# City To Update Guidelines for eNewsletter and Social Media

After reviewing the city's guidelines for publicizing content on the Torrance eNewsletter and the city's social media sites, the council asked that a few modifications be made, including adding in detail the process by which content is reviewed and edited before being published.

Currently the policies and guidelines do not detail what the information vetting process, prompting a request by Councilman Kurt Weideman on Aug. 9, 2016 to review said guidelines. The request was prompted after residents expressed concerns regarding an Aug. 4, advertisement that was created by the Torrance Refining Company [TRC] and included in a city webpage.

"Following the incident at the ExxonMobil refinery on Feb. 18, 2015, a webpage was established to share any and all public information related to the refinery," states the staff report signed by Cable & Community Relations Manager Michael D. Smith. "The page includes announcements, documents, and links to involved agencies, the refinery, and links to video recordings and presentation materials of all meetings and hearings."

The ad from TRC that raised concern among residents was shared with the intention of just sharing information with the community. However, many residents who read the post and took their concerns with city hall questioned the purpose of the ad, which led to the recommendation by the city manager for the council to review the city's publication guidelines.

"We post third-party information on a routine basis," Smith said. "The intent behind providing that information is to extend transparency to the community...we include press releases from AQMD [Air Quality Management District], from the, city from the Chemical Safety Board, as well as ExxonMobil at the time."

Upon further review and after looking at the city e-newsletter, Smith's department determined that there are an estimated 1,000

subscribers, of which 40 percent clicked on the newsletter. Of that total, only and estimated 25 percent people clicked on the read more section of the article. Given those numbers, the department believed it was necessary to clear up any misunderstandings and confusion that could have been caused by the TRC information.

The council expressed a mutual agreement in that the policies and guidelines established

With 17 elementary schools, eight middle schools and four high schools, preparing for the first day of school is no simple task for the Torrance Unified School District. However, on Sept. 8 the District's 29 schools welcomed back from summer break the almost 24,000 students.

"The first day of school is always full of excitement for students, parents, teachers and staff," Arnold Elementary School Principal Justine Lang said. "You can feel the energy on campus. It's such a great day for everyone. Tiring, for sure, but great."

Preparations to welcome back the thousands of students from a three-month

break range from teacher and staff training to classroom arrangements, such as ensuring lesson plans are in order, supplies are readily available and establishing the logistics to dealing with classrooms filled with students.

"While our students were enjoying their time off with their families, our faculty and administration use the summer months to prepare for the coming year," Torrance Unified School District President Martha Deutsch said. "All of our teachers participated in one or more training over the summer in subject areas ranging from English Language Arts to Math and Science. While we offer some


## **Check It Out**Author Spotlight: Lisa Genova

#### **El Segundo Library Staff Book Reviews and Recommendations**

A researcher with a Ph.D. in Neuroscience from Harvard University, Lisa Genova's novels explore how patients and their families cope with and adapt to living with cognitive diseases or injuries. Her novels skillfully weave scientific information about the conditions characters have and how that personally affects them with the larger context of how those changes affects their family bonds, relationships with others and wider perspective of the world.

Genova's best known book, Still Alice, chronicles the initial onset, diagnosis and aftermath of a Linguistics professor with early onset Alzheimer's disease. Adapted into a movie starring Julianne Moore, the novel is mostly told from the perspective of Alice, and gives readers a unique perspective of how disorienting it is to slowly lose one's memories.


Similar to Still Alice, Genova's latest novel, Inside the O'Briens, also gives readers a glimpse of what it's like to live with another incurable, early onset disease, Parkinson's. Unlike Alzheimer's, Parkinson's patients slowly lose physical control of their movements, speech, etc. while their memories

stay intact but trapped in a body that no longer responds to the brain's commands. Told from alternating perspectives of a close knit Irish family, the novel also honestly and heartwarmingly details how Joe's diagnosis and successive decline affect the relationships, expectations and perspectives of the various family members.

Another difficult but well-handled topic in these two novels is the diseases' hereditary legacy, meaning diagnosed parents have a 50 percent chance of passing these incurable diseases on to their children and grandchildren. Genetic testing can confirm if the

adult children will or won't get the disease when they are older and their decisions to find out or live their lives not knowing are beautifully told.

