Shorewood Agents Kick Off Holiday Food Drive to Help Families in Need

Property values and demand continue to grow in El Segundo, with the local real estate market now experiencing its greatest heights in the community's history. And yet while many families and individuals comfortably enjoy the many benefits and amenities of living in this quaint coastal town, the going is quite a bit tougher for some others despite the advantage of residence in such a preferred locale. For those who have hit upon hard times and struggle to just put food on the table, the holidays in particular can become a huge burden and challenge. With that in mind, the 21 agents at Shorewood Realtors on Main Street recently banded together to launch a food drive to benefit 36 El Segundo families (about 80 people in total) currently being assisted through C.A.S.E. (Community Alliance to Support and Empower). Dedicated since 1992 to helping local families in need, C.A.S.E. is a fully volunteer organization that operates a food pantry located at 709 Penn Street.

"During this time of year, it is so important to give back," said Gina Hoffman, the agent who originally came up with the idea of the C.A.S.E. campaign after she and her colleagues met to mull over various possibilities. "Several different philanthropic organizations came to mind, but we really wanted to stay focused on our local community since our office is located on Main Street, we do business here, most of our agents have been long-time residents of El Segundo, and we raise our families here."

Emphasizing the concept of strength in numbers, the 21 agents began to flood social media and through word-of-mouth to clients, placed flyers in their office windows, and relayed the message about what C.A.S.E. needs most. As it happens at this time, the pantry could use more canned meats, canned fruits, condiments, snack items, cereals and juices. Each of the Shorewood agents pledged to contribute at least 10 items of their own to get the ball rolling. Citizens can also drop off their own donations at Shorewood's office where the items will be stored and then brought over to C.A.S.E. The food collection will continue up through December 13, the date of this year's Holiday Parade in which Shorewood participates annually. Attendees can also bring the food items at that time.

Julie Stolnack, a volunteer with C.A.S.E. for the past 20 years, explained that potential clients must be El Segundo residents (proof is required) and cannot be homeless. "C.A.S.E.'s mission is to assist El Segundo families in need and to keep them in their homes," she said, adding that the names of both current and past clientele remain confidential at all times. "Each family is assisted on an individual needs basis. The level of assistance is not the same across the board, as each family's needs are different. The client base consists of single moms with school-aged children, senior citizens on a very limited income, families who have lost their jobs and are unable to make ends meet, single people living on disability, etc." Stolnack added that C.A.S.E. families visit the food pantry twice a month on set days and are free to shop for non-perishable food items, hygiene products and cleaning items for a two-week period. When possible and/or necessary, clients may also receive financial assistance for utility bills and gasoline.

"We are doing this collectively as an office and we're all making sure to tell all our clients and anyone in town we run across," said Lynn O'Neil, an office manager at Shorewood and agent for over 30 years. "Many of us here have also supported the Education Foundation for many years as well as Children's Hospital, Habitats for Humanity, Give Back Homes, Rotary, Kiwanis, El Segundo High School sports, and more. Giving back is part and parcel of our business model."

Originally founded in 1969 in Manhattan Beach, Shorewood Realtors opened a branch in El Segundo in the '90s on Grand Avenue before settling at 431 Main Street in June 2000. The company also has offices in Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach, Palos Verdes Peninsula, Redondo Beach and Torrance, with a new location in the works in the West Los Angeles area. "It's great to be part of an office that has direct ties to many different organizations in El Segundo--and with those connections comes even greater numbers of knowing people throughout our community to spread the word," added Hoffman.



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Wiseburn School District Shares Common Core Results

Back in August of 2010, the California State Board of Education adopted the new K-12 California Common Core Standards for school districts across the state. For the Wiseburn School District, like all the other district across the state, those new testing standards' have been made available.

However, the new testing standards, designed to provide a more detailed and accurate description of achievement and which have been implemented, are a significant departure from the old system used by the state. Due to the change, the district has been working with its LCAP [Local Control and Accountability Plan] committee to include parents and stakeholders into the transition phase of state testing.

"The LCAP Committee members have been very understanding about this being a baseline year and that we are in a new system," Wiseburn Deputy Superintendent Instructional Services Dr. Chris Jones said. "I believe this is a better system than what we had previously but it is also a harder system. It really is challenging to students on a variety of levels but the most important thing is that it challenges them to think in the assessment."

The scores not only reflect the state's new measure of academic competency among students, but also represent a change in the test-taking mechanism implemented by the state. Among the many differences in state testing is that achievement on the tests within the new California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) system is reported along two lines: broad achievement on the subject area test is reported as either Standard Exceeded, Standard Met, Standard Nearly Met, or Standard Not Met. Second, achievement on more specifics topics [referred to as claims] within the subject area test is reported as being either Above Standard, At or Near Standard, or Below Standard.

In every grade level tested, Wiseburn students were either at Standard Met or Standard Exceeded at higher rates than the state average. Overall, in the English Language Arts test, 60 percent of Wiseburn third through eighth graders met or exceeded the test standards in comparison to 42 percent at the state level. In the Math SBAC results, those same students out performed the state average 37 percent to 35 percent.

