Health Officials: Flu Shot Still Good Idea

Los Angeles County health officials said Friday the influenza outbreak that overwhelmed hospital emergency rooms and contributed to at least 96 deaths so far in January has peaked, and that the annual flu shot isn't to blame.

Officials say the H3N2 influenza virus making the rounds in South Bay communities, schools and workplaces reached a peak much earlier than in previous years. This year's flu shot is reportedly between 10 and 30 percent effective against the powerful strain of influenza. Still, county health officials and local physicians continue to recommend a flu shot for anyone over six months of age.

"The vaccine may not completely prevent the flu. But it does help the body launch an immune response," said Dr. Deborah Lehman, who is an infectious disease specialist and professor at the UCLA School of Medicine.

The Los Angeles County Public Health Department reminds residents that being vaccinated against flu protects a person who receives the vaccine and reduces their risk of contracting influenza and spreading it to others. Receiving the flu vaccine is "the most effective way to protect yourself and others" from getting the flu, according to health officials for the region.

Nearly half of Americans skip annual flu shots that some employers and health plans offer for free, according to U.S. Centers for Disease Control. For people with heart disease, a flu shot can have an additional benefit. Studies have shown that a flu vaccination can prevent heart attacks, according to medical researchers. "When people hear the vaccine isn't that effective, they assume there's no point in getting it -- and that's very frustrating," said Dr. Lehman at UCLA.

Public health officials in the United States and Great Britain have called for greater public-information campaigns to boost flu vaccinations among patients with known heart conditions. The British medical journal Heart reported in October 2016 on the link between the flu and heart attacks. A "wealth of studies

shows that heart attack risk is significantly increased within days of contracting the flu, and risk remains elevated for up to a year," the paper's authors wrote. In fact, their data showed that a flu shot was as effective at preventing a heart attack as quitting smoking or regularly taking cholesterol medicine. An annual flu vaccine can reduce cardiac risk by 19 to 45 percent, they found. In comparison, cholesterol-controlling medication lowers the risk by 25 to 30 percent, the authors wrote.

Even with its limited effectiveness, the current flu shot should ward off the more serious effects of the strong H3N2 virus making the rounds this month, health experts say. Healthy vaccinated children and adults may still experience a fever, cough and several days of discomfort. The current strain of

flu is called the A variety, and the annual flu shot is most effective against the B type, according to health officials. A B-type of flu could make the rounds here in late winter or early spring, they caution.

The flu outbreak is waning, but it's not gone by a long shot, so health officials advise residents and caregivers of children or the elderly to recognize the signs of distress due to the current flu strain, and to take emergency action if necessary. That includes these warnings from the UCLA School of Medicine:

- Elderly and people with compromised immune systems need to pay special attention to flu symptoms.

- Dehydration is a main danger because it can set off a chain reaction that makes it

Bonuses, Bigger Checks Promised to Workers

A message from the taxman can usually be summed up in two words: Pay up. So it's a pleasant surprise when the Internal Revenue Service announces that many taxpayers have more money coming their way soon.

Tax season, which opened on Monday, puts the IRS in a giving mood and this year is no different. When Congress approved a tax code overhaul in late December, the changes included lower tax rates for individuals. The IRS has posted the new tax tables on its website, and expects employers to begin using them in February.

"Many employees will begin to see increases in their paychecks to reflect the new law in February," the IRS said, without giving an estimate about how many U.S. workers' take-home checks will rise.


Congress' new law won't affect current tax returns for 2017, though it did raise the standard deduction for individuals to \$11,000, heads of household to \$18,000, and married couples to \$24,000. For

people with simpler tax situations, the new tables are designed to produce the correct amount of tax withholding. The revisions aim to avoid a common taxpayer mistake: over- or under-withholding of income taxes.

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act passed by Congress last December is predicted to deliver modest tax cuts to middle-income people. The Tax Policy Center in Washington, D.C., estimated an average tax cut of \$1,200 for all households in 2018, which won't be seen until next year's income tax returns are filed. But, the larger paychecks don't have to wait that long.

