Council Looks at Park Place Extension, **Gets Business-Friendly Kudos**

During its Tuesday night meeting, the El Segundo City Council took the next step in the long-desired extension of Park Place between Nash Street and Allied Way by authorizing City Manager Greg Carpenter to apply for a \$6 million Call for Project construction grant from the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) to help fund a portion of the future work (with the total cost estimate ranging from \$34 million to \$43 million). Extending Park Place to close the current gap and address grade separation is expected to relieve traffic congestion along portions of Rosecrans Avenue and Sepulveda Boulevard and improve freeway access.

Using a 2008 federal earmark (\$750,000 with a \$150,000 private developer match), the City awarded a contract to NCM Engineering corporation last year to study design alternatives for the project. In a presentation to the Council, NCM Principal William Nascimento noted that his group considered multiple options before settling on five viable alternatives---with one (Alternative 1C) standing out as the preferred solution. This configuration entails relocating the BNSF rail tracks along the existing Union Pacific Railroad facilities (which would stay in place). The scenario allows for future extension to Village Way from the north to create even better circulation in the area, Nascimento explained. He added that the intersection is proposed as a roundabout, which he believes will be "much more efficient" and "safer" than a standard signal intersection. An upcoming environmental study will consider this option as well as the others before a final decision is made.

The funding application for the \$6 million

grant is due in January 2015, with potential approval by Metro's board in September of the same year. City Public Works Director Stephanie Katsouleas referred to these dollars as the "first drop in the bucket" in amassing the \$30-\$40 million in funding required to complete the project. "It's a long time coming, but a long time to go," said Katsouleas, who noted that with construction not expected to start until 2020, the City has time to accumulate the necessary monies-which could potentially come from federal, state and local

sources, grants and developer contributions. Also on Tuesday, representatives from the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation (LAEDC) honored the City for once again being named a finalist for the annual Most Business Friendly City (Eddy) award. This marks the third consecutive year that El Segundo has been among the top five recognized in the small cities (populations under 65,000) category. El Segundo won the first-ever Most Business-Friendly City

Building Brighter Futures, Careers For Our Children

Op-ed article by Suzanne Fuentes, Mayor of El Segundo, CA

It's no secret that many of the jobs of tomorrow – those in fields like science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) – require specialized training and education beginning at a young age. In our own backyard, a growing percentage of jobs at the community's largest employers, such as Raytheon, Northrop Grumman, Chevron and Boeing, are highly technical and require thorough training in STEM-related subjects.

In the South Bay community and across Los Angeles County, we strive to provide our students - tomorrow's leaders - with the skills needed to grow and sustain a workforce that is competitive both locally and globally. As an aerospace professional with more than 25 years of experience, I know firsthand about the importance of STEM education beginning in early childhood. And as an El Segundo native who spent all her educational years in local schools and as a member of several local education organizations, such as El Segundo Education Foundation Superintendent's Roundtable, the El Segundo City/School Affairs Subcommittee, and South Bay Cities Council of Government's So Cal ROC Working Group, I am personally invested in making this happen.

The Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) – the most significant education reform in nearly 15 years – will integrate engineering and technology into science instruction in K-12 classrooms, but this will be a challenge as schools increasingly suffer from budget cuts. The state of California has reduced funding for public schools and El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD) alone has lost more than \$4 million in less than 5 years^[1]. As a result, students don't have the supplies to help them learn the building blocks for fields like technology and engineering, and it shows.

Teachers, who often struggle to pay bills, are digging into their pocketbooks to help. Public school teachers spent an average of \$485 of their own money last year to pay for school supplies, instructional materials and classroom materials. Across the U.S., this adds up to \$1.6 billion in out-of-pocket expenses^[2].

Teachers already give so much and simply can't be stretched further. Our teachers and schools in El Segundo and across Los Angeles County need our support. The upside is that the situation won't become dire if we start working together now to identify innovative funding solutions. With the proper education and tools, students can develop critical skills in problem solving, teamwork, time management, communication and leadership. Equipping students with these skills and providing the educational materials they need will help build a smart, adaptive workforce that can power economic growth.

