The City of El Segundo: 2019 Year in Review

In 2019 the economic good times continued for the City of El Segundo with another budget surplus for the latest fiscal year, but future projections weren't so rosy. Finance Director Joe Lillio predicted deficits on the way in the next few years as pension costs continue to escalate along with other expenditures.

For the 2019/20 fiscal year budget, the El Segundo City Council approved over \$3 million in capital improvement projects (and then okayed, in October, the first-ever three-year plan for such projects). Though the members agreed to move forward with a long-desired renovation of Acacia Park, they opted to scrap a planned pool at the site. Those monies (\$1 million) will instead go towards the future restoration of The Plunge. The group also prioritized Teen Center improvements and City Hall safety upgrades, among other key items. The Council also lowered general fund reserves from 19 percent to 17 percent and set aside additional dollars to further pay down long-term pension liability. Through various actions, the Council has saved \$11.7 million in future pension interest payments. On a related note, the City also finalized all remaining union contracts. While the deals included pay raises, the bargaining units agreed for employees to assume a larger portion of their pension costs moving forward.

With the retirement of Greg Carpenter in June, the Council voted to approve Scott Mitnick as the new city manager after an extensive search and background check process. Mitnick arrived with over 20 years of executive level experience as both a city manager and county administrator, along with private sector stints. He advocated a team approach to leadership as staff looks to achieve strategic plan priorities outlined

by the Council. One of the items unveiled in 2019 was a full-scale communications plan spearheaded by Deputy City Manager Barbara Voss.

After running more than a dozen personnel below the allotted 62 sworn personnel, the El Segundo Police Department is now back to full force after hiring several new employees over the past year. An aggressive marketing plan launched in April and a generous incentive bonus for lateral officers to come here from other departments were two key reasons for the news.

The City's new trash agreement went into effect in May after the Council in January chose EDCO as the hauler - replacing the longtime previous contractor Republic Services. Under the arrangement, one- and two-unit residential property owners began to pay for trash collection for the first time in El Segundo history. The fee: \$45 a quarter (\$15 per month). Those in larger residential or commercial units have to contract separately with approved haulers (who must follow certain guidelines and pay permit fees set by the Council in October). EDCO's service is automated, as opposed to the prior unlimited manual curbside service, with larger rolling bins corresponding in color to trash, recycling and green waste.

After nary a peep of news the entire year, TopGolf was again back in the spotlight in the fall after Council members Scot Nicol and Chris Pimentel wrapped up negotiations with CenterCal regarding the future operations of the driving range and nine-hole course at The Lakes at El Segundo. The Council voted 4-1 (with Don Brann dissenting) to move forward with the project, which specifies a \$1.3 million annual ground lease plus percentage of beverage sales and other contributions. The

new facility will also feature a three-story driving range with more than double the current hitting bays; a new pro shop and clubhouse; meeting space; restaurant; and the TopGolf venue. The revised deal outlined protections for open space, programs for youths and schools, discounts for residents, night lighting, a reconfigured golf course and more. Meanwhile, opponents of the project launched a signature campaign hoping to put a voter referendum on a future ballot aiming to overturn the Council decision.

The Council looked at regulating short-term rentals in town, spurred initially by complaints about a local party house that abused the system and disturbed neighbors. Staff recommended starting an 18-month pilot program requiring local airbnb (or other short-term rental unit) operators to obtain an annual permit and business license, live on the premises at least half the year, pay transient occupancy taxes, and follow guidelines such as providing off site parking and keeping their properties free of trash. The Council will revisit the matter in January.

Due to state mandates, the City will consolidate its next election with that of Los Angeles County – with the date moving up to March 3 instead of the usual April. The City Clerk will not tally the votes going forward and a new ballot system will replace the old technology. The City held two events explaining the new process. Meanwhile, three spots will be open on the City Council. Incumbents Drew Boyles and Carol Pirsztuk filed to run again,. Don Brann had no plans to run, but announced he would leave the Council before the end of 2019 due to state legislation (going into effect on Jan. 1) forcing him to choose between the Council or

Poinsettias Came a Long Way to Become a Floral Tradition

This is the story of the Christmas poinsettia, which came a long way from growing wild in Mexico before an American botanist and U.S. ambassador changed all that forever. The beautiful red poinsettia now associated with Christmas even has its own holiday.

December 12 was National Poinsettia Day in honor of Joel Roberts Poinsett, an American botanist, physician and a minister to Mexico. In 1828, he was dazzled by the beauty of the crimson red flowering plants that grew wild on the hillsides in Southern Mexico. So, he sent cuttings of the plant to his home in Charleston, South Carolina.

