Council Votes Unanimously to Launch Pilot Program to Brownout Fire Engine 32

Finances loomed large at this week's El Segundo City Council meeting as its five members grappled with the "Brownout" of a city fire department engine, how much money to spend on and what to do with "The Plunge," and heard the fiscal year-end financial report. City Manager Darrell George also delivered updates on outdoor dining on Richmond Street and the Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant.

In a public hearing on the impasse between the El Segundo Firefighters' Association, which does not agree with removing Engine 32 from service in a pilot program of six months, and the city, each side was given about seven minutes to deliver its presentation, with the city's labor negotiator presenting the city's side and Geoff Gerny, the ESFA's president going over why the brownout is not a good idea. The potential temporary suspension of Engine 32 first surfaced during public hearings on the city's fiscal year 2021-2022 budget, a time before the installation of current city manager George. At the time, City Council directed staff to make "a reoccurring expenditure reduction from the Fire Department budget of \$1 million." On November 2, 2021, city staff returned to the council with "an item outlining a recommendation to achieve the savings, which included the temporary suspension (brownout) of Engine Number 32 for the remainder of FY 2021-22." That recommendation sparked disagreement

with the ESFA, which believes the brownout would imperil public safety. Beginning on November 22, 2021, city staff and ESFA "met and conferred 11 times over six months to discuss the impacts of the brownout of Engine 32 but were unable to reach an agreement, which led to the impasse being heard by a three-panel fact-finding panel. That panel, which was only charged with deciding if the city had the authority to proceed with

the brownout, determined that the city could. During the council meeting Tuesday night, Chief Lee, who has been with the city's fire department for 20 years and was promoted to chief last November, noted that normally Fire Station 1 has Engine 31 and Rescue 31 and a battalion chief. Fire Station 2, the city's only other fire station, has Engine 32, truck 32, and Rescue 32. When the first


Garrett, and Frank Glynn. Current members Paulette B. Caudill and Emilee M. Layne opted not to seek re-election.

Busy Week for El Segundo High School Eagles

The El Segundo Eagles had a busy week. The girls' volleyball team honored their seniors, the boys' water polo team did well in an Orange County tournament, cross country Marly Smith stood out, leading her team in kills. In game one, Da Vinci kept the game close and held a 16-14 lead thanks to an ace serve by Peyton Veazie. But the Eagles rallied back behind Sara Allen and Marly Smith.

In game two, El Segundo raced out to a 9-3 lead before Da Vinci stormed back and tied the game at 13-13 on an ace by Maleah Faust. Kira Cullinan's putback and Smith's three consecutive points led to the

block, but Katana Santiago's hit gave her team the 25-23 win.

Game four was an epic one that showcased some highlight rallies. Neither team held more than a three-point lead. Marly

Eagles Sweep Gives Them Second Place

The Eagles ended their regular season on a high note, winning their final three matches, including wins over Da Vinci and Lawndale. With the Eagles winning out, coupled with South Torrance's loss to league champion Torrance the Eagles finished second in the Pioneer League.

In their final home regular season match, the Eagles honored their 11 seniors before playing Da Vinci, including Sara Evans, Emily Anderson, Summer Brenneman, Nicole Caruso, Macy Cochran, Trinity Cofield, Kira Cullinan, Peyton Ernest, Sammie Kleiger, Tala McGill and Marly Smith. The Da Vinci Wolves played the Eagles close, but El Segundo survived to win the match 25-20, 25-20, 23-25, and 34-32.

El Segundo head coach Natasha Nguyen started and played her seniors throughout the match, demonstrating just how deep the Eagles are. But the four-year starting senior Lauren Neely's block after an extended rally gave the Eagles a 23-18 lead. Smith ended the game with an overpowering hit to give the Eagles the game-one win.

Marly Smith helped lead the Eagles to a four-game win over Da Vinci game-two win. Game three was as tight as

the score indicated. Da Vinci took the lead behind Amasjah Gilling's serve. The Eagles closed the score to 23-24 thanks to Neely's Smith's blocked her team a 24-23 lead, but the Wolves scored the next two points. Summer Brenneman's hit saved the Eagles and tied the game at 30-30. Smith scored three of the next four points, and the Eagles won the game 34-32 and the match.

