State Recognizes Local High School as Model Campus

Recently, Torrance Unified School District's (TUSD) Kurt T. Shery High School was recognized by California Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson as a Model Continuation High School for 2017. As one of 35 schools in the state to receive this distinction, Shery was chosen because of the school's innovative academic programs that help prepare and support at-risk students to complete high school credits in order to graduate.

"Every day, the team of exceptional educators at Shery High make a lasting and positive impact on the lives of their students," said TUSD Superintendent Dr. George Mannon. "Together they have created a caring, nurturing and supportive environment in which their students continue to thrive and grow. We are so proud of their accomplishments."

Shery High Principal Jamie Jimenez, who began at the campus as a counselor 12 years ago, has been an integral part of the school's growth and success. "Last year, 92 percent of our seniors graduated," she proudly remarked. "Over the years, we have continuously looked at our programs to see what works and what does not." Principal Jimenez recalls how once upon a time Language Arts instruction was mainly bookwork, with very little interactive instruction. While some students did well, others struggled. They revamped their program to emphasize on single-subject and direct instruction with an increased focus on continuously engaging students with the subject material. Additionally, teachers began assessing students more frequently to ensure the latter understand concepts and topics before moving on to new subject areas. The results speak for themselves, with an increased number of students either returning to their home high school to graduate with their peers, or graduating directly from Shery High.

Continuation schools are designed to provide high school students who are at-risk of not graduating with the classes they need in order to complete graduate courses and credit. The student population at continuation schools range between the ages of 16-18 and daily attendance is required. Each one of the model school sites was selected based on a comprehensive and competitive application process that involved effectiveness, assessments and use of data including an onsite visit and peer review panel, according the a statement released by the California Department of Education.

The State provides continuation education for any students behind in high school credits. Students in need of a flexible school schedule

because of work obligations also benefit from these campuses. Other students choose a continuation education because of family needs or circumstances. Students who attend continuation high schools are required by the State to spend at least 15 hours per week, or three hours per day, at the campus and take courses required for graduation. Students also receive guidance and career counseling. Some programs even offer independent study, jobplacement services, and concurrent enrollment in community college.

Last year, Shery High went through an extensive Western Association of Schools (WASC) review process and received a sixyear accreditation. WASC is the State's way

Drug Maker Doesn't Have to Explain Price Hikes to Shareholders

Call this a case of the right hand not knowing what the left hand is doing. A federal government lawyer told one of the country's largest pharmaceutical companies last month it can remain silent about why it raised prices on life-saving therapies. The irony here is that the people asking for that information are concerned shareholders of the biotech company Amgen whose CEO was called recently to the White House for a meeting with the President.

Amgen is based in Thousand Oaks, yet it is a darling with fund managers and South Bay investors because of the company's sustained growth and annual

profits that will return \$11 or \$12 per share to investors this year. The company earned \$6 billion in profit last year, and made \$16.6 billion in sales on its 10 top-selling therapies. A faith-based shareholder group that includes the Catholic healthcare system Dignity Health filed a proposal last fall asking Amgen's management to explain to the stockholders why it raised prices on some drugs dating back to 2010.

Specifically, the Mercy Investment Services group asked for details about the company's rates of price increases and the reasoning behind them. The request included any assessment of risks to Amgen from price hikes on its 10 best-selling

Refinery Regulatory Action Gets County and Some Torrance City Council Support

On February 28, the community packed Torrance City Hall to express concerns regarding operation of the Torrance Refinery and use of Modified Hydrofluoric Acid (MHF). On March 7, the Torrance City Council voted to direct City staff to return in three to four weeks with alternative versions of a resolution indicating the City's support of Assemblyman Al Muratsuchi's five bills (AB 1645-1649) to significantly improve safety at the refinery, as well as phase out use of Modified HF. In addition, the resolution would support the South Coast Air Quality Management District's efforts to execute procedures for proposed Rule 1118 (Emission Controls) and Rule 1410 (Phase out use of MHF). Councilmember Tim Goodrich proposed the resolution prompting the vote and suggested the following language: "Be it resolved that [the Torrance City Council] calls for the phasing out of MHF at the Torrance Refinery in exchange for a safer alternative." On March 8, the LA County Board of Supervisors voted on a motion from Supervisor Janice Hahn and Supervisor Sheila Kuehl to support Muratsuchi's refinery bill package (AB1646-1649) and the proposed Rule 1410 to ban use of HF/MHF. The motion passed unanimously.

