yard touchdown run and a 42-30 win for the Eagles.

The Eagles improved to 3-0 on the year and travel Friday night at 7pm to face a Torrance team that has been struggling. The Eagles return home next Friday night to take on South Torrance.

The freshman team dropped a close game to North Torrance 16-8. The Eagle's only score came on the last play of the first half when Mathew Romero scrambled for a touchdown.

The Eagles, who started the season 2-2, improved to 10-2 overall with their recent eight game win streak. One of the Eagles' wins was an 11-10 comeback win against third ranked Crescenta Valley. With the Eagles trailing by two goals in the third period, Kelly Reynolds tallied three goals. Nick Paz and Lucas Frerichs each scored three goals while Matt Marak had two goals. Defensively Kyle Crist was phenomenal and Justin Knoll had seven saves. The Eagles faced Glendale this past Tuesday and travel to Redondo to play the Sea Hawks today. •

is because he has been overused as he has increased in age. Scott blames himself for using Kobe too much last season. Doing so led to Bryant being fatigued, having to sit out many games, and to an eventual tear of his rotator cuff after playing only 35 games of the season.

In the 35 games that Bryant played last season, he averaged 34.5 minutes played per game. While it remains unclear how many minutes per game he and coach Scott will agree on for this season, there is no question that it will be well less than that 34.5. While it's easy to throw a number out there at the beginning of the season and say you'll stick to it, gauging minutes on a star as competitive as Kobe can be rather difficult. Will he sit out all back-to-back games? If the Lakers are down by three points with two minutes left but Kobe's already played his 30 minutes for the night, will he continue to sit on the bench? These are all factors that will make coaching this Kobe Bryant led team that much harder for Scott in this upcoming season.

Bryant was medically cleared to begin all basketball activities last Thursday after rehabbing his shoulder for the past nine months. Scott and

the Lakers want to make sure that it's the last rehabbing Kobe will ever have to do. “I know Kobe's a competitor and he's going to play as many minutes as you want him to play,” Scott said. “I'm also a competitor, so I want to win and I know having him on the court gives me the best opportunity to win.” Kobe's expected to get things going this season by participating in the team's training camp at the end of the month in Hawaii. He's also already been working out this summer, closer to his home in Newport Beach. “If this is his last year,” Scott said of Kobe, “I want him to go out standing. I don't want him to go out hurt.”

The Lakers are obviously a young team and it remains to be seen just how good they will actually be. With so many unknown factors and such a young core, it doesn't realistically look as if Kobe will get the opportunity to compete for a championship in what might be his final season in the NBA. At this point, though, that doesn't matter. Kobe Bryant has been one of the best, if not the best, player of this generation. To see one more complete, healthy season out of a man that once ruled the NBA is all that Lakers fans and NBA fans alike could possibly ask for. •

as both Park Maintenance Leadworker and Supervisor over the next decade. In 2002, he became the acting Park Maintenance Superintendent after the prior person had to leave the department for health reasons. Trujillo outlasted several outside candidates to land the position permanently in 2003. Among the requirements: He had to become a Certified Arborist with the International Society of Arboriculture as well as a licensed pesticide applicator through the Department of Pesticide Regulations within a year of his appointment. “That was a tough year, to say the least, but I managed to successfully attain both certificates,” he said.

Looking at the highlights of his career with the City, Trujillo pointed to several new facilities he said have enriched the local landscape and listed Campus El Segundo, Camp Eucalyptus, Holly Valley Park and Clutters Park as examples. He also appreciates the relationships he has built with local residents and the community. “I now see children who used to play in the parks bringing their own children to enjoy the same things they enjoyed doing when they were kids,” Trujillo said. “I have had the pleasure of working with the high school coaches that use City fields like Keith Cameron, Steve Shevlin and of course John Stevenson. I have also had the pleasure of working with the Recreation and Parks Commission, which always has the best interests of the community—and the

Tree Musketeers that continues to provide much-needed volunteer support to enhance our own efforts.”

