### Taking a Look at Measure BT

### The City Attorney's Impartial Analysis:

Measure BT would adopt an Ordinance amending various sections of the El Segundo Municipal Code dealing with business license taxes ("BLTs"). Specifically, the Ordinance would:

Modify the BLT credit. Currently, businesses that generate sales tax receive a credit toward the BLT in an amount up to 40% of their last year's sales tax. The Ordinance would limit the BLT credit for such businesses to a three-year period and an overall cap of \$25,000.

Change the tax method for apartment operators and hotels/motels. Currently, apartment complex owners are charged an annual BLT of \$32.80 for up to the first three units and \$11.30 for each additional unit. The Ordinance would increase the BLT to \$150 for the first three units and \$150 for each additional unit. Hotels/motels are currently charged a flat rate ranging from \$111.30 to \$432.60 annually, depending on the number of rooms. The Ordinance would increase the BLT to \$150 for up to the first three rooms and \$150 for each additional room.

Adjust the BLT rates for approximately 50 business types listed in the El Segundo Municipal Code. The Ordinance would set the base BLT for these business at \$150 per year. Some of the classified businesses currently pay a BLT less than \$150 and some pay more than \$150. Therefore, the Ordinance would increase taxes for some businesses and decrease taxes for others.

Increase the rates for unclassified businesses (those not specifically listed in the El Segundo Municipal Code). Unclassified businesses are taxed based on the number of employees and the floor area occupied by the business. Currently, the rates are \$111.30 per year for the first ten employees and \$137.80 for each additional employee, plus \$0.27 for each square foot

of floor area over 5,000. The Ordinance would increase the BLT to \$150 per year for the first five employees and \$138 for each additional employee. The Ordinance would also transition to progressive tax rates on floor area, ranging from \$0.26 per square foot for businesses between 2,001 and 5,000 square feet to \$0.30 per square foot for businesses occupying more than 250,000 square feet.

Eliminate the exemption for nonprofit/charitable organizations and instead impose a flat BLT of \$150 per year.

Modify the formula for calculating the annual consumer price index ("CPI") adjustment for all BLT rates. Currently, all BLT rates are adjusted each year based on the most recent ten-year average annual increase in the CPI for consumers in the greater Los Angeles region. The Ordinance would change the annual adjustment to a rate equivalent to the most recent five-year average annual increase in the CPI.

The tax rates set forth in the Ordinance are maximum rates. The El Segundo City Council may, by resolution, suspend or reduce any of the BLTs.

The BLT is a general tax, the proceeds of which are placed in the general fund to be used for any lawful City purpose.

The El Segundo City Council placed Measure BT on the ballot. It takes a simple majority of the votes cast to pass Measure BT.

The above statement is an impartial analysis of Measure BT. 

On November 8th, El Segundo voters will decide who will fill the two available seats on the five-member El Segundo City Council. The five candidates running are Ryan Baldino, Michelle Keldorf, John Pickhaver, Robin Patch and incumbent Chris Pimentel.

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1. The workforce return to office has been significantly thwarted such that we see a major uptick in office vacancies, how would you address?

**Ryan Baldino:** El Segundo is known as an amazing place to live, play, raise a family, and work. El Segundo is proud to have been nominated for the third time as the Most Business Friendly City in LA County.

However, vacant office spaces threaten the tax revenue needed to keep our town thriving for its residents. I recently met with members of El Segundo Economic Development Corporation who believe offering more amenities east of PCH would attract employees. For the short term, I propose the return of the downtown shuttle providing the perk of free transportation from businesses east of PCH to our vibrant downtown dining and shops. For the long term we should consider updating our Corporate Office Zone to allow for more coffee houses, restaurants, and other services east of PCH. Our town depends upon maintaining a thriving business community. We need to continue to earn our businessfriendly reputation.

