ESPD to Try Hawthorne Jail as Cost-Cutting Measure

People arrested in El Segundo will be booked in Hawthorne jail starting next month as part of a cost-cutting trial, Police Chief Bill Whalen said Tuesday. The exclusive use of the neighboring city's jail and staff expands on an arrangement the cities struck a year ago, mostly for weekend jail coverage. The limited, full-time use of Hawthorne's jail will last for five months, and it could become long term if both cities like the results.

That jail contract for El Segundo Police originated because of vacant positions within the department. Unfilled jail positions at ESPD will cover the additional cost to use Hawthorne's facility, under a modified contract the City Council approved Tuesday. El Segundo will pay \$12,000 for the Hawthorne Police Department to process, hold and feed an estimated 40 people per month who are transported to jail by El Segundo officers.

Chief Whalen said while it might seem out of the way, the Hawthorne holding facility is closer to Nash Street on the east side for his officers who detain and arrest suspects. Hawthorne charges El Segundo \$300 for every person booked and held.

Councilman Scot Nicol wondered if the expanded use of Hawthorne jail signaled a step by the El Segundo Police Department to close its jail and "get that off our budget."

Whalen replied that using the Hawthorne jail full time is a possibility. However, other options could be presented to the council when

the issue is revisited in spring.

Once upon a time, celebrity Zsa Zsa Gabor spent a memorable weekend in the El Segundo Police Department jail, serving a short sentence

for slapping a Beverly Hills police officer during a traffic stop. The former Hungarian beauty queen in 1990 chose El Segundo instead of allowing Los Angeles County officials to pick a jail for her minimum stay. Upon leaving, Gabor told reporters the staff

El Segundo Rotary President Smith Guides the Nonprofit Through COVID-19

El Segundo resident Valerie Smith, mother of the current mayor of our fine city, Drew Boyles, and the El Segundo Rotary Club president has led an eclectic life. Raised in Winnetka, Illinois, just north of Chicago, she had worked for the Brunswick Bowling Corporation for more than a quarter-century, as well as selling real estate in Atlanta, Georgia, for nearly two decades.

She is a little more than three months into her tenure as the Rotary Club president. The Rotary International franchise, which has been around for longer than a century, and boasts more than 1.2 million members and 35,000+ clubs, is currently focusing on fundraising efforts to help eradicate

the scourge of polio, with October 24th christened as "World Polio Day."

Smith moved to El Segundo in 2014 and currently lives in the affordable confines of Park Vista, which is a stone's throw from the Little League baseball diamond at Rec Park.

After growing up in Winnetka, she eventually garnered a Liberal Arts degree from Chicago's DePaul University. "Winnetka was a great place to grow up," she said. "I went to a fabulous high school. I was very involved in musical productions, opera productions, singing with groups in the school, dancing, and won the election for President of the Girl's Club," which foreshadowed her leadership

With the implementation of distance learning, what are your thoughts on the best way for the District to ensure high academic scores? Any improvements you would seek with distance learning?

Michael Wagner: We have to consider distance learning in regards to access, technology and timing. As a teacher, there are more hours in preparation for less execution. As parents, we're spending more time just to get our children through each day. Unfortunately, for all of us, it isn't just a teacher's responsibility to deliver a lesson plan and parents are taking the lead in ensuring their students academic achievement. The biggest improvement we can make together is to reassure our students, while school is virtual, it is real. Students need to attend, participate, engage, study and advocate when they need help. If we all continue to stress that school is tangible, the closer it will reflect what it will be when we all return. This will be the most important thing we can offer right now in keeping high achievement for all our schools and ensuring against academic lapses.

Amy Grant: Our kids are facing a ridiculous amount of pressure because of distancelearning. Why should we create additional pressure to achieve high test scores? If ever there was a time to pivot our focus from high scores to whole wellness of the child, it is now. Most colleges and universities are not requiring standardized scoring for admission so it is the perfect opportunity for our district and our families to truly focus on creating happy, healthy and well rounded students. I am NOT saying that we become complacent in our standards, but I am saying that we need to allow our students grace to navigate these unprecedented times.

