Extension Approved for Low to Moderate-Income Housing

In a unanimous vote during Tuesday night's Torrance City Council meeting, a resolution was approved to grant a time extension for the development of low- to moderate-income housing on the property located at 1316-1320 Cabrillo Avenue. "This is a one-time, five-year extension to allow for additional time for the Housing Successor Agency to retain ownership of the property for the future development of low- and moderate-income housing," Nina Lang with Community Development Department said. "If at the end of this five-year period activities to develop this property have not been initiated, the property would need to be sold and the proceeds returned to the housing fund."

The recommendation made by Community Development Director Jeffrey W. Gibson asked that the Council exercise its authority as the Housing Successor Agency to the former Redevelopment Agency of the City of Torrance. With the approval of the resolution, the Council has established a new timeframe for the property to be developed into low- and moderate-income housing, which is in accordance to Health and Safety Code Sections 33334.16 and 34176.

"Prior to the dissolution of redevelopment agencies, the Redevelopment Agency of the City of Torrance had acquired various properties with the Low- and Moderate-Income Housing set-aside funds," states the staff report signed by Gibson. "Properties owned by the Redevelopment Agency, including those purchased with housing set-aside funds, were conveyed to the City of Torrance on March 8 and March 29, 2011."

By January 10, 2012 the Council adopted Resolution 2012-02 through which it decided to retain the housing assets along with the all of the functions carried out by the Redevelopment Agency--including all rights, powers, duties, obligations and hosing assets. However, based on the state's health and safety code 33334.16, the initiation of activities to develop property with low- and moderate-income housing must take place within five years from the date of acquisition. Since development efforts have not begun and the five-year time limit to begin construction is set

to expire on September 5, 2017, it was necessary for the City to approve another extension.

With regards to the property itself, if nothing has been built within the new five-year extension period, the City can still keep the land so long as a contract is signed with the developer prior to the five-year extension period expiration. "We were buying parcels along Cabrillo with the idea to actually redevelop that whole area, and the state actually seized redevelopment agency--which stuck us with some surplus property, which

Is the Region Really at Full Employment?

Matthew Fienup looks at the same jobs data as other economists, yet he's convinced something is missing. The Southern California-based economist is suspicious about the supposed strength of the job market and the state's economy. He's not convinced it's accurate. "We see California and the U.S. well below potential," he said.

That view puts him at odds with other economists who believe the region is at "full employment" and that the economy is strong. Fiend, who calls himself a "contrarian" on such points, has released an early-2017 economic report with implications for South Bay employers

and employees. One of his findings is California's economy is slipping and the state is losing its tax revenue and people.

"Decades of policy experimentation are having an effect," he wrote. "In addition, growth in state revenues has declined in recent months." He cites an unfriendly business environment, heavy regulation and tax levels for restraining California's mighty economy. State leaders like to say it's the sixth largest in the world, while others say it's the 11th biggest because of high business costs.

Other economists see unemployment hovering near five percent and call that full employment. Fienup disagrees with

Police Briefs

Torrance PD Ramps up Efforts to Deter Distracted Driving

April is recognized as National Distracted Driving Awareness Month. In California, the Office of Traffic Safety (OTS), The Torrance Police Department, CHP, local law enforcement, and community partners throughout the state are working together to make the roads safer by highlighting the dangers of being distracted while driving, especially by cell phones.

The Torrance Police Department will join other law enforcement agencies throughout the state to provide educational experiences as well as zero tolerance enforcement efforts to discourage distracted driving. Officers will have a special emphasis this month on enforcing all cell phone and distracted driving laws. The goal is to gain voluntary compliance by drivers, but sometimes citations are necessary for motorists to better understand the importance of driving distraction free.

The Torrance PD is deploying extra traffic officers with grant-funded resources on April 12 and 26 in city locations with higher numbers of traffic collisions. Violators will be stopped and cited with fines set at \$162 for first-time offenders. This campaign is funded by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Lawmakers agree that distracted driving continues to be a growing problem among California's motorists. Assembly Bill 1785 went into effect on January 1, requiring all drivers in California to keep their cell phone out of their hands while operating a motor vehicle. Under the new law, a driver may activate or deactivate a feature or function of the cell phone or wireless communication device by swiping or tapping its screen only if it is properly mounted or not being held in a driver's hand. Specific information on the new law can be found at www.ots.ca.gov.