Michelle Keldorf: High vacancy is as much about outdated office space as it is a sluggish post-Covid return to work. On Planning Commission, I have reviewed several new commercial office projects and continue to seek clarity about the demand for additional square footage given vacancies above 20%. Commercial developers consistently respond that demand does exist, but specifically for newly designed space that functions like a campus. These buildings attract tenants and companies by providing considerable employee amenities and open space. Companies like L'Oréal and Haus Laboratories recently acquired creative office space like this in El Segundo. My belief is that people will return to offices but the layouts will be significantly changed. The city can help facilitate this transition by ensuring our zoning code and development standards support this type of office environment.

Robin Patch: The COVID-19 pandemic has undoubtedly changed the office workforce landscape, as many office workers continue to work from home. In my opinion this shift is beneficial to both workers and the City of El Segundo. Employees who are able to work from home no longer have the burden of a commute, and the City experiences less wear-and-tear on roads, and less environmental pollution from traffic. Furthermore, lower occupancy rates in high-density office buildings (mainly those East of PCH) reduces the burden on the City's police force, fire department, and emergency response teams. I prefer to focus attention on supporting local small businesses rather than large Fortune 500 Companies.

John Pickhaver: While we can look to incentivize businesses to return to the office, the reality is many employees enjoy working from home and employers enjoy the lack of tax liability made possible by remote work. This puts the City in a difficult position since much of our revenue derives from business activity. To address this, I would start by looking to attract businesses where remote work is less likely/not feasible for their employees. But we can only have so many Top Golfs. What will be needed is a shift in our approach from workability in our City to livability. This is especially important with a looming deadline to meet state-mandated affordable housing requirements by 2029. Vacant office space provides a pathway to housing and mixed use properties. Additionally this allows us to spread density out, giving relief to neighborhoods in town regularly identified by developers for new projects.

Chris Pimentel: While this is a significant issue in many cities, El Segundo has some distinct advantages that have made us more resilient. We see our office rental rates remain strong, but the utilization of those offices is lower than we would like. That hurts our amenities and businesses built to support them. For the second consecutive year we are finalists for the region's "Most Business-Friendly City". Over the summer 555 S Aviation sold for more than \$200 million and accommodates Belkin's headquarters. We have more than one million square feet of legacy buildings in differing stages of development. We intend to build on this success by modernizing and simplifying our regulations. While I cannot promise what the shape of the modern office will look like, I am confident that we will continue to offer businesses of all sizes the best place to succeed in southern California.

### 2. Rezoning on the east side of PCH could be a way to create more housing within the City. Would you, as a council member, be open to allowing residential zoning across PCH to the east side of the City?

**Ryan Baldino:** I'm always open to having conversations about more housing options for residents, but so far I'm not convinced housing east of PCH is the best path forward for our city. We depend on businesses to provide over 90% of our tax revenue, which is needed to support valuable City services such as our independent police and fire departments. El Segundo receives much less in residential property tax than neighboring cities. This means every business east of PCH that is replaced with a residence will result in substantially less tax revenue for our city. In addition, new homes east of PCH will require increased expenses for more police and fire services. Every section of our city is zoned for a purpose to maximize resources for our citizens, and my years on Planning Commission have taught me that what looks like an immediate win can often have longterm potential negative impacts.

Michelle Keldorf: I believe this is a decision that should be voted on by El Segundo residents rather than by City Council members. City Council's role is to study the benefits and corresponding costs of incorporating housing east of PCH and work diligently to present the community with that information. We must evaluate it as a business attraction and retention tool. Then we need See City Council Candidates, page 12



Garrett, and Frank Glynn. Current members Paulette B. Caudill and Emilee M. Layne opted not to seek re-election.

As election day nears, each of the candidates elaborated for the Herald on their qualifications and provided their viewpoints on the most pressing issues facing the El Segundo Unified School District [ESUSD].

1. What skill set can you bring to the school board that is unique?

Yadranka Lucia Draskovic: "I have experience both in the classroom and in the business arena. Finally I am a school parent and volunteer. I am currently the ESHS PTA Treasurer, and have been on the executive board for the last 5 years.