Dieema Wheaton: The best way to maximize academic success during distance learning is through increased guardian/parental participation and student/teacher engagement. When discussing possible improvements, we must first acknowledge that distance learning will impact our student population in different ways. For some students, factors such as connectivity, in-home academic support, food insecurity, and lack of supervision may lead to an overall decline in learning. In order to improve our current distance-learning

model, it is imperative that we educate our teachers and parents to quickly recognize and address concerns or issues that may lead to a deterioration in learning, while continuing to strive for academic success.

Speaking of distance learning, how are your children participating? How is it going? Are they fully distance learning, or opting-in to the hybrid option the District has offered?

Amy Grant: We opted for our 2nd grader to go full distance. When distance learning began last Spring, I had to sit with him constantly and walk him through his assignments. This year he has had a complete turn-around and I believe a great deal of his success is owed to the improved structure of distance learning. While we would prefer in-person instruction, he has pivoted well and achieved a new level of independence and academic progress. We do deal with a weekly "break down"...but Ms.

Varghese and I have been in amazing communication, and we work as a team through any issues as they come up. We opted to keep our other son, Ryan, at St. John's Preschool. He just turned 5 and we felt that we would be setting him up for greater success academically by keeping him there until he can be enrolled at Richmond full-time in person.

Dieema Wheaton: My husband and I chose the hybrid option for our three children. However, due to the current Los Angeles County mandate, all three are currently in full-distance learning until ESUSD is approved for in-person learning. While all three of my children have adjusted well to remote learning, they are looking forward to returning to their respective schools.

Michael Wagner: We elected to place our children in the hybrid program, to ensure if we are able to safely return, they would have the option to go back to school. The current distance learning is working for both our children academically, but they are lacking the daily social interaction that school offers. It is important to note that having a teacher and former teacher in the house gives us a great advantage in supporting our children. As parents we understand the commitment it is taking to lead in their student's academic progress. As everyone adjusts their responsibilities around distance learning, we have to continue to work in student's best interest in getting back. As an educator and parent, I understand fully that there is no replacement for in-person instruction and only hope that we continue pushing forward to safely return to school for all of the students in our district •

Proposed Aviation Blvd. Bikeway/Greenway is a **Great Public Private Regional Community Project**

The eastern border of the City of El Segundo along Aviation Boulevard is often the introduction to El Segundo; and, it is a cluttered, blighted, industrial eyesore. In my initial column on August 13, I commented on this ugly stretch along the west side of Aviation that sits between Imperial Highway and El Segundo Boulevard.

Since 2017, this area has been used as the staging and dumping grounds for Metro's Crenshaw/LAX expansion. Drive/walk by this eastern border of El Segundo and you'll see debris, dirt, construction materials, heavy machinery, left over trash from workers' lunches, etc. This land is embarrassing for the City and an eyesore for our eastern neighbor- the neighborhood of Del Aire.

To the rescue comes the proposed Bikeway/ Greenway, a proposal to clean up, beautify, green, and put the land to use for the community. This proposal involves installing a bike and jog/walk path off the street with beautiful landscaping and big trees in order to make this introduction to El Segundo something to be proud of. A Bikeway/ Greenway along this stretch will provide transportation options not available today. This stretch of road is identified as a priority in the South Bay Regional Bike Plan and the LA County Regional Bike Plan. However, no bike lanes currently exist. The Bikeway/Greenway would allow El Segundo cyclists to connect with the nearby Metro Green Line station and get to LAX or to a Rams game without driving, get to work in downtown, or tie into future links of the South Bay Bike Path network throughout El Segundo. Furthermore, the Greenway will beautify the blighted corridor, provide a safe route to school for Da Vinci school students living in Del Aire, boost economic investment along the rapidly changing entrance to El Segundo, and enhance safety for pedestrians, students, and cyclists.

To visualize this proposal, see the renderings created by local architect Nathalie O'Gorman. It's striking to compare and contrast the renderings that include blue-butterfly attracting bushes and meandering paths with the present conditions. By traveling one mile south and turning left at 135th Street into the neighborhoods of Hollyglen and Wiseburn, one can view two developed walk/jog paths along the east and west side of the San Diego Freeway. These examples demonstrate what can be done. These developed paths were a mess for decades until funding, bureaucracy, and politics were overcome by determined community members.

