City of El Segundo Gets Serious About Cybersecurity Outreach

During October, much attention gets directed towards recognition of Breast Cancer Awareness Month – and deservedly so, as the El Segundo City Council recognized the milestone with a proclamation last week. But also during the same meeting, Information Systems Director Charles Mallory came to the podium to make a presentation on another topic that continues to grow in importance as the world continues on its digital path. October additionally owns the moniker of National Cybersecurity Awareness Month and that has prompted Mallory, his staff and the City of El Segundo as a whole to focus on beefing up its online protection while providing critical outreach to help local businesses and residents do the same.

"We have made a concerted effort to educate and prepare City staff by providing computer-based cybersecurity training, which involves reviewing methods cyber-attackers practice," Mallory explained. "The training taught us what to look for and how to recognize some of the tells that are common with cyberattacks. With the understanding that we cannot stop all attempts, our best defense is how we respond to them."

According to Mallory, the first line of protection is the user. "We continue training by issuing phishing campaigns that send counterfeit emails out to staff, and we are proud to say that many of the people practiced the skills from the training," he said. "This is a continuous process that evolves as the cybersecurity and

threat landscape changes."

Established by the Department of Homeland Security in 2004, National Cybersecurity Awareness Month is a collaborative effort between government and industry to share information that aims to drive home the importance of cybersecurity. For 2019 specifically, the objective is to emphasize personal accountability as well as the need to take proactive steps to bolster cybersecurity both at home and in the workspace. This year's program preaches the message, "Own IT. Secure IT. Protect IT." The focus is on the key areas of citizen privacy, consumer devices and e-commerce security. "The bottom line is each and every one of us needs to do our part when it comes to cybersecurity," Mallory said.

In the "Own IT" category, Mallory elaborated that "you really have to own the activity." As an example, he noted, those taking pictures probably should not GeoPost them because then other people can find out the time the photos were taken as well as the location. "If you're going on vacation, I don't know that I would post that on Facebook because basically anyone that's taking a look at Facebook knows that you're actually on vacation," Mallory warned.

The "Secure IT" portion of the mantra encourages strong passwords with Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) that utilize two different ways of entering into a system as an enhanced security measure. "I use password phrases instead of a single password," Mallory pointed out, while offering an example of how one

can be tweaked to make it more complex. "One of the passwords I've used historically is, 'ILoveMondays...' Loving Mondays gives me a chance to correct everything I got wrong the previous week... If you take that phrase and maybe change the 'o' to an '@' sign on 'Love' and maybe change the 'e' or 's' to a '\$' sign, you have a password that you can easily remember. You can also change that password when the time comes with respect to just changing those signs." Lastly, Mallory added, the area of "Protect IT" emphasizes the need to "think before you click" – a message seemingly at the forefront of most communication these days.

Mallory reported that his department's training campaign will run throughout the month and includes a "brown bag or two" to train employees. The project additionally entails publishing information on the Internet via the City's website for the public to glean various helpful hints and reminders.

Cybersecurity is an all-encompassing term for the various technologies, processes and practices in place to protect networks, devices, programs and data from attack, damage or unauthorized access. In today's age, just about everyone collects, processes and stores data on computers and other digital devices. The list of those who rely on the data includes vital government agencies and the military, plus corporate, financial and medical organizations – not to mention countless small businesses and home users. No one is immune to potential attack.

Lt. Col Michael Scott Kerr USAF

Lt. Col Michael Scott Kerr USAF (Retired) slipped the surly bonds of earth and flew west into the sunset. It was a peaceful takeoff at 9 pm. on August 10, 2019. Mike was 81 and he was a former resident and graduate of ESHS before joining the US Marine Corps in 1956. After serving 3 + years, he was discharged as a Sergeant and went on to receive his Degree from San

Diego University. He then entered the US Air Force in 1964 where he was commissioned.

He then started and later completed his pilot training. His first assignment was to fly the RF4C Phantom aircraft out of Udorn Airfield in Thailand on reconnaissance missions. On his 29th mission, January 16, 1967, his aircraft



was shot down by a surface to air missile 35 miles north of Hanoi Vietnam. He was then captured and incarcerated in the Hanoi Prison. He then started his 2239 days (6+ years) of suffering as a POW until his release in March 1973. After his release Mike was retained as a pilot and remained in the USAF until his retirement in 1992 after completing over 32 years of


military service to his country.