In terms of my teaching career, I started with 1st and 2nd grade. Later I taught 3rd, and the Middle School grades. I also co-taught a group of 4th and 5th graders. ### 2. What do you see as the two most important issues facing the District, and why?


Yadranka Lucia Draskovic: "The long period of school closures brought about a significant challenge. Recent reports show

that learning gaps exist in both Reading and Math. School closures also brought about emotional and social disruptions that are now seen in the classroom. Nationally, students are returning to school, albeit with new behaviors like anxiety. As a member on the board, I'd like to address this.

Another issue is faculty retention at ESUSD. In recent years we have seen a revolving door of principals at the High School. Last year we saw a large number of administrators/staff leave ESUSD. We also have a national shortage of teachers, which adds to the concern. However, the attrition of High School principals was apparent prior to the Pandemic. One of the 5 goals illustrated on the district website is recruiting and retaining high quality employees. As a member of the board I'd like to revisit that goal."


Frank Glynn: "The legal and moral duty of the school district is to protect the physical security and emotional safety of students on campus. Safety improvements to ESUSD campuses (e.g., creating safe entrances and secure perimeters) are matters addressed in the facilities improvement plan and continue to be evaluated. Today's technology allows for unhealthy social interactions to persist beyond school hours, these interactions could lead to physical and/or emotional encounters on campus, thus all stakeholders - administrators, staff, parents, and community members must engage in collaborative support. See something, say something!

Ongoing funding insecurity continues to plague the State of California schools, this impact is widely felt within ESUSD, as the funding formula unjustly underfunds our See School Board Candidates, page 12

### Measure BT

### **Argument in Favor of Business License Tax Measure BT**

1971, 51 years ago, under Ordinance No. 776, was the last time the El Segundo Business License Tax (BLT) had a major update. The only other changes to the BLT were done 26 years ago in 1996 under Ordinance No. 1252. Today the business community looks very different from that of 1971. Though aerospace and light manufacturing businesses continue to thrive in El Segundo, the business community has become more diverse. Companies in bioscience, technology, financial, entertainment, toys, hospitality, and many other industries now call El Segundo home.

The El Segundo City Council is bringing to the voters an opportunity for residents to vote on a measure that would adopt an Ordinance amending various sections of the Municipal Code dealing with business license taxes ("BLTs"). The city developed the Ordinance to anticipate El Segundo's future business landscape to ensure it remains relevant for the next 10-20 years.

The Ordnance will modernize, simplify, and streamline the current outdated tax structure. Fundamental changes include:

- business attraction incentive.
- Setting the base BLT for all businesses at \$150 per year.
- Align the apartment and hotels/motels
- Modifying the formula for calculating the annual consumer price index ("CPI") adjustment for all BLT rates.

The tax rates set forth in the Ordinance is maximum rates. The City Council may, by resolution, suspend or reduce any of the BLTs.

The BLT is a general tax, and the proceeds will go to the general fund to be used for any lawful City purpose. The BLT changes are anticipated to generate an additional \$3M in General Fund revenues per year for the

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

### <u>Film Review</u>

# Don't Worry Darling: A Massively Underwhelming Misfire Fueled by Gossipy Offscreen Drama

If you keep up with news of the latest movies-or that of Harry Styles-chances are that you've also heard about the new movie Don't Worry Darling. And if you have, what you've also likely heard are the tabloid-worthy headlines detailing the alleged production woes that have accompanied it.

Controversy has followed Don't Worry Darling since the beginning. From highprofile casting shake-ups shortly before the film's shooting, to a scandalous on-set romance between the film's director and its leading male (global pop) star, even up until its cringe-worthy world premiere at Venice Film Festival (which set the internet ablaze

(Florence Pugh), who enjoys her life of cleaning, shopping, cooking, and bedding her husband Jack (Harry Styles), which repeats every day.