This project faces similar challenges. Los Angeles County Metro owns the land along this stretch of land and supports the project as it will help them increase accessibility to and from Metro train stations. However, BNSF Railroad owns the operating rights to the tracks; which means that the railroad tracks along Aviation are still part of BNSF's active system. Even so, BNSF has not put any trains along this stretch for over ten years and the Crenshaw/LAX Metro expansion blocked the tracks ability to go north. Thus, BNSF could

AFI FEST Goes Virtual With Exciting Films That You Can Stream Soon

Like most things, AFI FEST (presented by Audi) looks a little different this year. Instead of queuing up to see a film at the TCL Chinese Theater on Hollywood Blvd., or having the chance to see a filmmaker Q&A at the Egyptian Theater, Cinemacy and the rest of Los Angeles audience-goers are attending the festival online this year. But AFI FEST is still looking to promise the same cutting-edge festival experience, with world premieres, to video conference conversations with filmmakers and top talent, we're enjoying it all from the comfort of our couches. Below are a few early standouts from the festival, which will be available to stream and on VOD later this year and as films find distribution.

The Sound of Metal (130 min.)

As a musician, the most important instrument you have is your hearing. *The Sound of Metal*, written and directed by Darius Marder and story by Derek Cianfrance (*Blue Valentine*), explores the emotional and physical unraveling of what it's like to lose your identity

beyond all control.

Riz Ahmed plays Ruben, a heavy metal drummer who unexpectedly starts to go deaf before playing a show with his bandmate and partner, Lou (Olivia Cooke).

Terrified and confused, Ruben learns that with only a 20% hearing capacity, his lifestyle as a touring musician is forced to stop. Ruben is stubborn to accept his new reality but throughout the course of the film, he begins to understand the beauty in the unknown.

The way in which director Darius Marder works with sound—the ringing of tinnitus, the strain of trying to understand the muffled conversations, and lead Riz Ahmed gives a phenomenal performance that will certainly be discussed come awards season.

'The Sound of Metal' is being distributed by Amazon Studios, and will be available to stream on Amazon Prime Video on December 4, 2020.

only possibly use this eastern border of El Segundo to store train cars and increase the blight along this stretch of Aviation Blvd.

There is a concerted local community effort to persuade the railroad to cooperate and find a way to transform the current blight and enable the proposed Bikeway/Greenway. Led by local community organizer Jessica Daugherty, to date, the community has held multiple meetings with over 300 people in attendance, gathered the support of local and regional politicians, local school districts, local businesses, and community organizations. Local students have taken on this project and have presented the project via Zoom meetings to the businesses, elected officials, and community organizations.

This project is a clear win for everyone involved. Del Aire residents would get a beautified view and a needed bike and walk path. El Segundo residents would get a City border that they can be proud of. The City of El Segundo will have a useful bike and walk path that adds value to local businesses such as the LA Times, Hackman Capital Partners, Northrop Grumman, and the Air Force Base. It would encourage economic investment. El Segundo businesses will receive increased traffic as families from Del Aire and Hollyglen cycle to the Point, Pizza shops, and the beach from their homes. LA County Metro will be able to increase multi-modal transportation routes to its South Bay Metro stations. Cyclists finally get a much-needed and overdue section of bike path. Students get safe routes to school. And BNSF can dispose of property that it does not use to enhance community relations. All of this at

little to no cost to local residents. This is the kicker- most projects come with a high cost. The federal and state governments value bike accessibility and have multiple funding streams for "Active Transportation" that the City of El Segundo can apply for. LA County Metro has similar funding available and has expressed extreme interest in this project as it can be part of their "First-Last-Mile" initiative that gets Metro riders to and from their stations in active transportation modes that do not involve cars. The County Department of Water and Power often funds the maintenance of such projects which could reduce and/or eliminate maintenance costs. No wonder everyone in Del Aire and Hollyglen supports this proposal while the City of El Segundo benefits from the beautification of its eastern border.

The proposed Bikeway/Greenway represents an opportunity to achieve a regional winwin solution that scores in numerous ways. It presents a great way to leverage several outside funding sources – County, Metro, Federal, State – for creation of a beautiful recreational public path that also promises benefits to employees and travelers.

