South Bay Local Rescues Squirrels

In every park across the city of El Segundo, residents can enjoy sunny picnics, social gatherings, and the occasional greeting from our bushy-tailed neighbors. Squirrels run wild throughout the city, along with raccoons, opossums, skunks, and more. One resident has taken it upon herself to look out for the rodents' wellbeing.

Ashley Liberty, whose time in El Segundo began in 2008, has come to be the city's most prominent squirrel rescuer.

Every so often, a squirrel may misstep and fall out of a tree, or be attacked by crows, or have the misfortune of being in the road at the wrong time. When this happens, Liberty is first in line to help out.

"I have a lot of pets, and people know, I really, really like animals," she says. So when a friend's cat brought home a baby squirrel in 2018, Liberty got the call. She picked up the baby squirrel in a cardboard box, wrapped in a towel, too young to even open its eyes. Never having raised a squirrel before, she set to work to make sure her next moves were as best for the animal as they could be.

Without time to drive to Van Nuys, where the next nearest squirrel rescuer is located, or Long Beach, where injured squirrels go for rehabilitation, she took to online communities and forums for information from states where squirrel ownership is legal and common. She decided she would raise the baby herself for eventual release back into the wild.

"It's illegal to have squirrels as pets in California," she explains, going on to say local police know of her rescues and have agreed to let her continue because she does release them when they're ready.

Thinking the squirrel was a boy, her two kids named her Oscar. As she got older, they kept the name, and she became Oscar the Girl Squirrel. From March to July of that year, Liberty raised her from being too small to walk until she was ready to be free.

Raising a squirrel is no easy task. Liberty describes weeks of constant care, including night feedings, like a newborn. With Oscar, she immediately went to her nearest pet store and got the appropriate formula, along with baby syringes.

As Oscar began to gain her strength, Liberty began to see her open her eyes and start to walk. At this point, she was transferred to a wire cage with hanging bird toys, branches from outside, and wooden bridges to start learning to climb and jump. She moved on from formula to fruits, veggies, nuts, and even some flowers. Sometimes, Liberty would give her free rein of the house, putting a tiny harness with a bell attached on her to keep track of her whereabouts.

Finally, when it came time for release, Liberty placed her cage outside and began the process of detaching herself and introducing Oscar to the outside world. Over the course of about a week, Oscar was gradually separated from all human contact and allowed to leave the cage at her own pace.

For a while, Oscar came back to visit, occasionally appearing at the Libertys' back door to say hello or ask for a peanut. Since Oscar, Liberty has had seven squirrels pass through her care, either to be released or sent for professional rehabilitation in the case of

With the help of her two kids, Cohen (8) and Harper (11), as well as her husband, she

ensures that squirrels have the best chance at life after release. For this reason, she does not mark any of the squirrels for any reason, citing that squirrels can be very territorial and will attack squirrels who may appear or smell different. In addition to no marks or scents, the family goes through a period of little contact with the squirrels before release to discourage them from being too comfortable with humans.

As far as prepping the animals for wild behavior, Liberty says that comes naturally. As her squirrels have grown, they've naturally begun to climb, jump, and hide snacks. In the case of Oscar, they found peanuts and food stashed away all over the house in the weeks before her release, something she instinctively started to do. In a later visit, Liberty was able to see that Oscar had even had babies.

So, what should you do if you find a baby or injured squirrel? If it's a baby, and it's

Film Review

Mayday Review: A Sisterhood of Breathe Like a Bear by Kira Willey, Soldiers Run The World

Sisterhood reigns supreme in writer/director Karen Cinorre's action film, Mayday. Take a trip to this women-dominated fantasyland, and you'll find that pent-up rage from years of gender-based injustice is personified as WW2-era ladies as cold-blooded killers. Best described as a "feminist war film," Mayday's callousness stops just short of being a full out "anti-men" to be a thought-provoking, femaleempowering fantasy film. In theaters and VOD on Friday, October 1st.

For Ana (Grace Van Patten), a caterer at a small venue in town, an approaching storm that may ruffle a few feathers, but much like its characters, Mayday isn't interested in playing it safe. Director Karen Cinorre's bold vision is brought to life in beautiful fashion by cinematographer Sam Levy who, after working on films like Lady Bird and Frances Ha, knows a thing or two about creating a cinematic environment for strong women to thrive. Adding to the film's edginess is experimental composer Colin Stetson (Hereditary), who opens the floodgates of chaos with his chilling polyphonic sax.

