## Stores Ready for Crowds and Shoplifters

If the UCLA men's basketball coach wanted his team to play good defense and get some steals, three young members of the Bruin squad clearly misunderstood Steve Alford's instructions. In what became an international shoplifting incident, the younger brother of Lakers guard LaVar Ball got caught stealing from a store in China.

The goodwill tour turned into a lesson in Chinese criminal justice for Bruin fans and Americans. The three UCLA freshmen - LiAngelo Ball, Jalen Hill and Cody Riley - escaped possible prison sentences in China, which considers retail theft a disrespectful act by anyone - including tourists - toward that host nation.

Californians don't share the Chinese government's stern view toward stealing from stores, and in 2014 passed a statewide initiative to downgrade shoplifting to a misdemeanor when the value is \$950 or less. The authors of Prop. 47 said the voter-approved change in the state's penal code would lower adult prison populations, and it did.

An unintended consequence has been more shoplifting by individuals and criminal gangs, the retail industry says, though stealing was on the rise before the 2014 passage of the criminal-sentencing initiative. Still, shoplifting by American adults is a crime that's expensive on a national scale and an embarrassment when it's done overseas.

The next time you're in a South Bay store or at one of the malls, think about this statistic. *One in 11 people will steal something from a retailer, and it's not usually premeditated.* Habitual shoplifters steal six times per month, according to the National Association for Shoplifting Prevention.

Retail thieves get busier around the holidays in Manhattan Beach, according to Officer Tim Zins with the police department. Stores that sell alcohol know from experience they'll be targeted between now and New Year's Day. Shoplifters in the city want the good cheer

without paying for it, Zins says.

"Suspects come into the stores with heavy clothing and attempt to hide the alcohol under their clothes and try to walk out of the stores," Zins said. Some shoplifters will walk past the cashier without paying for merchandise, hoping they blend in with the crowds. The less-stealthy thieves will grab a bottle and dash for the front door.

Big and small retailers have come to expect unwanted visits by these modern-day Grinches, and Zins says the stores have security measures in place to detect thieves lurking in the aisles. Surveillance cameras will catch a shoplifter in the act, but there's high-tech isn't the only way the stores are fighting back, according to Zins.

"Many stores have upgraded their video

surveillance systems and some have added more personnel during the holidays to greet people while entering the store. Having this natural surveillance of human interaction with potential criminals usually deters them because they know they are being watched by employees," he revealed.

Thieves don't just prey on the retailers. Manhattan Beach residents report more thefts of all kinds around the holidays, including package thefts and home burglaries. Vehicle burglaries also jump around the holidays, with some thieves smashing car windows to grab merchandise in plain view, according to Zins.

Like the stores, residents should be on the lookout of suspicious characters in their **See Shoplifters, page 4**

## **Busting Myths and Misconceptions About Osteoporosis**



(BPT) - One in two women over the age of 50 will suffer a fracture caused by osteoporosis in her remaining lifetime. Despite its prevalence, there are many myths and misconceptions about this "silent" disease. These myths may be a reason why osteoporosis is underdiagnosed and undertreated.

A fragility fracture (breaking a bone by falling from a standing height or lower) can impact day-to-day life, but it can also be an indicator for osteoporosis in postmenopausal women. When you have osteoporosis, even daily tasks such as taking your dog for a walk can put you at risk for a fragility fracture of the wrist, leg or even hip. But, a startling 82 percent of postmenopausal women did not identify such fractures as a possible risk factor for osteoporosis, according to results from a recent online survey of over 1,000 postmenopausal women conducted by Harris Poll on behalf of Radius Health, in partnership with HealthyWomen and the National Osteoporosis Foundation.

"It is critical that postmenopausal women do not dismiss seemingly insignificant fragility fractures as 'clumsiness,' but instead see them as an important indicator for bone fragility, disease progression and the need for intervention," says Dr. Andrea Singer, MD, FACP, CCD, clinical director and trustee of the National Osteoporosis Foundation.