The time it will take for employees to see the result of tax cuts legislation on their paychecks will vary, according to the IRS. Those hikes in take-home pay depend on the employers and how quickly they calculate federal withholdings using the 2018-revised tables. "Employers should begin using the 2018 withholding tables as soon as possible, but not later than

Brady's Bunch of Rings Back at Big Bowl

The sun sets in the west, the moon rises at night, and Tom Brady is in the Super Bowl. Few things in the world are seemingly as automatic as Brady and the Patriots playing for a championship at the end of a season. Come this Sunday, they'll both be right back where they seemingly belong. You can love him, hate him or even refuse to have an opinion about him, but as Brady readies to play in the eighth Super Bowl of his career, you certainly have to respect the way that he plays the game of football.

Even if you love to root against Brady and the Patriots – which most football fans who don't cheer for the Patriots do – you have to admit that New England being in the Super Bowl at least makes the game a bit more interesting to watch. What can be better than rooting against the guy who will likely go down as the greatest quarterback to ever play the game, not to mention his head coach who thrives on being unlikeable?

The good news, too, is that New England has never dominated its opponents in the biggest game of the season. In his seven championship games so far, Brady is 5-2. Were it not for some miracle plays by Eli Manning and the New York Giants, he could very easily be 7-0. Just as easily, though, Brady could have been

0-7. The total difference in scoring between the Patriots and their opponents in seven Super Bowl games is just 12 points. New England has put up 169 points, while their opponents have combined for 157. That alone should provide enough foreshadowing to tell that this weekend's Super Bowl LII will likely be a close game, no matter what outcome arises.

Philadelphia doesn't figure to be a walk in the park for the Patriots either. Despite losing their MVP-caliber starting quarterback in Carson Wentz, backup Nick Foles has come on as of late and is leading the team in quite a similar fashion. "They've got a great defense," Brady explained of Philly. "As good as we've faced all year. They've been playing well all year and that's why they're in this game – and that's why we're in this game. It's going to be a great game." Brady would likely change his opinion about the game should the Patriots lose, but losing isn't necessarily something that comes easily to New England.

The Eagles defense will be tasked with stopping Brady and his teammates on Sunday. That same group ranked fourth in the league in total defense (306.5 yards per game) and points allowed (18.4) this season. Great defenses have fallen to Brady before, though. Just two weeks

ago, he and head coach Bill Belichick dispatched the Jacksonville Jaguars and their top-ranked defense this season. Even still, it's not the team on the other side of the ball that the Patriots concern themselves with and that in itself could be the reason for the team's prolonged success. "I think they have their strengths, but we have ours," Brady continued on. "It's going to come down to who plays the best and that starts with being who's the most prepared."

No other quarterback in NFL history has ever played in eight Super Bowls. This weekend, at the ripe young age of 40, Brady will become the first ever and maybe the last ever to do so. Perhaps the most important thing that has fueled the quarterback's decade-and-a-half-long run is preparation. The drama and controversy that has been mixed in between has certainly made it easier to root against Brady and the Patriots, but when it comes down to X's and O's, New England naturally has a distinct advantage no matter how old the quarterback or how athletically gifted the team.

Now, as Brady prepares for his third Super Bowl appearance in the last four years, the outcome of the game has almost been painstakingly decided before it has even been played. When Brady's on the field, people expect him to win.

He has been a dominant force in the NFL for 17 years now. In the most important game of the year, even Patriots detractors feel as though the ending is predetermined. The only thing that can seemingly take him down is a remarkable helmet catch or maybe just Eli Manning himself. Fortunately for Brady, Eli's not suiting up in Minnesota this week. No matter what the score of the game or how much time left on the clock, Brady consistently finds a way to win. Just ask the Atlanta Falcons. Twenty-five points wasn't a big enough cushion in the second half of play. Unless they have a miraculous play to draw up in the huddle, Philadelphia certainly has its hands full come game day.

Yes, Tom Brady and the Patriots are going to the Super Bowl again. You've heard it before and quite frankly, it's getting rather disgusting to talk about year in and year out. But just as the Patriots have worn down fans of the NFL, they have also worn down their opponents. The Philadelphia Eagles are next to face off against Belichick and Brady in a championship game. That coach and quarterback are certainly no stranger to big games. That reason alone gives the initial advantage to New England, no matter the eventual outcome of the game on Sunday night.



Looking Up

A Stardust Memory: Meteoritic Stardust Unlocks Timing of Supernova Dust Formation

Dust is everywhere—not just in your attic

or under your bed, but also in outer space. To astronomers, dust can be a nuisance by blocking the light of distant stars, or it can be a tool to study the history of our universe,

galaxy, and solar system.