I highly recommend any of Lisa's novels, all of which are available in various formats such as hardback, Large Type, eBooks and Books on CD from the El Segundo Public Library. ## Canadian-set 'Yoga Hosers' is 'Eh'-mazingly Absurd

One of the more wildly talked about movies from this year's Sundance Film Festival that finally hit theaters earlier this month is the flamboyant comedy-meets-fantasy film, "Yoga Hosers," directed by Kevin Smith. Set in a small Canadian town where the accents are as thick as maple syrup, two 15-year-old best friends, both with extremely unhealthy cell phone addictions, discover that horrifying demons are taking over their workplace and threatening to ruin their late night plans. But what are these terrifying little creatures? Turns out that they're Nazi sympathizing sausages from Canada's past, appropriately called "Bratzis."

Colleen Collette (Lily-Rose Depp) and Colleen McKenzie (Harley Quinn Smith) are terms of the thematic guideline. However, one of my biggest critiques is how anti-climactic the ending is in comparison to the outlandish storyline. There is no stopping this crazy train and the ending could have followed through with the same emphasis.

Aside from the eccentric storyline, what really makes "Yoga Hosers" great is the familial full-circle connections off-screen. Firstly, and most obviously, director Kevin Smith cast his actors close to the vest with his daughter Harley Quinn as the lead character, Colleen M. Another fun connection is between Lily-Rose Depp, who not only acts alongside one, but both of her parents in the film. Her mother Vanessa Paradis plays Ms. Maurice, the school's history teacher who tells the girls of the Nazi origins in Canada. Her father,


yoga enthusiasts by day and convenience store clerks by night. They work after school deadend jobs at Eh-2-Zed, the local corner store that sells everything from toilet paper to "Pucky Charms" cereal. Their overall bratty attitude changes to excitement after senior heartthrob Hunter Calloway (Austin Butler) invites the girls to a totally awesome "Grade 12" party. However, things don't go according to plan when they get stuck working a late shift, and discover not only is Hunter not the sweet guy they thought he was, but that they have bigger fish to fry, or in this case, sausages. Enlisting help from legendary man-hunter Guy Lapointe (Johnny Depp), the girls are forced to defeat the meat that is threatening to kill them.

As one can safely assume by this point, "Yoga Hosers" is a wacky and wholly original moviegoing experience. The cheesiness factor is through the roof, but that is one of its biggest charms. Seeing a movie that is technically sophisticated with a top-notch cast (scene stealer Ralph Garman's insanely spot-on impressions of Sylvester Stallone and Adam West draw the biggest laughs), yet not take itself too seriously on screen, is a rare occurrence these days and should be rewarded. Think "Bad Milo" meets "Sausage Party" in

Johnny Depp, brings his signature Mad Hatter/ Inspector Clouseau-kookiness to his character Guy Lapointe, the legendary man-hunter from Montreal whose accent is as wacky as his bushy brows. Finally, a subtle but interesting connection comes from the air-headed yoga instructor Yogi Bayer, played by Justin Long. Not to venture into gossip magazine mode, but until recently, his longtime girlfriend was Amanda Seyfried, who also appears on the cover of the town's hottest magazine.

The biggest misfortune as an audience member would be to walk into "Yoga Hosers" unprepared; not in terms of knowing the plot twists and turns, but in being unable to appreciate this unusual cinematic presentation. It is a film that will provoke you to immediately either love it or hate it. Yet, despite its critics, there is no denying that "Yoga Hosers" is certainly one of the wildest films of the year. Here's a hint-you definitely want to stay through the end credits just to see Johnny Depp shred on the guitar during the closing song.

"Yoga Hosers" is rated PG-13 for crude humor, sexual references, comic violence, and brief drug material. 88 minutes. Coming soon to Video on Demand. •

# The Recovery Isn't Done With Us, Yet

A booming labor market has created jobs for nearly everyone who wants them and will drive salaries higher next year and ward off a recession, a newly released forecast says.

Los Angeles residents are working and spending money again, which has provided economic stimulus that should carry through 2017, economist Mark Schniepp with the California Forecast Project reported last week. Jobs are being created rapidly in Southern California even as the economy starts to slow in the eighth year of recovery from the 2008 subprime-mortgage crisis.

"The current expansion is old, but it's not running on fumes. Interest rates are at record levels, the stock market is practically

- 26,000 new apartments under construction.
- Office vacancy rates falling.
- Demand rising for warehouse and other industrial space for lease.

"No recession. Less jobs because we all have jobs," Schniepp predicted for 2017, explaining that government and private economists expect a "substantial" slowing of new jobs next year.