It's not long before inexplicable cracks start to appear in Alice's life: flashes of nightmarish imagery break a perfectly manicured day; cracking an egg reveals nothing inside; and a house whose walls are slowly-literally-suffocating her. They're all things that make Alice question not just her life, but that of the vision of Victory's dangerously charismatic leader, Frank (Chris Pine). From there, the film takes predictable steps towards a simultaneously baffling and underwhelming ending.

with #spitgate), perhaps no other movie in recent memory has generated as much gossipy and salacious drama as this has.

And now, as the film finally hits theaters, the question becomes: is the film actually any good?

What general audiences seem to agree-and what this reviewer is personally confirming-is that no, Don't Worry Darling is not good enough to transcend its own self-generated scandalous fodder. In fact, I think that the film-which I found to be visually enjoyable, but ultimately under-written, poorly directed, narratively underwhelming, and overall, quite boring-will only be remembered as a misfire of a movie that once had a lot of supplemental controversy attached to it.

It doesn't bring me any inner delight saying this. I anticipated the film's release at the time of its announcement, as there is a ton of talent both in front of and behind the camera. Olivia Wilde had previously won over audiences (and myself) with her directorial debut, the fresh and fun high school buddy comedy Booksmart; so, the announcement that she would be following that film with one that's best compared to The Stepford Wives and The Matrix was intriguing. But now, that choice just rings as confusing.

If you're aware of its marketing, Don't Worry Darling teases a world of 1950s American utopia; one in which sharply dressed men return home from work every day in their flashy Cadillacs, all awaiting a martini, a pot roast, and a smile from their doting, subservient wives. It's an intoxicating world to behold, this world of "Victory": a Mid-Century Modern community of suburban paradise, where young couples and families live in marital bliss. Among them is Alice

Don't Worry Darling at least has the intention of being a high-concept film, aiming to excite and challenge adult movie-goers. But ultimately, the film's empty story and confusing logic don't give the film any reason to want to care while you watch. Florence Pugh-never one to give a false note in her performances, and who regularly steals every movie she's in-continues to do the same here. But she, along with her co-stars Harry Styles and Chris Pine, are underserved by not having a clear vision for what this movie ultimately is (a social commentary? A silly satire? A sci-fi horror? Or, all of the above?).

I'll admit that following the tabloid headlines around *Don't Worry Darling* was entertaining and enjoyably juicy while it lasted. Now that the film has debuted to disappointing results, there isn't really much here to worry, much less care about.


### Horse by Geraldine Brooks

Geraldine Brooks is a Pulitzer Prize winner and always a good bet for an engrossing look at the world under a microscope. With this sprawling novel of interconnected lives from the Civil War era to present day, spanning the miles from Kentucky to New York and finally to Washington D.C, Brooks has penned another tour de force.

Based on real life, the story is centered around – you guessed it – a horse. Specifically, the brilliant racer and stud sire Lexington who became the leading stud sire for a record sixteen years, with four of his progeny winning the Belmont stakes and three winning the Preakness - Preakness himself being the offspring of the illustrious champion. For twenty years Lexington held the record as the fastest horse in the world. The thread

that pulls the book together is the real-life livestock painter Thomas J. Scott, who painted Lexington and whose 1857 painting, found in a junk heap on the sidewalk, now hangs in the Smithsonian.

Brooks deftly weaves slavery and racism into the story with the fictitious slave Jarret, who foals Darley, as Lexington is originally named, and who cares for and trains him throughout his long and adventurous life. Jarret is a fully realized character who grows up alongside Darley/Lexington. Theo is a black PhD student who struggles through the microaggressions and outright racism of present-day life in Washington D.C. In the novel, it is Theo who finds the painting and brings it to the Smithsonian for restoration and search for provenance. Sandwiched between the two men is Martha Jackson, a prominent New York City art dealer and gallery owner in 1954 who happens upon the painting through her maid, whose family has passed it down through generations.

