Junior Library Clerks Allocated To Librarian Technician Classification

The Torrance Mayor and City Council approved the allocation of two Junior Clerk II incumbents to the classification of Library Technician. The recommendation made by the Civil Service Commission and the Human Resources Administrator is in line with the Torrance Municipal Code and will funding for the changes will be included in the Library Reorganization.

"It's a win-win for everyone because it provides a more clear pathway to a library profession, if they [employees] so decide," Principal Librarian of Operations Dana Vinke said. "It creates a lot more positions that are flexible and part-time for employees, who that works for their schedule."

At the moment the library has several vacant full and part-time Library Technician positions. "As part of the meet and confer process between TLEA and city management, it was agreed that incumbent junior library clerk II's were offered an opportunity to promote to the vacant library technician positions" so long they complete the interview process, states the staff report.

"Employees have already shown interest in these positions and going through the steps," Vinke said. "It is going to be an unfortunately long process, but part of it is being dedicated and making sure that we go through all the steps to make sure that we have capable and strong candidates for these positions. We are very optimistic that current employees and people in our department will try to take advantage of these opportunities."

Vinke recalls that this restructuring process has been a long process but one that is necessary to help the library better serve the community.

"Thanks to Hilary [Theyer], who really pioneered this whole process of restructuring, we got thorough the work and surveying of other libraries to see what their structuring was like to make sure we were on par with them," Vinke said. "Working close with civil service, I think it has worked out really well. **See City Council, page 8**

support classifications concluded that there were five levels functioning as technical support in the library. Two of them were civil service [Library Assistant I and II], in addition to three that were non-civil service [Junior Library Clerk II, Junior Library Clerk I and Library Page]. As a result of the study, the classifications were restructured into four levels: Senior Library Technician, Library Technician, Senior Library Page and Library Page.

In August the Civil Service Commission approved, and the council approved, the class specifications Library Technician and Senior Library Technician to replace Library Assistant I and II. Due to this restructuring of the Library Division, Junior Library Clerk II positions were eliminated "through attrition" and replaced with Library Technician.

"All the positions that are created provide benefits that the current positions didn't have. Staff is afforded the ability to be flexible and to pursue great responsibilities with library organization if they wish to do so," Vinke said. "We are able to provide more coverage during

The Torrance School Board approved the participation of first-grade students from Wood Elementary in the Music Center Artist in Residency Program. This residency program invites students to be involved in six one-hour session tutorials from Sept. 22-Oct. 22, during which time these first-grade Torrance students will engage with a professional artist twice a week.



Legal Aid for Elders

To Prevent Family Squabbles, Add Two Documents to Estate Planning To-Do Lists

When a man who had remarried passed away, his children were less upset about his leaving everything to their stepmother as they were about her decision to liquidate the family home and furnishings. Rather than give them an opportunity to enjoy things that had special meaning to the children, she took the position that they could come to the auction and bid on the items, just like anyone else who attended the auction. The heartbreak and hard feelings that resulted could have been prevented with the use of two documents: a Letter of Instruction and a Personal Property Memorandum.

While it seems that listing out personal assets like jewelry, books, photo albums and home furnishings might be tedious and not really necessary, a recent article in Forbes, "Simple Steps To Prevent Future Family Inheritance Rifts," points the way to using two documents that can ensure that your personal property goes where you want it to go, and also saves your heirs from losing personal items that may hold a great deal of meaning to them.

A Personal Property Memorandum is a legally binding document. It is to be referred to in the will that is to list all the personal property you want to leave to your heirs and loved ones. A personal property memorandum is recognized in 30 states and must be referred to in the will. But the document doesn't need to be notarized or witnessed. The article suggests that you clearly describe these items so they aren't confused with others. For example, "All of the Barry Manilow LPs in my collection are to go to Cousin Buddy." Make sure your executor or executrix has the correct information, as well. You don't want the wrong relative to walk off with your disco records! The second document is called a Letter of Instruction. This is a non-legally binding document that you can create to convey any specific wishes. You may not be able to create a legally binding document to bequeath personal property, so this letter can be a terrific tool to detail the disposal of these things. Here are the types of items that you may want to include in a Letter of Instruction that might not be contained in a Personal Property Memorandum.

The article says to think of a Letter of Instruction as a "cheat sheet" to estates. It might contain the following: the location of important legal documents; all pertinent contacts for legal, tax and financial information and advice; any prepaid funeral arrangements; burial or cremation wishes; including hymns or speakers you'd like at your memorial; a list of financial assets with the beneficiaries and account numbers, PINs, usernames and passwords where applicable; the location of your latest tax return and Social Security statements; safe deposit box locations and keys; and a list of instructions regarding insurance proceeds, trust provision explanations, and business succession plan notes. The article also suggests that you leave a list of contact information for people who should be notified of your passing.

