South Bay's Natalie Strong Attempts to "Create Gold out of Every Day."

Communicate with El Segundo resident Natalie Strong, who serves as the cities Arts and Cultural Advisory Council vice-chairperson, and her return email features the motivating tagline "create gold out of every day."

So, what does that mean? Strong is a child of the evil empire a tad bit south, Manhattan Beach (just kidding, Plank spent his formative years in MB, which at one-time was a quaint little beach town), an attendee of the Chadwick School up in the Peninsula, and a USC collegiate grad who spent some schooling time in Kent, England, a year she said was "amazing."

Instead of encapsulating her living life to the fullest philosophies, let us let Strong have center stage. In her own words, we will let Strong tell you about her motivating philosophies. "Attempting to create gold out of every day" is my artistic philosophy," she said. "The Alchemists (her email handle starts with alchemist) were trying to make gold out of lead, and though they never succeeded, they never stopped believing that it could be done. Pens and Paints and Paper are my lead, and whether or not I make gold out of them, I will never stop trying. I will never stop believing that it is possible." If you want to view some of her artistic renderings, you can access them through her Instagram account.

Continued Strong: "My hashtag #letthemfindmeworking is another idea that I live by. When inspiration hits, when the Muses visit, if I am working, then I am open to receive that inspiration. Maybe what I am working on today is nothing special, but you never know. If the Muses visit, let them find me working."

On settling in El Segundo, Strong said that "the thing I like best about (El Segundo) is the scale. It is a place that is built and operates on an individual human scale. One person can make a difference; leave a mark. It is possible to feel at least like you know everyone. I can walk anywhere that I might need to go. It is possible to be familiar with all of it. It's a knowable place."

Someone who has met and associated with Strong in our "knowable place" is Josette Murphy. Murphy is the owner of About Space Interiors in town, and she has collaborated with Strong multiple times to showcase Natalie's artistic renderings during the always popular Art Walk, which, if the chips fall in the right direction, will resume this year in late August.

Murphy has known Strong for eight or so years, with their friendship starting when the mom's shepherded their kids to-and-from school. Murphy said that their paths have crossed in many ways. "We are both artists, in different media," Murphy said, noting that her artistic design specialties include fabric and tile and paint and appliances and lumber, while Strong specializes in "fiber arts," but she also "paints and draws, and does all sorts of other things."

Murphy said that their shared interest in artistic projects had led her to commission Strong to design not only "a beautiful custom quilt for my own house," but also pieces for Murphy's clients, including embroidered and painted items. Murphy has also hosted Strong's work during prior Art Walks.

"We are kindred spirits," Murphy said. "Natalie cares so much," noting her work for the El Segundo library and the arts and

cultural committee. "She does it with her whole heart, with a passion for promoting art in all of its forms. She is definitely a voice of art in town."

As previously noted, Strong was a Manhattan Beach gal who attended Chadwick, moved for an awhile to Hermosa Beach, and settled in El Segundo with husband Richard. He just happened to be recently profiled in the Herald. Why land in El Segundo?

Strong cited the strength of the El Segundo Unified School District, as well as El Segundo being touted as a good place to raise her children. And is a city located close to her day job, which she has plied for nearly two decades, as she runs her father's dental office in Manhattan Beach. Strong said that her proximity to her workplace, as well as her proximity to her boss (her dad), has allowed her to work a schedule that not only has provided the opportunity to attend her children's events,

Losing excess weight, even in small amounts, can help reduce joint pain, avoid joint surgery and become more active.5

Speak to Your Physician About Medicines for Pain Management

In addition to lifestyle adjustments, a range of medicines are available to help relieve arthritis symptoms. Nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), such as ibuprofen and naproxen, are frequently used to ease inflammation and pain caused by arthritis.6

"While it is important to have balanced pain management with arthritis, it is crucial

to speak to your physician often and openly about your daily lifestyle. That way, your physician can help personalize your treatment which may include NSAIDs or other types of pain management techniques," said Hasan Abed, MD, Anesthesiologist and Pain Management Specialist, Advanced Pain Management located in Timonium, Maryland.

If you take NSAIDs, it is important to talk to your healthcare professional because as many as one in four regular NSAID users are at risk to develop stomach ulcers - sores on the lining of the stomach caused by stomach acid.7 In addition to taking high doses of NSAIDs, other risk factors include taking NSAIDs with aspirin, or while taking corticosteroids or blood thinners, having had a stomach ulcer in the past and being older than 65 years of age. If you have more than two of these risk factors, you are considered at high risk for stomach ulcers.

Gastroprotection with Nsaids Can Help Lower the Risk of Stomach Ulcers

Over-the-counter and prescription NSAIDs come in many different forms. They are available topically, as a lotion or gel and can be taken by mouth.6 Some NSAIDs include a gastroprotective medicine to help reduce the risk of getting a stomach ulcer.8

Because every case of arthritis is different, it is important to talk to your physician about pain management and the potential risk of stomach ulcers if you take NSAIDs," said Dr. Abed. "If appropriate, your doctor may

suggest you take a medicine that can lower the risk of getting a stomach ulcer when taking an NSAID."

but also given her the chance to pursue her passions on the artistic side. The City of Inglewood provides water services to approximately 85,000 customers through 15,700 service connections within its service area of 7.2 square miles. The remaining customers are serviced by the Golden State Water Company or Cal America Water Company. The City service area is divided into three pressure zones for elevation differences that vary from 60 to 247 feet above sea level.

The City's water production system consists of four active wells and the Water Treatment Plant. The City provides approximately 8,982 acre-feet of potable water to its customers every year. Of the 8,982 acre-feet of potable water served, 3,400 acre-feet are produced by City wells, and 5.582 acre-feet are purchased from the Metropolitan Water District via West Basin Municipal Water District (WBMWD). In addition, from WBMWD, City provides 686 acre-feet of recycled water to a few particular customers: Inglewood Cemetery and Hollywood Park, and City facilities.
The State of California Urban Water Manage-

ment Planning Act of 1983 (Act) requires urban water suppliers servicing 3,000 or more connections or supplying more than 3,000 acre-feet of water annually to submit a Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP).
