Doug Herbst, whose family is part of Hawthorne lore, spent a great deal of time getting this luncheon in order and putting this event together. President of the Hawthorne Chamber of Commerce, Pat Donaldson, led everyone in a rousing rendition of *God Bless America*. Lisa Wellick, President of the Rotary Club (Hawthorne/LAX/Lennox), asked that we place our right hand over our heart, after which we recited the Pledge of Allegiance. Pastor Greg Guich of the Centinela Bible Church provided an invocation that set forth recognition and thankfulness for so much that is good.

The Hawthorne Memorial Center provided

a great room. And parked just outside was a very cool, vintage California Highway Patrol vehicle. I think from the year 1958. Broderick Crawford could have driven up in that car (if you know the tv show from way back when) as *Highway Patrol*, and Broderick might have said, "Ten-four. Ten-four... Two heroes in the house!"

This special luncheon was co-sponsored by the LAX-Lennox Rotary and the Hawthorne Kiwanis Clubs, but the list of generous sponsors is impressive and lengthy. This a sign of how much the community embraces this vital moment.

All the hustle and bustle, all the goings-on out there.

This luncheon stopped the merry-go-round for so many of us. We collectively said (though not out loud): "Just hold on for a little bit. We want to make absolutely sure these two officers get their props. Everything else will just have to wait. Everything else should wait. These two individuals put themselves on the line. You never know, with the kind of work they do, just what the day may bring or the night. So, we want to; we must seize their hands and squeeze them. We must say thank you and make sure they know it."

Nicholas Medina is a Los Angeles County Firefighter and Paramedic. He has served the Hawthorne community for seven years. Nicholas has done work overseas dealing with earthquake devastation.

He also recently deployed to Mammoth Lakes to help with the impact of the severe winter storms. He has a wonderful, superbly trained K-9 assistant named Mattis. Oh, and so you also know, he graduated from California State University (Northridge) with a double major in Music and Chicano studies. The word "remarkable" fits well.

John Broc started as a parking enforcement officer with the Hawthorne Police Department in 2018. He qualified to enter the Golden West Police Academy within his first year at the Department. The fact is, John is a

Film Review

Asteroid City is Wes Anderson's Most Spiritual Film to Date

Wes Anderson's latest film, *Asteroid City*, may be missing the auteur's most repeatedly cast actor—Bill Murray—but his absence doesn't leave too big a dent in this otherwise riotous affair. Jason Schwartzman—and to some degree, Bryan Cranston—anchor this meta-tale of a science field trip gone wrong and the controlled chaos that occurs after a small town's unexpected meet-and-greet takes place with an extraterrestrial.

Wes's quintessential quirks and styling shine in this dry desert landscape. Combined with the film's use of a once-again perfectly-curated soundtrack, *Asteroid City* is one of Anderson's more commercially accessible feature films.


were about to collectively witness would change their lives forever.

Of course, this being a Wes Anderson film, there is more to the story than this surface-level synopsis. The unexpected narrative choices and plot delivery throughout the film allow the audience to go inward and explore the themes that resonate with them personally. Watching the movie and mining for themes myself—both subtle and loud & clear—it is obvious to me how Anderson intentionally creates scenes with characters that have juxtaposing outlooks on love and loneliness, grief and hope, and life and death.

It should come as no surprise to hear that the acting is superb. As mentioned earlier, Bill Murray is missing from the typical all-star lineup, but like a classic SNL skit, nearly all returning cast members are represented (even if it's just for a cameo). That includes Edward Norton, Jeffrey Wright, Tilda Swinton, Adrien Brody, and Tony Revolori. While not meaty enough for any one person to be a frontrunner in the awards conversation, as an ensemble, the synergy fits like a glove.

The deadpan dialogue between the characters is delightfully funny but the real humor comes from what isn't said. A subtle look, a lack of acknowledgment, a simple sign indicating that road construction has stopped indefinitely. In addition to expectedly brilliant soundtrack curation by music supervisor Randall Poster, Alexandre Desplat's score, and costumes by Milena Canonero, special attention should be paid to the puppeteers, specifically Andy Gent (please stay through the credits to see why he deserved a shoutout).

The most spiritual in his film canon to date, Wes Anderson pokes the philosophical **See Film Review, page 7**

Asteroid City is a nostalgic take on America's nuclear-era obsession with aliens. Set in 1955, the town of Asteroid City (population: 87) is set to hold a convention for families to congregate and celebrate their children being named Junior Stargazers. Augie Steenbeck (Schwartzman) arrives with his son Woodrow (Jake Ryan) and three daughters and quickly meets the other families attending the literal star-studded affair.

Midge Campbell (Scarlett Johansson), her daughter Dinah (Grace Edwards), and three other Space Cadet award winners and their families are also amongst the group. Their cumulative IQ is highly concentrated in this remote city, but despite being some of the smartest people in the American Southwest, no one could have guessed that what they

Hawthorne Community Members Lace Up Free Skates at Skates in the Park Event

The event took place at Memorial Park and was co-hosted by the Hawthorne Police Department, who distributed free popcorn and donated

\$2,000 to purchase helmets for participants.