For example, astronomers have been trying to explain why some recently discovered distant, but young, galaxies contain massive amounts of dust. These observations indicate that Type II supernovae—explosions of stars more than ten times as massive as the Sun—produce copious amounts of dust, but how and when they do so is not well understood.

New work from a team of Carnegie cosmochemists published by Science Advances reports analyses of carbon-rich dust grains extracted from meteorites that show that these grains formed in the outflows from one or more Type II supernovae more than two years after the progenitor stars exploded. This dust was then blown into space to be eventually incorporated into new stellar systems, including in this case, our own.

The researchers—led by postdoctoral researcher Nan Liu, along with Larry Nittler, Conel Alexander, and Jianhua Wang of Carnegie's Department of Terrestrial Magnetism—came to their conclusion not by studying supernovae with telescopes. Rather, they analyzed microscopic silicon carbide, SiC, dust grains that formed in supernovae more than 4.6 billion years ago and were trapped in meteorites as our solar system formed from the ashes of the galaxy's previous generations of stars.

Some meteorites have been known for decades to contain a record of the original building blocks of the solar system, including stardust grains that formed in prior generations of stars.

"Because these presolar grains are literally stardust that can be studied in detail in the laboratory," explained Nittler, "they are

excellent probes of a range of astrophysical processes."

For this study, the team set out to investigate the timing of supernova dust formation by measuring isotopes—versions of elements with the same number of protons but different numbers of neutrons—in rare presolar silicon carbide grains with compositions indicating that they formed in Type II supernovae.

Certain isotopes enable scientists to establish a time frame for cosmic events because they are radioactive. In these instances, the number of neutrons present in the isotope make it unstable. To gain stability, it releases energetic particles in a way that alters the number of protons and neutrons, transmuting it into a different element.

The Carnegie team focused on a rare isotope of titanium, titanium-49, because this isotope is the product of radioactive decay of vanadium-49 which is produced during supernova explosions and transmutes into titanium-49 with a half-life of 330 days. How much titanium-49 gets incorporated into a supernova dust grain thus depends on when the grain forms after the explosion.

Using a state-of-the-art mass spectrometer to measure the titanium isotopes in supernova SiC grains with much better precision than could be accomplished by previous studies, the team found that the grains must have formed at least two years after their massive parent stars exploded.

"This dust-formation process can occur continuously for years, with the dust slowly building up over time, which aligns with astronomer's observations of varying amounts of dust surrounding the sites of stellar explosions," added lead author Liu. •

Haley is a hypocrite of the worst kind and needs to stop spreading the idea that being a celebrity makes you unworthy of a political opinion, especially when that opinion contradicts your personal views.

harder for the body to defend itself.

"If children, the elderly and immunocompromised people don't get enough fluids - or if they can't keep food and drink down - they need more help than a parent or other caregiver can provide," UCLA health professionals caution.

Seek medical attention if a person with the flu has difficulty breathing or their breathing becomes fast. Children who are unusually irritable or sleepy should see a doctor right away, too.

Frequent hand-washing during the cold and flu season can help health people not get sick, experts say. Getting adequate sleep, exercise and eating a balanced diet also are keys to warding off cold and flu germs, they say. These common viruses spread in families, schools and offices through sneezing and contact with surfaces.

The county public health office lists the flu's symptoms as: fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, headaches and fatigue. It adds that pneumonia is the most common complication of the flu, which can worsen asthma or heart disease. This year's H3N2 virus is responsible for at least 36 deaths in the county so far, compared with 13 deaths at this time a year ago, according to the county health department.

L.A. County offers flu clinics to South Bay residents at two locations through Feb. 18. Call the Curtis Tucker Health Center in Inglewood at (310) 419-5325 or Torrance Health Center at (310) 354-2300 for clinic appointments. The public health centers are open weekdays and see patients on a first-come, first-served basis.

During the first two weeks of January, nine percent of all emergency room visits were for flu symptoms and more serious complications, county officials said last Friday. Flu, like the seasons, follow a distinct pattern where these nasty bugs run hot and cold, the county's weekly "Influenza Watch" revealed in its Jan. 19 bulletin. "In a typical flu season, illnesses caused by influenza A viruses predominate early in the season," it said, adding that the B-type viruses come in a second wave later in the flu season, which runs from October to May.