It is an engrossing, tumultuous and fascinating story in the hands of a prize-winning novelist. Do yourself a favor and check it out!

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

district. As a district, we need to continue to fight at every level to support our amazing teachers and staff, as a community we can narrow the funding gap by donating to the Ed! Foundation."

Meredith J. Beachly: "I would love to see our district continue to provide all of our students a safe environment where they can learn a diverse curriculum and their own level. We need to retain our current incredible educators and hire new educators that provide all of our students with everything they need to be the best they can be, both in and out of the classroom, while staying relevant in the ever changing world. Our job is to prepare the next generation for whatever they may face in their future."

Tracy I. Miller-Zarneke: "The public education funding formula is a continued challenge for our District, since our student body size and demographic place ESUSD on the lower end of the budget provision allowances calculated by the State of California. Our District is constantly faced with a "do more with less" scenario from a base funding perspective, and thus we must seek out grants, partners, sponsors and other innovative ways to expand our staffing, programming and facilities options.

The second issue is actually a good challenge to have: ESUSD must continue to work hard to maintain or surpass its current standing as one of the highest ranked school districts in the country. Only through thoughtful decision-making by District leadership will we achieve our goals for attracting (and retaining) amazing teachers and staff, engaging our community for supplemental fundraising, and ensuring we have high-quality facilities and resources in place to best serve our students."

Dawn Garrett: "First: Re-entry after the last two years of disruption is impacting everyone, especially our students. We need to work through these new challenges together. There will not be a one-size fits all answer. We need to lean on our experts and support our teachers and administrators as they are regrouping. There will be tweaking and tuning along the way to the new normal. We need to focus on building forward from the new baseline focusing on how our kids are doing socially, emotionally and academically. Second: Ensuring we are creating a physically and emotionally safe place for our students to thrive. Teachers and administrators are being faced with unprecedented challenges including campus access and student behavior management. Getting it 'right' is high stakes and our teachers and administrators take that responsibility quite seriously every day. They need our support and partnership to continue to evolve our ESUSD practices." •

to compare potential revenue growth to the financial impact of increased demands on Police, Fire and Public Infrastructure. Along with studying the financial impact, we should have a direct conversation with ESUSD on how this will affect our schools. These considerations must be proactively researched so we, as a community, can make an informed decision.

Robin Patch: I firmly believe in maintaining El Segundo's small-town charm and tight knit community. While I recognize the City's need for additional housing, I am opposed to residential zoning East of PCH. In my opinion rezoning this area would detract from the City's small-town feel, and would put additional strain on already limited police, fire, school, and community resources. In addition, the construction of new housing would not benefit the El Segundo Unified School District. Currently, tax revenue from properties East of PCH fund the Wiseburn school district, not ESUSD, and I feel that this is unfair to current residents. My priority is to address the needs of community members who already live within the City's housing boundaries, especially low-income and elderly citizens.

John Pickhaver: I'd be open to exploring it. We have a mandate to identify 390 additional affordable housing units by 2029. For context, Pacific Coast Commons will add 257 apartments but only about 10% are affordable. If this pattern were to continue with future developments, we could see as many as 4,000 new housing units over the next decade. This figure alone makes it impractical not to consider housing east of PCH. Bear in mind, such development would be gradual allowing for appropriate adjustments to maintain adequate public safety. While ESUSD wouldn't benefit from residential property taxes east of PCH, spreading out the inevitable increased student population will help keep class sizes small. Further, we've built our town out many times over

in the last 100+ years while maintaining our signature charm. We can do so once more and be a part of the solution to a problem we must solve.