Poinsett died on this day in 1851, and the U.S. Congress honored him for his contribution to Christmas and the American floral industry. While Poinsett introduced the potted flower to the States, California botanist and plant breeder Paul Ecke, Jr. is considered the father of the poinsettia because he developed breeding techniques that allowed greenhouse growers to produce millions of poinsettias here and around the world.

Poinsettias are not only the number oneselling floral product at Christmas. No other flower or flowering plant is bought more by consumers in the United and Canada. A common misconception about poinsettias is that the colorful, pointed leaves are the flowers. The flowers are the yellow clustered buds in the center, while the colored leafy parts are actually modified leaves that turn vivid colors depending on how much sunlight they receive.

Each poinsettia plant starts as an unrooted cutting, which greenhouses receiving the starter plants during the summer. Though the plant gets its start during the longest days of the year, it needs total darkness up to 16 hours each day to be ready to burst onto the scene in late November and early December. Even the faintest amount of light during the night will result in a duller color.

Worldwide, growers of poinsettias know the Ecke family name. An immigrant from Germany in 1906, Albert Ecke settled in the Hollywood area. His family grew its own fruits and vegetables, but within a few years was selling cut poinsettias at a stand on Sunset Boulevard. That was 1909 when poinsettias grew wild in that area of Southern California.

Ecke and his son Paul "had the idea that the ruby flowers would sell well around Christmas," according to a history found at the web site, poinsettiaday.com. The Eckes scraped together some money to buy five acres in El Monte and expanded the family business. The business grew, and by 1917 the Hollywood-grown nursery plants were being shipped to Chicago and New York. Soon after, success led to some major changes.

Development pressures in Hollywood in the

early 1920s pushed the poinsettia growers to look elsewhere for land and opportunity. The Ecke family bought 40 acres in Encinitas, along what today is the I-5, and their first year was a complete disaster. Santa Ana winds tore through the fields of red flowering plants and ruined Christmas in 1923.

But, the family business bounced back. The production moved indoors to greenhouses in the mid-1950s at the suggestion of the founder's grandson, Paul Jr., who learned about modern horticulture techniques at Ohio State University. Not only was he a grower, but the young Ecke was an early adopter of product placement. By getting his family's crimson plants in front of a national audience, television viewers who tuned in for Bob Hope's annual Christmas specials came to associate poinsettias with Christmas cheer.

How the Eckes grew poinsettias was a family secret until 1991, when a botany See Poinsettias, page 7



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

The highlight of the season was an amazing night in which the Eagles were defeated at home by Santa Monica. Still, the home team

was treated to a standing ovation because of one very special player.

One of the most emotional games of the school year and maybe in recent memory didn't involve a league title or CIF championship. Never mind that Santa Monica would defeat the Eagles by 28 points. It didn't matter to the Eagle faithful because the gym was there to watch Cameron' Cam' Carlton. Cam Carlton played in just one game in his high school year, but it was played in front of a standing-room-only crowd there to watch and support him. Those who were there will long remember Cam scoring a game high15 points including, four three-pointers; even the Santa Monica crowd cheered him on.

Girl's Water Polo

Jenna Olson, Christina Mullane and Sophia Caravello led their team to the CIF-SS Division 4 playoffs. The fourth-seeded Eagles finished in a tie for the top spot in the Ocean League. The Eagles great season came to a thrilling end in the CIF-SS Division 4 quarter-finals playoffs losing 8-7 to fifth-ranked Sunny Hills.

They gave their all and stood out in their respective sport. Their focus beyond their sport also showed in the classroom and colleges from the East Coast to the West Coast beckoned them. Soccer

The Eagles had another historic season by winning their second consecutive CIF championship. Their memorable season continued when they swept their way to winning their second consecutive Division 3 Southern California State Regional championship. They defeated West Torrance 2-1 in overtime in the CIF Finals and defeated the Warriors 2-1 for the Regional State crown.

With their historic 25th win of the season, the Eagles cemented their achievement in school history. The Eagles finished 25-1-1 overall, won the Ocean League for the first time in three years, ranked fourth in the nation and second in California. It is the highest nationally ranked that any El Segundo team has been since the 1966-67 basketball team was the number one team in the nation.

The girl's team finished 9-9 overall had a decent year. They finished fourth in the competitive Ocean League but missed out on the CIF-SS playoffs. They were a young team led by forwards freshman Chelsea Charles and junior Chloe Brown and senior goalkeeper Liliana Romero.

