Approved Ordinance Prohibits Short-Term Rentals Within City Limits

A unanimous vote by the Torrance Mayor and City Council approved an Ordinance to ban short-term rentals in the city. The recommendation made by the city's Development Director, Jeffrey W. Gibson, came to the council after the body directed city staff to provide information on Internet sharing services for short-term vacation rentals, on May 5, 2015.

In recent years short-term rentals have become a popular alternative for vacationers trying to save money on lodging expenses by avoiding hotels. For property owners, who can join marketplace groups online to provide lodging accommodations, short-term rentals have become a convenient source for extra income.

At the time of the Ordinance's approval, the city's municipal cod did not prohibit the existence of short-term rentals within city limits. However, city officials have received various emails from residents asking that the city take action against short-term rentals.

"The draft ordinance is modeled after the City of West Hollywood and City of Seal Beach, both of which ban short term rentals," states the staff report signed by Gibson. "Various negative secondary impacts have been associated with short term rentals such as increased noise, traffic, parking demand and other city services."

The city council received a Land Use Study [LSU16-00001] on March 1 in order to consider regulating short-term vacation rentals within city. It was at the hearing that the council directed staff to prepare the ordinance to prohibit SVRs.

"The prohibition of short term rentals in the City is being done to preserve the quality of life in residential neighborhoods as these types of rentals are typically considered commercial in nature," states the staff report. "The ordinance

provides definitions for advertising, hosting platform, rent and short term rental."

As defined by the ordinance, short-term rentals are prohibited for any commercial and residential purposes, in any residentially-zoned property, or part of it for less than 29 days. Also prohibited by the ordinance is the advertising

and use of property for rentals such as weddings or large parties; however, churches have been labeled exempt when they are located in a residentially-zoned area.

Advocating in favor of short-term rentals was the Los Angeles Short Term Rental Alliance,

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Film Review

“Approaching the Unknown” Won’t Have the Search Team Called

Apparently, movies have yet to learn by now the dangers of sending but a few scarce humans—in this case, just one—beyond Earth’s reaches and into the vastness of space to save humanity from some planet-threatening problem. Of course, this risk of the ‘what can go wrong’ variety, drives a time-tested plot of which audiences are readily entertained; just look at recent cinema, “The Martian,” “Interstellar,” and “Gravity” for proof.

The real danger that movies should be wary

enough to discover a process to create water from dirt and fearless enough to disobey orders to manually fix his ship in a bind from Earth-residing NASA engineer and old pal Louis ‘Skinny’ Skinner (Luke Wilson), his cold exterior doesn’t lend itself to drawing the audience in, and proves the whole thing could use a little more humor and heart.

You can tell before it’s over that “Approaching the Unknown” is a movie that didn’t spend its efforts trying to differentiate itself from other sci-fi movies as it does attempting to cash in on their successes. Sure, a few flashback

of is building a story around this premise alone, and without adding anything new to the equation. The result, which the latest solo-in-space-survival flick “Approaching the Unknown” shows, is that audiences will fail to care if that character is fated to drift further and aimlessly out of orbit and into the forgotten beyond. While there might be enough familiar elements to satisfy those who are looking for something akin to background-watching, “Approaching the Unknown” doesn’t have enough original elements to generate the inertia of interest necessary to captivate viewers in its own right.

The astronaut whose fate we are tied to is William D. Stanaforth (Mark Strong), on a one-way, sacrificial trip to Mars to colonize the planet for the rest of humanity—if he doesn’t perish before arriving. A former military man with instinctual intelligence and steely conviction, Stanaforth is also loaded with lazily tacked-on self-affirmations (“I’m not going to Mars to die; I’m going there to live.”), making him a comparable but cliché fixture to spend a full ninety minutes with.