Mike is survived by his wife Darlene, his daughters Nadia and Tovah, his sister Terry Hobson, and numerous relatives and their families. Mike was a great patriot and will be deeply missed by all. He will be put to rest in Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia.



New Passenger Pickup Hub Hints at Changes to Come at LAX

Los Angeles International Airport is kicking a ground transportation tradition to the curb later this month when it opens a new taxi and ride-app pickup station that will be a temporary solution to the ever-increasing gridlock at the nation's second-busiest airport.

Starting around Halloween, the familiar yellow cabs and the popular ride-app companies Uber and Lyft will be diverted to a designated pickup zone next to Terminal 1, at the east entrance to the airport. Passengers can either take a short shuttle ride or walk to the U-shaped passenger pickup hub. Amenities include food trucks, covered benches and quicker exits from the airport onto Sepulveda Boulevard.

The traffic management change does not affect non-commercial drivers who pick up their family, friends or co-workers at LAX.

Also, the taxi and ride-app companies still will be allowed to make drop-offs on Level 2. Things to know about the coming changes and creation of the LAX-it pickup zone:

• Until Oct. 31, guests should continue to pick up their taxis, Ubers, Lyfts, and Opolis outside the terminals in the upper/ departures level.

• The pickup area is a three-minute walk from Terminal 1 and eight minutes by foot from Terminals 2, 7 and 8.

• Shuttles will arrive at terminals every three to five minutes and the longest shuttle ride is expected to take 15 minutes maximum. It will be shorter from most terminals, however.

 Passengers currently can wait up to 15-20 minutes for their ride app pickup - if their driver doesn't get frustrated and cancel on them. This new zone should improve that.

DUI and Driver's License Checkpoint Oct. 18

The El Segundo Police Department (ESPD will be conducting a DUI and Driver's License Checkpoint on Oct. 18 at an undisclosed location within the city limits between the hours of 8 p.m. and 3 a.m.

DUI Checkpoints like this one are placed in locations based on collision statistics and frequency of DUI arrests. Officers will be looking for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment, with officers checking drivers for proper licensing.

ESPD would like to remind drivers that "DUI doesn't just mean alcohol." If you take prescription drugs, particularly those with a driving or operating machinery warning on the label, you might be impaired enough to be arrested for DUI. Marijuana can also be impairing, especially in combination with alcohol or other drugs, and can result in a DUI.

ESPD offers these reminders to ensure

you have a safe night of fun that doesn't involve a DUI:

- Always use a designated sober driver - a friend who is not drinking, ride-share, cab or public transportation - to get home.
- · See someone who is clearly impaired try and drive? Take the keys and help make other arrangements to find a sober way home.
- Report drunk drivers -- Call 911.
- Hosting a party? Offer nonalcoholic drinks. Monitor who are drinking and how they are getting home.

Getting home safely is cheap, but a DUI arrest is not! Drivers caught driving impaired and charged with DUI can expect the financial impact this arrest to be upwards of \$13,500. This includes fines, fees, DUI classes, license suspension and other expenses, not to mention possible jail time.

ES School Board Gets Updates on Richmond Street Elementary

Richmond Street Elementary School (RSS) Principal Dr. Alice Lee and Assistant Principal Carie Oulashian took center stage on Tuesday evening to inform El Segundo School Board members about the strides being made at the campus. Lee and Oulashian focused on the highlights from the 2018/19 school year, including special events as well as accumulated test data that offered the Board members "a glimpse of our instructional focus for 2019/20," Lee said.

The presenters encapsulated their vision under the acronym "W.A.T.E.R," which translates to "we activate, transform and empower at Richmond." The 2018/19 highlights included utilization of 1:1 Chromebooks in third through fifth grade, increased usage of Personalized Learning tenets, and increased professional development opportunities.

In introducing Lee and Oulashian, Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore said how proud El Segundo Unified School District administration was of the successes at RSS. Oulashian took to the podium to share collected data that showed an uptick in student enrollment, as well as attendance, and a slight decrease in behavioral issues that would lead to a student office referral.

Student survey data showed that 82 percent of the students feel safe about being on campus, 91 percent believe that their teacher "cares about me," and 84 percent of the respondents believe that RSS has established clear rules dictating student behavior.

