El Segundo Year in Review Part 1: City Hall Rolls with the Changes

It was another whirlwind year in El Segundo with a number of notable news items that made their way through these pages over the last 12 months. For the short term, the City of El Segundo had much to be pleased about regarding its finances - with a structurally balanced budget and a hefty general fund surplus of over \$7 million. Savings from staff vacancies, plus revenue spikes from sources such as transient occupancy taxes were among the chief reasons for the positive bottom line. But the good tidings were tempered with projections of sizable deficits within just a few years, mainly due to the escalating unfunded pension liability that continues to soak up ever larger chunks of annual expenditures. The El Segundo City Council this year took proactive measures to address long-range pension impacts by allocating additional funds to shave down interest and avoid negative amortization. The group also established a trust fund to maximize investment possibilities for future monies to be used towards pension payments. Actions to date resulted in savings of \$6.15 million overall. City leadership changed after the April election with the departures of Mayor Suzanne Fuentes and Councilmember Mike Dugan, who both chose not to run again. Scot Nicol, previously on the El Segundo Planning Commission, and Chris Pimentel were the top vote-getters out of four candidates and officially joined the Council in May. The revamped quintet then appointed Drew Boyles as the mayor and Carol Pirsztuk as the mayor pro tem. El Segundo voters also overwhelmingly passed Measure C, a preemptive three-quarter-cent sales tax increase that will only be imposed if and when Los Angeles County places a similar measure on a future ballot. Should that occur, the additional sales tax revenues (initially estimated at \$9 million annually) will all go to the City of El Segundo instead of into LA County coffers. As a way to boost revenues immediately, the Council in June moved forward with an amended fee schedule to recover the City's total costs for various services – with projections of \$600,000 in additional general fund dollars in 2018/19.

During summer strategic planning and budget study sessions, the Council reinforced its previous direction, identified areas for improvement, targeted spending priorities and set up a 2019 work plan. To develop baselines in order to improve service and to better inform budget decision-making, the City conducted a Net Promoter Score and business and resident survey that will repeat in 2019. Staff also conducted an employee survey. And just last week, the Council approved the next three-year strategic plan that will further develop key performance indicators to measure the effectiveness of City services and consider ways to get better. Meanwhile, the allocations from the budget surplus included \$2.5 million towards paying down future pension obligations and another \$3.1 million to capital improvement projects. The Council also approved various department head requests with the stipulation that any new hires don't come out of the surplus funds. Among the notable capital projects in 2018: Main Street bollards and downtown landscaping/beautification (with tree up-lighting and parklets coming soon),

Fire Station #1 seismic retrofit, police station remodel, Recreation Park picnic shelter, citywide pavement rehabilitation, and pump station modifications. A citywide facility needs assessment is also in progress with results expected in 2019. Also of note, the City of Los Angeles (as part of El Segundo's settlement with airport officials) completed a pavement rehabilitation project on its portion of Imperial Highway, from Vista del Mar to Aviation Boulevard. Relations with neighboring Scattergood and DWP improved, charting the course for the water tank mural project that transformed what was a long-time rusty evesore in the community entryway on the south side of Grand coming up from the beach. The designer was renowned artist John Van Hamersveld. Public safety highlights included formation of the All Hazards Incident Management Team to train and prepare City personnel to respond to major events; the El Segundo Police Department Naloxone program to prevent possible drug overdose deaths; plans to incorporate drones in local crime enforcement; upgrades in car and body-worn cameras for police personnel; replacement of paramedic ambulances; and funding from Chevron for fire engine, utility vehicle and safety equipment replacement. The City also invested in major technology upgrades to the emergency radio system and installed a new fire dispatch pre-alert system to improve response times. To build back up the number of sworn personnel to budgeted levels, the Council approved an aggressive police recruitment campaign with high bonuses to entice lateral officers to come here, among other incentives. Two Bad Ideas

1. El Segundo streets are too narrow to accommodate an automated trash removal system. The trucks cannot reach over the tops of parked cars and pluck the trashcans from the sidewalks. The trashcans will have to be placed in the streets for the trucks to access them. Cars parked at the curb will mean the trashcans will have to be placed on the other side of the cars, narrowing the streets for traffic even further. Automated trash pick-up works well in newer communities due to wider streets, but it can be a nightmare for older communities like El Segundo, which has many narrow residential streets. Automated trash removal is a bad idea for El Segundo and the service should remain manual.

