High-Density Housing, Emergency Protocols Highlight Council Talk

On a Tuesday evening that featured a whopping nine presentations (including a welcome to the visiting mayor of Guaymas) before the members even took roll call, the El Segundo City Council discussed the possibility of high-density housing just west of Pacific Coast Highway. Concerned about the heavy demand for housing in town from potential business tenants, Councilmember Scot Nicol asked his colleagues if they would want to consider the prospect of larger residential complexes in the area adjacent to or abutting Washington Park (a buffer zone where there are no single-family homes). He noted that the last condominium and apartment facilities built in El Segundo go back to 1984 and 1979 respectively and wondered what led to the stoppage of this type of construction. The concern expressed is that lack of available housing stock will deter major businesses from coming here. The Council ultimately directed staff to work with the Planning Commission to explore the matter and put together a feasibility study on what it would take to allow high-density housing, mixed-use developments and recycling of properties. At the same time, none of the members expressed actual support for the concept at this juncture - just a willingness to, as Mayor Drew Boyles put it, "seek to understand the drivers for the local housing market." Councilmember Don Brann was against the idea altogether, stating that he has no interest in increasing density west of PCH. However, he said he is open to at least have a conversation about housing east of that major artery.

Environmental Safety Division on response to hazardous waste materials incidents and recent interactions with Chevron during a flare event in September. The division oversees the Certified Unified Program Agency (CUPA) responsible for regulatory oversight, administration, permitting, inspection and enforcement for local businesses that handle, use or store certain chemicals. Environmental Safety Manager Victor Morales explained that his division's mission is to "protect public health, the community and the environment." Safety areas under the CUPA purview include Hazardous Material Emergency Response Plans issues or industrial accidents, groundwater contamination clean-up, pipelines, or coastal water contamination since other agencies are responsible for those areas.

On a related note, Assistant City Manager Barbara Voss received Council direction to update emergency communication notification protocol to improve what is currently in place and ensure that accurate and timely information gets to the public. Her presentation included an overview of significant events, with the "Type 1" category listing incidents that pose an imminent threat or require immediate action (e.g. hazardous waste spills involving injuries/evacuations, major fires, active shooters, earthquakes or flooding that overwhelm City resources). The "Type 2" events are less severe, with potential for public concern or disruption of routine. Examples include road closures, traffic issues, and officer-involved shootings. Voss then listed communication tools to be utilized: a prepared holding statement to announce the event before more concrete information is available; Nixle alerts, reverse 911, social media posts, City website homepage statements, a temporary website page dedicated to the event in question, press statements, press releases and media interviews. Incident commanders (the fire chief, police chief or highest-ranking department management staff) will be responsible for disseminating the information, with Voss serving as the back-up source if any of the above are not available. In fine-turning the new policy, Voss and staff will also determine the necessary training for personnel as well as develop standards for how to speak to the press.

Also on Tuesday, the Council heard a report from the El Segundo Fire Department's for businesses, Underground Storage Tank Program, Aboveground Petroleum Storage Tank Program, Hazardous Waste Generator Program, and California Accidental Release Prevention.

Morales emphasized that recently approved regulations mandate increased oversight at refineries in order to reduce incidents/accidents at those facilities. He summarized the CUPA response to the September flare at Chevron where the division pre-event conducted inspections, reviewed documentation and confirmed proper training from operators. During the event, his staff responded to verify there was no explosion, no liquid release and no unit malfunction. They contacted the proper agencies to report the event and worked with Chevron to conduct air monitoring at specific locations in town, finding no toxic readings. After the event, staff met with Chevron twice, requested copies of the incident investigation, and reviewed emergency response plans to identify any gaps and make recommendations for improvements in the future. CUPA does not handle air emissions, work safety

Vox Lux: Pop Goes the World

Listening to pop songs brings about a rush of feel-good happiness to listeners, but when thinking of it as an engineered product of an industry, it might also be seen as a highly-concentrated construction of fantasy for consumers to buy into for momentary escape.

This relationship between the artificiality of pop music and the culture that empowers it, is what director Brady Corbet explores in his new movie Vox Lux -- a fictional portrait of a pop star set in modern America. With bold and unflinching storytelling, as well as mesmerizing

visuals and performances, Vox Lux is one of the most powerful films I've seen this year.