The Office of Traffic Safety will begin a new public awareness campaign throughout the state in April emphasizing how the new law makes virtually all hand-held cell phone activity illegal—talking, texting and using apps. The campaign aims to end distracted driving through education and raise awareness about the associated dangers. The goal is to change motorists' behaviors and save lives, not just in the month of April but year-round.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports that 3,477 people were killed and an estimated 391,000 injured in motor vehicle collisions involving distracted drivers in 2015. That is a nine percent increase in fatalities as compared to the previous year. •

Church That Received Queen's Award Beautifies Wilson Park

On Sunday, March 26, 2017 about 70 members from the local World Mission Society Church of God cleaned up Charles H. West High Finishes in State's Top 10 in LA County Academic Decathlon

Torrance's West High School was one of four Los Angeles County campuses to finish in the top 10 at this year's state-level Academic Decathlon competition that concluded on March 26 in Sacramento. West took the eighth and 10th spots respectively and joined South Pasadena High, West Covina's Edgewood High and Alhambra's Mark Keppel High in the high ranks. Edgewood also won the medium school title, clearing the way for its participation in the United States Academic Decathlon Online National Competitions in April.

Four other L.A. County teams competed in the 2017 California Academic Decathlon: Redondo Union High School, Beverly Hills High School, Alhambra High School and El Rancho High School. These eight teams were the top winners at the Los Angeles

County Academic Decathlon (LACAD) event organized by the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) earlier this year. Nearly 600 students from 67 high schools participated in the state competition, held March 23-26.

Decathlon teams are comprised of students from all grade-point averages. Decathletes are challenged to use analytical skills, performance abilities and test-taking and writing aptitude in 10 subjects: Art, Economics, Essay, Interview, Language & Literature, Math, Music, Social Science, Speech and Super Quiz.

Teams make it to the state and national decathlons based on their scores in local and state competitions. LACOE hosts the county-level competition for all schools in L.A. County except Los Angeles Unified School District, which holds its own competition. •

their optimistic assessment or that anyone who wants a job can find one. What he calls "labor market participation"—the number of Californians actively working or looking for a job—is at the lowest level since 1978, he says. He believes scores of Americans have stopped looking for work. Some are on extended unemployment or have gone on disability and disappeared from the weekly jobs survey.

People continue to leave California for jobs and opportunities elsewhere. For the 25th consecutive year, more residents left than moved into the state, according to census data. This economist is predicting the exodus over the next two years will be even greater.

California has outperformed the U.S. economy for a long time. That's due to a "rich endowment" that includes abundant natural resources, exceptional climate and geographic location, and a legacy of creative and technical innovation. But, "the growth premium that California enjoys over the Nation is shrinking," Fienup says.

The university economist says the regulatory rollbacks and tax-code changes proposed by President Trump could help the local economy, but he's not confident either about Congress passing any significant legislation soon. "We do not believe that the reforms discussed and Tweeted about by the Trump Administration are actually likely to be implemented," he wrote in a summary of quarterly report, which is posted at the Cal Lutheran Center for Economic Studies and Research website.

Rolling back regulations and changing the tax code would be good places for federal policymakers to start, Fienup thinks. California would be less likely to benefit even if "D.C. did get its act together" because the President lost the popular vote here by a 2-to-1 margin. Even on the national level, Fienup is telling business leaders he doesn't think the Trump effect will make that much of a difference.

Governor Jerry Brown has told the new President that California will ignore any regulatory rollback that weakens the state's greenhouse emissions standards, considered the toughest in the nation. Trump on March 28 issued an executive order that overturned Obama-era restrictions on coal-burning at U.S. power plants. Brown vowed earlier this year to keep our tough emission standards in place through the next four years. It's both a direct challenge to the new President and a potential loss of federal money, which the state badly needs.

By comparison, the data presented in the 2017 early forecast shows the U.S. economy lagging compared to 1947-2007. The growth rate over that 60-year period was twice the current rate, the authors note. This economy could not withstand a "significant external shock," Fienup warns, despite record stock market prices.

Making matters worse, Governor Brown and lawmakers are facing their first budget deficit in five years. It's possible that President Trump wouldn't include California in any windfall of federal money from a jobs program or infrastructure buildup.