Together we all can make this happen. Think positive, the glass is half full. Looking forward to passing you on the path someday! •



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



What is something about you that people would be surprised to know about?

Neil Goldman: I'm back in high school, and I've just finished the final performance of "Lights on Broadway," a musical theater revue where I played leading roles from Grease, The Music Man, and more. Instead, I obtained a communications degree, an MBA, and a doctorate in education, and built businesses where we've helped companies, non-profits, and schools make better decisions, better understand stakeholders' needs, and find increasing success. I recently turned my learnings on business and education into an Amazon best seller: The Escalator Effect: Four Essential Steps to Lead and Inspire Your Organization to Rising Success.

AND ... if I think I'm alone, you're still likely to hear me singing.

Jessica Daugherty: I have lived and worked in 4 countries and have travelled extensively in over 23 countries. These international experiences taught me to see the world in different ways, be open to new experiences, and to trust in the power of my fellow humans. In Ghana, in West Africa, I worked at a Liberian refugee camp where I fought for the rights of

refugees in a country that opened its borders to them but then left them in a disease-filled camp with no ability to earn a living. In that harsh environment, I learned about the strength of the human spirit and the immense opportunity of an education. Some of the women refugees wanted to learn to read so I began teaching literacy. By the second class there were 80 women ranging in age from 3 months to 80 years old-all eager to learn. These women and children knew that if they learned to read, they could find work. In that moment I also learned that I cannot do everything alone nor is doing everything alone as effective as doing things in community and teaching others along the way. By the time I left Ghana, I had trained fifteen Ghanaian university students to work at the camp which ensured the work would continue and expand.

Joanne Kaneda: I have a passion for discovering languages and cultures. Being raised in a bilingual, ethnic household speaking English and Croatian gave me insights into diverse traditions and behaviors that enrich my life. I also explored Spanish, French, Japanese and Russian, and taught Russian in High School. This familiarity with multiple languages and cultures guides me to fully appreciate the importance of diversity and inclusion.

Diversity has multiple forms: gender, race, economic status, ethnicity, and those with disabilities. Each form of diversity has its own "language" and culture. As your WUSD Board Member, my perception into the languages and

was nice, but she didn't like the food.

After the five-month trial period ends, Whalen and the city manager will evaluate any financial or staffing benefits to the city. The two leaders could recommend making the Hawthorne jail switch a long-term deal. Whalen said Tuesday city officials tasked him to find efficiencies - including cost savings - within the police department budget when he was hired in October 2017.

Because of bail reforms and COVID-19 precautions, fewer people are staying in California jails. Instead, people arrested on suspicion of misdemeanor crimes are being released on their promise to appear for trial. Defendants arrested for more serious crimes - including domestic violence or sex offenses - can be detained until their arraignment and trial under the new bail-reform system. "Very few people remain in jail. They are processed out," Whalen explained.

Voters will decide in the November 3 general election whether to uphold the state's bail reform law or replace it with something else. Proposition 25 is a referendum on Senate Bill 10, which the Legislature approved, but the law never took effect because the referendum qualified for the ballot. A "yes" vote upholds the current cashless bail reform, while a "no" would overturn the lawmakers and replace their bail reforms with another formula for deciding who is released from jail and who stays until they can post bond.

The fatigue felt by residents dealing with COVID-19 and 2020's new "normal" is real, Fire Chief Chris Donovan acknowledged during his regular report to the council. The epidemic has stretched to seven months. While he understands the frustration and impatience for the virus to be over, Donovan cautioned El Segundo residents not to let those emotions override good judgment. The city continues to make progress in slowing the spread of the novel virus, as evidenced by the latest Los Angeles County health department figures.

As of October 20, El Segundo has seven active cases of COVID-19, meaning people had tested positive and remained under a 14-day quarantine. The city has registered 139 confirmed cases and one death since the health emergency began in March. The city's case-positivity rate rose slightly since October 6, while actual case rates fell again.