Strong, last seen in this year’s underperforming Sacha Baron Cohen spy-spoof “The Brothers Grimsby,” lends his action-hero looks and serious resolve to playing Stanaforth and it’s to the actor’s strengths that he brings the character to life. While he seems like the perfect person to have in a real-life situation—brilliant scenes of Stanaforth convey his detachment from non-existent family and friends back home, but there’s nothing beyond his person that amounts to be developed. You’re probably already braced for when the solitarily-confined character loses his grip on reality, talking to himself and hallucinating characters from his emotional past. But all of this within the first twenty minutes? It fast-tracks all of what the movie has to offer in the blast-off stage alone.

While “The Martian,” “Interstellar,” and “Gravity,” show that battling elements and confronting the certainty of death can do more than simply entertain audiences (each being commercially and critically received and Awards-positioned), Strong’s strengths aren’t in the department of amiability and warmth, unlike Matt Damon in “Martian,” or Matthew McConaughey in “Interstellar (or even Tom Hanks in “Apollo 13”), actors whose ingenuity comes second to their naturally likable selves. It seems the bigger irony that first-time writer/director Mark Elijah Rosenberg doesn’t get right in his directorial debut is that the greater the dazzling technology, the greater a natural human presence must be there for us to relate to. Unfortunately, it doesn’t look like the search team will be getting called for this failed mission.

“Approaching the Unknown” is rated R for language. Now playing in select theaters and On Demand. •

Rivalry Goes North

The North High Saxons softball team received the opportunity that they had been waiting for all season long. After losing to a higher-seeded Torrance Tartars team in the first game of league play earlier in the season, the Saxons and head coach Howard Miller were out for revenge. The team thought that they were better than the Tartars, but Torrance was getting all of the love in the rankings. North and Torrance wound up tying for first place in the Pioneer League standings at season’s end, and once the playoffs started, both teams took off. Four straight wins later, they would meet in this year’s CIF Southern Section Division 4 softball final.

A movie director could not have scripted it any better; two cross-town rival teams that hated each other playing in the championship game for all of the marbles with Alyssa Loza, a transfer from Torrance High, on the mound for North. Loza dazzled. A three-hit, complete game, shutout effort from Loza got her team a 5-0 win in the final to make the North High Saxons this year’s CIF softball champions.

“I think there was definitely a little nerves going on early,” Loza said of her magnificent performance last Saturday morning. As good as Loza was, she did, in fact, start the game off slowly.

Throughout the first two innings of play, Loza walked five batters, but managed to get out of both innings unscathed.

“I just had to change my mentality,” she continued. “I hit my spots and knew my defense was going to back me up.” From there on out, Loza truly did hit her spots and her defense was there for support.

After Loza loaded the bases in the first inning by walking batters, she was able to get out of the jam by striking out opposing pitcher, Marissa Moreno, to end the inning. Loza loaded the bases again in the second, as if preferring to work under pressure, and this time struck out Torrance’s CeCe Da Costa to keep the game scoreless for the time being. While Loza was working in and out of jams, Moreno was pitching a gem. Three hitless innings to begin the game on the Torrance side of the field kept the game scoreless through the third inning in what was turning out to be a pitcher’s duel. That’s when Shonnie Baker had enough.

Baker led things off in the fourth inning with a single to get on base and start what became

an eventual miniature rally. After Veronica Garcia got a base hit to move Baker over, a wild pitch eventually led to the first run of the game as Baker came across the plate. In her very next at-bat, Baker made her case for player of the game as she crushed a home run over the outfield fence, driving in two runs. The three-run shot not only invigorated an already motivated team, but also served to put the game out of reach by making it 5-0 with only two innings left to play. “I just felt it, saw the right pitch, and swung for it,” Baker explained of her home run.

Five runs is all that the Saxons and Loza would need to close out the game with confidence. Six more outs came and went for the masterful pitcher, pitching against her former Torrance Tartars team. Loza, who decided to transfer to North High for a chance to be the team’s number one pitcher, certainly looked the part and made the right decision. Her five innings of shutout ball helped capture the Saxons first CIF crown since 2009. “This is a special team,” North coach Howard Miller said of his club. “The girls have been so focused all year and they’ve played their best softball in these big games.”