We need to work together on creative funding answers to provide students with hands-on learning opportunities. Parents and others can support schools and students in a number of ways, such as volunteering and donating through organizations like the El Segundo Education Foundation (esedf.org) and DonorsChoose.org. DonorsChoose allows anyone to contribute any amount at any time to the school and classroom project they choose as posted online by local teachers. This enables donors to direct their money and see how those contributions are used in the classroom.

Businesses and corporations also play an important role in working directly with communities to build bridges to the future. There are many examples: here in select cities in and around the South Bay area of Los Angeles County, the Fuel Your School program (fuelyourschool.com), a collaboration between DonorsChoose.org and Chevron, has donated \$500,000 to deliver needed materials and school supplies to classrooms since the program started in the area last year. The program is taking place again, right now. Chevron will donate \$1, up to \$500,000, to help support K-12 public schools when consumers fuel up with eight or more gallons at participating Chevron and Texaco stations during the month of October.

We'll all need to work together – educators, parents, residents and businesses – to help our students. Teachers can post projects on DonorsChoose.org. Community members can donate to charities and volunteer. And corporations and businesses can contribute to local schools to help prepare our students and ensure they are ready for college and their future careers.

We need to get busy. The NGSS standards – along with the community support in the South Bay – will strengthen our future workforce and build paths to promising futures. Let's give our students the building blocks they need for a better future.



A Barking Dog Cannot Bite

It's been a long, long time since I had to sit like a chastened schoolboy listening to an arrogant lecturer preach about the error of my ways. But I could only clench my fists under the table and nod my head in agreement.

Yesterday, I lunched with a revered Chinese doctor from Shanghai, ostensibly to learn about the differences between American medicine and Chinese medicine. But that discussion quickly evolved into a lecture on the foolishness of America, and the might of China.

Appropriately, last week China passed the U.S. as the largest economy in the world, so kudos to them. Moreover, as Obama boasts of a 2% growth rate, China grows at 7% so we'll eat crow and listen to stories of our own ineptitude.

The doctor reminded me that a confident China does not fear (or respect) the U.S. because a "barking dog cannot bite." Since we are so busy doing the former we cannot do the latter. We engage in a bombing program in the Middle East, a strategy no military person believes can succeed, using weapons the government has already ceased manufacturing. All the while IS continues its surge as Iraqi forces abandon the fight, and no Middle East country will materially contribute to the effort to save themselves.

We squander our riches as Gaza wails about the consequences of the war it started and Guatemala demands we rebuild Central America or face unrestrained illegal immigration. We send 3,000 of our military into harm's way in West Africa to build

hospitals and clinics without knowing what causes the disease, and without staffing or supplies for those facilities. We allow 4,500 West African immigrants into the U.S. each month even as the World Health Organization predicts worldwide infection growth at the rate of 10,000 per week. We stare in wonderment as Chinese investors buy the Waldorf Astoria for \$2 billion, not realizing that China has simply traded that amount of U.S. currency it has in its treasury for a piece of irreplaceable

The Chinese, in turn, stare in wonderment at our decision to import low-skilled laborers from poor countries even as we require highly skilled and highly educated workers to compete on the world stage. The former drags the economy while the latter propels the economy; so we have chosen the former. We create technical marvels like Apple iphones, but manufacture them in China where the technology can be replicated.

In the search for worldwide market share, Boeing sells its most technologically sophisticated planes to China in exchange for having parts built there. Chinese manufactured planes will improve on Boeing's products and cost it market share instead. China took advantage of Russia's economic straits by executing a monster oil contract on favorable terms, using Chinese currency as the source of payment, and thus undermining the importance of the U.S. dollar.

Everywhere now, an arrogant China sees a rival that has lost its way, a pathetic shell of its former self, reduced to merely a barking dog. How tragic. •


the ongoing media coverage is preying on people's fears.

Eagles Spoil Homecoming for Culver City

It's been years since El Segundo and Culver City have faced each other on the gridiron. The fact that the Centaurs had dominated games against the Eagles in the past was evident by the last two games they played each other. The Centaurs' Darius Banks threw six touchdown passes in a 40-7 win over the Eagles nine years ago. Oh, how things have changed when the Eagles spoiled Culver City's Homecoming game with a 41-0 win last week.