Sacramento depends on federal dollars for Medicaid recipients. Local police and law enforcement agencies are funded in part by the Department of Justice. The White House says it will withhold federal funds from sanctuary cities that don't enforce federal immigrant policies under the Trump administration. Money needed for the Medicaid expansion under the Affordable Care Act could be on the chopping block too.

Trump lost the popular vote here, so a political payback is a real possibility. The "Trump effect" here could have a different meaning than what supporters and pro-business groups expected after the November election. "Early signs indicate that Trump might actually try to stick it to California," Fienup warns. •

Lady Spartans Looking Like Contenders

Though they have yet to play a game inside of their division, the South High Lady Spartans softball team is quickly proving that they belong on top of the Pioneer League standings. Behind excellent pitching from Maddy Stockslager and the powerful bats of Maisie Weishoff and Sophie Fernandez, to name a few, head coach Tony Flores, Jr. and the rest of the Spartans have been tearing up the competition in the season's early going. With Pioneer League play just around the corner, South is ready to put a five-game winning streak on the line against its rivals from the city of Torrance.

The Spartans are known for putting up runs in the first inning to get ahead of their opponents early this season. When South took on the Peninsula Panthers two weeks ago at home, though, it wasn't the offense that stole the show. The senior pitching ace of the team showed exactly why she's ready to carry the Lady Spartans into the playoffs and perhaps even to a Pioneer League championship this season. Stockslager pitched a gem against the Panthers to bring her team to a win, notching five innings of no-hit ball and striking out 11 batters. While South was excellent on the mound behind Stockslager, the team continued to provide pop at the plate as well. Fernandez, a freshman this year, had four RBIs to lead the team. That was matched only by her teammate, Sommer Kisling, who had four of her own. The great all-around game earned the Spartans a 12-1 victory for their fourth win in a row.

Redondo Union was next on the Spartans' list and the team traveled to South High last Friday night for a nonleague showdown. While Hannah Lilly didn't necessarily have the outing that Stockslager had on the mound, the Spartans' offense was there to back her. After trailing the entire game, Weishoff came to the plate and hit a two-run home run that also scored Fernandez to tie the game. Weishoff was two for three with three RBIs, while Fernandez kept her hot bat alive by going three for four with an RBI and two doubles. South's offense is so explosive that the team is able to find a new hero on a game-to-game basis. This time, it was junior Alyssa Podhurack who delivered the winning swing that sent her team to a nail-biting, yet effective 5-4 victory.

At 10-3-1, the Lady Spartans are certainly proving to be one of the South Bay's elite teams. The real proving begins in league play, though. Coach Flores and South are certainly ready for the challenge and will look to put their talent on full display in

two weeks when the first game of league play takes place against their inner-city rivals from West High.

North High

The Redondo Union Sea Hawks have been the punching bag of Pioneer League teams lately. In addition to losing to the South High Spartans, the Sea Hawks were also swept in back-to-back games last Wednesday afternoon at North High by the Saxons. North put both offense and defense on display in the sweep, outscoring Redondo 10-0 in each game played. Abbi Alexander provided the power in the first game, knocking in four runs on two hits. Lucia Ramirez was the lightning to Alexander's thunder, pitching a one-hit shutout over five innings for the 10-0 win.

As if Ramirez's one-hitter wasn't enough, Kyndra Marzorini led the Saxons' pitching in the second game. Marzorini went five innings without allowing a single hit in the team's second consecutive 10-0 shutout. Marzorini also helped her cause at the plate, providing the team with two runs on a three for four afternoon. The Saxons (6-4) have the power and the pitching that it will take to compete in what is looking like an extremely impressive and competitive Pioneer League this year. North will test its skills in the first week of league play this week with matchups against the West High Warriors and the Leuzinger Olympians.

West High

Of all of the great teams atop the Pioneer League, the West High Warriors may just be the most impressive thus far. The Lady Warriors opened the season with five straight victories and a Redondo Tournament title when they beat the Spartans in the final. Most recently, West shut out the Leuzinger Olympians by a final score of 18-0 last Friday afternoon in the team's first matchup of Pioneer League play. The shutout was West's sixth of the season. Junior Mailee Newman has anchored the pitching staff all season long while performing like one of the best, if not the best, pitcher in the South Bay. Offense hasn't been hard to find either. Behind the contributions of Alizae Umi and the aforementioned Newman, the Warriors' bats are firing on all cylinders. West (11-3, 1-0) will put its elite skills to the test in the team's second game of league play against the North High Saxons this Wednesday afternoon.