2. Consideration for high-density housing west of PCH in El Segundo near Washington Park as suggested by Council Member and Realtor, Scot Nicol begs the questions, "When will enough businesses located in El Segundo be enough? When will enough people living in El Segundo be enough? When will the smalltown atmosphere that many of us love about El Segundo take precedence over business interests? Why the rush to turn El Segundo into a congested community dominated by commercial buildings, large high-density apartment/condominium complexes and traffic congestion everywhere you look? When will enough be enough?"

Current El Segundo residents deserve better from their City Council and Planning Commission Members. Priorities should be to maintain a quality lifestyle for El Segundo Residents rather than constantly chasing after revenue.

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


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<u>Community Briefs</u> **Rider Alert: Temporary Green Line Station Closures**

Green Line rail service will be suspended between Crenshaw Station and Redondo Beach Station beginning at 9 p.m., Friday, Jan. 4, 2019, through 3 a.m., Sunday, Jan. 20. The Crenshaw/LAX Transit Project is laying the foundation and making connections for the future. In order to make the necessary connections between the Crenshaw/LAX Transit Project and the Green Line, rail service will be suspended between the Crenshaw Station and Redondo Beach Station.

The work will activate the rail connection between the Crenshaw/LAX Transit Project and the Green Line to make them functional; begin testing trains between the two lines; serve as a milestone for the Crenshaw/LAX

Transit Project; and keep Crenshaw Station open for eastbound Green Line service only.

The following stations on the Green Line will be closed and rail service will be suspended:

Crenshaw (Note: This station will be open for eastbound Green Line service to Norwalk only), Hawthorne/Lennox, Aviation/LAX, Mariposa, El Segundo, Douglas, Redondo Beach. Note: LAX G Shuttle stop will remain at its usual stop at Aviation/LAX Station.

Replacement Bus Shuttle Service (Line 853): A free Green Line bus shuttle will be provided to service all closed stations between the Crenshaw Station and the Redondo Beach Station during this time.

Raytheon Designs Special Prosthetic Hand for Teen Musician

Two weeks ago, Raytheon celebrated the end of its Toys for Tots Toy drive. The company's employees, across five different sites, donated over 4,000 toys to the Marine Corp's Toys for Tots organization. In El Segundo alone, more than 2,700 toys were collected. Keeping with the spirit of giving, Raytheon employees teamed up with high school students in El Segundo as well as in McKinney, Texas to design a prosthetic hand for a 13-year-old boy who is learning to play the mellophone. His prosthetic hand was making it difficult to hold the

instrument, so the best and the brightest minds at Raytheon's Space and Airborne Systems office volunteered over 90 hours of their time to help fulfil his goal of performing in his school's marching band. With help from a group of Da Vinci Science High School students, Raytheon engineers made him a new 3D-printed prosthetic hand designed to grip objects more easily. Texas Scottish Rite Hospital will do the final testing and fitting once Raytheon 3D prints the final design.





Engaging Local Elementary Students in Art

Pursuing your passion. Some call it a "fanciful hope," while others say, "#lifegoals." At Vistamar School students and teachers pursue their passions through exploratory classes, and it is the reason why Paint Pals exists for Juan Cabrillo Elementary.

Designed by Vistamar seniors Emma Cheung and Nikki Sadat, Paint Pals is the answer to a need for further art exploration at Cabrillo. Under the guidance of a faculty advisor, Cheung and Sadat are in their second year of running the program.

When asked why Sadat and Cheung felt it was important to create this class, Sadat reflected, "Freedom of creative expression is critical for development in kids. The ability to have fun at a young age and that 'coloring inside the lines' isn't the only way is very important for self-confidence." The Vistamar exploratory class meets four times a month, spending two days lesson planning and two days visiting Cabrillo School. Cheung added, "I've always loved art as well as volunteering with kids, so this was the perfect opportunity to combine these two passions."

The class has grown from nine students in the inaugural year to more than 20. The group does projects like decorating masks, crafting hand puppets and designing paper airplanes. Sadat shares her favorite memory of the class: "The image that always stuck with me was my view of 35 kids quickly running towards their parents with their masked faces covered in a

Sports The 2018 Sports Year in Review

As 2018 comes to a close in another week, this gives us the opportunity to look back and recall the ups and the downs, the exciting wins and some heartbreaking losses. It was another year of close calls, heartbreaks and a time to reflect and reminisce about sports in our community. High school and youth sports once again took center stage as we supported our teams and our kids. So with that in mind, let's revisit the first six months of 2018 and relive the excitement of some very special and precious memories that had our community buzzing and outside communities in envy.

