Fireworks Stand Slots Remain Up in the Air After Council Discussion

Talk of whether to reduce the number of local fireworks stand slots from the current eight down to six continued at the most recent Hawthorne City Council meeting with a public hearing on the matter. A handful of speakers expressed their opinions, but ultimately the Council unanimously voted to put the item "on the backburner."

Councilmember Alex Monteiro, who brought up the topic at the previous meeting, emphasized, "No one is trying to eliminate fireworks in Hawthorne." The issue, he explained, is the markedly higher rents nonprofits must now pay to run their stands for one week. That coupled with decreased sales with online and other options available resulted in profit declines for the organizations. The thought to consider going to six slots was to "ensure nonprofits make a little more money." Earlier a Little League volunteer confirmed that the rent cost had risen from \$1,500/\$2,000 to \$15,000, which makes it tough to meet expenses. Monteiro said he would support keeping the eight stands if the

fireworks companies (there are two, Phantom and TNT) negotiate a cap of \$1,000 for the locations – or charge no rent at all.

During public comments, Phantom representative Morrie Dym said it makes no sense to reduce the number of slots when Hawthorne already has among the lowest total permits in the area. As example, he noted that Lawndale has nine or 10 despite

a population less than half of Hawthorne's. Later, when asked by Councilmember Mike Talleda if a cap might be possible, Dym replied that it is out of his hands because his company doesn't own the properties that house the stands. The landlords put a price on them and then Phantom works out the split with the nonprofit from there. Noting

Inglewood City Council Approves Action Plans for Local Housing

Location, location, location was the unspoken mantra at Tuesday's meeting of the Inglewood City Council, with developments at addresses all around town packing the agenda. The Council unanimously approved an exclusive negotiating agreement (ENA) for development of four acres at Prairie Street and 113th Street. The amended agreement bears the influence of the community activist group, Uplift Inglewood Coalition.

Mayor James T. Butts acknowledged the group's lawsuit against the City of Inglewood was settled, resulting in a modification to the original plan. The development will now set aside 15 percent

of 392 luxury rental apartments as affordable housing units, with the bulk of the units at market rate.

Unanimous approval also went to an advance funds agreement between the City and Faith Lutheran Church. The church will deposit \$9,978 with the City for costs associated with a planned assembly development and a 65-unit senior housing development at 3320 W. 85th Street.

The Council approved additional funding associated with the ENA for the Clippers arena at Century and Prairie. The \$2.8 million increase brings the exploratory budget for the development to almost \$9 million. The CEQA funding agreement

Wiseburn Board Meets After the Tragic Saugus High Shooting

Less than 12 hours after another deadly school-site shooting, the Wiseburn School Board members met to view special presentations from tech guru Andy de Seriere and Wiseburn Education Foundation (WEF) Executive Director Melanie Mack.

Board President JoAnne Kaneda solemnly recognized the school shooting that occurred early that Thursday morning at Saugus High School and resulted in the deaths of two teenagers, as well as the gunman. Three other Saugus High students were also injured in the incident. Kaneda quietly offered the Board's condolences to all involved in the most recent campus tragedy.

De Seriere and his group were the first presenters. The R.H Dana Middle School offers a Project Lead the Way (PLTW) program that, said de Seriere, gives "students the opportunity to engage in project-based, real-world challenges that emphasize science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). The Wiseburn Unified School District PLTW program has mushroomed from 65 students who were enrolled in 2011 to the 600 enrolled in grades 6-8 this school year.

De Sierre noted that, with the District surrounded by so many engineering jobs, the goal is to find ways to help students consider STEM pathways and career options. Aiding him in the presentation was Da Vinci High student Winston Bird, who serves as a mentor to the Dana budding engineers and was recently promoted to the Da Vinci robotics team, leading the CAD department. They detailed a recent Dana lunchtime competition that drew 30 entrants, with the students asked to complete a computer-assisted design

project (CAD) within the allotted timeframe. Fifteen students made it to the finals of the competition. The first place winner was Cassie Vizuete. Nathan Escolero came in second, with Crisanto Carillo third and Sheraz Fayyaz finishing fourth. The students gave a quick demonstration of their CAD skills to the Board. Said de Seriere of his PLTW students, "I can't wait to see what they can do."