This is just one myth about osteoporosis. There are many others, including:

Myth: Osteoporosis only affects the elderly. Truth: Osteoporosis often affects women after menopause. Natural menopause can occur as early as age 50. The rate of bone loss after menopause is increased with the accompanying loss of estrogen. Osteoporosis is a progressive disease that lowers the density of bones over time, making them weaker and more likely to fracture.

**Myth:** Osteoporosis isn't very common. **Truth:** Ten million Americans are estimated to have osteoporosis, and more than 8 million

of those are women.

Myth: Osteoporosis isn't that serious.

**Truth:** More women over the age of 55 were hospitalized in the United States for osteoporosis-related fractures than for stroke, heart attack or breast cancer. Yet, according to the survey, postmenopausal women were more likely to be concerned with a diagnosis of stroke, heart attack and breast cancer than osteoporosis.

**Myth:** Health care providers will tell you when it's time to test for osteoporosis.

**Truth:** Research suggests only 2 in 10 older women in the United States who suffer a fracture are tested or treated for osteoporosis. Furthermore, according to the survey, 96 percent of postmenopausal women who have not yet been diagnosed with osteoporosis and who suffered a fragility fracture were not told by their health care provider it could be linked to osteoporosis.

**Myth:** Getting enough calcium and vitamin D is enough to treat osteoporosis.

**Truth:** About 3 in 10 postmenopausal women incorrectly believe that drinking milk or taking calcium supplements alone will prevent osteoporotic fractures/breaks, the survey found. While getting enough calcium and vitamin D is critical to keep bones strong, it may not be enough when it comes to treating osteoporosis in postmenopausal women, especially after a fracture.

**Myth:** There is no way to build new bone after menopause.

**Truth:** About one-quarter of postmenopausal women incorrectly believe there is no way to build new bone at their age, the survey found. The truth is that certain types of treatment for postmenopausal osteoporosis can help build new bone, while others help slow bone loss.

Separating the truths from the myths is an important step in pursuing appropriate care for bone health after menopause. ## **Hydrocarbon Haze Keeps Dwarf Planet Colder than Expected**

New analysis of Pluto's atmosphere explains why New Horizons spacecraft measured temperatures much colder than predicted.

The gas composition of a planet's atmosphere generally determines how much heat gets trapped in the atmosphere. For the dwarf planet Pluto, however, the predicted temperature based on the composition of its atmosphere was much higher than actual measurements taken by NASA's New Horizons spacecraft in 2015.

A new study published November 16 in Nature proposes a novel cooling mechanism controlled by haze particles to account for Pluto's frigid atmosphere.

"It's been a mystery since we first got the temperature data from New Horizons," said first author Xi Zhang, assistant professor of Earth and planetary sciences at UC Santa Cruz. "Pluto is the first planetary body we know of where the atmospheric energy budget is dominated by solid-phase haze particles instead of by gases."

The cooling mechanism involves the absorption of heat by the haze particles, which then emit infrared radiation, cooling the atmosphere by radiating energy into space. The result is an atmospheric temperature of about 70 Kelvin (minus 203 degrees Celsius, or minus 333 degrees Fahrenheit), instead of the predicted 100 Kelvin (minus 173 Celsius, or minus 280 degrees Fahrenheit).

According to Zhang, the excess infrared radiation from haze particles in Pluto's atmosphere should be detectable by the James Webb Space Telescope, allowing confirmation of his team's hypothesis after the telescope's planned launch in 2019.

Extensive layers of atmospheric haze can be seen in images of Pluto taken by New Horizons. The haze results from chemical reactions in the upper atmosphere, where ultraviolet radiation from the Sun ionizes nitrogen and methane, which react to form tiny hydrocarbon particles tens of nanometers in diameter. As these tiny particles sink down through the atmosphere, they stick together to form aggregates that grow larger as they descend, eventually settling onto the surface.

"We believe these hydrocarbon particles are related to the reddish and brownish stuff seen in images of Pluto's surface," Zhang said.

The researchers are interested in studying the effects of haze particles on the atmospheric energy balance of other planetary bodies, such as Neptune's moon Triton and Saturn's moon Titan. Their findings may also be relevant to investigations of exoplanets with hazy atmospheres.

