Arts Up For Debate In New Budget

The Torrance City Council held the first of its annual budget hearings on May 13, considering changes to services and fees affecting the Cultural Arts Center and the Nakano Theatre box office. Before the budget hearing got underway, the Council paid tribute to group of veterans and active duty military personnel as part of the city's Hometown Heroes banner program. The Council presented 23 tribute banners to veterans, their family or supporters. Honorees came from not only the Air Force, Army, Marines and Navy but also services like the Army Air Corps (predecessor to the Air Force) and the Coast Guard. Veterans ranged from young enough to still be serving, to in their nineties but still proud enough to shout "Go Navy." The Council also announced that the banner program would continue, but would only be updated with new banners in conjunction with the Armed Forces Day parade. The city's hometown heroes weren't alone in receiving accolades. Harriet Apsel, Bob Chiota and Frances Glauber were presented with the Older Americans Award by the City of Torrance Commission on Aging. Apsel was recognized not only for her involvement with groups like the Arts Council of Torrance and Trinity Hospice, but also her service to the New Horizons community where she lives and serves on the Board of Governors. In addition to his military service, Chiota is active in the local chapter of the Vietnam Veterans of America and has lead efforts to bring three handicap accessible bocce courts to the city. Glauber was given the award based on her dedication to the Torrance Women's Club, where in addition to serving various

positions in its board she organizes local tours, with proceeds benefiting the club's philanthropic program, and is instrumental in the club's two stage productions. All the honorees were grateful for the award and wanted to continue working for their causes. "I've enjoyed doing this," said Glauber. "I hope to keep up the work for a long time to come."

The budget workshop then began with an update by Finance Director Eric Tsao on the state of the city's revenues. Tsao said he had a positive outlook for the city's financial future, fueled by increased GDP growth and other positive indicators, though he did acknowledge negative factors facing the economy such as climate challenges in the east and international unrest. In Torrance specifically, Tsao noted that sales and property taxes have produced more revenue for the city, while the utility user fees haven't shown growth. Overall, he said signs point to a continued slow recovery. "The recovery is how it has always been, it has always been kind of fragile, it's been a slow growing recovery for many years now," said Tsao. "The economy continues to expand and improve and with that it improves the city's revenue streams."

Middle School Mathletes Compete

The crowded auditorium at Hull Middle School was abuzz with 160 energetic middle school students anxious to hear who would be moving on to the tie-breaker rounds of the Torrance Regional Middle School Math Competition. Every student had given up his or her Saturday to attend the May 10 competition, and once the final competitors took their seats behind a set a dividers, the room fell into a hush as proctor Julie Chao read the final questions off the overhead projector.

This is the fourth middle school math tournament Torrance Unified School District (TUSD) has hosted. The event encourages students to study science, technology, engineering and math (referred to as STEM) topics. Torrance Superintendent George Mannon said the competition has been surging in popularity: it has grown from 13 teams from nine schools to 32 teams from 19 schools in 11 different school districts. "You can see the number of teams increased this year from last year, in fact the winning team is from San Diego," said Mannon. "Obviously the word is out, this is a good competition for kids."

The event consists of two events, the individual competition and team competition. In both events students have to tackle complex math problems with the added pressure of the clock ticking down from 30 minutes to zero. After handing in See Mathletes, page 14

The West Torrance Robotics Club joined over 12,000 students from 38 countries at the 2014 FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) Championships, held April 23-26 at the Edward Jones Dome in St. Louis, Missouri. In front of a roaring crowd of 20,000 at the famed stadium, West High students hit the playing field with

The West Torrance Robotics Club rookie team started the season by winning the Los Angeles Regional Championships, qualifying them for the world competition. At the FRC Championship in St. Louis, the team returned home proudly ranked 42nd in the Newton division. In addition to their recent FRC World success, the team has won awards in the FIRST Tech Competition. The winning titles include the Innovate, Promote, Think, Motivate and Inspire awards. Teamwork is highly valued by the founders of FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) Robotics Competition. During the games where robots on the court scored points by putting balls into a goal, points were also earned by how much the teams worked together. Robotics pulls from many disciplines, bringing students together who may not have met otherwise. The collaborative nature of the projects allow a place for everyone to participate, learn and become professional. "I see kids from physics who know nothing about wood shop and the kids from wood shop who know nothing about physics," said Evans. "They work together in robotics and I see their faces light up. They get it."

The robotics students encourage brainstorming, hands-on collaboration and treating others fairly. Since it started at West High four years ago, the team has grown to thirty members. Are you involved in the community, chamber, organizations - if so which ones? Do you support the Fourth of July picnic and the Rose Float?