Next up was Mack, who delivered a \$40,000 oversized check to the Board that will be utilized for teacher grants. Prior to the meeting, Superintendent Dr. Blake Silvers stressed the important work that the WEF does. "The WEF partnership is a real integral partnership for us," he said. "It provides opportunities for teachers and staff members to be able to fund innovative practices." He mentioned Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics, citing STEAM labs and initiatives that are often made possible by WEF fundraising efforts. Silvers added that WEF has done a great job on focusing on the Arts. "WEF is a real wonderful part of our community," he said.

Upcoming meetings, Silvers said, are set to focus on the District's Long-Term Facilities Master Plan, which he said should be "wrapped up by March." He emphasized that the District and Board will then look towards addressing Wiseburn facility needs.

During Board member reports, the main theme was congratulating the PLTW students and addressing school-site safety issues. Dr. Neil Goldman noted Kaneda's initial thoughts. "Thank you for your opening remarks about Saugus...Safety remains our main priority," he said. Clerk Roger Banuelos spoke about

New Lawsuit Raises Heat on E-Cigarettes for Tempting Teens

Los Angeles County has joined a lawsuit against the popular maker of flavored e-cigarettes sold by South Bay retailers and online, alleging the California company focused its marketing on minors to get them addicted even though they weren't old enough to buy.

The announcement by the California Attorney General's Office and the L.A. County District Attorney follows a South Bay vaping forum held in October that exposed some of the alleged marketing practices of the vape industry. High school students told concerned parents and child advocates that e-cigarette companies advertise on social media channels popular with middle and high schoolers. Those ads have appeared on study websites, teens said.

The legal action announced Monday is going after Juul, a San Francisco-based company that is a major player in the \$9 billion-per-year e-cigarette industry. State Attorney General Xavier Becerra and District Attorney Jackie Lacey seek to punish the company for deceptive marketing and failure to disclose harmful health effects of vaping.

Local physicians said last month that regular use of e-cigarettes for three months can lead to an addiction and withdrawal symptoms when a person tries to quit. The county and state's lawsuit alleges that Juul's products fail to warn consumers that the nicotine-laced products, which are inhaled as a white vapor, contain chemicals and have serious health risks.

The lawsuit also charges that Juul failed to verify the age of California consumers and violated the privacy rights of minors. The company kept the email addresses of minors whom the company knew weren't old enough and contacted them anyway with promotions. Juul used an age verification process on its website, which is how the company knew, the suit says.

The use of flavored e-cigarettes, or vaping, is increasing rapidly among teens and

pre-teens, according to reports from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration. Juul dominates the U.S. market with more than 64 percent of the sales, according to officials.

That includes adults, some of whom see vape as a safer alternative to smoking cigarettes. What perturbs public health officials and state and local leaders is the novelty of flavored e-cigarettes has created a new generation of smokers among children who were not considered at-risk to become nicotine users. Four deaths from vaping have been reported in the state.

"We've worked too hard, committed our hard-earned money for too long combatting harmful tobacco use to stand idly by as we now lose Californians to vaping and nicotine addiction," Becerra said on Monday. "Juul adopted the tobacco industry's infamous playbook, employing advertisements that had no regard for public health and searching out vulnerable targets."

Nearly one in 10 high school students in LA County report using e-cigarettes, according to Supervisor Janice Hahn who represents El Segundo, Westchester, Lynwood and Gardena in the 4th District.

"With this lawsuit, we are going to hold Juul accountable for their hand in this public health crisis and do what we can to stop this company from creating a new generation of nicotine addicts," Hahn said at Monday's press conference about the legal action.

Prosecutors filed the lawsuit in Alameda County Superior Court. Juul's viral marketing campaigns led millions of American youth to start vaping without knowing the potential harms associated with nicotine, the suit alleges. In some cases, underage buyers and their friends whom they shared with didn't know the product contained nicotine.