The test results also determined that in ELA, 14 percent of Wiseburn students were at Standard Not Met [34 percent at state level] while 26 percent of the district's students nearly met that same standard [25 percent]. In math, 23 percent of district kids fell into the not met category [36 percent state level] in math, while 40 percent registered as nearly met [30 percent state level].

"We had stronger results in English Language Arts than we did math so we are looking at that. [Nearly Met] is a group we definitely want to focus on," Dr. Jones said. "Now we have a baseline and we know where we are at but we had an intuition about where we need to work on things. We are now working with the Math Leadership Corps at Loyola Marymount University on a

coaching model that is focused on improving classroom instruction based on Cognitively Guided Instruction for Math. For ELA we can look across our data and see if we have achievement gaps with different groups, such as special education or English learners."

Despite the new state-imposed testing standards, state officials are offering few guidelines as to how school districts assist students who fall below the established standards. Unlike the days of No Child Left Behind, the state is now allowing the district's administrators the flexibility and responsibility to bring students who do not meet or exceed testing expectations up to par.

"Under the old system of No Child Left Behind, you as a school district have to follow federal and state guidelines exactly to the one-size, fits-all approach and it was not successful on a national level," Dr. jones said. "I hope we are headed into a more reasonable system of accountability and it looks like our state is headed that way. If the federal government allows states to go in that direction, it's going to be a good thing."

New to the state testing approach is that with CAASSP, which tests for English language arts/literacy and math among third through 11th grader students, is test taking on a computer that gives the student a follow-up question based on their answer. This is a significant departure from the multiple-choice, paper-based test used for the STAR testing, which had been the norm since 1998. Knowing about the changes to come, district officials were as proactive as possible to prepare students.

"Last year we helped prepare kids via computer labs where students were rotated through the labs because we didn't have enough computers," Dr. Jones said. "That shifted this year since the bulk of our kids will be taking the test on Chromebooks, as part of our implementation of a 1:1 ratio of students to computers in the classroom. So students should be more familiar with the machine they are using when taking tests online."

Assessments were so different under the prior testing standards that it was more challenging for districts track student achievement. Under the new requirements, assessments are so closely aligned that it is easier to analyze a student's achievement throughout their academic career.

Part of the district's goals for students is to develop "college and career" readiness for 100 percent of students via the implementation of Common Course State Standards at all grade levels. Class reduction in TK- third grade, increased staffing, increased support for arts education, providing supplemental common core instruction, are just some of the steps to be taken in order to better prepare students.

"The tough part is that this is new for our students, so our baselines do not translate from the old system," Dr. Jones said. "Our LCAP committee understood that concept, as do our school site councils who analyze the data for each individual school; our parents are great partners. We aren't trying to simply teach to a new test; we are trying to help the kids think and learn."•

August: Osage County is a complicated family drama and perfect to watch this holiday season

The holiday season is typically a time for families to come together, to enjoy each other's company and reminisce about the year's highs and hopes for the future; a time when the mere act of being in each other's presence signifies the love shared by all. One would not make lightly. Streep as Violet drives the movie, like a high performance car, shifting gears with the most subtle and refined moves and touches to the most manic and crazed, all maneuvered with the skill, intuition, and control of a seasoned professional who knows her track. Violet, in one minute ethereal and dazed from her cocktail of pills, turns on a

does not usually hear an outspoken daughter command her acerbic mother at mealtime to "Eat the fish, F**ker!"

This is the case, and family, in August: Osage County.

From the Weinstein Company and director John Wells (Company Men) comes the story of one divided nuclear family, the Weston's, reuniting after one devastating event, bringing them all back to their old childhood Midwestern home along with all of the bad blood stirred while living under the roof of the harsh matriarch of the family.

As adapted from the stage, from Tracy Letts' Pulitzer Prize and five time Tony Awardwinning play (2008), the film runs rampant as a rich, dense, family drama, comprised of equally rich and dense dialogue of scenes shared between veteran, experienced actors. Including Meryl Streep.

As the pill addicted, volatile mother Violet Weston, Streep makes (yet another) incredible turn with one of her most evocative performances yet, an accolade and claim any movie reviewer


dime to become a scathing and acid tongued mother of three, to which only her husband Beverly (Sam Shepard) can sigh in defeat.

With Violet as the hurricane of the family's epicenter, it's no stretch to see the rest of the characters so incredibly "screwed up" with such driving and believable conviction. Commanding the Weston troops is the eldest daughter, hard nosed and dominating Barbara (Julia Roberts), whose frustrations with dealing with her mother extend to that of dealing with her failing marriage to husband Bill (Ewan McGregor). As a dense, dialogue driven family drama of a film, whose DNA comes from the savvy stage play, it hangs its hat on its veteran actors and performances. From Streep and Roberts, their impassioned acting packages the whole film, and sets the series of events on a rightful due course. Roberts returns to the screen at the top of her game.