The Eagles' offense started slowly with a quick three and out series to start the game. That only caused the Centaur faithful to chant, "Overrated, overrated" as Eagle's quarterback Lars Nootbaar jogged off the field. El Segundo's defense, which has given up a mere 19 points all season long, forced a turnover to give the Nootbaar a second chance. Mike Villa sacked Centaur quarterback Quintorius Truitt who fumbled the ball and Nick Palomo recovers the ball at the Eagle's 42 yard line.

"We heard those guys (Centaur student body) yelling 'overrated' at Lars (Nootbaar) and we wanted to get him the ball back," said Palomo. "We had his back." Nootbaar, an all-South Bay quarterback as a junior, completed backto-back passes to Jackson Walz for 19 yards and Miguel Wagner-Bagues for 18 yards. Two plays later he found Taz Tauaese open on a 20-yard touchdown pass play. Nootbaar had silenced his critics on the far side of the field but in doing so he got caught up in the moment that cost his team a penalty. "That won't happen again; I just got a little silly," he said.

In most games there is a turning point in which the game will start to favor a team. In this case El Segundo's defensive energy on Culver City's ensuing possession may have been its most impressive effort of the season. It was also the most poignant part of the game. The Centaurs had moved to the El Segundo 10-yard line with the help of a few penalties on the Eagles. The Centaurs ran five plays from inside the 10-yard line. On fourth and less than a yard they came up empty when Tyler Stephens and Palomo stopped Anthony Polk inches away from the goal line.

The Eagles offense moved the ball well but the ten-play drive stalled out on the Centaur 35-yard line. The Eagles defense continued its dominating play and forced a punting situation. Tony Caiseros prepared to punt from his own 41, but a bad snap and fumble and Mike Villa recovered the ball at the Centaurs 10-yard line. Two plays later, Wagner-Bagues let the blocking of Ryan Kelly and Michael

Rincon open a hole and he easily got into the end zone from two yards out.

On the Eagles' next possession Nootbaar looked for an open receiver, but when nobody was open he took off on a 54-yard pickup. Then Wagner-Bagues rushed the ball three times to get the ball to the Centaur 1-yard line where Nootbaar dove into the end zone to make it 21-0.

The Eagles got the ball back on the 50-yard line with just under two minutes remaining in the first half. With time winding down Nootbaar found Nick Karsseboom open on a 40-yard touchdown pass with six seconds remaining.

Eagle head coach Steve Shevlin said the key to the first half was the stop the defense had made twice inside the Eagle's two-yard line. "If they push it in the game might have gone in a completely different direction."

If there was one area of the game the Eagles were concerned about going into the game it was Culver City's speed. Defensive coordinator Dan Heck believed his unit could play with them if they could slow the game down and they did. "We weren't concerned with how they threw the ball, but how we could stay with them rushing the ball and we passed that test," he said.

Other than a 12-play drive that was stopped inside the El Segundo 1-yard line the Centaurs were forced to punt on every other possession. For the game Culver City gained just 21 yards rushing and up until the fourth quarter had 0 yards passing and ended with just seven total yards in the air.

With the Eagles leading 28-0, Nootbaar continued his magical ways. On third and long he found Ryan Kelly open for a first down. Jackson Walz picked up another 16 yards to move the chains and new set of downs. On third and 19 from the Centaur 23-yard line, Nootbaar found Karsseboom open for another touchdown pass to make it 35-0. Wagner-Bagues ended the scoring on the Eagle's next possession four consecutive runs of 1, 10, 18 yards and a 1-yard dive play into the end zone for a 41-0 lead.

El Segundo improved to 7-0 overall and 2-0 in the Ocean League. Of the Eagle's seven wins this season four of those games have been with a running clock sometime during the second half. Nootbaar completed 13 passes for 219 yards and three touchdowns and also rushed 74 yards. Wagner-Bagues led the Eagles 165 total yards, rushing attack with 78 yards on 15 carries including two TD runs. Nick Karsseboom had four catches for 88 yards and two touchdowns. Joey Garza, Jake Barone, Jackson Walz and Dwayne Polk dominated the defensive scheme for the Eagles







lives on the line deserve everything that we can possibly do for them because they were willing to fight and even to die for our country and our national security."