Juul has been on the defensive since September, when the first reports of lung damage and deaths from e-cigarettes were widely

Film Review

The Artistry and Depth of *Waves* Will Leave You Breathless

There's a line in Kanye West's 2016 album *The Life of Pablo* that says, "Waves don't die, Let me crash here for the moment." The ebbs and flows of life are inevitable, but it's resilience that will make or break a man. This is the takeaway from director Trey Edward Shults' *Waves*. He returns home to A24 with his third feature film. Pitch-perfect in every way, *Waves*, now playing at ArcLight Hollywood and The Landmark, is a mesmerizing portrait of a hard-lived life and the discovery that every day is a new opportunity for compassion, acceptance and peace.

In an intensely moving performance, Kelvin Harrison, Jr. (who previously worked with Shults on *It Comes at Night*) plays Tyler, a high school athlete with a promising future, a steady

She finds comfort in the arms of Luke (Lucas Hedges), a well-intentioned guy who shares her grief and offers her a healthy escape. Their relationship is pure and allows for Luke and Emily to heal both separately and together.

Waves' boundary-pushing cinematography and constant fluidity generate a feeling of unrest, excitement and energetic catharsis. From 360-degree turns to controlled yet constant pans and rotations, DP Drew Daniels (who also shot *Euphoria*) makes every scene come alive. Further aided by seamless editing by Isaac Hagy, a chilling score by Trent Reznor and Atticus Ross, and set to the decade's best soundtrack, *Waves* is a full-body, full-sensory experience.

Like the title suggests, *Waves* will put one through a range of emotions. First come the

relationship and a supportive family. His father (Sterling K. Brown) takes the tough love approach to parenting, riding his son to always push harder, faster. "We are not afforded the opportunity of being average," he reminds Tyler -- and that despite their suburban middle-class status, society will always identify them as only African-American. Tyler escapes the pressure in his home life by spending time with his girlfriend Alexis (Alexa Demie), riding in cars with the music blaring and making out on the South Florida coast. High school love is all consuming, and theirs is no different. However, when a shoulder injury sidelines Tyler from his college prospects, his life begins to spiral out of control.

Waves is split into two acts, and the second half of the film focuses on Tyler's family that is left to deal with the aftermath of his circumstance. Newcomer and breakout star Taylor Russell is the protagonist of the second act. Russell plays Tyler's younger sister Emily, and she is burdened with the emotional weight and societal exile with which Tyler left her.

rumblings of uncertainty, then the crash of chaos, all to be swept away and reset to calm, steady waters. This rebirth cycle is a reminder that life goes on, despite the hardships, tragedies and tears that act as roadblocks. Life stops for no man, and the awareness that we are in control of our actions makes navigating the hard times a little more bearable. •

reported. The e-cigarette giant has posted health warnings on its website and suspended sales of several popular flavor vape juices.

Days before the state-county legal action was announced, Juul announced it would stop immediately selling a mint-flavored product in the United States. Back in September, the company acknowledged that reports of lung damage by e-cigarette users had hurt public confidence in the product. Juul said it had suspended all advertising and promotion nationwide, and the sale of four flavored smoke products: mango, creme, fruit and cucumber pending federal review by the Food and Drug Administration.

For those unfamiliar with vaping, the devices that heat the flavored juices are either a cartridge or a pod, the latter being the minty device Juul halted sales of earlier this month. The cartridges can look like a small box, a lipstick, a USB drive, or even a can of soda.

Juul started in 2015, almost a decade after e-cigarettes debuted as alternatives to cigarettes for smokers trying to quit. Since the company's launch in 2015, youth vaping in the United States has almost doubled. Between 2017 and 2019, e-cigarette use among high school students rose by 135 percent.

In 2019, five million middle and high school students used e-cigarettes - an alarming increase of nearly three million students in two years. The majority of underage e-cigarette users report that JUUL is their usual brand, according to the state-county lawsuit. New York also has filed a similar lawsuit against Juul, accusing the company of downplaying the nicotine in its products so youngsters and

teens would get hooked.

