City Council Sets Permit Fees for Commercial and Self-Haulers

The El Segundo City Council on Tuesday night approved recommended annual permit fees for commercial/multi-family solid waste collection and transportation firms to do business in town. The group also set a yearly fee for residents who may choose to "self-haul." The move stemmed from a June 18 Council vote to establish a permit process in order to comply with state mandates. In the past, the City of El Segundo employed an open system in which haulers needed only a business license to operate here. But changes in state regulations prompted the City to create a permit program and fill in perceived missing gaps identified by CalRecycle. Under the new guidelines, set to go into effect this February, prospective commercial haulers (serving three or more units) must apply for a permit costing \$1.866 per year.

In setting the fee, staff looked solely at recovering the City's costs for validating application information, conducting inspections of the premises and destination facilities, reviewing services rendered, quarterly and annual reporting, and periodic monitoring and reviews. Haulers must reapply for the permit every 12 months. If denied, they receive a refund minus a "review application" charge (of about \$306).

While collection at single-family and duplex dwellings fall under the City's contract with EDCO with a \$15 per month per unit (\$45 quarterly) fee, owners of those properties will have the option to obtain a self-hauling permit to do the job themselves. The Council set that fee at \$338 annually, which runs more than paying EDCO to handle the task. Councilmember Chris Pimentel found it "illogical" that it is more expensive to do it yourself than pay an outside company. However, Public Works Director Ken Berkman pointed out that the City still needs to recover costs for validating applications, as well as inspecting premises and disposal sites,

among other items. "The individual is operating as a commercial hauler," he explained, adding that he has received "zero inquiries" thus far from anyone clamoring to self-haul.

Councilmember Scot Nicol wondered how many residents in one- or two-unit properties have not signed up with EDCO or refused to pay. Berkman noted that those dwellings are automatically enrolled and that he hasn't heard of anyone trying to skirt the program. Nicol brought up the case of four vacant properties that do not produce any solid waste and asked what would happen if the owners announce that they do not wish to pay EDCO. Berkman responded that the ordinance includes a provision for those with vacant properties to file a notarized application of exemption that would preclude them from paying but require them to alert the City if and when the property becomes occupied.

Currently, 26 haulers have business licenses in El Segundo. To get them on board with the new process, the City's outreach plan includes sending a letter/notice to them the first week of October, November and January; emailing them the first week of October, November, January and February; and placing a phone call to them the first week of November, January and February. The 2,622 commercial and 1,200 multi-family property owners in town (who must obtain their own solid waste services outside of the City's contract) will receive letters and emails in November and January. The City will also provide related information on its newsletter. It will additionally contact non-responsive haulers in December and acquire their customers list. The following month, the City will get in touch with customers whose current haulers decide not to apply for the permit.

Also on Tuesday, City Attorney Mark Hensley alerted the Council to changes in how street vendors (specifically food-related) may be regulated going forward. State legislation that went into effect earlier this year reduces the

restrictions cities can put on food vendors. In El Segundo, the City can (if it so chooses) prohibit stationary food vendors in residential areas; and prevent stationary and mobile food vendors from blocking sidewalks as well as from competing with special events or non-profit activities (e.g. Little League, farmers market, City-sponsored festivities).

As part of the above restrictions, the vendors in question must leave 48 inches of sidewalk access per ADA regulations, cannot take up parking spaces when streets are not closed, and cannot offer junk food within 300 feet of a school or sell within 300 feet of a farmers market or designated event. They also can't operate in local parks. Regardless of the revisions, food vendors still must obtain a City permit and be licensed to do business in town. They must also have an LA County health permit.

Realizing the possibility of new kinds of infractions should the vendors violate local restrictions, Pimentel asked if the City might need an additional code enforcement officer to handle the extra work. City Manager Scott Mitnick promised to look into the matter. Meanwhile, the ordinance change will come back to the Council on Oct. 15 for second reading and final adoption.