**Chris Pimentel:** We need housing that is attainable and in the coming years we forecast more than 400 new units within the current residential zone. Apartment towers east of PCH, while seemingly reasonable, carry fatal flaws. They convert businesses that provide 98% of our revenue into high-density units with enormous costs for services, utilities, police, fire, etc. We would spend vastly more, with less. Planning residences on manufacturing sites carries significant risks under CEQA that make them unattractive to developers and snarls them in litigation, leaving land that accomplishes nothing. El Segundo is a special place because we see each other every day. With housing east of PCH, that will no longer be true. The city will be divided into districts, with residents that have never been to Main St, never seen Rec Park, a different school district and neighborhood. And that would be the end of El Segundo as we know it.

3. El Segundo has become unaffordable for most families today. How do you address this for potential homeowners and current tenants?

**Ryan Baldino:** More affordable housing is needed in our city. Sacramento is requiring our town to provide a plan for adding 492 affordable housing units over the next seven years. The addition and location of any high-density housing must be carefully considered and shaped by input from our community. I strongly believe we must create a live/work preference when it comes to all new affordable housing units, which means we should prioritize awarding affordable housing to those who live or work in town. This will help keep families in our community and also benefit our businesses by providing extra incentive to help attract and retain employees. Our Development

Services Department is currently revising the Downtown Specific Plan and has recently begun developing a new Smoky Hollow Specific Plan. Now is the time to explore all options encouraging responsibly building more residential units within our downtown and Smoky Hollow zones.

Michelle Keldorf: Today, 60% of residents are renters, 40% live at or below moderateincome, and 25% at or below low-income (per a study conducted by the City's affordability consultant, Many Mansions). When the teachers, public servants, seniors, and young professionals cannot afford to live here, we lose the fabric of our community. I support varied housing options that meet the needs of all residents and our workforce. I would prioritize our efforts on underutilized and problematic sites west of PCH and revisit the Smoky Hollow Specific Plan to include live-work units (a ground floor commercial space with a residence above) and medium density residential (townhomes). One way to directly address affordability is to require a percentage of income-restricted units on new projects as was done on the recently approved Pacific Coast Commons.

Robin Patch: While I am opposed to rezoning the area East of PCH to allow for new housing development, I feel that there are opportunities to provide additional affordable housing within the current footprint West of PCH. For instance, the City Council recently approved the construction of a 263unit apartment complex on the West side of PCH, which I support. This housing complex would also provide 32 units for affordable housing, which is approximately a 12% ratio. In my opinion I feel that this ratio should be closer to 20%, or 1 unit of affordable housing per 5 units for new construction. In regard to current tenants, I propose that the City provide a property tax break to owners of multi-family dwellings as an incentive to designate part of their rental property to affordable housing. I also want to give current residents priority when additional rental housing becomes available.

John Pickhaver: Do you know 40% of existing El Segundo residents would qualify for affordable housing? This according to the June 2022 draft of the City's Affordable Housing report. Housing has become unaffordable for families in El Segundo because there isn't enough of it. For decades El Segundo City Councils have ignored this problem by 1) refusing to allow anything close to enough housing to be built to meet increasing demand, and 2) opposing state initiatives overriding local zoning laws, claiming they will do it on their own but continually failing to do so. All this explains why there hasn't been an apartment complex built in El Segundo in 40 years and why only 53 total housing units have been built since 2010! The time for inaction is over. We need to increase our housing supply to bring down costs, or risk losing even more local control with additional intervention from Sacramento.

Chris Pimentel: A safe, welcoming community, with balanced budgets, superior firefighters and police, dedicated staff, parks, pools, restaurants, sensational locations, quaint traditions, and Wendy's Place is always going to be desirable. But cities that become unaffordable, become stagnant and, eventually, decay. Complicating this, are regulations in California that make residential development eye-wateringly expensive and profit margins slim. As a city, we've built several approaches to this. We work aggressively with developers to shape agreements that make sense and incent them to add attainable options. We created an affordable housing trust to remove the financial obstacles to attainable development. Critically, we studied all the potential areas where we have current apartments to see which may be suited for renovation. And, lastly, on the city's behalf I worked within the Contract Cities Association to author a bill that would provide for regional trust funds to further help build attainable housing. •