Tom Brewer: I've been involved in my community for over 30 years. I must admit that since I have been on the city council, I have had to cut back on some of the organizations I've been involved with. I have been on the board of the Torrance Education Foundation for over 15 years and I still serve on the board of directors as the Past President. I have been an outspoken supporter of a Fourth of July celebration. I have proposed a scaled down version of the all-day event that we used to have. Safety for the event is the most important issue that must be considered and we have always had a strong police presence throughout the entire day. That is expensive. We should make it a fireworks only evening, with no organized all-day program. We could also contract with a security firm to supplement our police force, as we did when we had the all-day Centennial Celebration in 2012. Since we stopped the fireworks show, our residents are going to Redondo Beach and we are spending money to help control the crowds there. I do support the Rose Float, but I think we need to explore private partnerships for funding right now.

Pat Furey: I have been continuously involved in the Torrance Community since moving here in 1987. My longest involvement is with Little League Baseball as a dedicated volunteer umpire for 27 years. During that time I have officiated in over 1,000 games throughout the South Bay – including all of the leagues in Torrance. I served 10 years as volunteer Boy Scout Leader and Committee Chair for Cub Scout Pack 948 and as a Troop Committee Member for Boy Scout Troops 242 and 592. And, I served as a Merit Badge Counselor for the South Bay District of BSA. I am currently a board member for the Torrance Education Foundation - having served for 15 years and for 4 of those years I was the president. Before I was elected to the council, I was the president of the North Torrance Homeowners Association for eight years. I fully support the Fourth of July Fireworks and the Torrance Rose Float. It was heartbreaking, but necessary during the recent recession, to cut funding for both. But, I believe that both of those City of Torrance traditions will be fully funded in the near future – when our economy rebounds a bit more.

Bill Sutherland: For years I have been a member of the Chamber of Commerce. As a councilman, I have been the most active and participative member of the Council, except for the Mayor, in Chamber activities. I also keep involved in our School District events. I served thirteen years on the Board of the Salvation Army Torrance Corp and over 30 years as an active member of Torrance Rotary serving in many leadership positions including President. I am an active supporter of many non-profit community organizations. Diana and I are ardent supporters of the youth sports activities that provide multiple recreational opportunities for all Torrance residents. My involvement in Torrance sports includes serving as a Little League and Torrance American Baseball coach/ referee and Regional Commissioner for AYSO. I am a member of the Torrance Sister City Association and Diana and I have enjoyed hosting Kashiwa exchange students for the past two years. I would dearly love to see us continue as a participant in the Tournament of Roses Parade, especially 2015 when one of our hometown heroes, Louis Zamperini, will be Grand Marshal. I am less excited about the Fourth of July event at Wilson Park. I feel the \$220,000.00 cost was extravagant and taxing on our limited resources.

What is your vision for the future of Torrance?

Tom Brewer: Torrance has a bright future. By the end of this year the new wing of Torrance Memorial Medical Center will open and extensive changes are planned at Providence Little Company of Mary as well. We have a Ferrari/Maserati dealership coming to Hawthorne Bl. We are going to get a new mall by the end of next year and this could be the catalyst that starts the rejuvenation of the rest of our city. We should look at the possibility of combining some lots that currently contain vacant buildings to give us the chance to get better projects in those spaces. I can see that much of Hawthorne Bl. will benefit from the new mall. I believe that many of the current business properties are ready for modernization that would not only benefit them, but Torrance as well. We are the hub of the South Bay. Almost all of the surrounding cities residents must pass through Torrance at some point during their travel time. That is why businesses and employers want to locate in Torrance and that's why I am so encouraged about our future.

Pat Furey: I believe Torrance has the potential to become the economic nucleolus of Los Angeles County, while maintaining its small town charm and all-important "balanced city" approach. But, that is only possible with the right leadership. Torrance has so much to offer – a well-educated populace; a firm housing stock; an almost perfect geographical location mid-way between the ports and the Los Angeles Airport; and a great climate. We must increase our efforts to attract and retain quality businesses that provide good paying jobs for our residents by doubling or tripling our efforts in economic development. If I am elected mayor, I am committed to doing just

that. I have already reached out to the state and county offices of economic development and to a number of community business members in an effort to establish a public-private business council to assist and advise the city in making these efforts. We must reach out to business leaders throughout the country and the world to explain the benefits of doing business in our city. I am certain that with my energy, vision and initiative and with the help of business professionals from our community that Torrance will begin to realize its tremendous potential.