Still, the Los Angeles labor market will remain one of the strongest in the nation and creating jobs, especially in the downtown area and the San Fernando Valley, at a near-record pace, according to the data. More than 100,000 jobs will be created this year, and a housing construction boom is underway in West Los Angeles and downtown, according

at record highs, we're at full employment or certainly near it, and wages are rising," Schniepp said last week at the 2016 Entrepreneur Economic Forecast.

"We really don't have any imbalances or bubble concerns at all, right now," he added.

The long-sustained U.S. recovery will end eventually, he noted, but the timing is just speculation at this point. The region's economy is experiencing the most vibrant expansion in the last 30 years, Schniepp said, even joking about the abundance of work for anyone who wants it.

"If you can fog a mirror, you can get a job," he said. "If your salary isn't rising in this labor market, something's wrong."

The job numbers in the L.A. market are "absolutely extraordinary," he told the audience. The surrounding L.A. area is expected to finish the year with 100,000 more jobs than it started with in January. Good things are happening all over Southern California from housing construction to tourism, and it's reflected in the soaring confidence that consumers have about their finances.

Consumer confidence peaked in August to its highest level in nearly five years on the strength of government reports showing employment dropping, incomes rising and the stock market climbing. The nation, California and L.A. County are nearly at full employment, which economists peg at about 4 percent, but Schniepp likens to "most anyone who wants a job can find one."

The booming labor market has an upside for workers, giving them some leverage to ask for a raise or look for a better-paying job. It's expected that personal incomes will grow next year in Los Angeles County, which has experienced its most robust expansion in the past 30 years, the regional data showed. Income growth is expected to hover at around 5 percent.

Almost every L.A. business sector is adding employees and generating more income, and the hospitality industry and the airports - including LAX - are feeling the surge. Current and forecasted conditions for the region include:

- Unemployment near 4 percent.
- Highest job growth in L.A. County in modern history.
- Employment in real estate hitting all-time high.

to data. More than 25,000 apartment units are under construction in the Los Angeles area, the highest number in three decades.

The job numbers in the L.A. market are "absolutely extraordinary," he told the audience. The shortage of available workers could push employers toward labor-saving technology. Tasks normally performed by people would be turned over to robots due to the coming labor shortage, the regional economist said.

The reason why business publications people are talking about a possible recession is that the nation's economy - defined by the gross domestic product - is experiencing such low rates of growth this year, Schniepp said. The nation's economy barely expanded through the midyear, moving the needle just 1.6 percent higher, largely because of falling crude oil prices that has gasoline under \$3 per gallon.

The downside of cheaper crude prices are layoffs and bankruptcies by U.S. exploration and refining companies in the domestic oil and petroleum industry.

The consensus is that the GDP could head upward next year and keep going into 2018.

"We could have one of the better years in 2017 because we won't have the energy meltdown producing a drag on GDP," Schniepp said.

What does it mean for Los Angeles and neighboring counties? The superheated economy should start to cool, though inflation will stay below 3 percent and be partially offset by growing wages, data shows. Population in L.A. County will grow slightly less than 1 percent next year.

The Federal Reserve is expected to raise interest rates sometime late this year or in early 2017 after the election, however, the California Forecast project doesn't anticipate a change in lending rates will discourage people from buying homes. Lenders have eased their credit requirements, which regional and state economists believe will drive demand for homes and condominiums.

## **Outing a Success**

At the beginning of the season, it may have been hard to predict that the Los Angeles Dodgers would be right in the thick of this year's NL pennant race. The team lost Zach Greinke to the Arizona Diamondbacks and previous manager Don Mattingly to the Miami Marlins and it seemed like the Dodgers would need some time to get used to new personnel. Any team that has Clayton Kershaw, though, has a chance. Kershaw recently made his return to the mound last Friday night in Miami after having been out since June 26. It wasn't his best outing in the world. The former Cy Young Award winner only threw 66 pitches through three innings of work, giving up two runs and five hits. The story wasn't about Kershaw's performance, though. The story was that Kershaw actually could perform again.

Any successful postseason run would only be made possible for the Dodgers if Kershaw is available and firing on all cylinders. That's why the Dodgers ace returning to the mound was big news, despite his subpar outing. "A little bit of it, you have to take the long view and understand that this was a win for him and a win for us," Dodgers manager Dave Roberts explained. We will continue to build him up and look toward that start in New York." The positive sign is that there will, indeed, be a next start in New York. After pitching in Miami, Kershaw may not have been up to his typical best, three-time Cy Young Award winner self, but it was the first step in getting the All-Star back to normal.