Vox Lux is a portrait of the rise of a pop star, but that's largely just the story that allows the movie to act as a mirror of this 21st century America where entertainment, image and pop culture hold all value. Vox Lux has a storybooklike quality, where meta elements such as its three chapter structure and omniscient narration by Willem Dafoe give it lyrical quality. However, that also includes its significantly darker tone (which audiences should brace themselves for as seen in the film's opening sequences). Our future pop star - young Celeste (Raffey Cassidy) - is born from darkness. After being the sole survivor of a horrific and deadly rampage, the soft-spoken New Jersey native is thrust into the national spotlight as the face of a nation's sorrow and strength. Poised and collected, we see that Celeste not only has words of honest strength to share,

but music in her heart as well. An original song co-written by her sister Eleanor (Stacy Martin) soon becomes a national anthem to a grieving and shaken country. With the guidance of a new manager (Jude Law), Celeste and her sister are introduced to a whole new world of entertainment and all that it brings.

We see young Celeste go through the ropes recording in the studio, dealing with her publicist (Jennifer Ehle), and further entrenching herself in the debauchery of the industry, but it's when Vox Lux jumps years ahead that we find presentday Celeste (Natalie Portman). Now she is no longer a novice of the pop music machine, but its biggest superstar. And although years have passed, the film plants us back into now on the day of another horrific rampage, sending a tour-bound Celeste back into national headlines through comments to reporters (Christopher Abbott). We've seen Portman embrace against-type roles before, including her Best Actress award-winning performance in Black Swan, but in Vox Lux she is a full-on diva playing every bit the self-obsessed celebrity who is manic in ego and as drug-dependent as one can imagine. It's a terrific performance that sees Portman play the full range of pop star and should be remembered this awards season.

Audiences should be warned beforehand that Vox Lux depicts horrific events in vivid detail. Rampages with firearms are shocking, but only serve to show what it is that pop music tries to do - which is what young Celeste wisely notes: "I make pop music to make people feel good."

110 min. Vox Lux is rated R for language, some strong violence, and drug content. Opening this Friday at ArcLight Hollywood and AMC Century City. •





The El Segundo High School cross country program has been on the rise for years, thanks in part to the program's head coach Marcos Bolanos. The 2018 season may have been the best season for the girls team in school history. They capped their remarkable season with a third place finish at the California CIF State championships.

The season started with the Eagles hosting the inaugural Eagle XC Invitational held at the Lake. The Eagles finished first by besting some of the top programs in the Southland. Next up was the Woodbridge Invitational where the Eagles participates in the Sweepstakes race, which is exclusives for the top teams in the Western United States. Their team time was the fastest of any of the participants on a 3-mile course in California.

Being asked to run in the Seattle Hole in The Wall Invitational is reserved for some of the top programs from Washington, Oregon, Nevada and California. The Eagles placed all five top scorers in the top 10 runners in their division. James Matlosz won the race, while Sophia Zago finished third, Nikki Fulcomer fifth and Gabby Lee rounded out the scorers with a seventh place finish.

Competing in the challenging Ocean League has been successful for the El Segundo girls cross country team. For the fourth consecutive season, the Eagles won the league title. Lee, a four varsity runner, led the Eagles by finishing second. The pack running strategy worked with Zago (3), James Matlosz (4) and Fulcomer (5) rounding out the top five. Tyler Matlosz ran a PR race finishing 10th while juniors Letina Daniel and Leah Guziak each ran their best race of the season and finished in the top 15.

Next up was the CIF-SS finals where the Eagles finished third for the second consecutive year. Fulcomer ran perhaps her best race of the year and that helped propel her team to the podium. James Matlosz, Lee, Zago, Tyler Matlosz, Daniel and Erin Rifkin each ran a calculated race and joined Fulcomer on the podium.

The run to the CIF State championships had been a long and great road traveled. The Eagles would run a calculated race that would end up cementing this team in school history with a third place finish.

The State meet was an amazing day for the Eagles and the program as a whole. Finishing third in the CIF finals the week before, it helped punch their ticket to the State meet. The team felt that that they had let a second place finish slip through their hands. So they used a different strategy to run a better second mile and finish strong.

The Eagles' biggest asset is their top five runners that can pack in close with a tight scoring gap, which ultimately propelled them to the podium. Of the top four teams, El Segundo had the narrowest gap between their first and fifth runners. During the race, the Eagles really fought for each other and knew at the 2-mile mark that every runner they could pass would help them reach the top three and a place in history on the podium.