Bill Sutherland: This is probably the most important question in the series. I am a businessman and understand the need to continually work to make sure we are a business friendly city in a decidedly business unfriendly state. Expanding the Economic Development team and forging stronger relationships with the Chamber and other groups is essential. We will work hard to make sure we enhance the positive environment that makes Torrance the place to locate. I am adamantly against raising taxes. I see an opportunity in the relocation of Toyota to Texas. We are already receiving inquiries about the Toyota facility and in the end we will be proud of what replaces Toyota. In the future I see the city no longer playing catch up with infrastructure issues but instead getting ahead of the replacements needed. I also see an expanded emergency preparedness effort. I see Torrance as a vibrant city in the future and remaining one of the safest cities in the nation to live, work, and play. My vision for Torrance sees us maximizing the use of technology to streamline operations. I also see an expanded use of volunteers and community involvement in government.



The West High Warriors began the season getting to know themselves; realizing how to play together; their strengths and their weaknesses. The team's early season struggles are certainly paying off now as the Warriors make their way through a tough Bay League

Peninsula stands alone as the only team ahead of the Warriors in the standings. Taking on the Palos Verdes Sea Kings, a team who was, at the time, in third place in the Bay League standings, the Warriors won the final game of a two-game set by the score of 8-7, dropping the Sea Kings down to fourth place while vaulting themselves up to second place in the process, where they now stand just behind Palos Verdes Peninsula.

Attaining a sweep against their rivals from Palos Verdes was by no means an easy task for head coach Juan Cueva and his West High Warriors to achieve. In fact, after opening up the game with a run in the bottom of the second and another in the bottom of the third, the Warriors watched as their 2-0 lead slipped away at the hands of careless play. In the sixth inning, for instance, the Sea Kings were able to get two runs on the scoreboard without even making contact on a pitch. After the Warriors hit a Palos Verdes batter at the plate, the Sea Kings decided to be aggressive on the base paths and executed a double steal. A passed ball and two errors later, Palos Verdes had scored five runs throughout the course of two innings to take a 7-3 lead without even doing much work.

That's when West High accomplished the miraculous. Nyles Nygaard was the brunt of West High's offense, as he usually is, and got things started in the seventh and final frame for the Warriors. Needing four runs to tie the game, Nygaard led off with a double. A base hit by Angel Mora and another by Javier Galvan drove in two consecutive runs to make the score 7-5. Rattled on the mound, Palos Verdes pitching then looked almost as sloppy as West High's defense in the sixth inning. A bases loaded walk drove in another West High run and a wild pitch sent in the tying run from third base to miraculously tie the score when the Warriors were just about out of chances. The game went into extra innings and that's when the aforementioned Mora saved the day. "He's a senior that's been stepping up to the party," coach Cueva said of Mora. "We've been talking about the seniors stepping up and taking charge." With one out in the bottom of the 10th inning, Mora did precisely that: stepped up. With a line drive single, Mora brought in the winning run to help the Warriors take an ugly, but effective 8-7 victory over Palos Verdes, in turn giving the team sole possession of second place in the Bay League. Mora was 4-for-5 with a walk and two RBIs on the afternoon to help his team towards victory. With only one series left in the regular season, the Warriors will need some help to capture first place overall in the standings. themselves, but they will have to hope for a sweep from Redondo to keep their division title hopes alive.

South High

The South High Spartans continued on with the winning ways that have kept them atop the Pioneer League for a majority of this season. Their latest victims happened to be the Centennial Apaches, who sit in last place in the division standings. Drake Pingel was the pitcher of record as the Spartans hosted the Apaches last Friday afternoon. Pingel pitched a shutout through five innings as Kyle Henmi and Matt Jacoby led the way on offense for South with two hits and a run scored for Henmi and two RBIs for Jacoby in the 6-1 win. The Spartans are cruising along effortlessly in the Pioneer League, having won their last seven league games in a row. The Torrance Tartars (20-8,7-1), however, are trading blows for first place with South (19-8, 7-1) as the two sit stuck in a virtual tie for first place as the season comes to a close.

Torrance High

The Tartars kept pace with South High by notching a two-game sweep of their own against the Lawndale Cardinals. There wasn't much of a story to either game, as Lawndale was unable to come up with a run throughout the entire series. In the second of two at Kendall Field in Torrance, however, it was Tyler Martizia and Zack Ferrin who combined for the one-hit shutout for Torrance. Kyle Smith did away with pitching for the day, but came through with two hits to lead the way on offense for his club. Torrance (20-8,7-1), in a virtual lock for first place with South High for first place, will take on the fourth place North High Saxons to finish up their season this week. South (19-8, 7-1) gets the third place El Segundo Eagles in what should be a heated contest on both ends of the city to decide who will ultimately take the Pioneer League crown outright.