Parent survey data was also shared, with 93 percent of the respondents believing that RSS has nurtured a positive, respectful, friendly environment. Teacher survey data, which involved 30 respondents, found all the teachers believing that the campus is a supportive and inviting place to work, a safe place for students and staff, and that the administration clearly articulates a vision for teaching and learning.

Prior to the RSS presentation, El Segundo High School Principal Dr. Melissa Gooden introduced eight students who excelled in their participation in the National Merit Scholarship (NMS) program. The students recognized included Jonas Bar-on, who has received a semi-finalist notification from NMS. Andrew Solanto, Thomas Seli, James Matlosz, Hyun Kim, Madison Kellum, Stephen Kaminska and Felipe Da Costa Lima earned Letters of Commendation from the NMS. Each student received a certificate of recognition from the Board.

More than 1.6 million students took part in the testing that was required as part of the initial screening for NMS consideration. About 16,000 students, roughly one-third of the 50,000 high scorers on the test, are notified that they have achieved semi-finalist status.

"We are proud to honor the academic achievement of these eight students," Gooden emailed. "In addition to being strong academically, each of them participates in at least one extra-curricular activity. They all have promising futures ahead."

El Segundo Education Foundation CEO Carol Pirsztuk thanked the community members for their recent contributions, noting upcoming fundraising efforts for the organization, including the Oct. 27 SKECH-ERS Friendship Walk, and the annual Ladies Night Out that will take place on Nov. 21. Pirsztuk also touched on athletic programs that the Ed! Foundation funds at District school sites.

Next the Board dealt with consent agenda items, including the upcoming screening of the documentary *Like* in the El Segundo Performing Arts Center on Nov. 14. The film will highlight the impact social media has on our daily lives with an attempt to create awareness. The PTA Council is sponsoring the screening, which will also include a panel discussion after the film that will encompass community members and students who are well-versed on the diverse effects of social media immersion.

Board member Emilee Layne spoke passionately about growing the attendance for the *Like* screening, and how important it is to deal with the social media onslaught in a proactive way. In an email prior to the meeting, Board President Nancy Cobb noted, "Hopefully the film and panel will spark some healthy discussion and help all of us to better understand and manage this phenomenon."

The Board also modified the funding for a continuing agreement with Straight Up communications, which has worked with the District for more than four years to enhance branding and increase parent engagement through targeted communications.

Action items were next on the agenda, with the Board approving a Telacu Construction Management proposal that would yield additional staff support to the Bond Project Manager as the District steams ahead to make facility upgrades that dovetail with the Long-Range Facilities Master Plan. The additional staffing would be in the form of a project engineer, who will help oversee construction activities, work in concert with the program manager in pre-construction activities for upcoming projects, attend meetings, and close out certified Division of State Architects projects.

With no information pending action items on the agenda, Moore then briefed the members on upcoming events, which include town hall meetings on Oct. 14 and 23 to discuss District goals and address safety concerns, as well as the annual "Great Shakeout Earthquake Drill" that will take place on Oct.17.

Board member reports then followed, with member Paulette Caudill stressing the importance of attending the Oct. 23 safety town hall meeting.

The next regularly scheduled El Segundo School Board meeting is calendared for Tuesday, Oct. 22. •

Eagle Water Polo Making Waves

The El Segundo High School boys water polo team, ranked third in the latest CIF Southern Section, opened up Ocean League play and also hosted one of the Southern Section's longest-running and prestigious tournaments. The Eagles dispatched Culver City 12-2 to start league play and then faced some ranked teams in the Henry Stuart 50th Annual South Bay Tournament to end up sixth.

The Ocean League will be up for grabs, but El Segundo looks to be the team to beat. The Eagles started off their league schedule by

taking care of Culver City. The team rattled the cage for nine first half goals, paced by Mason Jaeger's three tallies. Aleks Nisavik contributed two goals and had two assists as El Segundo took an 8-0 lead. In the second half the Eagles attacked inside where Ethan Kelch scored twice on no-look hook shots, each on assists from Brian Schodorf and Kalan Smith.