In Mayday, Cinorre makes a strong statement on the roles that men and women play

acts as a daunting premonition of changes to come. Although she's (unfortunately) used to being taken advantage of by her sleazy male superiors, it's clear that she still values the friendships with the rest of her co-workers, men and women alike. On this particular stormy day, however, Ana's natural submissiveness is about to come face to face with a domineering feminist future, in which supernatural events occur that transport Ana into an alternate reality where women are in charge.

It's no coincidence that Ana is wearing a blue dress and white apron combo (much like Alice falling into Wonderland), awakening on an unfamiliar coastline. Dazed and confused, she is taken in by Marsha (Mia Goth), who acts as the white rabbit to Ana's Alice. Her memory wiped clean, Marsha provides context as to where she is: it seems that Ana's fallen into a fever dream where the patriarchy doesn't exist. Marsha introduces Ana to two more women, Gert (Soko) and Bea (Havana Rose Liu), a band of women and sorority of soldiers whose mission is to lure and kill every man who views them as a damsel in distress... AKA, all men.

It doesn't matter if you're a "good" guy or a "bad" guy in Mayday-so long as you're a guy, you're a target. It's a divisive premise in society, which is further strengthened by its excellent cast. Grace Van Patten and Mia Goth give hard-hitting performances, with both an emotional and physical range on full display. And can we just say, that any film that Juliette Lewis is in, is already that much better. Mayday might not be for everyone (even I cringed at some of the one-liners that came off as a little "emo"), but the bigger question is well worth asking: Would the world be better with women in charge? •




Check It Out

ORDINANCE NO. 2224 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWTHORNE, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING ENGINEERING & TRAFFIC SURVEYS PREPARED BY HARTZOG & CRABILL, INC. FOR THE CITY OF HAWTHORNE AND AMENDING CHAPTER 10.16 OF THE HAWTHORNE MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO PRIMA

FACIE SPEED LIMITS ON VARIOUS STREETS WITHIN THE CITY. WHEREAS, the City of Hawthome retained Hartzog and Crabill, Inc. to prepare an engineering and traffic survey (the "report") to update the speed limits on City of Hawthome arterial and secondary arterial street network. (The report is attached as Exhibit "A" to this Ordinance). The overall study was conducted to comply with existing State regulations concerning the ncreasing or decreasing of speed limits within City boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the California Vehicle Code ("VC") requires that speed limits be established in accordance with appropriate engineering practice and methods; and

WHEREAS, to legally use radar for speed enforcement, VC Section 40802(b) requires that limits be established per Sections 22357 and 22358 of the VC, the limits must be justified by an engineering and traffic survey conducted within five years prior to the date of the alleged violation. However, a change in State law allows cities to extend the survey period up to seven or ten years depending on specific criteria.

WHEREAS, at 43 locations in the City's arterial and secondary arterial street network, spot speed surveys were taken in conformance with the State law for conducting engineering and traffic surveys for the purpose of establishing prima facie speed limits. The data was collected per the Caltrans Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices ("MUTCD") January 2012 California Supplement; and

WHEREAS, the actual speed zone surveys were conducted by National Data & Surveying Services, a subcontractor of Hartzog & Crabil Inc. A California registered traffic engineer from Hartzog & Crabill, Inc. drove the streets.

WHEREAS, on the basis of those surveys staff has determined that the adoption of the following recommended speed limits and the amendment of Chapter 10.16 of the Hawthome Municipal Code are reasonable and safe and will facilitate the orderly movement of vehicular traffic.

NOW THEREFORE THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWTHORNE DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Report contains sufficient information to document that the condition of VC Section 627 have been satisfied and that other conditions not readily apparent to a motorist are properly identified.

Section 2. Ordinance No. 2224 and the Report, attached to this Ordinance as Exhibit A (including the "Summary of Recommendations 2021" table, which delineates the new speed imits of the various streets within the Citv of Hawthome) is hereby approved and adopted. Section 3. Chapter 10.16 is repealed in its entirety and the following is added to the Hawthome Municipal code.

Chapter 10.16 SPEED LIMIT

10.16.010 Forty miles per hour.