North High

Some might say that for the North High Saxons, this simply just isn't their year in the baseball world. As the season comes to a close with only two games remaining, the Saxons find themselves as losers of their last five games in a row and seven of their last nine. Two of those five in a row came last week in a two-game set against the El Segundo Eagles. With a 6-4 loss in El Segundo, followed by a 12-4 loss here at North High, the Saxons now find themselves looking forward to a tough matchup this week against the first place Torrance Tartars to try to close the season out with a win or two. Though the Saxons' (10-16, 6-7) playoff chances don't look too bright at the moment, the team could always play the spoiler and knock Torrance out of their first place position with a win. •

Despite all of the negative attention, the players and coaches of the team have rallied. The Clippers team, not the organization owned by Sterling, but the players that wear the logo across their chests, have persevered through the negativity and decided to keep on working and sweating for themselves, not their owner. Doc Rivers remains at the center of the fight and delivered a sense of confidence into the team that now has them thinking not about racism, but about a championship.

After the Clippers won in Game 3 of the first round of the playoffs against the Golden State Warriors, tapes of Sterling's racist and insensitive comments were leaked to TMZ and later, the world. NBA commissioner Adam Silver issued a prompt punishment to Sterling, effectively banishing him from the NBA and anything to do with the Clippers. Unfortunately for the Clippers, even with Sterling gone from the building, his comments and thoughts remained like a black cloud above the organization. Players wondered if they wanted to remain playing for a team with an owner such as Sterling. Even coach Rivers pondered not returning to the team. Not surprisingly, the Clippers were blown out by the Warriors in their very next game and returned back to Los Angeles amidst a firestorm of commotion that had already made its way around the world and hung ominously above the Staples Center.

The Clippers could have just given up. If they had laid down and rolled over, perhaps no one would have even blamed them. Doc Rivers made sure that wasn't going to happen, though. Rivers was brought to the organization to do a job, just as his players were, and he was going to make sure that job got done. Rivers instilled confidence into a team that otherwise should have had none. He brought the star out of Blake Griffin, molded DeAndre Jordan into the player that he should have been all this time and handed the reigns over to Chris Paul. Rivers made playing for the Clippers a special thing despite the unexceptional views warm-up jerseys featuring the Clippers logo at center court and wore plain red T-shirts turned inside out instead. At that moment, the healing process began for this team and perseverance ensued.

Now Sterling no longer represents the Clippers. The comments that he has made are the views of just one ignorant man and have nothing to do with the players, coaches and staff surrounding the Clippers organization. The team of players that takes the court, puts in the hours, and works towards victories represents the Clippers now. Doc Rivers represents the Clippers. The fans that have been with the team from their days as one of the worst teams in the NBA to now, as one of the best, represent the Clippers. There are some owners who give their teams lifeblood, like the Jerry Busses and Mark Cubans of the world. Then there are others, like Sterling, who continuously force that life out of an organization. Sterling has been doing it for years. A horrid past of offensive and distasteful decisions followed this owner around and it was only a matter of time before he got caught. That time is now and the Clippers' face is about to change and it couldn't have come at a better time.

Sterling's comments may have been the best thing that has ever happened to a Clipper fan. Now the owner that has long since been despised by fans and other NBA people alike is finally gone for the association and gone for good; the Clippers now have a future and will not be viewed as solely a piece of property. As they are in the midst of one of the toughest playoff series in franchise history against the Oklahoma City Thunder, the Clippers are finally gaining an identity of strength, of perseverance, of stickto-itiveness. These Clippers, not the Clippers of Donald Sterling, but these players of Doc Rivers are an example to fans not just in the city of Los Angeles but to fans of the game of basketball from around the world. Win or lose in the second round of the playoffs, the Los Angeles Clippers have at last found their place in the NBA. They have found themselves. The Clippers will be a team to be reckoned with not just at the back end of this season, but for a long, long time to come. •

The City of Torrance Asks for Your Help

You, the voter, wield the most influential tool in politics: your ballot. In the upcoming June 3rd municipal elections, the City of Torrance asks for your help in demanding honest campaign tactics and the best for your community.

For the past few years, there has been a robust dialogue regarding the expectations of the people of Torrance of their elected officials. Most recently, a blue-ribbon panel of community leaders set clear, shared goals for candidates and their campaign teams in the Ethics Policy for Candidates for Elective Office. See TorranceVotes.org for more information along with a video of the actual Ethics training class offered to all candidates (21 of 23 attended) shortly after the filing was completed.

The next step beyond the conversation about ethics is reinforcement that what's been written on paper and shared out actually matters in practice. This is your job as a Torrance voter. While solid ground work has been laid, it's your duty to consider each candidate's campaign through your own political lens, consider their policy positions and words, and hold them accountable for their actions when you place your ballot in the box.

We're all busy these days, and seemingly more so every month. Knowing this, the Torrance Votes project has put together some simple guidelines for you to research candidates. You should have already received brochures regarding the program in your mailbox – either from the candidates or supporters, had a candidate or their supporters walk your street, attended a campaign forum or neighborhood meet & greet. Have you seen campaign related materials including a series of video vignettes on the City's cable channel or the City's Strategic Plan Reports on progress in meeting the Strategic goals set by a citizen committee in 2008 on TorranceVotes.org.