El Segundo's defense forced the Centaurs into turnovers and poor shot selections. Senior goalie Caden Kastigar shut down the Centaurs with seven saves while Schodorf, Smith and Jaden Vanderwoude were instrumental in taming a good Culver City team that was ranked seventh in Division 5.

The Henry Stuart 50th Annual South Bay Tournament was first played at Aviation and Mira Costa high schools in 1969. In 1978, under the direction of Eagle head coach Henry Stuart, the tournament was and is hosted by El Segundo. With the new pool in operation, it serves as the perfect setting for the tournament.

This year's tournament included CIF-SS ranked teams including Palos Verdes (Division

1 ranked 10th), Redondo (Division 3 ranked fourth), Westlake (Division 3 ranked ninth) and Chadwick (Division 4 ranked ninth). Two other teams in the tournament Rancho Bernardo (San Diego Section) and Palisades (City Section) are both highly touted.

El Segundo opened with Rancho Bernardo where the Eagles rallied for a 16-10 win over the Broncos. The Eagles trailed 2-0 early before Kelch scored back-to-back goals to even the game at 2-2 and then Smith gave his team a 3-2 lead. Vanderwoude scored two goals before the end of the first quarter. The first was on a five-meter free shot. He then took a pass from Smith and powered it into

the back of the cage for an Eagle 6-3 lead. In the second period, Smith's three goals helped give his team a 10-5 lead.

Rancho Bernardo made a comeback attempt in the second half. Bennett Axiine's four goals helped keep the Broncos in the game. The Eagles countered with tallies of their own. Jaeger and Ryan Whalen each scored down the stretch as the Eagles won 16-10.

The Eagles faced Chadwick in the second round and lost a heartbreaker 5-4. Kastigar had 12 saves, but couldn't stop a five-meter attempt with 18 seconds left in regulation.

The Eagles faced Ocean League rival Santa Monica in the consolation bracket. This was a highly contested game that the Eagles would win 8-7. El Segundo would take a 1-0 lead into the second period when goals by Jaeger and Vanderwoude made it 3-0. Samo scored back-to-back goals, the second just before halftime to make it 3-2. To open up the third period, Smith bounced a goal in and Schodorf fired a goal in from the left side for a 5-2 lead.

Are You Protecting Your Digital House From Cybercrime?

(BPT) - As the pace of technology advances, cybersecurity threats do, too. Data breaches, identity theft, phishing and malware make headlines seemingly every day. Internet-connected devices, social media, digital assistants and mobile apps have become indispensable in our everyday lives, but their connectedness makes us increasingly vulnerable to cyberattacks. Recent reports estimate that damages relating to cybercrime are expected to hit \$6 trillion annually by 2021.

"It's impossible to predict when you will be affected by cybercrime," says Bashar Abouseido, chief information security officer for Charles Schwab Corp. "The best defense is to stay informed."

It can be helpful to envision your computer and digital devices as a house where you store your personal data. October is National Cybersecurity Awareness Month, so it's a good time to make sure your digital house is secure. The first step is to understand the ways cybercriminals may attempt to access your data.

Data breaches occur when there is unauthorized access to sensitive personal information. These incidents often make headline news and can affect large numbers of consumers.

Malicious software, also known as malware, spyware, ransomware and viruses, refers to software programs designed with the purpose of gaining unauthorized access to a mobile app, digital device or computer.

Tips to protect your digital house

1. Remodel your digital house: Installing updates is an essential first step.

Think of system updates as basic maintenance to your digital house that is keeping your personal data safe. It can be annoying to see those system update prompts on your computer or mobile device, but



software developers are constantly improving their software to repel the latest malware. By keeping your operating system and apps updated, you are making sure that your digital house is as secure as possible.

2. Don't have a leaky house: Be wary of public Wi-Fi networks.

Using public - and often free - Wi-Fi networks is convenient, but it is a common entry point for criminals to use malware to infect your devices and apps. Use only networks you trust or use your own personal Wi-Fi hotspot if you have one. Never update your devices when you are connected to a public Wi-Fi network.

3. Keep your keys secure: Choose unique access credentials.

Access credentials - usernames and passwords - are the keys that keep your digital house safe and secure. Select credentials that are unique and don't include personal identifying information such as a name, address or birthday. For added protection, choose two-step verification to access critical online accounts for your banking, retirement or investment accounts. Two-step verification

is typically a key or another code provided by the service provider in addition to your primary access credentials to verify your identity.