Big 5 El Segundo Run for Education

On a breathtaking morning, more than 1600 runners took to the streets of our community for the 28th Annual Big 5 El Segundo Run for Education. El Segundo residents were among the fastest runners in the 5K run. Austin Van Biezen finished second overall, Bill Seidel third, Garrett Rifkin fourth and Calvin Liang fifth. On the female side, the El Segundo high schools cross country team dominated the top nine runners. Megan McCann, the high school softball coach, paced the race and came in first. Lauren Shakstad finished third while Tami Higa came in sixth. ESHS cross country standouts Isabella Mai (fourth), Sophia Zago (seventh), Tyler Matlosz (eighth) and James Matlosz (ninth) represented their high school team well.

In the 10K race, 17 locals finished in the top three in their respective age groups. John Picklhaver finished first overall in 33:39 while, Niall Glynn came in third at 37:35. In the female race, Valerie Voboril was third overall and the first female El Segundo resident to cross the finish line in 44:53.

Boys Volleyball

The Eagles had an opportunity to exact some revenge to Santa Monica and, in the process, win a share of the Ocean League title when these two teams met. In their first

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

his position on the Da Vinci schools board. He chose the latter. The Council will operate as a quartet until after the election. Lance Giroux filed for the third open spot. With no additional candidates, he will be elected in March along with the incumbents. For other positions, City Clerk Tracy Weaver will run unopposed while City Treasurer Crista Binder chose not to seek reelection. Matthew Robinson is the sole candidate for City Treasurer.

At Binder's request, the Council agreed to place a measure on the March ballot that would require the Treasurer to become an appointed position in the future in hopes of ensuring the individual running that department is qualified and experienced to take on the role.

The Council had multiple discussions early in the year to determine which groups should get priority pool time at the new aquatics center (outside of already established school district usage). Ultimately Alpha Aquatics, with the largest number of El Segundo residents, received 60 percent of the time and first pick of selection days. Beach Cities Swimming received the other 40 percent.

In May, the Council certified the EIR for the Park Place extension and grade separation project near PCH and Rosecrans. The members chose the staff-preferred Alternative IC to relocate the existing BNSF rail tracks to allow for a single trade separation with a roundabout at Park Place and Allied Way to reduce traffic congestion. Also in May: A facilities condition assessment of the City's 31 buildings revealed the structures in good shape overall with no urgent safety improvements needed immediately. And during the same month, the Council changed the start times of its regular meetings to 6 p.m. instead of 7 p.m. with the idea to make the sessions more efficient and not run as late.

In the late summer, the Council approved

a deal with landowner El Segundo Unified School District for the City to cover 70 percent of the cost for a shared parking lot for the Richmond Street Field Improvement Project. The ratio was based on Plunge and community usage versus school.

The Council also approved a 10-year development agreement and EIR certification for the Beach Cities Media Campus Project (Continental Development Corporation and Mar Ventures) at 2021 Rosecrans Ave.

In November, the Council adopted a Percent for Arts development fee (also imposed by 36 other municipalities in the County). Under the arrangement, developers of new commercial/industrial projects of \$2 million or more pay a one percent fee or provide equivalent art on their sites. The fee doesn't apply to residential projects.


Currently, El Segundo boasts more than \$1 billion in active and planned developments. The new creative office spaces and campuses coming out of the ground are smart, state-of-the-art, and architectural works of art. The new AC Hotel by Marriott located near Elevon in Campus El Segundo area opened Spring 2019. Construction of 888 N Douglas by developer Hackman Capital Partners is well on the way and will hold more than 550,000 square feet of creative office. Development is set for completion in 2020. Several large commercial office buildings have been repurposed over the last year and the notable new tenants have moved in to these reimagined new spaces, including Saatchi and Saatchi, Skyryse, Inc., NEXT Trucking and Quest Nutrition. In October 2019, the city approved a new three-deck Topgolf facility, the first in Southern California, to renovate the existing driving range at The Lakes. The project includes modifications to the existing golf course, parking lot expansion, demolition of the existing clubhouse and construction of a new pro shop.•

student published a university research paper that spilled the beans. There are blue poinsettias for sale, but they are a "designer color" created with dyes, according to the University of Vermont, which provides some fun facts about today's horticultural honoree.

- Poinsettias can be grown in a backyard. In the wild or planted in tropical climates, thepoinsettia can reach heights of 12 feet.
- The botany community originally dismissed the poinsettia as a weed. It wasn't until the 1960s that researchers were able to successfully breed plants to bloom more than just a few days.
- The poinsettia is not poisonous, despite what people say. The National Poison Center in Atlanta and the American Medical Association have tested the plant and debunked the myth. Cats and children also may choke on the fibrous parts, however, and keep poinsettias out of reach of animals and toddlers.
- The best way to prolong the life of the plants is to avoid hot or cold drafts. Keep the soil moist, and keep poinsettias near natural light and in temperatures of 60 to 70 degrees. Water when the soil begins to dry, and avoid soaking the potting soil.