Remember to follow three simple steps to become a more savvy consumer of political rhetoric: First, read the candidate statements found in your sample ballot statements by fourteen of the sixteen candidates. Second, explore the candidates, their histories and their goals in their own words at the non-partisan Smart Voter website, www.SmartVoter.Org. And, third, research the candidates and their campaigns based on strategies found on the Torrance Votes website, www.TorranceVotes.org.

It's important to note that the City of Torrance does not endorse or suggest you vote for any individual candidate. Each voter has their own political mindset about what's truly important to them and no two are completely alike. You know where to find them. And, it is hoped that each resident will take the time to engage in the process and vote accordingly.

The most important part is remembering to vote! Go to the bottom of the ballot to find the City of Torrance races when you go to the polls. OR make sure your VoteByMail ballot is received by the Registrar no later than 8:00 p.m. It is OK to drop off a voted VoteByMail ballot at any Torrance precinct. And you'll find all Torrance voting precincts online at TorranceVote.org as well! For more information about the upcoming municipal election, or the Torrance Voter project, please contact the City Clerk at 310.618.2870. of that grill cleaned up. 
• Cut the vegetables in pieces that are sized to cook fast, but not fall through the grates.


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TerriAnn in Torrance 100 Years of Unselfish Volunteers

There are those among us who go about doing a lot of good almost completely under the radar. And if it weren't that this particular organization happened to celebrate their 100th Anniversary last Sunday, I still might not know about these wonderful women. The organization I am speaking about is the South Bay Auxiliary of Children's Hospital Los Angeles. These dedicated women operate their thrift shop at 1418 Aviation Boulevard in Redondo Beach. Although the Thrift Shop has been in many locations since 1930, it has been at its current address since January 1970. 100 percent of the proceeds from the Thrift Shop go to help fund the Children's Hospital.

Children's Hospital Los Angeles, located at the corner of Sunset and Vermont in Los Feliz, is one of only eight children's hospitals in the nation, and has been serving the community since 1901. It is the first and oldest children's hospital in the state and the best on the west coast, according to the prestigious US News and World Report Honor Roll. This premiere teaching hospital also works hand in hand with the Keck School of Medicine of the University of California. Wow!

I wanted to find out how this efficient,

philanthropic, and wonderful organization works. Janet Payne, recipient of the prestigious Jared Sidney Torrance Award, and First Vice President of the Torrance Historical Society and Museum, among many other duties, approached me and told me about the auxiliary. After that, I made time to meet with Sue Golden, a member of the auxiliary who served as president from 2009 - 2011.

Sue was generous enough to take time from her busy day to give me a peek into the world of these generous-hearted women who almost go unnoticed. She began by telling me, "There is an outpatient satellite facility in Torrance at the corner of Torrance Boulevard and Madrona. What we are, our group - Children's Hospital

Los Angeles depends a lot on philanthropic fundraising. Starting about one hundred years ago... there are probably thirty to thirtyfive associate auxiliaries that raise [money] philanthropically for the hospital. We fund research, machines, and imaging centers. We choose a project and we raise money for it and our particular auxiliary runs a thrift shop," said Sue. All the members are volunteers and they are from South Bay cities including Torrance, Hermosa Beach, and Redondo Beach. The Thrift Shop operates Monday through Saturday, 10

a.m. to 4 p.m.

Sue Golden was born in Los Angeles at Hollywood Presbyterian Hospital and grew up in the South Bay. "My twin sister and I were born there; she has also become a member [of the auxiliary]. My husband and I have owned our home in Torrance for 29 years. I retired from Hi-Shear Technology - I was Operations Manager there. My husband is Kurt Weideman. He also does a lot of philanthropic work. He is past president of the Torrance Foundation, Torrance Historical Society, and he is currently a member of the Torrance City Council. We have two daughters, Jodi and Angela, both living with their families in Indiana; a son, Christopher, still in the South Bay; and we have an adopted special needs daughter, Christina, we adopted when she was about five and a half. She is living in Portland right now."

After Sue retired from Hi-Shear Technology, she decided to get involved teaching with South Bay Literacy (SBL). The mission of SBL is to teach people to read and write. "Although I had never met her, a woman who was also teaching at SBL came up to me and said, 'would you be interested in finding out about the South Bay Auxiliary of Children's Hospital?' [That was] 2005 and I became a member and almost immediately joined the board. If I am going to give up my time I want to have input. I started as parliamentarian and then became a First VP and then president after four years, from 2009 to 2011. Three of the last five presidents have been Torrance residents and about 25 - 30 percent of the active members are from Torrance," added Sue. She told me the membership is probably sixty people but the active core is somewhere around forty.