With the win, El Segundo finished 9-3 in the Pioneer League and 13-5 overall. The Eagles open up their CIF Southern Section Division 3 playoffs at Corona Del Mar today and would most likely host the second-round match, should they win, on Saturday.

The Eagles faced some challenging teams in the Orange County tournament. They opened by taking on a team they'd defeated twice before this season, but Palisades stung the Eagles for an 11-5 victory. The Eagles then defeated Yorba Linda, San Marcos, and Capistrano Valley to finish the tournament.

With the score 28-24 and the Eagles threatening to make it a game, the Warriors quickly struck back. They picked up big yardage plays and capped their five-play drive with a short rushing touchdown. On the Eagles' next possession, Menendez was stripped, sacked, and the Warriors took advantage of the turnover scoring three plays later to extend their lead to 42-24.

Film Review

The Banshees of Inisherin is a Striking Achievement, Among The Year's Best

The meaning of life is hidden within *The Banshees of Inisherin*, I just know it. How we spend our days – our very limited time on this planet – is the crux of writer/director Martin McDonagh's buddy comedy that also doubles as a cinematic spiritual awakening. On the surface, this is a forlorn story about a friend-

Colm. Seemingly overnight, he has reached a new level of self-awareness and decides to prioritize what matters most in life: time. In an effort to stop wasting what precious time he has left, Colm has decided that he will no longer put up with Pádraic's small talk, benign chatter, and fleeting thoughts. Colm has found that playing the fiddle – creating something

ship breakup between the well-meaning but dim-witted Pádraic Súilleabháin (Colin Farrell) and his longtime friend Colm Doherty (Brendan Gleeson), a stoic man a couple of decades his senior. But this isn't just a story about ex-BFFs. Filmed on location on the idyllic Irish coast, *The Banshees of Inisherin*, in theaters this Friday, is a quiet masterpiece that tackles the rhetorical question of how to live a reverential, more conscious life.

Colm's sudden ex-communication is a mystery to Pádraic, who cannot comprehend why he would abruptly end their relationship. His stubbornness and refusal to talk only confuses Pádraic further and with no understanding of social cues or personal space, he continues to bother Colm for answers, much like a mosquito buzzing in your ear that you swat at but it still won't leave you alone. Pádraic's sister Siobhan (Kerry Condon) and his acquaintance Dominic Kearney (Barry Keoghan) do the best they can to help Pádraic move on, but he can't. He needs to know why. And finally, Colm tells him.

As we get older, we realize that we have control over what we choose to tolerate in our lives. The people-pleasing default that many grew up with slowly morphs into making autonomous decisions that may or may not align with other people's expectations – much like

with permanence like music – is a better use of his time. And so he exchanges Pádraic for a fiddle. The fascinating observation here is that both men, confident in their opposing wants, are both right. And, one could argue, both are completely wrong. Colm wants to be left alone; Pádraic wants company. Who deserves to get what they want?

The Banshees of Inisherin caught me completely off guard. I thought I was walking into a standard, period-set drama about a complicated







Ask The Experts About Alzheimer's

(BPT) - Alzheimer's is a progressive medical condition, and one of the deadliest diseases in the United States. That's why it is important to learn about the disease along with some simple steps that can help delay the potential onset, or help facilitate an early diagnosis.

Dr. Rhonda Randall, a board-certified family physician, geriatrician and chief medical officer for UnitedHealthcare, answered the following questions relating to Alzheimer's disease. What is Alzheimer's disease and how is it distinguished from other dementias?

While the terms are often used interchangeably, "dementia" is an umbrella term physician to perform a memory evaluation the next time you visit the doctor's office. It only takes a few minutes.

Eligible UnitedHealthcare Medicare Advantage members can take advantage of the HouseCalls program, which brings a yearly health and wellness visit to the convenience and privacy of home, at no additional cost. One of the most noticeable symptoms is the inability to retain newly learned information, as Alzheimer's generally impacts



for many types of diseases associated with cognitive decline and memory loss, whereas "Alzheimer's" references a specific diagnosis. Alzheimer's is referred to as a progressive disease, as the dementia symptoms generally worsen gradually over time.

