The Joyful Art of Organizing

During the summer, have you, like me, overlooked the clutter and building up of "stuff" around the house to such an extent that you finally decide that enough is enough? Well, that happened to me this week. One extra book on the stack I have already read, or the little tchotchke that moves about the house to different places, or the pile of folded clothes destined to be donated...had finally gotten to me. It was time for some spring-cleaning and organizing before the end of summer, which officially ends on September 22. Spring-cleaning in summer, you ask? Definitely yes.

First, I began ripping out the old phone line in my office I had tacked around a doorframe to a fax machine I no longer used. Who knows why I had not removed it before, but just that one action made me feel great. Then I moved over to the pile (rather, piles) of books and files. Files need a home in a storage bin, so off I went, seeking additional organization bins.

Because of the suffocating heat and humidity of the week, instead of venturing miles to the container store, I ended up at a big box store and lo and behold found just what I was looking for--plastic bins. An added bonus was that the bins were much less expensive than the ones I intended on buying. Home to tidy!

That afternoon, after piling my files into the containers, I realized the bins weren't quite the size I imagined, so fitting them into the storage container was a little tricky. But it worked. Have you ever seen all those organizing cubes and trays just aching for use at the store? Pondering their use, do you also imagine yourself all organized and neat? Do you, on occasion, get the bug to clean and organize?

After moving some things into the garage, it made my office and guestroom look larger and gave me a sense of accomplishment. Maybe you, like me, usually keep things tidy, but on occasion let things get a bit out of hand, and some major organizing is called for.

Thinking about being organized, I decided that asking some South Bay residents how they feel about being organized would be fun. I mean, am I the only one who yearns for the calm of order while fighting the entropy law? Absolutely not.

Young adult and South Bay resident Jillian Vasquez told me, "I always organize. I organize clothes and I often organize my make-up. I organize my haircare products--I have a drawer for haircare and one for make-up. I get all my organization things from Daiso and I measure them and make little areas so I can adjust them. I feel very clean and accomplished. If I go to bed at night with a dirty room, I don't sleep well." Jillian told me she makes her bed every day and even organizes her clothes by color, using matching hangers.

Then I spoke with teenagers from a local high school about their organizational skills. What I found out was surprising. Fifteen-year-old Kiran Abayaratra told me, "My mom used to do everything for me, but then my sisters--well, I sort of started doing everything she does for myself. So I organize my clothes and have cabinets for everything I wear. For shoes, we have like a box so it's not a mess all the time." Kiran told me he feels it is simply easier keeping things organized and added, "If you can keep yourself in the habit of staying organized, things become a lot easier."

Eric Berg, age 16, told me, "I think of my organization as organized chaos. I leave it where it is and I remember where it was. I just keep everything in one spot. That's where I keep it, so it is bad organization...but it's also good in my own way. I know where my things are. If someone cleans up, I am lost."

Maxwell Johnston, age 15, said, "I try and stay organized most of the time, but I live with a little brother and he's 13. It is kinda difficult because he usually leaves everything around and I have to pick up after him sometimes. We have kinda found this balance finally, and it is nice because now I know where everything

is. It is much easier now." Maxwell told me he tells his younger brother to pick up after himself and it seems to be working. "You have to keep reassuring them as to what to do because they never listen the first time. It is repetition," added Maxwell. Wise words from a 15-year old!

Next I spoke with Elissa Nakano, age 15, who told me, "I like to say I am organized, but I am not really sure--it is relative. I mean, I think in my household I am organized, but that is just because my parents are kind of unorganized."

Mia Hasenmayer, age 15, said, "I feel that I am pretty organized 'cuz for me, I get annoyed and anxious if things are out of place or if my room is a mess. I have to clean it up that second." Sitting next to Mia was her best friend from preschool, Abby Howell, age 15, visiting from San Jose, who attends Leland High School. Abby told me, "I think for me, I like coming home to a really organized room and waking up to an organized house and it is really nice. I think when you get into the habit of being organized, it just makes you feel better and cleaner as a person. It gets you in the habit of being organized not just in your house or room, but in everything else."