The Thrift Shop is 'manned' by a group of about thirty-five women who are assigned specific days and if a conflict arises, then the ladies exchange days with each other. Sue told Items are priced to move and after paying the rent and the electricity, all the revenue goes to the hospital. No one takes one cent.

On the first Tuesday of December, (this year it will be on December 2), the Thrift Shop has their annual Holiday Boutique Sale and Luncheon held at the Palos Verdes Golf Club. Everyone is invited to attend the sale that includes china, housewares, books, clothing, and jewelry. "I have been the boutique chairman for the last two years. It is a lot of work. We have one lady who does jewelry. In our group we have several professional painters so they look at the artwork. We have such an interesting group of women. Some are retired teachers, nurses, professionals like myself -- some of them have amazing life stories to tell. That is the wonderful thing about joining this group. You meet the nicest, most interesting women you wouldn't meet otherwise. All of the revenue from the thrift shop goes to the hospital. The older ladies have a Bridge Fling in June. Most of the members are retired but there are some daughters who volunteer," said Sue.

I asked how someone becomes part of the auxiliary and Sue explained, "First someone who is a member recommends you for membership. Your application is presented to the board and if the board approves it, the general membership approves it. Everyone has to go through twenty-seven hours of training - they are a 'provisional' during this time. Usually a three-hour shift per week is what people do. Some people naturally take on special projects and become very involved in the organization. Approximately nine hundred children from the South Bay were seen at Children's Hospital Los Angeles last year -- four hundred eighty from Torrance. Lots of people who patronize our shop do so because they have family members who have been helped by Children's Hospital." "Once a year all the associates and affiliates

me the system works marvelously well. The shop exists entirely on donated goods and no one takes a salary. No one. The women take in the donations, sort, clean, iron, price, and then donate to the Goodwill what they do not place in their shop. "We are very selective," added Sue. Experts who are part of the group help price specific items. For example, someone might be knowledgeable about china or jewelry or maybe someone else knows all about art or books. When they are not sure of value, they go to experts and on occasion they sell things on the internet. But Sue told me they haven't exactly had an 'Antiques Roadshow' moment where someone had donated a Picasso - at least she hopes not. And if something comes in and they aren't sure what it is or what it's for, they put it on the counter and if you can figure it out, you can have it. "If we get too many stuffed animals, we donate them to police departments. Our idea is to keep it going. We tell people when they come into the shop, when you see something you like, you need to buy it now because there is no guarantee it will be there in an hour, or tomorrow. It is priced to move and our quality is much higher. . . ." said Sue. Nothing stays on the shelves more than three months. There is a color code system and on the last two days of the last month, they have a dollar sale and that clears things out.

go down [to the hospital] and if there isn't some kind of a plague in town, we get to tour. It's really inspirational. All you have to do is go down there and see those kids, and you say, 'Okay, it's worth it,' this is why we do it," said Sue. I asked Sue what she enjoys about being part of the auxiliary and she told me, "You see how people in most parts of the world live and you look around and say, I have got running water, I have indoor plumbing, and I think when people have the time particularly if people have the ability to give back – it is trite but what is the saying? To whom much is given... [much will be required, Luke 12:48]. Never occurred to me not to -- I just said yes. That is what my mother used to tell me, 'don't you know how to say no' all during working. I was a PTA lifer because that is what I could do." How do you donate items? Come to the front door if you have a small donation or go around to the back if you have a large donation. The Thrift Shop is open for business, serving the people in the South Bay to help the children at the hospital. This South Bay group rooted in our community does amazing things - quietly and gently, day by day. Visit the shop, purchase the goods, donate to the cause, and help these selfless women help our children in need of care. •

One Man's Opinion By Gerry Chong

We are a nation of contradictions, aren't we? This week we were treated to still another treatise on Global Warming . . . or as it now called, "Climate Change," since the earth hasn't been warming for the last 17 years. Undaunted, the followers of the environmental faith struck another spike in the heart of the economy. The contradiction of the Leftists is that they will accept the apocalyptic models from computers, but they reject the faith of religion, based on thousands of years of human experience. Both visions of the future and acceptance of God are matters of faith, but while Leftists accept one, they reject the other.

The Pentagon is equally contradictory. It bemoans the reductions in budgeting, yet wastes the assets it has. This week the Pentagon admitted it would destroy its \$1.2 billion in small arms ammunition simply because it does not have an accounting system capable of sharing information with the General Accountability Office, and cannot therefore manage its inventory. For instance, a Marine request for ammunition is e-mailed to the Army, where it is manually typewritten into the Army system because the Services cannot share data.