Alzheimer's is the most common form of dementia. In fact, someone in the United States develops the disease every 65 seconds, according to the Alzheimer's Association. That means roughly 5.8 million people are living with the disease. However, Alzheimer's will only become more prevalent - around 14 million people are estimated to be living with Alzheimer's by 2050.

Alzheimer's disease is commonly diagnosed after conducting a memory screening and ruling out other reasons for cognitive decline. It is important to have a memory screening done each year, as having a historical record can increase your health care practitioner's ability to accurately diagnose memory disorders earlier.

Memory screenings can be performed during your annual wellness visit, which is free to anyone on Medicare. Make sure to ask your the part of the brain that affects learning. That said, it is important to distinguish Alzheimer's from normal, fleeting memory loss, sometimes associated with aging - Alzheimer's is marked by serious memory loss and confusion.

Examples of serious memory loss might be having to ask for the same information repeatedly or requiring memory aids, such as notes, to remember basic information. If you feel like you or a loved one is suffering from serious memory loss, contact your health care provider.

Staying physically and mentally active is key, regardless of age. That may mean taking a brisk walk, playing online brain games or participating in other activities that can improve circulation and challenge your mind.

Additionally, it is important to keep your blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar levels in check. If you are a smoker, quitting is important, as it increases your chances of developing Alzheimer's.

Taking these steps to help prevent Alzheimer's is key, as there is currently no cure for the disease. •

Get Started with a DIY Financial Plan

Did you know that 78 percent of people with a financial plan pay their bills on time vs. only 38 percent of people who don't have a plan? Or that 68 percent of planners have an emergency fund while only 26 percent of non-planners are prepared to cover an unexpected cost?

While you're working, disability insurance is a smart move. Finally, you should consider life insurance, especially if you have dependents.
- Know your income tax situation To make sure you're prepared, review your withholding and estimated taxes, and explore potential tax credits.
- Create or update your estate plan At a minimum, have a will to name a guardian for minor children. Check that beneficiaries are up to date on all retirement accounts and insurance policies. Complete an advance healthcare directive and assign powers of attorney for both finances and healthcare.

academic foundation that emphasizes math facts and reading skills is critically important for success. Finally, our district has an unequal amount of female/male faculty. We need to actively recruit male teachers. One in four boys are labeled with a developmental disability. It seems the system is failing boys, as data suggests boys perform better when there is a male teaching."

Frank Glynn: "The successful recruitment, support for, and retention of top-tier teaching staff is the foundation of educational excellence. Providing support for faculty and administrators to pursue professional development opportunities both increases the caliber of instruction and creates opportunities for career growth. The technology employed by our schools gives parents full access to lesson plans and grade assessments. Teachers and counselors should be encouraged to create additional pathways for dialogue with parents to address academic concerns and advancement or remedial opportunities. By leveraging the benefits of our compact district, we can accomplish multiple goals: enhance the vertical continuity of curriculum and programs, reinforce focus from early grades through high school on the objectives of our Graduate Profile, and encourage open dialogue between school sites and grade levels to promote seamless academic transitions. Students of all abilities are motivated at every academic level by their personal goals; even modest achievements should be acknowledged."

2. Some parents, nationwide, have been very vocal about their view that some school districts are tending to spend more time teaching the tenets of critical race theory, and less time teaching reading, writing, and arithmetic. Your thoughts?

Meredith J. Beachly: "Ours teachers do a great of teaching diversity in the the context of the classes Already being taught. Students can also take classes that will further their experience in multiple elective classes or tjey can join several different extra curricular clubs.

Dawn Garrett: "CRT is a college graduate level curriculum where students examine the design of systems and the impact those systems have had on various communities to ideally improve those systems over time. This would not be in a PK-12 curriculum. CRT is being confused with diversity, equity and inclusion. Age appropriate books and discussions that ensure all students feel welcome and included, important and valued is key to ensuring students that are well-educated, confident, thriving and prepared for college and career when they leave ESUSD. Our schools are consistently delivering top ranking results. Families want to move to El Segundo because of the quality of our schools. My job as a school board member would be to ensure those results continue and that we focus on more programs like AVID and Project Lead the Way pathways

that prepare our kids with the technology and evolving skill sets they'll need to thrive."