While the smoking craze is safer than cigarettes, that doesn't mean teens should take up the habit, said pediatrician Dr. Alice Kuo with UCLA Health Sciences. It's never a good idea to put chemicals in the lungs, she said, adding she has seen lung damage in a few cases at the Redondo Beach clinic where she practices. She hears a lot from teens that they think vaping is safe. "Oh, Dr. Kuo, you don't know. It's just water vapor," her young patients tell her.

However, new data from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control indicates that a black market for e-cigarettes is behind the emergency room visits and deaths so far this year. Juice bought on the street or from family, friends, dealers or other informal sources "are linked to most of the cases and play a major role in the outbreak," the CDC said last month.

A huge challenge for parents is how easy it is for minors to buy vape products. South Bay teens use online websites to bypass the age restriction of 21 and older, student leaders with the Beach Cities Health District testified at the October forum.

Speakers at the vaping awareness event told parents to be on the lookout for small smoking devices their teens are carrying that bear the names Suorin or Pax. Suorin is less expensive than Juul pre-loaded pods and pens, and Pax is sold as a cannabis vape device.

(We contacted Juul asking if the company had a response to the allegations in the lawsuit. As of press time Wednesday, we had not received a reply and there was no mention of the legal action on Juul's web site.) •

District funding, how competitive it is to get construction bond money and that the District needs to continually revisit safety procedures. Israel Mora noted how "Saugus hits close to home." He called the shooting a "very scary event," while urging that less talk and more action is needed.

Kaneda mentioned how the whole Saugus event lasted just 16 seconds, saying, "Not to take us down a horrible path, but we need to talk about this with our kids." She said there are a lot of side effects to school-site

violence. "Safety is the priority. Kaneda stressed the need of "building awareness and dealing with this sort of behavior. "

In his remarks, Silvers reiterated the critical importance to secure school sites, noting it is in the "forefront of our minds every day," and the need to continually advocate to implement strategies encompassing mental health interventions.

Next the Board participated in a discussion centering around field and gym usage. As with most coastal cities in the South Bay, field

usage slots are at a premium, with multiple in-District groups, as well as non-residents, trying to secure field and gymnasium time.

Chief Business Official Dave Wilson helmed the field usage update and mentioned how ASYO teams, whose season runs from July until November, basically utilize the sites seven days a week during that time span. Another heavy user, in season, is the Hollyglen/Wiseburn Little League. At the last Board meeting, Kaneda asked for a rundown on facility usage, including adding

and changing locks and keys for security purposes. She said her concerns were to keep the fields available for Wiseburn residents and keep them from being damaged from overuse.

Prior to the meeting, Silvers spoke of logistics challenges dealing with the fields, as well as the need to get the fields a little downtime and secure limited entry.

The next regularly scheduled Wiseburn School Board meeting, the final one for 2019, is slated for Thursday evening, Dec. 12. •

with Clippers-owned Murphy's Bowl LLC covers certain City costs for environmental and legal services that must be performed by third party consultants.

The Mayor postponed, for the second time, a public hearing set to consider a zoning change at La Colina Drive and East Beach Avenue. No explanation was given. The 63,783-square foot site is northeast of the Florence and Hillcrest intersection, near St. John's Church.

At a special meeting held last Thursday, the Council approved property acquisitions for two Inglewood residents who were lottery winners in the City's Homebuyer Assistance Program. The Inglewood Housing Authority bought the properties for resale to the winners, at a considerable discount from the original purchase price.

Both resale properties, a condominium and a single-family home, were sold to the lottery winners for the affordable price of \$312,500. The City instituted the first-time homebuyer program in August, and the lottery drawing was conducted at a City Council meeting.

A public hearing was set for Dec. 10 at 2 p.m., to consider the adoption of a number of state building codes related to 2019 California, Title 24 Building Codes.

The City Clerk announced the public is invited to preview new voting machines that will be rolled out countywide this spring. The schedule for demonstrations and hands-on training is Dec. 2 at the Inglewood Library; Dec. 9-12 at City Hall; and Dec. 15-20 at the library. Interested parties may

contact the Clerk's office directly for more information.

The City Treasurer reported impressive numbers in the City's coffers as of Sept. 30, noting the total cash and investment earnings under management total a hefty \$146.9 million, including over \$50 million in the Successor Agency and over \$12 million in the Joint Powers Authority accounts.