As for his fellow colleagues, Trujillo referred to City staff as his “family away from home,” adding that he has worked with some of the personnel for his entire 30 years. “In my position, I attend many meetings with staff from various departments and feel the City is in good hands with competent representatives on every level,” he said. “The Recreation and Parks Department has had several directors during my tenure, but I feel Bob Cummings brought stability, a level head and professionalism during his time with us. Our current Director, Meredith Petit, is a bright, young, enthusiastic professional who has great ideas and will take the department to new heights and continue to improve the City under her watch.”

In the meantime with some additional budget to help the trees along and plenty of work still to be done, Trujillo will hold off on retirement for a few more years. When he does wrap up his career, he plans to enjoy his free time with his wife, three sons and (hopefully plural by then, he emphasized, as he has just one now) grandchildren. And what does the arborist do with his current spare time? “My main hobby right now is restoring a 1972 [Chevy] Nova Super Sport,” he said. Well, everyone needs to branch out here and there...•

care, such as parents who worked full-time-plus schedules. With this proposed expansion of care, we hope to pick-up families in the community who already see us as a great program, love the teaching staff and parent network, and can now have a bit more time of quality care for their children."

Said Grijalva: "We want to continue to meet the need of the family dynamics in the community, and offer support to the families of young children."

Next up to the presentation podium was Marisa Janicek. She detailed the District's participation in the fairly new CAASPP testing program. The District had field-tested the program in 2013-14, with no results given. They then tested again in the 2014-2015 school year, and plan on testing again this spring, with students in grades 3-8, and grade 11 being tested.

She called it "one measure of how our students are performing throughout the year." Mentioning that the new testing format is "more rigorous than the old multiple-choice exams that we have been accustomed to with the former standardized tests," she noted that the students are now testing on a computer, and have to explain "how they solve problems, think critically, and write analytically." Calling it a "major shift for our students and teachers,"

she said the results so far have been "above average," but cannot be compared to the previous testing results, likening it to comparing "apples and oranges."

She said that this year the administrators and instructors are looking at baseline data and "breaking down and analyzing the results to look at our strengths and areas of focus by schools, grades, and classes." She said that by analyzing the data, "we can inform our teaching and build interventions and accelerations for individual students." But as important as these new tests are, she noted that, ultimately, the tests are just "one way to assess the progress of students, like a report card or grades on class assignments."

"As an academic check-up," she concluded, "these tests are simply one tool to gauge what students know."

In an email received prior to the meeting, ESUSD Superintendent Melissa Moore wrote that "the CAASPP results provide the District with a baseline metric for this new accountability system. We welcome the new, more rigorous system as an opportunity to analyze the data and inform our instructional program. The faculty at each school has embraced the California State Standards. This new system allows for an opportunity to grow and improve

as a learning organization. We will be watching to see how we grow as a school district, school site, within groups of students, and as individuals over time. We will also be looking to other measures of success that we will also consider as part of our system of continuous improvement."

Student representative to the Board Lexi Griffin next gave her report, which was followed by the Board tackling Tuesday evening's consent agenda. There were ten items on the consent agenda, including the approval of an April assembly at Richmond Street School; an agreement with Straight Up Communications; and two agreements with school District consultants.

The annual Colonial Day assembly will take place at Richmond Street in the afternoon of April 22nd. Always popular with the students, the assembly will last about two hours, and allow the students an interactive, educational experience as they sample Franklin's Colonial Day Museum on Wheels. Straight Up Communications will be providing the District with professional services as it relates to public relations and communications. The District hopes to "enhance ESUSD's brand and increase parent and community engagement through communication and promotion of the programs

and achievements of the ESUSD and students served by the District."

A consultant agreement with Network Solutions was approved. Network Solutions will provide their expertise in the implementation of the planned upgrade to the District's network infrastructure. A consultant agreement with A Higher Level was also approved, with the District tasking the company to "provide services to assist in auditing and making recommendations to our existing recipes in the District's Food Services program."

There were only three items on the action item portion of the agenda during the 100-minute meeting, with the Board taking action on new Eaglet Care fees for the 2015-16 school year. Fees will range from \$35 for a one-day, 1.5 hour stay, to \$500 per month for a daily stay of 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Superintendent Moore then highlighted the informational calendar, noting PTA events, the Richmond Street Fall Festival that will take place on October 9, and the Great Shake-out and High School College night that are calendared for October 15. Board member reports followed, with Moore then giving her Superintendent's report.