After speaking with the young adults and teenagers, I realized they have very good habits. And they were very open with advice on how staying organized leads to an organized life. Although confessing I don't color-coordinate my clothing, or have them all hanging on matching hangers, I do okay. And I try and not let things get out of hand. Most of the teenagers I spoke with had a clear handle on their rooms. All of them knew how to organize their world. Listening to them gave me a sense of pride in our young American teenagers. Not only were they articulate, responsive and forthcoming, but they took time and shared their knowledge of what works for them. I was impressed. Inspired about organizing yet? •

Lawndale, Hawthorne Teachers Receive Unsung Heroes Grants

Voya Financial, Inc, a leading provider of workplace retirement solutions, including savings plans for K-12 educators, announced last week that Gregory Lakey, a teacher at Environmental Charter High School in Lawndale; and Ma Tadena, a teacher at Hawthorne High School, have each received \$2,000 grants as part of the company's 2017 Voya Unsung Heroes awards competition.

Through the program, Voya Financial awards grants to K-12 educators nationwide to honor their innovative teaching methods, creative educational projects, and ability to positively influence their students. Lakey's innovative teaching idea, "Quadratics Through Rocketry," focuses on providing a hands-on approach to understanding abstract concepts, such as quadratic equations, trigonometry and physics. Through designing and building a rocket, and then measuring and analyzing its flight, students are exposed to STEM concepts and learn how to apply them to real life situations. Building rockets from scratch can be very expensive, as there is a tremendous amount of trial and error involved in perfecting the apparatus, so Lakey

hopes the Voya grant will enable him to build upon his rocketry project and establish a rocketry club that gives students the opportunity to compete in national rocketry competitions.

Tadena's innovative teaching idea, "When Geometry Meets Fashion," focuses on connecting "left brain and right brain" skills and applies a Project Based Learning (PBL) strategy in her geometry classes. Students apply the math skills they have developed from Tadena's class to the study of music, art, and fashion design. The Voya grant will allow Tadena to provide materials used for a diverse array of mathematical art projects, including drawing, painting, fashion and accessory design, and more. Tadena believes that by understanding and applying the crossovers between arts and mathematics, students will be able to find color, glamour, and beauty in what is often considered a dull, linear subject.

Selected from a group of more than 1,200 applicants, Lakey and Tadena are two of only 100 winners across the country who will receive this award to help fund and bring their programs to life. In addition, they will now compete with other finalists for one of the top three prizes—an additional \$5,000, \$10,000 or \$25,000 from Voya Financial. — Source: Voya Financial

Metro Line Work to Close Parts of Arbor Vitae This Weekend

Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) announced last week that LA Metro work on the Crenshaw/LAX Project will close a portion of Arbor Vitae Street, affecting access to some businesses northeast of Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), including several car rental offices, the weekend of September 15-17 (the street was also closed last weekend).

Arbor Vitae Street will be closed between Aviation Boulevard and Bellanca Avenue during the work. Metro has established a detour using Aviation Boulevard, Manchester Avenue and Airport Boulevard. Access will be available to businesses on Bellanca Street between Manchester Avenue and Arbor Vitae Street.

LAWA encourages travelers to allow extra

time for potential traffic delays. Passengers should arrive at their terminal two hours ahead of the boarding time for domestic flight and three hours ahead of the boarding time for international flights.

Take Precautions in the Heat - Lifesaving Tips



(BPT) - From tornadoes and floods to hail and lightning storms, the United States experiences a broad array of extreme weather. Fatalities do occur, but many people are surprised to learn that the weather event that causes the greatest number of deaths is heat.

According to the National Weather Service, heat causes the greatest number of weather-related fatalities each year. In fact, an average of 130 people a year lost their lives as a result of heat from 1986-2015. This is a higher number than all other weather events, including hurricanes.