New Horizons passed within 7,800 miles of Pluto, with this closest approach on July 14, 2015. New Horizons had a relative velocity of 30,800 mph at its closest approach, and came as close as 17,900 miles to Charon. Starting 3.2 days before the closest approach, long-range imaging included the mapping of Pluto and Charon to 25 miles resolution. Because of Pluto's tilt, portions of the northern hemisphere were in shadow at all times.

Meanwhile, instruments on board New Horizons studied the atmosphere, both by emissions of atmospheric molecules (airglow), and by dimming of background stars as they pass behind Pluto (occultation). During and after closest approach, other instruments sampled the planet's high atmosphere and its effects on the solar wind. They also searched for dust. A communications dish on Earth measured the disappearance and reappearance of the radio signal as the probe flew by behind Pluto. The results resolved Pluto's diameter (by their timing) and atmospheric density and composition (by their weakening and strengthening pattern). •



## **Trojans Take Home Pac-12 Title**

With quarterback Sam Darnold under center, the USC Trojans won their first conference title since 2008. With a 31-28 victory over the Stanford Cardinal last Friday night in Santa Clara, the Trojans showed just how gritty they can be and how good they have become in such a short amount of time. Unfortunately for USC, its two losses on the year banished the team from College Football Playoff conversation and landed it in this year's Cotton Bowl. Even still, the Trojans not only showed that they have become a force to be reckoned with, but also proved that they have come a long way since their inconsistent play at the beginning of the regular season.

USC fans got everything that they could have possibly asked for out of the game against Stanford last week. Not only was it close and competitive throughout, but it came down to a gritty fourth down stand with seconds ticking off of the clock in the fourth quarter of play that would wind up determining the Trojans' fate. Uchenna Nwosu, the outside linebacker for USC, was the hero of the game this time around, gashing the Cardinal offensive line to fly through and make a game-saving stop on the one-yard line. "Probably the biggest stop of the year," Trojans running back Ronald Jones explained of the play.

USC came away with the slim three-point victory, but not before Jones rushed for 140 yards and two touchdowns while simultaneously moving into the top five on USC's career rushing list. Darnold, the star quarterback who will likely have just one game remaining in the Cardinal and Gold before taking off for the NFL, finished with 325 yards through the air and two touchdowns while also being named MVP of the title game played at





Levi's Stadium in Northern California. "It's special to see how far we've come as a team," Darnold said with a smile on his face after his team had finally secured the win.

With the victory, the Trojans became the first team from the South Division to win the Pac-12 title. It wasn't easy, either. The defense had to put up with the prolific play of both opposing quarterback K.J. Costello and opposing running back Bryce Love. Costello only completed five passes in the first half of play, but came on strong in the third and fourth quarters to finish with a total of 192 yards through the air and two touchdowns. Love, on the other hand, had carried Stanford all year long and attempted to do so again in this game with a total of 125 yards and a touchdown on the ground.

Despite the good play of Stanford, the game still ended in USC's favor. Even with the win for USC, the team still found itself on the outside looking in on this year's fourteam College Football Playoff. "Obviously, the reality is we'll need some help," USC coach Clay Helton said following his team's

victory, before the playoff standings were announced. "But we deserve to be in the discussion, especially the way we finished the season. [We're] hot right now."

If only the season were two games longer, the Trojans may have had a better chance to prove themselves and their 11-2 overall record. Unfortunately for USC, those two losses were enough to keep the team behind the likes of Clemson, Oklahoma, Georgia and Alabama in the end-of-year standings. "We're sitting here as champion," Helton continued. "That's important. We sit here with 11 wins. We sit here with an unbelievable strength of schedule. We had the opportunity to show on national TV who we are."

Although they did not finish in the final four, it can still be said that the Trojans had an excellent season and perhaps even overachieved in a year when they weren't expected to do much at all. With the amount of injuries suffered on the team and the amount of youth on the offensive side of the ball, the achievements of USC this season can certainly be considered impressive, to

say the least. As it turns out, a 30-27 loss at Washington State in September could turn out to be the only thing that kept the Trojans out of the playoff. That slim, three-point loss, which could have realistically gone either way once all was said and done, may just turn out to be the one game that comes back to haunt USC and all of its fans once this year's season officially comes to an end.

