The Point Tenants Announced; Council Gets More Earfuls on Richmond Restripe

During Tuesday night's El Segundo City Council meeting, Planning and Building Safety Director Sam Lee revealed the names of the first group of high-end retail and restaurant tenants coming to Federal Realty's The Point shopping development at the hard corner of Sepulveda Boulevard and Rosecrans Avenue. The project is currently under construction with a slated mid-2015 grand opening. The merchant roster includes the stores Athleta, Lucky Brand, and No Rest for Bridget as well as the eateries Superba Food + Bread, True Food Kitchen, Mendocino Farms, ShopHouse, and North Italia. Lee reported that The Point will open with about two-thirds of its tenants in place. A second batch of future tenants will be announced in the near future.


On a related note, a public hearing took place on Tuesday to address Federal Realty's (which also owns the adjacent Plaza El Segundo) request to authorize minor increases in square footage allotments for health clubs and fitness centers as well as general office uses. The current agreement for the Plaza El Segundo development site allows up to two health clubs and fitness centers provided that no one use is larger than 6,500 square feet and the two combined don't exceed 10,000 square feet of floor area. The revision will uptick those numbers to 8,500 and 11,502 square feet respectively in order to accommodate the new SoulCycle fitness facility at The Point. Lee noted that staff favors the

change, feeling SoulCycle will foster more patronage of shops and restaurants at the complex. Meanwhile, general office use will grow from the current 28,735 square feet to 30,072, paving the way for Federal Realty to relocate its corporate offices there—a move staff believes will improve management at Plaza El Segundo and The Point. Lee also stated that the revisions in question will not

create additional traffic and parking impacts. Also on Tuesday, more citizens spoke out against the recent restriping of Richmond Street—this time focusing on the 100 block. Speakers included Old Town Music Hall owner Bill Field plus volunteers and patrons of that venue who detailed various traffic safety hazards (with photo evidence provided of semi trucks clogging the street) from the angled parking configuration. They also lamented the adverse impacts on seniors and disabled people due to the loss of a long-time loading zone in front of the theatre (which is now a traffic lane) and relocation of a previous handicapped parking space.

City Manager Greg Carpenter reported that options for loading zones and wider/differentangled spaces will come before the Council at the December 16 session. Before that, the City and El Segundo Chamber of Commerce will co-host a Downtown business meeting on Wednesday, December 10 at 3 p.m. to get feedback on the parking situation for the 100 and 200 blocks of Richmond as well as the lunchtime shuttle, filming, and building/ planning permit requirements. The meeting will take place in the Council Chambers and will be open to the public. Carpenter added that crews will repaint the 300 block of Richmond this Friday and Saturday to restore that particular section back to parallel parking in the wake of strong public and resident outcry.

In their quarterly report, City Treasurer Crista Binder and Deputy Treasurer II Dino Marsocci updated the Council on the City's portfolio and indicated that investments continue to perform to stated benchmarks. Among the key points mentioned, the City is in compliance with its investment policy for securities within the portfolio. The July 1-September 30 period included purchase of negotiable CDs to add yield to the portfolio and support a strategy of laddering (investing in several securities with different maturities to protect from interest rate risk). The City's short-term portfolio (\$46.5 million) showed a stated yield of 0.27% while the long-term portfolio (\$21.8 million) garnered 0.93%. Investments in Treasury bonds continue to reap low returns, with those in the zero to two-year range at just 0.03% and only rising notably at the five-year range (1.78%). Binder said she does not expect interest rates to move upward until at the end of 2015 at the earliest and perhaps later. General economic indicators affecting investment show measured growth with unemployment now below 6% nationwide and inflation of 1.7% running below the Federal Reserve's See City Council, page 14

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

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

Eagle Winter 14-15 **Sports Preview**

With the heartbreaking CIF Southern Section Western Division playoff loss in football, it marked the end of the fall sports season. Now with Thanksgiving behind us and Christmas but a few weeks away, it's time to look forward to the high school winter sports. The boys' and girls' basketball teams will have new coaches while both soccer teams look forward to improving on last season's outcome and return to the post season.

Boys' Basketball

The boys' basketball team has their third head coach in a year. Though Jason Ito hasn't been a head boys' varsity coach, his resume is certainly impressive. He was an assistant coach under Fairfax's legendary head coach Harvey Kitani. While assisting at Fairfax for four years, Coach Ito helped the team win the City Section, be nationally ranked, and helped mentor and get players to the colligate level.

When the head coach's girls' position opened up a year ago Ito applied and was accepted. His team went 15-15, advanced to the finals of their own tournament and advanced to the second round of the CIF 4AA playoffs before losing to Bishop Montgomery the eventual CIF champions.