The consent agenda included an agreement with the City of Hawthorne to use the latter's jail facility for the next six months to a year. Though in favor, Councilmember on Brann asked to pull the item in hopes of launching future discussion and a recommendation from Police Chief Bill Whalen on the future course of the jail. Nicol wanted further clarification, fearing that Herald readers might "freak out" and think that the local jail is moving to Hawthorne. That is not the case, Whalen assured those watching. The action is a "stopgap" move due to a temporary staffing shortage in El Segundo of Police Service Officers (PSOs) trained to work in jail facilities. In order to



Fire Safety Corner

Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week is here. Oct. 6-12 is Fire Prevention Week. The theme this year is "Not Every Hero Wears a Cape. Plan and Practice Your Escape!TM". Home fires killed 2,630 people in the United States in 2017, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). Annual fire loss data from NFPA has again shown that working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half --- and in 2017, cooking is the leading cause of home fires, with Thanksgiving the leading day for fires involving cooking equipment. Kitchens are not the only areas a fire can happen in your house. You need to be

• If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time while you are frying, grilling or broiling food, you should turn off the stove. Wherever possible, do not leave the kitchen when cooking.

fire-safe. Some fire safety practices include:

- Use the back stove burners when children
- Keep anything that can catch fire away from your stovetop.
- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home.
- Create a home fire escape plan with your

family. Draw a map of each level of the house, showing all doors and windows. Go through the house with each family member and look at all windows and doors, and talk about how you could get out of the house through the windows and doors. Set up a meeting place outside, away from the house where everyone can meet after exiting.

- Practice the home fire escape plan twice a year, once during the day and at night, so you and your family are more prepared and will therefore be more likely to survive a fire.
- If you use candles, always make sure they are out when leaving a room and keep candles on a non-combustible (glass or metal) base.
- Remember, all heaters need space. If you use a portable heater, keep a 3-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Don't use extension cords as permanent wiring. Use only approved surge suppressors for appliances and home entertainment/computer equipment.

Again this year, the Fire Department and El Segundo Rotary are sponsoring the Fire Prevention Week Poster Contest. Students from the third, fourth and fifth grades participate by drawing a poster involving the Fire Prevention Week theme. Poster contest winners from each grade will be honored at the Rotary luncheon on Thursday, Oct. 10. •

South Bay Health Plans Should Be More Affordable by Next Year

Covered California has announced that South Bay residents who buy their health insurance through the state's health care exchange have more to look forward to in 2020, including new financial assistance and bargains because of increased competition. Anthem Blue Cross is expanding into southwest Los Angeles County next year, giving residents a choice of 10 health plans for themselves and their families. While enrollment for 2020 won't begin until Nov. 1, consumers are encouraged to shop and compare now among the health plans. The coverage limits, co-pays and monthly premiums are listed at the Covered California website, www.coveredca.com.

Out-of-pocket monthly premiums next year should drop by 9 percent for people willing to switch their health plans to the best value, the exchange says. For those who choose not to change, their monthly premium will stay nearly identical to what they're paying now. That's the smallest increase since Covered California opened in 2014.

For the first time, middle-income families shut out of premium assistance from the government will get some financial assistance. The funding from Sacramento is intended to help those families whose health costs actually increased once Obamacare was launched. Subsidies have been a popular feature of the consumer health care law from the beginning. Low-income residents pay as little as \$1 per month for a plan.

Dec. 15 is the deadline to enroll in a plan and be insured on Jan. 1. California extends the deadline every year to Jan. 15 for Californians to avoid a penalty, though their plans don't take effect until Feb. 1. And yes, there still is a penalty for non-compliance.

Despite changes by Congress that weakened the Affordable Care Act, the state will penalize a person up to \$695 and a family \$2,100 for failing to meet the January enrollment deadline. The state mandate requiring that all residents be covered by a private or government health plan is new, and will be enforced by the Franchise Tax Board. It replaces the federal individual mandate, which Congress eliminated at the end of 2017.

The Affordable Care Act remains the law of the land. Congress repealed the penalty at the heart of the Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare. Congress repealed the penalty when it approved the federal tax code overhaul at the end of 2017. Texas has challenged the law in federal court, arguing without a penalty the law isn't valid anymore.

Employer-sponsored health plans and federal Medicare enrollees aren't affected by the rate See Health Plans, page 8



Wiseburn Board Views CARE Presentation

The only special presentation at last Thursday's Wiseburn School Board meeting was from elementary counselors Dr. Monique Ingram and Julie Walker, who spoke of their Counseling and Access to Resources in Education (CARE) program. A major component of the counseling program is dealing with issues involving students deemed "at-risk" for certain issues. The presentation was well-timed, with a recent article noting that 20 percent of high school students who had responded to a survey had contemplated suicide.

The presentation began with the duo delineating their three-tiered pyramid programs goals and foundation for action that starts with all students on the bottom tier, students with some risk factors listed on the second tier, and the top tier targeting those perceived at high risk. The presentation noted goals, including supporting academic and social/emotional growth; embracing diversity while acknowledging individual need; building partnerships; and promoting a family-like atmosphere.