When the first runners were coming through the finish chute, the scoring screen was to the right of the finish line displaying team results. Runner after runner crossed the finish line and team placement was constantly being updated. El Segundo was initially third, but Matlosz. Zago had a strong day and finished as the third Eagle. One of the biggest surprises of the day came from freshman Tyler Matlosz, who finished fourth and really cemented the team's place on the podium. She had a stellar season ranking as the all-time fastest freshman girl in school history. Four-year runner senior Lee rounded out the top five Eagle runners with a PR performance. Daniel came through as the Eagles' sixth runner and finished ahead of Harvard Westlake's fifth runner. Guziak rounded out the team with an impressive finish. The alternates included two freshmen, Isabella Mai and Erin Rifkin. They finished

after more runners crossed the line the Eagles were pushed down to fourth. El Segundo was battling Harvard Westlake for third place and this was the same team that nudged the Eagles to third place in the CIF finals.

The back and forth progression of changing places between third and fourth continued. At one point, it showed El Segundo and Harvard Westlake tied at a 194 team score. Coach Bolanos said it was an anxious time trying to figure out if his sixth runner had finished before the Harvard Westlake sixth runner. When the scoreboard was updated the big board showed El Segundo 193, Harvard Westlake 195. It turned out to be the thinnest of margins to make the podium that day.

El Segundo's historic day and a place in school history were led by Fulcomer and James Matlosz respectively who finished simultaneously with Fulcomer edging out the season ranked in the top eight all-time freshman runners.

This was a truly magical ending for our two seniors, Nicolette Fulcomer and Gabby Lee. They both are four-year lettermen and have had solid careers. They have helped elevate the program to one of the top XC programs in Southern California. Consider that during their tenure, they have helped the Eagles win four consecutive Ocean League titles, placed on the podium in two out of state Nike Invitational meets, ranked in the top 10 in state the past three consecutive years and created a culture of success.

With five of the team's top runners returning, an impressive number of underclassmen returning and more hard work to come, it should translate into continued success. The team will have all eyes set on a higher podium finish next year.

Here is some perspective on how hard it is to make the podium and why these athletes should be treated like rock stars. There are approximately 1,600 XC teams in the state across five divisions. Only the top three teams take a podium spot in each division. The California CIF State Finals have been going on for 30 years now, starting in 1987. During that time, only 141 schools (girls teams) have touched the podium. There are a lot of schools that have monopolies over the top three spots. For El Segundo to finally crack the top three places on the podium is truly a remarkable accomplishment. Move over soccer, baseball, volleyball, water polo, softball, football, swimming and, yes, the 1963 basketball team... There's another championship sport on campus.

Girls Basketball Proving Worthy of Ranking

The Eagles didn't make the postseason last year and they have a new coach, but there are those in the know who see something in the team this season. El Segundo is ranked fourth in the first CIF Southern Section Division 3A Division. They improved to 5-2 on the season after defeating Bassett 58-29. The ball movement and crisp passing has elevated the Eagles' overall play. Couple that with their aggressive defense and you can see why they are worthy of their ranking.

The Eagles are 10-deep in the rotation of players with little drop-off when a substitute player enters the game. In fact, head coach John Peterson often will substitute for all five players on the floor at one time. Malia Hue has become one of the top threats off the bench. She sank a three-pointer the first time she had the ball and it helped propel her team to a 9-0 lead. Later in the first quarter, her easy layup extended the lead to 17-4. El Segundo went on to outscore the Olympians 26-11 in the second half and cruise to the win.


Hue and Story Noble each had 11 points to lead the Eagles. Reese Jones had a great defensive game, leading her team with six rebounds and six steals. The Eagles play in the Valley Christian Tournament this week. Next week, Ocean League play starts with El Segundo visiting Hawthorne on Wednesday at 6 p.m. and Beverly Hills next Friday at 6 p.m.

Cherry-Cranberry Sauce

The rich fruitiness of sweet cherries helps blunt the sharp edge of fresh cranberries. Cooked together, these anthocyanin powerhouses make a great holiday staple that can be used as a base ingredient for cocktails, a glaze for meats, a spread for sandwiches, a topping for yogurt and more.