Even as the military cannot keep track of its ammunition, other federal agencies are buying ammunition at a rate . . . do I dare say it? . . . like there's no tomorrow. Homeland Security in July placed an order for 25 million rounds of shotgun shells, deliverable at the rate of 5 million rounds per year for five years. Earlier this year, Homeland Security ordered 141,000 sniper rounds of .308 ammunition, each having a range of 800-900 yards. Last year, Homeland Security bought 2 million rounds of ammunition of various capabilities, and over the last several years has bought 2.5 billion rounds, including many hollow-point bullets intended to stop human beings. Two months ago, Homeland Security began taking delivery of hundreds of retrofitted Mine-Resistant Ambush Protected Vehicles (MRAP) once used in Iraq and Afghanistan, now destined for the streets of the U.S.

In total, the Justice Department says there are 40 federal agencies containing 120,000 men authorized to carry arms. Those agencies include the EPA, Drug Enforcement Agency, Bureau of Prisons, Library of Congress, Federal Reserve Board, Fish and Wild Life, The Park Service, Social Security Administration, the Department of Agriculture, The National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration, The IRS, The U.S. Marshall's Office, The Department of Education, The Secret Service, the Health and Human Services Department, The Postal Department, and the infamous Bureau of Land Management which physically threatened Cliven Bundy in Nevada.

In fact, guns and ammunition bristle from every nook and cranny of a Federal government which claims to abhor the spread of weapons for public consumption. Ominously, in response, private gun buyers have overwhelmed the ATF's registration system, having grown by 380% between 2005 and 2013.

In a toxic cocktail, the military cannot control its weapons inventory; the government's paramilitary departments bristle with weapons; and a citizenry distrustful of intrusive and outsized government is arming itself to the teeth. Take a breath and step back, everyone. •

optional actions the Council could seek more information on, which included making changes to the box office hours and fees at the George Nakano Theatre and introducing tiered rental rates at the Torrance Cultural Arts Center. The Torrance Performing Arts Consortium began the conversation on service fees at the box office of the theatre by seeking a freeze to cost of living adjustment to fees for the facilities they use (which is reflected in the budget) and asking the Council to look into dropping the \$2.50 service fee for purchasing tickets by phone. During the discussion the Council looked into the hours the box office was operational, and Mayor Frank Scotto noted that the city could save money while maintaining the core service of the box office by reducing its hours of operation. "I think we could curtail the hours and save a lot of money there," said Scotto. The changes to the Cultural Arts Center rates would introduce a "non-peak" rate for Monday though Thursday daytime use. City staff suggested a 15 percent discount for non-peak use, but both Scotto and Council member Kurt Weideman thought the discount was not enough to attract new customers, with Scotto referring to possibly a 25 or 30 percent discount. As usual, this workshop mostly dug into what issues the Council

would like to explore, but any action taken on either the box office or non-peak rates would have to wait for the Council next workshop scheduled for May 20. Jackson said that his staff would look into the issues the Council identified and provide guidance on how to address them next week. "I think we understand what issues still remain," said Jackson. "We'll bring it back for consideration at your next workshop."

Lastly, the Council recognized City Clerk Sue Herbers for earning the Award of Distinction for Voter Outreach by the California City Clerks Association for her lead role in the Torrance Votes program.

The goal of the program is to provide the tools necessary for residents to become better informed voters and make decisions in the ballot box that are consistent with their outlook, beliefs and morality. "I couldn't have done this with a team of people," said Herbers. "It is a team effort and I'm very proud to have been the leader of it." Byron Pope, vice-president of the association said the organization is proud of her hard work in creating the program. "This is definitely a model program worthy of being emulated in municipalities throughout the county, state and the country," said Pope. "We are peacock proud." •

their answers, they are then given a review on the concepts they were quizzed on. "The problems are problems that kids do in math class all year long," said Mannon. "They aren't problems that are developed for this competition, these are the actual types of problems that students encounter in the classroom."

The tiebreaker round was fast and furious, with students reaching the solution to problems faster than Chao could read the questions. At the end of the day Torrance's own Alvin Kim from Calle Mayor Middle School took first place in the individual competition, with Kenton Kim from Oxford Academy taking second place and Caroline Choi, Caroline Liu and Steven Ren all from South Pasadena Middle School taking third and a tie for fourth. In the team event Carmel Valley Middle School earned top honors with a score of 79 of 80. South Pasadena Middle School took second place with a score of 75 of 80, El Roble Intermediate School took third place with a score of 71 of 80 and Calle Mayor made fourth place with a score of 68 of 80.

One of the competitors, Cynthia Lin, said she enjoyed the chance to use her math skills.

While she is already a self-proclaimed math fanatic, she said the competition has encouraged her to keep learning. "It's really fun and really challenging," said Lin "[It was challenging] not overthinking the problem when it's really easy," said Lin. "I've always been a math fanatic, but this has encouraged me to study math more."