Personal Property Memorandums and Letters of Instruction can be pretty easy to create and to change. They can be a big help to your loved ones after you pass away. In 2007, a North Carolina man got a lot more than he bargained for when he bid on a used grill from a repossessed storage unit at a local flea market. Much to his surprise, when Shannon Whisnant took the grill home, he discovered a severed human foot inside. An egotistical and boisterous personality, he unapologetically intended to keep this foot forever, despite demands of its return from the man whose foot it was. As bizarre as it out of tragedy-John lost his foot in an airplane crash that also left his father dead. On top of struggling with drugs and alcohol for years, the death of his dad was especially hard on him, so he decided to mummify his foot in memoriam. It's an unconventional idea, but the way John speaks to the camera and explains his hardships so honestly and, now seven years sober, so openly, we can't help but support his decisions, no matter how crazy they may be. While it could have been easy to laugh at and look down on the situation, the way Carberry and Tweel capture John's essence and Shannon's ignorance is sweet; we laugh not at them, but with them.

I first saw Finders Keepers when it screened during this summer's Sundance Next Fest, and while I initially didn't have high expectations that this documentary would be anything out of the ordinary, I did predict that I would be in for a wild ride. Now having seen the film, the term "wild ride" seems like an understatement. Funnily enough, when I left the theater at the Ace Hotel in Downtown L.A., I ran into John and his wife about a block away. I stopped to talk to him for a good 20 minutes, and he told me even more outrageous facts that will possibly be made into a narrative film. You heard it here first. 

Quick Italian Bean Salad

- 1 single serve 3 Bean Salad Cup

is because he has been overused as he has increased in age. Scott blames himself for using Kobe too much last season. Doing so led to Bryant being fatigued, having to sit out many games, and to an eventual tear of his rotator cuff after playing only 35 games of the season.

In the 35 games that Bryant played last season, he averaged 34.5 minutes played per game. While it remains unclear how many minutes per game he and coach Scott will agree on for this season, there is no question that it will be well less than that 34.5. While it's easy to throw a number out there at the beginning of the season and say you'll stick to it, gauging minutes on a star as competitive as Kobe can be rather difficult. Will he sit out all back-to-back games? If the Lakers are down by three points with two minutes left but Kobe's already played his 30 minutes for the night, will be continue to sit on the bench? These are all factors that will make coaching this Kobe Bryant led team that much harder for Scott in this upcoming season.

Bryant was medically cleared to begin all basketball activities last Thursday after rehabbing his shoulder for the past nine months. Scott and the Lakers want to make sure that it's the last rehabbing Kobe will ever have to do. "I know Kobe's a competitor and he's going to play as many minutes as you want him to play," Scott said. "I'm also a competitor, so I want to win and I know having him on the court gives me the best opportunity to win." Kobe's expected to get things going this season by participating in the team's training camp at the end of the



Saturn's Moon Enceladus Hosts a Global Ocean

Every square inch of Saturn's small moon Enceladus overlies a potentially habitable ocean. Observations of Enceladus' slight wobble as it orbits Saturn can only be explained if the outer crust floats freely from the inner core, according to scientists studying images taken by NASA's Cassini spacecraft. This means there is a globe-spanning ocean beneath Enceladus' icy surface.

Enceladus has been a prime location for studying the potential for life in the solar system for the past decade, since Cassini found in 2006 a fine spray of water vapor, icy particles, and simple organic molecules erupting from fractures near Enceladus' south pole. Measurements of the saltiness of geyser particles in 2009 proved that they must emanate from a liquid reservoir, and a 2014 analysis of Enceladus' gravitational pull on the Cassini spacecraft demonstrated that the liquid reservoir is at least a regional sea underlying the entire south pole region. The new results-derived using an independent line of evidence based on Cassini's imagesprove that that regional sea is a widening of a global ocean. This discovery is published online in the journal Icarus.

"This exciting discovery expands the region of habitability for Enceladus from just a regional sea under the south pole to all of Enceladus," said Matthew Tiscareno, a Cassini participating scientist at the SETI Institute, Mountain View, California, and a coauthor of the paper. "The global nature of the ocean likely tells us that it has been there for a long time, and is being maintained by robust global effects, which is also encouraging from the standpoint of habitability," he said.

The discovery was made through a combination of imaging, dynamical modeling,

and statistical analysis. "This was a hard problem that required years of observations, and calculations involving a diverse collection of disciplines, but we are confident we finally got it right," said Peter Thomas, a Cassini imaging team member at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, and lead author of the paper.



Enceladus has a tiny, but measurable wobble as it orbits Saturn. The icy moon is not perfectly spherical, and because it goes slightly faster and slower during different parts of its orbit, Saturn pulls and pushes the small moon back and forth as it rotates.

Tiscareno developed a series of dynamical models of this wobble, technically called a libration, and Thomas's group then tested each model against hundreds of Cassini images, taken of Enceladus' surface at different times and from different angles, to find the best fit to the observations with extreme precision. The team plugged their best-fit value for the wobble into different models for how Enceladus might be arranged on the inside, including ones where the moon was frozen from surface to core.

"If the surface and core were rigidly connected, the core would provide so much dead weight that the wobble would be far smaller than we observe it to be," said Tiscareno, "This proves that there must be a global layer of liquid separating the surface from the core," he said.

The geysers deliver samples from this ocean to the surface regularly, which makes Enceladus a prime candidate in the search for life beyond Earth. Although a handful of worlds are now thought to have subsurface oceans, Enceladus joins only Jupiter's moon Europa (which was recently selected as the destination of NASA's next flagship mission) in having an extraterrestrial ocean that is known to communicate with its surface. •