While the entire Dodgers organization sees his outing as the first step in what could be a long process leading up to the playoffs, Kershaw chooses to look at it a bit differently. "I'm thankful that I got to come back; that's definite," the lefty explained. "Steve [Smith] and Brandon [McDaniel] (his physical therapist and strength and conditioning coach, respectively) have been with me nonstop to get me back and a lot of people have put in a lot of work to help get me back. I understand that from that standpoint and I'm thankful for that. But at the same time, I'm out there to win. I'm out there to get guys out very consistently and I didn't do that tonight."

Kershaw isn't the only one who has been struggling to get guys out, though. After seeing their lead in the NL West balloon to five games, the Dodgers have slowed down a bit since Kershaw's return. After losing two of three to the Miami Marlins, the team's lead shrank to just three games as the Giants look to be heating up just as the Dodgers look to be slowing down. There is certainly no guarantee that Los Angeles wins their division, especially as the race tightens and the season comes to a close. But with less than 20 games remaining on the regular season schedule, a healthy Kershaw continues to be a priority not only for first place in the NL West, but also for success come this year's postseason, no matter the team's seed.

Now, all attention is turned to Kershaw as he takes the mound on Wednesday evening in New York when the Dodgers face the Yankees. The Dodgers, and Dodger fans everywhere, will have their eyes peeled to not only see how healthy Kershaw looks going into and coming out of the performance, but also to see if he can limit the hits and runs as he continues to return to the form that made him the most dominant pitcher in the game. "It was good to see him out there, obviously," Adrian Gonzalez said of Kershaw. "The main thing is that he came out of this healthy. We knew he was on a pitch limit and we knew that he would be not in top shape. He's only had one start in a few months. It was just great to see him out there. He told me he feels good."

The Dodgers have been successful without their ace, going 38-24 in his absence. While that may look good on the surface, there is no doubting the fact that the Los Angeles is simply a better team when Kersh is firing on all cylinders. After missing 75 days due to the herniated disk in his back, the positive sign is that Kershaw is finally back. While he was away, the team turned an eight game deficit in the standings into what became a three game lead after last Sunday's game.

Now, the Dodgers expect to start Kershaw every fifth day down the stretch run of the season, including two starts against the hated San Francisco Giants. By the time the season ends, Kershaw not only expects to be throwing 100 pitches once again, but also expects to be back to form. If the Dodgers can hold their lead in the division and get the best pitcher in the league back to his normal self, a World Series appearance just may not be such a stretch. •

#### **Spartans Earn** First Victory of Season

After South High's initial loss to Lawndale two weeks ago to open the new football season, it looked like it would be a long year for the Spartans and first-time head coach, Matt Mishler. The Spartans were only able to muster three points in their loss a week ago to the Lawndale Cardinals, but quickly turned things around in week number two. Last Friday night, the Hawthorne Cougars traveled to South High to take on Mishler and his Spartans. With a game full of solid defense and touchdowns in both the second and fourth quarters, South was able to pull out a 14-6 victory, earning their first win of the young season.

After both Hawthorne and South High eventually made it out of a first quarter that failed to yield points to either team, it was actually

South High this Friday night. Santa Fe is 0-3 and coming off of a 44-6 loss to Northview, so Mishler and his Spartans will be looking to pad their stats with three weeks remaining until league play begins.

#### North High

After notching their first victory of the season two weeks ago against Aliso Niguel, the North High Saxons and head coach Todd Croce are on a roll. Last week, Torrance's own Bishop Montgomery Knights served to be the victims. In what was a hard-fought game that came down to the very last play, the North High defense was able to stand strong at their goal line and stuff the Knights as time ticked off of the clock at North High. By stopping Bishop on back-to-back plays from the 2-yard line, the Saxons were able to come away with their second victory of the season and stay near

the Cougars who came out roaring first. A 78-yard drive capped by a 5-yard touchdown pass gave Hawthorne a 6-0 lead in the second quarter when quarterback Andrew Kalinowski completed a 4-yard pass to his receiver, Carlos Jacobo.

With just four minutes to go in the half, Mishler and his Spartans weren't about to go into the break scoreless. The South High offense was assisted by the special teams unit all night long. In this case, it was specifically Patrick Patterson. Patterson returned Hawthorne's kickoff 64 yards, setting up South's starting quarterback, Anthony Bjazevich with excellent field position. Bjazevich made the most of it. A four-yard quarterback-keeper resulted in a touchdown on fourth-and-goal as the final seconds ticked off of the first-half clock.