4. Secure doors and windows: Use only secure websites and app stores.

Web browsers and app stores are like the doors and windows in your digital house. Make sure they are secure by using web addresses that start with "https" and downloading apps only from the Apple App Store, Microsoft Store and Google Play store.

5. Don't open that door: Delete suspicious

That knock on your cyber front door is the sound of a cybercriminal sending you a phishing email. Be suspicious of emails that come from unknown senders. Use your cursor to hover over questionable links and email addresses to reveal the true identity of the link or sender. When in doubt, don't click on any links or open any attachments and delete the email immediately.





As part of the October campaign, Mallory and company will provide simple tips to keep residents, businesses and City operations safe and secure during the holiday seasons and beyond. Guests have complained about being frustrated with the current ride-pickup situation at curbside, which spurred this action, according to Keith Wilschetz, who oversees the airport's operations and emergency management. "LAX-it will provide an easy, efficient experience for guests using taxis and ride apps and reduce overall traffic in and around the central terminal area for all those driving to and from LAX and our neighbors," he said.

The diversion of taxis and ride-app drivers away from the terminals is necessary until construction is completed on a 2.3-mile, elevated people mover along Century Boulevard. The people mover will connect all passengers to a sprawling car rental facility, expanded parking areas, and easy access to the Los Angeles Metro rail system, starting in 2023.

With the holidays approaching and the airport growing in passenger volume, LAX officials decided to carve out a temporary solution to the growing gridlock problem. Drivers entering the airport for drop-offs or pickups can be delayed by as much as 45 minutes, according to LAX. With completion of its modernization projects three years away, the airport decided on a Plan B, which it's calling LAX-it.

The people mover is reaching a critical phase of its building stage, which will reduce the amount of curb space on both levels 1 and 2. LAX estimates 30 percent of the inner-lane curb space currently used for passenger pickup and drop off will be lost during the height of the construction between now and 2023.

The temporary move to redirect taxis, Uber and Lyft drivers away from the central terminals is expected to ease some congestion on the ground floor. The taxi and ride-app drivers account for about 15 percent of all vehicle traffic, which the LAX-it will absorb in a less critical

area of the airport. The horseshoe-shaped hub is at the corner of World Way and Skyway to the east of Terminal 1. The terminals are a short shuttle ride or walk to the mall area. The open-air mall offers waiting passengers amenities such as restrooms, benches, umbrellas for sun and rain protection, and local food trucks. And Wi-Fi access. LAX will assign staff to the pickup zone to provide passenger assistance and lane management on site.

Shuttles will service all terminals and arrive every three to five minutes during peak hours. They will make a maximum of two stops before heading to LAX-it. LAX staff will be available at each shuttle stop to help with wayfinding, questions, luggage loading and assistance for guests with disabilities, the airport promised.

"The new shuttles and LAX-it are designed with people with disabilities in mind and go beyond regulatory compliance to be ADAfriendly. Customer service agents at each shuttle stop who will be trained to offer (and call) our LAWA ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) shuttle or to provide assistance to board our ADA compliant LAX-it shuttle if they prefer," the airport said in an Oct. 4 announcement.

LAX officials believe the new traffic management scheme will benefit airport guests and local residents and businesses affected by traffic backups into the airport during holidays and peak travel periods. "With the opening of LAX-it, both guests who are using taxis or ride apps for pickup will have a better experience, while those who are being picked up by friends or family, or taking other shuttle buses to their destination, will benefit from the reduction in traffic within the central terminal area (CTA)," its management promised. •



Eagles Shut Down Hawthorne 44-6

For the fourth straight contest, the Eagles have been involved in a running clock game in which they were either leading or trailing by 35 or more points in the fourth quarter. This time it was a 44-6 victory over Hawthorne in each team's Ocean League opener.

In a game that featured 12 first half penalties, the Eagles dominated on both offense and defense. In the first quarter, the Eagles held Hawthorne to minus two yards of offense and less when factoring in penalties. Hawthorne's first possession ended when Kyle Myers grabbed the first of his three interceptions on the night. Sophomore quarterback Conor Hochberg took over and completed passes of 28-yards to Scott Melton and a 19-yard TD strike to tight end Luis Beas for a 7-0 lead. Later in the first quarter, the Eagles drove to the Cougar 1-yard line where Hochberg followed his blocking into the end zone for a 13-0 lead.