Once attendees received their free pair of skates, they were able to test out their new wheels on an outdoor skating rink set up by the City’s Parks Maintenance department. The City’s Public Works department also pitched in, providing additional lighting and porta-potties for the event.

“It was amazing to see community members

skating alongside their loved ones, enjoying music together and making new friends at Skate in the Park,” said City Manager Vontray Norris. “Putting on this event was truly a community effort—thank you to our Hawthorne Community Services staff, the Hawthorne Police Department, Impala Skates and everyone else that made this awesome night possible.”

Skates in the Park was attended by well

over 350 community members, and the City of Hawthorne gave out nearly 400 pairs of skates. And, if people were still hungry after snacking on the free popcorn, the park also hosted two food trucks where the community could grab dinner. 

Protect Yourself or a Loved One From Romance Scams

(BPT) - Online dating and social media have made it easier than ever before to find your special someone. However, scammers are always ready to take advantage of well-meaning singles looking for love. Using the anonymity of the web, these con artists create compelling stories and fake identities to trick you into falling in love with someone who doesn't exist.

When dating online, watch out for the following red flags:

- Their name and the name in their email address don't match.
- Their messages to you have obvious spelling and grammar errors.
- Their online profile suddenly disappears from the dating site.
- They pledge their love way too quickly.
- They ask you to send or receive money and/or packages.
- They need money right away due to a medical or family emergency.
- They need a visa or plane tickets.
- They claim a business opportunity arose and ask you to wire a loan.

If you spot any of these red flags, cease contact immediately, as difficult as it may

be. Block any attempts to resume contact via email, text or phone.

Keep all personal and financial information private and protected until you are certain your online romantic interest can be trusted. Don't lend money, credit card information or personal possessions to any stranger you meet on the internet. Do more research before moving forward with any financial decision. Be alert if the person romancing you creates a sense of urgency to send them money.

If your bank or credit accounts are used, contact the bank, credit provider and the Social Security Administration. Get a free copy of your credit report and look for accounts you don't recognize. Put a credit alert or freeze on your accounts.

Look for inconsistencies in their profile and the information they share. Do a quick internet search for your would-be lover's name and the town where they claim to live. For photos, you can use an image search to verify their profile photos aren't stolen from someone else's account.

Because people who conduct online impostor scams frequently spin the same lines or tell

Go Green and Save with new Inflation Reduction Act

(BPT) - In August 2022, the U.S. government passed the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), a comprehensive energy policy bill that provides a record \$370 billion for climate and energy initiatives. The act, focused on clean energy and climate change, has wide-reaching implications for individuals and families.

Specifically for homeowners, the IRA comes with incentives to upgrade and install environmentally friendly equipment and appliances throughout their home. By taking advantage of the tax credit, homeowners can reduce their tax bill by up to \$3,200 and offset some of the upfront costs of making energy-efficient home improvements.

• Tax Credits - The IRA extended and enhanced a tax credit, the Energy-Efficient Home Improvement Credit (EEHIC). Previously this type of credit was the Non-Business Energy Property Credit, which was restructured and expanded as part of the new law.

Federal tax credits can be leveraged for the next 10 years, until December 31, 2032, and apply to the purchase and installation of highly efficient products, including HVAC equipment.

Homeowners can earn up to \$2,000, or 30% of the cost of the product and installation, for heat pumps; \$600 for highly efficient furnaces; and \$600 for qualifying air conditioners. There is a yearly cap on the tax credits of up to \$3,200, and the credit cap resets every year. So, a homeowner can replace one system, such as a heat pump, one year and other equipment the next.

• Rebate Program - The High-Efficiency Electric Home Rebate Act (HEEHRA) Program provides point-of-sale consumer discounts to enable low- and moderate-income households across America to electrify their homes. The program covers up to 100% of electrification project costs (up to \$14,000) for low-income households and 50% of costs (up to \$7,000) for moderate-income households. Eligible homeowners can receive:

- Up to \$8,000 for all-electric heat pumps
- Up to \$4,000 for an electrical load service center upgrade
- Up to \$2,500 for electric wiring
- Up to \$14,000 maximum for all eligible measures

the same backstory, an internet search can be especially helpful. If an online love interest makes declarations of undying devotion and sends love poems, search for these lines online and see where they've been used before.

A true, legitimate love interest will understand if you ask for proof that they're real and not misrepresenting themselves. One way you can protect yourself is to request a customized photo. Ask them to hold today's newspaper or a book you have both read.

If they can't or won't provide proof, or if your previous search results indicate something suspicious, it's time to voice your suspicions and lay the evidence on the table. When confronted

with your evidence, they may admit they are a scammer but claim they've “fallen in love for real.” While you may be tempted to believe them, this is just another heavily recycled tactic.

They may push the relationship to develop very quickly and use canned expressions and phrases. For example, they may call you pet names like “my love” or “my darling” early on. Or, they may say, “My child is already calling you ‘mom’ or ‘dad.’”