The next regularly scheduled Board meeting is on the docket for Tuesday evening, October 13. •

I had an opportunity to meet Senator Barbara Boxer when we worked so diligently to keep the Los Angeles Air Force Base open. Boxer became interested in Technology Transfer from the El Segundo-based aerospace industry and that led to her better understanding of the need for the base to remain open. While cleaning out old Chamber files of El Segundo Business and Professional Women, I came across records of their community leadership program; subsequently, Kathy Hagler and I founded Leadership El Segundo, which Joe Harding revived this past year.

"I also worked on various Chamber committees to update Downtown El Segundo and install the Heritage Walk, the tiles along Main Street dedicated to so many families and individuals. I returned to teaching in 1998. Even though owning my business was a successful detour while raising my family and was instrumental in my Chamber involvement, I missed teaching. Being involved with Leadership El Segundo and 'teaching' those participants made me realize that," Cobb recalled.

As a classroom teacher, a business entrepreneur, a leader in her volunteer opportunities with Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce, a unique perspective on education, and a passion for teaching and learning, Nancy Cobb appears to be a well-rounded individual with a positive objectivity on the future of education in the 21st century in El Segundo's schools. •

# Looking Up

## Saturn's Moon Enceladus Hosts a Global Ocean

Every square inch of Saturn's small moon Enceladus overlies a potentially habitable ocean. Observations of Enceladus' slight wobble as it orbits Saturn can only be explained if the outer crust floats freely from the inner core, according to scientists studying images taken by NASA's Cassini spacecraft. This means there is a globe-spanning ocean beneath Enceladus' icy surface.

Enceladus has been a prime location for studying the potential for life in the solar system for the past decade, since Cassini found in 2006 a fine spray of water vapor, icy particles, and simple organic molecules erupting from fractures near Enceladus' south pole. Measurements of the saltiness of geyser particles in 2009 proved that they must emanate from a liquid reservoir, and a 2014 analysis of Enceladus' gravitational pull on the Cassini spacecraft demonstrated that the liquid reservoir is at least a regional sea underlying the entire south pole region. The new results—derived using an independent line of evidence based on Cassini's images—prove that that regional sea is a widening of a global ocean. This discovery is published online in the journal *Icarus*.

"This exciting discovery expands the region of habitability for Enceladus from just a regional sea under the south pole to all of Enceladus," said Matthew Tiscareno, a Cassini participating scientist at the SETI Institute, Mountain View, California, and a

coauthor of the paper. "The global nature of the ocean likely tells us that it has been there for a long time, and is being maintained by robust global effects, which is also encouraging from the standpoint of habitability," he said.

The discovery was made through a combination of imaging, dynamical modeling,

and statistical analysis. "This was a hard problem that required years of observations, and calculations involving a diverse collection of disciplines, but we are confident we finally got it right," said Peter Thomas, a Cassini imaging team member at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, and lead author of the paper.

Enceladus has a tiny, but measurable wobble as it orbits Saturn. The icy moon is not perfectly spherical, and because it goes slightly faster and slower during different parts of its orbit, Saturn pulls and pushes the small moon back and forth as it rotates.

Tiscareno developed a series of dynamical models of this wobble, technically called a libration, and Thomas's group then tested each model against hundreds of Cassini images, taken of Enceladus' surface at different times and from different angles, to find the best fit to the observations with extreme precision. The team plugged their best-fit value for the wobble into different models for how Enceladus might be arranged on the inside, including ones where the moon was frozen from surface to core.

"If the surface and core were rigidly connected, the core would provide so much dead weight that the wobble would be far smaller than we observe it to be," said Tiscareno, "This proves that there must be a global layer of liquid separating the surface from the core," he said.

The geysers deliver samples from this ocean to the surface regularly, which makes Enceladus a prime candidate in the search for life beyond Earth. Although a handful of worlds are now thought to have subsurface oceans, Enceladus joins only Jupiter's moon Europa (which was recently selected as the destination of NASA's next flagship mission) in having an extraterrestrial ocean that is known to communicate with its surface. •