While Lin was worried about overthinking the problems, Ben Riser, a manager at Exxon-Mobil's Torrance Refinery, said he and his fellow volunteers from Exxon-Mobil were impressed with the depth of math knowledge these mathletes possessed. "If you were to take time to look through the list of questions, they're very difficult and it's very impressive that these kids were able to score as well as they did, some of them were able to get a perfect score," said Riser. "We have mostly engineers that are doing the grading and we are all impressed with how these kids are getting them all right."

Torrance Regional Middle School Math Competition was created by Lan Yokota as a way to keep her son Justin Yokota and students like him stimulated in math. Justin Yukota had been competing in the Math Olympiads tournaments since fourth grade, but once he was out of elementary school, Lan Yokota said it wasn't clear where to continue as a sixth grader. "The parents were looking around and wondering, 'What can we do after this?' and the chairperson said 'I don't know, this is it. You're on your own.' After fifth grade there is no Math Olympiads," said Yukota. "That tournament was so inspiring, seeing 120 of them on Saturday morning. full of energy, wanting to do math."

Yokota took it upon herself to create a tournament in the area for middle school mathletes like her son, whose final middle school tournament was last year. She was tasked with finding math problems, contacting interested schools and solving any other challenge an event like this creates. She also had to get approval from the school district. Mannon said he was happy to approve an event that lets academics receive the cheer more commonly reserved for athletics. "Sometimes we dwell too much on athletics and athletic competitions and not enough academic competitions and that's what this does," said Mannon.

However, Lan Yokota couldn't put on this event on her own. Mannon said the event wouldn't be possible without the help of Exxon-Mobil. "It's a great event," said Mannon. "We're appreciative to Exxon-Mobil: without their sponsorship this couldn't happen. This is a part of our ongoing partnership between the Torrance Unified School District and Exxon-Mobil. We're always appreciative to them and their focus on education. "

"Math and science is very important to the future of our community, country and the world. How to Have Good Water Sense in and Around the House

(BPT) - When you turn on the water faucet in your kitchen, do you think about the water that goes down the drain without being used in any way? Or have you wondered how you might be able to reduce your water bill? Having good water sense can help answer these questions and more.

What does it mean for homeowners to have good water sense, and why is it important? In the past 10 years, nearly all regions of the country have experienced a drought - some severe - resulting in the establishment of water-usage guidelines in various communities and states. In 2012, the last reported year, 70 percent of the United States was abnormally dry, with 20 percent of those lands under extreme drought, according to the Environmental Protection Agency.

The Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) WaterSense program labels home water-consuming products in order to help homeowners reduce the amount of water they use. Lowering water usage not only helps reduce the amount of water a community needs to provide, but it also saves money for the community and the homeowner. Both of which would come in handy any time especially during times of drought.

"There are many ways a homeowner can help to reduce water consumption inside the house and around the yard," says Kevin McJoynt at Danze, Inc. "From replacing toilets to switching out faucets or limiting the number of laundry loads you run, it's relatively easy to cut back without even noticing a difference. It's important for all of us to take ownership of simple water-reducing practices, and once they're in place, you probably won't even notice."

Danze offered the following tips you could consider to cut water usage in your home and backyard:

* Toilets - If you have a toilet manufactured before 1992, it's the biggest water hog in your home. These fixtures use about 6 gallons of water per flush, according to the EPA. New high-efficiency toilets with a WaterSense label use 1.6 gallons or less per flush, and thanks to better flushing technology there is no sacrifice in performance.

* Faucets - Leaky faucets or faucets without new aerators could be wasting water right before your eyes. New faucets with the WaterSense label produce a maximum of 1.5 gallons of water each minute, which can help you reduce your water usage by 30 percent, according to the EPA. Danze faucets are WaterSense labeled, providing homeowners with stylish designs and water streams that would challenge you to notice less water is actually being used. In addition to a change in faucet, remember to turn off the water when it's not in use. When brushing teeth or washing hands, for example, only let the water run when you need it for rinsing.

* Gardening and lawns - Everyone wants a green and healthy-looking lawn and garden in the summer, but many homeowners actually overwater the lawn. For sprinkler systems, there are high-tech sensors that only turn on the sprinklers when the soil is too dry. There are also systems that connect to local

weather systems to program when the water laundry machines, each load requires nearly will turn on. In addition, it is best to install sprinkler heads that apply water directly to the plants instead of allowing the water to blow away and evaporate in the air. Rain catchers can be a great natural supplement to water needed for your gardens.

* Laundry - The average family washes between seven and eight loads of laundry per week, according to the EPA. This number might be even higher for larger families and those who wash reusable diapers (which also has its environmental benefits). For traditional