Ingram and Walker shared the results of need assessment surveys at the three Wiseburn Unified School District elementary schools in which teachers had participated, giving their opinions on myriad areas where students need to build skills. Areas listed included self-control, bullying, expressing feelings, promoting confidence, and communication.

The presenters spoke about supports offered to date, including parent/guardian coffee with the CARE team at all school sites, parent workshops and PTA presentations, intakes with new and existing families, and crisis support and collaboration.

"I am excited about the work that they have done," Superintendent Dr. Blake Silvers said prior to the meeting. "It has really brought a comprehensive approach to counseling and student health at the elementary level. The goal for us as a school district should be addressing kids' social and emotional states early on their lives so that we can continue to support well-prepared students. Early intervention is key. I believe we are on the cutting edge of elementary mental health by bringing in two phenomenal experts in the field."

The presenters said they were excited that students had finally arrived on campus, and that they could meet with them. It was noted that the Care team tried to be as visible as possible to the students and staff in the rollout of the new program.

Juan Carbrillo Elementary Principal Lisa Wilberg next praised the Cabrillo PTA for its tireless work in helping to raise money in the recent Jog-A-Thon.

During member reports, Dr. Neil Goldman said he attended a District Facilities Master Planning meeting and called it a "good opportunity, a positive day," in planning what is upcoming for the District. He added "We are privileged to be a school of choice," but he also wanted to gather information on why Wiseburn had lost some students in the 2019/20 school year. He thought it was an "exploration worth pursuing... why did certain students not stay in the District?"

Board President JoAnne Kaneda spoke about the success of the recent STEM event involving students working with corporate mentors and said she received a request to try to involve students who may be not versed in, or "afraid" of delving into, STEM opportunities.

In his comments, Silvers spoke about the recent story about students who have considered suicide. He gave kudos to the start-up work of the CARE team, citing how important it is to have "early and successful interventions." He also spoke about student retention and the need to face that challenge. He mentioned the recent R. H. Dana Middle School open house, and how the District teachers instill a tremendous environment for students and parents.

A somewhat skinny approval agenda faced See Wiseburn, page 10

Eagles Capture Nike XC Invitational

The El Segundo High School cross country program has rapidly become one of the best in the South Bay. Winning Ocean League titles has become an annual occurrence as is advancing to the end-of-season CIF state meet for the girls team. The boys team has steadily been successful and getting better. Both squads traveled to Portland, Oregon to compete against some of the top Northwest high school programs in the Portland Nike XC Invitational. The Nike Portland XC is one of the premier events in the Western U.S. with teams from eight states coming to compete at Blue Lake Park in Portland. Several highly-ranked teams from California make the trek each year to see where they stack up against some of the best in the Pacific Northwest. In a rare feat, each team won its respective races in Division 2.

The boys team finished first out of 42 teams in the Division 2 race. Arend Verfaillie led the pack until the final 400 meters. He ended with a second place overall finish with a time of 16:15. For the second consecutive week, Lukas Lux finished second for the Eagles by running a personal best 17:41. The key to victory this week was El Segundo's 3-5 runners who managed to stack themselves closely together with only an 8-second gap between them. Cole Sterba, Niall Glynn, and Ryu Iguchi helped cement the Eagles' victory with their efforts. Jonny Felker and Marcus Ortiz were close behind to help the Eagles to the podium.

The Lady Eagles have more depth this year than in previous seasons and after capping 2018 with a podium finish at the state event. They came out and showcased their depth well at Woodbridge Meet two weeks ago where they had their best cumulative time in school history. For the second consecutive week, Sophia Zago led her team -- this time with an overall second place finish. The Matlosz sisters had another strong showing with James finishing eighth overall and Tyler close behind in 11th.

Ami Jacobson was El Segundo's fourth runner to finish as she worked her way up the pack after a slow start and ended at 34th. Isabella Mai rounded out the scoring for the top five and finished 38th, while Erin Rifkin and Leah Guzman finished strongly. The Lady Eagles won in convincing fashion with an impressive 87-point spread.

With two impressive showings to start the season, it sets up for another successful year and eye on winning an unprecedented fifth consecutive league title. Next up for the Eagles is the Central Park Invitational in Huntington Beach on Saturday

Eagles Dominate South Torrance

The El Segundo High football team seems to have righted a rocky ship that plagued the Eagles to start their season. After losing their first three games, the Eagles have won two straight including their 23-3 win over South Torrance.