Basketball

The girls had a challenging season that included playing 18 games against teams that advanced to the playoffs. They tied for third place in the Ocean League that culminated in a tiebreaking loss to Santa Monica. Junior guards Malia Hue and Kailea Lee were instrumental running the offense, while sophomore forward Reese Jones and freshman Jordan Peterson were key defensive players.

The boys had a good season in spite of finishing fourth in the Ocean League. The Eagles would start the season 5-0 and were off to their best start in years with a 12-4 record before starting their Ocean League schedule. The league schedule was a challenge, facing three teams that advanced to the postseason.

The Eagles faced 14 teams that reached the postseason and their 15-12 overall record was the best in six seasons. Second-year head coach David March had the program going in an upward manner with hardnosed defense.

Third-year guard Miles Jones was supplanted after getting injured. Jones' injury hurt the Eagles offensively, so the direction was to be better on defense. In 27 contests, the Eagles gave up an average of 38 points per game -- one of the stingiest in the CIF-SS Division 4AA.

The season ended in the first round of the CIF-SS Division 4AA playoffs when El Segundo fell to second-seeded Mark Keppel in a close game, 44-39.

Girls Water Polo

The Eagles' high-scoring offense, that saw them score the fifth most goals in their division (291) and easily the most in the Ocean League (99), was one reason El Segundo advanced to the CIF playoffs. The Eagles advanced to the finals of the Diamond Bar Tournament, but lost to Long Beach Millikan 11-10 in a thriller.

The offense was led by Jenna Olson, Claire Lindsey and Christina Mullane, who helped the team average 10 goals per game. The defense was led by Lisa Caravello in goal. She turned back some of the top offenses, including Millikan. The Rams, who averaged 15 goals per with the Black Widows in a game that was a nail-bitter. The Flying Tigers took a quick 2-0 lead thanks to goals by Donovan Finney and Aran Clinton. Gavin Vanek scored a hat trick and led the Flying Tigers to a 6-4 win.

In the Squirt Division, the Rue Jackets fell to the Classic Kings 6-3. The Classic Kings leaned on goalie Jacob Light, who was solid throughout the game in making 25 saves. The Classic Kings took the lead three minutes into the second half on Landon Aubert's unassisted score. Four minutes later, Aubert took a pass from Connor Hitzig with another score. The Classic Kings would score another goal with less than five minutes remaining to ice the game.

In the Pee Wee Division, the Whitehawks trailed the Classic Kings 5-2 at halftime only to make a brilliant comeback in the second half to win 8-6. It was a minor miracle of their comeback win, with three of their goals coming off short-handed power plays. Noah Poinsettia-Yoshida led the Whitehawks with four goals, including two during short-handed plays. Austin Kehl, who was playing in his third consecutive championship game, led the Classic Kings with two goals and two assists.

Soccer

After a challenging start, the Eagles got on a roll. El Segundo began the year 2-3-3 and didn't look like the team that would finish as the CIF and Southern California Region champion. Things changed once the Eagles started Ocean League play with wins over Culver City and Beverly Hills. Though they didn't win the Ocean League after two close games with Santa Monica, they were clearly the team to beat once the playoffs started.

The Eagles were playing their best soccer entering the playoffs and were peaking at just the right time. It wasn't an easy road to the championship game even if they had outscored their opponents 11-6 in the first four playoff games. They defeated four league champions, including fourth-seeded Baldwin Park before getting to the pinnacle of the season. They were challenged by the long drive to Vista Murrieta in a 3-3 win on penalty kicks. They forged through a chilly game on the road that saw a light dusting of snow against Oak Hills from Hesperia and an eventual win 2-1 to reach the final. In the final, El Segundo would face a Hesperia team that had outscored its playoff opponents 9-1 and was on a seven-game win streak.

In the CIF final, Denis Vezina fed Ciaran Feeney with a pass and the latter obliged with a header out of reach of the goalie and into the net in the 59th minute. In the 72nd minute, Jack Finders took a free ball and blasted a left-footed shot to the back of the net for a 2-0 lead to cap the scoring and the Eagles'

contest, were held to 11 and Caravello made 15 saves in the game.

The Eagles advanced to the CIF Southern Section playoffs and defeated Alemany 16-10, but were eliminated by Diamond Bar in a close one 5-4 in the quarterfinals.

A standing-room-only crowd watched and cheered on Championship Saturday when the El Segundo In-Line Hockey Association crowned champions in three divisions. In the Mite Division, the Flying Tigers faced off first CIF soccer championship.