Despite the Trojans' impressive win over Stanford, there simply wasn't a possible combination of championship game results last Saturday that could have vaulted the team into the College Football Playoff conversation. Even still, the team's first conference title since 2008 should be celebrated--and a matchup against Ohio State in this year's Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic is certainly not something to be taken for granted. That game will take place on December 29 in Arlington, Texas and could provide the Trojans with the perfect pedestal to finish the season off strong with a statement win against an extremely elite opponent from the Big Ten.

## **Insurance Changes Bringing Needed Relief to Medical Practices**

A new law will make it possible for small companies to afford workplace accident insurance next year by loosening the rules on privately-owned businesses, says the South Bay lawmaker who sponsored the bill.

Senator Steven Bradford, D-Gardena, said that more owners and board members of California corporations can opt out their company workers' comp policies under his bill. Part-owners and directors will be allowed to waive coverage as long as they have other health insurance to cover them in case of accident or illness.

The Legislature's efforts to reduce cheating by employers have made it harder on small business owners, according to Bradford who represents the 35th District. The California Department of Insurance says that workers' comp premium fraud occurs when a company underreports the true number of employees on its payroll.

The new law doesn't take effect until July 1, giving small businesses time to decide who'll claim the exemption. The California Medical Association predicted that owners of medical practices will sign up immediately for the waivers.

"All owners of medical corporations will be able to exempt themselves from workers' compensation coverage, regardless of percentage ownership, as long as they submit a waiver and have health insurance coverage," the association said when the bill was signed on October 30.

Currently, a relative or investor in a corporation can decline insurance coverage if they own at least 15 percent of the business. That same applies to a member of a board of directors. Bradford's bill relaxes the requirement so that owners with a lower 10 percent stake also may opt out as a cost-saving measure.

The 15-percent rule was "arbitrary" and left many owners of medical corporations to pay higher insurance bills for coverage they didn't need, according to the state's medical association that sponsored Bradford's bill.

CMA noted that the rule had good intentions. It was aimed at stopping employers from handing out phony job titles or small fractions of a business to avoid coverage requirements under the work comp system. The 15 percent rule wound up costing medical corporations with 10 owners an additional \$11,000 to \$18,000 per year, the

"Suspects know we shop during the holidays and usually have more valuables in our homes at this time. We encourage our community to always lock their doors and windows, use their alarm systems, have a working camera system and most importantly if you see something, say something," Zins advises

Shoplifters describe getting a rush or a "high' feeling every time they pilfer from a store and leave without paying for merchandise, the National Association for the Prevention of Shoplifting says on its web site. "Many shoplifters will tell you that this high is their true reward, rather than the merchandise itself" the group says.

The great majority of retail thieves aren't

professionals or shoplifting crews that have begun to plague the area, according to experts. In fact, 97 percent of shoplifters steal because of social pressure or for personal reasons. The other 3 percent are professional criminals who sell stolen merchandise or trade it.

Interestingly, non-professional thieves don't commit other types of crimes other than stealing, the NASP says. They're typically non-violent and sometimes they even make a purchase in the store where they're shoplifting, theft-prevention experts report.

The next time you're in a department store, look around for the nearest 10 people because one of them is stealing. That is based on industry estimates that one in 11 people who frequent stores and malls shoplift. Employee theft is a problem for stores, too, which is

why stores are spending more on video surveillance and other technology to lower the dollar-value of pilfered merchandise.

Organized retail criminal gangs, known as ORCs, are harder to stop and more dangerous for store security-team members, according to the National Retail Federation. Criminal enterprises in Los Angeles County recently have begun targeting cell-phone stores, where members grab as much as \$60,000 in new phones before leaving.

"These are not ordinary thieves, opportunists or people making bad choices," Jerry Biggs, Walgreens' ORC division director, says. "We're talking about criminals engaged in human trafficking, drugs and terrorism. They're committing retail crime to fund another illicit activity."