Tracey I. Miller-Zarneke: "Critical race theory is a subject that is not taught within our District, and is typically not taught until the collegiate level. That said, we are fortunate to have an engaged parent base in our community, and as a Board we must always be open to listening to any questions or concerns about the curriculum being offered. I appreciate that our teachers and administrators are open to dialogue with parents about specific assignments and will gladly explain the educational logic and goals behind the work students are asked to do. I respect that ESUSD teaches math based on California standards, achieved through Common Core and Cognitively Guided Instruction practices, and in our District, the foundational reading and writing work always incorporates ageappropriate topics and varied perspectives and cultures so that it is representational of our student population."

Yadranka Lucia Draskovic: "CRT is a political theory focused on racism and is being pushed by teacher unions. Rooted in CRT is Diversity, Equity and Inclusion or DEI, which has already been embraced by ESUSD. DEI claims to guarantee fair treatment and opportunity to all. Sounds nice, but what it aims to do is place race into every lesson and works to divide children. Kids are no longer thought of as individuals, but rather part of a race/group. This leads

to the debate about curriculum, as we are now straying from the basics. For example, testing math facts is being dismissed as too stressful. In the long term, this will hurt our students. Without knowledge of basic math facts, higher level Math like Algebra or Calculus will be extremely difficult. If we strive to set our kids up for success, we need to focus on installing a firm academic foundation."

Frank Glynn: "El Segundo Unified School District is dedicated to providing students and the community with an optimum learning environment preparing educated, productive, compassionate citizens to meet the challenges of a global society in the 21st Century. Our school district does not teach critical race theory. The focus of education at ESUSD is to produce creative and critical thinkers who have a clear plan that outlines a path for college and career. Our students have proven their passion for global issues like sustainability and equity by joining national and international protest days. Parents interested in leadership and/ or overall direction of the curriculum at the school are encouraged to participate in their School Site Council, Action Plan Focus Groups, the Principal's Advisory Committee, the Wellness Committee as well as the PTSAs. We are fortunate in El Segundo to have so many active, engaged, and supportive parents who actively volunteer their time and expertise." •



His sweet demeanor is at odds with Brendan Gleeson's boorish ignorance and watching these two celebrated actors play out his dynamic on screen together is something special.

The tonal bait and switch from dark comedy to introspective, sensitive drama is what makes The Banshees of Inisherin such a powerful film. It hints at the meaning of life in a delicate way and leaves audiences with some food for thought as the credits roll. It's also a film that I'm already looking forward to rewatching again, and again. •



discussions on how to handle the brownout staffing, Chief Lee was concerned with the staffing level moving from 14 firefighters on duty at one time to 11. Adjustments were then made to move the engineer from Engine 32 to Truck 32 to make it a four-person vehicle while moving the Engine 32 firefighter to Engine 31 to make it a four-person vehicle. Council member Scot Nicol guided Chief Lee through questions that established that and explained that city firefighters may not enter a building to fight a fire unless they have four firefighters on scene, with the strategy of "two in, two out" being the appropriate way to launch firefighters into a response to a fire call. Chief Lee noted that the brownout and staffing changes also would remove three captains' positions and that part of the budget cuts of the brownout would include freezing the emergency management division. Mayor Pro Tem Chris Pimentel noted that ambulance service and staffing were not being discussed as potential cuts to meet the \$1 million budget cut ask from the city council. Chief Lee answered a question from Nicol and said that Engine 32 had been subject to a previous brownout due to insufficient staffing, noting the times you brownout an engine are due to budget cuts or a lack of staff. Chief Lee explained that "it wasn't really a true brownout" because engine 32 was still used, but personnel was cut to two on Engine 32 for a period of about five months, "and we were still able to give service to the community. We've looked at all the data, and I'm going to continue to analyze the data of if there are delays in response or if the information that Geoff Gerny gave is accurate as to the overlapping incidents and the numbers of calls of fires