Torrance (25-10, 9-1), on the other hand, see’s an extremely successful season fall just one win shy of what would have been the team’s second championship in as many years. The Lady Tartars beat Highland in an exciting 1-0, 13-inning game last season to take the title back home to Torrance.

“I couldn’t be more proud of our girls,” Torrance head coach Don Glavich explained after the team’s loss. “We did it the right way.” Two championship games in two years is certainly nothing to scoff at. The way that things have gone recently for the Tartars, there is no reason to believe that they won’t be back next season, most likely favored to make another deep run in the playoffs. Moreno pitched a complete game, allowing five runs on eight hits while striking out six and walking two.

For now, North High (29-6-1, 9-1) has captured the glory. A long and arduous 36 game season has come to an end with a “W” in the standings and a trophy attached to it. Coach Miller, Loza, Baker and the rest of the Lady Saxons can rest easy knowing that they accomplished what few predicted they would at the beginning of the season. The North High Lady Saxons are your 2016 CIF champions. •

Rumble, Young Man, Rumble

Ali boma ye. A familiar slogan shouted by thousands of Congolese audience members as Muhammad Ali prepared to face George Foreman in 1974 at the Rumble in the Jungle in what was at the time, Kinshasa, Zaire. The pro-Ali crowd from back then has grown by millions in the years since. Cassius Clay, later known as Muhammad Ali, chiseled out a place in the hearts of every American on his way to becoming known as “The Greatest”. Ali entered the hospital last week in the Phoenix area due to

as well. He took down Sonny Liston twice. He brought the enormous George Foreman to his knees by inventing the rope-a-dope. Perhaps most famously, Ali nearly fought until life left his body when he took on Joe Frazier in the Philippines. The names mentioned above speak volumes about who Ali was as a person and a boxer. He never shied away from a battle and was never scared to take on the best that there was. Boxers nowadays fight battles that they know they can win. Ali, on the other hand, was always out to prove a point. He took on the best, beat the

what was initially thought to be non-threatening respiratory issues. It later became one fight that the champion would ultimately not survive. Muhammad Ali died last Friday night at the age of 74. Though his spirit may now be gone, his legend will truly live on forever.

There have been books written, movies made, documentaries produced and articles constructed, all about the man whose name was Ali. The 860 words in this article will certainly neither do any of those, nor the man himself, justice. Perhaps the most important thing to remember about Ali, however, was that he was a man who made promises and truly lived up to them. He promised to be the greatest ever. He was. He promised to shock the world. He did. He floated like a butterfly, he stung like a bee, and even after a despicable disease rendered him much more useless than any other fighter ever could, Ali remained fearless. Though his voice was little more than simply a whisper, his spirit remained gigantic. An unshaken champion, Ali stood for freedom and love.

Muhammad Ali was bigger than boxing. He was one of the world’s most recognizable people, and not just because of what he did with his gloves inside of the ring. Ali famously took a stance on the military draft and refused to go across seas to fight in the Vietnam war. “I ain’t got no quarrel with them Viet Cong,” Ali explained. Likewise, Ali’s conversion to Islam even further polarized a nation that was already in awe of the man who stopped at nothing to stand up for what he believed in. “It’s a sad day for life, man,” promoter Don King said of Ali’s passing. “I loved Muhammad Ali. He was my friend. Ali will never die. Like Martin Luther King, his spirit will live on. He stood for the world.”

Though he stood for the world outside of the ring, Ali certainly stood tall inside of the ring,

best, and became the best that there ever was.

“Muhammad Ali is a legend and one of the world’s most celebrated athletes, the fighter who ushered in the golden era of boxing and put the sport on the map,” Oscar De La Hoya explained. “He paved the way for professional fighters, including myself, elevating boxing to become a sport watched in millions of households around the world.” Muhammad Ali truly was a household name. Without him, the sport of boxing would be nothing.