"There's three phases to the game," coach Mishler explained. "We wanted our boys to take that and show them how special teams changes the game." With just 30 seconds remaining in the quarter, Bjazevich and the Spartans were able to take a 7-6 lead going into the break thanks in large part to South's special teams play.

The third quarter was much like the first quarter; uneventful. The fourth quarter, however, was much like the second. A blocked punt by Jake Fejer on special teams gave Bjazevich and South excellent field position, once again. Two plays later, the Spartans quarterback ran the ball in from five yards out once again, this time giving his team the 14-6 advantage. A stout South High defense was able to hold the Cougars at bay the rest of the way. The Spartans and Mishler both successfully came away with their first victory of the regular season.

Bjazevich and a strong South High special teams unit was the key to the game against Hawthorne. The Spartans will look to continue that success and work on other facets of their game as they welcome the Santa Fe Chiefs to

The Saxons came out and started the game on fire. The team scored on three of their first four possessions, taking an early 17-0 lead before going into the halftime break up, 17-7.

Saeed Galloway punched it in from a yard out for North's first score of the game and Malik Welch galloped in from five yards out to create the Saxons initial advantage.

After scoring so effortlessly throughout the first half, North High found themselves stuck on 17 points until late in the fourth quarter. Bishop Montgomery, meanwhile, made their way back into the game thanks in large part to the play of their quarterback Daniel Schubert, who finished the night throwing for 233 yards and a touchdown. By early in the fourth quarter, the Knights led 21-17 on the heels of another Schubert rushing touchdown and everyone in attendance at North High began biting their fingernails a bit.

North starting quarterback, Glenn Searcy, came to the rescue. Searcy generated a 13play, 77-yard drive that marched his team down the field and toward the end zone in the fourth quarter. With just over four minutes remaining in the game, Searcy finally charged the ball into the end zone from two yards out, giving his team the advantage once again with a 24-21 lead. Schubert attempted to drive his team back in the final seconds. After going 86 yards down the field and winding up on North High's 2-yard line, the Saxons defense came up big. Consecutive stops from just two yards out stuffed the Knights and sealed the win for the Saxons. "It was a great relief," Searcy said of his team's defense. "Everyone was really motivated to stop them and I'm really glad and appreciate that this team is willing to do that."

Though it was nail biting and highly entertaining, North High was able to escape with a victory and move to 2-1 on the season. "I


## Hello? Not Now, I'm Driving

While looking out the window riding in a van to an event one evening last week, I happened to notice many drivers talking on their cell phones. They were not necessarily sneakily or stealth-like talking on their phones - they were blatantly holding the phone up to their ear and talking while driving. Upon closer investigation as we rode northbound along the congested San Diego Freeway, not only were people of all ages holding their cell phones with one hand and driving, but some were even texting! This surprised me. Not that I didn't know people broke the law in this way, but I had no idea it was so prevalent. After awhile I stopped counting the number of drivers either holding their cell phone to their ear while they talked, or those blatantly texting.

After that night, I began wondering about the cell phone laws and found out not every state has them, and California has one of the strictest laws in the country. Texting bans outnumber cell phone bans and no state bans all cell phone use for all drivers. According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety 2016, "37 states and D.C. ban all cell phone use by novice or teen drivers, and 20 states and D.C. prohibit any cell phone use for school bus drivers. Text Messaging ban: 46 states, D.C., Puerto Rico, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands ban text messaging for all drivers. Two states prohibit text messaging by novice or teen drivers, and three states restrict school bus drivers from texting." California bans all hand held cell phone use for all drivers, and has an 'all cell phone ban' for transit bus drivers and drivers younger than 18. California also bans all texting for all drivers. Seems that is plain common sense, but as we all know, there is nothing common about common sense.

The entire issue, I found, is complicated. For us here in California, it is illegal for all drivers to talk on the cell phone or text. One of my friends who happens to be a Torrance Police Officer, told me that if you are in an

accident and a question comes up if you were on a cell phone while driving, your records will be checked – confirming the date and time of the accident and your call will be used against you.

Do you notice people talking on their cell phone while driving? And I am not talking about people who use either their 'ear buds' or high tech devices that link their cell phones to their cars' audio system. I decided to ask around and see if I was overreacting, and if others noticed what I did, and what they thought about the issue.