Congressman Waxman has been serving as an elected official for more than 40 years and has authored significant legislation in the areas of health and the environment. When redistricting occurred in 2012, the congressman began representing the South Bay.

"I have always supported a strong military. If you want to avoid a war we have to have a strong military: not to fight it but to prevent it and for our foreign policy to be able to speak with authority around the world," Congressman Waxman said. "We are the only super power left and to save all of the values that we want others to know about: freedom, democracy, diversity and tolerance are things that we take for granted but they are in short supply around the word, particularly in the middle east. So we need to have a strong defense."

The Chamber's Salute to the Military stands out from other events designed at honoring the country's servicemen and women because El Segundo recognizes the efforts of the aerospace industry, military personnel and the nonprofits committed to helping the men and women in uniform.

"It is interesting because I can look at a table and see a bunch of people only to realize that it is a Colonel from the local Air Force base sitting next to a volunteer from the community of El Segundo who is next to the director of a big defense corporation," Hansen said. "In the end they are all just people and everyone is here because they care. How lucky are we to have this military? They volunteer and they are such awesome people."

Already in its fourth year, the Salute to the Military used to be an aerospace outlook luncheon. Since the decision was made to make the event bigger and reach out to support military, the gathering had been growing.

"This year we have had one of the biggest crowds for it and we hope that it continues to grow," Hansen said.

Congressman Waxman is serving out his last term but expressed his appreciation to the South Bay and its contributions to the aerospace industry. "I saw first hand when I came here how important the aerospace and defense industry is not just our economy but to our whole military strength," Waxman said. "The military industry reached out to me to understand the important role that the South Bay plays in our economy and our defense."

"We are blessed because of them (military personnel)," Senior Vice President The Aerospace Corporation Malissia R. Clinton said. "I thank the El Segundo Chamber for reminding us that we get a gift everyday: we get the gift of peace and we get that because of our servicemen. As the Senior Vice President of Aerospace workers I have the distinct appreciation for the important work that our military performs each day." •

award in 2006. Per policy, winners cannot submit entries for the subsequent five years--so El Segundo had to wait until 2012 until it could apply again for the honor. Other 2014 small city finalists include the cities of Artesia, Glendora, Pico Rivera and Vernon. This year's Eddy program will take place at The Beverly Hilton Hotel on November 13.

LAEDC South Bay Regional Manager Barbara Voss pointed out that El Segundo attracts companies of all sizes and has a good mix of industries, offers a skilled workforce, allows easy access to the airport and freeways, uniquely blends big industry with "idyllic, small town charm," and has a proactive City staff that engages with businesses. Voss also revealed comments from the blue ribbon panel of judges impressed with El Segundo's application. Remarks included that the City has a lower cost of doing business, with low utility user tax rates and a unique sales tax credit to offset business license taxes. The judges also singled out the City's streamlined and expedited permit processing, low crime rate, State-recognized schools, commitment to customer satisfaction and focus on economic development, among other items.

When it took home that first Eddy, El Segundo bested four much larger citiesBurbank, Lancaster, Long Beach and Santa Clarita—selected from the County's pool of 88 cities. There are now two Most Business-Friendly City awards handed out annually, with the other going to municipalities with populations over 65,000.

During reports, Councilmember Marie Fellhauer urged citizens to vote against Proposition 47 in the upcoming election out of concern that it reduces penalties for certain crimes—in particular date rape drug possession and gun violations. Asked to speak on the potential impact on El Segundo if the measure passes, Police Chief Mitch Tavera said Prop 47 would allow "another population of disenfranchised people" to be out on the streets--as drug possession (as well as shoplifting, grand theft, receiving stolen property, forgery, fraud, and bad check writing up to \$950 in each case) would now only be considered misdemeanors. Prop 47 purports to apply the criminal justice savings to support school truancy and dropout prevention, victim services, mental health and drug abuse treatment, and other programs designed to keep offenders out of jail. Tavera believes the measure will have the opposite effect and make matters worse. He added that the minimal prosecution for date rape drug

possession is the "most egregious" potential issue and pointed out that most police agencies have come out against Prop 47.

