## Process To Enhance Safety at Torrance Refinery Moves Forward

Packed to the brim with a standing room-only crowd, Tuesday night's Torrance City Council meeting was another of the many gatherings to come in the effort to ensure the safety of the local refinery and its surrounding community.

For the Council's consideration that evening were two resolutions: The first, presented by Councilman Tim Goodrich, asked to phase out Modified Hydrofluoric Acid in exchange for safer alternatives; and the second was an alternative resolution supporting efforts to work with government agencies, elected officials and all interested parties in addressing safety concerns and finding a viable solution for the task at hand. The Council unanimously approved the latter resolution.

"My concerns about the safety of this chemical are, I think, validated in the EPA report that came out," Goodrich said. "I am not going to attribute some of the things that were in that report to Torrance Refinery Company because they were only owners of this refinery for four short months after taking it over from ExxonMobil when this investigation occurred. I believe that is too short a time to blame on the company."

Concerns regarding the safety of Hydrofluoric Acid (HF--a solution of hydrogen fluoride in water that is a colorless, highly corrosive solution that has the power to dissolve many materials) and Modified Hydrofluoric Acid (MHF) are not new among residents. However, the amount of recent incidents at the refinery, such as fires and explosions, has brought the safety issues to the forefront of community concerns.

"I wouldn't participate in a science experiment without giving consent, which is why I don't consume GMOs--but I had a choice to be able to do that, but I don't have a choice to

whether I am going to breathe the air in Torrance," said Brian Hitchcock, a resident who wants to ban MHF and supported Goodrich's phase-out proposal. "I don't play games of chance where the odds are unknown and the downside is virtually unlimited. I have a good life, I have a good home, I have a good job and I have many fine friends here and all I would hate to lose."

While support for banning MHF was strong among residents in attendance, there was also a large group of Torrance residents who work at the refinery asking the Council to reconsider an absolute ban. "Families are being supported by this refinery, so I have to oppose this ban on MHF because it does not give enough

consideration to the economic impact that it will cause," Torrance resident and refinery worker Neal Miller said. "Unemployment has a high correlation with depression and domestic violence and violent crime and I think that it needs to be considered when talking about the risk to the community. In this era of Internet petitions it is easy to reduce politics to binary variables in a zero-sum game, but it does not have to be like that."

The approved alternate resolution will move forward with the City's plans to work alongside the following agencies/elected officials to ensure the safety of the refinery and the community without imposing a ban that is argued

## "Grease Girl" Teaches Women About Their Cars

Kristin Cline likes to work on her car on the weekends and she's not squeamish about the grease and grime. When she pulls on her mechanic coveralls and leans into the engine compartment of her classic Studebaker, she feels at ease. She thinks more women should try it, popping their car's hood and getting familiar with what's under there.

Lately, she's had less time for her 1955 Studebaker because she's leading a Saturday car-clinic class for women. Cline is an automotive writer during the week with a blog called "Grease Girl." Her classroom is a garage at the Automobile Driving Museum in El Segundo, where she teaches

the "Ladies Car Care 101" clinic. It's a starter class, drawing sometimes as many as two dozen women who come knowing a little, not a lot, about cars. "Knowing certain things about your car can mean more confidence when you're driving it," Cline said.

The garage always was the domain of men, starting when they're boys. So many women think of car maintenance and repair as a guy thing, which "Grease Girl" found out firsthand when she bought her Studebaker and began restoring it. She'd attend classic car shows and often was the only woman there. But, that's changing as women become auto technicians and mechanics.

## Community Briefs

### Torrance Police Department Shoulder-Tap Decoys

The Torrance Police Department recently participated in a "Decoy Shoulder-Tap" operation on March 11 within its city's limits. During the operation, the Department utilized two decoys which resulted in five random locations visited/checked; 20 subjects contacted; and one subject cited for furnishing alcohol to a minor (misdemeanor).

During the operation, a minor under the direct supervision of a peace officer stands outside a liquor or convenience store and asks patrons to buy them alcohol. The minor indicates in some way he or she is underage and cannot purchase alcohol. If the adult agrees, and purchases alcohol for the minor, officers will arrest and cite them for furnishing alcohol to the minor. The penalty is a minimum \$1,000 fine and 24 hours community service.