From coast to coast, many regions are experiencing heat waves and extreme temperatures this summer. The toll the heat can take on the body should not be underestimated. It's important to take precautions to ensure safety in the heat when exercising, entertaining or working outdoors or in non-air-conditioned areas like the garage.

Hydration: The top tip for giving your body the power to beat the heat is to stay hydrated. You need water to sweat, which cools the body. When sweat evaporates, it cools the air around the skin so you can maintain a comfortable body temperature. Be certain to avoid sugar or caffeinated drinks, as they are not as effective as plain old H₂O.

Rest: Whether at work or play, be sure to take breaks from the heat. Heat exhaustion can lead to heat stroke, both of which are dangerous conditions caused by too much time in hot temperatures. Frequent breaks from strenuous activity allow the body to rest and cool down.

Shade: High temperatures paired with

the UV rays of the sun can be a dangerous combination. If you must spend time outdoors, try to do so in the shade. Shaded surfaces, for example, may be 20-45 degrees cooler than the peak temperatures of unshaded surfaces, according to the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

Cooling: While air conditioning is not an option for open areas like the patio, deck or garage, consider achieving cooling in these spaces with a portable evaporative cooler. Using the ambient air and the natural process of evaporation, these coolers produce chilled air to create a comfortably cool environment. Portacool portable evaporative coolers offer a variety of sizes to accommodate spaces from 1,000 to 6,000 square feet. They operate with a standard 110-V, are energy-efficient and are equipped with heavy-duty castors for easy mobility.

Clothing: Loose-fitting clothing made from lightweight materials can help keep your body cool during hot temperatures while shielding you from sunburn. This type of clothing can breathe, meaning that air can easily circulate to your body and keep you cool. Be selective when it comes to colors. Choosing light-colored attire is wise because it can reflect heat more efficiently than darker tones.

Peak hours: While it's not always possible, it's wise to avoid being outdoors during peak heat periods of the day. This is typically noon to 5 p.m. So if you must work in your garage or plan to exercise outdoors, start early in the morning. Consider planning family cookouts for later in the evening when the sun lowers and temperatures start to drop. •

Dodgers Look Horrible, But That Really Doesn't Matter

It has become a year of records and streaks for the Los Angeles Dodgers, who have simultaneously looked like the utter and complete best team and now the absolute worst team in Major League Baseball this season. The Boys in Blue, who at one time not long ago looked destined for greatness, began looking black and blue. As of last Sunday, they were still stuck in a losing streak that they simply couldn't seem to halt. Every great baseball team hits a skid. It's simply a matter of how long that skid lasts. For the Dodgers, while it seems as if their current slide was lasting forever, it's better for the team to figure it out now during the stretch run of the regular season than once the playoffs roll around in early October.

It wasn't long ago that everyone around baseball was talking about how the Dodgers hadn't lost a series to an opposing team since the beginning of the month of June. Since that time, someone obviously took it upon themselves to create a voodoo doll with a big Los Angeles logo on the front of it in an effort to bring a team that looked like one of the best ever back down to the mean. Now as of last weekend, the Dodgers hadn't won a series since late August, finding ways to lose games in every way imaginable. They could lose close, like they did last Friday night in a 5-4 loss to the Colorado Rockies. They could

get demolished, like they did in a 13-0 loss to the Arizona Diamondbacks. Or, they could lose two games in one day like they did two weeks ago when they dropped a doubleheader to the San Diego Padres over the Labor Day weekend.

Labor seems to be the key word here, as the Dodgers are struggling on the mound and most notably, at the plate. "It's bad right now," Dodgers ace Clayton Kershaw began to explain. "There's no getting around that. When you compare it to the first half, however many games we played it's pretty stark opposite. If anything, it doesn't make this easier." Nothing is ever easy about losing. Especially when you're Clayton Kershaw and your team had won the previous 16 consecutive games that you had started. Even the great one had been made victim of the slide, however, as the three-time Cy Young Award-winner pitched arguably his worst outing of the year by giving up four earned runs through just 3.2 innings in a 9-1 loss to the Rockies last Thursday night.