El Segundo's ball control strategy certainly worked against a South Torrance Spartan team that had been impressive on defense in the first four games. El Segundo's balanced offense and long, sustainable drives kept the Spartans' high-octane offense off the field. The time-consuming Eagle drives left South's defense panting.

The opening drive of the game, directed by sophomore quarterback Conor Hochberg, consumed nearly seven minutes. Hochberg completed four of four passing attempts, including a 20-yard pass to Arman Sayson on third and 18. Six plays later, Sayson connected on a 35-yard field goal when the drive stalled.

Each team had a takeaway interception. Kyle Myers wrestled the ball away from South's 6'5" Bryce Caufield. El Segundo gave it right back when Caufield stepped in front of Scott Melton on a deep pass. That interception led to a 23-yard field goal to even the score at 3-3 with 1:40 remaining in the first quarter.

El Segundo's 9-play drive was stopped when

the Eagles failed on a fourth down attempt. The Spartans took over and drove to the ball inside El Segundo's 2-yard line. The turning point of the game came on the next play when Spartan running back Carson Hollandsworth was met at the line of scrimmage. He dove towards the end zone where Eagle safety Nick Villa met him and took the ball away at the 1-yard line. After some discussion by the officials, it was determined that Hollandsworth was not down and the ball was stripped away.

That takeaway led to a school record-tying longest drive of 99 yards. Hochberg completed passes of 24 yards to James Fraelich, 12 yards to Sayson and 31 yards to James Pearson that helped set up a 1-yard TD dive by Hochberg with :40 remaining in the first half and a resulting 10-3 lead.

The Eagles played with a purpose in the first half. It was a different look that thrilled a large home crowd dominated by an enthusiastic and boisterous student section. The second half was even more entertaining, led by an inspired defense that allowed six plays to go for negative yards. The Spartans had a net two yards of offense when you factor in all of the quarterback sacks and loss of yards on plays.

El Segundo took advantage of great field position that started on South's 33-yard line.





changes or new subsidies. However, more than 200,000 people in the southwest corner of Los Angeles County use Covered California to buy their health insurance.

Though a 9 percent drop in premiums is the high average, it could be even higher in some cases. Switching to a plan in the same metal tier -- bronze or silver -- could lower the cost for South Bay families and individuals by as much as 12 percent, the exchange said.

Expect more competition next year among health plans in the South Bay. People who should benefit most include existing health plan participants whose annual household income falls below 138 percent of the federal poverty level, according to Covered California. Their premiums for basic coverage drop to \$1 per member, per month. Individuals with income less than \$17,237 or \$35,535 for a family of four qualify for the additional financial assistance next year.

As many as 663,000 Covered California participants who currently receive federal financial assistance could pay slightly less, too, thanks to a monthly bump of \$15 per household. Though a small amount, it could lower current premiums an average of 5 percent for those who qualify, the state's affordable care market coordinator explained.

Rate relief is coming for middle-income Californians who previously did not qualify for financial help because they exceeded federal income requirements. Starting next year, these health plan buyers can receive an average of \$172 per household each month if they use Covered California. It predicts nearly a quartermillion state residents will qualify, including many who live in high-cost areas of the state, including parts of L.A. County. The subsidies could make health insurance more affordable and accessible to small businesses, contractors and workers, and drivers in the gig economy.

The agency offered an example of a married couple in their early 60s earning \$72,000 per year. This year, they weren't eligible for any financial assistance. Under the coming changes, that couple could receive \$1,700 per month in financial assistance, which would cover 70 percent of their monthly health premiums.

The Legislature recognized the plight of middle-income earners, whose health insurance plans increased steeply under the Affordable Care Act and the mandate that everyone be insured. Lawmakers extended some rate relief to those residents with an appropriation in next year's state budget. Covered California's chief applauded the move. "Thanks to these bold steps from California's leaders, rates across the state in 2020 will be on average from 2 to 5 percent lower across the state than they would have been without these policies," said Executive Director Peter V. Lee with Covered California.

The South Bay region could see the deepest savings for coverage with nine health plans returning to the fold in 2020 and a 10th insurer rejoining the competition. Anthem Blue Cross HMO withdrew from the California exchange in 2017, citing uncertainty surrounding the Affordable Care Act and lawsuits over the legality of the law.

The average rate for consumers who don't shop and switch from their current insurer will increase a minuscule one-tenth of 1 percent next year, according to rate charts released by Covered California.