and so on and so forth. But we have looked at several staffing models over the last year, and I think that what we're trying to do is come to a compromise to what would be the best service for the community." Nicol pointed out that the city budgets \$2.1 million per year to cover overtime costs in the fire department and the department has 40 staff members. He also called out that when the city used "light staff" for Engine 32 during that prior brownout 13 firefighters were on duty each day, and why wasn't that considered last year when these decisions were being made. Chief Lee also explained that the city has "to have 14 firefighters in those seats 24/7. If people are sick, on vacation, or on longtime injury, or we have not promoted or hired, or recruited for firefighters, then it's always overtime. One strategy is to over-hire, and then you just fill in" so that you reduce the overtime. "But if you want to have a constant staffing of 14 firefighters, that's just how it happens." She noted that the department currently has four vacancies in the paramedic rank, "so every day we're hiring fire paramedics at time and a half to fill that spot."

Nicol asked if four firefighters showed up at his house to fight a fire, could they enter, which was confirmed by the chief. "So, if one engine with four firefighters shows up, then two guys can go in?" Said Chief Lee, "Yes, you can make entry, but we need 17 firefighters to put out one room on fire in a 2,500-square-foot house." Nicol pointed out that the city fire department would need to use mutual aid firefighters from nearby jurisdictions to fight the fire even with the current city fire department staffing of 14. He also noted that Engine 32 isn't "being

sold, it's not being decommissioned, put out to pasture at the yard. It's still going to be in station 2." Chief Lee agreed.

"I think the important thing is to realize that the engine is not going anywhere. We have the same amount of staff. A pilot program is put together so we can learn something from it," said council member Lance Giroux. "And we've said from the beginning that if it's determined that there is a problem, we can pull this pilot program at any minute, at any time. The reason why we didn't permanently put this in is because we wanted to do the right thing. We wanted to study what is possible, what is acceptable, and what we can still maintain our level of service with. So, what this is about is basically learning what's possible. But at any time, it can be pulled. That's why I understand the feelings of the fire association. I get it. I really do. We do have budgetary issues that we need to address. This is a way to look at something without it being permanently put in place."

Said Chief Lee, "If I may, I take my job as a fire chief very seriously. It has been my pleasure to serve this community for 20 years, and I want to continue to deliver great service. Of course, I support the firefighters. They're here day in and day out, and they'll risk their lives for you, and they are there for you on your worst days. I also support the city council, and I will respect the decision that you make. This is a difficult place that

we're at here."
Said Pimentel, "Chief, we look to you to provide us subject matter expertise and fire-fighting and life safety. Leave the budgeting piece. That's not your decision, right? You make recommendations." He noted that the city budgets \$170,000 in overtime per month

for the fire department due to its unique staffing model but spends nearly double that at \$300,000+ in overtime per month. "It's incumbent on us as the fiduciaries of the city. We have to interrogate. Public safety is job one, but job two is doing it in a value-driven model."

Added Pimentel, "The potential staffing model that the FFA put out there is not in opposition to this. I think that's something that warrants a significant amount of study, and I think that is a tremendous display of forward-thinking by them. So, I think that regardless of what we do here about this pilot program, that is something that warrants a great deal of investigation." The FFA's proposal would change from using paramedics to EMTs as a service model.

In a 5-0 vote, the council approved the brownout of Engine 32. City Attorney Mark Hensley said the program's six months would start the day it is implemented but that the chief and city staff need to work out scheduling.

City Council also sent the latest design and plans for the city's solo city-owned historic Urho Saari Swim Stadium, aka "The Plunge," back for more fine-tuning and the prospect of reducing its cost. City Manager George elaborated on Richmond Street's outdoor dining, noting it was brought forward during the pandemic, three restaurants applied for the permit to have outdoor dining in public right-of-way encroachments, and that no fees have been charged to the restaurants. It's anticipated that outdoor dining, as it presently exists under the state of emergency due to COVID-19 and the city council's action regarding it, may go into the middle of 2024, said City Attorney Hensley. •