The Torrance Refinery Action Alliance (TRAA) stated that is thankful these governmental bodies unequivocally showed support for elimination of Modified HF in California refineries, noting that "as the language in AB 1645 and Rule 1410 is formed, TRAA will continue to stress the importance of HF/MHF removal from the Torrance and Wilmington refineries by January 1, 2020. The timeline of removal of MHF is of utmost importance for the safety of the community."

South High Student Dies in Car Collision

Sixteen-year-old South High School student and star baseball player Jesse Esphorst, Jr. lost his life in the wake of a three-car traffic collision the evening of March 7 that also left his father hospitalized. That night at approximately 10:09 p.m., officers from the Torrance Police Department responded to the collision at the intersection of Crenshaw Boulevard and Crest Road. On arrival, officers discovered that a silver 2004 Audi A6 and a black 2014 Mercedes Benz GLK350 were both traveling northbound on Crenshaw Boulevard when they collided with a white 2000 Toyota Sienna van that was making a left turn from southbound Crenshaw Boulevard to eastbound Crest Road. Jesse Esphorst, 47, was behind the wheel of the Sienna with his son as the passenger. After being treated at the scene by Torrance Fire Department personnel, father and son were transported to a local hospital where Jesse Esphorst Jr. succumbed to his injuries.

Classmates, teammates and rivals held a private vigil on the baseball field last Wednesday, while others set up a memorial at the accident scene with photos and flowers. Esphorst, Jr., considered a future professional baseball prospect, had hit a home run in a game earlier that evening against Hawthorne High. His father was still listed in stable condition at the time of this writing.

Initial investigations indicate the driver of the Audi was involved in a minor collision in Rancho Palos Verdes with the Mercedes Benz and fled the scene. The Audi driver fled northbound Crenshaw and the driver of the Mercedes Benz GLK350 was following the Audi when both vehicles ran the red signal for northbound Crenshaw Boulevard at Crest Road and both collided with the Toyota Sienna van. After the collision, the Audi fled northbound on Crenshaw and the driver of the Mercedes GLK350 stayed at the scene. The Audi was located a short time later near the scene unoccupied. An extensive follow-up investigation revealed the identity of the Audi A6 driver as 28-year-old Los Angeles resident Darryl Hicks, who was subsequently arrested for vehicular manslaughter, reckless driving and felony hit and run.

The driver of the Mercedes Benz, 21-year-old Tung Ming from Rancho Palos Verdes, was

treated by Torrance Fire Department personnel at the scene and transported to a local hospital where he was examined, released from the hospital and arrested by the Torrance Police Department for vehicular manslaughter. All charges related to the incident will be submitted to the Los Angeles District Attorney's Office for felony filing consideration.

This incident is being investigated under the command of Captain Martin Vukotic, Commander of the Special Operations Bureau. Anyone with information regarding this collision is encouraged to contact the Torrance Police Department's Traffic Division at (310) 618-5557.

Torrance Police DUI Checkpoint on St. Patrick's Day

St. Patrick's Day has become one of the nation's favorite holidays to celebrate and party. Unfortunately, too many people are taking to the roads after drinking, making the holiday one of our most dangerous. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), 252 people lost their lives in drunk driving-related crashes during the St. Patrick's Day holiday period from 2011-2015. More than a fourth of them were killed in drunk driving crashes that occurred in the early morning, post-party hours (midnight to 5:59 a.m.).

That's why the Torrance Police Department and the California Office of Traffic Safety are teaming up to reach all drivers with an important life-saving message and warning: Don't Drive Impaired by Drugs or Alcohol.

The Torrance Police Department will conduct a DUI/Drivers License Checkpoint on Friday, March 17 between 8 p.m. and 3 a.m. specifically to stop and arrest drivers showing signs of alcohol or drug impairment. In addition to this St Patrick's Day enforcement effort, all police, sheriff and the CHP will be on heightened alert ready to stop and arrest any impaired driver throughout the long weekend.