El Segundo put the game away in the second quarter by scoring three touchdowns while the defense continued its stingy ways. Hochberg continued his hot hand on the first series of plays to start the second quarter. He completed three of three passes including a 39-yard catch and run touchdown pass to James Fraelich for a 20-0 lead.

Hawthorne's dreadful night continued on offense when Cougar quarterback Tyree Davis was sacked by Jose Hurtado and then he threw an interception to Myers. A punt blocked by Louis Beas set up a 25-yard touchdown run by Fraelich with 2:22 remaining in the first half. On Hawthorne's ensuing possession, Jonathan Smith fumbled and Nick Villa recovered on the Cougar 32-yard line. On the first play, Hochberg found Fraelich open in the end zone for a 32-yard touchdown pass and a 34-0 lead to end the first half.

In the third quarter Arman Sayson connected on a 30-yard field goal and then Myers' interception to the Hawthorne 12-yard line set up Sayson's 12-yard touchdown run. The Cougars would score on a 41-yard touchdown run by Jonathon Smith for the final 44-6 score.

Hochberg led the Eagle offense by going 12-15 for 233 yards and three TDs and also rushing for one. Myers' three interceptions are the most by an Eagle since Jimmy Quinones did it against Nordoff in a playoff game in 2009. The Eagles travel to Beverly Hills Friday night for a 7 p.m. kickoff and return home Friday, Oct. 18 when they host Culver City for the annual Homecoming game.

The Lady Eagles were defeated by Santa Monica in four games by scores of 13-25, 24-26, 26-24 and 20-25 in Ocean League play. In a match against the Ocean League's top team, El Segundo held its own in each game other than the first contest in which it committed too many errors. In the second game, the Eagles kept the game close and Marly Smith gave her team a 21-18 lead. Kaia Breeden's back-to-back kills evened the score at 24-24, but Samo closed out the game.

In the third game, Hailey Koppleman put away a point to give her team a 25-24 lead and then Samo's unforced error gave El Segundo the win. In the fourth game El Segundo Audrey Maloy's two blocks kept her team close, but Santa Monica pulled away for the game and



Check It Out

The Library Book by Susan Orlean

The Library Book by Susan Orlean is about the April 29, 1986 fire at the Los Angeles Central Library that left the whole library community in shock. At first the library patrons and staff thought that it was just a regular smoke alarm going off, but then

realized that there was an actual fire in the library. The fire reached 2,000 degrees and burned for more than seven hours. When the fire was finally extinguished, it consumed 400,000 books and damaged seven 700,000 more. Even with fire and police investigators examining the evidence, no one was ever convicted of the crime. The Library Book examines not only who might have set the fire, but also the history of the L.A. Central Library.

I really enjoyed the book because not only was it a mystery, but I also learned about the history of the library and libraries across the country and around the world. Orlean describes the library as a cornerstone of national identity and brings each department to life by interviewing various staff members and recounting their stories. I especially liked learning about the history of the Central Library and how it was built. To me, it is one of the most beautiful buildings

downtown and it is always an adventure to go explore the library. Many do not realize that the Los Angeles Central Library houses not only books, audio books, movies and music, but also unique collections such as sheet music for orchestras as well as maps from all over California and the world. The library is not just about books. It also has an extensive genealogy collection and is used by many for research. When the fire occurred, many articles were lost or damaged and never replaced.

The person whom the investigators thought was the culprit was Harry Peak, an actor who was loved by everyone but trusted by no one. Unfortunately, Harry died and so it was never proven or disproven that he was the arsonist.

As someone who really enjoys reading and going to the library, I was fascinated by all of the research that was done for this book. Orlean narrates from both her own perspective of libraries and from the facts. Each chapter opens with descriptions of books and their call numbers that correlate with the chapter's content. I really enjoyed reading about all of the head librarians and the history of the Los Angeles Central Library. It made me appreciate my own library even more! Libraries are beloved institutions and provide much more than just books, movies and music. They were and remain an essential part of the heart, mind and soul of our country. I hope everyone gets a chance to read this great book and learn a little about the history of the library and of Los Angeles itself! •