The Torrance Police Department is one of

over 80 agencies to collaborate with agents from the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control in a statewide underage drinking enforcement operation wherein 447 individuals were arrested. The goal of the operation was to raise awareness about the dangers of underage drinking and also make it clear to any adults that buy alcohol for minors that there are serious consequences. The operation is also an effort to build safer and stronger communities by holding individuals accountable for illegal activity that creates harm.

Many of the local operations were funded by the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control through the Department's Grant Assistance Program (GAP) and some were funded by the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

### Torrance DUI Checkpoint Leads to Arrests, Citations

The Torrance Police Department Traffic Unit conducted a DUI/Driver's License checkpoint on March 17 in the 3400 block of Torrance Boulevard between the hours of 8 p.m. and 3 a.m. Checkpoints are placed in locations that have the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence and provide the greatest safety for officers and the public.

High Visibility Enforcements, which include DUI/Driver's License checkpoints, have been shown to lower DUI deaths and injuries. A

major component of these checkpoints are the deterrent effects it has on those who might drive alcohol or drug impaired, bringing about more awareness and encouraging everyone to use sober designated drivers.

Throughout the evening, 865 vehicles passed through the checkpoint, which resulted in 700 vehicles screened, five DUI-alcohol suspects arrested, four drivers cited/arrested for operating a vehicle unlicensed or while suspended/revoked, one misdemeanor cite/arrest, and three citations issued.

Cline discovered that "the car world is a really fun place to be and the garage can be fun." The classic car project was her path to a writing career and her blog. Cars can be like that, too. There's linkage between random happenings under the hood that fuel, power, cool and control a vehicle. Career moves are easier to predict than a car breakdown, though.

Some basic knowledge and terminology about horsepower and cars can be a confidence-builder for a woman, Cline noted, adding that though a woman may not do her own tune-up or oil change, she should know what system of the car and parts they involved. "We talk in class about gaining vocabulary. It helps to understand why a repair is costing you so much," she said, likening the experience to a visit to the doctor. Trained mechanics and doctors both have specialized training and are skilled at diagnosing a problem. It helps to know what they're talking about--and specifically with a car repair, what a broken part does and why it needs to be replaced.

"Ladies Car Care 101" doesn't expect them to know about cars, though some can identify the radiator, which holds the engine coolant. The air cleaner and the carburetor at the top of the engine aren't always a mystery to the ladies. The museum keeps a Cadillac Deville in the garage, which comes in handy for Cline's

class. The women surround the old Cadillac as she opens the hood. Then, they do a pretty typical guy thing. They look at the engine, trying to figure it out.

For the next two hours, "Grease Girl" explains the engine parts, the transmission, the brakes and tires. Class time is a slow trip through the working systems of the internal combustion engine. Along the way, students pick up the terminology of the repair shop mechanic: timing belt, master cylinder, engine coolant, wheel alignment. They also hear about car maintenance from Cline and why it's better to pay a little now rather than a lot later. "We'll talk about various maintenance things under the hood," she said. "Checking your fluid levels, checking your oil, checking your tires, using a tire gauge to check the PSI [pounds per square inch] and how to add air to your tire."

Regular oil changes and keeping tires properly inflated are the simplest ways to give their vehicle tender loving care, the women are told. After all, it's a machine with fast-moving parts that create friction and heat. The coolant in the radiator system prevents the car from overheating, and the oil lubricates and protects engine parts. Warning lights alert drivers about low levels of these critical fluids, and Cline says don't ignore them. "A lot of people don't

### Torrance Baseball Coming on Strong

Torrance High's game against the Redondo Union Sea Hawks last Wednesday afternoon went much like the team's entire season has gone so far this year. The top-ranked Tartars have struggled with a few uncharacteristic losses in the early going, but have recently been able to find their groove to put together some nice wins. Against Redondo, pitcher Dante Mendoza struggled early as the Sea Hawks got out to a 3-0 lead in the first inning. Much like the Tartars have done, though, Mendoza found his groove as the offense sparked late in the game and the Tartars pulled out a 10-3 victory in the first game of a doubleheader at Kendall Field.

When Torrance trailed 3-0 in the first inning of the doubleheader, it looked like Mendoza and the rest of the Tartars were going to be in for a very long day. Jose Aceves, Gabe Pech and Danny Zimmerman all came around to touch home plate in the first inning before Mendoza finally settled down and started to hit his spots. "His pitches were up in the first inning--that's why he experienced problems," Torrance head coach Terry DeWan explained. "Then he started driving the ball downhill and he's tough when he throws downhill."