"These needless deaths can be prevented," said Chief Mark Matsuda, of the Torrance Police Department. "Planning a sober ride home before the party begins is the first step in staying safe on St. Patrick's Day. Don't wait until you've already been drinking to make your transportation decision. Designate your sober driver in advance, and never get behind the wheel if you've been drinking." •

drugs. An attorney for the group argued to the SEC that the healthcare debate in Washington and public opinion over patient-drug costs put Amgen and its investors on shakier ground in 2017. Stockholders could be affected if the federal government caps reimbursement for prescription drugs covered through Medicare and Medicaid, attorney and former law school professor Paul Neuhauser wrote to the SEC in January.

That letter was a follow-up to another one sent last fall to Amgen CEO Robert Bradway and his management team. The Mercy Investment members were worried about public outrage over pharmaceutical prices and by comments made by President Trump during his campaign. Trump said that drug makers were "getting away with murder" and vowed the federal government would negotiate lower prices on his watch.

The group is largely comprised of religious groups, including the Dignity Health system that operates clinics in Inglewood and Torrance. Their attorney reminded the SEC staff that in the past they had sided with shareholders wanting drug makers to explain to them how prices were set on FDA-approved medicines. Amgen, in its own letter to the SEC, said that it already provides drug information on its website. However, the faith-based group says the drug maker is being secretive and that the information it wants is more detailed than what the company has divulged publicly.

Drug pricing represents a moral issue for the religious community, Neuhauser said, noting that CEOs of major drug companies have appeared before Congress and been roundly criticized over increases to drug costs, including a 400 percent hike for EpiPen, used by children with severe food allergies. Turing Pharmaceuticals caught flak from Congress and the public after it hiked the price by 5,000 percent on an anti-parasite therapy called pyrimethamine.

President Trump in January met at the White House with pharmaceutical executives, including Amgen CEO Robert Bradway. One topic of discussion reportedly was the need to make drugs cheaper for U.S. patients. The President promised U.S. corporate tax cuts from his administration and gave the CEOs a tour of the White House, but he didn't ask for any specific commitments from the pharmaceutical executives on capping their pricing. The interfaith shareholder group is keenly aware that the President, Congress, insurers and patients are closely watching how Amgen and the industry, known as Big Pharma, respond to the palpable dissatisfaction with high drug costs.

Amgen's business plan "can be upset if there's enough public pressure," Neuhauser said. The company's revenues grew by eight percent annually over a five-year period, according to Amgen figures.

Amgen attorney Andrea Robinson successfully argued that drug pricing falls into ordinary business operations, which needn't be discussed with shareholders under SEC rules. In a letter dated January 10 to the SEC's Division of Corporation Finance,

The South High girls' soccer team has completed a season that is truly one for the record books. A powerhouse team, led by head coach Elizabeth Kitsios, put together a year that saw the Spartans lose only one game all season long. In doing so, South made it all the way through the playoffs where they eventually beat the Claremont Wolfpack by a final score of 1-0 in double overtime at Warren High School in Downey, California. The victory added to a long list of accomplishments for this year's Lady Spartans team and brought home a CIF Southern Section Division 3 championship to South High and the city of Torrance.

It wasn't easy and it took two overtime periods, but it was eventually Grouwinkel who came through with the golden goal to defeat Claremont and bring home a championship trophy. "When the second overtime whistle blew, it was, 'Okay, this is it," Grouwinkel explained of her miraculous game-winning goal. "I don't know why I chose the most impossible angle, but it went in." The Lady Spartans may not have been able to score in the first 80 minutes of the championship matchup against a very stiff competitor, but in that final minute of play Grouwinkel hit an impossible shot from an angle that seemingly traveled through the air in slow motion before making the back of the net dance to signal victory for South High.

While the Lady Spartans were elated and took to the field in excitement at their newly acquired championship, their worthy adversaries were dejected and left wishing that they could have done just a bit more. "We had our chances and didn't finish," Claremont head coach Tim Tracey explained. "That's the difference. You have to finish them." Though not many teams or players get much of a chance against South sophomore goalkeeper Hayley Garriott, the Wolfpack was able to put together a few shots on goal late in the second half that just nearly missed the mark. Opposing senior midfielder Mackenzie Boulware had two shots on goal about 10 minutes apart before the break. Both were inches away from getting past Garriott, but managed to find the crossbar each time to stay out of the net and keep the game at 0-0.