The H3N2 type-A virus peaked earlier than usual, officials say, and is widespread across the contiguous 48 states. It has contributed to 96 deaths -- mostly among older residents in their 80s -- as of Jan. 19, according to the county health department.

The CDC says that colds and flus are easily confused, though both are upper respiratory illnesses. Flus are worse than common colds, with more severe and intense symptoms, federal health officials say. The telltale sign of the flu is a fever, while a cold is more likely to bring on a runny nose or stuffed sinuses, the CDC says. "Colds generally do not result in serious health problems, such as pneumonia, bacterial infections or hospitalizations," it adds. •

Film Review

The Miseducation of Cameron Post Wins Top Honors at Sundance Film Festival

There are so many good things to say about *The Miseducation of Cameron Post*, the second feature film from director Desiree Akhavan and the winner of the U.S. Dramatic Grand Jury Prize, Sundance Film Festival's highest honor. Adapted from Emily Danforth's acclaimed teen novel, *Miseducation* is the coming-of-age story of a young teen sent to a religious camp to "pray the gay away." Led by Chloë Grace Moretz, the entire cast brings life to these characters, mixing heart and humor for moving performances. What's more, one of the most inspiring parts of this production, besides Moretz's female-empowering performance, is the below-the-line hiring -- as Akhavan herself, along with the film's cinematographer, editor, co-writer and music supervisors,

compose an all-female crew. Cameron Post (Moretz) sits in a bible study group, silently observing the environment around her. Having grown up in a Christian household, it has been said since day one that there is a very clear right way and wrong way to live in the eyes of the Lord, which does not bode

well for Cameron being that she likes girls. When she is caught engaging in sexual activity with her secret girlfriend on prom night, Cameron's life is instantly turned upside down as she is immediately sent to God's Promise, a gay conversion therapy school run by Reverend Rick (John Gallagher, Jr.) and Dr. Lydia Marsh (Jennifer Ehle). This "school" claims to cure "SSA," or "Same Sex Attraction" through Christian teaching.

Luckily, like Cameron, not all of the students -- or disciples, as the school calls them -- are on the same page with the school's mission. Cameron quickly finds kinship in rebellious classmates Jane (Sasha Lane) and Adam (Forrest Goodluck), who smoke poorly-grown pot and eye-roll their way through the school's stream of hokey activities -- like worksheets and collage art therapy -- intended to trace back to events in the students' lives which "caused them to be gay." It's evident that no one at God's Promise wants to be at God's Promise, but Cameron and her new friends rely on each other to get through this process as relatively unscathed as possible.

Chloë Grace Moretz is subtle yet astounding in the title role. The authenticity she delivers as a teen struggling with her sexual identity proves she was absolutely the perfect casting choice, and she doesn't shy away from the movie's more demanding scenes of physicality with other women. Her vulnerability in this role makes it easy for audiences to see just how awful this experience is for those who are forced to

partake in it (fortunately, as was reported at the post-screening Q&A, more and more states are beginning to outlaw conversion

therapy in growing numbers). John Gallagher, Jr. as the conflicted Rev. Rick especially shines in his role. "Rick eating cereal" was the movie's scene-stealing moment. Also, Ehle as the domineering school leader gives another brilliant performance.

Since the release of her debut feature, *Appropriate Behavior*, Akhavan has shown that the ambitions of her artistry have grown in the last four years. Back then, it seemed like a plausible assumption that she would continue to work in niche hipster fare and follow in the footsteps of Lena Dunham's style of trendy filmmaking. But with this project, she proves that she has much bigger aspirations as well as skills. Akhavan has created a film that is appealing to everyone and specifically meaningful to the young LGBTQ community. *The Miseducation of Cameron Post* serves as a beacon of light for anyone struggling

with aspects of their lives and proves that being true to yourself is the only way to live. •


The Colossus Rises by Peter Lerangis

Lerangis invites readers to tag along to the far corners of the world on a new adventure filled with excitement, danger and myths.