After the Tartars got out of a rough first inning, everything went downhill for Redondo from there. Sophomore Neil Feist got the scoring started for Torrance, plating two runs in the third inning with a single over the second base pad. Still down by one run in the fourth, Alex Gallegos began what would turn into an excellent offensive day for the senior. Gallegos singled and eventually came around to score the game-tying run to lock things up at 3-3 before a monster fifth inning would open the floodgates.

Gallegos was back, this time with a two-run double before junior BJ Becerra knocked in two runs with a double of his own. Five hits and seven runs later, the nightmare inning was finally over for opposing pitcher Chet Wilson and his relief, Gabe Pech. Gallegos was the key cog on offense, enjoying a night in which he had three hits, scored two runs and knocked in two. Senior Noah Ishikawa also had one hit and an RBI while scoring two runs, and Taishi Nakawake had two hits and a run scored. On the mound, Mendoza gave up six hits and three runs in five innings while striking out eight. His relief, Eric Small, closed the game out with two innings of hitless ball while striking out two.

The Tartars would go on to win the second game of the doubleheader as well, although it was much closer throughout. Torrance trailed 6-5 heading into the seventh inning of play before Becerra tied things up to send it into extra innings. In the bottom of the 10th, junior Logan Young was the hero, drawing a walk to force in the game-winning run. Gallegos pitched 4.1 innings, giving up five hits and two earned runs. Ishikawa was

strong in relief, going two innings and allowing just one hit with four strikeouts. The Tartars (7-5) will now head into the Anaheim Lions Tournament and the Redondo Beach Tournament before finally getting into their first league matchup of the season against South High.

#### North High

The North High Saxons are bunched in at the top of the Pioneer League standings with their rivals from around the city of Torrance in what looks to be a very elite division this season. Despite their impressive play to start the year, North took a 3-0 loss to Palos Verdes last Thursday afternoon in what was a minor setback for head coach Mike Neily and his team. Opposing pitcher Matthew Johnson pitched all seven innings while allowing just four hits and striking out five batters. Erik Anderson, Nick Criss and Joeseeph Moussalli were responsible for all three runs in the shutouts.

Despite the loss, North (7-2) remains in second place in the very early Pioneer League standings. Neily's team will begin Pioneer League play this Wednesday with a two-game set against the Leuzinger Olympians before moving on to play the first place West High Warriors.

#### West High

The West High Warriors have been on a tear lately, ripping through every opponent that they've take on so far. Coach Juan Cueva's first place team in the Pioneer League (10-2) won five games in a row heading into this year's Anaheim Lions Tournament. The first game of the tournament was against the Apple Valley Sun Devils and put quite a scare into the West High faithful. An early 2-0 lead disappeared in the six and seventh innings when the Sun Devils tied things up to send the game into extra innings. The Warriors were able to pull out the victory in the bottom of the eighth inning to advance to the next round. They'll take on their rivals from North High next Wednesday afternoon to open up league play.

#### South High

After starting the season off hot, the South High Spartans have now fallen victims to an offensive slump. Winners of four of their first five games of the season, South and head coach Grady Sain have now lost three in a row and have been shut out in two straight. South's loss to the Peninsula Panthers last Thursday afternoon came at the hands of Matthew Meskin. Meskin pitched seven full innings of one-hit ball while striking out nine batters. Junior Jacob McNally got the only hit of the game for the Spartans, who lost in extra innings on a sacrifice fly by Ben Zuercher to score the only run of the game. Junior Kevin Ishimaru pitched seven innings of four-hit ball while striking out six before Jonathan Martz came on in relief to give up the game-winner. The Spartans will begin league play next Wednesday afternoon against the Leuzinger Olympians.

## A Park by the Sea

The city of Torrance shines in the South Bay as a jewel. Quite often, I refer to our city as such when explaining where I live and work. From the historic downtown area meticulously planned by Olmsted and Gill, who were hired by our founder, Jared Sydney Torrance, to the cliffs at Torrance Beach above the sea where the Hollywood Riviera Beach Club once stood, Torrance remains an All American city. One of my favorite places in the city and one of my favorite parks among the many here in Torrance is Miramar Park.