"We dodged some bullets 100 percent," Kitsios explained of the two close calls. "It opened some eyes. We are beatable. It made them step up. Something clicked at halftime and they turned it on." While the Lady Spartans still had trouble getting the ball through the net in the second half of play, their offense did manage to really start clicking. Grouwinkel, along with senior midfielder Holly Kaemerle and junior forward Bridgette Campbell all had shots on goal that had the chance to end the match for good. Grouwinkel even had one go in the net, causing quite a stir on the South

There is no mistake when looking down upon the patchwork blanket of velvet green flying into Ireland that you are landing in a very special place. Although St. Patrick didn't enter Ireland from the air, his mark on this Emerald Isle remains. According to my trusty Encyclopedia Americana, "St. Patrick found Ireland almost wholly a pagan country; he left it at his death predominantly a Christian land." St. Patrick used the shamrock for explaining the Trinity to the pagan Irish of the time and that sprig continues as a symbol of Ireland.

A few years ago on a trip to Ireland with my parents, we went on a pub crawl one night. Not knowing what that exactly was, I learned that the Irish not only enjoy their spirits, but I also discovered their music and the written word go hand in hand. At each pub we visited, there was music, a history lesson and a lively, friendly atmosphere. We discovered the Irish are proud of their heritage and love telling stories.

How are modern Irish and non-Irish celebrating St. Patrick's Day? I decided to find out. Leslie Cortez stated emphatically, "I make

it a point to eat corned beef and cabbage. I don't like beer, so I don't drink green beer--but I noticed you could put food coloring in chardonnay and champagne. Who knew? I just discovered it last year and I actually make my own corned beef and cabbage in a slow cooker, turn it on in the beginning of the day and it's ready by the end of the night and [you can] have little shenanigans in the evening." Leslie also told me she wears a t-shirt every St. Patrick's day that says, "I know I'm not Irish, but kiss me anyway."

Theresa Mack told me, "I am Irish on both sides of the family--mostly my great-grandmother was a Magee and my grandmother's name is McLaughlin, so I have a lot of Irish blood." Theresa told me she eats green cookies for St. Patrick's Day and added, "My mother was really, great and every month she tried to create a holiday...and on St. Patrick's Day she would use green food coloring and try and turn everything green, and of course wear green, and we as kids always got gifts that were of a green nature."

Todd Trinner said, "I always definitely make corned beef and cabbage in the slow cooker before work and when I get home, it is all ready. The only thing I don't put in is the cabbage, because it will get too wilted.



So I just steam it at the end because I like it a little crisp." Todd and Leslie both make their dinner in a slow cooker and that may be how people with busy careers cope with the traditional dish.

Cory Frietas thoughtfully shared with me, "I like my corned beef and cabbage. Sometimes my mom makes it and I go over her place and eat it." Steve Coy laughingly told me with a glint in his eye, "I dye the river green and drink green beer. I eat corned beef and cabbage. Sometimes my wife will make it, sometimes we go out." Jack Walser told me, "I stay home, go skiing, what day is it this year? I am not a big celebrator. I don't even drink beer. I am very boring." Obviously, Jack isn't into the holiday at all. No wearing of the green for Jack, although I do

not think he is boring.

On the other hand, Timothy McCauley, whose father was 100 percent Irish, loves St. Patrick's Day and is proud of his Irish heritage and passes it on to his three daughters. "There is a pride in being Irish, I love being Irish," Timothy proclaimed.

Corned beef and cabbage and green beer were on the menu in the Cooper household when Michelle was growing up. She told me, "All this was my mother's doing. Now, we still decorate the house, but it is nothing like it was when I was growing up. Now my daughter [Cassidy] has already decorated the house and we have a flag outside, and we will probably do green beer - 'cuz why not?" Speaking with Michelle Cooper, whose mother was Irish and loved to celebrate every holiday, I realized her mom was similar to Theresa Mack's mom because their homes were both filled with green on St. Patrick's Day.

Are you thinking about a corned beef and cabbage dinner tomorrow night? I am. This year, I intended on corning my own brisket but my best-laid plans were crushed when I realized I didn't have enough time for the process. Interestingly, I found out the reason for the term "corned beef" is because the salt pellets used in the preserving process of the meat were large and resembled kernels of corn. Hence the term corned.