The main character is Jack McKinley, a 13-year-old boy who just happens to be a descendent of an ancient civilization with a rare genetic condition that will lead to his death in a few months unless he is able to tap into the ancient power of Atlantis. Ingredients

- 10 chicken drumsticks
- 1 large lemon zested and juiced
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 3 whole cloves garlic, chopped

- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- 1 pinch each salt and pepper
- Minced parsley for garnish

Honey Mustard Sauce:

- 3 tablespoons melted butter
- 1/2 cup each honey and mustard
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Preparation

- In a bowl, mix together lemon juice, zest, olive oil, chopped garlic, paprika, oregano, salt and pepper. Add chicken drumsticks and toss to coat evenly. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and place in refrigerator for at least 30 minutes. When ready to cook, let chicken come to room temperature for about 20 minutes.
- Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
- Arrange chicken on oiled foil-lined sheet pan.
- Bake uncovered for 20 minutes. Flip chicken pieces and cook another 10 minutes until chicken reaches 165 degrees and is no longer pink.
- Make sauce in a small bowl by whisking together the mustard and honey.
- Add water as needed for a workable consistency.
- With a small pastry brush, brush sauce over chicken and broil 5 minutes until bubbly.
- Place chicken pieces on a serving platter and sprinkle minced parsley over all.

Feb. 15, 2018," the IRS said.

Whether taxpayers really see any extra money depends on whether they read their pay stubs. A finding by the Electronic Payments Association suggests that any slight change could go unnoticed by the majority of U.S. workers. The association reported that 82 percent of U.S. workers use direct deposit instead of a paper check. If they read their electronic pay stubs, they'll see a difference.

There's an added bonus in the tax rate change for workers. Employees do not have to do anything at this time, though the IRS is revising the standard W-4 withholding form that each employee fills out at time of hire. "The new withholding tables work with the Forms W-4 that workers have already filed with their employers to claim withholding allowances. This will minimize burden on taxpayers and employers," the IRS said.

The tax code changes took effect on Jan. 1, just days after the House and Senate approved the biggest tax reform legislation in

decades. Companies since have announced bonuses for employees because Congress

- Bank of America: \$1,000 bonuses to about 145,000 of its workforce.

- FedEx: \$200 million in raises, about two-thirds of which will go to hourly team members. The delivery service giant also plans to contribute \$1.5 billion to its pension plan.

- Home Depot: Gave one-time cash bonuses of \$1,000 for hourly associates before Jan. 1.

- Honeywell: Increased the 401(k) match for employees in the U.S., Canada and Puerto Rico.

Financial institutions and banks, including Wells Fargo and Washington Federal, raised staff salaries and bumped the company minimum wage to \$15, using the corporate tax savings. Verizon gave employees, excluding its top management, 50 shares of the telecom company's restricted stock. Apple was even more generous, handing out \$2,500 in stock to most of its employees.

Not everyone will enjoy a tax reduction under the new law. While most taxpayers will pay less, some taxpayers will pay a

slightly higher tax rate for 2018, according to Executive Director Kathy Pickering with The Tax Institute. High-earners with a marginal tax rate of 35 percent (up from 33 percent) will be most affected.

Even if you didn't receive a celebratory bonus, the IRS said that 70 percent of taxpayers are expecting refunds this year. The tax season opened Monday and runs Jan. 29 through Tuesday, April 17. The filing period is five days shorter than last year, putting added pressure on tax preparers and self-filers to make the deadline.

The IRS says 90 percent of refunds are issued in under 21 days, but to expect delays with returns that claim the Earned Income or Additional Child Tax Credits. The Earned Income Tax Credit is for working people with low to moderate income. To qualify for this refund, you must file a tax return, even if you do not owe any tax. According to the agency, "The IRS expects the earliest EITC/ACTC related refunds to be available in taxpayer bank accounts or on debit cards starting on Feb. 27, 2018, if they chose direct deposit and there are no other issues with the tax return."

For the second consecutive year, April 15 falls on a weekend -- so the tax return filing deadline falls two days later on a Tuesday. •

Chloe



A trip to their veterinarian and a prescription to rid me of the parasites was first priority. Then a bath and some nutritious food with a lot of TLC thrown in and I'm feeling so much better. Now, I'm working on gaining a few pounds -- my ideal weight

should be about 10 pounds -- and then watch out, world because I'm finding my forever home! I'm super sweet, cute as a button, will be your best friend and... like the bird in Greek mythology, I will rise from the ashes of my old life to the much better life I deserve." Amazingly, I responded so well that I was looking and feeling much better after only one treatment and a medicated bath. I should be all healed and ready for my new home mid-January. It's been a bit of a rough road for this four-year old, female, purebred Miniature Schnauzer, but I know the best is yet to come!