The other afternoon, I took a drive to the ocean and parked right next to the grass at Miramar Park. As I meandered through the park, I gazed at the magnificent ocean and noticed lots of activity. Small children with their parents, and lots of dogs on leashes were making use of the grass, the air and the view. Two sweet dogs were playing with each other under the watchful eyes of both owners. The little brown dog, a miniature Australian Shepherd named Quinn, and a mutt (as described by its owner) by the name

After Quinn and Gypsy's playful romp, Quinn hit the "Fido Fountain" located in the middle of Miramar Park for quick refreshment of pure water. The fountain was installed on April 25, 1990. The double basin, one for

humans and one for dogs, refresh both man and beast.

On the front end of the park, I spied an energetic two-and-a-half-year-old by the name of Kelly running up the grass with his babysitter Tiffany in tow. Little ones love this park as much as adults. There are trees low enough to hang onto and a dolphin to sit on, although I noticed the dolphin was fenced in when I visited and that must mean it is being refurbished.

Overlooking the park facing the Pacific sits a large sculpture of a frog and a plaque with the inscription, "'Dreaming of the Kiss' donated to the City of Torrance in memory of Sandi Walker who spent her life giving to others 1942-2006." I had the privilege of knowing Sandi Walker and her life was indeed all about giving. She gave and served here in the South Bay, in addition to being heavily involved in Los Angeles, helping children less fortunate. Sandi was the type of person who didn't let her right hand know that the left was giving. She never spoke of what she did for others. Sandi Walker was an inspiration and I often think of her and appreciate the tribute to her at this most beautiful park, for she truly was a philanthropist.

Folklore, history and mysterious stories surround Miramar Park from all angles and

depending upon whom you ask, you get different histories with different insights. Pauline Shaw told me she grew up in the "Hollywood Riviera," as it is known, near Torrance Beach in the '50s and '60s, and

shared her memories. "I remember huts on the beach," she said. "There was a time around 1960 or so and something happened up from Torrance Beach--up on the cliffs. There were no homes there at the time and people would hike around where the Indian burial grounds were. I remember they found posts with feathers and an old blanket that was unearthed on top of a very old body. There was a big inquiry because Native American Indians [Tongva] had long ago lived along the shore, but there weren't many left because they were killed off. Someone came in and attacked them long ago... or so the story goes. There were also caves along the coast, not far from where the *SS Dominator* ran ashore into the Palos Verdes Peninsula in 1961." Pauline continued with her story, "The American Indians had lost their land and were upset because the burial grounds were disturbed [the body they found back then was very old]. I hiked up there and saw it, but we left it alone. We also found artifacts above Torrance Beach--pieces of pottery, and abalone shells. When we were kids, my uncle, who was a Navy Seal, would go in the water and get abalone for us. They were adventurous, fun times! We would also find hieroglyphs up from Torrance Beach [on the cliffs]. There were horses and other things written on the cliffs--before the homes were

built when there was simply sand dunes and cliffs." Listening to Pauline's memories of on and around the cliffs, and Torrance Beach, allowed me a fuller understanding of all the folklore attached to this land.

Long ago, a friend, Marlene Dunn, told me a story about Miramar Park. She and her husband had raised their children in the Hollywood Riviera and loved the ocean and Torrance. I remember her telling me that around the late 1970s and '80s, their homeowners association was very active in keeping the 1.6 acres at 201 Paseo de la Playa and Calle Miramar as open space. She told me that her husband was instrumental in saving the land from developers. In fact, there was a move to name the park "Dunn Park," which he absolutely refused to allow. According to Marlene, Miramar Park might have been called Dunn Park. Interesting, huh?