Accompanying the mother-daughter combo is a star-studded cast of impressive talent. Chris Cooper, Abigail Breslin, Juliette

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
Eagle Basketball Preview

Fall From Grace

The Land Down Under has certainly seen some crazy things in its time, but perhaps none crazier than what the world saw happen in Australia on Saturday night, November the 14th. Ronda Rousey, the former Olympic Judo fighter who was previously undefeated in 12 professional fights, winning most of them faster than you could even blink, went down in UFC 193 to her opponent, 34-year-old foot and was out-cold on the mat. Despite all of Rousey's trash talking before the fight, Holm kept it classy afterwards telling Rousey in the middle of the ring once she was able to get up, "I really admire you for being such a great, dominant champion. None of us would be here without you, so I appreciate you."

We've all appreciated Rousey as well. Seeing her dominate her previous opponents was a thing of beauty and witnessing her

Holly Holm. The 28-year-old Rousey didn't just lose, she was utterly and completely outmatched by the former 18-time World Boxing champion. "Rowdy" Ronda Rousey was left even rowdier by Holm, who delivered one of the most brutal kicks to the head in UFC history to the former champ, knocking her out less than a minute into the second round. There's no telling whether Rousey's first loss of her career will ultimately be good or bad for her brand, but one thing is certainly for sure; the dominant performance put on by Holm has exposed Rousey as a human just like every other fighter in the UFC.

For a while, Ronda Rousey was perceived as unbeatable and better than every other fighter in her sport. There was even talk that she should fight undefeated boxer, Floyd Mayweather. Thank goodness that she didn't. If there was anything that we all learned from the fight that took place almost three weeks ago now, it's that Rousey is, indeed, vulnerable. She has yet to make an appearance in public since her crushing loss, but Rousey has since issued a statement. "I just wanted to thank everyone for the love and support," it read. "I appreciate the concerns about my health, but I'm fine. As I had mentioned before, I'm going to take a little bit of time, but I'll be back."

The concerns for Rousey's health were not unwarranted. She was, after all, taken to a local hospital following the match. It was announced that the transportation was something that was done by the UFC after every knockout in the sport to assure the safety of the fighter. Knockouts like the one that Rousey suffered put fighters at major risk for brain damage, but apparently, and fortunately, she was released with a clean bill of health and plans to fight again. That plan, however, will have to wait. Rousey was given a minimum 60-day suspension by the UFC and was ordered to go 45 days with no contact training. She could be suspended from the sport that she loves for as long as 180 days (six months) depending on CT scan results for head trauma.

It wasn't just the kick to the head that Rousey took that has set off red flags. Holm dominated from the outset with her superior striking skills learned from her days as a boxer. Round 1 was dominated by Holm as she landed punch after punch and even an elbow or two to the face of Rousey. Holm was a 12/1 underdog in the fight, but looked just the opposite. Dazed from the barrage she was taking, Rousey fell right into Holm's left skills - especially her patented arm bar - was something that hasn't been seen before. So was this loss good or bad for the previous champion? Obviously it's always bad to lose. Her perfect 12-0 record now has a blemish and the money comes with winning. She was starring in movies and appearing on late night television, all because she was a winner. Her star had never burned brighter. Rousey was untouchable. Almost this generations greatest athlete ever. Maybe - just maybe - losing saved Rousey's career though.

Ronda Rousey didn't know what it was like to lose. She was undefeated and almost getting bored with the sport. Gravitating towards show business, Rousey was gaining other priorities, like starring in the remake of the Patrick Swayze film, Road House. Rousey was bored with the sport of UFC that she had dominated so easily. Her newly acquired arrogance and sense of bravado that she hadn't previously demonstrated may have been telling enough. Rousey needed to lose to regain her passion for the sport. To lose in front of everyone - on a stage that is brighter than any other in the world - reawakens a passion for the sport unlike any other. Kobe did it. LeBron did it. Tom Brady has done. All of the greatest athletes in the world are fueled by losing on the biggest stage possible. Rousey just took that loss. Now she will come back even stronger and more motivated, with a new, more substantial interest in her sport.

For Ronda Rousey, it's not the end of the world. There is obviously already talk of a rematch with Holm. UFC president, Dana White, confirmed that the two would be headed for another fight almost immediately after Rousey is cleared for contact again. All that the loss means for Rousey is that she is not perfect. No one is. The loss is just another bump in her road and serves as impetus for her to get better as a fighter. Rousey shouldn't have tried to spar with Holm. She should have taken her to the ground and tried to get her in the arm bar that has worked so flawlessly for her in the past. Instead, Rousey was out to prove that she was a better boxer than the 18-time World champ. Now, Rousey is smarter. She has been brought back down to earth and will come back stronger and better off for it. Rousey is human. With that, she fails. So do we all, but just like any human who has failed before, she will be back. There is success in her future. It just needed failure to make it more tangible and appreciated.

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

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Frissy is a flame-point Siamese who needs a calm environment.


Looking for your purr-fect match? Kitties of all colors and sizes are ready for their forever home with you.