Coach Ito is realistic about the El Segundo program and he hopes to return the team to the playoffs after the Eagles missed out the past two seasons. "We're in an extremely challenging league. Lawndale and Santa Monica have three Division I players and Beverly Hills has a new player that's 6'10" who could be an NBA lottery pick one day,"

To prepare for a challenging Ocean League the Eagles will play one of the toughest schedules perhaps in the South Bay. They are hosting their own tournament that's underway through Saturday. They opened with El Camino Real the 2014 City Champions on Monday, faced Fairfax in the second game and Westminster. Next Monday they are entered in the University Tournament and face the host to open up and then Windward the 2014 CIF Division 4A runners-up.

The Eagles will have their work cut out for them. With just two starters returning and the bulk of the team promoted from the JV team, this could be a challenging season but one Coach Ito's team will be ready and prepared for. The Eagles will not want for size since their front line will average 6'6".

Junior guard James Martin and 6'6" junior power forward Wyatt Boyce return and both will lend their experience to help mentor what Coach Ito says is a very young team. Both Martin and Boyce showed signs of brilliance as sophomores and will be team leaders. Others to watch for are 6'5" sophomore forward Sean Emery, 6'6' junior Steven Moyer, guards Daniel Jerman and Sam Ernest.

Girls' Basketball

The girls' basketball team won 15 games last season for the third straight year and advanced to the CIF 4AA playoffs for the fifth consecutive year. The Eagles have their third coach in three years and Randy Kiehm is hopeful to keep the playoff appearance streak intact.

Coach Kiehm's coaching background was mostly as the head boys' varsity coach at Bell high school for ten years. He says he stepped away a few seasons for family reasons but returned last season to assist Coach Ito on the girls' team. He applied and was given the job when Ito took the boys' position.

He says the Eagles were playing really well and started out 7-2 before the opposition figured out how to stop the Eagles. Coach Kiehm would like his team to improve on its record and get a better seeding for the playoffs. "In our division its really top heavy where the top four or five teams really separate from the rest of the pack. Bruins Lose Their Roar

All they had to do was win. After a remarkable rivalry week victory over their hated enemies from the University of Southern California, the UCLA Bruins had themselves in prime positioning to make a run at the Pac-12 championship and a surprise entry into this year's four-team College Football Playoff. With one win against Stanford last Friday night at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Jim Mora would have given his team a golden opportunity to be back in the national spotlight. Maybe it was the short week, playing on a Friday night instead of a Saturday. Maybe the team was simply out of energy after such an intense,

After blowing out their rivals from USC less than a week earlier, the Bruins lacked the motivation and charisma that they were beaming with against the Trojans in every capacity. emotional win over USC. Whatever it was, the Bruins simply didn't come out to play and with a 31-10 loss to the Cardinal, blew their season away.

Jim Mora and the formerly No. 8 UCLA Bruins have been left seeing red. Not the red of the USC Trojans, but an angry red; or a Cardinal red some might say, after losing to Stanford yet again for what has now become the seventh consecutive time. The Cardinal were, after all, playing for fun. With nothing at all to lose after going 6-5 on the season and 3-4 in the Pac-12 leading up to this game, starting quarterback Kevin Hogan led the Cardinals on to the Rose Bowl field with the sole intention of enjoying their afternoon while tossing around the pigskin for a bit. Well, Hogan went 16-for-19 on the night for 234 yards and two touchdowns en-route to a 21-point victory. Enjoyment achieved. "We knew this meant a lot to them," Hogan said. "We wanted to come out and get a win for our seniors, for our team. We haven't lost to them since we've been here and we wanted to keep that streak going." The streak is alive and well, Kevin, and while your seniors joy and delight at their win, UCLA's are left to wallow in their own sorrow of losing to Stanford yet again.

While Hogan had what seemed to be an effortless night, Brett Hundley seemed to struggle all night long. In what was likely the quarterback's last home game of his somewhat illustrious college career, he totaled only 146 passing yards from scrimmage before injuring his hand late in the game, forcing him to watch from the sidelines as the woeful night came to a close. "We had higher expectations than that," Hundley stated bluntly. "To put a on a whole, it is the head coach's job to instill that confidence, passion, and will to defeat your opponent. Jim Mora simply didn't fit that bill and failed at preparing his team to take the field. "We have to figure out a way to close the gap," Mora said. "I thought we had closed the gap, but we still have work to do." The word "we" should be replaced with the word "I" in those sentences. As head coach of the Bruins, it is Mora's job to make sure that his team comes out ready to play and gets the victory, something that clearly they weren't prepared to do and failed to accomplish. Maybe Mora's eyes are too transfixed on getting back into the NFL at this point to help his team win at home in a game that was quite possibly their biggest of the season. The Bruins now have three losses on the season. All three of those losses have come at home in the confines of the Rose Bowl.