Most areas have their own unique and colorful history, and the land in and around Miramar Park most definitely holds its share of stories, as I discovered. But one thing has always been true of the area we call Torrance Beach, Miramar Park, and R.A.T. Beach and

of Gypsy, were having a wonderful time jumping and playing on the grass. The two dogs apparently enjoyed being photographed because after I took a picture of them, they both lunged at me as if wanting me to play with them. Alpha dog I am not, and I am not sure if Cesar Millan from *The Dog Whisperer* would approve, but I enjoyed meeting those two canine sweethearts.

will lead the refinery's closure: California Interagency Refinery Task Force; California Environmental Protection Agency (Cal EPA) in developing the California Accidental Release Prevention (CalARP); California Department of Industrial Relations (DIR)-Occupational Safety & Health Standards Board (OSHSB) for Process Safety Management for Petroleum Refineries; Torrance Refining Company and Southern California Edison electrical reliability project; U.S. Chemical Safety Board; Congress members Maxine Waters and Ted Lieu; Assembly member Al Muratsuchi; the Los Angeles Board of Supervisors; and the South Coast Air Quality Management District--which is in the rulemaking process for Rule 118 and Rule 140 relating directly to flaring events and the continued use of MHF.

"As you all know, the Air District [AQMD] has announced that it will undertake rulemaking on the use of HF and a potential ban on HF. The District's rulemaking process will include a very public process with a working group and opportunities for comments," President, PBF Western Region Jeffrey Dill said. "The process will also include a full CEQA [California Environmental Quality Act] analysis of any proposed rule. That CEQA analysis will include the issues of the impacts of any substitutes for HF, as well as the market and

socioeconomic impact of a ban."

While many supporters of the ban expressed over and over again that their goal is not to shut down the refinery, Dill reassured the Council and everyone in attendance that given the current technology, there is no timeline or capital investment that would allow for banning HF and keeping the refinery open.

"Capital investment will be chocked and the viability of the refinery will be threatened long before the effective date of a ban," Dill said. "Many have expressed views on this--but none of them have the responsibility of making sure that resources are available to properly maintain and operate the facility and keep it safe for our employees, contractors and the community and to continue delivering fuel to motorists, the airports and the harbors. That responsibility is mine."

Despite the rejection of Goodrich's resolution, he pledged his support to work with all stakeholders in order to ensure the safety of the refinery's employees and the surrounding community. "Perhaps I am an eternal optimist, but I would like to think that there is a third way. I would like to think that if both sides work together hard, we can find a safer alternative and save the jobs--and that is a conversation we need to have with other elected officials," Goodrich said. •

know what the different warning lights mean in their cars," she said. "Is it an emergency that needs pulling over and stopping or can they keep going to their destination?"

Ignoring a warning light that is an emergency light can be a very expensive driver error, so Cline covers the most common warning signs that women and men should heed. If the engine temperature light is showing, that's a serious one. So is the engine oil light, even if the car is new or just had an oil change. "This could

change the brakes themselves, yet a Saturday in the garage with the "Grease Girl" is where horsepower meets consumer power.

"I'm not calling for everyone to be a car enthusiast or expert--just have a basic knowledge about car systems, how they work, and about car maintenance," Cline said. "A little knowledge about your car can go a long way."

Having been the only woman at car shows and in the garage when she started rebuilding her Studebaker, Cline had to get over

be a tipoff that the drain plug isn't tight or it fell out, and the oil has all drained out," Cline said, adding that engine-damaging problems aren't limited to older cars. "Even if a car is brand new and a light comes on, it could be something serious."

There's a perception among men and women that cars are too complicated to understand, so they don't even attempt it. Cline thinks she understands why: Today's cars have gotten so efficient, they don't break down as often. Even the guys have stopped learning about their cars and trusted the maintenance to a garage or the dealer, but even choosing a qualified mechanic takes a little know-how about their training and car talk.

"Ladies Car Care 101" offers some garage time without the guys, though Cline says she may open a class later for men and women. Her plans include a more in-depth class about changing the oil and a tire too. The women who turn out to these classes at Automobile Driving Museum never tune up their cars or


the feeling of being out of her element. Men feel more comfortable talking about cars and standing around a shop because they were raised that way. The garage can be a strange and intimidating place for a woman, especially a car repair shop. Her message to the class: Don't be afraid to ask good questions.

Cline's classes for the South Bay are small, drawing between 12 to 27 beginners, and not really hands-on. The women who gathered around the classic Cadillac at last month's clinic didn't get their hands dirty or take home dirt under their fingernails. That'll come later for the ones who, like "Grease Girl," decide to work on their cars as a hobby.

For the majority of the beginners, they were connecting the dots between the spark plugs and the ignition, the oil cap and moving pistons, and the gas pedal and the transmission. And, they discovered there's personal power in horsepower. Being an informed car owner, they can deal with a mechanic more confidently and be safer out on the road. •