The plans available through the state's exchange include four of the market leaders: Kaiser Permanente HMO, L.A. Care HMO, Blue Shield PPO and Health Net HMO. Outof-pocket premiums next year are expected to drop about 1 percent for Kaiser customers and almost 5.5 percent on average for Health Net enrollees, according to the rate data.

The two Blue Shield Plans and L.A. Care's HMO are hiking their rates by 2 percent.

continue booking prisoners (El Segundo's jail is set up for 96-hour maximum stays), ESPD got a "good deal" from Hawthorne at \$7,500 a month. Whalen said a similar arrangement with the LA County Sheriff's Department would have cost three times as much. It takes six months to a year to recruit, background and hire a new PSO - hence the need for the fill-in facility. Whalen said his department will evaluate the new setup and decide what is most effective for El Segundo.

On a related note, Whalen earlier introduced two new officers to the ESPD -- Kristoffer Eszlinger (a lateral who moved over from Hermosa Beach PD) and Joe Camagong. The hires bring the complement of sworn personnel to 61 (just one below the budgeted 62), which is the highest in a decade and up from the low of 48. This despite seven retirements in the recent past. Brann lauded the Council for giving Whalen the tools to rebuild the department by approving a new union contract, a lateral bonus incentive, and a marketing plan/campaign.

Among the presentations to kick off the meeting was a commendation for local resident Carol Hahn in conection with the Oct. 1-7 Active Aging Week for her "many years of dedicated service to older and adults" and "making a significant difference in the community." Information Systems Director Charles Mallory made a brief presentation on National Cyber Security Month (October) and related City training and other activities. The 2019 message, he said, was, "Own it. Secure it. Protect it." Other proclamations recognized October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month and Oct. 6-12 as Fire Prevention Week with Fire Marshal James Carver emphasizing the need for residents to have in place and practice an escape plan in the event of a fire. The mayor additionally singled out the LA Street Festival and Fair at Richmond Street events that "didn't conflict" with each other despite running concurrently. In his report, Mitnick added that a Chevron flare occurred during the two events, but was "self-contained" and taken care of in a "seamless way." He also mentioned that a TopGolf public hearing will take place on Oct. 15. The Council earlier on Tuesday approved a purchase order of up to \$96,000 for Lane Donovan Partners, LLC to continue management services at The Lakes at El Segundo. The arrangement with Lane Donovan may be terminated with a 120-day notice, so the City can opt out without penalty should TopGolf move forward. Mitnick added that discussions on percent for arts and short-term rentals will take place on Nov. 5 and Nov. 19 respectively. •

Environmental Determination: On September 5, 2017, the City Council certified an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and approved a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program for The Lakes Specific Plan Project, which included a total of 63,090 sq. ft. of net usable space (72,455 gross square feet). However, the Council did not take any subsequent action to approve or carry out the project. The proposed project is a slightly modified version of the Lakes Specific Plan Project analyzed in the previously-certified EIR. The modifications consist of changes in the locations and sizes of entertainments areas and restaurant/bar areas, resulting in a 76 sq. ft. decrease in net area, but a 351 sq. ft. increase in the gross area due to larger circulation space; however, all other components remain the same, including the number of hitting bays, height of the building and the proposed uses. The EIR concludes that the project would have less than significant impacts, or no impacts, in the areas of Aesthetics, Agricultural Resources, Biological Resources, Cultural Resources, Geology and Soils, Greenhouse Gas Emissions, Hydrology and Water Quality, Land Use and Planning, Mineral Resources, Population and Housing, Public Services, Recreation, Transportation/Traffic, and Utilities and Service Systems. the Board during the 70-minute meeting. Among items confirmed: Approval of new Da Vinci School Board member Karen Latuner. Wiseburn Board member Nelson Martinez said 18 candidates applied for the position, and that the process took three months. Member Israel Mora said he was "blown away" by the applicant's skillsets. Member Roger Banuelos called the applicants "fantastic candidates."

"She is a known entity," Silvers said of Lautner's selection while citing her help in rolling-out and supporting the District's Project Lead the Way Program. "We are happy and excited to have her onboard with our partner organization."

Also ratified was the selection of Dr. Nisha

Dugal as the interim principal at Dana Middle School for the next four months or so. The Board also passed a resolution to recognize the retirement of Michael Spiwak, who retired after 24 years of service. Silvers said that there is a "gaping hole in the community" with the retirement of the longtime kindergarten teacher at Juan Cabrillo Elementary. 