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

Secret Rescuers series by Paula Harrison



Film Review

Greta Gerwig's *Little Women* Proves An Empowering Remake

I am generally not a fan of remakes/reboots; I believe the reliance on doing what has already been done distracts from the discovery of new and inspiring voices in cinema. Greta Gerwig, however, has changed my mind. Did society need another rendition of Little Women, the Louisa May Alcott novel that was first published in 1868 and has been remade over 14 times? Will this be the quintessential female empowerment film of the year released at a perfect time? Are we all the better for it? A resounding yes! To all of the above.

This interpretation of the life and times of the March sisters stays faithful to the novel while embracing Gerwig's charm and quick-witted the characters, Gerwig takes some creative liberty in her storytelling by jumping through the timeline, with the only distinction between past and present being the more saturated color palette of the past as opposed to the more bleak and gray reality of the present. It's a stylized decision that works wonders.

Aside from being a directorial knockout, the assembly of this all-star cast is an exciting who's who of legendary and iconic artists. Laura Dern provides an emotionally moving performance as Marmee, and Meryl Streep is unmatched in her cattiness as Aunt March. Saoirse Ronan is fierce as the protagonist, Jo, but perhaps the film's biggest surprise is Florence Pugh, whose hypnotic voice and measured understanding of

charisma. A story of love, loss, and coming of age, these four sisters – Jo (Saoirse Ronan), Meg (Emma Watson), Amy (Florence Pugh), and Beth (Eliza Scanlen) - rely on each other to navigate life's unpredictability and hardships. All independent thinkers with unique personalities, the women are headstrong in their quest to find personal fulfillment, which means different things to each of them. Jo, the outspoken feminist of the group, is committed to her work as an aspiring writer. Despite her admiration for her wealthy neighbor, the charming and confident Theodore 'Laurie' Laurence (Timothée Chalamet), she turns down his marriage proposal in favor of a life she can call her own. Her views on love and marriage stand opposite to Meg and Amy's, who find love in very unexpected partners. The youngest and more reserved sister, Beth, finds happiness through music but, as we learned 150 years ago when the novel was released, even her passion and purity can't protect her from contracting an incurable illness.

Despite being set in a post-Civil War era, the script, which was adapted for the screen by Gerwig, feels fresh with sharp, sassy humor. The dynamic between Jo and Laurie feels like any modern-day teenage couple trying to figure out their relationship through the ups and downs of tears and laughter. In addition to modernizing comedic timing both enhances the ensemble cast while simultaneously stealing every scene.

The vibrancy that radiates from Little Women feels reminiscent of Gerwig's past both as a director in Lady Bird and as an actor in Frances Ha. What all of her films have in common are strong female leads whose confidence in themselves and their dreams surpass any societal expectations. No matter if it's 1868 or 2020, the timelessness of Little Women, now playing in theaters everywhere, is undeniable; there will always be women who strive for personal fulfillment and love on their terms. •

meeting, Samo won the match in five games. This time the two teams battled to five games again, but El Segundo came away losing 23-25, 25-23, 16-25, 25-17, 11-15 and entered the CIF playoffs as the second-place team.

After dispatching Bishop Montgomery in the first round of the CIF-SS Division 2 playoffs, the Eagles fell to Beckman in the second round. The loss ended their season with an impressive 15-10 overall record.

Softball

The Lady Eagles had one of the program's most successful seasons. They won the Ocean

League, won 25 games, had an 18-game win streak (which is the longest in the program's history) and reached the CIF Southern Section championship game for the third time in 12 years and the sixth time El Segundo had advanced to a softball CIF final. Unfortunately, the Eagles 41-year drought between their last CIF championships continued when they fell to second-seeded Godinez in the finale.

Baseball

The Eagles were invited to the big dance, the CIF Southern Section Division 2 playoffs, after winning the Ocean League. After dispensing of self-entitled Santa Fe in the first round, they faced a way too confident top-seeded Arcadia team in the second round. They upended the Apaches 3-2 in 11 innings to advance to the third round against Santa Margarita, where the dance ended and with it the season. El Segundo traveled to Santa Margarita to face quite possibly their toughest opponent this past season. You could call this season's version of the Eagles a Cinderella story. The clock struck midnight on the Eagles and their glass slipper shattered when Santa Margarita dealt the Eagles a 4-0 loss.

Not many thought they would win the program's 37th league title or even 15 games on the season. But nobody told the 18 members of the team or their five coaches. The Eagles wound up winning the Ocean League and for good measure ended the season with a 21-9 record. It marked the fortieth time in the last 59 years that the Eagles have won 20 or more games in the same season.