Councilmember George Dotson reminded the community of the Turkey Giveaway scheduled for Monday, 9 a.m., at Faithful Central, 321 W. Eucalyptus Ave. The big event is a partnership with Snoop Dogg. Dotson thanked him for his benevolence to the city. Dotson also announced the District 1 Toy Drive and Christmas Party on Dec. 11 at the ICOP Center on 7th Avenue and Manchester.

Councilmember Alex Padilla announced the District 2 Toy Drive and Food Drive will take place Dec. 14 at the district community center.

Councilmember Ralph Franklin, District 4, announced the new Norm's is officially open today. The family sit-down restaurant is located at the Crenshaw-Imperial Plaza.

The meeting was adjourned in honor of J.B. Williams, a reserve police officer who served at Santa Monica College and area schools; as well as Alna "Pearl" Brown, a beloved community humanitarian; and Bernard Tyson, Kaiser Permanente CEO.

The Inglewood City Council meets every Tuesday, unless otherwise noted, at 2 p.m. in the Council chambers on the 9th floor, Inglewood City Hall. •

the idea of free rent is unrealistic. "To give everything for free, we might as well not sell fireworks at all," he said. Monteiro lamented that "Phantom used to be more willing to negotiate," but has been less amenable after going through a leadership change.

Mayor Alex Vargas reiterated his position that he doesn't feel comfortable eliminating opportunities for two nonprofits that "know what they're getting into" when they take part in the lottery to notch a slot. Mayor Pro Tem Olivia Valentine wondered if the Council should even intervene in this case and asked for a legal consultation to determine if this is a matter strictly between the fireworks companies and the nonprofits. Talleda concluded that he thought the negotiation process should start earlier to allow everyone to "have more time to think about the deal."

In a second reading, the Council voted 5-0 to adopt an ordinance addressing the problem of prolonged residential and commercial property vacancies that can become public nuisances. Councilmember Haidar Awad said the idea is to assess a "blight fee to hold absent landlords accountable" and in turn make Hawthorne a more desirable location to buy property. Awad pointed to the brewery area and arts complex as successful examples of transforming previously vacant complexes. He went on to note that the object of the ordinance is not to go after everyone. Those actively trying to rent or lease a property and "don't have the tendency to create blight" will not be penalized, City Attorney Russell Miyahara further elaborated. Valentine reported that she received numerous complaints from citizens about blighted properties and sees this as an image matter. "People need to see us as a city on the move" and not one with blighted properties scattered throughout, she said.

Awad concluded that the ordinance provides a way to identify "separate offenses each and

every day" with the City of Hawthorne able to impose misdemeanor civil injunctions and administrative citations. "We've taken a bit of a beating," he said of past developers who've allowed empty properties to deteriorate to the detriment of local beautification. "Now it's our time to push back..." The Council will discuss the particulars of the fee schedule at its next meeting on Dec. 10, just a few days before the ordinance goes into effect.

Senator Steve Bradford provided a year-end legislative briefing that highlighted key bills that eventually became law. The list included major housing legislation to impose statewide rent control and allow accessory dwelling units on residential properties with garages. Other bills addressed mental health, clean drinking water, fair pay to play for college athletes, renewable energy, a time extension for those seeking compensation from wrongful convictions, and testing laboratories for the cannabis industry, among others.

Valentine spoke of key information culled from last month's meeting of the League of California Cities as well an economists' panel at Cal State Dominguez Hills. Among the highlighted items, she reported that one-quarter of the nation's homeless is in California; the State anticipates "moderate revenue growth" with a \$4.4 billion surplus; and there is "no expectation of a recession" – but if a downturn occurs, the State will feel it first due to reduced personal income tax revenues. Cities that rely on property taxes will notice it next, Valentine said. Meanwhile, the panel opined that rent control will limit incentives to fix up properties and noted that interest rates will drop again if there is no recession. Valentine added that Hawthorne stands to benefit as a perceived "action place for start-up" aerospace companies – as that industry has become the "hottest" in Southern California. "Hawthorne is definitely a player in the South Bay," she said of the community's aerospace reputation. •