The Brett Hundley era has now come to a close. Although there are more games left to be played in this college football season, the end has still found a way to creep itself forward. Now UCLA fans will most likely have to begin to get used to rooting for their quarterback as he plays on Sunday's instead of Saturday's and in a different uniform at that. For all we know, it may be the end of an era for Jim Mora too. The head coach has constantly stated that he does not wish to make a return to the NFL, but as usual, the rumors will swirl this offseason. The UCLA Bruins will take on a much different look next year. After failing to win the Pac-12 championship game once again this year and losing in their biggest game of the season, maybe a fresh start is what the Bruins and all of their fans might need. •

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Kabocha Squash



Serves 4 or 16 tasting portions

Ingredients

- 1/2 grated garlic
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1/2 bunch chopped sage
- Handful of thyme
- 2 tablespoons maple syrup
- 1 medium Kabocha squash skin on, seeded and cut into 4 wedges
- Salt
- Pepper
- 1/2 tablespoon Ras el Hanout spice
- Orange zest
- 1 cup whole milk
- 1/2 clove of grated garlic
- 1/4 cup of Arbequina olive oil
- Zest and juice from one lemon
- 1/2 tablespoon ground pink peppercorn
- Seeds of 1 fresh pomegranate
- 2 tablespoons fresh mint, coarsely chopped

Preparation

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Combine grated garlic, olive oil, sage and thyme into a food processor and process until smooth. Whisk in maple syrup. Spread half the Kabocha squash in a 1.5 quart CW by CorningWare Medium Baker. Using a pastry brush, thoroughly brush all the squash with the olive oil/maple syrup mixture. Season with salt, pepper, Ras el Hanout and orange zest and roast, covered with foil, for 35 minutes or until the flesh and skin are tender.

Meanwhile combine the milk, Arbequina olive oil, lemon zest and juice, peppercorn, pomegranate seeds, mint and salt and pepper to taste in a 20-ounce CW by CorningWare Small Baker.

Remove the squash from oven and cut each piece into bite-size pieces. Place them in a clean, cool dish. Top each piece of squash with a dollop of the yogurt and serve immediately. •

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



## Best View Yet of Jupiter's Moon Europa

Scientists have produced a new version of what is perhaps NASA's best view of Jupiter's ice-covered moon, Europa. The mosaic of color images was obtained in the late 1990s by NASA's Galileo spacecraft. This is the first time that NASA is publishing a version of the scene produced using modern image processing techniques.

The image features many long, curving and linear fractures in the moon's bright ice shell. Scientists are eager to learn if the reddish-brown fractures, and other markings spattered across the surface, contain clues about the geological history of Europa and the chemistry of the global ocean that is thought to exist beneath the ice.


In addition to the newly processed image, a new video (http://youtu.be/kz9VhCQbPAk)

found that the rotation axes of these quasars tend to be aligned with the vast structures in the cosmic web in which they reside.

Quasars are galaxies with very active supermassive black holes at their centers. These black holes are surrounded by spinning discs of extremely hot material that is often spewed out in long jets along their axes of rotation. Quasars can shine more brightly than all the stars in the rest of their host galaxies put together.

A team led by Damien Hutsemékers from the University of Liège in Belgium used the VLT to study 93 quasars that were known to form huge groupings spread over billions of light-years, seen at a time when the universe was about one-third of its current age.

"The first odd thing we noticed was that some of the quasars' rotation axes were aligned with each other—despite the fact that these quasars

details why this likely ocean world is a high priority for future exploration.

Hidden beneath Europa's icy surface is perhaps the most promising place in our solar system beyond Earth to look for present-day environments that are suitable for life. The Galileo mission found strong evidence that a subsurface ocean of salty water is in contact with a rocky seafloor. The cycling of material between the ocean and ice shell could potentially provide sources of chemical energy that could sustain simple life forms.

#### "Spooky" Alignment of Distant Quasars

New observations with ESO's Very Large Telescope (VLT) in Chile have revealed alignments over the largest structures ever discovered in the universe. A European research team has found that the rotation axes of the central supermassive black holes in a sample of quasars are parallel to each other over distances of billions of light-years. The team has also

are separated by billions of light-years," said Hutsemékers.

The team then went further and looked to see if the rotation axes were linked, not just to each other, but also to the structure of the universe on large scales at that time.

When astronomers look at the distribution of galaxies on scales of billions of light-years they find that they are not evenly distributed. They form a cosmic web of filaments and clumps around huge voids where galaxies are scarce. This intriguing and beautiful arrangement of material is known as large-scale structure.

The new VLT results indicate that the rotation axes of the quasars tend to be parallel to the large-scale structures in which they find themselves. So, if the quasars are in a long filament then the spins of the central black holes will point along the filament. The researchers estimate that the probability that these alignments are simply the result of chance is less than 1%. •