Torrance High

The Torrance Tartars and head coach Don Glavich are coming off a season in which the team took a disappointing 5-0 loss in the CIF championship against none other than their rivals from North High. The Tartars

Passover in Torrance

Passover begins on the 15th of Nissan and ends on the 22nd on that month of the Jewish calendar, which corresponds on the modern-day calendar as beginning on Monday, April 10 and lasting until Tuesday, April 18. Passover is an eight-day feast commemorating the emancipation of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt. A Seder meal includes four cups of wine, bitter herbs, matzah, and many other dishes designed to remind participants of the story of the Exodus as it is read throughout the meal.

flowers and antique china adorned the table, which added to the reverence and meaning of the Seder. The table is set with many glasses, dishes and symbolic food interspersed with the story of the Exodus.

Have you ever wondered why the meal is called Passover? Simply, after decades of slavery under the Egyptian pharaohs, God sent Moses to Pharaoh with the message, "Let my people go that they may serve me." Well, Pharaoh refused to let the Jews go, and the first of 10 devastating plagues, which ravaged the Egyptians, began

symbolic food," said Hope. "We hide the 'afikomen' [which is the center piece of three stacked pieces of matzah that is split in half, wrapped and then hidden somewhere in the house]. Then the children go looking for it. We take turns reading through the Haggadah [Passover text guide] and it takes a long time. Dinner could be two and a half hours."

There are lots of preparations and Hope told me that she and her husband Michael also plan on sharing additional Passover dinners with others. Dinner number one will be celebrated with their newly married granddaughter Denise and her husband, Matt Tepfor. Matt's parents host a huge Passover dinner for nearly 40. Dinner number two is at a friend's house, and Hope and Michael host the third Passover dinner at their home with family on the 15th. "This brings back memories of my grandmother, who was a Holocaust survivor, and she brought the customs of Passover [to America] and I am carrying them on. In this modern day, it is important to remind the younger generation of our history," added Hope.

Later, Mark Gelbaum, also a Torrance resident told me, "It [Passover] varies each year. Sometimes we have friends that come over. With my family growing, it's at my daughter's house. For us, it is a potluck, so we each have our own little thing we do. Tradition is to use what is called a Haggadah. It does not have to be a traditional one, so I actually wrote our family Haggadah. The requirement of Passover is to tell the story of the Exodus from Egypt of the Jewish people. We tell it to our children and they'll tell it to their children, and so on down the line. Then comes the traditional meal." Mark also told me his granddaughter, Skylar, age nine, is studying diligently so she can ask the Four Questions (in Hebrew) about why they celebrate Passover. Bravo, and good luck, Skylar!

Then 20-year-old Joshua Schitman shared his memories and family tradition of Passover with me. He told me he remembers celebrating Passover since he was four years old and a large number of family and friends always

gather at his grandmother's house. "The food is delicious. That is what I love about it," said Joshua. "We have Passover at my grandmother's house, my mom's mother's house. She [Elizabeth Canter] is one of the best cooks in the entire world. She is! She always does the cooking and always does a superb job. Her mother used to do it and it brings back memories, and I think she enjoys it." I asked Joshua if he reads through the Haggadah and he says they take turns around the table with everyone reading a paragraph, but they read



Passover Seder.

Have you ever been to a Seder? I have been to a few, but the one that stands out in my mind was the one I attended at my friend Rose Toren's home several years ago. Rose was an Auschwitz Holocaust survivor and author of two books, *Destiny* and *A New Beginning*. Rose died last year at the age of 91. She was a remarkable human being, an incredible inspiration to me and a good friend. Well into her 80s, she cooked and did the yeoman's work of preparing the Passover meal. Rose's home was beautiful and she saw that every detail was attended to for the special feast. Fresh

ending with the last plague--at midnight on the 15th day of Nissan in the year 2448. The last of the 10 plagues on the Egyptians killed all the firstborn, while sparing the children of Israel and "passing over" their homes. Pharaoh chased the Israelites out of Egypt so quickly that their bread didn't have time to rise--hence the unleavened bread at the Passover table.