Check It Out

might be waiting patiently for an innocent patron to pick it up from the stacks. I'll need to know how to defend against such a thing.

Will Haunt You mixes the paranormal with rock music, so I really couldn't resist. Jesse Wheeler used to be part of a heavy metal group called The Rising Dead and he is asked to be part of a one-night-only reunion in a bar. He has a great time performing again, visions of "Back Together Again" tours dancing in his mind. But in reality, there were a handful of diehard fans and a smattering of applause after the final song.

Jesse is now married and has a handicapped son. Instead of rock and roll, he writes commercial jingles. This little gettogether of his friends makes him stop and think: What is his life now? Answering to his "ball & chain" wife and helping to care for a child that will never really grow up normally... Maybe he should, but no! He leaves the bar and most of his inebriated bandmates and heads for his old Camry in the parking lot. With his former front man Caspian nodding off in the passenger seat, Jesse pulls onto the highway while "The Midnight Hour" radio show informs him that his friend Kevin is in the studio with the DJ and speaking directly to him through the car radio.

A long night of weirdness ensues, with the old "car engine dying" beginning, leading to running through dark tunnels and fetid water, being threatened and beaten by goons, kidnapping ... until he wakes up in a hospital. That's when a hallucinatory experience takes over and Jesse isn't sure what's real and an extreme hoax. He only knows it's connected to a book his friend Solomon gave him to read.

And there's the author's conceit. By picking up this book, reading it, you the public are now complicit -- "...you have volunteered to participate in the author's deadly game ..." Author Brian Kirk was nominated for a Bram Stoker Award for his debut novel We Are Monsters. I won't tell you whether or not we've been acquainted since reading the book. I mean, I am writing this review. I must be okay...

Film Review

A Director Reflects on His Prolific Past in *Pain and Glory*


Pedro Almodóvar's Pain and Glory, opening this Friday, is a lovely rumination on life, death, love and, of course, pain and glory (although the latter hard-won and not cherished). It would be easy to consume this film as an autobiography. This, after all, is a tale of a middle-aged film director experiencing a creative block brought on by both physical and seemingly spiritual pain after decades of prolific filmmaking. It's made by the 70-year-old Almodóvar whose long and winding career has produced its share of masterpieces including Women on the Verge of a Nervous Breakdown and Oscar winners All About My Mother and Talk to Her, along with other films that never caught fire with the public.

While there's plenty in Pain and Glory that's self-referential (including the use of the director's flat, wardrobe and furniture) there's also ample evidence that this is, as one character calls it, "autofiction." Only at the end is the line between reality and fantasy drawn, but by then you'll have gone on such a fantastic ride that it will hardly matter. Antonio Banderas, Almodóvar's frequent alter ego, has never been better. This time, he plays Salvador Mallo, a director sidelined by crippling pain that he is pacifying with a recently acquired heroin habit. Though not to worry—this tale isn't told through a drug-infused haze, but rather with a crystal clear and deeply colorful lens.

The first third of the film's action begins around Salvador's decision on whether and with whom to attend a tribute screening of his classic '80s film, *Sabor*. But this is merely a device to set off a string of events that lead the director to look back when he can't propel himself forward. "Without filmmaking, my life is meaningless," he says, yet it's unclear what will motivate him to regain his creative footing.

The film skips through three periods of Salvador's life: His childhood in the '60s, when he and his impoverished parents lived in caves in Valencia, Spain and he fell for a neighborhood laborer; his adulthood in '80s Madrid when his great, though tragic love

affair occurred; and the present, where we see him become increasingly isolated and crippled psychologically as much as his body is physically impeded. Through these reflections, we learn about how his identity was formed, how he acquired his love for cinema, and his deep and stinging passions and losses.

The other guiding force of *Pain and Glory*, as is always the case with Almodóvar, is his palette of vibrant colors that bring magic to this film. The reds, greens, blues and bright patterns are alive in every scene, whether it be the operating room, an abandoned train station, the Valencia cave where the young Salvador and his family reside, or the dresses and scarves that his mother (played in her younger days by another Almodóvar regular, Penelope Cruz) wears.

If *Pain and Glory* proves to be Almodóvar's swan song, he's going out in a blaze of glory. This is as profound, moving and deeply engaging as a film you're likely to see this year. It stands as another masterpiece from this Spanish auteur who is never afraid to examine his own foibles and frailties with a vision that few of his filmmaking disciples can come close to attaining. •