El Segundo city officials learned Tuesday their request to Sacramento for a waiver to lift the city from the purple tier, where all of Los Angeles County is stuck, is being considered. The state's Department of Public Health is working on a response. However, a representative who spoke October 14 with the city's communications manager, Martha Guzman-Hurtado, didn't specify when an answer to El Segundo's request might come.

The City Council on September 10 sent a letter to Governor Gavin Newsom asking for some leniency from his guidelines for a safe reopening across California's counties. The governor chose a methodology that treats all cities and unincorporated areas within a county as a single group, making it impossible for El Segundo to be evaluated independently. El Segundo would move up two tiers, and the South Bay would jump one tier if their lower case numbers and test-positivity rates were taken into consideration.

City Attorney Mark Hensley reported that other cities and counties - including Torrance - are pushing the Newsom administration to rethink its one-size-fits-all test for measuring the risk of spreading the virus within communities. Cities and counties want Sacramento leaders to revise the rules for dealing with the extraordinary public crisis, which has closed public schools, spiked unemployment, and put the brakes on the economy. The recession forced El Segundo to trim nearly \$15 million from its budget.

In another COVID-19 development, the City Council endorsed Superintendent Melissa Moore and the school district as they try to reopen some lower grades for partial in-class school days. The school district plans to ask Los Angeles public health officials to allow kindergarten through second grades at Richmond and Center Street elementary schools to come back to campus on a limited basis. The district expects to file its petition by Monday and must wait three weeks for county officials to decide.

Under the school-reopening guidelines issued on September 29, Los Angeles County Public Health Department can issue 30 waivers per week to individual campuses for transitional kindergarten through second grade only. The earliest Richmond and Center Street students could return to campus is November 30, though it's possible the district will be waitlisted because the reopening rules favor schools with higher numbers of children receiving free lunches.

The superintendent expressed confidence the district can maintain a safe, healthy environment for everyone in the classroom, the office, and support staff. "We have successfully offered three weeks of summer day camp and six weeks of The Learning Connection (TLC) full daycare and distance learning support without a single case of COVID-19,"

Moore wrote. These young children have done "an excellent job" wearing their masks, following explicit hand-washing instruction, and practicing proper use of hand sanitizer, the TLC staff report. •

their nation's response to the COVID-19 outbreak (the film's title accounts for the number of days when Wuhan first began lockdown in January to when the country re-opened seventy-six days later).

76 Days is mostly devoid of a formal narrative, instead following the many different moments that happen within the two hospitals during this chaotic time. From seeing the respiratory health scares, the medical team's exhausted states, and the inevitable deaths that begin to rise, 76 Days captures the full spectrum of how the devastating virus actually cripples a country.

What makes 76 Days so impactful is that there are no politics or punditry injected into the film, instead, only choosing to show incredibly-captured footage of Wuhan's medical teams working at breakneck speeds on the frontlines to treat at-risk patients and contain the virus.

Director Hao Wu, along with Weixi Chen and director left as anonymous, captures the relationships and heartfelt moments between the medical team and their patients, showing the best in humanity and what we're all collectively fighting for.

Nine Days (124 min.)

A highly conceptual film that's both spiritual and sci-fi, Nine Days is ultimately more

The film begins ambiguously, with a mysteriously quiet and bespectacled man, Will (Winston Duke), observing a wall of old televisions—one stacked on top of the other-each playing through life moments from first-person POVs.

We learn as to why he pores over these life moments: (somehow) Will is directly responsible for choosing the souls that will begin a life on Earth, a gatekeeper or god-figure, however you choose to see it. And so, over nine days time, we see Will interview a collection of characters, asking them all a variety of lifeaffirming questions with searing intensity that give the film its conceptual identity.

Nine Days has a very interesting premise, but the film-directed by Edson Oda-doesn't give Will anything for him to grow or for us to invest in. Zazie Beetz is underutilized as Emma, a character interviewing for life on Earth, whose countered-openness and positivity challenges the cynically over-stoic Will into rethinking who should be granted life.

While the film is too slow-paced and loose for a great watching experience, Nine Days should be rewarded for being a daring and original film. •

talents. Her road to receiving a college degree was circuitous, though. Initially, she attended DePauw University in Indiana. She said that it was "kind of my father's choice, not mine. I didn't fit in." She bailed after a year-and-a-half and traveled to Spain, where she met her boyfriend at the time. Smith finally received her college degree in 1987 at the age of 41.