Torrance resident and former Councilmember Hope Witkowsky told me that since she is the matriarch of her family now, everyone goes to her house for Passover. "Passover means unleavened bread, matzah ball soup, and eating

it in English. Joshua told me he is looking forward to Passover--especially the food. "It is a yearly tradition and it is good to be together with my parents and family," added Joshua. "We do it once a year, so as not to ever forget about it. That is why we do it every year. You want to pass it down."

If you happen to be fortunate enough to be invited to a Passover Seder, enjoy the experience, history and the food because this feast only comes around once a year. And if you are looking forward to hosting, know you are making memories for the entire family. Have a blessed Passover! •

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Sweet Potato Bowl



Ingredients

- 1 large sweet potato
- 2 teaspoons olive oil, separated
- salt and pepper
- 2 Eggland' Best Eggs (large), poached
- 1 cup ground sausage
- 1/2 cup salsa
- 1 avocado, diced

Preparation

1. Heat 1 teaspoon of olive oil in a medium pan over medium/high heat and brown the ground sausage. While the sausage cooks, fill a large pot with a few inches of water and place over medium/high heat until it just starts to simmer.
2. Crack eggs individually into a ramekin or cup and create a gentle whirlpool in the water. Slowly pour the eggs one by one into the water and leave to cook for three minutes.
3. Remove with a slotted spoon and drain on paper towel. While the eggs poach, spiralize the sweet potato using a spiralizer.
4. Heat the other teaspoon of the olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add in the sweet potato noodles and cook until they just begin to soften, about 5-7 minutes. Season with salt and pepper.
5. Transfer the cooked sweet potato noodles into a large bowl. Drain the ground sausage and add to the sweet potato noodles.
6. Toss with 1/2 cup of the salsa. Divide the noodles and sausage between two bowls, top each with diced avocado and a poached egg! •

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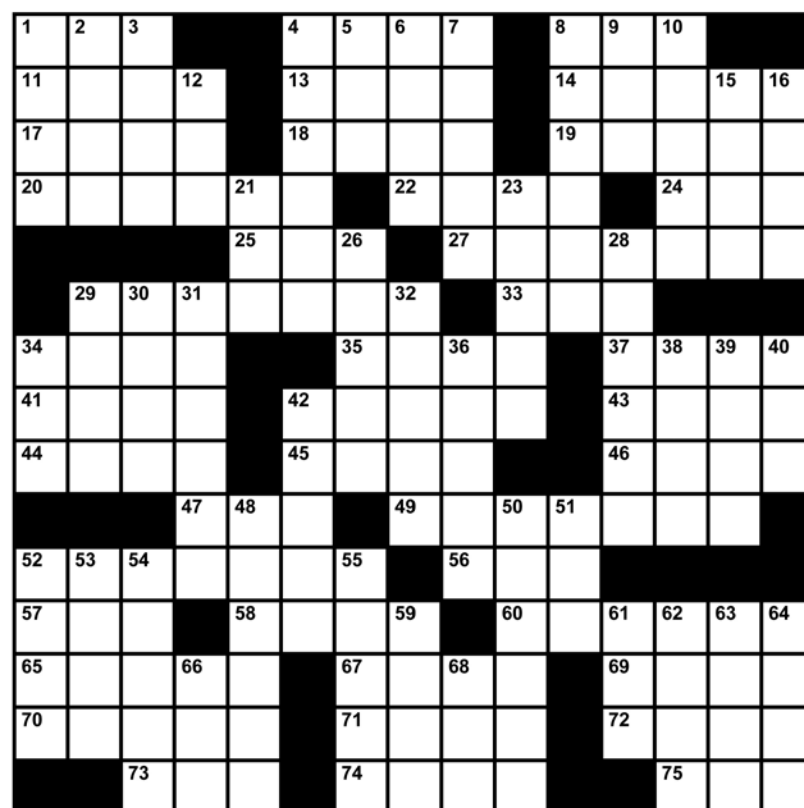