All week, I have noticed cooking shows have featured different ways of preparing the traditional corned beef and cabbage dinner for St. Patrick's Day. It seems to me, even if you are not Irish, it is fun kicking up your heels on this day. The Irish have given us famous writers including James Joyce, Ulysses; Oscar Wilde, The Importance of Being Earnest; Jonathan Swift, Gulliver's Travels; C.S. Lewis, The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe; and many other authors with a multitude of other works.

One of my very good friends, an Irish priest, the late Monsignor Michael Lenihan, always quoted the Irish blessing when officiating a wedding (and it was also recited at his funeral) and I can still hear his melodious Irish tones saying, "May you always have work for your hands to do. May your pockets hold always a coin or two. May the sun shine bright on your windowpane. May the rainbow be certain to follow each rain. May the hand of a friend always be near you. And may God fill your heart with gladness



Drug Maker

Robinson reminded the commission staff that the exemption exists so that stockholders of a publicly owned company don't micromanage how it conducts business. That includes how it sets prices and prepares for any backlash, she wrote.

"The supporting statement further requests that the Company provide 'detailed justification for price increases.' These mandates demonstrate that the Proposal is seeking to probe deeply into matters of a complex nature upon which stockholders, as a group, are not in a position to make an informed judgment," Robinson wrote.

SEC staff issued its legal opinion in the Amgen matter on February 10 in favor of the drug maker. Though the opinion is nonbinding, the Mercy Investments group will not pursue the issue with Amgen at this year's shareholder meeting, the group's attorney said.

Identically worded proposals were submitted to at least eight U.S. drug makers, and SEC staff gave a thumbs down to each shareholder plan for more transparency about drug pricing. Mercy Investment members were involved in some, but not all, of the calls for more transparency from the pharmaceutical industry. Nehauser confirmed. It's possible his client will pursue this issue next year with Amgen management, he said.

Other drug makers being pushed by stockholders for more transparency about their pricing decisions include some of the largest pharmaceutical companies in the country. SEC staff in February blocked proposals filed with Biogen, Bristol-Myers, Eli Lilly, Gilead Sciences, Merck & Co., Pfizer and Vertex Pharmaceuticals, according to SEC records. The campaign by faith-based investors, many of them members of an interfaith push for corporate responsibility, doesn't appear to be finished. The SEC staff's decision not to recommend any enforcement action against drug makers for ignoring these shareholder requests only covers this year, so they could be back.

"The first shareholder proposal on drug pricing that I'm aware of was successful in the 1990s," Neuhauser said. "There have been successful ones since. I think the problem this year was more the way it worded than the basic notion."

Shareholders in three 2015 cases overcame a drug maker's resistance to producing its pricing data, according to Neuhauser. In each case, the companies argued like Amgen that investors were trying to micromanage the business operations, yet SEC staff rejected the argument Neuhauser presented in January in writing. The former law school professor pointed to other SEC's staff opinions regarding drug companies and price-setting.

"This is not too intricate a matter for shareholders to understand. Note that it is the rate of increase that is being requested, not the actual prices charged. Indeed, the proposal 'micromanages' significantly less than the proposals that were deemed not to micromanage in Celgene Corp. (March 9, 2015), Vertex Pharmaceuticals Inc. (February 25, 2015) and Gilead Sciences, Inc. (February 23, 2015)," he wrote.

Calls to Amgen representatives for comment about the pricing of its leading drug therapies went unreturned as of late last week. The company's website did not mention the SEC lawyer's favorable ruling.


Amgen had product sales of \$21.9 billion last year, and total revenues increased six percent, according to 2016 financials. Drug sales grew six percent in 2016 over the previous year, led by a 49 percent increase in sales of Blincyto for leukemia patients. The company's other big gainers for the year included Kyprolis for treatment of myeloma--up 35 percent--and bone-density-building Prolia, which was up 25 percent in annual sales.

The top-10 sellers for Amgen, which the shareholder group targeted in its proposal, generated \$16.6 billion for the biotech firm last year. Only a dozen or so drug companies outsell this Southern California success story.

The company can choose to address at its annual shareholder meeting the drug-pricing issue and the risks from the current political debate over healthcare costs in the nation's and state capitals, but for now the federal government watchdog over publicly traded companies won't force pharmaceutical makers to say anything. This ruling is corporate America's version of the Miranda rule. The SEC decided a drug maker has the right to remain silent, even when it's the investorowners of the company asking the questions. •