During presentations, the Council issued a proclamation recognizing this Saturday as the second annual Make a Difference Day in El Segundo, urging all citizens to gather on Imperial Avenue at Main Street at 10 a.m. to care for Trees to the Sea and native plants. The event is part of a nationwide day of community service to encourage people to get involved with their favorite non-profit organization—in El Segundo's case, the local youth environmental organization Tree Musketeers. Saturday's festivities will also include a competition on a stretch of median on Imperial to determine who can fill the most bags with weeds and trash.

The Council also considered a request from

a SpaceX engineer who asked for special permission to use Recreation Park overnight on November 21 in order to cook a whole cow to help celebrate NASA's recent award of the space taxi contract to his company (along with Boeing). SpaceX originally started in El Segundo before outgrowing its facility and moving to Hawthorne. Current park regulations forbid use after 10 p.m. City Manager Greg Carpenter reported that Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit did not deem it appropriate to waive the restriction—feeling it may set a precedent for future use, and that the cow could be cooked somewhere else. Councilmember Dave Atkinson begged to differ. "Do you have any idea how heavy a cow is?" he asked. The Council agreed to bring Petit into a future discussion and will agendize the matter at its next meeting. •

Cats and Dogs are Not A Risk **Factor in Spread of Viruses**

Lately, it seems deadly viruses have been dominating the news. Ebola has been seen in the United States for the first time. Enterovirus 68 is spreading across the country and causing serious illness in children. Long Beach has seen record numbers of West Nile virus.

A common question that comes up is whether or not our pets may be a risk factor in transmitting these serious diseases. The quick answer is: no they are not. As with many emerging and serious diseases, there is a lot of misinformation and lack of knowledge that can lead to fear. Let's review these diseases, put them into perspective and see where animals may play a role.

In West Africa, where Ebola is endemic, the fruit bat is the natural reservoir for the virus and dogs play an insignificant role in the transmission to humans. There is evidence that dogs in these areas can become infected with the virus by eating other animals that died of Ebola virus. However, there is no evidence that they develop disease. In an ongoing study in Africa, 27% of healthy dogs had serum antibodies to the virus but none had detectable virus in circulation. There is no evidence that dogs can shed the virus.

Enterovirus 68 has been seen locally in Southern California. There are over one hundred types of enteroviruses, which are single stranded non-enveloped RNA viruses that contain poliovirus, coxsackie viruses and echoviruses. Enterovirus 68 is a non-polio virus that was first discovered in California in 1962. The infection can be serious in younger individuals. It is not uncommon to see enterovirus infections in the fall. The symptoms in people are similar to common cold symptoms. Transmission is from person to person through respiratory secretions and stool. At this time, there is no evidence that cats or dogs can be carriers of this disease.

West Nile virus has been seen in increasing numbers in Southern California in the past several years. Long Beach is seeing a record

number of human exposures. Although one local death has been contributed to the West Nile virus, most people that are infected will make a full recovery. Unlike Ebola and Enterovirus 68, West Nile requires a vector animal. The vector is the mosquito. It seems ironic that in a time of drought in the southland the mosquito population would be a problem. However, it seems our storm drains and sewer systems are the problem: the mosquito population has been driven underground. The city is making every effort to mitigate the problem with mosquito traps around town. Dogs and other animals, other than the mosquito, cannot transmit West Nile to humans. Horses are very susceptible to the virus and should be vaccinated for the disease.

The news has sensationalized the latest viral outbreaks. It is important to put everything into perspective and continue everyday hygiene to prevent the spread of all kinds of diseases. Washing your hands frequently is the single most important thing you can do to prevent the spread of disease. Sanitize things like your phone, doorknobs and other objects people handle. Stay home if you feel sick.

Animals do play an important role in all kinds of human diseases. Fortunately, that role is of helping people and not spreading disease. Chickens are used as sentinel animals all around our city and county to monitor for West Nile. Dogs may play a role in monitoring for human diseases as well. At this time, there is no concern for our pets to become transmitters of Ebola, Enterovirus 68 or West Nile.