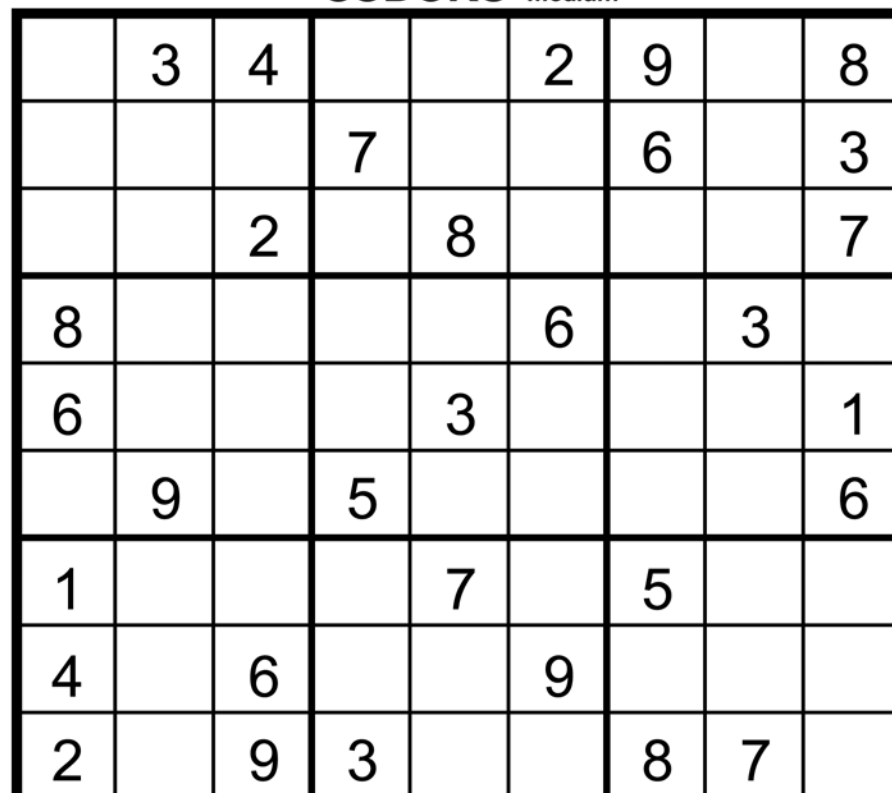

is where 1316 and 1320 are located,” Mayor Patrick Furey said. “There now is the building we are using now for our theater company and we are working actively to keep it viable, but the whole purpose that we purchased it with was for funding for low- to moderate-income housing.”

If at the end of the new extension period there is no development plan in the works, the City is left with a few options. “We are still hopeful that everything will proceed along,” added Mayor Furey. “If not we have five years to either do that or sell it, or acquire it

[meaning City restores the funds].”

Resolution Approved to Vacate Portion of Park Street

The City Council approved a recommendation by the Community Development Director to summarily vacate a portion of Park Street, south of Blair Way. Per a request by the owners of the property located at 24520-25494 Hawthorne Boulevard (Hillside Village), the City approved a request for “vacation of an unused portion of Park Street.” The property is bordered by Park Street on the east, Newton Street on the

north and by Hawthorne Boulevard on the west and south sides.

“This portion of Park Street encumbers a portion of the existing parking lot that serves the Hillside Village, in that area, at the intersection of Blair Way,” Ted Simons with Community Development Department said. “As part of the procedure, we also want to reserve an easement for the adjacent public sewer that is right there.”

Efforts to vacate the outlined easement began with the Council approving Resolution of Intent 75-150 back in 1975, but the process was never

completed with the public hearing process. However public improvements along Park Street have taken place, so the Council was asked to review the current easement vacation request.

“The easement to be vacated has not been used by the public for its intended purpose in well over five years, so it may be vacated summarily as per state law,” reads the staff report signed by Gibson. “The appropriate utility companies and City departments have been notified of this vacation and no opposition to this request has been received.” •

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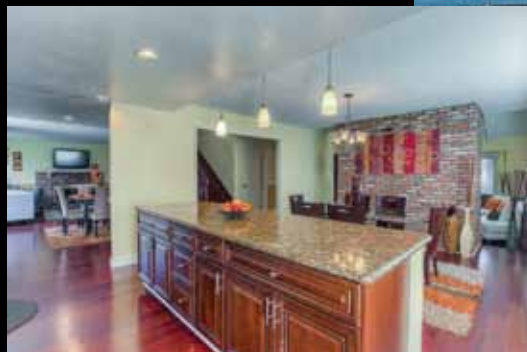
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