My sister, Linda said, "I see people talking on cell phones while driving all the time, every day. I think what could be possibly so important someone talking on their cell phone, she makes sure to stay away from their car – far away.

they have to be on the phone? And don't they

know that there is a law against it? And if I

am next to them, I have even said, 'no, no'

with my wagging finger and they just ignored

me and kept on talking." I asked my daughter,

One of my friends, living in Torrance, told me her cell phone rang when she was one block from her home in her residential neighborhood, so she thought she could catch it. Well, she did and it just so happened one of Torrance's finest happened to be nearby and saw her reach for her phone and put it to her ear. And yes, you guessed it - she was issued a ticket right on her block. That cured her. Now she never even looks at her cell when she is driving.

The next day, while visiting my local Torrance chiropractor, Dr. Terry Haydel, I asked him if he noticed people texting while driving. He told me he sees people talking and texting

every single day. In addition to his frustration with the fact that people continue to text when they shouldn't, he added that much of his practice now is treating people who have been hit by those texting. Wow. After visiting Dr. Hadel, I spoke with the office assistant, Valerie Sperduto, who told me, "I was going down Hawthorne Blvd. and I was in the second lane off the right hand lane and we were going less than 20, down to 10 miles an hour sometimes. The cars in the other lanes were going right by me. There were too many cars in the lanes and I couldn't get around them. But when I finally did, I looked over and I saw the driver – texting away on her phone. I realized, hey, that's one of our patients.

So, a week later when I saw this patient, I confronted her and asked, 'Do you know what you were doing?' and she had no idea that she was holding up traffic and she was oblivious to everyone around her." Valerie told me after she spoke with the patient she hoped she would pay more attention while driving, and stops texting while she is on the road. Valerie then told me about one of their patients who just died while driving on the 710 freeway. Someone dropped their phone, bent down to pick it up and crashed into their patient and killed her. "I don't know what it's going to take," Valerie added, shaking her head.


Everyone I spoke with about this subject knew it was illegal to hold a cell phone in your hand and talk while driving. And everyone also knew about the 'no texting law'. So why is it we see so many people breaking the law? What will it take for us to put down our phones completely when we drive? As Torrance residents, let's all put down our cell phones and stop texting while driving, keeping our streets safer for everyone. •

professional development during the school year, summer professional development allows teachers the opportunity to develop their subject matter knowledge without having to miss class time."

In addition to being well prepared by the district's training, teachers throughout the district, such as fourth-grade teacher at Arnold Elementary Rubina Ahmed put in an extra effort to meet the first day of school head on.

"I start very early, almost a month in advance to get all my ducks in a row to ease the tension," Ahmed said. "Of course you want to meet all the parents on the first day and have small first impression conversations with the students, but we always have so little time. I am both eager and nervous because I want everything to go perfectly which helps in setting the tone, but of course you have to be flexible."

Setting the tone on the first day of school allows for a smoother transition into the rest of the semester for both students and teachers.

"I think everyone is both nervous and excited on the first day of school, but in a good way. The planning we do isn't just for the first day, but for the entire year, really," Lang said. "The start of the school year is just a busy time with lots of activity and problem-solving. were followed correctly regarding the TRC information, but it was noted that needed is a step-by-step process that explains how information is reviewed and who approves its publication.

"What are the procedures for vetting the information that will show up on the newsletter? Torrance eNewsletter was a weekly publication that featured the community services department and shared activities that included cultural, parks, recreation, and library activities for the upcoming week. Since the newsletter has grown and Smith shared with the council that at the moment, all

Was that information vetted properly before it was even allowed in the newsletter?," Councilman Geoff Rizzo said. "We find that it was not vetted properly. I think we are looking at procedure issues, more than policy issues."

Smith, who took full responsibility for the incident, guaranteed the council that he would look at all information intended for the newsletter and make final decisions on what will publish, as he has been doing so far.

"I currently already look at all the newsletters before they are issued," Smith said. "I'd say ninety-eight percent of all newsletters that have ever been published, I have seen; in this particular incident, it was an oversight on my part."

The city began publishing its weekly e-newsletter in September of 2011, based on a request by then Councilman Cliff Numark. At first information goes through one staff member who writes, another staff member who will edit and the final process involves his edits and final approval.

The council will revisit the guidelines and policies in the following weeks, with updated language that describes the vetting process for information to be published.

"We will be making a more concerted effort in reviewing each newsletter and as information comes forward. We were, for this particular incident, trying to get information out that just came in briefly and share that with the community," Smith said. "It was not our intent to take any position with that particular document. We will take a much closer look at outside information when out comes in, whether we share it or not in the newsletter and social media." •