From going 53-10 and on pace to capture the most wins in MLB history to losing eight of the team's first nine games in September (and the five games in a row preceding that) is demoralizing, to say the least. Even still, there is no reason to worry just yet. Rival manager of the Rockies, Bud Black, perhaps summed it up the best when speaking of the Dodgers

slide after his team's 5-4 win in Los Angeles last Friday night. "If you look at the landscape of our game and you look at every team – all 30 of them – you see segments of the season like this. It's what happens over the length of six months. It's very difficult to sustain a great deal of success because there's always someone on the other side coming for you."

The majority of the Dodger losses during their skid have not only come at the hands of their rivals from the NL West, but the rivals like the Rockies and the Diamondbacks who are fighting for their playoff lives. To say that those teams simply want it more right now, especially when up against the best team in all of baseball and the one that is in first place in their division, would be an understatement. While that doesn't sound good to say of a Dodgers team that should want every game just as badly as their opponent does, winning 90 games and basically clinching your division before the last week of August goes a long way to afford you some time of relief in a long 162-game season.

What we've seen of the Dodgers lately is manager Dave Roberts being very liberal with his disabled list. Kershaw, Yu Darvish, Corey Seager, Cody Bellinger and more have all been thrown on the DL lately, not because most have serious injuries, but because Roberts would rather have them around, fully healthy

and clicking on all cylinders in October rather than in August and September. Missing key players and offensive pieces of the roster like the ones listed above can certainly do its part to throw a wrench into the concept of outscoring an opponent. What it also does, however, is gives other, lesser involved players, the opportunity to get at-bats in competitive situations in order to gear up and get them ready for a World Series run.

If the Dodgers know one thing about playoff competition, it's how easy it is to get beaten when you're off of your game. Los Angeles has won four consecutive NL West titles, yet has come up short every single year when the games tend to matter the most. Whether you're the 2006 St. Louis Cardinals, the 2000 New York Yankees, or a handful of other great teams from the past, a slump is a necessary part of a great season. Like winning, losing becomes contagious. Once the games begin to matter again for a team that is still miles ahead in its own division, winning will do its part to reappear, turning any memory of a so-called losing streak into nothing but a distant memory. Some might say that winning is always important on a night-in and night-out basis, but most Dodger fans would much rather have the "Ws" pile up once the new and more important season begins in October. – Aserrao6@yahoo.com •

Make Ahead Breakfast Bowls

Ingredients

- 2 lbs Yukon gold potatoes, chopped into 1-inch cubes
- 1 green pepper, seeded then chopped into 1-inch chunks
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1 tablespoon seasoned salt
- 12 eggs (large)
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 3 green onions, chopped
- toppings: tortilla chips, salsa, avocado
- 6 individual-sized containers with lids

Preparation



1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.
2. On a large baking sheet, place potatoes, peppers and onions in a single layer. Drizzle with olive oil and sprinkle with seasoned salt and ground black pepper. Toss until evenly coated.
3. Roast for about 30-40 minutes or until potatoes are golden brown and tender, stirring and rotating pan halfway through cooking.
4. Meanwhile, crack Eggland's Best eggs into a large bowl, then season with salt and pepper and whisk until smooth.
5. Heat a large skillet over medium heat, then spray with nonstick spray and add eggs.
6. Scramble until the eggs are just barely cooked through and still slightly glossy, then scoop onto a plate and set aside.
7. Divide the potatoes and scrambled eggs evenly between the containers, then set aside to cool.
8. Once cool, sprinkle with cheese and green onions, then cover and refrigerate. Freeze any portions that aren't eaten within three days.
9. To reheat from frozen: microwave for 1 1/2 minutes, then stir and continue microwaving until food is reheated, stirring between intervals. Top with optional toppings, then serve. •