Ali had a career after boxing, as well. He later became an evangelist and a missionary for Islam, naturally stating, “I will be the greatest evangelist ever,” in a way that only Muhammad Ali could. Soon thereafter, Parkinson’s entered into Ali’s life. His loud voice turned to a whisper, his shuffle in the ring turned into a slow stagger, and his muscular visage quickly turned into a frail countenance. Through it all, however, Ali remained strong-willed and kept the heart of a lion in his chest. “What I suffered physically was worth what I’ve accomplished in life,” he related. “A man who is not courageous enough to take risks will never accomplish anything in life” Words that we all could truly live by.

“I would like to be remembered as a man who won the heavyweight title three times, who was humorous, and who treated everyone right. As a man who never looked down on those who looked up to him, and who helped as many people as he could. As a man who stood up for his beliefs no matter what. As a man who tried to unite all humankind through faith and love. And if all that’s too much, then I guess I’d settle for being remembered only as a great boxer who became a leader and a champion of his people. And I wouldn’t even mind if folks forgot how pretty I was.” – Muhammad Ali

“North Korea has detained those who traveled independently and those who were part of organized tours. Being a member of a group tour or using a tour guide will not prevent North Korean authorities from detaining or arresting you,” said a May 16 alert.

“Possession of any media, either physical or electronic, criticizing the DPRK government or its leaders is considered a criminal act punishable by long-term detention in hard labor camps and heavy fines,” the alert explained.

The United States has no diplomatic ties with North Korea, and cannot assist Americans who are detained by the authorities who’ve held at least 14 U.S. visitors over a 10-year period.

Most of the countries and regions with high travel-risk levels are off the beaten track for most Americans, including Somalia, Pakistan, Central Africa, Columbia, Syria and Iran.

Travel to Mexico merited this warning from the State Department, with a reminder that criminal gangs and drug wars make some states more dangerous than others to visit.

The risks run from being caught in a street fight between rival gangs to abduction for ransom, it said. Carjacking and highway robbery is a serious problem in border towns.

“U.S. citizens are encouraged to lower their personal profiles and to avoid displaying indicators of wealth such as expensive-looking jewelry, watches, or cameras,” the State Department says. Tourists should avoid isolated areas or situations where they appear easy targets for robbers or kidnappers who demand a ransom or force their victims to withdraw money from an ATM before being released.

U.S. citizens traveling on Mexican roads and highways by car or bus may encounter government checkpoints, staffed by military or law enforcement personnel. American travelers are advised to cooperate with the federal police and military personnel, who’ve been deployed by the Mexican government to combat organized criminal groups.

Leader of the Salvation Army Band in Torrance

Most of us know about the Salvation Army. We see their red kettles at Christmastime and know about their collection of gently used items for their stores, helping those in need, but did you know that the Salvation Army in Torrance has opened a music and dance school, named Crescendo? Located at 4223 Emerald Street, I have driven by the facility many times, watching the construction of the new buildings these past few months, and decided to speak with the Music Director, Garry Lawrence.

Although the main church facility continues with the final stages of construction, the Crescendo Music and Dance School is up and running. I parked in the upper lot of the Salvation Army on Emerald Street and made my way down the stairs into the music and dance school, where a smiling Garry Lawrence greeted me. As we walked toward his office, I saw the music rooms on either side of the hallway, and a dance studio at the west end. Speaking with Garry, I found out he was born in Bournemouth, England, and refers to himself as a ‘livelong Salvationist’. “I am third generation Salvationist, so my mum and dad, and his dad before him. And I have three sons, and two of them are fourth generation. James, Barnie, and George,” said Garry in his dulcet, distinctly English accent.