The national retail organization estimates that organized retail crime is a \$30 billion nationwide activity. Gangs target specific products, such as baby formula, cosmetics, over-the-counter drugs, DVDs, and expensive items. The Los Angeles Police Department formed a special unit in 2007 in response to these retail-theft networks.

These criminal networks send in "boosters" who use a variety of tricks to conceal stolen items, including belts worn under clothing or shopping bags with hidden compartments.

Usually, a getaway driver is parked nearby often in a car with paper license plates, according to law enforcement.

Thirty-four states have come down hard in recent years on ORCs, adding offenses to their penal codes for members of these retail-theft crews. California is the only West Coast state not to have an ORC statute.

Prop. 47 required that non-violent crimes that were felonies before 2015 require misdemeanor sentencing, including shoplifting and grand theft where the value of the stolen goods didn't exceed \$950. The same dollar threshold applies to receiving stolen property, forgery, fraud and passing a bad check.

Experts and psychologists who've studied the behavior by shoplifters report that most adults who steal started as teenagers. Because shoplifters are hard to spot, stores train their employees to greet customers and ask if they need any help. A friendly offer of assistance is a deterrent to shoplifters, according to loss-prevention experts.

U.S. retailers lose \$13 billion each year to theft, which includes employee theft. In California, the number of shoplifting arrests has increased five of the last six years, according to the state attorney general's office.


#### The Conjuring of Andy Kaufman: Or Jim Carrey's Psychic Slip

Jim Carrey has played a lot of out-of-thisworld characters in his lifetime, but devoted audiences are likely unaware of the one role that Carrey committed so deeply to playing that he remained in character for the entirety of the film's shoot (even when the cameras stopped rolling). Such a thing would be nearly impossible to imagine. Right?

Audiences will now be able to witness this

long-form interview with present-day Carrey. Wearing a leather jacket and Burning Man beard, he recounts this chapter of his past with enough distance to provide worthy insight. The juxtaposition of seeing the Carrey of now recount the antics of the Carrey of then proves an interesting mind shift. The new Carrey is seemingly content with his place in the universe and attempts to rationalize the weight of human depression and ego. This makes for a profound meditation on

feat in the new documentary, Jim & Andy: The Great Beyond – Featuring a Very Special, Contractually Obligated Mention of Tony Clifton. Jim & Andy captures the period of time after the newly minted A-list movie star wrapped three iconic films that would define his career: Ace Ventura: Pet Detective, The Mask, and Dumb and Dumber. He then followed those hits by transforming into Andy Kaufman in the 1999 biopic, Man on The Moon.

The film reveals that Carrey simply let Andy "take over" to make Man on the Moon and that he was merely "the vessel" channeling the spirit of Kaufman. It's amazing to see the accompanying footage of Carrey uncut, as he upends the production at every turn as the antic-prone Kaufman, torturing the crew to our gleeful delight. It's more than a treat to see every shade of Kaufman that Carrey conjures up: there's bashful and anxious Andy, there's tantrum-throwing Andy who bemoans studio executives--and of course, his most taxing persona, the repugnant lounge act and drunkard Tony Clifton, who stirs the most agitation of all much to the audience's delight and Kaufman's giddy.

Accompanying the on-set footage is a

celebrity and ego perception--a fitting study for this Internet age.


Perhaps just as amazing is the accompanying behind-the-scenes footage and that so much of it exists. We learn that Universal (the film's studio company) commissioned the footage for press kit use, but ended up shelving it after deeming that people seeing Carrey wreak havoc on set would make him look like a jerk. Ultimately the footage was found in Carrey's private Los Angeles office by filmmaker Spike Jonze (a producer on the film), who recognized that there was a movie to be made in this mad peek behind the curtain.

Much like the actor, the role the actor played and the means the actor took to play the role, Jim & Andy: The Great Beyond is either an indulgent, self-satisfying work, or it gets exactly at the heart of how we construct our identities and who we believe we are. Ultimately, Jim & Andy is part satiating behindthe-scenes movie, part psychological study of the ego, and an endlessly fascinating watch.

The power of nostalgia may be what first draws vou to The Impossible Fortress, but the affection for such beautifully-written personalities and well-crafted story will keep you turning the pages.








Madeline