El Segundo advanced to play in the Southern California Region State Division IV championship tournament and defeated Kennedy, the City Section Division 3 champions, 7-3. The Eagles went on to beat Desert Mirage of Thermal on the road 5-4 on penalty kicks to advance to the final hosted by El Segundo. On a rainy evening in front of a crowd that numbered over 700 fans sitting in the wind, rain and cold, the Eagles faced Hesperia and won a thriller on penalty kicks. During the penalty kick phase, Logan Pismopulos scored on a shot to the right corner, Malcolm Holtzmann's blast to the left corner was good and Finders' finesse made it 3-3. When Hesperia's Cesar Roque's attempt went wide left, it all came down to Casey Lund to deliver the game-winner. Lund blasted it into the corner and with it was a historic win for the ages.


The Lady Eagles started the season without four potential starters who were either injured or decided not to play. It would be a challenging season, but they persevered through adversity to return **See Sports, page 10**

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

Year in Review

related note, the Council in late November locked in new three-year labor deals for the police and fire unions that allocated salary raises for personnel but in return required the employees to pick up three percent more of their CalPERS pension payments.

Technology improvements included online business license applications, new Recreation and Parks scheduling software, self-checkout machines at the library, launching of economic development and travel/tourism websites, citywide website/mobile app replacement (underway) and permitting and plan check system revamps. At the beginning of 2018, the City brought on new Information Systems Director Charles Mallory to lead that new department with dozens of projects already in the pipeline.

The El Segundo Public Library welcomed aboard its new director, Melissa McCollum, in June. Notable projects in the works include a new Wi-Fi zone with the renovation of the east side of the main floor, plus the aforementioned self-checkout machines. The library also unveiled the new "Living Book" program in collaboration with the El Segundo Museum of Art and kicked off the "Community Conversations" effort to engage local citizens of all ages to provide input and ideas on how to improve local quality of life. The popular summer reading programs continued to thrive and the annual Author Fair was once again a major success.

In addition to the aforementioned downtown improvements and online software, Recreation and Parks oversaw installation of a new picnic shelter at Rec Park, worked with the Arts and Culture Committee and El Segundo Co-Op Nursery School to add a mural at the Clubhouse in Rec Park (with another mural in progress near the basketball court), developed a process to identify and prioritize future capital improvement projects to bring to the Council, and initiated the design process for the Acacia Park rebuild. Recreation and Parks was also heavily involved in the lead-up to the new Aquatics Center set to officially open on Jan. 5 at the site of the Wiseburn High School in El Segundo.

Economic development continued its upward projection during 2018. Major news included the Los Angeles Times' move to town, the new AC Hotel under construction, expansion of Beyond Meat and Boeing, completion of the Ascend/Frank Gehry project with Radiology Partners set to move into the space, near-completion of the DR Horton housing project with the first homes and townhouses sold, Cross Campus renovation and opening, Apollo Landing project at Continental Park complete, Hackman Capital reused project in progress, planning for the first phase of the Raytheon commercial center, Air Products site reuse and Segundo House Hotel underway at the former Stick N Stein site. The City also bested the city of Budapest in the quest to host the inaugural World Urban Games next year. El Segundo will additionally host the second event in 2021.

Former Economic Development Director Barbara Voss earned a promotion to the new deputy city manager position and will serve as the point person to oversee the citywide communication program while also managing the two new websites and collaborating with the City's marketing firm. During 2018, the City's e-news subscribers grew to 6,200. In September, the City held the Champions of Business Celebration at the UCLA Health Training Center (also the site of March's State of the City luncheon) to recognize local business leaders and honor Los Angeles Lakers owner Jeanie Buss. The event showcased El Segundo's growing prominence as a regional presence, as did this month's Convening of the LA County Mayors program at Cross Campus. El Segundo also revived its dormant Sister City program with a visit earlier this month from the Mayor of Guaymas.

After garnering the necessary clearance from Caltrans, El Segundo was finally able to officially rename its portion of Sepulveda Boulevard to Pacific Coast Highway in June - with the hope that the name recognition will solidify regional knowledge of the city's beach proximity and further spur economic development. Of note, the Manhattan Beach City Council voted against a similar move this month that would have allowed the PCH name to run contiguously north to south through the entire South Bay.

In other City department news, David Serrano recently arrived as the new HR director and long-time Community Cable Programming Manager Dan O'Toole announced his retirement effective today.

The first female runner to cross the line was former ESHS standout Amy Reaser, while 11-year-old Ruihan Zhu was the youngest to cross the finish line first in 21:05.