How did Garry Lawrence make his way ‘across the pond’ to Torrance? Six years ago, he was part of a ‘south of England youth band’ that participated in the Rose Parade in Pasadena. “So my group did the Rose Parade. [Garry has marched in three Rose Parades; 2014, 2015, and 2016.] As a result of that, I was invited the following year to come out and be the guest at the Divisional Music Camps. As a result of that - a position was offered me to start this great opportunity here,” said Garry. Everything seemed to fall into place for Garry and his wife of thirty-five years, Julie, so they moved from Bournemouth, England to Torrance, California. “I’m not a young man - lots of people come out here early in their

If you want to check out the school, they offer one free lesson to anyone interested in signing up for classes. The school operates on school semesters, but will offer a summer program. “It is very important with the kids that they like the teacher. If they don’t like the teacher, (we’ve all been there), they won’t work for them. That is important. I am very, very blessed here with out teachers. It’s a great team. “We all know the benefits of a musical education and there are so many papers to say it supports social skills, improving math, generally everything. Our claim is, we don’t want any kid denied a music education because they can’t afford it, so we are also endeavoring to find the funds to meet that need. We’ve got the facility, we’ve got the staff. Funding is another issue,” said Garry.

Garry has traveled the world with his music and the Salvation Army Band. A Band Master (or Band Director) is responsible for the music. “If you perceive a Salvation Army Band as a portable church organ... the function of a Salvation Army Band is to provide music for the services at your own church, but because we can get out, part would go to the hospital, part would go to the old folks home - they can’t come to church, so we took church to them,” said Garry. He explained the band is not a concert band, but predominantly a religious tool, used to evangelize. “For the school to have a brass band, a community band, a community choir, therapy lesson...anything and everything we can do to attract people here and make them feel wanted - through music. That is my aim,” added Garry.

an organization of short-term rental owners, operators and supporters working toward establish responsible guidelines that can serve to regulate, while nurturing, the popular industry. At the moment the LASTRA is advocating for short-term rental owners in cities like Los Angeles where elected officials and neighborhood council members are in the middle of determining how to proceed with said rentals. Some cities, such as Santa Monica and San Francisco, have established special enforcement teams that are dedicated to investigating and eliminating STRs within their city boundaries.

In an email to the mayor and council, attached to the staff report, LASTR Public Engagement Director Brandon Brawner highlighted the benefits of regulating the short-term rental industry in the city. “The truth is that STR have been around for generations, especially along the coastal borders of California, the only thing new about them is the access provided for by our mobile technology-but the same intentional care towards our diverse communities and the sunshine state remain,” states the email. Still, the council moved to prohibit short-term rentals and defined rent as any considered fee,

money, goods or labor, that will cover the use of a property in a residential zone of the city. In addition, advertisements for such rentals are prohibited and defined as “any printed or lettered announcement, whether in a magazine, newspaper, handbill, notice, display, billboard, poster, internet website, internet application, or any other form” by the staff report. Lastly, a hosting platform is defined as a marketplace, regardless of form or format, that “facilitates a short-term rental, through advertisement, match-making or any other means, using any medium of facilitation, and from which the operator of the hosting platform derives

revenues,” states the staff report. The staff report highlighted that the ordinance is categorically exempt from California Environmental Quality Act [CEQA] guidelines set in section 15061 (b)(3) because “it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity may have a significant effect on the environment,” concludes the staff report. “Per the proposed ordinance, any existing short term rental in the City of Torrance must cease operations on the effective date of the Ordinance,” states the staff report. “Failure to do so will result in civil and/or criminal prosecution.” •

Farro, Tuna and Fennel Salad with Crumbled Feta

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup farro, uncooked
- 1 (5-oz.) can tuna, drained
- 1 cup canned chickpeas, drained and rinsed
- 1/2 large bulb fennel, cut in half, cored and sliced very thin
- 2 generous handfuls baby arugula
- 2 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- Zest of 1/2 lemon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/3 cup crumbled feta cheese
- Salt and pepper, to taste

Preparation

1. Cook farro according to package directions. Drain well if any cooking water remains.
2. Transfer farro to a large bowl. Add tuna (flake with a fork), chickpeas, fennel, arugula, olive oil, lemon juice, lemon zest, cumin and salt. Toss well.
3. Spoon into a shallow serving bowl or small platter and sprinkle feta over the top.