Ingredients

- Equal portions fresh cranberries and dried/frozen Northwest cherries
- 3/4 cup water or pomegranate juice
- 3/4 cup maple syrup, molasses, or sugar to taste Optional: 4 -2" peels fresh ginger,
- 3 tbsp citrus zest, black pepper, fresh herbs, raspberries

Preparation

- 1. In medium-sized sauce pot, add 3/4 cup water, preferred sweetener and cranberries.
- 2. Bring to simmer, stirring occasionally and more frequently as the sauce begins to form.
- **3.** Add sweet cherries, continue stirring.
- 4. Once reduced, remove from heat, incorporate other flavorings if desired.
- 5. Cool for 30 mins 1 hour before transferring to wider, shallow pan to speed cooling.
- 6. Once cooled, refrigerate in air-tight container for up to 2 weeks.





City Council

At the behest of Mayor Pro Tem Carol Pirsztuk, the Council agreed to study the current business license tax structure that has not changed in about 30 years. Part of the goal is to clean up the code to remove business categories that no longer exist and add any new ones. City Attorney Mark Hensley pointed out that the Council can approve such tweaks. However, any proposed increases to the general business license tax must receive voter approval. With the next municipal election in March 2020, Hensley recommended that staff come back with any proposed changes by February or March to allow proper time to move towards a potential ballot measure (should one be requested). In order to place a measure on the ballot, four of the five Council members must opt in favor of doing so. A report within the last two years comparing El Segundo with neighboring communities showed small business license tax fees falling below the average but larger employers running higher.

The spate of presentations to begin the meeting kicked off with a recognition of Guaymas Mayor Sara Valle, who was recently elected to the position by a record 62 percent of voters (despite four other candidates). She and a small contingent arrived in El Segundo on Monday to tour the town and reinvigorate the now 56-year relationship between the two cities. Valle also served as mayor for the Sonora, Mexico coastal community in the late '90s. During her address to the Council (delivered in Spanish with an interpreter beside her), Valle provided an overview of Guaymas' history, chief industries and claims to fame. She also received the Key to the City.

Next up, the Council recognized four successful girls softball all-star teams that excelled in recent tournaments. The groups included the 8U Gold, 10U Gold, 10U Silver and 12U Gold squads, with the players and coaches on hand for photo opportunities with the Council members.

Fire Chief Chris Donovan introduced two new employees: Administrative Specialist Vanessa Arias and Management Analyst Liz Lydic (who moved over from the Finance Department). Public Works Director Ken Berkman introduced new Sr. Management Analyst Jasmine Allen, who was promoted to the new title.

The Council also received the quarterly report from City Treasurer Crista Binder and Deputy Treasurer 11 Dino Marsocci, with a

rundown of the City's investment activities. Among the highlights were significantly higher interest returns compared to 2017 as yield rates tick up. The City continues to comply with its investment policy with a diverse portfolio.

In a commendation, Allen Gragg received El Segundo Police Department's (ESPD) 2018 RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer of the Year) honors. An RSVP since July 2015, Gragg provides routine patrol but contributes additional hours for various local events. He also removes graffiti, and repairs crime prevention and station equipment at home in his spare time.

New ESPD K-9 Officer Jeff Rudolph introduced his canine partner Ory, a 2-year-old male Belgian Malinois.

The Council proclaimed the 1200 block of East Acacia Avenue as Candy Cane Lane from Dec. 8 at 7 p.m. through Dec. 23 and recognized all the homeowners who decorate their properties over that period. ESPD Lieutenant Jeff Leyman provided an update on the safety plan for the very popular event, announcing street closures at Acacia and Center as well as California and Walnut, with two police personnel each in two vehicles plus a fifth officer to handle any incidents. To limit who drives in or out to actual residents, the ingress area for the 1100 block will be from Acacia and Center. It will be from Walnut and California for the 1200 block. Officers will request identification from residents of those blocks and will not allow any non-resident vehicles access. Police will provide flyers/door-hangers regarding the plan and also post the information on social media.

The Council also proclaimed this Sunday, Dec. 9 as the 55th Annual Holiday Parade, which will run from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. starting at Imperial Avenue and Main and continuing down Main to El Segundo Boulevard. This year's theme is "Seaside Yuletide."

Meanwhile, Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit announced that a "Plan B" is in the works in case rain pours down during this evening's treelighting ceremony at the Civic Plaza. While she indicated the actual lighting will likely take place regardless, inclement weather could force the Santa and toy giveaway inside. Final status was unknown at press time.

As is common practice, the Council canceled its first meeting in January (this year on the 2nd) due to its close proximity to the holidays. The next regularly scheduled meeting will be on Tuesday, Dec. 18. •