Although she was working her way up the corporate ranks at the iconic bowling business Brunswick Corporation, she had not been interested in pursuing a business degree. She said she found the Liberal Arts curriculum offered "so much more fun," noting that she

had "promised my Dad before he died, that I would finish college."

The Brunswick Corporation has been around for more than a century and is based out of the Chicago area. Smith worked in multiple areas of the corporation, finally landing in the bowling center division, helping to operate about 250 bowling centers across the country. She called Brunswick "a second family to me." Smith said that she was "never much into sports," but was assigned to run a bowling center in Denton, Texas. "It was the toughest job that I ever had," she said. She said she had not really bowled much but was told that, as a Midwestern gal, the Texas pin-busters would have little respect for her business decisions unless she upped her bowling game. So, she joined a local women's league, a mixed league, and "actually got pretty good."

Next on her travails was a move to Georgia. Moved there for "a man," she said. While working for Brunswick as a purchasing agent, she was sent by her boss to Dalton, Georgia, "the carpet capital of the world," to design carpet for company bowling centers. As luck would have it, she met a gentleman while she was in Georgia and decided to stay, garnering her real estate license, which she utilized for nearly two decades.

Business tailed-off real estate wise, so she explored an opportunity with the tax-filers H&R Block. "I am not a numbers person," she said, "but I am a good interviewer and good asker of questions." She has worked for H&R for two decades, calling it a "great part-time job, great for my mind," she said, noting the continuing education classes that are required for a tax preparer to complete prior to each tax season.

A grandmother of five, Smith knew that she would be the victim of property-priced sticker shock when she relocated to El Segundo. But she had a plan and got on the residency list for the Park Vista senior housing complex and is happy residing there with their affordable rates.

When not Zooming Rotary meetings, Smith said she is looking for a convenient and comfortable venue to partake in ballroom dancing. She also swims regularly and peddles a bicycle.

Smith said that she had planned to get a California real estate license when she moved here, but her son Drew prevailed upon her to manage, "for a few months," his 1-800-Got-Junk franchise. Five-plus years later, she is still involved with the business, marketing primarily to Realtors. She is also affiliated with other off-shoot businesses (Hazawaytoday and You Move Me) that the entrepreneurial Boyles has started.

So how did a former bowling center operator and real-estate agent end up as the El Segundo Rotary Club president? Smith said she met a couple of affiliated ladies in Hawthorne and Drew suggested that she "check-out" the El Segundo Rotary Club, and she said it "really clicked for me. Fun people, great projects, I love the idea of the service that we are doing." She became a Board member, then ascended to the Presidency in July of this year. "It is a great honor," she said.

Smith said living and toiling in El Segundo reminds her of her Midwest upbringing, noting many move into the area for the high-quality school system. "People here are so willing to participate in things," she said, noting an earlier Rotary program that was launched in the earliest stage of the pandemic to benefit seniors that garnered 175 volunteers in the community to serve their fellow citizens who were locked-down. "It really blew my mind," Smith said, "that so many people in the community stepped up and said, "yeah, I want to do this."

Local realtor Shiela Fowler considers herself a great friend of Smith's. "Val and I originally met through the El Segundo Auxiliary of Children's Hospital," she said. "We quickly developed a friendship. One day while attending my Rotary Club meeting, I surprisingly saw Val. We laughed, and our friendship bond grew even closer. The real coincidence in our relationship is while I was celebrating my birthday on January 17th, she was in the hospital giving birth to her son, Drew! So, you can say, the three of us have a unique relationship."

"Val and I truly respect each other," Fowler continued. "We have conversations about our many travels and how we are so enriched by living in so many different states. I truly admire Val for her work ethic, whether it be supplementing her income or volunteering in our community."

Said Smith's friend Adele Bouett: "Val is an asset to El Segundo for the numerous philanthropic organizations she belongs to. She does this with a dedication one does not often find. I know that she puts so much thought and care into the meetings and members. Not to forget raising money and making sure the organizations are deserving and represent the consensus of the club."


